INFORMATION STATEMENT

NOTICE TO ALL VOTERS

Under a new 1975 Oregon law, this is a combined Voters' Pamphlet.

In it you will find Democratic, Republican and non-partisan candidates as well as measures. EVERY HOUSEHOLD in the state will receive one combined Voters' Pamphlet. Additional copies available at post offices, courthouses, and other public buildings.

In the Primary Election only registered DEMOCRATS may vote for DEMOCRATIC candidates; only registered REPUBLICANS may vote for REPUBLICAN candidates; ALL VOTERS may vote for non-partisan candidates and measures.

Voters cannot change political party affiliation within 30 days of the Primary Election. After April 24, 1976, no changes in party affiliation are allowed.

(1) VOTER QUALIFICATION REQUIREMENTS

YOU MAY REGISTER TO VOTE IF:

- 1. You are a citizen of the United States
- 2. You will be 18 or older on election day
- 3. You are a resident of Oregon IMPORTANT: You may REGISTER to vote if you meet the qualifications above, but you must be a resident of Oregon 30 DAYS before you may vote.

YOU MUST RE-REGISTER IF:

- 1. Your address changes for any reason
- 2. Your name changes for any reason
- 3. You wish to change political affiliation IMPORTANT: You cannot change political party affiliation within 30 days of the primary election.

You must be registered 30 days before the election (or by April 24, 1976), in order for your name to be included in the poll book.

(2) REGISTRATION WITHIN 30 DAYS OF ELEC-TION DAY:

If you fail to register or re-register more than 30 days prior to election, and you are otherwise qualified to vote, you may still register and vote by delivering to the county clerk of your county a completed voter registration form and obtaining a "Clerk's Certificate". If the county clerk receives your registration form more than five days prior to election day, your certificate will be mailed to you. If the clerk receives your registration form within the five days of the election, you must obtain your certificate in person from the clerk's office.

After obtaining your certificate, you may present it at your new precinct on election day. The election board will write your name in the poll book and you then may vote. Your name will appear in the poll book for the next election at which you are entitled to vote. A person who has changed his or her name within 60 days before an election and has not re-registered may vote upon presentation of proof of name change.

(3) VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT:

YOU MAY APPLY FOR AN ABSENTEE BALLOT IF:

- 1. You are a registered voter.
- 2. You live more than 15 miles from your polling place.
- 3. You will be unable for any reason to attend the election.
- 4. You are a "service voter". "Service voters" are registered by following the service voting procedure. "Service voter" means a citizen of the state of Oregon absent from his place of residence and serving in the Armed Forces or Merchant Marine of the United States, or temporarily residing outside the United States and the District of Columbia.

YOU MAY APPLY FOR AN ABSENTEE BALLOT BY:

- 1. Submitting an application to the county clerk within 60 days preceding the election. "Service voters" may apply after January 1 of any election year.
- 2. The application must include:
 - Your signature
 - Your address and precinct number
 - Statement explaining your inability to attend the election
 - Address to which ballot will be mailed

YOU MUST RETURN THE VOTED ABSENTEE BAL-LOT TO THE COUNTY CLERK NOT LATER THAN 8 P.M. OF ELECTION DAY.

THE MATERIAL CONTAINED IN THE VOTERS' PAMPHLET IS WRITTEN BY THE CANDI-DATES, BY COMMITTEES, AND BY SUPPORTERS OR OPPONENTS OF BALLOT MEASURES. UNDER OREGON LAW THE SECRETARY OF STATE COMPILES AND PUBLISHES THE STATEMENTS SUPPLIED TO HIM.

Expands Veterans' Home-Farm Loan Eligibility

Referred to Electorate of Oregon by the 1975 Legislature to be voted on at the Primary Election, May 25, 1976, by OL Chapter 117.

Explanation

By Committee Designated Pursuant to ORS 254.210

This measure would grant the Oregon veterans' farm and home loan to post-Korean and Vietnam veterans (those who served after January 31, 1960) who came to Oregon and lived here for two years prior to May 1, 1977. Under present law they must have entered service from Oregon to qualify.

The measure would also grant the loan to World War II veterans who lived in Oregon for two years between the date of their discharge and December 31, 1965. Currently, the two years residence must have been before December 31, 1952.

If Measure 1 is approved by the voters, an estimated additional 25,000 veterans would qualify for the State veterans' loan.

Measure No. 1

Expands Veterans' Home-Farm Loan Eligibility

Argument in Favor

By Joint Legislative Committee Designated Pursuant to ORS 255.465

Veterans of World War II and the Korean War who came to Oregon after their military service enjoy entitlement to the Oregon veterans' farm and home loan program if they meet certain residence dates. But post-Korean and Vietnam veterans (those who served after January 31, 1960) in order to qualify for the loan, must have entered service from Oregon. Measure 1 would merely extend to them the same privileges already enjoyed by World War II and Korean War veterans. They should all be treated alike.

As to extending the post-war residency period for World War II veterans, the reason here is that many veterans who came to Oregon in the early 1950s actually have been Oregon residents longer than other veterans who do qualify for the loan.

