

## The Stamp which led to the American Revolution.

Government ordered to be affixed to deeds, promissory notes, etc., in the American Colonies, the resistance to which imposition was the preliminary step to our Declaration of Independence; and hateful as its sight may have been to our forefathers, Americans of the present day should regard it, on account of the glorious Revolution which it produced, with a feeling of admiration. The original of our engraving exists in the rooms of the Connecticut Historical

Society, at Hartford, to which Association it was presented by James Brown, Esq. It was received by Mr. Brown from his brother, Wm. Brown, Esq., M. P., of London. The following memorandum accompanied the donation:—"John Woods, Esq., Chairman of the Inland Revenue, London, found a box of these stamps in August, 1850, being a part of those issued and prepared to send to America. The act compelling their use in the colonies after the 1st of Nov., 1766, being resisted, led to the independence of the United States."





Description.—This stamp is composed of two pieces of paper, each impressed on one side, and pasted together, back to back. On one is the crown, with the initials G. R. and figure 3, and a double cipher of G. R. underneath. On the upper right-hand corner is the number of the stamp. This is on white paper, and is printed from a copper-plate in the ordinary way. The other side is properly a stamp, impressed not very deep yet quite distinctly, by a die, on blue paper. It contains a crown, with the word America at the top, and two shillings six pence—the value of the stamp—at the bottom.

## The Literature of American Lumismatics.

[A PAPER READ BEFORE THE AMERICAN NUMISMATIC SOCIETY AT THE SECOND NOVEMBER MEETING.]




HE progress of numismatic investigation and record in the United States has of late been truly remarkable. In the general increase of attention bestowed upon all subjects of an artistic or scientific nature, which has been perceptible among us during the last seven or eight years, the important subject of the national coinage has fully shared; and while a laudable anxiety is now evinced, in many quarters, to acquire for private or public collections specimens of every accessible coin, the history of our own numismatic undertakings has received especial attention, and each successive writer undoubtedly stimulates new students to inquiry.

It is a fortunate circumstance for the American beginner in numismatic investigation, that the period to be traversed is one of little more than two hundred years. We are favored in this respect more highly than the archaeologists of other countries—the students of English, French, or German numismatics, for example, or the collectors of Roman and Grecian coins or medals. One is appalled at the consideration which is involved in a resolve to master the history of any of these coinages, extending over periods five and six times longer than our own, with a really inconceivable profusion of types and variations to be studied; so that no outlay can procure a complete collection of any one national series, and no amount of inquiry reveal all the mysteries of the ill-recorded coinage. Widely different from these, our own numismatic history lies, compact and accessible, within the range of original record; and there are comparatively few facts relating to it which cannot be vouched for by contemporary authority, though, strange to say, there are some points regarding the coinage immediately following the Revolution which will in all probability never be elucidated, while we are perfectly familiar with the Mint Regulations in force during the lifetime of Oliver Cromwell.


The first coinage which took place in the American colonies of Great Britain was ordained by the authorities of Massachusetts in 1652, when it was provided that shillings, sixpences, and threepences should be coined, "for forme flatt, and square on the sides, & stamped on the one side with NE, and on the other side XIId, VId, & IIId, according to the value of each peece."



This issue was shortly followed by the more elaborate Pine Tree money, and very few specimens of it are known to exist. Most of these are in English collections. Twenty dollars is a low price for the NE shilling or sixpence, and the threepence has entirely disappeared.



Beside Massachusetts, others of the Colonies were endowed with especial currencies during the 17th century, though by no means to the extent that was really demanded by the exigencies of trade; and among the rarest and most interesting of these early colonial coins may be mentioned the Carolina token, or Elephant piece, so named from the design—a large elephant—on its



obverse. The reverse had the legend, God: Preserve: Carolina and: the Lords: Proprieters: 1694. This piece exists in a few collections, and is worth, in moderate preservation, from twelve to fifteen dollars. Beside these there were, as is well known, the Maryland currency, the Massachusetts Elephant piece, the Rosa Americana coppers, and one or two other colonial pieces, all of which are now quite rare.

Fifteen years ago the knowledge of American numismatics was confined to a very few individuals in the United States, and was principally to be found among English coin-collectors. England, pre-eminently the land of moneyed leisure and of energetic study, has long been distinguished by the learning of her numismatists, and the wealth of their collections; so that it is not strange if the history of our coinage could once be studied to better advantage on the banks of the Thames than in our own libraries and cabinets; but the last decade has seen a vast improvement in this respect. The number of American coin-collectors has received greater and greater accessions annually since 1850, and already Numismatic Societies have been successfully organized in New York and Philadelphia, while a third is contemplated in Boston. The awakening interest has naturally created a class of writers who especially devote themselves to the agreeable and instructive investigation of our coins, medals, and tokens, and the nucleus of an American numismatographical collection is already formed, to which, we have no doubt, valuable works will now be frequently added.

