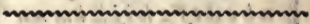

He was playing the Flute.




She went to the Tailor's
