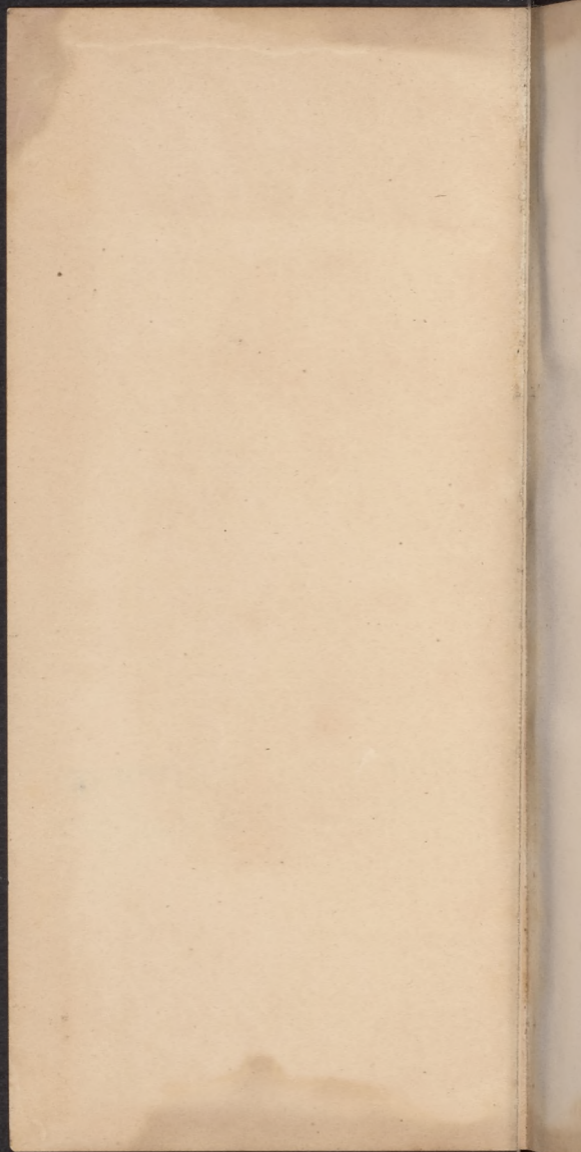
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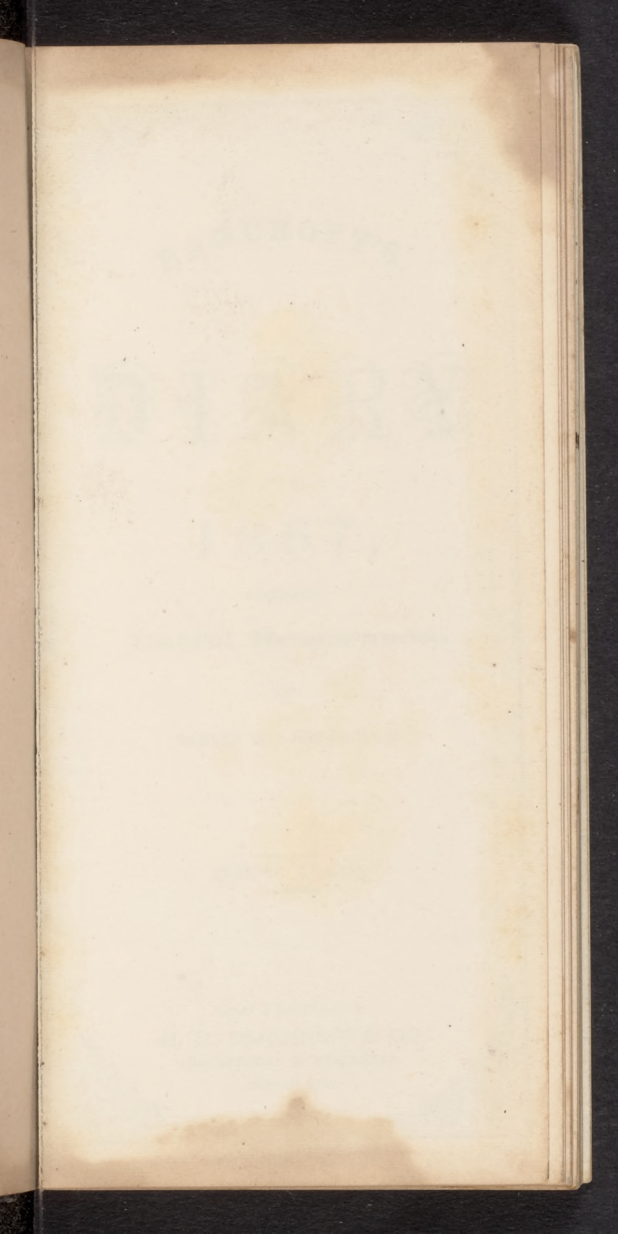
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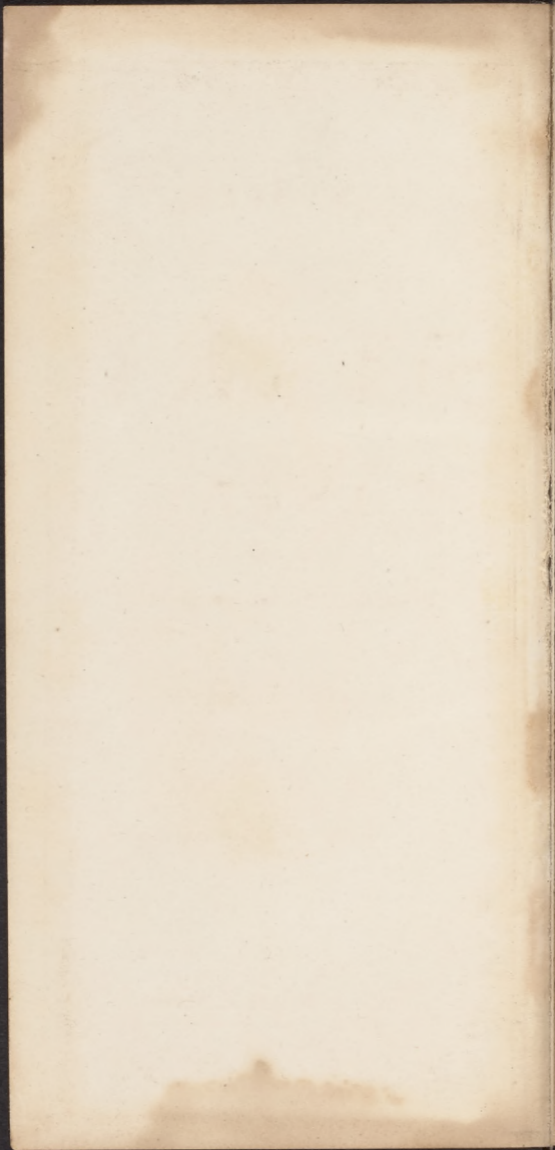

