- 12. Parsley: Champion Moss Curled. For garnishing no variety is more attractive. In growth it resembles a tuft of finely curled moss. Is very hardy and slow in running to seed.
- 13. Parsnip: Hollow Crown. The growing demand for this delicious vegetable makes this improved strain particularly desirable.
- 14. Peas: American Wonder. Very early quality, excellent; needs no brush; one of the best for private gardens.
- 15. Peppers: Red Cayenne. Bright red. Pods small, coneshaped. Scarlet when ripe. Pungent.
- 16. Pumpkin: Sweet or Sugar. Bakes the most delicious Pumpkin pies.
- 17. Radish: Lady Finger. Pure white in color. Delicate, crisp and tender.
- 18. Squash: Delicata. May be used either as a summer or a winter variety. Matures about the same time as summer squash and is of much better flavor.
- 19. Salsify: Or Vegetable Oyster, Sandwich Island. A greatly improved variety. Superior both in point of quality and flavor.
- 20. Spinach: Long Standing. Best for family use.
- 21. Tomato: Early Minnesota. Unapproached in earliness by any good Tomato. It is shapely, smooth, solid and of fine flavor.
