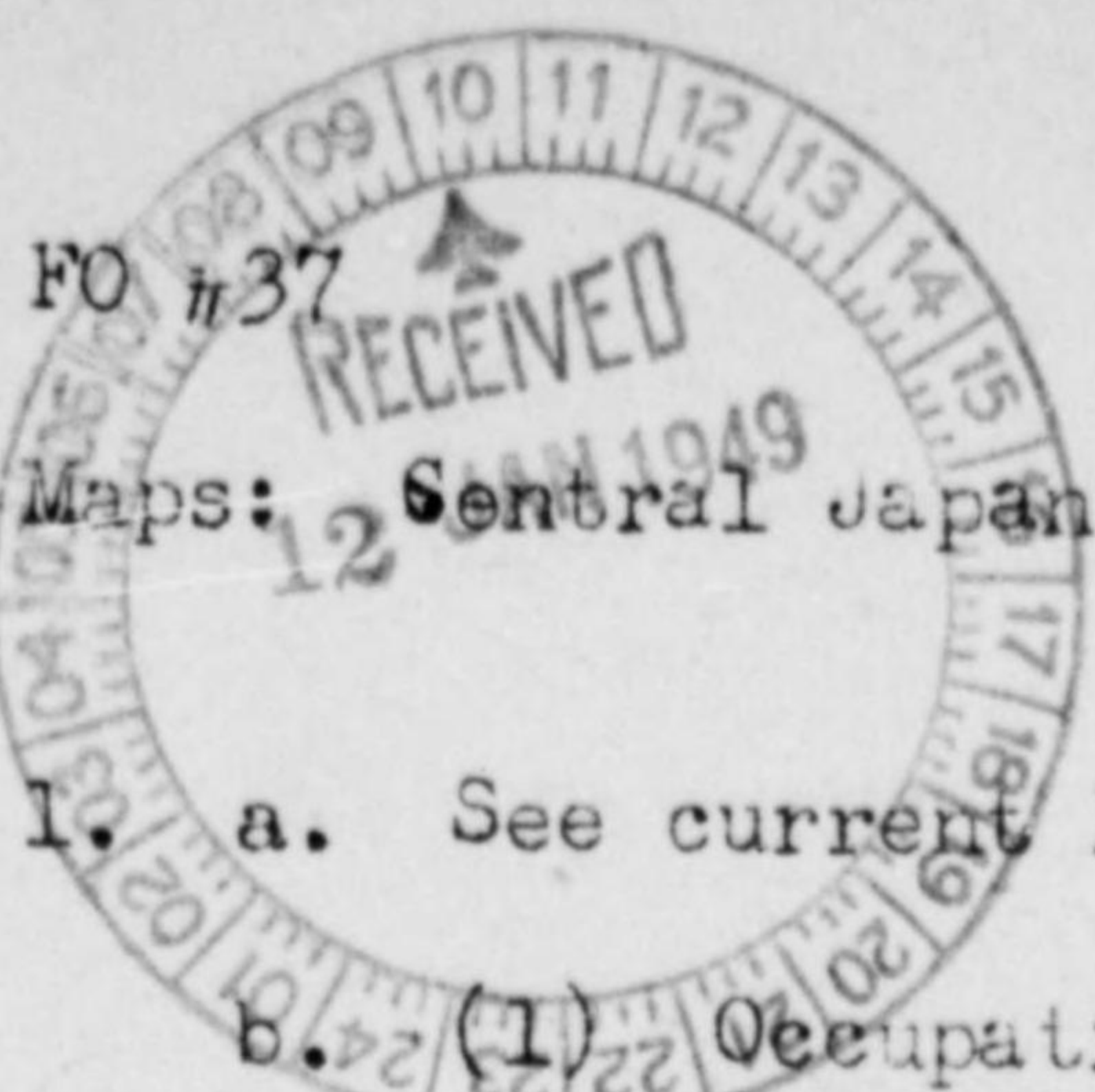

1. a. See current Intelligence Summaries and Annex 1, Intelligence.

b. (1) Occupation Forces under Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers continue to exercise military control of Japan. The British Commonwealth Occupation Force augments the US Occupation Forces in JAPAN under the Supreme Command of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

(2) Eighth United States Army:

a. Retains responsibility for all land areas in JAPAN proper except the YAKOSUKA Naval Base.

b. Assigns the British Commonwealth Occupation Force an occupation zone consisting of HIROSHIMA Prefecture and the IWAKUNI Police District in YAMAGUCHI Prefecture. See Annex 3, Operations Map, and Annex 4, Map of IWAKUNI Police District.

