BOWSER TO HOLD MORE STRINGS

MINOR APPOINTMENTS TAKEN FROM JUDGES

University Endowment - Selection of Lands - Faculty of Commerce to Be Created

Legislative Press Gallery, Jan. 24. In line with the policy of centralizing all appointments in the hands of the government - more particularly when in some department of provincial administration which falls under the control of Attorney-General Bowser - the House to-day was asked to consider two bills which take away from judges or court officials certain small appointments which they now have power to make.

The first bill was one to amend the County Court Act, and this was taken up in committee of the whole, with H. B. Thomson (Victoria) in the chair. This bill repeals the former provisions as to the appointment of a deputy to act for the registrar of the court whenever that official is prevented from acting by illness or other unavoidable cause, or whenever the assistance of a deputy is required. Under these the deputy was named by the registrar or by a County court judge. The amendment places this power in the hands of the lieutenant-governor in council - which is practically the attorney-general in such a case as this. The bill went through without discussion, and stands for its final stages. The second measure came on later in the sitting.

Faculty of Commerce. The bill extending for three years the time for a selection of the lands to be set apart as an amendment for the university was taken up in committee, H. G. Parson (Columbia) in the chair. H. C. Brewster asked if there was to be a faculty of commerce, or a commercial course, in the new university. He inquired of the minister of education what steps had been taken along that line.

"In the bill establishing the university provision was made for a course in commerce among other things," replied Hon. Dr. Young. "In the plans for the buildings, which I will submit to the House in a day or two, I have made provision for putting up a building for a faculty of commerce."

J. H. Hawthornthwaite argued that giving an extension of time for the selection of lands would mean the tying up of such lands for three years longer from settlement. The minister of education explained that the government had to wait till the results of surveys of lands in the north before it could complete making its selection. As fast as the reports of surveys came in selections were made, and last year some 90,000 acres had been selected.

Mr. Hawthornthwaite - But it will tie up the land? Dr. Young - Certainly, but the area we are setting aside for the endowment of higher education is very small in comparison with the acreage of the province. We are only setting aside half a million acres, whereas the premier told us the other day there are twenty-nine million acres open to settlers. It is absurd to say that a reserve of such a small area is going to retard settlement.

Premier McBride dwelt on the value of a well-endowed provincial university and hoped the children of workmen would be found in large numbers among its students. He repeated his colleague's assurance that nothing would be done in making a selection to affect settlement. Mr. Hawthornthwaite was not hopeful of the working classes getting any benefit from higher education, which he alleged to be used for deluding, humbugging and deceiving them.

Mr. McBride, on the authority of the commissioner of lands, stated that in the last two years there had been 790,000 acres of land surveyed, and all of this had been reserved for pre-emptors. He confessed that he had been disappointed in the speed with which the department of lands had made the endowment selection.

Aid For University. "We expect that the public-spirited men of the province will donate from their wealth to the university," the premier continued. "From the attitude of the legislature I think there should be every reason to expect that the wealthy classes of British Columbia will not be at all sparing with their means, so that the university will have

in addition to government assistance, an endowment from private sources which will give it the rank which should be its, and which we propose that it shall have."

H. C. Brewster recalled that when the endowment bill was being discussed the then leader of the opposition objected to the setting aside of an area of land before its value was known, or a survey made. But as the policy had been adopted he saw no objection to the extension of time now asked. "It was not impossible to pick out three individual pieces of land that was proposed to be set aside to endow the university, and not for any such cause as that of higher education. The land of the province was going so fast that unless the endowment lands were selected in the next three years there would not be much left to select from. Parker Williams (Newcastle) wandered away from the text and made a general attack on elementary education. Hon. Dr. Young indignantly repelled the allegations of the members for Nanaimo and Ladysmith, pointed to the splendid record of British Columbia students who have gone to eastern colleges, and concluded by accusing the Liberal party of giving him only political criticism and no support in his efforts to advance higher education. The per capita outlay on elementary education, he said in reply to Mr. Parker Williams, was much more than in any province, and salaries paid teachers were from one-third to one-half as high as anywhere else. It was to be regretted that two schools in Mr. Williams' district were without teachers, as were others, but this was not the fault of the government. Without lowering the standard everything possible was being done to obtain teachers.

