## NEW ORLEANS:

### TUESDAY, APRIL 21, 1829.

MR. EDITOR:—It is reported that at the late Militia review, an Officer permitted himself to strike with the flat of his sword, one of the men belonging to his company, merely for having quitted the ranks. As it is not probable that the militia regulations permit the exercise of such degradatory rigour, it seems to me that the commanding officer ought to enquire into this fact and to do immediate justice to the person injured.

A CITIZEN.

By this time the Hamilton cotton factory, belonging to the company of that name, had taken fire on the roof and belfry, and an extensive conflagration was threatened. This last factory is of wood, four stories high. The fire engine, belonging to the village, had been broken and rendered useless at the beginning. Messrs. Job Jencks & Sons, had sent their engine and hands from their factory, about three quarters of a mile distant, which rendered great assistance. The utmost exertions were made by individuals on the roof and elsewhere to check the flames, in which they were at length successful, owing mainly to the opportune arrival of the engine from the Blackstone factory.

The result of the destructive fire was the total loss of Mr. Ballou's Cotton Factory and machinery, running about 1800 spindles, valued at \$20,000 or \$25,000, of which 10,000 dollars were insured at the Etma office.—Thayer's Factory, a small wood mill, three stories high, consumed, together with machinery. Goods and stock mostly saved. Supposed value, 3 or 4000—800 dollars said to be insured. Mr. Arnold's Grist mill, with three runs of stones; loss about 2000 dollars, no insurance—total loss between 25 and 35,000 dollars of which not more than 10,800 dollars were insured.

The Factories in the vicinity of the village were prompt in rendering assistance. Besides those above named, Messrs. W. & D. D. Fatnum, and Smith Arnold & Co. about half a mile distant from the fire, with all their workmen, were active in affording every aid in their power. There were three other factories very near those consumed, which were not injured. The Bank was in some danger of taking fire, but was saved. Some articles were removed from the Hamilton mill, and most of the webs were out from the looms. There are now 6 factories remaining in this flourishing little village, which has never before been visited with a fire, except the burning of a grist mill a few years ago. We are happy to add, that the ability of those who have suffered by the fire to sustain their losses, is undoubted.

EDGARTOWN, March 25.

Arrived brig Pembroke, March 13, fell in with schr. Celeb, Edgartown, from New Orleans for Baltimore, dismasted, and leaking 1200 strokes an hour, took off capt. Worth and crew.

BARNSTABLE, March 26.

Schr. Springbird, from Elizabeth City, with flour and corn, for Boston, went ashore on Nauset Beach, on Sunday-morning about 2 o'clock—crew saved, vessel bilged. The Dewitt Clinton ashore at Wellfleet, bilged in the same gale. A schr. from the West Indies, with molasses and sugar, cut away her masts in the Bay, between the shoal ground and the bar off Brewster, and rode out the gale.

The packet sloop Combine, from Dennis, for Boston, with flour, put back in the storm on Monday morning, came to anchor off Dennis, and was obliged to throw over 60 barrels of flour.

Two vessels are reported to be ashore at Wellfleet, inside—one from New-Orleans.

Foreign News.

VIENNA, Jan. 28.

The report that was in circulation here, that the Porte had acceded to the mediating Powers, and invited the Ambassadors of France and England to return to Constantinople, is not confirmed, and appears to have originated in a stock jobbing speculation.

A Russian courier arrived here today on his way to Italy, and an English courier arrived from London.

Count Zappella, the universally-esteemed Ambassador of the King of Wurtenburg, died here yesterday afternoon, after a long and painful illness. Their Imperial Majesties showed him the most generous attention during his illness.

FRONTIERS OF SERVA, Jan. 13.

The latest accounts from Sarajevo, of the 2d instant, say, that the following troops are ordered to take the field; from Bosnia (where the insurrection has to be suppressed) and from Albania, viz. from Bosnia 30,000 men the beginning of January, and 30,000 more at the end of the same month. From Albania, 50,000 men under the Pacha of Scutari; 20,000 under the Pacha of Jenibazar; and 20,000 men who will be under the command of the Pacha of Bosnia.

The above number is correct; but the possibility of bringing such masses into the field seems very problematical. An account received by way of Belgrade, says that part of the Bosniaks passed through Nissa in December, and that the late firman received by Prince Milosch from Constantinople, related to the subsistence of these troops.

### DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.

About 2 o'clock on Thursday morning, the cotton factory in Woonsocket Falls village, (Cumberland,) belonging solely to Mr. Dexter Ballou, was discovered to be on fire. The fire appeared to have originated in the carding room, but its precise origin is matter of conjecture. The building was three stories high, the basement of brick and superstructure of wood. The flames, spread with such extraordinary rapidity as to prevent the saving of a single piece of machinery, except one picker. From this building, the fire rapidly communicated to the satinet factory, within 30 feet distance, owned by Mr. R. Thayer; building and contents consumed. Not to St. Petersburg, surely; for it has been officially announced by our government, that the empire in this controversy, as mutually agreed on by the parties, is His Majesty the King of the Netherlands.—N. Y. Jour. of Com.

The latest accounts from Sarajevo, of the 2d instant, say, that the following troops are ordered to take the field; from Bosnia (where the insurrection has to be suppressed) and from Albania, viz. from Bosnia 30,000 men the beginning of January, and 30,000 more at the end of the same month. From Albania, 50,000 men under the Pacha of Scutari; 20,000 under the Pacha of Jenibazar; and 20,000 men who will be under the command of the Pacha of Bosnia.

The above number is correct; but the possibility of bringing such masses into the field seems very problematical. An account received by way of Belgrade, says that part of the Bosniaks passed through Nissa in December, and that the late firman received by Prince Milosch from Constantinople, related to the subsistence of these troops.

### DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.