Passage of Measure 1 will make an additional 25,000 veterans eligible for the farm and home loan, which should result in \$40 million more in loans in the next biennium. This will stimulate the economy of Oregon by:

- 1. Creating new jobs through home construction, purchase and improvements.
- 2. Bringing eastern capital into the state through the sale of self-liquidating bonds to acquire the loan funds.
- 3. Making property taxpayers out of additional veterans, thus helping to share the tax load.

A yes vote on Measure 1 is urged.

Expands Veterans' Home-Farm Loan Eligibility

Be It Resolved By the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

Paragraph 1. Section 3, Article XI-A of the Oregon Constitution, is amended to read:

Sec. 3. No person shall be eligible to receive money from the Oregon War Veterans' Fund except the following:

(1) Any person who resides in the State of Oregon at the time of applying for a loan from said fund, who served honorably in active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States, for a period of not less than 90 days any part of which occurred between September 15, 1940, and July 25, 1947, who was either at the time of his enlistment, induction, warrant or commission a resident of the State of Oregon or who has been a bona fide resident of the State of Oregon for at least two years between the date of his separation from aforementioned service and December 31, [1952] 1965, and who has been honorably separated or discharged from said service, or who has been furloughed to a reserve. No loans shall be made to persons justified under this subsection after January 31, 1980.

(2) Any person who resides in the State of Oregon at the time of applying for a loan from said fund, who served honorably in active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States for a period of not less than 90 days any part of which occurred between June 25, 1950, and January 31, 1960, who was either at the time of his enlistment, induction, warrant or commission a resident of the State of Oregon or who has been a bona fide resident of the State of Oregon for at least two years between the date of his separation from aforementioned service and December 31, 1965, and who has been honorably separated or discharged from said service, or who has been furloughed to a reserve. No loans shall be made to persons qualified under this subsection after January 31, 1988.

(3) Any person who resides in the State of Oregon at the time of applying for a loan from said fund, who served honorably on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States for a period of not less than 210 days, any part of which occurred subsequent to January 31, 1960, or who was, prior to completion of such period of service, discharged or released from active duty on account of service-connected injury or illness; who was either at the time of his enlistment, induction, warrant or commission a resident of the State of Oregon or who has been a bona fide resident of the State of Oregon for at least two years between the date of his separation from aforementioned service and May 1, 1977; and who has been honorably separated or discharged from said service, or who has been furloughed to a reserve. No loan shall be made to a person qualified under this subsection unless application for the loan is made within 20 years after the date the person separates or is discharged from the service or is furloughed to a reserve.

(4) (a) The spouse of a person who is qualified to receive a loan under subsection (1), (2) or (3) of this section but who has either been missing in action or a prisoner of war while on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States even though the status of missing or being a prisoner occurred prior to completion of the minimum length of service or residence set forth in subsection (1), (2) or (3) of this section, provided the spouse resides in this state at the time of application for the loan.

(b) The surviving spouse of a person who was qualified to receive a loan under subsection (1), (2) or (3) of this section but who died while on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States even though the death occurred prior to completion of the minimum length of service or residence set forth in subsection (1), (2) or (3) of this section, provided the surviving spouse resides in this state at the time of application for the loan.

(c) The eligibility of a surviving spouse under this subsection shall terminate on his or her remarriage.

Paragraph 2. The amendment proposed by paragraph 1 of this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at a special election to be held throughout this state as provided in House Bill 2505 of the 1975 regular session of the Legislative Assembly.

Discipline of Judges

Referred to Electorate of Oregon by the 1975 Legislature to be voted on at the Primary Election, May 25, 1976.

Explanation

By Committee Designated Pursuant to ORS 254.210

In 1968 the people of Oregon added Section 8 to Article VII of the Oregon Constitution (Judicial Department). The added section provided the exclusive methods for removing from office (other than recall by the voters) a judge of any Oregon court and established as grounds for removal (1) conviction of a felony or other crime involving moral turpitude; (2) willful misconduct in office involving moral turpitude; (3) willful or persistent failure to perform judicial duties; and (4) habitual drunkenness or illegal use of narcotic drugs.

Adoption of this section permitted the establishment of the Commission on Judicial Fitness consisting of three judges appointed by the Supreme Court, three attorneys appointed by the Board of Governors of the Oregon State Bar, and three persons who are neither attorneys nor judges, appointed by the Governor. Complaints may be filed against judges with the Commission. The complaints are reviewed and investigated and hearings are held on those which fall within the grounds for removal. If the Commission finds that the comduct of a judge justifies removal from judicial office, the Commission shall so recommend to the Supreme Court. The Supreme Court then reviews the case, and it may remove the judge from office or dismiss the charge.

Experience since 1968 has shown a need for additional and more realistic grounds and methods for the discipline of judges. The present law is too vague and restrictive and this has hampered the Commission and the Supreme Court in dealing with some misconduct which warrants discipline short of removal from office.

The Act before the voters as Ballot Measure No. 2 clarifies and corrects the deficiencies. It strengthens the present law, brings more types of judicial misconduct within the authority of the Commission and the Supreme Court and provides more flexibility and alternatives in disciplining errant judges.

