Holls, of the International Court of Arbitration, left for Warsaw last night after having been received in special audience by Emperor Nicholas at Perterhof palace at noon. The conference was extended and most cordial. It is understood that the Emperor thanked Mr. Holls for his history of the peace conference dedicated to His Majesty, It is also understood that the Emperor spoke warmly of the excellent relations, historical, traditional and actual between the United States and Russia, and expressed a hope that both powers, with their great resources, would continue to stand for peace and the strengthening of the Hague tribunal and the bloodiess adjustment of international differences.

His Majesty expressed a conviction that the conference marked an important step in advance, but that the tribunal annet seek support first and foremost in the intelligent opinion of the world.

Mr. Holls is said to have been greatly impressed by the Emperor's grasp of the subject, and by his-reserve mental force. During his ten days' stay he was warmly received by Count Lampsterff, M. Dewitt and M. Pobledonostef, procurator of the Holy Synod, and by other eminent men. One of the most influential statesmen he met while here told him Russia would not only not wage aggressive war, but would do all that was possible to prevent war between other powers.

The burning was on the scene of the negro's crime, within 160 yards of the principal thoroughfare of this city, at 10-o'clock yesterday morning Mrs. Taggart went fishing alone in a small rowboat, in Palacog creek. This is in-full view of the public thorough fare. A few minutes before noon, deciding to return home, she efowed her boat to the bridge and made it fast. A negro man was fishing from the bridge at the time. Mrs. Taggart started home and had proceeded only a few steps into the swamp toward the open prairic thence to the street, when she was approached by Rochelle, who had been hiding in the swamp. In spite of the sheriff and a strong guard of extra deputies, who made every effort to Protect him from mob violence, they surrounded the prisoner and took up the march to the scene of the crime. He was half dragged, half carried, to the bridge, enveloped by a great throng of people of all ages, who were resolute and determined, but quiet and orderly. Scream after scream broke, from the wret h's quivering lips, followed by groans and prayers for mercy. At the bridge the mob turned toward the prairie, and then into the swamp, and to the scene of the negro's crime. By common consent burning was to be the penalty. The stake was the only sugestion as to the proper explation of the crime, and without organized effort, and yet by apparently unanimous understanding, a barrel was in readiness; and was placed by the stake on the very spot where Mrs. Taggart was murdered. The negro was then chained to the stake. He pleaded for mercy, but in the crowd around him silence was the only response. 



Though it is a scientific axiom that it is impossible actually to destroy a single particle of a material substance, a number of researches have been made to test whether this doctrine of the permanence of matter is strictly true. Substances can, of course, be made lighter, but no less of mass is involved in the operation. These are simple instances of the indestructibility of matter, and with thousands of others they form the foundation upon which modern chemistry is built. Heydweller 'has distinctly established a diminution of weight about one part in fifty millions during a number of chemical changes. A loss of mass equal to seven-hundredthe of a grain was obtained by hixing blue vitriol with water, but no changes of mass whatever could be found by varying the magnetic electrical, optical, or similar state of a substance. 
