A BRAVE BOY

Thirteen-Year-Old Lad Saved His Mother and Brothers From Flames,

Portland, July 2.—Bravery and pres-nce of mind on the part of 13-year-old Michael Cohn saved his mother and four morning in a fire which destroyed the dwelling of the family at Hall and Fifth streets. Young Cohn went into the room which was filled with smoke and flames and dragged out his unconscious mother

Mrs. Cohn, who is subject to fainting agells, fell while carrying a lighted lamp. The house immediately took fire and was destroyed. Young Cohn, who rushed to the assistance of his mother and little brothers, succeeded in rescuing them all.

SCOURING COUNTRY

TROOPS ORDERED OUT TO AID THE POSSE

Surrounded in House in Seattle, But He Fought His Way Through the Guards.

Seaffle, July 4.-Escaped convict Harry Tracy has just passed a red letter day in his erratic career. He killed Policeman E. E. Breeze and fatally wounded Neil Rawley in the city limits. after having murdered Deputy Sheriff and probably fatally wounded Deputy Sheriff John Williams, of King's county,

In his hopeless flight for safety, without consideration for human life, Tracy has covered probably 60 miles.

He was first encountered by a Scattle posse near Bothell at 4.30 o'clock in the afternoon. Evidently the convict raught sight of his pursuers before they saw him. He had taken a commanding position in a clump of first and covered for him. He had taken a commanding posi-tion in a clump of firs and opened fire before he was discovered. He fired five shots in all. Raymond was instantly killed by one of the rifle balls. Another struck the raised rifle held by Williams, splitting it in four parts, and entered the deputy's breast. He will live, it is believed.

THE LOST CONDOR.

Still No Investigation Has Been Ordered Into Cause of Ship's Disappearance.

Into Cause of Ship's Disappearance.

The Naval and Military Record just to hand again raises the question why an official investigation has not been held into the loss of the Condor. It says: "Is it not time that a member of parliament with an inquisitive turn of mind asked for the production of the report on the loss of the Condor? As soon as hope was abandoned the Admiralty promised that an inquiry should be held with the view of ascertaining whether the ship was, by her build, rig and equipment, in all respects fitted for the service on which she was employed. Itself there been but one survivor he would have been tried by court-martial, and the inquiry would have been held with spen doors, but although the formality of an open trial cannot, be gone through for want of a survivor, the Admiralty might at least have given the relatives of the deceased the moughful comfort of ordering an investigation. This consideration, however, was refused them, and at the present moment we have no definite knowledge as to whether the inquiry has been held or when it is likely to be held.

"Supposing a sourt of inquiry were held with directions to come to a fluding, the verdict could hardly be more severe than in the Cobra court-martial, where the court verdict could hardly be more severe than in the Cobra court-martial, where the court practically censured the Admiralty for buying the vessel. Nor do we see how secrecy can be justified on the score that there is no survivor to be tried by court-martial. The friends of the deceased officers and men have the first right to know how the breadwinners came to their death, and the nation has a right to know how it was that a ship-of-war and her gallant crew suddenly passed out of existence. Even should the court of inquiry, decide, in the picturesque language of the service, to hang some body, the publication of this painless publishment would be better than keeping the public in needless ignorance. It must be remembered that the Condor was lost at a peculiar time, when the disaster made no appeal to public charity, and the bereaved have now to depend on the pitiful doles of the Admiralty. Is the report of the court of inquiry such as to produce an outery for greater and special generosity on the part of the state? If so, no one would grudge the money.



MINING IN THE **BOUNDARY COUNTRY**

W. YOLEN WILLIAMS SPEAKS OF OUTLOOK

Is Impressed With the Developments at Mount Sicker-No Cause for Pessimism.

"There is no cause for down-hearted-ness in regard to the mining outlook in British Columbia. The problem of the prolitable mining of low grade ore bodies is being gradually solved, and the even-tual success of our principal industry is assured"—so said W. Yolen Williams in assured"—so said W. Joien Williams in the course of a conversation with a Times reporter last night. Mr. Williams is the mining superintendent of the Granby Mining, Smelting & Power, Company, the big corporation of the Boundary district. He is spending a few days on the coast in company with Orrin B. Smith, mining engineer of the same corporation, and has found time to take in the Mt, Sicker camp during his stay on the Island.

Speaking of Mt. Sicker, Mr. Williams said he was very much impressed with what he saw at the camp. "Mining." he said, "is evidently being carried on there on a large scale and on scientific lines, and judging from the considerable amount of ore which I saw on the Lenora dump the camp will be a big thing. The proximity of the smelter at Crotton and the facilities for shipping provided by Mr. Croft's unique tram line afford the most advatageous conditions for mining at Sicker. There seems to be large ore reserves there, and the quality of rock is good. I consider that Mr. Croft deserves great praise for his enterprise and ability in developing the camp. Speaking of Mt. Sicker, Mr. Williams

camp.

Asked about the condition of mining in the Boundary country Mr. Williams said that, speaking generally, good progress was being made in the mines up there. "Our smelter is now treating 1,500 tons of ore per day," he said, "and with the additional furnaces which will be put in at an early date, we shall be able to treat 2,000 tons daily. This ore is taken in about equal quantities from the Knob Hill and Old Ironsides properties. The company is now employing over 600 men on the mines and smelter. Just at present we are having a little officiently in regard to the supply of coke for the smelter, owing to the accident and the strike at Fernie, but we do not mine for any considerable time. Several other mines—not the property of the company—ship occasionally to the smelter, but in most of them development work is the chief object at present. Among the properties which are showing up well about Phoenix is the Snowshoe, on which a considerable amount of work

phasized the fact that in comparison with other mining countries the amount of British capital invested here is not considerable, and expressed the opinion that as wider knowledge of the mineral resources of the province reach British investors there will be pleuty of money available for sound mining propositions.

Mr. Williams, with Mr. Smith, left the city by last evening's boat for Vancouver, where he will stay for a day or two prior to his return to the Boundary.

As mining is now conducted in the north this means a serious loss to the miners. They find now that they can operate their claims much more advantageously during the summer months than during any other season. The labor is then more pleutiful and daylight lasts longer, it being possible to work a mine 24 hours in every day. This saves the use of electricity required during the winter months, and means to the miner wonths.
