So far as France is concerned, she does not contemplate any step, beyond that already taken, of sonly step b-yond that already taken, of sending a warship to protect the lives and property of Frenchmen on the Isthmus. The government has not received any news from its representatives in Central America concerning the troubles there until a day or two ago. As they came by mail they relate to events several weeks old and fail to give a clear idea of what is taking place. But it is certain that there was nothing calculated to cause alarm for the safety of French interests.

For Kobe and Yokohama the cargo includes 450 bales of cotton, valued at \$26,418, besides miscellaneous merchandise and 2400 existent flances.