The early history of American coinage is naturally to be sought in the minute detail of facts presented by Ruding, in his Annals of the British Coinage, which work, an amplification of the

preceding one by Martin Folkes, affords particulars, drawn from official sources, of the successive colonial issues, and also of the proposals which were made from time to time for the supply of the colonies with convenient coins. The engravings in Ruding (republished in three volumes 4to., London, 1840) comprise every coin struck in England for the American settlements down to the period of the separation. It is only within a few years that Ruding has been superseded as the only standard authority on American numismatics, although his brief notices of our coins cease at the Revolution, since no other writer made the important subject his own. True, a work published at London in 1761, entitled "The American Negotiator; or, the Various Currencies of the British Colonies in America," by J. Wright, Accomptant, purports to give a description of colonial coins, but it is of no value as a record, and was, indeed, intended only for reference in commercial matters. At the time of the adoption of the Federal Constitution, Washington, Franklin, Jefferson, Hamilton, Rob't Morris, and other of our Revolutionary heroes, took a deep interest in the affairs of the national coinage, and memoranda still exist, drawn up by several of the individuals we have named, upon the establishment of the currency which is now in vogue, and a resumé of these and other propositions was given in a small pamphlet published in 1789, entitled "Monies, Coins, Weights, and Measures proposed for the United States, &c." As yet, however, the true numismatic spirit was wanting, and the first actual attempts at systematic classification and record of the coins struck in or for the American colonies and United States, appear in the shape of papers to be found in the collections of State Historical Societies.

At a time when "coin-collectors" in the United States were popularly considered little better than monomaniacs, two or three gentlemen—Dr. J. B. Felt, of Salem, Mass., Mr. J. Francis Fisher, of Baltimore, and Dr. Jas. Mease, of Philadelphia—were deeply interested in the subject, and communicated the results of their investigations to societies of which they were members, or published them in a separate form. In the 3d vol. of the New York Historical Society's Collections (pp. 387—404), will be found a highly interesting paper by Dr. Mease, giving a description of 17 medals struck with reference to America; and this paper the Massachusetts Historical Society republished (Coll., vol. 4, 3d Series, 1834), together with additional particulars from the same hand concerning 33 medals presented to the officers of the war of 1812–14; and also of 4 other miscellaneous American medals.

In Vol. VI. 3d Series of the Mass. Collection, Mr. J. F. Fisher communicates a detailed description of 38 American medals, 14 of which bear the head or the name of Washington; and in Vol. VII. (1838) of the same series, a paper on Old American Coins gives some particulars regarding the Fugio, New Jersey, and Connecticut cents, the Rosa Americana series, &c., &c. These we believe to be the first distinct essays in American numismatography. In 1839, Dr. J. B. Felt's admirable work on the Massachusetts Currency was published, affording a full history of the N. E. and Pine Tree money, the Continental notes, and the coinage at Boston subsequent to the Declaration of Independence; and in 1840, Wm. W. Gouge published at New York his "Paper Money and Banking in the United States," containing some valuable information on the coinage and paper money. In the ensuing decade the interest in numismatics steadily increased, and the work of Eckfeldt and Dubois, of the Philadelphia mint, appeared in 1851, presenting a general tableau of the United States coinage, together with a glance at the contemporary coins of all other nations, the whole illustrated with very fine colored plates. A smaller work, on American Coins and Coinage, was published by the same parties at New York in 1852. It had previously appeared in successive numbers of the Bankers' Magazine. In 1850, Dr. O'Callaghan

presented illustrations, in his "Documentary History of New York" (Vol. 111.), of the copper coins struck for this State circa 1790, together with an engraving of the great Libertas Americana medal, and the Washington Cent of 1783; and in the Transactions of the American Antiquarian Society, Vol. III., Boston, 1857, the Diaries of John Hull, Mint-Master and Treasurer of Massachusetts Bay in 1652, are reprinted, together with a memoir of the diarist and engravings of the Pine Tree coins. Within the last few years, moreover, American numismatics have been the subject of frequent discussions in the periodical press. Not until 1858, however, did a work appear devoted exclusively to American coins. The "Historical Account of American Coinage," by John II. Hickox, was published at Albany, N. Y., in August last. This work contains plates of early American coins, and was gladly received by numismatic students. The mention of one more work will complete our catalogue. This is the "History of American Tokens," published in 1858, by Mr. Bushnell, of New York, containing plates and much very valuable descriptive matter. We understand that a very elaborate and comprehensive work on American Coinage is to appear shortly at Philadelphia, and that Mr. Bushnell has a similar treatise in preparation; but these cannot yet be considered as portions of our subject. A few catalogues have of late been issued by dealers, which are valuable as standards of price; and Mr. Mickley, of Philadelphia, recently published a list of American copper and silver coins, with degrees of rarity attached, which is a useful vade mecum to the collector. We understand that a more extensive catalogue is in preparation. A few years more will undoubtedly greatly enlarge our list, and fill up the deficiencies still existing in American numismatography.

