J. K. BIGELOW FOR SUPERVISOR,— HIS PLATFORM

Did Not Seek the Nomination. Clearly Sets Forth His Views and Tells the People on What Principles He Will be Elected.

To the Voters of the First Supervisorial District:

A plain statement of facts leading up to the nomination of myself as Supervisor of this District:

For the past six months, men of both parties in this District have been after me to stand for the office of Supervisor. To them, one and all, my answer has been the same, that it would be impossible for me to come out for or accept the nomination, both on the ground that if I were elected, it would work an injury to my business on account of the time any honest official must give to the roads and other county business, and second that I was not personally anxious for public office.

At a caucus of Republicans of my precinct, I wanted Mr. Lamotte and Mr. Lewis of El Verano to be the nominees for delegates to the County Convention, but the former refused on the ground that he was a poor talker and that I would be better able to accomplish something for this district. As the entire caucus thought the same, I accepted the nomination and Mr. Lewis and myself were elected delegates to the County Convention.

When we arrived in Santa Rosa, on the day of the convention, I looked around to see who was out for the nomination and learned that Mr. Weise of Glen Ellen and Mr. Knight of Shellville were spoken of but there were no candidates from Penn Grove, Cotati or Lakeville.

When I was asked by delegates if I wanted the nomination for Supervisor, my answer to one and all was, "I do not" and I gave my reasons as stated above. I saw Mr. Knight, from Shellville and he said

that as he was foot loose at present, he would feel honored to receive the nomination. When I talked to Mr. Weise, he said that he would like to run, but that at present, for personal reasons, he would be unable to accept the nomination for Supervisor.

On this showing I came out for Mr. Knight for the nomination and worked to that end. I nominated Mr. Knight and voted for him. Outside of one other vote he received and one vote cast for Mr. Lewis of El Verano, I received the entire vote of this District for the office. And when I saw that the people of this District, thought that my nomination and subsequent election would accomplish good results for them, and as I am good a Republican, I accepted the honor bestowed upon me.

I claim that no man is greater than the people and that a man's interests must be forgotten if he expects to do the full amount of good, in his official position, for the people of his District in particular, and the people of the county in general.

I promise that if the people want me to serve them as Supervisor from this District, that I will use every honest effort to serve them and give them as good a government as lays in my power. And now, it is up to you, people, up to every honest man, woman and child in this District to do what you can.

If you think that by my going to Santa Rosa, as Supervisor from this District, will benefit you, it is your fight to send me there. It is not any personal fight of mine. The platform on which I stand, is I think, the expression of every good citizen and honest man in this District.

1. A square deal to all.
2. I am opposed to the issuance of any more liquor licenses on the county roads in Sonoma Valley.
3. Honesty in public office.
4. No "one man job" on the County roads; every man irrespective of party should be allowed, if he feels so inclined, to work on the County roads.

Now, Mr. Voter, it is up to you, it is your fight, not mine. If you approve of the above and feel that by my election that I can be of service to you and your District, it is for you to send me to Santa Rosa to carry out your wishes, on November 3rd.

Also remember that if you have not registered since January 1st, 1908, that you must register on or before September 23rd, or you will not be allowed to vote.

I am not a prohibitionist, and no man recognizes more clearly than I do, that if the saloons of this valley were closed the valley would be dead. I recognize the right of any and every man to take a drink when he feels so inclined, but I am under the impression that he will not go thirsty in this valley for a lack of good saloons.

I am satisfied with conditions as they now are, but am absolutely opposed to the issuance of any more licenses for road houses.

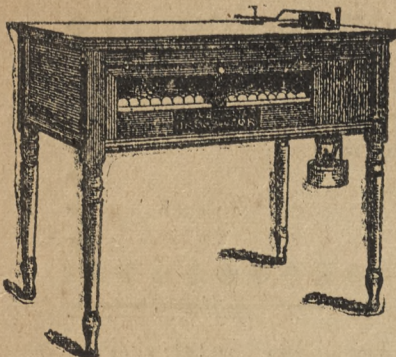

The people of this supervisory district have an opportunity during this campaign of voting for a principal. The contest between Mr. Hart (incumbent), the Democratic nominee and Mr. Bigelow, the Republican candidate is not a personal one in any sense of the word.

Mr. Bigelow is for fixing a limit now, not after a while, to the granting of saloon licenses outside of incorporated cities. He contends that there are enough thirst emporiums in this district now and that no more licenses should be granted and if elected will do all in his power to enforce that idea.

A multitude of saloons bring on prohibition is an old saying that has proven true many times.

