FEDERAL AID FOR PROHIBITION AREAS ASKED

Ottawa, March 28.—(Canadian Press)—A deputation representing the license commissioners of the various prohibition provinces waited upon the Government this morning and asked Federal aid in tightening up the prohibitory laws of their provinces and making them effective. The deputation urged that the right to export liquor for beverage purposes be restricted to licensed distillers and brewers, transportation of liquor shipped by such out of their bonded warehouses to be via common carriers only, by rail or water. It was also urged that no liquor should be exported for beverage purposes from any province into a province or a foreign country where a prohibitory liquor law is in force, and that the United States should be included in this category.

TWO MURDERS IN NEW BRUNSWICK

Man and Woman Were Shot to Death

Woodstock, N. B., March 28.—A double murder at Benton Ridge was reported to Sheriff A. R. Foster of Carleton County late yesterday afternoon. Harvey Trenholm and Mrs. Olive Swim were shot to death during the afternoon. The man's body was found on the doorstep and the woman's body lay in a room off the kitchen.

As far as could be learned, it would appear that Mrs. Swim was engaged as housekeeper for Trenholm and had formerly resided at Hartland. On the Canadian Pacific train going south yesterday, Barry Swim, the woman's husband, was a passenger.

It is suspected that the murders were prompted by jealousy, but this remains to be determined.

The most intense excitement prevails as the families were well known in that section of the country. The murdered woman was about twenty-five years of age and Trenholm somewhat older.

AGREE ECONOMY NOW IS NEEDED

Commons Members Discuss D.S.C.R. Officials' Salaries

Supervisor Directs Large Federal Outlay

Ottawa, March 27.—John Millar, Progressive member for Qu'Appelle, Sask., addressing the Commons during the consideration of the estimates of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, last evening, expressed disappointment that the Government was granting increases to high salaried men. On the prairies it was considered that a salary of \$5,000 a year was quite enough. These were critical times and farmers were being driven to the wall. He did not know what would happen on the Prairies if there should be another crop failure, but it was possible that the whole industrial structure might collapse. The farmers felt that there should be more economy in the civil service, and that a large proportion of money which was supposed to be spent on the returned soldiers was used up in administration.

Dr. Beland, Minister of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, agreed with Mr. Millar that the strictest economy should prevail.

Bonus.

James Arthur, Conservative, Parry Sound, said that some of the returned men were being driven to the wall. Dr. Beland retorted that the majority were against it, and that the veterans had submitted a memorandum to the Government which would be referred to the special committee. "Anything that can be done in favor of returned men, compatible with the resources of the country, will be done," the Minister added.

Dr. Manion strongly denied that any of the Conservatives had indicated they would support a cash bonus when elected.

Mr. Crerar protested that the whole discussion was out of order. The House was considering salaries for the D. S. C. R., if it was desired to discuss the bonus question, a resolution could be introduced later.

Lincoln H. Joffe, Progressive, Lethbridge, declared he would like to see justification for increases before being asked to vote for them. He had been elected on a platform of strict economy.

The resolution for increases carried.

San Francisco, March 28.—The scene of the party Roscoe (Fatty) Arbuckle, film comedian, gave last September at which it is charged he inflicted a fatal injury on Miss Virginia Rappe, was inspected yesterday by the judge, jury and attorneys participating in his third trial on manslaughter charge arising from the girl's death.

LONDON WRITER'S ATTACK RESENTED

Grand Trunk Article Mentioned in Canadian Commons

Ottawa, March 28.—Right Hon. Arthur Meighen in the Commons yesterday afternoon drew the attention of the Government to an article which had appeared in the morning newspaper in regard to the Grand Trunk arbitration proceedings. The article in question, which was, he said, carried over Canadian Press cables from London, England, quoted a British paper, inasmuch as it was defamatory to the honor of Canada, he wished to bring it to the attention of the Government and ask what course would be taken in regard to it.

Mr. Meighen read from the dispatch in question, and declared that it intimated that members of the arbitration board had been "subject to political and financial pressure in the discharge of their onerous duties."

