Ten Millionth Ford To Be In Los Angeles Saturday Industrial Marvel of Age

The ten millionth Ford car is due to arrive in Los Angeles, Saturday, Aug 23, according to J. Milton Stienberger, local dealer. Elaborate preparations have been made to make the reception a huge success. Five hundred gaily decorated new Ford cars will meet the car at Burbank and escort it through Glendale and Hollywood to the Los Angeles assembly plant. Mayor Cryer of Los Angeles will officially greet Pilot Klulick and present him with a large floral key to the City. Many notables will be present, and Ford dealers and owners from far and near will take part in this demonstration which promises to be one of the most memorable in automotive history. In the evening CAR TEN MILLION will be shown in the court at Grauman's Egyptian theatre, Hollywood, where Douglas Fairbank's latest picture, "The Thief of Bagdad" is being shown.

The TEN MILLIONTH CAR was started across the nation's greatest highway on June 16th, not only to prove its performance, but to commemorate an industrial achievement of profound significance.

Mr. Ford's Start

At three o'clock in the morning on a chill winters day, Henry Ford completed the first Ford car. It was the result of years of study and intense study and intense effort, yet its practicability was still in question.

On June 16, 1903 the Ford Motor Company was incorporated with an authorized capitalization of \$100,000 of which only \$28,000 was actually paid into the treasury. Among the twelve original stockholders, Henry Ford held twenty-five percent of the stock.

Within four years Mr. Ford had acquired 58 1/2% of the holdings of his company, and in 1919 he turned over the Presidency to his son, Edsel B. Ford, who purchased the remaining 41 1/2% held by outside stockholders and the company was reorganized with an authorized capitalization of \$100,000,000.

Economy of Science

The manufacturing methods of the Ford Motor Company have been and remain the marvel of the engineering world. All are based upon the most scientific principles, distinctly individual in their advanced steps and they combine quantity production with high quality processes.

The Highland Park Plant cover-

ing an area of 278 acres, and the River Rouge Plant covering 1,100 acres comprise the chief manufacturing units. The former employs 65,000 men with a motor output of 8,000 cars daily. The River Rouge Plant, though not yet nearly complete, is one of the marvels of the age. It has a floor space of 3,500,000 square feet, eight miles of roadways, fifty miles of railroad track, a storage capacity for ore, coal and lime stone of 2,000,000 tons and employs 40,000 men.

One of the chief and most interesting features of the River Rouge plant is its amazing economies. Starting with a sintering plant which reclaims blast furnace dust, reclamation features follow every operation. Vapors from the coke ovens are condensed cohering 24,000,000 cubic feet of gas per day, 22,000 gallons of benzol, 55,000 pounds of ammonium sulphate, 17,000 gallons of tar and 6,200 gallons of refined oil. All of these products with the exception of the ammonium sulphate which is sold as fertilizer and the benzol sold as motor fuel are turned back into the Ford industry for use in making automobiles.

Cement from Waste

There are now cement plants converting slag from blast furnaces into cement at the rate of 1,000 barrels per day, a glass plant with a capacity of 10,000,000 square feet a year, a paper mill, saw mills, mines, Great Lake steamers, and railroad all working together and responsible for this monumental manufacturing achievement—10,000,000 cars in twenty-one years.

In the manufacture of these ten million Ford cars there has been consumed 4,468,261 tons of steel, 1,465,421 tons of malleable and grey cast iron, 100,421 tons of brass, 73,905 tons copper, 133,690 tons of lead, 137,930 tons of cotton, 82,716,666 square feet of glass, 341,474,527 board feet of wood and 6,669,179 tons of coal.

There are thirty-four Ford branches in this country and nearly 10,000 authorized dealers who have watched with keen interest and enthusiasm the progress of the famous TEN MILLIONTH on its long journey. It is but one of the approximately 7,200 standard cars produced by the company in a single day and has covered a distance of over 4,000 miles on this, its first trip, with but one minor adjustment.

