ECLIPSES OF 1860.

There will be Four Eclipses this year:—Two of the SUN, and Two of the MOON:
I.—The First will be an *Annular Eclipse* of the SUN, on Sunday, January 22d day, invisible here.

II.—The Second will be a *Partial Eclipse* of the MOON, on Monday, February, 6th day, visible here, as follows:

III.—The Third will be a *Total Eclipse* of the SUN, on Wednesday July 18th day, visible as a *Partial one* here:—Beginning, at 7h. 14m.; Greatest obscuration, 8h. 20m.; End, at 9h. 55m.; Duration, at 2h. 11m.—Mean time, morning.

IV.—The Fourth will be a *Partial Eclipse* of the MOON, on Wednesday, August 1st day, invisible here.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS OF 1860.

The Planet *Venus* (♀) will be *Evening Star* until July, 19th; then *Morning Star* until the end of the year.—*Mars* (♂) will be *Morning Star* until July 17th; then *Evening Star* to the end of the year.—*Jupiter* (♃) will be *Morning Star* until Jan. 11th; then *Evening Star* until July 29th; then *Morning Star* to the end of the year.—*Saturn* (♄) will be *Morning Star* until Feb. 12th; then *Evening Star* until Aug. 22d; then *Morning Star* to the end of the year.

LIGHT HOUSES.

Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.—Robert W. Crookshank, John Ward, Isaac Woodward John James Robinson, R. N., and Donald Clark, Esquires.

Isaac Woodward, Esquire, Surveyor of those Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy belonging to New Brunswick, and also of those belonging to Nova Scotia which are partly supported by this Province.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof. A plain white light

Digby Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the west side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin—A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white

Bearings and Distance by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House. This Light bears from the Light house on Brier Island, N. N. W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. 22 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. distance 7 miles.
From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, off White Head Island, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W. $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

To the Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, W S. W. 2 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W and by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N. 13 miles.

NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westward, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. 18 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles

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The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable, Seal Islands S. and by W. $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed *white* lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 1000 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same position, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, (British or American) Both the Buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz:

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly.

Gannet Rock Light E. by S. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. 13 miles.

Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

Northern Head of Grand Manan. N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.

N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.

Little River Head, N. by W.

Libby Island Light House, (American.) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the lights.

It is recommended that the Ship's Compasses should be well compared and adjusted (particularly in new ships), before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westerly, or ($1\frac{1}{2}$ points) it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay (South Channel) between the Old Proprietor and N. W. Ledge, is S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S., but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light, (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed *white* light. The building is painted White, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet—Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and *white*. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed *white* light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed *white* light. The House is white and black, in stripes vertically.

Quaco.—A revolving *white* light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can

be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain white light. The House is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

West Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light—On Cape Forchu, on the western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova-Scotia), in lat. 43, 39, N. long, 66, 8, W. It exhibits a plain revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white and is elevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

Grindstone Island Light.—An Octagonal Tower, sixty feet above the level of high water on Grindstone Island, in Chignecto Bay, in Lat. 45° 43' 13" N. Long. 64° 37' 25" W. The Tower is painted white, as is also the Keeper's house, one story, situate about 50 feet to the Eastward of the Tower.

Bearings and distances of several places from the above Light House, as follows:

Cape Enrage Light, by compass, S. 61½ W., 10 1-7 miles.

Highest Point of St. Mary's Ledge, by compass, N. 40 W., 6-10 mile.

The point of low water off the Light House, by compass, S. 78 W., 2-10 mile.

Jones' Ledge, N. 10 W., 3-10 mile, it dries at low springs and has about 2 1-2 fathoms on it at half tide.

A Sand Bank, S. 15 W., 6-10 mile, it has 1½ fathoms on its shoalest part at lower water springs.

Grand Manan.—There is a Light House and Keeper's House being erected at the "Swallow Tail" on the North Eastern part of the Island of Grand Manan, in the Bay of Fundy, which will be lighted next season. The Light is 45 feet from Base to Deck; the point on which it stands is 103 feet above high water, making 148 feet elevation. This is a conspicuous mark in the South Channel between Brier Island and Grand Manan. Both Houses are painted White.

SIGNALS.

Displayed at Partridge Island, on the approach of Vessels to the Harbour of Saint John.

One ball close, for one square-rigged Vessel,

One ball half hoisted for two ditto.