Civil Service. The provincial secretary obtained a second reading for his bill to amend the Public Service Act of last year. This grades the service into four classes and requires the passing of a public qualifying examination before anyone can enter any class. All permanent appointments made since March 12 last is validated. The executive is given power, in cases where knowledge and ability requisite for a permanent appointment are "wholly or in part professional, technical, or such as require peculiar training," to appoint without examination or reference to age limit or nationality. Temporary appointees now in the service may, where their work justifies a permanent appointment, be admitted without further examination than in practical office work, but hereafter no temporary clerk or stenographer can be employed for more than twelve months without passing the qualifying examination. Heads of departments have to notify the civil service commissioners of vacancies and the need for temporary assistance, and the commissioner "shall make such recommendation to the minister presiding over the department as may appear necessary."

Dr. Young stated to the House that since the act had been passed there had been a great improvement in the tone of the service, and a distinct advance had been made in management of the service by the merit system.

Appointing Commissioners. A second reading was given to two of the attorney-general's bills. The first validates the rules governing the operation of city and interurban electric tramways and street railways, recently promulgated by the executive council. The other proposes to amend the Oath Act by taking from the judges the power to appoint commissioners for the taking of affidavits for use in the courts of British Columbia and placing it with the lieutenant-governor-in-council - again the attorney-general.

Hon. Mr. Bowser, in explanation of the latter bill, said all other oaths were appointed by the governor-in-council, and it was the same in other provinces. This was the only province where the judges appointed commissioners, and as the judges were overloaded with responsibilities anyway he had prepared the bill.

J. H. Hawthornthwaite admitted that he had before now thrown a rock when he had seen a judicial head, but did not see why any reflection should be cast upon the judges by the attorney-general. It was all part of the policy of that gentleman to denude the judges of all privileges, first in large matters and now in the small details.

With the appointments in the hands of judges there was some guarantee that there would be no politics, but there was absolutely no guarantee of that if it was in the hands of the attorney-general.

H. C. Brewster entered his emphatic protest against this as against every other bill which had a tendency to concentrate power in the hands of the lieutenant-governor-in-council. It appeared to him to be nothing more or less than another opportunity for the government to exercise its functions in council to party advantage in every possible manner in which such could be used. This bill seemed to him to be going a little further than any previous one and giving another string to the attorney-general, who had the ends of most of the strings in his hands now. It was difficult to see why a judge of the Supreme Court was not a proper person to say who was fitted to take affidavits. The bill was a slur on the judges of the province.

The premier jumped into the debate to defend the judiciary from some imagined attack by Mr. Brewster, and showed some little heat in doing so. He declared it to be undignified for any member to assert that any government in British Columbia would lend itself to anything which would reflect upon the judges.

More will probably be heard of this bill when it comes up in committee. H. B. Thomson introduced a private

Many are now LEAVING PEKIN

Plague Case at Capital Believed to Be Responsible for Exodus

Peking, Jan. 25. - The weekly express to Hankow yesterday was crowded with refugees. These included college professors, military officers, the Italian minister, minor diplomats and persons of means who find the moment convenient for vacation or retirement. The bubonic plague, which had its first victim here several days ago, and it is believed, many since, is the primary cause of the exodus.

No new cases of bubonic plague were reported here yesterday, but the opinion is held at the legations that the Chinese are not reporting illness and are possibly secreting the bodies. The newspapers are supporting the government in its efforts to allay the fears. The masses, nevertheless, are much alarmed by gruesome reports, such as one alleging that the Russians at Harbin are casting the afflicted into poisoned wells. The story perhaps developed from the possible use of lime pits for the dead.

Meanwhile the diplomatic body has not been able to agree how the legation quarter should be quarantined. The Germans, Australians and British are behind barred gates of their own commands, are advocating drastic measures. The Japanese, who have the most pressing general interests to be looked after, are supported by the Russians in arguing the necessity of continuing diplomatic relations with the Chinese foreign board. William J. Calhoun, the American minister, has suggested keeping within the quarter all the guards, and the exclusion of the Chinese except such officials as have business with the legations. The moderates declare the others are panicked, while political motives are attributed to the Japanese.

So far, only a general measure of quarantine has been undertaken. The disease has reached Pao Ting Fu, in the province of Chi-Li, on its southward progress. Pao Ting Fu is 70 miles southwest of Peking.