(3) IX United States Corps continues current operational missions as directed by the Commanding General, Eighth US Army.

I United States Corps will:

(1) Continue current operational missions as directed by the Commanding General, Eighth US Army.

(2) Assume tactical responsibility for the prefectures of SHIMANE (to include Oki-Retto), TOTTORI, OKAYAMA, YAMAGUCHI (less the IWAKUNI Police District), and the Island of SHIKOKU. (Effective 17 Dec 48).

(3) Assume responsibility for Military Government within the prefectures of SHIMANE (to include Oki-Retto), TOTTORI, OKAYAMA, YAMAGUCHI, HIROSHIMA, and the Island of SHIKOKU. (Effective 17 Dec 48).

Boundaries: See Annex 3, Operations Map.

24th Infantry Division will:

(1) Continue current operational missions as directed by the Commanding General, I US Corps.

(2) Assume tactical responsibility for the prefectures of SHIMANE (to include Oki-Retto) and YAMAGUCHI (less the IWAKUNI Police District). (This confirms verbal orders effective 17 Dec 48).

b. 25th Infantry Division will:

(1) Continue current operational missions as directed by the Commanding General, I Corps.

(2) Assume tactical responsibility for the Prefectures of TOTTORI and OKAYAMA and the Island of SHIKOKU. (This confirms verbal orders effective 17 Dec 48).

## ANNEX 1 to FO 37, INTELLIGENCE

1. The Japanese Government and civilian populace are abiding, and probably will continue to abide, by the surrender terms and directives issued by the Occupation Forces. However, as the Japanese continue to learn how to walk in the light of their new found freedoms and the upsurge of nationalism continues as the haze of defeat lessens, the possibility of increasing unrest and internal disorder is ever present. Dissatisfied minority groups, unscrupulous leaders and external pressure in labor, political and economic fields cannot be overlooked and are of constant and considerable concern.

2. ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS OF INFORMATION:

a. Obstruction to operations, passive or active resistance to, or failure to comply with directives covering demobilization and demilitarization of Japan of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, by Japanese authorities, groups or individuals. Indications:

- (1) Possession, concealment or manufacture of, or failure to report arms, ammunition and other war materials.
- (2) Attempts by Japanese nationals to obtain possession of arms, ammunition, explosives or other war materials by theft, seizure, manufacture, or other unauthorized means.
- (3) Obstructions to, or failure to apprehend or arrest war criminals as directed.
- (4) Retention, destruction or concealment of military, technical, or scientific information, official records, and/or documents desired by, or of value to, all United States Government agencies.
- (5) Efforts secretly to continue scientific research on electronic weapons, atomic weapons, biological warfare, or any other similar activity, the purpose of which is to develop potential force for waging war.
- (6) Organization of Japanese groups authorized to remain in being, e.g. schools, factory workers, etc., along distinct military lines or instruction of same in military subjects (except for the Japanese Police).

b. Attempts by Japanese authorities, groups or individuals to resist the authority and intent of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers. Indications:

- (1) Formation of secret or non-secret societies or groups for activities in resistance or opposition to directives and/or orders of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, or subversive to his authority.
- (2) Failure of Japanese authorities to enforce adequately Japanese laws, ordinances and regulations which are promulgated to implement the directives of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- (3) The use of pronouncements or publications, either public or private, tending to incite resistance, opposition, or non-compliance with directives and/or orders of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

