First Irish Coaching Company.

In 1815, an Italian, named biancor! started the first coaching company in Ireland, running long cars over varous regular routes. Long cars soon became the safest and most reliable means of traveling over Ireland, and Bianconi turned rich affd prosperon . Writing in or about 1842, Mr. and Mr. Hall, who have written much of fre land, tell us that "parsons of the highest respectability" used the long car for traveling. At this time, although these cars passed through 128 towns. they had not made their way into the north of freland. The cars varied considerably in size, requiring from one to four horses. The fare, even over the rockiest roads, in the West, was twopence farthing a mile. The Halls carefully explain that passengers were provided with "dry and comfortable horsehair cushions and aprons" and that, in wet weather, the long cars never journeyed more than two stages without changing the cushions.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 24

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 44 AND SECTION 46 OF ORDINANCE NO. 11 ENTITLED, "AN ORDI NANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ASSESSMENT, LEVY AND COLLECTION OF TAX ES IN AND FOR THE CITY OF CARMEL BY THE SEA," ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SAID CITY ON THE 18TH DAY OF FEBRUARY A. D. 1917.

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. - Section 44 of Ordinance No. 11. entitled "An Ordiuance Providing for the Assessment, Levy and Collection of Taxes in and for the City of Carmel by the Sea," adopted by the Board of Trustees of said City on the 13th day of February, A. D. 1917, is hereby amended so as to read as follows, to-wit: "Section 44. The Marshal, as soon as he has made the publication required must file with the City Clerk a copy of the publication with an affidavit attached thereto, that it is a true copy of the same, that the publication was made in a newspaper or supplement thereto. stating its name and place of publication, and the date of each appearance. The Marshal must collect, in addition to the taxes due on the delinquent list, together with the penalties for delinquen cies, seventy-five (75) cents on each lot, piece or parcel of land separately assessed, and on each asse sment of personal property, to defray expense of publication of delinquent list, which must go to the City, and be placed to the credit of the General Fund.

Section 2. Section 46 of said Ordinages No. 11 entitled "Au Ordinance Providing for the Assessment, Levy and Collection of Taxes in and for the City of Carmel-by-the Sea," a lopted by the Board of Trustees of said City on the 13th day of February, A.

D. 1917, is hereby amended so as to read as follows, to wit: "Section 46 -The Marshal must make out a certificate of delinquent tax sale for each piece or tract of land sold, dated on the day of the sale, stating (when known) the name of the person assessed, a description of the land sold, that it was sold for delinquent taxes to the City. and giving the amount and year of the assessment, and specifying when the City will be entitled to a deed. Such certificate must be signed by the Marshal and filed in his office. The Marshal, in a book provided for that purpose, must enter a description of the laud sold, corresponding to the description in the original assessment roll, the name of the person assessed, the date of sale, that it was sold for delinquent taxes to the City, and the amount for which it was sold, and must regularly number the description on the margin of the book and put a corresponding number on each certificate. The Murshal must keep a suitable index to such book, giving the names of the persons to whom each parcel of land was originally assessed.

In case of a redemption or a subsequent sale of any of said property by the City, the Marshul must enter on the margin of the record in his office, in said certificate book, the fact of such redemption or sale, giving the date thereof, and by whom redeemed.

Section 3 .- This ordinance shall tske effect and be in force thirty (30) days from and after its final passage and approval.

# SAVE 16,000,000 BUSHELS OF WHEAT THAT FORMERLY WAS LOST IN THRESHING

Farmers, Urged by Food Administration, Provide Seven Extra Loaves of Bread for Every American.

By adopting cleaner threshing metaods and by literally combing harvest fields to gather grain formerly wasted, the hermen and farmers of the United States this year saved fully 16,000,000 bushels of wheat, estimated as equivalent to about seven one-pound loaves of bread for every person in the couptry. This result, accompanied by corn sponding savings of barley, onts rye and other grains, is shown by reports from 33 grain states to the U. S. Food Administration. Other states. although not prepared to furnish defi alte figures of conservation in the crain fields, report greatly reduced mrvest lesses.

This rural food saving achievement, accomplished in scarcely six months time, was in direct resconse to requests by the Food Administration, which asked farmers and threshermen to reduce harvest losses from about 3½ per cent, the estimated average in normal times—to the lowest possible minimum. Country with threshing committees carried into every grain growing community the official recommendations for accomplishing the results desired.

In numerous instances drivers of racks with lenky bottoms were sent from the fields to repair their equip ment and frequently bad order thresh ing machines were stopped until the cause of waste was removed. But in proportion to the number of personengaged in gathering the nation's grain crop, cases of compulsion were comparatively rare. The Food Adminis tration freely attributes the success of the grain threshing campaign to ma triotic service by farmers, thresher men and their crews. Incidentally grain growers of the United States are many millions of dollars "in pocket as a result of the grain saved
