An original study of the famous work of the artist in the Louvre. Three sturdy peasant girls, dressed in coarse garments of various colors, among which blue predominates, are gathering scattered straws from a broad, open, freshly-harvested wheat field. The one on the right kneels upon the stubble binding her gleanings into a small sheaf, and a short distance away her two companions stoop over to pick up the straws. The group is in full light from the sun, which is apparently near the zenith, and the shadows are filled with luminous reflections. Beyond the group the view extends across a wide open cultivated country to a simple horizon line broken here and there by low hills and clumps of trees under a sky completely covered by a stratum of thin sunlit vapor.

The nearer one carries a small but richly embroidered standard and from his costume appears to be an official of rank. Beyond the horsemen, who are in sunlight, is a narrow river with a steep rocky bluff beyond. The sky is nearly obscured by masses of gray vapor.

Height, 22 inches; length, $331 / 2$ inches
In the foreground two Arab sheiks, both mounted on richly caparisoned horses and accompanied by a standard bearer, stand on a slight elevation in a broken rocky plain, gazing intently toward the distance, where drifting smoke in the horizon indicates that a native village is on fire. To the left of the group of horsemen, in the middle distance, is a small party of mounted Arabs, and on the right is seen the single figure of a horseman urging his steed across the rough ground, as if hurrying to report to his chief the progress of the fight in the distance. A range of arid rocky hills forms the horizon on the left, diminishing in rapid perspective until the lines are lost in the dust and drifting smoke in the horizon. The sky is partly covered by thin clouds and the landscape is in a strong sunlight effect.

Beside the trees is a rich meadow with cattle, and beyond a moderate-sized partly wooded hill which, with a red-roofed whitewashed cottage at its base, is glowing with the warm light of the setting sun.

On the other bank of the river the dark forms of evergreens rise above a mass of bushes in autumn foliage, and farther away a great mountain range, partly covered by drifting vapor, rises against the cloudy sky. The surface of the river is broken by a multitude of ripples and also by an irregular sinuous sandbank which rises just out of the water on the right.

In the foreground on the right is the corner of the Riva dei Schiavoni, with a number of richly dressed ladies and gentlemen about to embark in gondolas which are moored to the steps. Beyond the familiar buildings along the water front, which extend away in perspective to the end of the Grand Canal where the Salute shimmers in the sunlight above the Doge's Palace, rises the Campanile and the domes of San Marco. A few thin clouds gather along the horizon and others float near the zenith.

## THE APPROACHING STORM

Height, 29 inches; length, $391 / 2$ inches
A shepherd is urging his flock of sheep along a broad sandy road, assisted by his active dog, who vigorously barks at the heels of the laggards. Turbulent storm clouds, which nearly obscure the sky, indicate the speedy approach of a violent tempest, and a flash of vivid sunshine strikes upon the animals and the shepherd in the immediate foreground, and flecks the landscape here and there with spots of light. In the immediate foreground on the left a sturdy oak tree, with scarred trunk and broken branches, rises out of the picture, and on the right, across the road along which the sheep are hurrying, is a low bank with scattered boulders and a scattered clump of trees in dense summer foliage. A low line of wooded hills bounding a meadow toward which the shepherd is driving his flock forms the horizon.

In the immediate foreground on the left is the shattered hulk of a large French vessel, the silent muzzles of the guns still pointing out of the portholes and the tricolored flag trailing in the water from a broken mast. In the right foreground an English boat, full of sailors, is proceeding toward the fleet at the moment when the magazine of the Orient is exploding and the dismasted vessel is envel-
oped in flames. In the distance a great conflagration lights the sky with a lurid glow and the massive castle of Aboukir is seen surrounded by smoke and fire.

The picture was painted in 1798 when the artist was twenty-four years of age and its exhibition in the Royal Academy in 1799 was the reason for his election as an associate of that body. It disappeared until 1886 when it was exhibited in the Nineteenth Century Art Galleries in London. The artist adapted to his subject the following lines from Book VI. of Milton's "Paradise Lost":
