Hudson Bay, Peace River and Pacific Main Line Will Be 1,500 Miles Long

(Special to the Times.)

Winnipeg, May 3.—The Tribune says that within a fortnight surveys will start from Edmonton and this point on branch lines in connection with the Hudson's Bay, Peace River and Pacific railway, and that another surveys will start from Edmonton and this point on branch lines in connection with the Hudson's Bay, Peace River and Pacific railway, and that another surveys will proceed to Fort Churchill to start work from that end on the main line which will run right across the top of the continent, south of Lake Athabasca and through Peace Landing across the Rockies to Port Simpson on the Pacific Coast.

This aribitious project is financed by Scottish capifal with which prominent Toronto and Winnipeg capitalists are associated and there is good geason to believe in its bona fides.

The proposed route will be the shortest practical between Hudson Bay and the Pacific, reducing the rail haulage to fifteen hundred miles, or about half any other transcontinental line. Amendments to the original charter are now being sought at Ottawa to enable the building of various branches.

The system as planned provides for the following mileage: Main line, Fort Churchill to Port. Simpson, 1,599; branch, Fort Churchill southeast to York Factory, 150 miles; branch, from main line near southwesterly direction ast of Reindeer lake to Prince Albert, 500 miles, branch, from main line in a southwesterly direction ast of Reindeer lake to Prince Albert, 500 miles; branch, from main line near the mountains in southwesterly direction to Edmonton. 200 miles.





How is the beginner to obtain the advantages of "line" breeding or in preeding without incurring its risks? Professor Darwin pointed out many years ago that if a male bird is resmoved from the flock at an early age and reared at a distance; the difference of climate, feeding and environment generally will so affect him that if, later, he is brought back to the flock the dangers of inbreeding are minimized almost as much as if he had been of unrelated blood.



The practical bearing of this for the beginner is that he should obtain-birds from a famous breeder at a distance. Clauses of Veto Bill Passes—Only Preamble Now to Be Considered

London. May 3.—After closure, lause two of the parliament bill, the most important section of the government's measure for the curtailment of the answers of the Lords, was carried a the Commons last night, by 298 to 55. Later, by the aid of closure the remaining clauses—four, five and six—were adopted without amendment by large, majorities.

Clause four provides that "nothing in this act shall diminish or nullify the existing rights and privileges of the House of Commons."

Clause five provides for the duration of parliament, reading: "Five years shall be substituted for seven years as the time fixed for the maximum duration of parliament under the september of the House of the House of Commons."

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ment's m asure for the curtailment of the sowers of the Lords, was carried in the Commons last night, by 298 to 195. Later clause three of the bill, providing that "any certificate of the speaker of the House of Commons given under this act shall be conclusive for all purposes and shall not be questioned in any court of law," was carried, after closure, by 255 to 133.

Clause two relates to any bill other than a money bill, and provides that if any such measure is passed by the Commons in three successive sessions and is rejected by the Lords at each of these sessions it shall become an act of Parliament on the royal assent.

Before the vote was taken Winston Churchill, home secretary, said the adoption of the clause was imperative P. Burns.