Two Balls close, for three Vessels

Two Balls separated, for four ditto

A Pendant of any colour, for five ditto

A ditto under a Ball, for six ditto

A ditto over a Ball half hoisted, for seven ditto

A ditto under two Balls close, for eight ditto

A ditto between two Balls separate, for nine ditto
 A Flag of any colour, for ten or more ditto
 The above are displayed at the East or West yard arm, according to the direction in which the Vessels are at first observed, and as soon as their use can be distinguished, descriptive Colours will be hoisted at the mast head, in the following order:
 A Union Jack for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.
 " with a Red Pendant over, for a two-decker
 " with a Blue Pendant over, for a Frigate
 " with a white ditto, for a small armed vessel
 A blue Pendant for a Merchant Ship
 A red ditto, for a Merchant Brig
 A white and blue ditto, for a Foreign Vessel
 A white ditto, [without a ball.] for a Topsail Schooner or Sloop.
 A blue Flag pierced white, for a steamboat from Saint Andrews or Eastport.
 A Red Flag pierced white, for a Steamboat from Digby
 A Red Flag with a white square, for a Steamboat from Boston
 A Ball at the mast head, Vessel is on Shore or in distress

RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John—passed 3d August, 1848.

Five Shillings per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and Five Shillings per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by Virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing Vessels from any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hundred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Vessels over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, Ten Shillings; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three Hundred Tons, Fifteen Shillings; and for all Vessels over Three Hundred Tons, the sum of Twenty Shillings.

First Distance.—From Partridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing North West, Five Shillings per foot.

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point LePreaux, bearing North West, Six Shillings and Threepence per foot.

Third Distance.—From Point Lepreaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West—or North Channel, bearing South East, Seven Shillings and Sixpence per foot.

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Fourth Distance.—From the North Head of Grand Manan—or North Channel as aforesaid—to Machias Seal Island, bearing South, or Brier Island bearing South South East, Eight Shillings and Ninepence per foot.

Fifth Distance.—Any where outside the aforesaid distance, Ten Shillings per foot.

HARBOUR MASTER'S FEES.

On Vessels of 30 Tons and under 50, 2s. 6d.; Vessels of 50 Tons and under 75, 3s. 9d.; 75 and under 100 tons, 5s.; 100 and under 150 tons, 6s. 3d.; 150 and under 200 tons, 7s. 6d.; 200 and under 300 tons, 10s.; 300 and under 400 tons, 12s. 6d.; 400 tons and upwards, 15s.; Decked Vessels, under 100 tons, owned and registered at Saint John, and all British Vessels under that tonnage trading within the Bay of Fundy, or arriving from Ports to the Northward of Cape Cod, or the Westward of Cape Canso, or from any Port in Nova Scotia, to pay annually as follows: Under 30 tons, 3s 9d.; over 30 and under 50 tons, 5s.; over 50 and under 75 tons, 6s.; over 75 and under 80 tons, 10s.

RATES OF WHARFAGE, established by Act 5 Vict. cap. 49, in the City of Saint John and Parish of Portland.—For every decked vessel, or wood boat, of the burthen of 40 tons and under 1s. 6d. per day; above 40 tons, and under 50, 1s. 9d.; above 50, and under 60, 2s.; above 60, and under 70, 2s. 3d.; above 70, and under 80, 2s 6d.; above 80, and under 90, 2s 9d; above 90, and under 100, 3s.; above 100, and under 120, 3s 6d; above 120, and under 150, 4s; above 150, and under 180, 4s 6d; above 180, and under 200, 5s; above 200, and under 220, 5s 6d; above 220, and under 240, 6s; above 240, and under 260, 6s 6d; above 260 and under 280, 7s; above 280, and under 300, 7s 6d; above 300, and under 320, 8s; above 320, and under 340, 8s 6d; above 340, and under 360, 9s; above 360, and under 380, 9s 6d; above 380, and under 400, 10s; above 400, and under 450, 11s 3d; above 450, and under 500, 12s 6d; and 1s 3d for every additional 50 tons.

RATES OF SLIPPAGE AT THE CORPORATION SLIPS.

