

MACKENZIE TO DISCUSS PLANS WITH PREMIER

Broken Bridge Delayed Railway President at Comox-Probable Route of Railway

An announcement in regard to the plans of the Canadian Northern rail-way on Vancouver Island is expected almost immediately, probably to-morrow. William Mackenzle, who arrived on Saturday, made an automoble trip to Comox without meeting with Premier, McBride, and was expecting to have returned last night. To-day a telegraphic message was received from him at Union Ray stating that owing to a bridge being down he would be unable to reach this cify until to-night, and that he would see the premier in the morning.

Although it has not been officially announced, it is understood that the royte to Barclay Sound by way of the wast coast has been abandoned, on account of the large expense which would have to be met in rock cuttings. It is also known that a number of survey parties have been out in different directions looking for the most feasible route. It is expected that the railway will go west from Victoria to Goldstream, thence north along the west shore of Saanich Inlet, between the E. & N. railway and the sea, finding a much better grade than the other line. They may cross the E. & N. track in the vicinity of Duncans, and thence up vicinity of Duncans, and thence up the vicinity of Duncans, and thence up fhe Cowichan river and along the north shore of Cowichan lake, head-ing for a point on Alberni canal, some-what south of the town of Alberni, and probably about midway between the town of Alberni and Sarita Bay, where it was formerly thought the railway would make its terminus.

When asked as to the correctness of When asked as to the correctness of a report that an application for a change of location in the main line from Edmonton under the charter granted by the government to the Ed-monton, Yukon & Pacific Railway Company was to be made. The land value tax was but a means of laying the foundation in brotherhood, the end of which would be applied Christianity. He had not leasned the meaning of the text, "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and his righteousness and all these things shall be added unto you" until Henry George taught him. The reason men worried about what to eat, drink and put on, was because they denied the righteousness of God in the earth on which they lived.



(Special to the Times.)

Ottawa, Ont., Sept. 6. - Earl Grey, Governor-General of Canada, is in communication with civilization after a month in the wilderness on a journey overland to Hudson Bay and from there via government steamer down the Atlantic coast to Pictou, Nova Scotia. an official description of the trip was received Sunday by the secretary of state. It was wired from Battle Harbor by W. R. Brock, deputy minister of mines, who is a member of the party. Mr. Brook telegraphs:

"The object of the Governor-General's and through Hudson's Straits was journey, given by himself, is to explore the theory of the frozen north and to add another chapter to the history of northern travelling. and through Hydson's Straits was made without incident, the weather being fine and no ice being seen. On the 1st of September, off Cape Harri-sen our wireless operator got us into touch with civilization, his signals be-ing picked up by the Canadian wireless station at the Straits of Beile Isle."