Specifically the measure gives to the Supreme Court authority to censure and to temporarily suspend a judge as well as to remove a judge from office. The present grounds for discipline are expanded to include (1) conviction of a felony or other crime involving moral turpitude; (2) willful misconduct in office related to effective performance of judicial duties; (3) willful or persistent failure to perform judicial duties; (4) general incompetence in office; (5) willful violation of any Supreme Court rule of judicial conduct; and (6) habitual drunkenness or illegal or habitual use of narcotic or dangerous drugs.

Ballot Measure No. 2 was introduced in the Legislature at the request of the Commission on Judicial Fitness. During the Legislature's consideration of the measure, no one testified against it, and only two Senators and one Representative voted against it. The measure is supported by the Supreme Court and by the Oregon Judicial Conference which is made up of all District, Circuit, Tax and Appellate Court judges in Oregon.

Measure No. 2

Discipline of Judges

Argument in Favor

By Joint Legislative Committee Designated Pursuant to ORS 255.465

Should a judge be above the law? Or should he be subject to a discipline for abuses of his judicial office? Ballot Measure #2 should be voted "YES" so the Supreme Court will have broader powers to discipline judges and greater flexibility in the kind of discipline to be applied.

Unless this measure passes, the Supreme Court will not have the power to suspend a judge nor to publicly censure for judicial misconduct. And the Supreme Court will not have the power to correct potential misconduct of a judge, concerning his official duties, if the misconduct does not amount to a crime or to heinous dishonesty.

At present, only the most serious types of judicial misconduct may be reached by the Supreme Court in the disciplining of judges. Cases of lesser misconduct go unquestioned.

And, at present, the only discipline available to the Supreme Court in a case involving an Oregon judge is removal from office.

Removal from office is seldom, if ever, used. This means cases of acknowledged judicial misconduct go completely unremedied because the Supreme Court may feel removal from office is too harsh.

The citizens of the state should benefit from the greater flexibility and broader range of coverage provided by this measure.

Temporary suspension from office or public censure should be available to the Supreme Court, and a judge who is generally incompetent in the performance of his duties, or who engages in wilful violation of a rule of judicial conduct should be the subject of discipline. For example, appropriate discipline should be available where a judge sits in judgment on his own individual rights to bail or on his or her other personal rights. Judges are only human. Sometimes they fail to decide a case until months after it has been tried. Sometimes they berate the private citizen who must rely on the courts for protection.

The enlarged power to discipline a judge, which is contained in this proposed change in our constitution, can only be exercised by the Supreme Court. So, the independence of the Judiciary is maintained. And, there is no lessening of the independent power of recall reserved to the people in other sections of our Oregon constitution.

For these reasons, we join with Oregon's Commission on Judicial Fitness, which requested that this measure be placed on the ballot, and urge Oregonians to vote "YES" on Measure #2 for broader, more flexible power to discipline judges. People have the right to respectful, courteous and fair treatment by all levels of government, including the judiciary. A "YES" vote on Measure #2 will help the people get the best from their judges.

Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

Paragraph 1. Section 8, Article VII (Amended) of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, is amended to read:

Sec. 8. (1) In the manner provided by law, and notwithstanding section 1 of this Article, a judge of any court may be removed or suspended from his judicial office by the Supreme Court, or censured by the Supreme Court, for:

(a) Conviction in a court of this or any other state, or of the United States, of a crime punishable as a felony or a crime involving moral turpitude; or

(b) Wilful misconduct in a judicial office [*involving moral turpitude*] where such misconduct bears a demonstrable relationship to the effective performance of judicial duties; or

(c) Wilful or persistent failure to perform judicial duties; or

(d) Generally incompetent performance of judicial duties; or

(e) Wilful violation of any rule of judicial conduct as shall be established by the Supreme Court; or

[(d)] (f) Habitual drunkenness or illegal use of narcotic or dangerous drugs.

(2) Notwithstanding section 6 of this Article, the methods provided in this section, section 1a of this Article and in section 18, Article II of this Constitution, are the exclusive methods of the removal, suspension, or censure of a judge [from judicial office].

Paragraph 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the special election to be held on the same date as the state-wide primary election in 1976.

Measure No. 3

Housing Bonds

Referred to Electorate of Oregon by the 1975 Legislature to be voted on at the Primary Election, May 25, 1976.

Explanation

By Committee Designated Pursuant to ORS 254.210

Ballot Measure #3 is a constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds not to exceed 1/2 of 1% of the true cash value of the State's taxable property. The bonds would make available funds to lending institutions and qualified housing sponsors to stimulate the State's economy and provide multi-family housing for the elderly.

WHAT WILL THE BONDS PROVIDE?

The bonds would provide up to \$180 million in funds for up to 15,000 housing units over the next five years. Rents are estimated to be 20% below market rate. In order to assure the project is self supporting, some units may be rented at full market rate to renters other than senior citizens.

WHAT ARE GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS?

General Obligation Bonds are guaranteed by the citizens of the State of Oregon. The State currently has an AAA rating on General Obligation Bonds because no default by the State has occurred. The State Veteran's Loan Program uses General Obligation Bonds. Such bonds are preferred because they provide the lowest interest rate.