ASCENSION DAY, or HOLY THURSDAY, is the Thursday in Rogation Week, the fortieth day from Easter. — *May 30th.*

PENTECOST, or WHITSUNTIDE, is the forty-ninth day, or seventh Sunday after Easter. — *June 9th.*

TRINITY SUNDAY is the next after Pentecost. — *June 16th.*

ST. JOHN BAPTIST'S DAY. — *June 24th.*

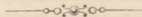

regulating Hacks, Cabs, and other Vehicles in Public
Streets.*

RATES OF FARE.

For a Hack for one person, not exceeding one mile. .	\$ 1 50
For a Hack for two or more persons, not exceeding one mile.	2 50
For each additional mile, for each passenger.	50
For a Cab for one person, not exceeding one mile ..	1 00
For a Cab for two or more persons, not exceeding one mile.	1 50
For each passenger for each additional mile.	25
For a Cab for two persons, when engaged by the hour, to be computed for the time occupied in going and returning, including detention for the first hour.	1 50
For each subsequent hour so-used	1 00
For a Hack for four or less persons, when engaged by the hour, to be computed for the time oc- cupied in going and returning, including de- tention, for the first hour.	3 00
For each subsequent hour so used	2 00

*No extra charge to any passenger shall be made for the
ordinary amount of baggage.*

SEC. 5 OF ORDER 43. — "From the landing of any steamboat
to any point east of the west line of Mason street, and north of
the south line of Brannan street east of Third street, shall in all
cases be estimated not to exceed one mile."

The penalty for the violation of any of the provisions
of the above Order shall not be less than five dollars, nor
more than ten dollars for each offence, exclusive of costs.



 The indiscriminate use of all kinds of stamps (except postage or proprietary) is permitted, care being taken to affix a stamp or stamps of the proper amount.

Documents made in any foreign country, to be used in the United States, shall pay the same duty as when made here.

Powers of Attorney, or other papers relating to applications for bounties, arrearages of pay, or pensions, require no stamp; neither do indorsement of negotiable instrument, nor any warrant of attorney accompanying a bond or note when such bond or note shall be stamped; and whenever any bond or note shall be secured by mortgage, but one stamp duty is required, provided the stamp duty placed thereon is the highest rate required for said instrument, or either of them.