All Decked Vessels, same rates as for Wharfage; Wood Boats, and other Boats, or undecked Vessels, having standing Masts, and all Scows, and not lying at the wharves on either side of Slips, to pay the following rates:

Every Woodboat of sufficient burthen to carry 10 Cords of Wood, or under, 1s. 6d
 ditto ditto upwards of 10 Cords, and not more than 15, 2s. 6d.
 ditto ditto upwards of 15 Cords, and not more than 20, 3s. 9d.
 ditto ditto upwards of 20 Cords, 5s.

The above to be paid each trip, and if any such Vessel remains over six days, an additional duty to be paid of from 2s. 6d. to 5s. daily, according to the burthen. Other Boats and Vessels without decks, and having fixed or standing masts, and all Scows, to pay 1s. 6d. each trip and 1s. 6d. additional per day, if suffered to remain over three days.

RATES OF FERRIAGE ACROSS THE HARBOUR OF ST. JOHN.—Foot passenger, 2d.; Child under twelve years, 1d.; Horse, 3d.; Ox, or other large animal, 3d.; Elephant or Camel, 1s. 3d; six

gle Waggon, not loaded, 2d.; single waggon, with horse and one man, 6d.; single waggon, with horse, load and man, 7d.; double waggon, not loaded, 7d.; double waggon, with horses and man, 9d.; double waggon, with horses, load and man, 1s. 3d.; barrel, 1d.; bag, containing two bushels, 1d.; firkin, keg, or box of the same size, 1d.; cask of lime, 2d.; pipe, hogshead, or puncheon, whether in waggon, cart, sled, or other vehicle or not, except containing molasses, vinegar rice, or sugar 9d.; every cwt. of iron, steel, or copper, whether in waggon, cart, or other vehicle or not, 1d.--Carts, sleds, drays and carriages, same as waggons.

RATE OF TOLLS FOR CROSSING THE SAINT JOHN SUSPENSION BRIDGE.—For every foot passenger, (excepting children under five years of age,) 2d.; horse, mare, gelding, mule, ass, ox, cow, or other large animal, 4d. each; elephant or camels, 2. 6d.; carriage, sleigh, waggon, cart, sled or other vehicle, drawn by one horse or beast of draught, with one person, with or without a load, 7 1-2d.; horse or beast of draught, more than one, with a carriage or other vehicle, 4d. each; sheep, calf, hog, or goat, 1-2.

RATES AT THE PUBLIC WEIGHING MACHINES—Every load not exceeding One Thousand Pounds Weight, One Shilling; and One Penny for every additional Hundred Weight; payable, half by the seller, and half by the purchaser.

HACKNEY COACH FARES.—For conveying one passenger from any public stand to any part of the City, or from any one part of the City to any other part thereof, 1s.; and for every passenger exceeding one, 6d. additional; and if any driver of any Carriage or other vehicle, shall be detained at any place by any passenger, or shall make any agreement for carrying any passengers by the hour, he shall be entitled to ask, and receive the following rates, viz:—For any time not exceeding half an hour, 1s. 3d.; and in that proportion for every half hour that such Carriage, or other vehicle shall be detained or employed. Provided always, that in case any driver shall be required to cross the Ferry to Carleton, he shall, in addition to the foregoing fares, be entitled to demand and receive the ferriage for himself, his carriage and horses, both going and returning.

PUBLIC PORTERS AND HAND CART MEN—For loading carrying, and housing any goods, or any other article on any Hand Cart, from the Market Slip in King's and Queen's Wards, or from any other place within the limits of the first district, to any other place within the said several Five districts, the rates of prizes are as follow:—For the first district 3d.; second district 3½d.; third district 4d.; fourth district 4½d.; fifth district 5d.

MARKET TOLLS.—Beef, per quarter, 2d.; Calf, Sheep, Hog, Goat, Lamb, Kid, or Sheat 2d.; Tub, Pail or Jar of Butter, 1½d.; Firkin, 3d.; every 10 lbs. of Bell Butter, 1d.; Cheese, 1d.; load of Potatoes under 15 bushels, 2d.; ditto over 15 bushels, 6d.; load of Oysters in shell or tub, 6d.; Turkey, Goose, or dozen of Pigeons, 1d.; pair of Ducks, Poultry or Partridges, 1d.; bag of Flour, Meal, Oats, Peas, or Beans, 1d.; Ham or Shoulder, 1d.; Eggs, per 10 dozen, 1d.; and all other articles in like proportion.