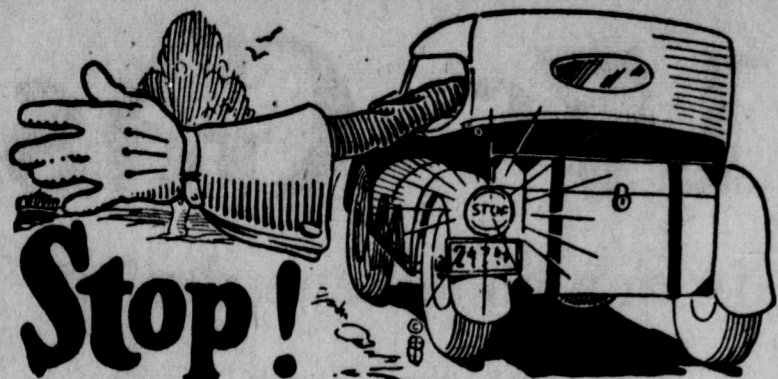

Your Poultry

By Howard J. Curtis

Meal time in the chicken yard is especially noticeable for two facts; one is the loud noise made by hungry hens and the other is the fast disappearance of hard earned money in the form of feed. Both are a necessity in the business of manufacturing eggs and the pen is quiet it is usually a sign of ill health or of overfeeding.

During the summer months and the moulting season lady hen shows a particular fondness for grains and a tendency to slack up on mash consumption. However this should be avoided when possible if best laying results are to be obtained because while grains are necessary to build up fat and tissue eggs are produced from the mash.

I am often asked, "What is the best formula to go by in feeding my hen?" "And my answer to this question is "to sit on the fence and watch them eat." If you bear in mind the simple rules of egg production and feed your hens all the green feed and dry mash they will eat with

just enough grain to assure a full crop for the night you will be doing your fatherly duty in so far as feeding is concerned.

To many poultrymen are in the habit of carrying the same amount of feed into their yards every day, every week, every month with no change for seasons. This is a grave mistake and the man that follows this system is literally throwing his money away both in the waste of feed and in the loss of eggs.

Grain rations at this time of the year should consist of about sixty per cent wheat, twenty-five per cent oats, ten per cent corn and the balance sunflower seed and sorghum grains.

Always feed grain in a litter of long wheat straw which should be about six inches deep, thus forcing plenty of exercise.

The generous feeding of fine cut greens is essential because greens contain mineral properties that are absolutely necessary in egg making and also minerals that are nature's medicines in fighting disease.

As I have already stated, eggs are formed largely from mash and the hen

ORDINANCE NO. 285 AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF SIERRA MADRE, ORDERING THE VACATION AND ABANDONMENT OF A PORTION OF GRAND VIEW AVENUE, ALSO KNOWN AS KINNEY ROAD, IN SAID CITY OF SIERRA MADRE. The Board of Trustees of the City of Sierra Madre do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. That all that portion of Grand View Avenue, also known as "Kinney Road," lying between the northerly prolongation of the easterly line of Santa Anita Avenue and the Section line between fractional Sections 15 and 16, Twp. 1 N., R. 11 W., S. B. M., in the City of Sierra Madre, State of California, be and the same is hereby closed up and vacated for street purposes.

SECTION 2. That the said work is for the closing up, vacation and abandonment of that portion of Grand View Avenue, also known as "Kinney Road," more particularly described in Section 1 hereof, and it appears to said Board of Trustees that there are no damages, costs or expenses arising out of said work, and that no assessment is necessary for said work, and therefore, no commissioners are appointed to assess benefits and damages for said work and to have general supervision thereof.

SECTION 3. The Sierra Madre News, a weekly newspaper of general circulation, published and circulated in said City of Sierra Madre, is hereby designated as the newspaper in which this Ordinance shall be published in the manner and by the person required by law.

SECTION 4. The City Clerk of the City of Sierra Madre shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same to be published by one insertion, in the manner required by law in said newspaper.

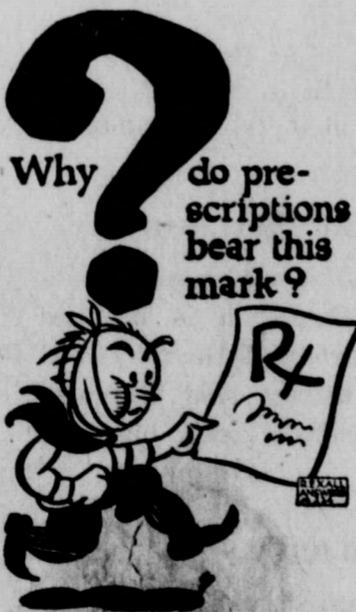

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"GOOSE STEP" DAY

(From the Hemet News)

The national administration does not like the term "mobilization day" which has been applied by common public consent to the army's proposal for a showing of national military strength, and a practice of national mobilization, on September 12.

