The island of Kotlin, which is a little more than seven miles long and a mile and a quarter wide, lies at the western extremity of the Bay of Neva, in the fresh water discharged by the River Neva. To the west os the Bulf of Finland.

Kotlin was first fortified in 1703 by Peter the Great, when it was wrested from the Swedes, but it was not until seven years later that the great monar in laid out the town of Kronstadt and began the systematic erection of its defenses. Three hundred thousand men are said to have been employed on this work, but it was not excepteted until the reign of Peter's daughter E izabeth