FISH MARKET DUES.—Per every Salmon, 1½d.; Codfish, Pollock, Bass, or Shad, each 1d.; Halibut, not exceeding 20 lbs. 1d.; exceeding 20 lbs., and for every 20 lbs., 1d.; every Lobster, 1d.; dozen of Haddock, 1½d.; every 100 of Capereaux, Alewives, Herrings, or other small fish, 1½d.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS—(near Saint John).—The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full ebb, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

AGRICULTURAL.

REFUSE OF TANNERIES AS MANURE.—At a late meeting of the Farmer's Club of Little Falls, the subject of using the refuse of tanneries, hair, fleshings, lime, &c., for agricultural purposes was discussed, and one member said he had used hair on grain, and grass with the most marked effect. He had spread it thinly and harrowed in with spring wheat, and produced the best crop he had ever raised, or seen in the neighborhood. Upon grass its effects had been very distinct and lasting. Applied upon the top of an unproductive dry ridge of land, it had produced a very luxuriant growth, and without any other application, the dark green complexion of the sward had scarcely abated since 1847. On corn its application had not been so successful. It might have been owing to the manner of applying.

SORREL.—Sorrel hay should be cut the first of the season, and if you have any pieces of grass in which considerable sorrel is found, be sure and put your scythe into it at the first of your haying. There are several reasons for this: sorrel furnishes a great amount of seed, and if cut before it is perfectly ripe, the seed will be saved from the ground, and add value to the fodder. By cutting it early, its value is almost nearly doubled, and if properly cured, makes one of the best and most palatable fodders for sheep, of anything which your farm affords in the shape of hay. Do not neglect this until it is dead ripe, when the seed will be scattered on the ground, and the stalks make but poor food for stock.

SOWING GRAIN.—With your permission I will give you my way of sowing grain, which I think has some advantages over the ordinary way. I sow grain all one way—that is, walk across the field and cast my grain with my right hand—then moving my stake three or four paces, walk back and cast my grain with my left hand. This may not seem to be so easily done, but let any one take a bushel of grain, and go on to the barn floor and cast the grain with his left hand, and he will see that the thing is easily learned. I sow all my grain in this way, and generally get it on very even. Some of the advantages are as follows—the labor is not all performed with one hand. Grain can be sowed more even. It is desirable to sow grain with the wind.—W.—*Allegany Co., N. Y.*

CHEESE MAKING.—Set the milk at 90 degrees, in spring and fall, and 86 in hot weather. Heat up three times—first 90 degrees, then 95 degrees, and last 100 degrees. About one tea-cupful of salt to 16 pounds curd. Use much care in breaking up and working the curd; cutting at first with a dairy knife of four blades, and using the knife with one hand during the whole operation, taking particular care not to squeeze the curd in any way, but pass one hand under, and lifting gently, and letting it fall off the hand and between the fingers, and with the other keep the knife in motion in the curd, cutting it as fine as possible by the time it is ready for salting.

Thought and care are essential in all the various operations. Intense interest and anxiety are necessary in order to do *all these things well*, for they influence the *texture, flavor, and quality of the cheese*.

ANOTHER.—First scald the tub, then strain the milk into, it soon as brought from milking. Next put in sufficient rennet, (the quantity depending upon the quality) to fetch the milk to a curd, in from forty to sixty minutes. The curd is then dipped carefully into the basket for draining, until the next morning. The mornings' milk is prepared in the same manner, (after the thorough scalding of the tub.) The curd, when formed, is dipped in with that of the previous evening; then left to drain, with an occasional stirring with a knife or slice, (a knife is preferable, as it is not so likely to injure the curd.) When sufficiently drained, which it will be by nine or ten o'clock if properly attended to, tie together the ends of the cloth, and hang in the cellar until the succeeding day, when the curd of that day is prepared in the manner of the previous day's curd. It is now ready for scalding. Pour boiling hot water, at the rate of one gallon for 10 lbs. of curd, into the tub; next slice in the curd from the basket. (handling it carefully, so as not to disturb the "white whey.") The curd is next brought from the cellar and sliced in the same manner. It is put in lastly, for being older it does not require as much scalding as the newer curd. Let it stand from five to ten minutes, from the time the last slice is dropped in; then dip back into the basket, curd and water together, to drain. Check and stir it up with the knife, four or five times, when it is ready for grinding. The mill is placed upon the "cheese tongs" over the tub; the curd is then sliced into the mill and ground, when it is ready for the seasoning, which consists of a common sized teacupful of rock salt, and one teaspoonful of salt petre, for every twenty pounds of curd. It is thoroughly mixed, (not squeezed) with the hands. It is then ready for pressing, which is done gently until night, when the cheese is turned, cloth changed, and put back to pressing with sufficient weight, where it remains until the next cheese is ready for the press.

