LONDON, June 21 .- The conference between Premier Macdonald and Premier Herriot of France, this week-end, was hailed as inaugurating a new era in European diplomacy. Both are Socialists and both have been consistent enemies of "secret diplomacy and secret agreements.'

It is generally expected that the conference will sound the death knell of the old Poincare policy towards Germany and will reestablish Anglo-French accord on a real and firmer basis.

Y., June 21.-Twenty-six persons are dead, one dying and more than \$3,000,000 property damage done today as a result of a combination of heat waves, cloud-bursts and tornadoes that struck the Mississippi and Ohio valley and adjacent states and finally swept eastward into northern and central New York state. Additional reports will, it is believed, increase the list of dead and injured.

## Daily Greeting To News Readers

YOUR ASSOCIATIONS WITH-People should make you more charitable. Books will make you the master of great ideas. Nature will lead you into the presence of God. Evil will start corrosion in your own soul. Business, only, will dwarf your spirit. Music will make you sick of jazz. Crime will teach you the stupidity of selfishness.

#### WIDE HIGHWAYS VITAL NEED

We boast a great deal about the boulevards of Southern California, and it may be true that this section has more miles of paved road than other like areas, but it is poor policy for us to rest on our laurels when there is so much room for improvement. One of the real, vital needs of Los Angeles and surrounding territory is wider streets and highways. This need has been mentioned in The Glendale Evening News before, but it is of such importance that it cannot be stressed too strongly or too often.

The narrow highway is the chief cause of traffic congestion. It does not take much mental ability or agility to figure out that if a certain number of cars pass over a certain street in a given time that twice the number of cars could pass over a street twice as wide in the same time-or that the same number could pass over the wider street in half the time.

The San Fernando Road between Burbank and Avenue Twenty in Los Angeles furnishes a good example of the way traffic is impeded by a narrow road. This thoroughfare is just wide enough for two cars abreast, no more. There is a tremendous amount of hauling by truck over the San Fernando road. There are moving vans, trucks carrying fruit and vegetables from the ranches of the San Fernando Valley to the markets of Los Angeles, gravel and cement trucks, merchandise trucks, trucks with long trailers carrying sewer pipe, girders, poles and the like, and, besides these, the regular local and up-state traffic of stages and motor cars.

The heavy trucks move along at a pace of about twelve miles an hour. There is a steady stream of traffic going both ways the greater part of the time, so it is easily seen that on so narrow a road a car that would like to make a reasonable speed finds few opportunities to pass the slow-moving trucks. So the man who would ordinarily drive thirty miles an hour where such speed is allowed is forced to slow down to half that speed.

When traffic regulation is mentioned some one is sure to chime in with a remark about the fast driver. There is a feeling that one who drives right along and passes other cars is in too much of a hurry; that if everyone drove slowly traffic problems would adjust themselves. There is no logic whatever in such reasoning. There are reckless drivers, but the good driver usually goes as fast as the law and other traffic will permit. By doing so he is making use of the road for the shortest possible time. The slower a car moves the longer it is using the road and the greater chance it has of blocking other traffic.

It isn't a question of the individual driver who loses valuable time, or of the wear and tear on his car in starting, stopping and putting on the brakes while driving behind a slow-moving vehicle. It is the question of the greatest good to the greatest number, and this requires the maximum number of cars moving over a certain section of highway in a given time.

The narrow limits of the San Fernando Road and the great volume of hauling that is done on this thoroughfare holds traffic down to half speed. So there are twice as many autos on the road as there should be in a given period. This means traffic congestion and loss of time.

A wider road with the trucks and other slow-moving vehicles compelled to keep in one line, and those who wish to go faster in another, would speed up traffic fifty per cent.

What is true of the San Fernando Road is true of many other roads and streets in Southern California. Wide boulevards and a great many of them is a real, pressing need in a section so far-famed as an all-the-year-round play ground. The progress of the Southland will be impeded if the matter is not remedied very soon.

ure to pass the half-billion dollar mark, and some observers declare that 1924 will be a billion dollar building year in New York. These calculations are based on the re-port of \$492,000,000 for five months, a gain of 33 per cent over the same period in 1923 and 72 per cent over 1922.

The twenty-five leading building cities reported gains of \$29,000,000 or 16 per cent over May, 1923, and \$44,000,000 or 26 per ent over May, 1922, thus showing that building operations in the arger cities of the country are still greatly in excess of any pre-

Further softening in the prices of lumber and structural steel naterials manifested itself during the month. In certain markets, notably New York and Boston, sand and gravel receded from the prices established during the prerious month, but in Chicago there was an upward turn. 