WHO WILL ADMINISTER THE LOANS?

The Oregon State Housing Division would administer the housing bonds, seeking proposals from the private sector and public agencies to build or rehabilitate rental housing for the elderly. The State would issue General Obligation Bonds at a low interest rate and then finance rental housing through traditional lending institutions and public agencies. The benefits of lower interest rates would be passed through to elderly tenants in the form of lower rents.

WHEN WILL THE FUNDS BE SPENT?

Housing funds would be allocated throughout the State according to local housing needs. Each city and county would receive its fair shair of funds.

Housing Bonds

Argument in Favor

By Joint Legislative Committee Designated Pursuant to ORS 255.465

Oregon voters have the chance this election, with a single YES vote, to provide over 15,000 jobs and over 15,000 housing units for senior citizens. If Measure #3 is approved, the state may use its credit to sell \$180 million in bonds to finance rental housing for the elderly.

THIS MEASURE BENEFITS THE ENTIRE STATE. Every city and county will receive its fair share of the construction based upon the number of elderly and the relative housing needs of that area.

THIS IS NOT A TAX MEASURE! The program is financed by using the state's credit—just like the Veteran's Home Loan Program. This lowers the interest rate and makes it much easier for the program to be SELF-SUPPORTING—again, just like the Veteran's Home Loan Program. So far, in 30 years, every veteran's bond has been paid on time, without using one penny of your taxes. This housing program for senior citizens will be handled in the same businesslike way.

BALLOT MEASURE NO. 3 WILL

- 1. Put Oregonians back to work.
- 2. Build needed housing for senior citizens.

Unemployment in Oregon's lumber and housing construction industries has recently been higher than any time since the Great Depression. Although the demand for multi-family housing is rapidly increasing, housing starts have fallen off. And, escalating rents are especially difficult for older Oregonians who live on fixed incomes.

BALLOT MEASURE #3 would allow the State to issue general obligation bonds for construction of multi-family rental housing for the elderly. The bonds are designed to be entirely self-liquidating, the same as the Veterans' Housing Bonds. The benefits of Oregon's favorable interest rate would be passed through to elderly tenants in the form of lower rents, as much as 20 percent lower than market rates. The Oregon State Housing Division would administer this Elderly Housing Finance Program and would make funds available through banks, savings and loans and public agencies. The housing will be constructed in various areas of Oregon according to need.

THIS IS A NEW ARTICLE TO THE OREGON CONSTITUTION.

- *If passed, it will give the State POWER TO INCUR AN INITIAL DEBT OF UP TO 180 MILLION DOLLARS TO FUND MULTI-FAMILY HOUSING UNITS FOR THE ELDERLY.

MEASURE 3 is designed for 'below median income' elderly WITH A LIMITED ABILITY TO PAY. If there is a default on the mortgage, the Housing Division may cover the loss with taxpayers dollars.

* The DEFAULT RISK IS GREATER for the MULTI-FAMILY housing developer because his ability to repay the state loan depends on the ability of NUMBERS OF TENANTS to pay adequate rents.

Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

Paragraph 1. The Constitution of the State of Oregon is amended by creating a new Article to be known as Article XI-I and to read:

ARTICLE XI-I

SECTION 1. In the manner provided by law and notwithstanding the limitations contained in section 7, Article XI of this Constitution, the credit of the State of Oregon may be loaned and indebtedness incurred in an amount not to exceed, at any one time, one-half of one percent of the true cash value of all taxable property in the state to provide funds to be advanced, by contract, grant, loan or otherwise, to lending institutions and qualified housing sponsors for the purpose of providing additional financing for multifamily housing for the benefit of elderly households.

SECTION 2. Ad valorem taxes shall be levied annually upon the taxable property within the State of Oregon in sufficient amount to provide, together with the revenues from advances to lending institutions referred to in section 1 of this Article, for the prompt payment of bonds issued pursuant to this Article and the interest thereon. The Legislative Assembly may provide other revenues to supplement or replace, in whole or in part, the tax levies.

SECTION 3. Bonds issued pursuant to section 1 of this Article shall be the direct obligations of the state and shall be in such form, run for such periods of time and bear such rates of interest as shall be provided by law. The bonds may be refunded with bonds of like obligation.

SECTION 4. The Legislative Assembly shall enact legislation to carry out the provisions of this Article. This Article shall supersede all conflicting constitutional provisions.

Paragraph 2. The following shall be the ballot title for the amendment proposed by paragraph 1 of this resolution pursuant to ORS 254.060: HOUSING BONDS: "Authorizes bonds up to one-half of one percent of true cash value of taxable property in state to provide funds for advances to lending institutions and qualified housing sponsors to stimulate the state's economy and provide multifamily housing for the benefit of elderly households, such bonds to be paid from revenues generated by the advances and ad valorem taxes."

Paragraph 3. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at a special election held throughout the state on the same date as the next regular state-wide primary election or at any other special state-wide election preceding the next statewide primary election.