- (4) Improper use or distribution of military stores, installations or lands released by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers for the benefit of the Japanese civilian population.
- (5) Improper distribution and consumption of commodities.
- (6) Demolition and/or destruction of public or private property. Acts of sabotage and lawlessness against the Occupation.
- (7) The making of plans or attempts to commit violence on the personnel of the Occupation Forces, or on Japanese Government officials when such Japanese officials are discharging duties in accordance with orders of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- (8) Intimidation of liberal, modern party leaders by threats or other measures designed to vitiate democratic leadership.
- (9) Formation, membership, and activities of social, cultural, secret or non-secret societies, groups or political parties whose basic principles are not democratic.
- (10) Introduction or attempts at introduction into Japan of leaders, organizers, foreign or national, agents or means of non-democratic political elements.
- (11) Failure to purge political leaders whose past record is incompatible with a democratic form of government.

c. Development of political, economic and social forces capable of subverting the democratization of Japan. Effect of foreign ideologies tending to create social unrest and ultimate chaos. Indications:

- (1) Operations of foreign agents in fomenting social unrest and political sabotage.
- (2) Subversion of the national press toward anti-American and anti-occupation publications.
- (3) Introduction into Japan of organizers and agents, foreign and national with a view toward agitating the populace and discrediting the Occupation Force.

3. GENERAL INTELLIGENCE BASIS

- a. Report all violations of/or failure to comply with directives of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers by Japanese authorities, groups or individuals in Japan.
- b. Investigate and report all acts of sabotage, riots, social unrest or other disturbances.
- c. Report all subversive activities of foreign agencies, in attempting to discredit United States policies, spread propaganda and increase their own influence.
- d. Report on all indications of, or actual formation of armed or semi-armed groups which are or may be engaged against Occupation Forces.
- e. Be responsible for the provision of logistic support for field detachments of the following intelligence agencies which are operating within First Corps area of logistic responsibility: 441st CIC Detachment, Civil Censorship Detachment (CCD), Advance Translator and Interpreter Service (ADVATIS), Central Intelligence Agency (CIA), Army Security Agency (ASA) and General Headquarters Technical Intelligence Detachment.

- f. Establish, operate and maintain such interrogation centers, language detachments and linguist teams as are necessary to develop information required by General Headquarters, SCAP.
- g. Report on interrogation of repatriated Japanese Nationals.
- h. Coordinate activities in collection of foreign documents with the Translator and Interpreter Service, General Headquarters, SCAP.

## 4. SPECIAL INTELLIGENCE TASKS.

- a. Carry out general intelligence tasks in conformity with policies published by Headquarters First Corps.
- b. Coordinate with CIC on local counter intelligence measures.
- c. Keep abreast of political trends within areas of responsibility.
- d. Arrange for inventory and safeguarding of documents and take action on requests for documents held locally, either by producing the original or copies.
- e. Pass to CIC, Military Government or Provost Marshal within respective headquarters for action, information concerning matter essentially of a CIC, Military Government or Provost Marshal nature which has been developed through intelligence channels.

## 5. COUNTERINTELLIGENCE.

- a. Military Censorship.
  - (1) There will be no military censorship of personal correspondence or telegraph and telephone communications of personnel of U.S. military forces, attached civilians and dependents.
  - (2) Personal communications are still governed by the provisions of AR 380-5 in regard to release of classified military information.
  - (3) Information, now classified, regarding past operations, intelligence, tactics, methods and equipment will remain classified until declassified by proper authority.
- b. Civil Censorship.
  - (1) Civil censorship is the responsibility of GHQ, FEC.
  - (2) Civil censorship detachments will screen and examine communications to and from Japan. Information found which is of immediate intelligence or counterintelligence interest will be referred to the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2 of the division concerned.
  - (3) Civil censorship detachments will advise Military Government authorities concerning the posting and dissemination of proclamations and regulations concerning civil censorship.
  - (4) Civil censorship will be responsible for censorship of the Japanese press.
- c. Counter Intelligence Corps.
  - (1) Eighth Army has been relieved of counterintelligence responsibility within Japan.