Mr. Bigelow is not a prohibitionist, he's a Republican and believes that such a radical change as prohibition would work irreparable injury to the valley. Injury or no injury, he's opposed to the prohibition principal anyhow and it is to avoid such a condition coming about that he is endeavoring to do by opposing the issuance of any more liquor licenses.

Now, it is up to the people of the First Supervisory Dist. Do they want more saloons and road houses or are they satisfied with what they have already. Mr. Bigelow says, "I'll stand for no more."

The Expositor firmly believes that the best policy to pursue for this valley in particular and the county in general is for the Board of Supervisors to refuse to grant any more new liquor licenses, for the reasons stated above and will use every effort to see that that policy is carried out by securing the election of men pledged to that policy.

N. S. G. W. Meeting

At the regular meeting of Sonoma Parlor, N. S. G. W. last Monday evening, there was a large attendance of members and much enthusiasm prevailed.

A committee consisting of F. T. Duhring, L. H. Green and W. O. Hocker was appointed to meet and welcome those sturdy pioneers of Bear Flag days, Jas. McChristian of Sebastopol and Henry Beeson of Booneville, Mendocino Co. who arrived on the Southern Pacific Tuesday afternoon. The former was the guest of Sebastopol Parlor and the latter is the only surviving member of the famous Bear Flag Party.

Grand Celebration

In Honor of the Dedication of the New City in Sonoma, Wednesday, Sept. 9, 1908.

The biggest event that has ever happened in the historic town of Sonoma in later years took place here last Wednesday, Sept. 9, 1908. Admission Day.

The occasion was a celebration and barbecue given in honor of the new \$25,000 City Hall, one of the finest for its size on the Pacific Coast. Sonoma is one of the oldest towns in California and while not the largest has been making very rapid and substantial growth in the last few years and this celebration marked a new epoch in the history of the old town.

The Program of the Day was as follows:— Grand Street Parade at 11 o'clock. The pageant halted at the original Bear Flag Pole in the northwest corner of the plaza to witness the raising of the Bear Flag by Henry Beeson of Booneville Mendocino Co., only surviving member of the famous Bear Flag Party, a band of patriotic Americans who on June 14, 1846, raised the famous Bear Flag there and proclaimed the California Republic.

As the venerable pioneer again took his stand at the foot of the Bear Flag Pole, where over sixty-two years ago he was an actor in that great event, his frame shook with emotion and doubtless the stirring scenes on that memorable June 14, 1846 came back to the old gentleman's mind with vivid recollections. As the facsimile of the Old Bear Flag was again hoisted and flung to the breeze thousands of patriotic voices filled the air with three rousing cheers.

Features of Grand Parade

Grand Marshal Landsborough and his aides formed the parade at the Northwestern depot and immediately after the arrival of the train the advance was made, headed by the Grand Marshal and his aides and the Petaluma Brass Band. The line of march was up First Street East to Spain St. thence around the plaza and down Broadway where the parade counter-marched.

The following fraternal orders made a fine showing and received much favorable comment: Santa Rosa Parlor, N. S. G. W. with its drum corps, the Glen Ellen W. O. W. carrying a large stump on which were placed the emblematic tools of the order, Glen Ellen Parlor, N. S. G. W. in uniform and Sonoma Parlor No. 111.

Dunbar School had the finest and most complete representation of an early days mining camp we have ever seen and were cheered all along the line.

The Sonoma Valley Womans' Club float showing the contrast between the Days of '49 and the present time was decidedly great. The old pioneer wagon and mule team as sharp contrast with Robert Hill's beautifully decorated auto carrying the officers of the club accompanied by four girls carrying streamers, was skillfully carried out. It came in for a full share of praise.

The beautiful High School float representing Valley of the Moon (Sonoma) and its products was greatly admired and showed excellent taste had been used in the get up. Riding upon the float were Miss Eva Dresel representing Sonoma, Miss Emily Poppe, grapes and fruit and Miss Bernice Hocker, grain.

The ladies appointed to prepare suitable a float for the parade committee worked indefatigably and the results of their labors was a magnificent creation representing California being admitted into the Union. Miss Mary Valente, representing California looked lovely in her golden robes and J. E. Van Hoosear, tall and stately, made an ideal Uncle Sam.

Of course the most attractive feature befitting the occasion was that rare old relic, General Vallejo's carriage of state. It was beautifully decorated and carried the framed picture of that grand old man and most distinguished Native Son, General Vallejo. The carriage was drawn by four white horses each led by a Native Son in uniform. Two grandsons of the General, Carlos and Rapul Empanan and Theo. Kiser and Roy A. Pauli acted as groomers.

