FOLLOWS WAR NEWS MAGISTRATE TOLD

Nationalist Reporter Declares He Was Beaten up by Street Gang

Evidence That Feeling Runs High in Local Chinatown Over War News

From the city news beat of a reporter on a Victoria Chinese daily newspaper to the troubled city of Canton is a far cry but it was bridged in one jump this morning by a witness in the City Police Court who elaimed fellow-ship with Dr. Sun Yat Sen, presi-

ship with Dr. Sun Yat Sen, president of the provisional government of South China, now reported sheltering in an arsenal in Shanghai. A high state of tension in factional feeling arising out of late war news from Shanghai was in evidence in a hearing attended by crowded Chinese galleries.

The point arose during the trial of Chon Kee and Harry Hing Foo, mutually charging each other with assault and battery occasioning actual bodily harm. Joe Wong, local insurance agent and commission broker told the court that he belonged to the same organization as Harry Hing Foo. This was the Chinese nationalist association of which Dr. Sun Yat Set was the bead. Harry Hing Foo, said witness, was a reporter on The New Republic, a nationalist Chinese dally.

Witnesses for Harry Hing Foo told the court of a miniature riot on the streets of Chinatown when a body of men attacked the Nationalist reporter, belabored him with fasts clenching iron weights and finally knocked him to the pavement in the centre of a body of milling men. The details of the engagement are denied by the defendant Chon Kee who himself charges Harry Hing Foo with assault.

In opening the case for the nationalist complainant, W. C. Moresby stated that it was evident feeling ran high in Chinatown and that while no vindictive punishment was sought the prosecution wished to give the accused Chon Kee a lesson that would stop other outbreaks in the native quarter. The affair, to his mind was a serious one, that lucklly ended without much more serious consequences than a few black eyes.

Ex-Dowager Czarina Says He Should Not Call Himself Russian Emperor

Paris, Oct. 22.—The manifesto issued in Berlin by Cyril Romanoff, an ex-Grand Duke of Russia, declaring himself "Emperor of all the Russias," is disputed by former Dowager Empress of Russia, Marie Feodorovna in a letter to Nicholaievitch Romanoff, ExGrand Duke, who is living in France.

The former Dowager Empress says Cyril's action is premature since she still hopes the Russian Royal Family is not dead. She addresses Nicholaievitch as "the eldest member of the House of Romanoff," and says:

"Our future Emperor will be designated by our fundamental laws in union with the Orthodox Church and the Russian people."

Nicholaevitch Romanoff, in publishing the letter, disapproves of Cyril Romanoff's attitude and appeals to all Russian people to carry on "the holy task of liberation of Russia."



'The Anonymous Letter'

PEOPLE of common sense do not take anonymous letters sertously. An unsigned letter betrays the fact that the writer is ashamed of it. An unsigned letter is just like unbranded goods.

When a manufacturer produces something of which he is proud he brands it with a distinct trademark and gives it a name.

For this reason, nationally advertised goods carry with them the assurance of their purity. For goods which are not advertised show that the maker of them lacks assurance. The manufacturer who advertises his product invests good money in making a brand familiar to you. His advertising is profitable so long as you continue to buy his product. But, of course, if the quality should alter for the worse you would cease a dead loss.

Thus there is a reactionary effect of advertising upon the quality of material. The very fact that a man spends large sums in making a particular brand known is a guarantee that he is keeping the goods branded up to the mark. And if goods are not branded it is an evidence that there is no authority behind them, no guarantee of their genuineness.

The public is justified in putting its faith in advertising products.

No lie can keep up if it is made universal. By and by the public come to suspect it. Just as a light at a street corner is better than a policeman, so the publicity of advertising is better than any threatened action in the courts.

Advertising shows that a man is not ashamed of his product and that he is sure that the use of it will bring him more trade.

Those who use unbranded goods are the small minority who believe in and read anonymous letters.
