Earl Kitchener Makes Statement.

"Earl Kitchener is well aware that much anxiety must have been caused to the British press by the knowledge that these matters were being freely discussed in the continental press and he wished to assure the press of this country that nothing but his conviction of the military importance to this country of suppressing these movements would have led him to issue instructions which placed the press of this country under a temporary disadvantage."





AN ICELESS REFRIGERATOR.

. . . Technical World.

Because no ice-refrigerator is cole enough, according to the experts, to pre-vent decay of perishable foods, the ice-less domestic refrigerators are doing away with the ice-man. This new ma-chine, which has been placed on the mar-ket, operates with an electric motor and the well-known ammonia system of re-frigeration. The average cost a month for electric current is about two dollars, and the various spaces in the refrigerator are kept at a temperature of from twenty degrees up. The average ice-box in hot weather keeps its compartments at a temperature of from fifty-six to sixty-three degrees, but it has been shown that fruits should be kept at a temperature at least thirty degrees lower. CONFERENCE TO-DAY ON WATER QUESTION

Committees of City and Saanich Councils Meet to Settle Basis for Purchase of Water

As a sale of water in bulk to Saanich would necessitate the putting in of connections for the municipality in the big pressure pipe line at Burnside road, it is urgent that the city council and the Saanich council come to some de cision. Hence committees of the two councils met this afternoon to arrange the terms which the councils may be asked to adopt.

The conference last week cleared the air considerably, but no mention was made of any specified amount which should be paid by the district to the city per thousand gallons. However, figures were before the aldermen and councilors which tended to demonstrate that the city could not afford to venture to sacrifice a customer of the potentiality of Saanich, as the fixed charges and maintenance of the Sooke works will be the same whether five million or ten million gallons a day are assing through the big main.

Although it must necessarily me months before there is a change from the present sale of water retail to a sale in bulk, the connections must be put in at once before the trench is filled on the Burnside road should the city and district council reach an agreement on the matter. If no set-tlement can be made, then the pipe will be covered, for the Saanich people would be compelled to make a con nection with the main from Gold-stream in the vicinity of the Craig-flower bridge.







Three years later the charter was revised. This monopoly was confined by the acts of 1707 and 1742. The government of 1844, under Sir Robert Peel, revised the organization of the bank. The legislation was known as the "Bank Charter Act of 1844," or "Peel's Act," in which are embodied the leading provisions by which the bank note circulation of England and Wales is now regulated. The act provided for the division of the bank into two departments, the issue department and the banking department.