The Sonoma Grammar School made a good showing and the pupils made a fine appearance riding on decorated bicycles.

The bicycle float representing the

U. S. Cruiser California conceived and carried out by Clyde Johannsen and Leland Volquardson was a clever feature of the bicycle section and won admiration of all.

Dr. Van Amringe dressed as an early California Indian accompanied by his little son riding in a goat cart was decidedly a unique and well carried out feature.

The El Verano Villa float representing vacation was a faultless prepared and greatly admired.

Agua Caliente Springs had a skillfully gotten up float representing Caliente Water, a famous Sonoma Valley product and was awarded first prize in that class.

The buses and other vehicles in the parade looked very pretty indeed and showed that great pains and expense were used in their preparation.

The Eldridge Home band riding in a bus played fine music throughout the line of march and their efforts were greatly appreciated and applauded.

H. Kerner's pretty little pony and cart appropriately garlanded was a very pleasing feature.

Miss Gladys Simmons looked very sweet in her pretty riding habit and took first prize for the equestriennes.

Several decorated autos looked swell, with their gay trimmings, L. Simmons winning first prize and L. L. Lewis second.

The carriage containing those sturdy old pioneers Henry Beeson, Richard Platt, Jas. McChristian and Edward Gillan was an honored feature of the parade.

We regret that lack of space forbids the more detailed account of the fine features of the great parade but we must record the fact that each and every feature was very pretty indeed and the parade committee wishes to thank each and every one who kindly helped out with their labor and presence and assisted in making the parade a grand and beautiful one.

Dedictory Exercises

The dedicatory exercises were held on the west side of the new City Hall where a temporary covered platform had been built. Mayor Breitenbach acted as chairman of the day. The exercises were opened by an invocation by Rev. W. C. Day. F. T. Duhring made a masterly address referring briefly to the early history of Sonoma, its growth and present prosperity and confidently prophesied a greater and better Sonoma. His remarks were listened to with wrapt attention. He eulogized the orator of day whom he introduced to the assembled thousands.

Hon. James D. Phelan was at his best and delivered an eloquent address that will go down in history as a masterpiece. His oration was rich in history and patriotism and he carried his vast audience with him throughout his entire address and was accorded a hearty ovation at its close. The next on the program was a California song by Mrs. Lulu V. Empanan, a daughter of the late Gen. Vallejo. Always a sweet singer with a rare rich voice never appeared better than on this occasion. She was enthusiastically cheered on her able efforts.

The Barbecue

After the literary exercises a barbecue feast was enjoyed during the afternoon. Chairman M. E. Cummings of the Barbecue Committee and his assistants did their work well and prepared one of the finest dinners of the kind ever served here. It was estimated over one thousand people enjoyed the spread consisting of barbecued beef, beans, Spanish stew, bread, butter, etc. served on tables erected beneath the trees in the plaza.

The Races

The Race Meet given under the auspices of the Sonoma Driving Club at the track on First St. West was the biggest and most successful one ever held here.

There were six good races every one of which proved exciting and intensely interesting to the large crowd in attendance. Very little time was lost between races and everything was well conducted. The Sonoma track established a new record for itself and the club is naturally very proud of the good work accomplished. In the Free-or-All race, Kitty D., driven by Jos. F. Ryan went a mile twice around the half mile track in 2:11 1/4 which is the fastest time yet made on this track. In the 2:30 class, Hello Girl won over Dan Fraser in

2-out of 3 heats, time 2:27; purse \$50. In the Saddle Horse race, Carmalita, Dan McGovern's horse, won the half mile dash and a purse of \$10, time 58 seconds. The best race of the day was the Free-For-All won by Kitty D. 2:11 1/4. The purse was \$75. Maud Wilkes driven by its owner, Jas. Cowan, won the road race and a purse of \$10 in 2:52. In the thoroughbred running race, A. Anderson's Coney Island won in 5 1/2 seconds and a purse of \$25. Mike C. won the race in the 2:40 class, best 2 in 3 heats in 2:27 1/2. Mike C. was driven by Jos. F. Ryan. M. E. Cummings is the owner of the speedy colt, purse \$40.

The Grand Ball

Like all the rest of the day's doings the grand ball in the evening in Union Hall was an unqualified success. The Paul Johnson orchestra distinguished itself by its perfect music. A large crowd enjoyed the dancing and the banquet during the intermission.

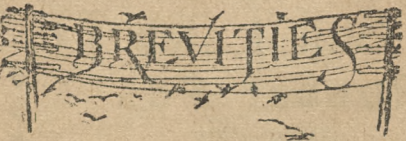