- (2) Annex 6, Operations Instructions #6, GHQ, FEC, dtd 1 Aug 48, GHQ, FEC Circular 72, dtd 20 June 47 and paragraph 6 of Eighth Army Circular 72, dtd 16 Oct 48, prescribe the mission of, and manner in which counterintelligence operations will be conducted.
- (3) Counter Intelligence Corps personnel are organized into District and Area Teams, with Sub-Detachments operating directly under the parent Area Team.
- (4) The 441st CIC Detachment supervises and coordinates the counterintelligence activities within Japan, through seven District Headquarters, located and having zones of jurisdiction as indicated below:

1st District	Kobura	24th Div Zone including Hiroshima Prefecture
2d District	Okayama	SHIKOKU Island, Okayama and Tottori Prefectures

4th District	Camp Drake	1st Cav Div Zone less Tokyo-Kanagawa Prefectures
5th District	Sendai	Seven Northern Prefectures of HONSHU

- (5) Regional Headquarters located at Kyoto (First CIC Region Hq- I Corps) maintains liaison to effect coordination and exchange of information at Corps Headquarters. Regional Headquarters receives one copy of all District investigative reports from Districts operating within the Corps zone.
- (6) Each numbered CIC District Headquarters maintains a liaison group to effect coordination and exchange of information with Division Headquarters in whose zone of jurisdiction that CIC District is operating.
- (7) Prefectural CIC unit (Area) Commanders maintain liaison with local Military Government teams and local tactical commanders in those prefectures in which troops are stationed.
- (8) First Corps units will provide adequate office space, quarters, rations, and means of communication as requested by each CIC detachment commander. It is necessary, in view of long range planning, that these detachments be established on a permanent basis.
- (9) Unit Commanders will render full assistance to CIC detachment commanders to further the conduct of counterintelligence operations outlined under policies of the First Regional Headquarters. CIC badges and credentials will be honored at all times.

- (10) Request for desired changes in CIC personnel, or policies, will be forwarded by unit commanders through channels to this headquarters, attention AC of S, G-2, for appropriate action.

## 6. HANDLING AND TRANSLATION OF DOCUMENTS, INTERROGATION AND INTERPRETATION

### a. General

- (1) The primary mission of language detachments is to process recovered documents of intelligence interest, and to render services of translation, interrogation or interpretation for the G-2 or other agencies as he may direct.
- (2) Documents will be processed in accordance with:
- (a) Standing Operating Procedure Instructions No. 1, GHQ, SCAP, dated 8 August 1945.
  - (b) Letter dated 21 October 1945, MIS, GHQ, SCAP, "Handling and Exploitation of Surrendered Japanese Documents".
  - (c) Sec. III and IV, Circular 62, GHQ, FEC, dated 2 June 47, subjects "Policy concerning use Language Personnel and Processing Enemy Nationals, Repatriates etc. and of Captured or Impounded Documents" and "Disposition of Documents" respectively.

### b. Document Inventories.

- (1) In cases where documents are found in such volume as to render their complete removal impractical, or where continued local accessibility is considered desirable, three copies of a general inventory, prepared in accordance with Inclosure 1, will be submitted through language channels. Inventories need not be detailed listing of documents but they should be complete enough to enable TIS, GHQ and Washington Document Center to determine the necessity for further screening. Each language detachment will keep a file of all such inventories submitted.
- (2) Final screening and removal of such documents left in place will be carried out at the site of field teams composed of representatives of TIS, GHQ and Washington Document Center. Language detachments of army, corps and divisions will be prepared to render assistance to such field teams.

## 7. TECHNICAL INTELLIGENCE.

a. AC of S, G-2, GHQ, SCAP, has been designated as the agency to coordinate and supervise the exploitation of military intelligence targets and intelligence targets of interest to civil departments of the United States or to foreign governments.

b. Unit commanders are responsible for discovering, securing and reporting new or unique technical intelligence items within their areas. Reports will be forwarded through G-2 channels with such copies through service channels as are desired by the chief of the service concerned.

c. Unit G-2's will furnish assistance requested by technical intelligence teams and special intelligence groups in the performance of their missions.

Such assistance will include:

- (1) Arranging for rations, billets, transportation and interpreter service.

- (2) Arranging liaison with appropriate staff sections and services and interviews with Japanese officials and civilians where necessary.
- (3) Arranging with appropriate unit agencies for safeguarding or evacuating samples of new or modified material or equipment as provided in Technical Intelligence Instructions No. 1, Military Intelligence Section, GHQ, SCAP, 20 November 1945.

d. Technical Intelligence Teams of the GHQ Technical Intelligence Detachment will be under the administration, operational and technical control of the Commanding Officer, GHQ Technical Intelligence Detachment. Units of this command may request assistance of such teams through G-2 Channels.

