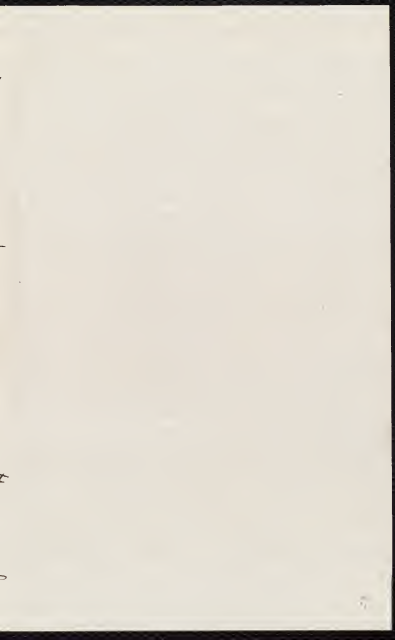

compensation. He seems honest
but whether it is safe to take
the testimony of a man tempted
to write, for ^{what may not be true} the sake of compen-
sation, the Committee can judge.
I will communicate their an-
swer as soon as received.
