One of the most trying experiences of the siege was the waiting for news.
Every now and then a dispatch rider or native runner would manage do get through from the British lines with a buddle of English and colonial papers, but shees occasions were very much like angels' visits. To people in England it will doubtless seem almost incredible that although we were cut off as to how long the water would hold out, and on the Sunday morning hundreds of daps were turned on, and every available vessel utilized in the "drawing off" process. Fortunately there was no real cause for alarm. The reserve supply was sufficient to last about a month, and long before this was exhausted the De Beers Company had arranged-for a supply from the Premier mine, ample for domestie purposes.

In regard to the food supplies, every body felt confident that we were well provisioned, and that there need be no anxiety on this head.

It had hardly lasted three days when the majority of the storekeepers commerced "running up the prices, but Colonel Kekewich soon stopped this, regulating the prices of various necessaries, and decreeing that what was charged for the remainder should not exceed the figures prevailing before we were cut off. For the first month things went on as usual, and then the stocks of flour, Boer meal, etc., held in town, were ordered to be delivered at certain depots, and allowances of bread flour, mealle meal, sugar, and rice were shortly afterwards fixed for consumers, the allowances being on a fairly liberal scale. At the same time, the flat went forth that no fancy bread, biscuits or cakes could be made.

During the last few weeks of the siege the allowance per head was as follows: '4 pound meat, 10½ ounces of bread, 2 ounces of mealie meal, 1 ounce of samp forushed mealies), and 2 ounces of sugar per diem. This was just about sufficient to keep body and soul together. The little bacon, cheese, tinned meats, butter, condensed milk, etc., remaining in the town had long since been commandeered by the military authorities, and were only doled out to sick persons provided with a medical certificate.