The person using or affixing the stamp or stamps, shall write thereupon the initials of his name and the date upon which the same shall be attached or used, so that the same shall not be used again, under a penalty of \$50; or they may be otherwise canceled as the Commissioner of Internal Revenue may prescribe.

Violations of these Stamp Duties will be punished as the law directs.

LAWS OF CALIFORNIA,
OREGON, NEVADA, WASHINGTON, AND IDAHO,
FOR THE
COLLECTION OF DEBTS.

I. Of California.

STATUTE OF LIMITATIONS.—In this State, debts are barred by time sooner than in any other State of the Union, except Nevada. To compensate for this, however, the means given for their collection are speedy and effective.

ACCOUNT.—Action on an open account for goods, wares, and merchandise, and for any article charged in store-account, must be commenced within two years after the account is due, or the cause of action accrued.

2. Accounts which have been audited by the parties, and approved and certified to be correct by them, are called "stated accounts," and are not barred until four years after they become due. And an account in writing, examined and signed by the parties, will be deemed a stated account, notwithstanding it contains the ordinary clause that errors are excepted.

3. Where there are mutual open running accounts regularly kept up between parties, the cause of action is not deemed to have accrued until the time of the last item proved in the account on either side. Consequently, the statute does not commence running until the date of such last item.

4. To sustain an action on an "account stated," it must be shown there was a demand in favor of plaintiff acceded to by defendant. And if defendant does not object to the accounts as presented, within a reasonable time, his silence will be an admission of its correctness.

5. A private account-book kept by a person, containing only an account of money paid by him, is not evidence to charge another. It should be an account of both money paid and that received.

6 The account-book of a tradesman is not evidence to establish a charge for money loaned, but it may be to show that articles were procured for another, which the tradesman paid for and charged as so much money loaned.

7. The fact that the charges are first made on a slate, and then transferred to the book, does not affect the character of the book as one of original entries,—the charges on the slate being mere memoranda, not intended to be permanent. But such transfer must not be long delayed, otherwise the book will be rejected, unless the delay be satisfactorily accounted for.

8. An account-book is not admissible to prove a single item only, unless it appears that goods were bought at various times, for which only one charge was made after the order was filled.

MECHANIC'S ACCOUNT. — Notice of mechanic's lien, filed in the Recorder's office, need not set out the items of the account; a general statement of the demand, showing its nature and character, and the amount due or owing thereon, is sufficient.

2. A farmer's, mechanic's, or laborer's book, in which he keeps an account of services rendered and materials furnished in the course of trade, and of articles furnished from his farm, may be introduced in evidence in his favor, after having been shown by his own oath that it is a book of original entries; that it was kept by himself; that the entries were made by him at the time of the transaction; that he kept no other books; and had no clerk. Under such circumstances, the entries in such book, accompanied with proof of the party's reputation in the neighborhood for keeping correct accounts, by persons who have dealt with him, are sufficient *prima facie* evidence of the services rendered, and of their value, and of the materials or products furnished, and of their price.

ACCOUNTS IN OTHER STATES. — The same limitation of two years applies to accounts contracted out of the limits of this State. And if such account be barred in the State where contracted, short of the two years, it is barred also here.

WRITTEN INSTRUMENT. — An action on a promissory note, bill of exchange, bond, due-bill, or other written instrument, promising to pay, is barred at the expiration of four years from the time the same became due and payable. And if a note or bond is payable in instalments, one or more of the instalments may be barred whilst others remain in force.

LAWS FOR COLLECTION OF DEBTS.

2. In this State, contrary to the rule in other States and in England, no admission or part payment will have the effect to revive a claim barred by the statute of limitations, unless such admission be in writing, and signed by the party to be charged. This writing may either be endorsed on the instrument itself, or be in a separate instrument or letter or memorandum.

ON JUDGMENTS.—An action on a judgment rendered in this State is barred in five years; on one rendered in another State or country, in two years from the final entry of the judgment.

ARREST OF THE DEBTOR.—The only instances in which the person of the debtor can be arrested for a money demand, in this State, are the following :

1. In an action for the recovery of money or damages on a cause of action arising upon contract, express or implied, when defendant is about to depart from the State, with intent to defraud his creditors.

2. In an action for a fine or penalty, or for money or property embezzled or fraudulently misapplied, or converted to his own use, by a public officer, or an officer of a corporation, or an attorney, factor, broker, agent, or clerk, in the course of his employment as such; or by any other person in a fiduciary capacity, or for misconduct or neglect in office, or in a professional employment, or for a wilful violation of duty.

