

NAVAL TRAINING

Report on New Scheme-Every Officer an Engineer.

The British admiralty has issued a The British admiratly has issued a blue book containing reports of the departmental committee appointed to consider certain questions concerning the extension of the new scheme of training for officers of the navy. The principal report is that of Sir. Archibatd Douglas' committee, who had to report whether the time has arrived to formular very lating for the allows. formulate regulations for the alloca-tion of the duties of future officers by various branches of the service—whe-ther any necessity exists for the dis-tinct classification of such officers, and consider and report on methods for providing warrant officers for taking tharge of stoke hold and engine-room tharge of stoke hold and engine-room watches, so as to relieve more highly trained officers from such routine duties. The committee consider that these duties can be efficiently performed by men specially selected from the stoker ratings of the fleet, provided that a suitable course of instruction is byten and recommend the creation of a warrant officer rank for that pur pose. On the general question of the classification of officers the repor-says. We are of officers that a spe-cial knowledge of engineering or mill tary duties will no more debar an officer from obtaining the qualification necessary to the command of a ship or

to wait and watch its operation and effect without prejudice, and to make and changes therein that time and experience may show to be necessary regarding classification and specialization, interpreted in the control of the decision into effect will be needed for many sears. Then the board can see what the effect of the training has been arrivated by the result of experiment. The new regulation that specialization will not take place until the rank of lieutenant has been reached has been confirmed. There is no intention of interfering with the continuity of policy in regard to education and training of naval officers as now established."

Prof. J. A. Ewing delivered a lecture on the new naval officers at Portsmouth. The training broadly speaking, he said, would make every naval officer an engineer, for it must he recognized that in the modern navy engineering was by no means confined to the engine-room.
