

The American Association of Nurserymen.

There are always quite a number of members who make it a point to get to the place of meeting a day in advance of the organization. It is a good time to meet old friends and to make new acquaintances, free from the obligations to which we are dutifully bound during the sessions.

Paragraphs From Meehans's Monthly.

HABDINESS OF VARIETIES .- There is in all plants a line of variation. No two plants are exactly alike, no two leaves are exactly alike, and even in the parts of the flower there is some variation to be noted. But these variations are within a certain limit, beyond which they cannot go. The hardiness of individuals of a species is subject to the same law of variation. There are different degrees of hardiness, just as there are different degrees in the other characteristics; and this is shown even in the common Pursalane of gardens, which seem to be injured by the first white) frost. A few plants will be hardy enough to escape the first light attack. This variation, however, is limited to two or three degrees. In trees and plants of an arborescent character the limit will often extend to several degrees; and it is in this particular line that improvers look for hardy varieties. When we speak of hardy apples, cherries, pears, and similar fruits, we simply mean that we are welcoming improvements among those which have reached the extreme limit of hardiness. This principle is not generally recognized. There is really no such power in acclimitization as people imagine; for no fruit or flower can develop to any greater extent? than is provided for in the constitution of the species. We may get some varieties of tomatoes or some varieties of potatoes that will stand one or two degrees more than we have been accustomed to observe; but to get a potato or tomato that will stand eight or ten degrees of frost is, we may safely avouch, an absolute impossibility.

EVERBLOOMING MULTIFLORA ROSES.— Among the novelties announced in Europe is a new race of roses, from the Rosa multiflora.¹⁰⁰⁵_{WEC} The varieties have assumed an everblooming character.

PEACH TREES.-On Peach, Leading Varieties.

Our Peach Trees are budded on seedlings grown from Tennessee and Alabama Pits. They are free from Aphis or Root-knots, and have fewer borers than those from most nurseries.

We can supply beautiful medium and small-sized peach trees this year. The lands upon which our peach trees are grown this year produces a light, well-matured tree, with fine roots. These trees will answer well the purpose of "June Buds." and are very much better to transplant, as they will be well matured to the terminal bud, while June Buds are often tender at the tips. The little trees we offer should not be confounded with the little culls left after the larger trees have been dug and offered so cheaply by other nurseries. Our peach trees have been grown with especial reference to the Southern trade, where small sizes are mostly wanted. The Yellows and Rosette are unknown in this locality, and we have been careful not to bring in any buds from affected localities.

RATES.—As we send this list to the trade only, we make the difference in prices between the 10, 100 and 1000 rates very slight—simply sufficient, as a rule, to cover the difference in the expense of handling in the smaller numbers. We uni-formly tie in bunches of 10, when consistent with the order, and we suggest to our customers to make their orders for varieties in multiples of 10 as far as practicable. Orders for 50 and not over 300 trees, if for not less than 10 of a variety, will be charged at the rate per hundred. Orders requiring 300 trees or more, and not less than 10 of a variety, will be chled at the lowest quoted prices. Orders for less than 10 trees of one variety, will be charged at the rate per ten. SEASON.—Our packing and shipping season RATES .- As we send this list to the trade only,

SEASON-Our packing and shipping season begins by the 20th of September, and continues until about the first of March. We have great advantages to offer here in early shipments for the North in Spring. We

do not accept orders for the North in Spring. We do not accept orders for trees we do not grow, as we never buyt rees to sell again. You can de-pend upon us for fresh dug trees. Each order is taken up separately, and not until it is wanted for shipment.

SHIPPING DIRECTIONS.—We respectfully beg our patrons to furnish us with explicit direc-tions as to shipping, and the mode of conveyance by which they desire trees forwarded. When no by which they desire trees forwarded. When no particular directions are given, we forward according to the best of our judgment. But in no case do we assume any responsibility as to safe delivery and condition of Trees and Plants after a proper shipment by us.

after a proper supment oy us. **RELEASE.**—When prepayment of freight is not required, we will Release and Guarantee, and take forwarder's receipt and mail to consignee. It is left to the option of the shipper of trees over some railroads, whether he will release them or not under the clause "Value less than \$5.00 per 100 lbs." If released under this clause, the freight is less on roads governed by this classification, and we will assume it to be proper to make this release, without reference to the classification, and we will assume to be proper to make this release, without reference to the value of the trees, unless instructed to the con-trary. This clause does not apply upon roads under some of the district classifications, and because of this confusion we will not be held responsible for any oversight to release, unless instructed by our customers. Claims for delay or loss must be made to the forwarders.

PACKAGES.—The cost of package must be added to the prices quoted in this list, as follows: Boxes 30 inches square, from 7½ to 9 feet long, as the trees may require, each \$2.50; boxes 24 inches, \$2.00; boxes 18 inches, \$1.50; bales from 25c. to 75c. each.

PACKING .- Goods will be packed in moss, and especial care taken to insure their arrival in the best condition.

ASSORTMENTS .- We do not require customers ASSORTMENTS.- We do not require customers to take an assortment they do not wish, but will sell one variety alone if desired. If any substi-tution can be allowed, either in grade or variety, it should be so stated when making the order. As a rule we do not substitute without permission.