## American Medals.

Aside from the very natural desire of collecting and possessing that which is, of itself, rare or unique, there is an inexhaustible source of pleasure in the information contained in these little souvenirs of the past. "A cabinet of Medals is a body of history," and Addison's graceful essay, entitled "Dialogues on Medals," affords us a pleasing example of the vast amount of learning and even poetry connected with their study. To them, indeed, more than anything else, are we indebted for our knowledge of the men, customs, actions, and history of the ancient world. The painter's brightest

colors may fade from the canvas, the sculptor's art may be destroyed by violence or marred by time, but

"The medal, faithful to its charge of fame,
Through climes and ages bears each form and name."

Medals, moreover, are sure exponents of a nation's progress in the politer arts and sciences of civilization, in which we trace the dawnings of genius as well as the development of principles. We would ask for no better text-book, from which to teach a class in History, than a well-selected cabinet of medals. Take, for example, the fine series illustrative of the Sovereigns of France. Beauty of design, and accuracy of portraits and costume, are here combined with the historical data of each reign in a concise and attractive form, which is well calculated to make an ineffacable impression upon the memory. One such medal, properly studied, is tenfold more instructive than the usual drill of a recitation.

In this country, the science of Medallurgy is comparatively in its infancy. The number of amateurs, however, is increasing, and we can boast of several fine collections, chiefly of American Medals. The recent establishment, also, in this city of the American Numismatic Society is a pleasing evidence of a growing taste in this direction. Nor are we, as a nation, so destitute of medals commemorative of events in our history, as might be imagined. An evidence of this is found in the list which we present below, which comprises only such as by their origin, design, or the event which they were designed to commemorate, are fairly entitled to be considered as National Medals of the United States.

We have classed them as follows:

1st. Medals of the War of the American Revolution.

Many of these were executed under the supervision of Franklin and the American Commissioners in France. The great men of the Empire took pleasure in designing them, and

the best skill of the French artists was employed upon them. They are not only beautiful works of art, but pleasing examples of the cordiality which animated the two countries during the progress of our struggle for national independence.

2d. Medals of the War of 1812.

This war was as prolific of medals as of heroes, and of both it may be said that they are very creditable to our nation.

3d. Medals of the Mexican War—of which there are but few, yet those are very fine specimens of the medallist's art.

4th. Miscellaneous. Such as Presidential medals and those in regard to whose origin or purpose we lack information.

1. ADAMS, JOHN.—Occasion. Acknowledgment of, as envoy of U.S. to the Dutch Government, during the Revolution. Device. Pallas shaking hands with an Indian Queen over an altar with incense; on front of altar a caduceus between 2 cornneopiæ; sun overhead; Pallas holds a lance bearing a low, broad-brimmed Dutch hat, which she is placing on the head of the Queen, whose foot presses down a prostrate lion. Legend. Libera, Soror. Exergue. Solemni, December Agn. XIX. April M.d.eelxxxii. Reverse. British unicorn falling forward, with his head against the Rock of Independence, his horn broken, etc. Legend. Tyrannis virtuti repulsa. Exergue. Sub Galliæ auspiciis.

(In cabinet of Joshua Francis Fisher, of Phila.)

- 2. Occasion. Capture of ANDRE. Device. A shield. Legend. Fidelity. Reverse. A wreath enclosing name, etc. Legend. Vincit Amor Patrice.
- 3. Medal in honor of LORD CHATHAM.—
  Diameter 1 3-5 inch. Obverse. Head of
  Lord Chatham. Legend. Gulielmus Pitt.
  Reverse. Inscription: The man—who having—served the—parent pleaded—with sueeess—for her—children.
- 4. DE FLEURY, LT. COL.—Occasion. Taking of Stony Point. Device. A helmeted soldier standing on the ruins of a fort; in right hand a sword raised; in left hand a staff of colors reversed, upon which he is stamping. Legend. Virtutis et andiciæ monum, et præmium D. De Fleury equiti gallo primo muros

resp. Americ. d. d. Reverse. 2 water batteries of 3 guns each; fort on a hill; 6 vessels before the fort. Legend. Aggeres paludes hostes victi. Exergue. Stony Pt. expugn. 15th July, 1779.