**8. MAPS AND PHOTOGRAPHS****a. Maps**

Requests for maps will be forwarded through Engineer channels to the Eighth Army Engineers.

**b. Aerial Photographs**

Requests for aerial photograph missions, contact prints and lithographic copies of aerial photographs will be forwarded to the AC of S, G-2, First Corps.

**9. REPORTS**

a. Violations of surrender terms involving hostile activity of extreme tactical importance will be transmitted to the AC of S, G-2, First Corps immediately by the most expeditious means.

b. Incidents involving acts of violence against U.S. troops will be investigated and a preliminary report will be submitted to the AC of S, G-2, First Corps immediately by electrical means in the clear.

c. G-2's operating directly under Headquarters First Corps, will submit a daily G-2 periodic report by electrical means covering the twenty-four hour period ending 1800I. It will be sent in the clear unless it contains information prejudicial to the interests of our forces such as misconduct by Allied personnel.

d. G-2's operating directly under Headquarters First Corps will submit by safehand a daily written report, covering the same period as the report described in preceding paragraph in form outlined in Inclosure 2. However, written report from 1800I Saturday through 1800I Monday will be consolidated and forwarded as one report for the period.

e. G-2's operating directly under Headquarters I Corps will submit a semi-monthly reconnaissance report as of 1800I on the 10th and 25th of each month. This report will be in the form of an overlay (1:250,000) which will indicate routes traversed and populated places reconnoitered by intelligence patrols since the last report. Dates of reconnaissance will be indicated. (Report Control Symbol ICC-3). Significant intelligence developed by patrols will be included in the daily report prescribed in par d above.

f. G-2's operating directly under Headquarters I Corps will submit a monthly summary and estimate of the intelligence situation as of 1800I on the 25th of each month. Report to be dispatched so as to reach this headquarters by the first of the following month. (Report Control Symbol ICC-4)

## ANNEA 2 to FO #37, SIGNAL ORDERS

1. a. For information of enemy communications systems, see current Intelligence Summaries and Situation Reports.
  - b. (1) Allied Forces will continue communications responsibilities necessary to carry out their missions of exercising military control of JAPAN.
  - (2) For information of principal tactical channels of Signal Communications, see Appendix 1, attached hereto.
  - (3) Command Posts: (See paragraph 5, Field Order No. 37).
2. Communications facilities required at established headquarters will operate in accordance with Signal Operations Instructions, and Standing Signal Instructions, Headquarters Eighth United States Army and I Corps.
3. The Commanding Generals, 24th and 25th Infantry Division, and the Commanding Officer of the 58th Signal Battalion, will:
  - (1) Continue to carry out the Signal missions presently assigned.
  - (2) Install, operate and maintain signal communications facilities required to accomplish the missions assigned in paragraph 3, Field Order No. 37 and current Operational Directives.
- x. (1) Submit line route maps, circuit diagrams and such other reports as directed by the Signal Officer, I United States Corps.
  - (2) Submit line route maps of proposed permanent wire construction for approval of the Commanding General, I United States Corps, prior to any actual construction.
  - (3) Security and use of Japanese wire and radio communication facilities:
    - (a) be prepared to protect and assume control of Japanese wire and radio communications facilities within assigned areas. No positive action will be taken in this connection except on further orders from this headquarters. In the event of Allied Force supervision and control of any Japanese communication facilities, officials and employees of the system concerned will be retained in their professional positions insofar as practicable.
    - (b) Procurement of Japanese communication facilities will be in accordance with current Items 41, 52 and 53, Standing Signal Instructions, Headquarters Eighth Army.