Authorizes Vehicle Tax Mass Transit Use

Referred to Electorate of Oregon by the 1975 Legislature to be voted on at the Primary Election, May 25, 1976.

Explanation

By the Legislative Counsel Committee Pursuant to ORS 254.225

Section 3, Article IX of the Oregon Constitution requires that the proceeds from any tax or excise levied on the ownership or operation of motor vehicles be used exclusively for the construction, reconstruction, improvement, repair, maintenance, use and policing of public highways and streets and for the acquisition, development, maintenance and use of parks, recreational, scenic or other historic places and for publicizing any of these uses and things.

House Joint Resolution 18, if passed, would permit the proceeds of any tax or excise levied upon the ownership or use of motor vehicles, when imposed by a special district formed primarily for the purpose of providing transportation of passengers, to be used for transportation of passengers.

The proposed constitutional amendment would expand the permissible uses of those moneys which are derived from the imposition of motor vehicle registration fees by a special district formed primarily for the purpose of providing transportation of passengers. The amendment would not expand the permissible uses of those moneys derived from other taxes or excises such as motor vehicle fuel taxes, nor would it authorize the state to use any Highway Fund revenues for public transportation purposes. Under the amendment, a special district formed primarily for the purpose of transporting of passengers, such as a mass transit district, could use such moneys for transportation of passengers and highway purposes otherwise permitted by Section 3, Article IX of the Oregon Constitution to the extent such purposes are also permitted by law.

WHY VOTE "YES" ON BALLOT MEASURE NO. 4?

1. Will bring the Oregon Constitution up to date—to reflect modern transportation needs.

2. Will permit greater local control over transit district taxing and spending, by giving district residents an opportunity to make their own decisions regarding public transportation.

3. Will NOT add one penny to your taxes.

4. Will NOT touch highway fund dollars currently earmarked for highway maintenance and construction.

5. Will provide greater flexibility to transit districts, allowing them to spend funds for operations, rather than just for road-related purposes. (The authority for taxing already exists; this measure provides for spending funds for a wider range of districts' costs).

Ballot Measure No. 4 amends the state constitution to permit use of vehicle taxes for public transportation purposes when such fees are levied by a transit district. The auto registration fee authority can be imposed by a transit district **only** after a positive vote of the residents of the district.

The state has only two mass transit districts: Tri-Met, comprising Multnomah, Washington and Clackamas counties, and Lane Transit District. Jackson County has established a public transportation district which has the same limitations as mass transit districts. The proposed amendment will have no effect whatsoever in areas of the state where no transit district has been established.

The proposed constitutional amendment would have no effect unless the district authorizes a specific tax levy on the automobiles for transit use. If such a levy is authorized, the amendment would provide flexibility in using the proceeds. It would allow a district to use auto registration revenues to improve or expand its system so that public transportation can offer more people a realistic alternative to the automobile.

MEASURE 4 seeks to change an Article in the Oregon Constitution that states how motor vehicle taxes may be spent.

- * The Constitution DOES NOT NOW permit motor vehicle taxes to be used to pay general mass transit costs.
- * The Constitution NOW PROTECTS and ASSURES vehicle owners that vehicle and gas taxes are used for road-related purposes.

MEASURE 4 is a STATE WIDE ISSUE because Oregon voters must decide if taxes, imposed on vehicle owners by a transportation district, should be spent for buses, salaries, administration, advertising, land purchases, construction of terminals and used as matching funds for federal money.

PLEASE NOTE: The explanation on the ballot does not clearly state that MEASURE 4 PERMITS AN ADDI-TIONAL TAX ON MOTOR VEHICLES. The tax imposed on vehicle owners by a transit district would be IN ADDI-TION TO REGISTRATION AND LICENSE FEES now required by the State of Oregon.

ESTABLISHED TRANSPORTATION DISTRICTS (for example Tri-Met, Lane Transit and Rogue Valley) would be affected by passage of No. 4.

VOTERS who are not presently living in Public Transportation Districts should remember:

- 1. Goal 12 of State Land Use Planning is "to provide and encourage a safe, convenient and economic transportation system." Under Oregon's 1973 Land Use Act (SB 100) a 'Goal' has the force of law.
- 2. If and when a transit district is formed anywhere in the State, passage of No. 4 would permit the Transit District to tax vehicle owners to subsidize mass transit and those riding buses.
- 3. Those within the boundaries of the Transit District would be subject to an additional vehicle tax.

MASS TRANSIT IS NOT SELF-SUPPORTING. COSTS ARE PRIMARILY PAID BY THE TAXPAYER.

* Approximately 66% of Tri-Met's 1975-76 funding comes from taxes.

