LIVE STOCK TRADE.

Trade in live stock between Eastern and Western Canada has been growing rapidly within the last few years, says the Dominion live stock commissioner in a paper filet issued. This increase of trade has been promoted, and in fact made possible, by the vise and generous treatment of the C. P. R. During the month of December and the first eight days in January, 40 cars of grade and pure bred cattle were shipped from East-ern Canada to British Colombia. These cars contained 2,223 beed, and cost in the East something over \$30,000. Be-sides these, a considerable number have recently been sent to the Northwest Ter-ritories, and orders are now in hand for additional shipments to be made to the last mentioned territory.