3. When the defendant has been guilty of fraud in contracting the debt, or incurring the obligation for which the action is brought, or in concealing or disposing of the property, for the taking, detention, or conversion of which the action is brought.

4. When defendant has removed or disposed of his property, or is about to do so, with intent to defraud his creditors.

To entitle a party to the remedy of arrest, it is not necessary that he should know positively of the commission of a fraud or of an intention to leave the State. It is sufficient if the circumstances detailed would induce a reasonable belief that a fraud or exit was intended.

When the relationship subsisting between the parties be that of partners, and not that of principal and agent, an embezzlement of the copartnership property is not such a fraud as will warrant an arrest. Nor can one be arrested for fraudulent representations in obtaining money, when the representations were subsequent to the acquisition of the money. An affidavit for arrest which avers on infor-

mation and belief that the debtor has been guilty of a fraud in contracting the debt, or in endeavoring to prevent its collection, or that he is about to depart from the State, stating the facts upon which the belief is founded, also on information and belief, is sufficient.

The arrest is only intended to secure the presence of the debtor until final judgment; in order to detain and imprison him afterwards, the fraud must be alleged in the complaint, be passed upon by the jury, and be stated in the judgment.

By an Act of 1863, in an action on a contract in writing, made payable in a specific kind of money or currency, the judgment and execution may follow the contract, and be made payable only in the particular kind of currency designated. This act is intended to obviate the inconvenience and injustice resulting from the payment of executions in United States legal tender treasury notes. This act took effect on the 27th of April, 1863.

ATTACHMENT.—The property of the debtor may be attached in the following cases:—

1. In an action upon a contract, express or implied, for the direct payment of money, which contract is made or is payable in this State, and is not secured by mortgage, lien, or pledge, upon real or personal property, or if so secured, such security has been rendered nugatory by the act of the defendant.

2. In an action upon a contract, express or implied, against a defendant not residing in this State.

Under this law it has been decided,—

1. That a debt due for merchandize sold in Boston to residents of San Francisco, and forwarded to the latter, they stipulating to pay by remitting funds to Boston, is not the subject of an attachment. The contract must be made or payable in this State.

2. That a confession of judgment to a *bona fide* creditor, and the issuance of execution and making levy under the same by the judgment debtor, without the knowledge of the judgment creditor, done with the knowledge that another creditor is about to attach, and for the purpose of defeating his attachment, is void as to the attaching creditors.

3. An attachment issued before the maturity of the debt is *prima facie* void as against a subsequent attachment. But where goods are fraudulently purchased of an insolvent, the creditor may attach before the maturity of the debt.

LAWS FOR COLLECTION OF DEBTS.

4. A party having secured a mechanic's lien under the statute, does not forfeit or waive it, by causing an attachment to issue and be levied upon the property of the debtor to secure the same demand.

EXECUTION, *Property liable to.*—All property of the judgment debtor is liable to execution, except chairs, tables, desks, and books, worth one hundred dollars; necessary household, table, and kitchen furniture, including stoves, stove pipe, stove furniture, wearing apparel, beds, bedding, and bedsteads, and provisions actually provided for individual or family use, sufficient for one month; farming utensils, two oxen, or two horses, or two mules, and their harness, four cows, one cart or wagon, and food for such animals for one month, all seed-grain, or vegetables actually provided, reserved, or on hand for planting or sowing at any time within the ensuing six months, not exceeding in value two hundred dollars; the necessary tools or implements of a mechanic or artizan; the instruments and chest of a physician, surveyor, and dentist; the law library of an attorney or counselor, and the library of a minister; the cabin or dwelling of a miner, worth five hundred dollars, also his mining tools, implements and appliances, worth five hundred dollars, and two horses, mules or oxen, with harness and food for one month,—when necessary, for any windlass, derrick, car, pump, or hoisting gear; two oxen, two horses or two mules, and their harness, and one cart or wagon, by the use of which a cartman, huckster, peddler, teamster, or other laborer habitually earns his living, and food for such animals for one month; one horse, harness, and vehicle, used by a physician, surgeon or minister, in making his professional visits, with food therefore for one month; all fire-engines, carriages, and apparatus thereto appertaining, and all furniture and uniforms of any fire-company or department organized under any law of this State; all arms, uniforms, and accoutrements required by law to be kept by any person; all court-houses, jails, public offices, lots, grounds, buildings, and personal property; fixtures, furniture, books, papers, and appurtenances of court-house, jail, and public offices of counties; cemeteries, public squares, parks, and places, town halls, markets, buildings of fire departments and military organizations, lots and grounds held by cities or towns, and dedicated by them for purposes of health, ornament, or public use. But no article or species of property above mentioned shall be exempt from execution issued upon a judgment recovered for its price, or upon a mortgage thereon.

