

San Francisco, Oct. 26.—The curious circumstances surrounding a shipment of arms and ammunition on the Chilian steamer Loa, now lying in this port, has led to the agretion by the United States officials to prevent any possibility of the warlike goods reaching the hauds of central American insurgents. The cases coutain 4,500 Remington rifles and bayonets, and 2,500,000 ball cartridges. The bills of lading show that the guns and ammunition came to this city from El Paso, where they are supposed to have been reshipped from some point in Mexico. The ship's manifest stated that the munitions of war were for the government of Salvador, and that they were to be landed at Acanjuitia.

The consul-general of Salvador here disclaims any knowledge of the shipment, though Schwartz Bres, the ostensible shippers, say they are acting the Beautiful Salvador and the shipment.



WILL PLY ON PACIFIC.

A New York dispatch says: "When the British steamship Roma, driven by the terrife force of the burricane and tidal wave which swept over Galveston in September, 1900, crashed through three railroad bridges and struck a fourth one, landing finally upon the beach in six feet of water, it was believed she had made her last voyage, but recently, under the command of Captain. Stores, she came into port under her own steam and will be sent to the yards for repairs. After the wreck her London owners gave her up and turned her over to the underwriters, who paid the insurance. William Parr & Co., of Galveston bought her and got her off. This firm sold her to Jam's Jetome, manager of the Saginaw Steamship Company of San Francisco. When repairs, which it is estimated will cost \$800,000, have been made, she will obtain American registry and be used in Pacific coast trade.

SHEARWATER COMMISSIONED.

The Shearwater, which is to relieve the Icarus on this station, was to be commissioned for the first time on Thursday, at Chatham, her keel and underwater fittings having been overhauled. The Shearwater was constructed at Sheerness, and her bottom is planked over with wood and copper sheathing, which makes her suitable for long service on tropical stations. She is 180 feet in length, 32 feet 6 inch in breadth, and of 980 tons displacement. Her machinery, supplied by the Thames Ship building Co., is of 1,400-horse power, with which she is capable of steaming nearly 14 knots per hour. She is equipped with six 4-inch quickfiring guns (two heims mounted forward, two aft, and two amidships), and five smaller, quickfirers. In her fresh coat of paint the Shearwater is said to have the appearance of a very smart and trim little craft.

After spending several days looking over the flest of schoolers lying in the upper harbor, I finally picked on the vera as the one least liable to capsize. The next important thing for me to decide was in what capacity I should offer my services to her owners. I did not care to be mate or even second mate, as I feared my ill-health would prove to be an obstacle, so I finally decided that I would go as hunter. Everybody I talked to who had ever been sealing were hunters, at least so they said, and the case with which they killed "jumpers," bobbers" and "biters" convinced me that I would also be a success with the guns.

One evening I called on Capt. Chas. Burns, the Vera's master, and offered him my services as one of his companions during his coming voyage. I also told him I believed I would try the berth of hunter. He asked if I had any experience as a seal hunter. I told him no, but that I was not afraid of a gan, and had fired one quite a number of times. He said he was sorry, but that he had signed all of his hunters but one, and that several old and experienced men had applied for the berth, and he felt that his duty to the owners required him to employ one of them, but he kindly offered me the position of boat-puller for one of the hunters.

Telling him I would see him again the next day, I left much disappointed at my failure to convince him that young, fresh blood was the best in any business. Next day I found that all the captains had the same prejudice as Capt. Burns, and was going home in disgust when I met Capt, Monroe, of the Borealis. He was about ready to sail, he said, and wanted one more hunter. I told him that was the berth I was looking for, and that I understood the theory of seal hunting, but that I had very little experience in the practical part of the work. He said that made no difference, as none of his other hunters knew much more, and he told me the position was open to me if I wanted it. However, I finally decided that I would rather go as boat-puller on the Vera than hunter on the Borealis.

By December 22nd everything was ready for sea, so all hands were ordered aboard. Our complement consisted of Chas, Burns, master; Dick Gilbert, mate and hunter; W. Emery, second mate and hunter; A. H. Horn, J. W. Ackerman, Lee Gilbert and Osear Camperon hunters.

April 22nd we got 78 skins, which was the best day's catch on that coast during the season, and only four of our boats were among seal. We finally gave up looking for the Pup Bank, and headed for Atton to water up before going to Copper Island. During our run to this port everyone on the schooner was startled by the unusual cry of man overboard!

All of us rushed on deck and learned from the lookout that the mate had been washed off the jib-boom and had been run over by the schooner. Some jumped to boats and got one in the burtons, while others rushed aft to look out for him should be come up astern, for we knew he could not swim a stroke. While we were all anxiously looking over the side for the missing man, he came crawling up over the forecastle head and on to the deck. Just as he was about to be swept under the schooner he grabbed one of the bobstays and hung on till he could get his breath, when he coolly scrambled aboard, none the worse for his ducking.

On July 10th we anchored in Chicagofi harbor, where we found the Casco already lying. Two days later the Director came in, accompanied, by the Sufo Mark, a Jap schooner. They all had the same luck as the Vera, reporting but few seal. On the 15th of July all four of us made sail for Copper Island, and as we were leaving the harbor was sighted the Sieward coming in from the southward, but did not speak her.