He quoted a sentence as follows: "If some Central American country swindled British investors out of not less than \$45,000,000 by methods which were used in Canada, we think the collision with the Monroe Doctrine might be risked in an effort to do something about it."

Nothing Unfair.

Mr. Meighen said that whether or not there was disagreement as to the wisdom of the Government acquiring the Grand Trunk system, he felt sure there was nothing dishonorable or unfair in the treatment accorded to the Grand Trunk shareholders by the board of arbitration or the Canadian Government. The Government of the country in which a newspaper published an article reflecting on the honor of another country exercised some supervision in the matter. He wished to know whether the Government would take action.

Premier King replied that it was a little difficult to determine what course was the best to take in regard to newspaper dispatches. He was quite sure, however, that the remarks of Mr. Meighen would be given wide circulation, and he wished to associate himself with them entirely. That, he thought, would be sufficient.

The dispatch from London said the article had appeared in a weekly review called The Outlook.


URGES AID FOR FORMER SOLDIERS

Mewburn Asks Parliament to Deal With Problem Cases

Ottawa, March 28.—(Canadian Press)—Appointment of a Royal Commission to investigate problem cases among returned soldiers was advocated in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon by Major-General S. C. Mewburn, formerly Minister of Militia, at the time the estimates of the Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment Department was under consideration. He thought something should be done immediately for "problem cases" among returned men. It was understood the Government intended to re-appoint the Parliamentary Committee on Pensions and Re-establishment, but it would be a matter of months and perhaps the better part of a year before it would be able to benefit the returned men. General Mewburn suggested that instead there should be appointed a Royal Commission of four or five members, including a medical man of the highest standing and some returned soldiers, to investigate this matter.

IN WOMAN'S DOMAIN

WOMEN'S RIGHTS SIMPLY PROTECTED THROUGH D. C. LAWS

T. J. Stacpoole, K.C., Explains Working of Acts for Women's Protection

"One frequently hears the opinion expressed that women have not received the same consideration in legislation as the men, and that the laws are made for men. But women have received the most fatherly care and tenderest consideration ever since the Courts of equity came into existence." In these words, F. J. Stacpoole, K.C., prefaced an interesting address on "Laws of British Columbia Affecting Women" given before a gathering of women in the Liberal headquarters yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Stacpoole, in his address dealt principally with laws affecting the real and personal property rights of women. He took his hearers back to the days when the English courts looked after women's interests, particularly in the case of widows and the finances of wars, and in passing he paid a tribute to the judges of those days, who protected women's interests as far as it lay in their power.

Establishment of Dower.

The dower was first established under common law in England, this affecting only "real" property. Later the unfairness of conditions under which a man could claim a woman's personal effects led to the establishment in 1882 of the Married Woman's Property Act, protecting her in all her property rights and giving her the right to dispose of them as she chose. This law existed to-day.

"The Testator's Family Maintenance Act, under which an allowance can be granted by the courts to a widow or widower and family from an estate willed away by the testator was fully explained by the speaker. In force since April, 1921, there had not been a single application made under its provisions since it became law, said Mr. Stacpoole, who took this to be gratifying evidence of the general tendency of men to provide properly for their families by will.

Of great importance to women was the disposition of property left by a person after death in the Administration and Inheritance Acts dealt with these cases.

Enlightening Legislation.

"Perhaps the most enlightening piece of legislation passed for many years was the way in which the speaker described the law to legitimate, by subsequent marriage of the parents, the children of unmarried parents, and Mrs. Hooper, the president of the Mothers' Pensions Act, under which a mother is entitled to monthly payments for the support of herself and minor children; also the Maternity Protection Act passed a few years ago for the pre-natal and post-natal care of the working mother.

One of the inconsistencies of the law occurred in the Dower Act, continued Mr. Stacpoole, under which a wife became entitled to one-third of any land accruing to her husband's estate, and which could not be disposed of without the signature and consent of the wife. Against this, however, the Act enabled the husband to transfer the wife of this by transfer during his life or by will.

Deserted Wives.

Other acts described by Mr. Stacpoole included the Homeless Act, the Life Insurance Act, the Equal Guardianship Act, and the Deceased Workmen's Wages Act, all designed for the protection of women and families.