In addition to the above, the earnings of the judgement debtor for his personal services rendered at any time within thirty days next preceding the levy of execution or attachment, is exempt, when made to appear by debtor's affidavit or otherwise to be necessary for the use of his family residing in this State, supported wholly or in part by his labor.

HOMESTEAD.—Also, every person is entitled to a homestead, if he has taken the proper means to secure it. A married person, to one of the value of five thousand dollars; and a single person, to the value of one thousand dollars. This homestead is exempt from forced sale under execution.

Shares in homestead associations, to the extent of one thousand dollars, are exempt where the person is not the owner of a homestead.

EVIDENCE.—By an Act of 1863, no person can be excluded from being a witness on the ground of his being interested in, or a party to the suit, but all are admissible; and the fact of interest or other disability, which formerly rendered witnesses incompetent, now goes simply to their credibility, and not to their competency.

II. Of Oregon.

By the Act of 1862, called the Code of Civil Procedure, actions upon promissory notes, due bills, bills of exchange, accounts, and upon all contracts or liabilities, express or implied, are given six years to run before being barred by the statute of limitations.

And in case of judgments of any court of the United States, or of any State or Territory within the United States, and of sealed instruments, the limitation is extended to *ten* years.

ATTACHMENT.—In this State, to authorize an attachment, the defendant must either be a foreign corporation or a non-resident, or must have departed the State, to defraud or delay creditors, or to avoid the service of summons, or have removed, or be about to remove his property from the State, to delay or defraud his creditors; or must have assigned, secreted, or disposed of, or be about to dispose of his property, to defraud or delay creditors; or the debt must have been fraudulently contracted.

LAWS FOR COLLECTION OF DEBTS.

EXECUTION, *Property liable to.*—All the property of the debtor, both real and personal, is liable to execution, except the following:—

1. Books, pictures, and musical instruments, of the value of \$75.
2. Necessary wearing apparel, of the value of \$100, and if debtor be a householder, for each member of his family \$50 worth.
3. For each household, ten sheep, with their fleeces, and yarn and cloth manufactured therefrom; two cows, five swine, and provisions and fuel for such household for six months.
4. To each householder, all household goods, furniture, and utensils, not exceeding \$300 in value.
5. Tools, implements, material, &c., to enable any person to carry on his profession or trade, not to exceed \$400 in value.
6. Feed for his work animals for three months.

Not even these articles, however, are exempt from an execution on a judgment for the price of them.

There is no HOMESTEAD law in this State, exempting certain property of the debtor from execution, as in California.

III. Of Nevada.

In this State, the law relative to the limitation of actions is the same as that of California, except that an action upon any judgment, contract, obligation or liability, for the payment of money or damages obtained or made out of the State, must be commenced within six months from the time the action accrued. The ATTACHMENT law is substantially the same as that of Oregon, and the law relative to property exempt from execution is the same as that of California. The HOMESTEAD law, also, of this State is the same as that of California, except that it does not extend to unmarried persons, but to the heads of families only.

IV. Of Washington Territory.

The laws upon these subjects are nearly identical with those of Oregon. A *Judgment*, however, is placed in the same category with written contracts as regards the period of limitation,—both remaining valid for six years; and open *Accounts* are barred after three years.

In this Territory, also, there are exempt from execution, "Dwellings and other buildings, together with the lot or ground on which they stand, to the value of \$ 500." With these exceptions, there are no noticeable distinctions between the laws here, on these subjects, and those in Oregon.

V. Of Idaho Territory.

The statute of limitations of this Territory, is taken from that of California, and is nearly identical with it in every particular. There is here exempt from execution, a homestead not exceeding three thousand dollars in value, wearing apparel, private libraries, household furniture worth two hundred and fifty dollars, various domestic animals, and provisions, and feed for six months; two oxen or horses, with harness and wagon of a farmer; a mechanic's tools and material of the value of two hundred dollars; professional libraries; public property; fire arms kept for use; a skiff or small boat worth fifty dollars; a miner's tent and furniture, and instruments, with three months' provisions; but none of the above are exempt on execution for their price. A mortgage, to be valid upon any of the property exempt, must be signed and acknowledged by the wife, The laws in relation to arrest on civil powers and attachment, are the same as those of California.

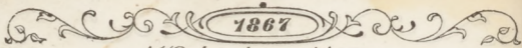

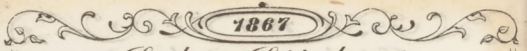

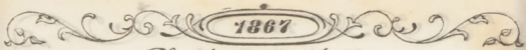
