At various stages of this operation the fear has been expressed in certain quarters that the removal of important individuals from the economy would adversely affect the operating efficiency of business concerns, retard economic recovery, and increase the burden on the taxpayers of the United States. Statistics of production and trade during the last six months have failed to bear out this fear. In fact, evidence has come to the attention of this Headquarters that the removal of old leaders has, by permitting younger and more vigorous executives to assume more important positions, created a healthder and sounder base for the future Japanese economy.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD:

SUBJECT: Purge Statistics, Including Forecasts

- 1. The information furnished in Inclosure #1 is based upon reports from the Japanese Government as of 14 February 1948 which were carefully checked against records in this Section.
- 2. It is impossible for this Headquarters to furnish the approximate estimates requested by Series II, basic communication, inasmuch as the entire purge program has been administered according to the basic concept of the applicable provisions of the Potsdam Declaration, the U. S. Initial Post-Surrender Policy for Japan and early directives from the Joint Chief of Staff, all of which positively avoid any reference to degree of culpability. In keeping with this principle the entire screening and other application of purge criteria to individuals has been administered for the purpose of determing if a person was or was not an active exponent of militant nationalism or aggression as broadly defined in directives received by this Headquarters. The purge criteria as specifically applied to persons who held positions in government and the economy of Japan during the critical years is such that it applies to only those persons who held key positions of policy-making responsibility. To furnish the required information would require a much more detailed definition of just what is wanted and would possibly require a re-survey of the entire

purge program as effected to date. To make such a distinction, if one clearly exists, would probably require an entire new program, based different in concept from that of the purge.

These persons held positions in economic organizations which subjected them to screening; upon examination of their questionnaires, they were, with 12 exceptions, found to have held positions which, under the economic provisions of the ordinances, subjected them to removal and exclusion from public office. They have been notified of their purge and removed from office. The 12 exceptions mentioned above have been removed and excluded from public office not because they fell under economic purge criteria, but because they were members of ultra-nationalistic societies, purgeable officials in IRAA, IRAPS, etc., or fell under other provisions of the purge ordinances as follows:

2. The total number of persons barred from office under the economic purge program is, as of 17 January 1948, 1.465. This figure includes those persons who have been provisionally, then finally, designated, as well as those persons who submitted questionnaires but resigned before notified that they were subject to removal and exclusion on the basis of their questionnaires. (Note: were those persons who submitted questionnaires, but resigned in anticipation of purge, counted among those removed from public office, instead of barred, the figure would run about 550.)

With the exception of 18 persons who fell solely on other than economic grounds, the 1,465 who were barred from public office were barred under the economic provisions of the purge memorands. Those who were barred on other grounds fell within the following categories:

figures due to the fact that many persons held one or more purgeable economic positions concurrently. For example, there were 1,820 positions subject to provisional designation under the economic purge criteria, 1,820 persons were provisionally designated, but only 1,465 were finally designated and barred, as many of these persons held more than one purgeable position concurrently.
