"I differ from the hon. member when he says that the reverse is not true—that there cannot be representation without taxation. The proposition of hon. members opposite, although I know they do not intend it, will be taken by the colonies as a proposal that we should tax them—(hear, hear)—that in return for giving them representation which would never be more than a minority in this House—at any rate, for years to come—we should claim the right to tax them in a proposition which, if it were ever to be considered, should come to us from them, and should not be suggested by us—(Cheers.)"

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Colonial Secretary agrees with Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Tarte that it is quite possible to have representation in the councils of the Empire, to a certain extent, at least, without taxation.
