At the conclusion of the address, the following resolution was offered and adopted by the assembled citizens, and a committee appointed to present it to the water company:

We, the citizens of Carmel, in mass meeting assembled, do hereby request the Monterey County Water Works to provide for the town of Carmel at an early date an adequate supply of water

**Many Improvements
For Pebble Beach**

Announcement is made by the
Pacific Improvement Co. that at
Pebble Beach, a suburb of Car-
mel, a sale of a large acreage has
been made to Dr. Max Rothschild,
a prominent physician of San
Francisco. Adjoining this pro-
perty is a section which has been
acquired by Ross Ambler Currau,
Burlingame clubman.

An eighty-acre tract has been
acquired by Mrs. M. E. White,
who will build a beautiful resi-
dence at once, and will also main-
tain a game preserve.

Plans are being drawn for the
three homes.

pier a bathing pavilion to be built
at Pebble Beach. It is planned to
have glass bottom boats there,
available the year round, and to
convert that portion of Carmel bay
into a veritable sportsman's para-
dise.

Changes will be made on the 17-
mile drive. The part of the road
running east of the Lodge will be
closed and the road will stretch
along the pipe line and in Pesca-
dero canyon instead. The purpose
of this change is to provide a golf
course without obstacles