RENNET.—The stomach of the calf should be taken when empty, (no curd in it)—care taken not to get dirt on it—and without rinsing or washing, and salted inside and out, with one teacupful of salt to a rennet, and placed in an earthen dish. It should lay in the salt two days, then be stretched upon a stick in the form of a hoop to dry. When dried, take it off the stick, and place it in a tight sack for use. Those prepared one season are not to be used till the next.

To soak the rennet, take an earthen vessel; put three in it; then take two gallons of water, put one quart of salt in it; boil and skim, and cool till milkwarm. Then pour it upon them, and in one week it will be fit for use. One teacupful of the liquor will curdle the milk of two milkings from fifteen cows, fit to break up in forty minutes.

WASTEFUL FARMERS.—Perhaps in nothing are farmers more wasteful than in the management, or rather want of management of their manure. Should one have his granary robbed every week or so of fifteen or twenty dollars worth of grain, he would make a great fuss about it, and probably offer a liberal reward for the detection of the thief; yet this same man will allow his manure to lie spread over his cattle yard, exposed to the bleaching rains of spring which frequently carry more than the above amount of the elements of crops contained in his manure, forever beyond his reach—and he allows this waste to occur year after year, as if it was no sort of consequence to him. Farmers have been told this thing so often through our agricultural press, that one would think it need no longer be reiterated. Why is this? Has the subject become to them such a hackneyed one that they no longer give attention to it, or do they mostly belong to the class who take no paper devoted to the interest of their calling? The voice of the agricultural press has for half a century or more been raised against this waste of manure, as well as against the skinning process of cultivation so universally practised in many parts of our country. Their empty barns and granaries should appeal to them in a way not to be misunderstood! Their fields, so barren looking, all overrun with sorrel, should reprove them for such dereliction of a duty they owe to their children and their country, as well as to themselves! But farmers waste also in the application of manure—putting it on ground which needs draining, when half the value of the manure expended in draining would produce almost infinitely better results. Again, they will lavish it on to fields 'already rich, while they have others suffering for want of it. But it seems impossible almost to change the course of many, however prejudicial to their interests that course may be.

ROOT CROPS IN ENGLAND.—The London *Farmers' Magazine*, states that 40 tons of swedes per acre, all cleaned and topped have been grown, each turnip being allowed a space of 28 by 10 inches, thus taking up 280 square inches of ground. If planted regularly, this would give 22,402 turnips, which at 4 lbs. each, would amount to 40 tons 8 lbs. per acre. It further states that a market gardener at Fulham, grew 64 tons of mangold wurtzels per acre, on a wager of twenty-five dollars, which the gardener won. They were planted each in a space measuring two feet by one foot; each root taking up 288 square inches. There would thus be 21,780 plants upon an acre; and each one must have averaged a little over 6 lbs. 9 oz. to produce the 64 tons. The land on which this enormous crop was grown, is yearly dressed with the strongest horse manure that can be obtained—that principally made from corn. This shows what high cultivation will do for the root crop.

TO CURE BUTTER.—Take two parts of the best common salt, one part of sugar, and one part of salt-petre; beat them up and blend the whole together. Take one ounce of this composition for every sixteen ounces of butter, work it well into the mass, and close it up for use.

Butter cured this way, appears of a rich marrowy consistence and fine colour, and never acquires a brittle hardness, nor taste salt. It will likewise keep good three years, only observing, that it must stand three weeks or a month, before it is used.

TO REMOVE THE TURNIP FLAVOUR FROM MILK AND BUTTER.—Dissolve a little nitre in spring water, which keep in a bottle, and put a small tea-cupful into eight gallons of milk, when waim from the cow.