- 5. FRANKLIN, BENJ.—French Medal. Diameter 1 4-5 inch. Obverse. Bust of Franklin, with flowing locks; engraver's name, Dupre, F., on bust. Legend. Benj. Franklin natus Boston, XVII. Jan. MDCCV. Reverse. An angel standing, pointing with one hand to the lightning in the clouds, with the other to a broken seeptre and crown on the ground; in rear, a temple with a conductor. Legend. Eripuit each fulmen sceptrumque tyrannis. Exergue. Senlpsit et dicavit Aug. Dupre, Anno Mdeelxxxiv.
- 6. French Medal. Diameter 14-5 inch. Same as last, except that the *reverse* motto is surrounded with an oak wreath, and the date is Mdeelxxxy.
- 7. Obverse. Bust of Franklin. Legend. Lightning averted, tyranny repelled. Reverse. An American beaver gnawing down an oak, symbolical of British supremacy in America. 1776.

(Struck at expense of Joseph Sansom, of Phila.)

8. Obverse. Bust of Franklin. Legend. Benj Franklin, natus Boston, 17 Jan., 1706. Reverse. Eripuit ealo fulmen seeptrumque tyrannis.

(Struck at Paris, when Franklin was Minister to France, 1777. This inscription was written by Turgot, Controller General of Finances of France.)

- 9. Medal struck apparently in England. Diameter 1 4-5 inch. Obverse. Full face of Franklin, in cap and open shirt collar—not a likeness. Legend. B. Franklin of Philadelphia, LL.D. & F.R.S. Reverse. An oak tree struck by lightning. Legend. Non irrita fulmina curat. Exergue. 1777.
- 10. Obverse. Head of Franklin. Legend. Benj'n Franklin, minist. Plen. Des Etats Unis de L'Ameriq. Sept. Mdeclxxxii. Reverse. Temple of Independence; 3 of the 9 sisters engaged working at the columns, 4 chiseling stone, 2 conversing. Legend. De Leurs traveaux naitre Leur Gloire.

(Struck in Paris, probably by Fr. Gov't. In possession of Am. Phil. Soe'y of Phila.)

- 11. GATES, GEN. HORATIO.—Oceasion. Surrender of Burgoyne's Army. Device. Bust of Gen. Gates. Legend. Horatio Gates duci strenuo comitia Americana. Reverse. Burgoyne presenting his sword to Gates in presence of the two armies; Am. army on right with colors flying; British army on left laying down their colors. Legend. Salus Regionum Septentrional. Exergue. Hoste ad Saratogam in dedition. Accepto die 17th October, 1777.
- 12. GERMANTOWN, BATTLE OF.—Obverse. Artillery at a distance playing upon a large house; fields on each side; troops, etc.; engraver's name I. Milton, F. Reverse. Inscription. Germantown, Oct. 4, 1777, in laurel wreath.
- 13. GREENE, GEN. NATH'L.—Occasion. Gallant conduct at Eutaw Springs, S. C. Device. Profile head of Gen. Greene. Legend. Nathanieli Greene egregio duci comitia Americani. Reverse. Victory lighting on the earth, stepping on a broken shield, colors, etc. Legend. Salus regionum australiam. Exergue. Hostibus ad Eutaw debellatis, die 8th Sept., 1781.
- 14. HOWARD, JOHN EAGER. -- Occasion. Victory at the Cowpens, N. C. Device. A mounted officer, sword in hand, pursuing an officer on foot, bearing a stand of colors;

