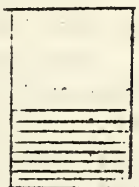
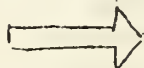

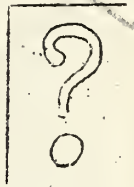

DOUBLE THE DONORS

Stars and Stripes says: "There just isn't enough blood being given by the folks back home." The Army has only two for every five pints of blood needed. Look at the chart above. Only two out of every five persons in the Dept. who are eligible donors are giving their blood.

We are putting on a drive the week of Dec. 4, to boost the blood donations in the Dept. Our goal is to more than double the number of donors now giving. Will you lend your personal support to this drive? Will you do your part to see that the Army has five pints for every five pints needed?

The Army has suffered more than 437,356 casualties since the beginning of the War--three years ago this Dec. 7; 55% of these casualties have occurred

since D-Day. These figures show why so much more blood is needed now on the battlefronts to bring back our friends and relatives.

During the drive scheduled for the week of Dec. 4, there will be an exhibit of the processing and uses of blood donations and other interesting features in the Patio. Be sure to drop by and see it. There will also be a film scheduled in the auditorium for your bureau. Go to these programs and then make an appointment to go to the Blood Donor Center with a group of Agriculture people. Have your keyman make the appointment for you (see p. 3) or call Miss McFadden, ext. 3281. You may make your appointment for either morning or afternoon.

Only your cooperation can double the number of donors.

A PRICELESS GIFT TO THE BOYS OVERSEAS—A BLOOD DONATION

DEDICATION AT BELTSVILLE

Sat., Nov. 11, witnessed a brief but impressive ceremony under the auspices of PISAE Employees' Assn., Beltsville, in connection with the dedication of the Bureau's Service Flag and Honor Roll. The program began with a bugle call, then an Armistice Day poem was read, "The Star Spangled Banner" was sung, and Dr. R. M. Salter, Chief of the Bureau dedicated the Flag and Honor Roll, which were formally carried to their permanent places by uniformed veterans. The program closed with a solo "There Is No Death" and a Benediction.

The Service Flag bears 313 blue and 6 gold stars, the latter for Lt. Col. Geo. E. Halliday, who gave his life in Italy; Lt. G. J. Henson, who gave his life in an airplane accident in North Africa; Pvt. A. B. Herring, Jr., who gave his life on Saipan; Ens. Betty Mabry, who died in the Naval Hospital at Oakland, Cal.; Lt. J. M. O'Brian, who gave his life in Normandy the day following D-Day; and Lt. H.S. Smith, who gave his life on Guam, July 21, 1944, when the Marines returned to repossess that island.

AMERICAN LEGION CHESS FUND

U. S. D. A. Post 36, American Legion reports that its War Service Committee used your contributions to the Welfare and Prisoners of War Chess Fund to send 1500 sets of chessmen and boards, 138 books and 100 pamphlets on the game to our men who are prisoners of war in Germany. The Post has also distributed more than 200 chess books to more than 40 Army General Hospitals in U. S., including Walter Reed and Forest Glen, and to a few Naval Hospitals.

A number of letters of appreciation stating that this material fulfilled a need have been received by Mr. Holland, Chairman of the War Service Committee.

U.S.D.A. CHESS CLUB GOES TO WALTER REED

On Tues., Nov. 14, a delegation from the U.S.D.A. Chess Club, consisting of the Misses Kitty Jones, Leona LaForais, Mary Menke, Shirley Neinhaus, Bernice Witt and Messrs. D. S. Burch and H. H. Holland visited Walter Reed Hospital for the purpose of introducing the game of chess to some 200 patients there. After an introductory talk by Mr. Holland, the U.S.D.A. group and some of the patients adjourned to the Solarium to play chess. Fourteen of the patients knew something of the game and others indicated an interest in learning. They are already planning to organize a chess club at Walter Reed. The U.S.D.A. Chess Club will meet with the Walter Reed group to play the game and to give instructions to beginners on Thursday evenings at 6:30 p.m. In addition, a U.S.D.A. delegation will go out on Fri. nights to play chess with officer patients.

Among the boys at Walter Reed who are going to play the game are amputation cases and the hospital is interested in the game for its therapeutic value as well as for its social value.
