# REPARATIONS OFFER MADE BY GERMANY

## Reply By Meighen To Shaughnessy's Proposals Awaited

Chairman of C. P. R. Suggests Pooling of Canadian Railway Operations, With Dividends to C. P. R. Shareholders Guaranteed By Government.

Ottawa, April 25 .- A statement from Premier Meighen is awaited following the sending to him and the making public by Lord Shaughnessy, chairman of the board of the Canadian Pacific Railway, of new proposals for a readjustment of the railway situa-tion in Canada involving the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Canadian National Railways. As yet the Prime Minister has not outlined the attitude of the Government on the matter.

Lord Shaughnessy's proposals, stated in a lengthy memorandum, were sent to Premier Meighen for his consideration, and also were made public by Lord Shaughnessy, who gave copies to the press. In his letter to Mr. Meighen Lord Shaughnessy said: "Dear Mr. Meighen:

Teutons Propose to Spread Payments Over Forty-Two Years or Less; Goods and Participation In Industries As Guarantees; Britain Supports French Attitude; German Government Has Not Officially Publishe Its Note; Proposal Sen By Way of Washington.

Berlin, April 25.—Payment by Germany of 200,000,000,000 gold marks for reparations is, roughly, the proposal submitted by the German Government for transmission to the Allied Governments, according to sources close to the Government. The payments would be spread over a period of from thirty to forty-two years, or less, according to Germany's economic recovery.

Economic pledges in the way of goods and participation German industries are offered as guarantees, it is stated.

The offer, it is indicated, inclines more toward the terms formulated by the Allies at the Paris conference last Winter than to the offer made by Germany at the London conference, which the Allies summarily rejected.

The Allies, under the decision reached at Paris in January, demanded that Germany pay 226,000,000,000 gold marks, or approximately \$56,500,000,000, the payments Discusses Plans ALLIED COUNCIL to be spread over a period of 42 years. The German memorandum was understood to be a lengthy one, and if such was the case it probably was not put on the cables until very late last night, as considerable time would have been required for coding it.

The German Government's note to President Harding was handed to E. L. Dresel, United States Commissioner in Berlin, last night. There was an impression here that the German proposals might not be formally communicated to Allied capitals until after at least an outline had been informally sent to members of the Supreme Council and some intimation as to the acceptability of the proposals had been given.

## **MORE WHEAT IN NEW ZEALAND**

Present Crop Greater Than

Washington, April 25 .- (Canadian Press)—A report received from the United States trade representative at ekland, New Zealand, says:

Auckland, New Zealand, says:

"This season has been a fairly favorable one for agricultural interests in New Zealand, notwithstanding the yield per acre of wheat and oats fell somewhat below the yield last year. However, the grain is especiality good and the total output somewhat above the gutput last year so far as wheat is concerned. The latest estimate of the wheat yield of the whole Dominion is 28.52 bushels per acre, compared with an actual yield last year of 22.66 bushels per acre, compared with an actual yield last year of 22.66 bushels per acre, the acreage sown was materially above that sown the previous year, with the result that the approximate yield will be 5,975,000 bushels, as compared with only 4,539,324 bushels for the 1919-1920 season.

"The wheat growers of New Zealand have asked the New Zealand Government to continue the guarantee that the price-of wheat for the next season shall be the same as that paid during the present season, namely, \$1.76 per bushel for Tuscan, \$1.82 for Hunters and \$1.85 for Pearl wheat. If the guarantee is not forthcoming, the wheat growers say it is not likely the same acreage will be sown this year as last year, which means that the New Zealanders must go into the open market for more wheat than they will be compelled to buy this year—about 2,060,000 bushels, according to the best advice obtainable at present.

"The New Zealand Government still proposes to control the wheat distribution in the future, and regulations have been promulgated that make it unlawful for any person in the Dominion to purchase, offer, or agree to purchase, whether as principal or as agent, save under permit issued by the Wheat Controller, any wheat of the harvest of 1920-1921 in New Zealand. In granting a permit the Wheat Controller may impose such terms and conditions as to the purchase and as to the disposition and use of the wheat so purchased. Price.





We claim no originality for our ideas: we recognize the great work that is being done by the Lord Robert's Memorial Workshops in London, and the work of Major Buckley at Montreal, we are but trying to adapt the essential principles of their work to our local needs.

It may be that you are already in possession of all essential facts that deal with this great national problems.

possession of all essential facts that deal with this great national prob-lem and may regard this expression of our views as uncalled for, we, however, feel that it is our duty to bring to your notice the very decided opinions we have formed on this matter in so far as it concerns the disabled as a service man.

We will-enumerate these as concisely as we can.

1. That even after all that has been done by the Government of Canada through its various departments for the welfare of returned men there remains in this country "a residue of disabled men who are unemployable to ordinary indusers," a vesture for whom no provision exists, namely, those who possess some potential capacity but can only exercise it if some special arrangements are made to enable them to do so."

2. That there will be many men in the years to come who have suffered in this war and who from various causes inseparable from the ordinary conditions of their daily life

3. That to "care" for such as these
is the reasonable and logical continuation of the work of the Red
Cross Society in the war.

4. That the best form of "cure" is
to provide regular paid work under
conditions suitable to the man's disability.

5. That by so doing there will be saved to our country the work of many crippled men who would otherwise lead useless unprofitable and sad lives.

8. That a far greater measure of happiness and contentment with their lot will be given to these men when they know that, though perhaps permanently disabled, they can in greater or less degree lead independent, useful and productive lives.

7. That in many cases of severe disablement, after discharge from hespital, the freedom from anxiety combined with the stimulus of regular healthy work has a direct curative effect on the man, physically and mentally.

8. That without this essential stimulus a cure is in most cases improbable and the man drifts down hill.

9. That the principles embodied in the Victoria Red Cross Workshop scheme will relieve the crippled employee of anxiety as to his future and from financial worry and by so doing will enormously help in his general well-being and possible recovery.





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

What might have proved a fatality was averted by the pluck of two boys. Ray Fledding and W. The boys are to be recommended for the medal of the Royal Humane Society for saving life at some personal risk.

The two boys, Churchill and Fleiding, saw the plight of the second man, and pluckily jumped to his rescue from the Gorge bridge. They assisted the man ashore, he then being in a very exhausted condition. The police ambulance responded to a call, and took Fry to St. Joseph's Hospital, where he was reported to be doing well today.

#### STAMPS WORTH £100,000.