THE WIRE WORM.—*Manure* is well known to good farmers as one of the best remedies for the evils of the wire worm, to say nothing of its other good qualities; and some farmers adopt the following mode of applying it. The land for spring crops is plowed very late in autumn, the later the better, so that the cold may effectually chill them; and during winter manure is applied to the land, with three or four bushels of salt, and if practicable twenty or thirty bushels of ashes. The two latter may be applied early in spring; and if the manure is made into compost with turf, loam and sand, the previous autumn, with the salt and ashes added at that time, and the compost applied early the following spring, it will succeed well.

MISCELLANEOUS.

A RIDE ON THE STEAM PLOUGH.—By the permission of the inventor I stepped upon the engine, and stood by his side, as the shrill whistle gave the signal to start. The gang of eight fourteen inch prairie ploughs, which until now had hung by chains to cranes at the rear of the machine, were quickly lowered until they rested on the hard sod. One movement of the lever, and onward we went up an ascent of about seven degrees, and with a smooth, uniform motion. As the eight shares entered the soil, I apprehended a sudden check and strain, like that felt when a railroad train is partially "braked up," but nothing of the kind was experienced. In the enormous driving wheel or rather drum, beneath my feet, I could not detect the least sliding on the sod. *The traction was perfect.*

Before us the beautiful green turf swept under the bow of our gallant craft. Behind us lay a wide deep brown wake, in which scarce a tinge of green was visible. Under the stern the eight broad waves of sods lifted their crests, and rolled over like surges falling upon the beach. "Steady she goes," as our helmsman with hand upon the tiller, and eye upon the guide-wheels, keeps on his strait course. But we near the edge of our field. Two shrieks of the whistle, and up rise the plows. Starboard your helm! Round sweeps our craft as easily and gracefully as a bird on the wing, and we come again into line. Another whistle, the plows are lowered, and in less time than that required to follow this sentence, she is off! A flush of triumphant pleasure mantles the face of the inventor. The grade slightly descends. The crowd which has toiled after us up the ascent quicken their

pace. Still we are leaving them. Now only the foremost—then the whole party break into a run, and shouts, like those which followed the triumphal car of a Roman conqueror, rend the air.

Many were the warm grasps of congratulation which greeted the American conqueror as he stepped from his car of triumph, and in modest terms proposed to subject the machine to any test which the committees might suggest. "Can you cross-plow the land you have just turned over?" "Yes sir," was his prompt reply, and wheeling his machine into position, he crossed at right angles the furrows previously thrown up. Subsequently gulleys were passed over, abrupt elevations surmounted, and finally the plows were detached and an omnibus hitched to the engine. THE USE OF FIRE-ARMS.—The following instructions, given by a parent, to be strictly observed by his son, as conditions of allowing him to use a gun, if practised upon, would save many a life. 1. CREAM BEER.—Two ounces Tartaric Acid. Two pounds white sugar. The juice of half a lemon. Three pints of water. Boil together five minutes. When nearly cold, add the whites of three eggs well beaten, with half a cup of flour, and half an ounce of essence of wintergreen. Bottle, and keep in a cool place. Take two tablespoonfuls of this syrup for a tumbler of water, and add one-quarter of a teaspoonful of soda. This is an effervescing drink, but far pleasanter than soda water inasmuch as you do not have to drink for your life, in order to get *your money's worth*. The effervescence is much more slow.

GREASE SPOTS.—The following method of removing grease and oil spots from silk and other articles, without injury to the colours, is given in the *Journal des Connaissances Usuelles*:—Take the yoke of an egg and put a little of it on the spot, then place over it a piece of white linen, and wet it with boiling water; rub the linen with the hand and repeat the process three or four times, at each time applying fresh boiling water: the linen is then to be removed, and the part thus treated is to be washed with clean cold water.

A TABLE

For Foretelling the Weather through all the Lunations of each Year forever.

FORMED BY DR. HERSCHELL, AND REVISED BY DR. ADAM CLARKE.

This table and the accompanying remarks are the result of many years actual observation, the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the sun and moon, in their several positions respecting the earth, and will by simple inspection shew the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom or never found to fail

If the new moon, the first quarter, the full moon, or the last quarter, happens	IN SUMMER.	IN WINTER.

Observations.—1. The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, are to *midnight*, the fairer will be the weather during the seven days following.

2. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

3. The nearer to *midday* or *noon*, the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

5. The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e. from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the *wind*; as is noted in the table.

6. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.

7. To prognosticate correctly, especially in those cases where the *wind* is concerned, the observer should be in sight of a good *vane*, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.