Authorizes Vehicle Tax Mass Transit Use

Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

Paragraph 1. Section 3, Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, is amended to read:

Sec. 3. No tax shall be levied except in pursuance of law, and every law imposing a tax shall state distinctly the object of the same to which only it shall be applied. The proceeds from any tax levied on, with respect to, or measured by the storage, withdrawal, use, sale, distribution, importation or receipt of motor vehicle fuel or any other product used for the propulsion of motor vehicles, and the proceeds from any tax or excise levied on the ownership, operation or use of motor vehicles shall, after providing for the cost of administration and any refunds or credits authorized by law, be used exclusively for the construction, reconstruction, improvement, repair, maintenance, operation, use and policing of public highways, roads and streets within the state of Oregon, including the retirement of bonds for the payment of which such revenues have been pledged, and also may be used for the acquisition, development, maintenance, care and use of parks, recreational, scenic or other historic places and for the publicizing of any of the foregoing uses and things; and the proceeds of any tax or excise levied on the ownership, operation or use of motor vehicles, when imposed by a district formed primarily for the purpose of providing transportation of passengers, may be used for transportation of passengers.

Paragraph 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next primary election held throughout the state.



As chairman of the Democratic National Committee in 1969-1970, Harris launched significant reforms to help broaden the party's base. He did not seek re-election in order to run for President in 1972.



TO OREGON REPUBLICANS:

My family and I hold a special place in our hearts for Oregon. Many of you may know that the late Congressman, Walter Norblad and Mrs. Norblad are the Godparents of our daughter, Susan. Our trips to Oregon have given us fond memories of old and new friends, together with a continuing appreciation for your state's natural beauty. In this regard, I congratulate you for working so hard to make the Hells Canyon National Recreational and Wilderness areas possible. Signing that bill on December 31, 1975 was a most satisfying way to end the old year and begin the new.

We truly have a new beginning in our bicentennial year: respect for the office of the Presidency has been restored, and the economy is improving.

In my 1975 State of the Union Address, I informed Congress and the Nation that our national problems were increasing at an alarming rate; however, by January of this year, significant progress had been made in finding realistic and workable solutions:

The rate of inflation has been cut almost in half. Over two million more Americans are on the job today than were emp-loyed when we reached the bottom of the recession. Almost 800,000 Americans obtained new jobs in January alone. At my insistence, we are getting people back to work without spending billions for inflationary, "make-work" job programs recommended by some members of the Democrat-controlled Congress.

When I took office as President of the United States, my goal was full recovery without inflation. We are well on our way to achieving that goal because we have followed a steady course of reduced taxes, a temporary increase in unemploy-ment compensation, a drastic cut in Federal spending and renewed business confidence to stimulate production and ioba

As President, I must be concerned with the State of the Union, while you are understandably interested in the State of Oregon. Naturally, we have common concerns, but you have special needs. I believe I know what concerns you, and I hope you will agree with my proposals to help you solve some of Oregon's problems.

We all desire a more healthy economy, but people seldom agree on the proper means to reach this goal. In Oregon, I am sure you will concur that a necessary condition of a healthy economy is freedom from the petty tyranny of massive government regulation.

Oregon farmers know what I mean. We are wasting mill-ions of working hours and billions of consumers' dollars because of bureaucratic red tape. The American farmer, who not only feeds 215 million Americans but also millions worldwide, has shown how much more he can produce with-out the shackles of government control. I know how important agriculture is to Oregon. When I spoke in January to the American Farm Bureau, I said, "We start this bicentennial year with justifiable pride in our agricultural strength and progress. I place to do everything in w power to keep farm progress. I pledge to do everything in my power to keep farm income high, and it will be." We must preserve the family farm and family-owned businesses, and I have proposed to Congress estate-tax and inheritence changes so that family businesses and family farms can be handed down from generation to generation without having to be sold to pay taxes.

An indispensible ingredient of a sound economy is a healthy housing and construction industry. In January, I called for additional housing assistance for 500,000 families. I had already authorized subsidized construction for 250,000 new or rehabilitated homes. My administration has lowered interest rates to make more mortgage money available, which should give the housing industry another needed boost. What's more, I have proposed rapid depreciation for new business construction in areas experiencing unemployment over 7 per cent. This program is benefiting the construction industry as it creates productive, permanent, well-paying jobs in the private sector.

I would like to give government back to the people; there-fore, I have recommended a five-year extension of revenue sharing to help state and local governments solve problems at home. I want to consolidate 59 separate Federal programs and provide flexible Federal dollar grants to help local education, child nutrition and social agencies. However, those who propose to save billions in taxes by a wholesale shifting of Federal programs to state and local governments are misleading the people. This would inevitably result in reduced services and a crushing rise in state and local taxes.

Americans are no longer dying on the battlefield. We are at peace, and I pledge to work diligently to ensure and maintain accord at home and abroad. In order to accomplish this, our nation must be militarily strong and flexible to meet any potential adversity. That is why I recommend a significant and essential increase in the Defense Budget for fiscal 1977. It provides for real growth in purchasing power, and includes the cost of our all volunteer-forces.

In closing, I'd like to remind you of one of our common goals: we would like life for our children to be better than it has been for us, just as our life has been better than the lives of our fathers and mothers. I know it will be better. I have no doubt that we will see a resurgent and confident America providing leadership and inspiration for people throughout the world. I trust you will give me your support as you vote May 25.

By 1973-74, 45 of the state's 58 counties were able to cut their property tax rates — many for the second year in a row. Under Reagan's leadership, new laws were enacted providing for stiffer penalties against rape, robbery, burglary and drunk driving.