- over the former, Victory descends with wreath in right and palm branch in left hand. Legend. John Eager Howard, legionis peditum prefecto comitia Americana. Reverse. Legend (within a laurel wreath). Quod in nutantem hostium aciem subito irruens, præclarum bellieæ virtutis specimen dedit in pugna, ad Cowpens, 17th January, 1781.
- 15. JONES, COM. JOHN PAUL. Occasion. Capture of the English Frigate Serapis, Capt. Pearson, by the Bon Homme Richard, Capt. John Paul Jones. Device. Head of John Paul Jones. Legend. Johanni Paulo Jones elassis præfecto comitia Americana. Reverse. Two frigates engaged yard-arm and yard-arm; English ship severely battered; another ship lying across bows of English ship. Legend. Hostium navibus eaptis aut frigatis. Exergue. Adoram Seotiæ, 23d September, 1778.
- 16. LEE, MAJ. HENRY.—Occasion. Attack on Paulus Hook. Dévice. Bust of Col. Lee. Legend. Henrieo Lee, equit, præfecto. Exergue. Comitia Americana. Reverse. Non obstantib fluminibus, vallis astutia et virtute belliea, parva manu hostes vicit victosq. Armis humanitate devinxit. In men. pugn. ad Paulus Hook, 19th August, 1779. (In laurel wreath.)
- 17. MORGAN, GEN'L DAN'L.—Occasion. Victory at Cowpens, N. C. Device. An Indian queen, with quiver at her back, crowning an American officer with laurel wreath; cannon lying on the ground; military emblems in background. Legend. Danieli Morgan, duei exercitus comitia Americana. Reverse. A mounted officer, at the head of his troops, charging a flying enemy; a battle in background; in front a fight between a foot soldier and a dragoon unhorsed. Legend. Victoria libertatis vindex. Exergue. Fugatis, captis aut cæsis ad Cowpens hostibus, 17th January, 1781.
- 18. STEWART, CAPT. JOHN. Occasion. Storming of Stony Point. Device. America as an Indian queen, presenting a palm

- branch to Capt. Stewart; emblems much the same as other. Legend. Johanni Stewart cohortis prefecto comitia Americus. Reverse. A fortress on an eminence; officer cheering his men, who charge with bayonets upon a flying enemy, etc. Exergue. Stony Point oppugnatum. 15th July, 1779.
- 19. WASHINGTON, GEO.—Oceasion. Evacuation of Boston by the British troops. Device. Profile head of Washington. Legend. Georgio Washington, supremo duci exercitum adsertori libertatis comitia Americana. Reverse. Troops advancing towards a distant town; troops marching to the river; ships in view; Washington in front, and mounted, with his staff, whose attention he is directing to the embarking army. Legend. Hostibus primo Fugatis. Evergue. Bostonum recuperatum 17 Martii, 1776. Gold. Diameter 2 7-10 inches. Struck in Paris from a die by Duvivier.
- 20. Apparently of French make, early in Revolution. Obverse. Head in Roman fashion—hair cropped—no resemblance to Washington. Legend. George Washington, General of the Continental Army in America. Reverse. Cannons, mortars, drums, etc.; rising sun in rear. Legend. Washin: Reunit, par nn rare assemblage les talens du guerrier, Les vertus du Sage. Diameter 1½ inch.
- 21. Apparently struck in England about 1794.

  Obverse. Head and bust of Washington in regimentals; hair in style of Frederick the Great—poor portrait. Legend. George Washington, born in Virginia; below, February 11, 1732; engraver's name, Brooks, se. Reverse. In parallel lines: General of American Armics, 1775. Resigned, 1783. President of the United States, 1789. Diameter 1 8-10 inch.
- 22. Diameter 1 3-10 inch. Obverse. Head and bust in citizen's dress; on bust engraver's name, Lyon. Legend. George Washington; below, 1796. Reverse. In center a seroll, on which the words Repub. Amerie; behind the scroll, eannon, caduceus, and fasces erossed. Legend, arranged around it in cir-

- cles. Gen'l of the American Armies, 1775. Resigned the comm'd 1783. Elec'd President of the United States, 1789. Resigned the Presidency, 1796.
- 23. Medal 1½ inch. Obverse. Bust in citizen's dress; long, straight face—bad likeness. Legend. George Washington. Reverse. Inscription in parallel lines: General of the American Armies, 1775. Resigned command, 1783. Elected President of the United States, 1789. Re-elected, 1793. Resigned, 1797.
- 24. Struck at expense of Joseph Sansom, Esq., of Phila., at U. S. Mint. Diameter 2 1-20 inches. Obverse. Bust in citizen's dress—likeness poor; on bust engraver's name, Halladay, se. Legend. George Washington, President of the United States. Reverse. An altar partly draped (on one side shield with national stripes), on which lie sword and fasces, encircled by a laurel wreath. Legend. Commission resigned. Presidency relinquished. Exergue. 1797.
- 25. Obverse. Bust of Washington—good. Legend. George Washington, President of the United States. Reverse. Signs of civil and military authority surmounted with laurels, deposited on a table of the Union. Legend. Commiss. resigned. Presidency relinq. 1797.

(Struck at expense of Joseph Sansom, of Phila.)

- 26. Death of Washington.—Diameter about 3 inches. Obverse. Head of Washington, erowned with a wreath. Legend. George Washington. Reverse. Tomb and Urn, over which a child is weeping, and at its side an armed female (Liberty?), with U. S. shield, also weeping; on tomb, Victor sine clade; behind, arms, etc. Legend. 