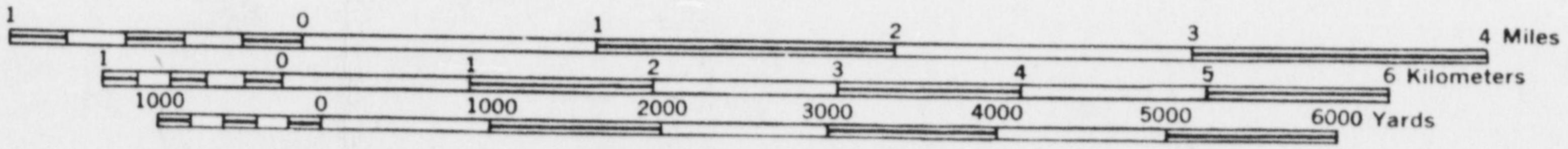

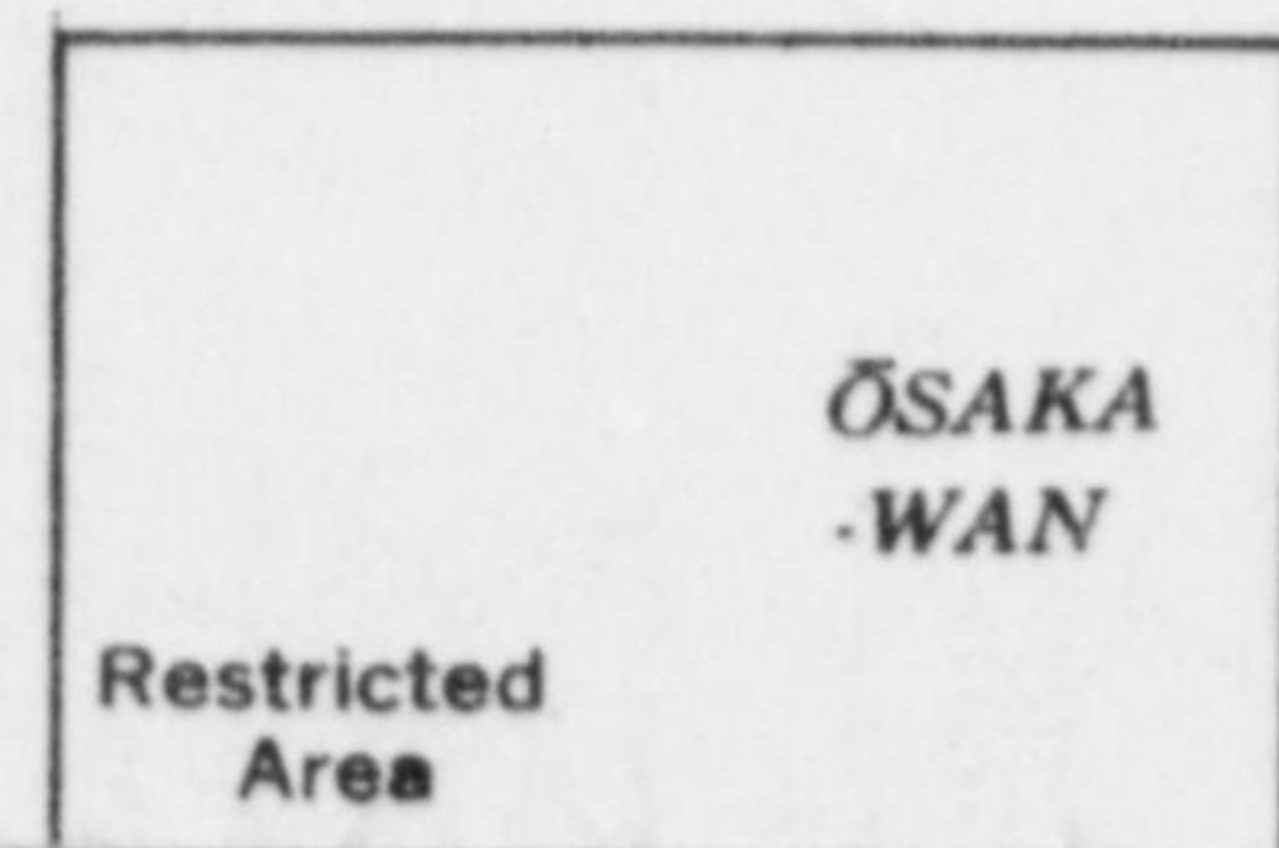