RONALD REAGAN, OUR NEXT PRESIDENT, SAYS:

DETENTE. "Through detente we have sought peace with our adversaries. We should continue to do so, but must make it plain that we expect a stronger indication that they also seek a lasting peace with us. Too often we act as if a concession on our side — with none by them — is automatically helpful to the process as a whole. Detente will work only if it is a twoway street — something for something."

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT. "We can and must reverse the flow of power to Washington; not simply slow it, What I propose is nothing less than a systematic transfer of authority and resources to the states — a program of creative federalism for America's third century." "The more government we can keep at local levels in local hands, the better off we are and the more freedom we will have."

DEFENSE. "A decade ago we had military superiority. Today, we are in danger of being surpassed by a nation that has never made any effort to hide its hostility to everything we stand for. As a nation, we must commit ourselves to spend whatever is necessary to remain strong. To be second is to be last."

CRIME. "It does no good to take guns from the law abiding. The most effective gun control is mandatory sentences for those who commit crimes with guns in their possession. When a would-be lawbreaker knows he can kill without facing the ultimate penalty, when he knows that parole or probation may come easy for him, we cannot say we have effective deterrents to increased crime."

INFLATION. "The one basic cause of inflation is government spending more than it takes in. When Washington runs in the red, year after year, it cheapens every dollar you earn; it makes a profit on your cost-of-living wage increases by pushing you into higher tax brackets; it borrows in the capital market to cover its deficits, cutting off business and industry from that capital which is needed to fuel our economy and create jobs; it robs your savings of value; and it denies retired people the stability they need and expect for their fixed incomes. The cure: a balanced budget. The federal government must set a timetable, a systematic plan, to balance the budget — and it must stick to it."

FEDERAL SPENDING. ". .Washington is spending a billion dollars every day and goes into debt a billion and a third dollars every week. As a result, real spendable weekly income of the average American worker is lower than it was a decade ago — even though in these 10 years the same worker has increased his productivity 23 per cent. In the words of Jefferson, that is taking from the mouth of labor the bread it has earned."




DICK GROENER BELIEVES IN SPEAKING OUT ON TODAY'S ISSUES

The state treasurer's duties are principally in two areas: administration of state owned lands and investment of public funds.

In the administration of lands, special concern should be for what is going to be done FOR people—land owners and land users—rather than what is going to be done TO them by all-powerful state agencies.

Elected state officials should be visible to the public and responsive to public opinion and not buffered from the affected public by an unresponsive bureaucracy.







EXCERPT FROM A 1976 SPEECH BY STAN BUNN

While I am a candidate for Attorney General, there are two issues which I believe every candidate for public office must face. It does not matter whether that person is a Republican, Democrat or Independent.

The two issues that you, the voters, must ask each candidate for his or her views on are: (1) credibility in government; and (2) responsiveness in government. By credibility in government I mean that we must elect to public office only those people who are willing and ready to tell us clearly and simply how they stand on the issues \ldots without trying to skirt the issues \ldots dogge the tough questions \ldots or other wise disguise where they stand.

I believe that candidates must forthrightly tell the people where they stand and explain their positions.



HANDGUN REGULATION

Tuck Wilson courageously approaches the burgeoning problem of handguns, 30 to 40 million of which are in circula-tion now, with over 2.5 million more being sold each year. Their number correlates directly to their use in crime, accidents and suicide.

Wilson does not propose banning handguns. But he does advocate

- Prohibiting the sale of "Saturday Night Specials."
- Licensing of handgun owners and the registration of their weapons
- Granting exclusive authority to issue concealed handgun permits to the state police.
- Making violations of handgun laws a felony, subject to mandatory prison terms.

SENTENCING CRIMINALS

Tuck Wilson would seek to eliminate the growing disparity between the sentence a criminal receives and time actually served. Wilson believes judges should have the power to prescribe terms during which the defendant will not be eligible for parole.

EXPANSION OF DETENTION FACILITIES

Overcrowding of existing detention facilities is a factor influencing early parole. Many local jails are understaffed and in poor condition.

Tuck Wilson supports the state development of multipurpose regional facilities that would supplant the present multi-layered system, and add to our detention capabilities.

Ours is a government of laws, not men. In the last few years Americans have become acutely aware that they must be very careful in selecting which men and women will make the laws, enforce them and interpret them—and do so without favoritism of any kind.

Americans have had enough injustice!

Berkeley Lent spent time getting ready to be a judge. As a legislator he was a leader in fights to help average Oregonians—against a sales tax and the infamous raid on the veterans' home loan fund, for lower property taxes by increasing state aid to schools, for more just and humane treatment of injured and unemployed workmen, for better safety laws for your protection.

His nickname is "Bud." He is not a stuffed shirt; his closest friends today are the same ones he's had for years. Before he became a lawyer in 1950 he worked at the kinds of hard jobs described above. He is a World War II navy combat veteran, a member of V.F.W. Post No. 1442 and B.P.O.E. Lodge No. 142.