The viceroy of Hankow has telegraphed to the government asking permission to establish a quarantine against Peking.

Fighting Plague. St. Petersburg, Jan. 25. - A special dispatch from Harbin declares that hurried from Jereboia in Mongolia carried the plague into Manchuria. The first cases occurred near Khalial, but the disease was not localized, and crept to the southeast. Almost every case has ended in death. The disease is of the pulmonary type, and the mortality is estimated at 99 per cent.

According to the dispatches, the Chinese masses suspect that it was designedly introduced into their country. Sixty physicians, 25 assistant surgeons and 200 nurses have been assembled by the Russian authorities and will be sent to the infected districts.

MONUMENT TO GENERAL WOLFE
STATUE UNVEILED
BY LORD ROBERTS
 Stirring Address by the Field Marshal at Westerham—Lord Strathcona Present
 "To the glory of God, and in honored memory of James Wolfe, who laid down his life for his Sovereign and his country on the plains of Abraham on September 13, 1759, I unveil this memorial." Such were the words used by Lord Roberts as he disclosed to public view the statue of Wolfe, erected in the Kentish village of Westerham. A bugler sounded "The Last Post," the Bishop of Chichester pronounced a benediction, and then, as the bugler sounded "The Reveille," a wreath from the citizens of Quebec was laid at the base of the statue.
 The statue, which is the work of E. Derwent Wood, A. R. A., is full of spirit and movement, and shows the tall young major-general in the pose of leading his men on to victory with his short sword raised aloft. On the stone pedestal is the inscription: "Major-General James Wolfe, born at Westerham, January the 2nd, 1727; died at the battle of Quebec, the 13th September, 1759."
 It was an impressive occasion, which perhaps gained in significance through the long postponement; and Lord Roberts, in an admirable speech, emphasized with marked eloquence the lessons to be derived from it. It was from Westerham Market Square that Wolfe started out on his last campaign, which ended in his death and the acquisition of Canada for the British Empire. One felt as the enshrouding fog fell away revealing the bronze presentment of the genial young soldier, that here was the birthplace not only of Wolfe, but of British North America, and that this quaint old English town, which remains very much as Wolfe left it, ought to be a place of pilgrimage for every Canadian who can claim proud descent from the Mother Country.
 All Westerham, feeling at last an adequate pride in its great son, says the London Standard, assembled in the Market Place to witness the unveiling ceremony. It made a picturesque scene, with powdery snow glistening on old red roofs, and every window filled with people looking down on the crowd surrounding the statue, where a strong body of the 4th battalion of the Royal West Kent regiment formed a guard of honor. A procession of the clergy and choir, in their robes, and headed by a band, came slowly from the church, singing a hymn. Lord Roberts—accompanied by Lady Alice Roberts, received a great cheer on arriving—took up his position on a raised platform behind the statue. By his side was Lieut-Colonel C. A. Ward—descendant of that Ward who was Wolfe's playmate—and behind them were Lord Strathcona, the veteran high commissioner for Canada; Sir Frederick Young, who has been the hon. treasurer for the Wolfe statue fund; the Bishop of Chichester; and Earl Stanhope who was in command of the guard of honor.
 Lord Roberts, looking very well and erect in his field-marshal's uniform, then delivered a vivid address, which came as a rousing message of Empire to those who hung on his words: "He said:
 "Rather more than 150 years ago a young soldier fought and died for England, and we are gathered here to-day to give expression to the feeling that a national duty remained unperformed until a memorial of the great services which that soldier rendered to his country should be erected. The statue I have unveiled is indeed a very tardy acknowledgment of the nation's debt to Wolfe. But, perhaps, that so many years have been allowed to elapse before the fulfillment of our duty may be looked upon as proof that our appreciation of his services is deep and lasting, and has been gaining in strength as time has proved their value, rather than the expression of grief for his loss was fresh in men's minds. We members of the British Empire as it exists to-day are better able to understand the work done in the past than were those who lived while the work was being carried on, and it is with a full knowledge of what Wolfe's military skill achieved for us, and a correct appreciation of the part he played in our history, that we are assembled here to do honor to his memory.
 "It always strikes me," he continued, "that in raising a monument to one who has done well for his country we
