The truck tire press has a pres sure of 200 tons, normally, but to handle the 40x14, it was necessary to take an additional chance and use a sledge hammer for fifteen minutes on the rubber.

Seek Privilege for Adjusting of Lights

Applications are reaching its state headquarters in Oakland from all parts of California, requesting appointment as headlight adjusting stations under the co-operative plan undertaken by the California Automo-bile Trade association, through the state's motor vehicle department.

Two illuminating engineers now are working in Alameda county, inspecting garages and repair stations. with a view to appointing adjusting stations there. Appointments will be made elsewhere as soon as the experts can inspect the stations and educate mechanics. To solve this adjustment problem, the engineers, L. E. Voyer and J. E. Templeton, are proceeding with care.

In addition to adjusting headlights and bringing them within the law, and, providing more light on the road, where it belongs, the official adjusting stations will issue certificates, with the seal of the Califor-nia Automobile Trade association, which will insure the motorist free-dom from trouble with officers of the law if the headlights remain in adjustment. Of course this certificate is useless if a driver hits something and gets his lights out of kilter. The certificate will be good for a definite time.

One of the main troubles with night driving is the number of glar-ing headlights which the motorist has to face. There is no excuse for this. Having adjusting stations will do much to make night driving safer, also easier-if headlights are adjusted there is much more light on the road ahead.