Probably it will like still less the term "goose step day," which also has been applied to it.

The army calls it a "defense test," which sounds very much like the other terms. To get a peaceful people worked up to the point of going through the motions of staggering an enemy with a flourish of arms is the same process, no matter what it is called.

President Coolidge, in a public defense of the plan, describes it in a way tending to make it more palatable. He says that it is nothing more than an inspection of the forces that would be available in an emergency.

The president appears to have a different view of the plan than that of the army; and doubtless his view will prevail and will result in a considerable modification of the original plan.

But the original plan, as it was announced in the press matter issued from the war department, was nothing more or less than a "goose step" day, in which every citizen was to participate, probably whether he wanted to or not. That plan, if it had gone on, would have resulted, once the habit was fixed in a jail sentence or perhaps a mob scene for any body who refused to take part in this military gesture.

General Pershing, in a statement issued for publication on May 18, said:

"It is to be a day given to patriotic gathering by the citizens of every community, during which every one will learn his place and portion in the defense of his country should our security be threatened." He added: "The 'Test' will certainly have a most beneficial effect on national sentiment, through which we hope to establish this system as a permanent policy." And, in closing, he said of the people "We expect them all to participate."

The whole business, name it as you will, should be accepted, if at all, for what it is. And it is, in essence, precisely the same psychological process by which the rulers of Germany transformed a pacifist people into the military mad nation that was set loose upon the world ten years ago.

The plea here is preparation for defense against attack. The plea there was preparation for defense against attack.

And the process was a gradual interesting of the people in military plans and military development, which is precisely the "beneficial effect" which General Pershing hopes this movement will have on national sentiment, "through which we hope to establish this system as a permanent policy."

If the United States does not want this subtle psychology of interest in military growth to go on from the start of September 12, it will stop it in the beginning by abandoning the plan.

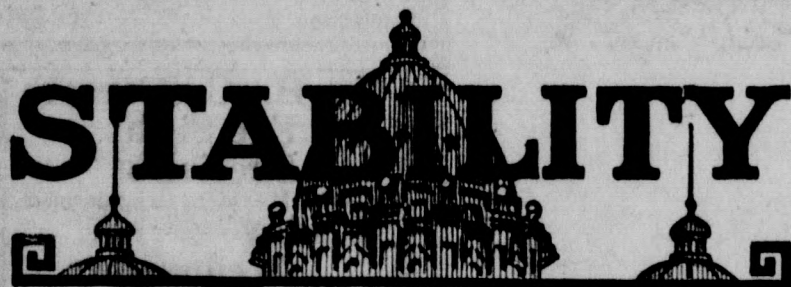

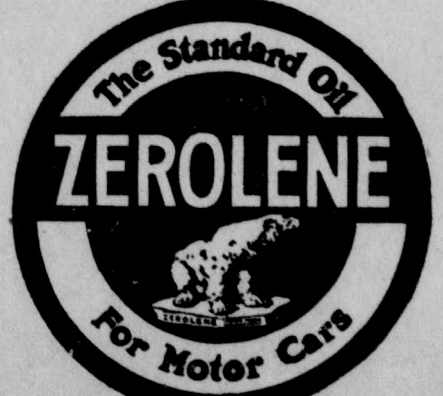

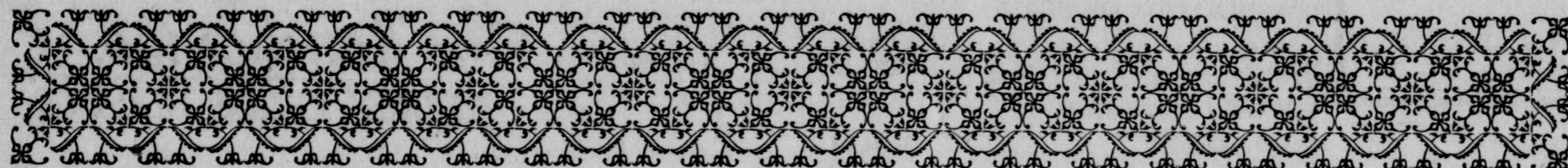