What should the taxpayers of Oregon expect from judges in return for their salaries? Surely, they have a right to expect a high degree of competence, fairness, judicial temperament and diligence or productivity. The other candidates for this position are Judge Shirley Field, Multnomah County District Court (a court of inferior jurisdiction) and Judge Jason Lee of the Court of Appeals in Salem. Comparisons seem in order.

As between Field on the one hand and Lent on the other, consider: A few months ago, "The Oregonian" published an evaluation of Multnomah County judges based upon a survey by the newspaper of those lawyers who regularly appear in the courts and are in the best position to "judge the judges." In the four categories above listed (competence, fairness, temperament and diligence) the trial lawyers rated Judge Field 11th (last) in each and every category among the eleven district court judges. Judge Lent (among the eighteen circuit court judges) "scored in the top 25 per cent of the field in all categories" and at the top in the fairness category.

As between Lee on the one hand and Lent on the other, consider: In 1975 Judge Lee wrote a mere 25 of the Court of Appeals' opinions while the other judges of that court averaged 84.8 opinions each. Is Lee productive? Is the taxpayer receiving his money's worth? On the other hand, for the last year for which records were kept for all 65 state circuit judges Judge Lent ranked in the top eight in the number of cases tried; seven-eighths of the circuit judges tried fewer cases than he did.

Also, Judge Lee's judicial competence has been questioned by the press as well as lawyers and judges. The survey mentioned above shows lawyers find Judge Lent highly competent. Lent's legal ability has long been recognized by the press. In 1968, The Oregonian: "... talented attorney..." The Oregon Journal: "... fine legal mind and general legislative talent..."

In 1974 Judge Lent was recommended for the Supreme Court by the Salem "Capital Journal" and "The Oregon Journal." The Capital Journal: "As a legislator Lent was vigorous and decisive. That's what he is now as a circuit judge. He works hard and fast. He's known for integrity." The Oregon Journal: "... the candidacy of Judge Lent offers an opportunity for providing the Supreme Court with a vigorous mind of above average legal ability ..." Judge Lent is expected to earn substantial newspaper endorsement in this election.

Judge Lent was raised in the Lents District of southeast Portland which is named for his pioneer great grandfather, the first settler in the area, who donated land for the first Lents school. Coming from this district of working people, Lent during his elective career has had the strong support of organized labor.

A Supreme Court justice should be a scholar. In law school Judge Lent was an associate editor of the Willamette Series of Legal Handbooks. For years he was an associate editor of the American Trial Lawyers' Journal. He has authored articles for law reviews and countless papers to continue the legal education of practicing lawyers.

He has been active in Bar Association matters: President of the Western Trial Lawyers' Association, vice-president of the Multnomah Bar Association, chairman of the State Bar's Committee on Civil Rights.


In early March, Judge Lent volunteered to make his confidential record kept by the State Bar open for inspection and challenged all other lawyer candidates for public office to do the same.





The Oregon Court of Appeals, created in 1969, was given jurisdiction of most appeals from the Circuit Courts and from orders of state administrative agencies. Litigants can petition the state Supreme Court for review, but review is denied in 90% of the cases.

The Court of Appeals has, in such cases, become a court of last resort, emphasizing the importance of the right of the people to have a choice in the election of judges. Unlike most state offices, the vast majority of judgeships are filled as political appointments, — the method by which the incumbent originally became a judge of the Court of Appeals.


The Oregon Journal on March 4, 1976, reported that certain judges of the Court of Appeals, in an unprecedented interview, publicly criticized the competency of one of its members, bringing to light a state of extreme dissention in this important judicial body.

As a voter, before you cast your ballot, ask yourself these questions:

- 1. Why is there dissention on this court?
- 2. Why would these judges air their grievances publicly?
- 3. Can a court torn by such dissention properly render justice to litigants?
- 4. Why, of 408 opinions by the Court of Appeals in 1975, have 301 litigants sought review by the Supreme Court of Oregon?

If answers to these questions give serious doubt as to the stability of the Court of Appeals under the six year leadership of the present chief judge, then you as a voter should resolve that difficulty by replacing the incumbent.

Referred to the People by the Marion County Board of Commissioners

EXPLANATION

Twenty nine additional law enforcement personnel will be added to the Marion County Sheriff's Office to broaden the security and investigative scope of the Sheriff's Department.

Because of the lack of present manpower, clearance of crimes reported is at a low level. The number of crimes coupled with the sharp increase in population and density in the suburban areas of Marion County have reduced the amount of service the Sheriff's Office has been able to give to the citizens of Marion County.

The hiring of additional personnel through regular budgetary allowances has been unable to keep pace with the demands for service over the past ten years.

With the passage of this five year operating levy at a cost of \$676,463 per year (approximately \$.36 per thousand dollar evaluation, or \$10.80 per \$30,000 home) it will allow the Sheriff's Department to add 15 patrol officers, 3 investigators, 3 correction officers, 2 deputies to work in Community/School Liaison and Youth Services Team, 2 warrant and court deputies, 1 radio dispatcher and 3 record clerks for support services, which will broaden the Sheriff's Office ability to provide more effective security and greater crime suppression through investigations and patrols.