In describing the Deserted Wives Maintenance Act, the speaker pointed out the absurdity, in these days, of the wording of the act, which gave as one of the grounds for desertion, one who was compelled to live apart from her husband by reason of assaults. Mr. Stacpoole pointed out that the English law used the word "chastity" in the act, allowing much greater scope, and he suggested that the women should seek elimination of the plural on the ground that no wife should have to submit to more than one assault before seeking the protection of the law.

Laws of Equity.

The laws of equity were also explained at some length, the speaker emphasizing the great measure of protection accorded to women under these laws. At the conclusion of his address the speaker answered several questions, which revealed the interest taken by the women in the subject. Mrs. C. C. Spofford occupied the chair.

Explorer Returns With Museum Specimens

New York, March 25—Carl E. Akeley, big game hunter, African explorer, animal sculptor and taxidermist, has returned from his fourth expedition to the Belgian Congo, bringing back five huge gorilla skins to be mounted, innumerable smaller shots and a wealth of new data for the American Museum of Natural History.

In the Congo belt, west of Lake Nyanza Victoria, she saw the pigmy tribe of Africa and they discovered her, the first white child they had ever seen. They considered her distinctly mature, however, for she was taller than the tallest member of the tribe.

"The chief," she could report with pride, "was very much surprised by my curls. He thought they came off."

Mrs. Bradley explained that the prevailing mode of coiffure among the pigmy people consisted in the use of a large, flat, circular, and they examined this phenomenon of her daughter with intense curiosity.

So far as known, no white women had ever before been to the interior reaches of the Belgian Congo, where the trail of the expedition led. Alice maintaining perfect health throughout the journey, was reported by her nurse, Miss Frencilla Hall, to be an irrepressible source of constant apprehension.

Child Watched Lion in Jungle.

She watched in particular a light white lion, known to most children only in the relative docility of the circus cage, who shot with other inhabitants of the jungle. Of the five gorilla trophies selected to be brought home, one stood five feet eight inches in height. His chest measured nearly five feet and he weighed 350 pounds.

Miss Martha Miller, Prof. Akeley's secretary, also one of the party, seemed tender-hearted about the gorillas, unless one caught the suspicious twinkle in her brown eyes.

"The so-called man-eating gorillas," she said, "are really very tame creatures and I don't believe they would fight unless they were cornered and absolutely compelled to do so. It seemed cruel to shoot them."

Mr. Bradley is a lawyer, Mrs. Bradley (Mary Hastings Bradley) a novelist and special writer for a Chicago newspaper. She participated in the hunting and bagged two gorillas and several lions. Miss Miller likewise brought down a lion or two.

Went for Gorilla Specimens.

Prof. Akeley, also noted as an inventor of the cement gun and the Akeley camera, set out on this latest crusade for science in August, 1921, for the American Museum of Natural History, where many of the specimens of his former trips are mounted, among them giant elephants, which he has also sculptured in clay. His special purpose on this trip was to get gorilla specimens.

"When I returned another time," he remarked, as he was landing, "I am going to take an artist with me. He will get the details for the most beautiful forest regions in the world—scenes beyond all description, with a roaring volcano in eruption for the background."

The time is coming, he believes, when the Kivu country in the East-African Congo will be a resort of tourists. He, too, insisted that the gorilla is not as ferocious as he looks and that it is not sport to shoot him. Among his many photographs are some showing these animals at play.

"When they hear the click of the camera," he said, "they run off into the jungle like frightened cats."

The expedition started from Cape Town and made for the exact centre of the continent. Travel was by rail and boat until the Lake Kivu region was reached. All the members of the party enjoyed themselves to the utmost, they said, but not a day of illness was experienced.

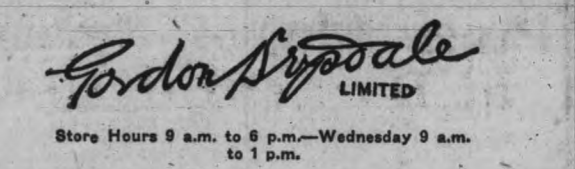

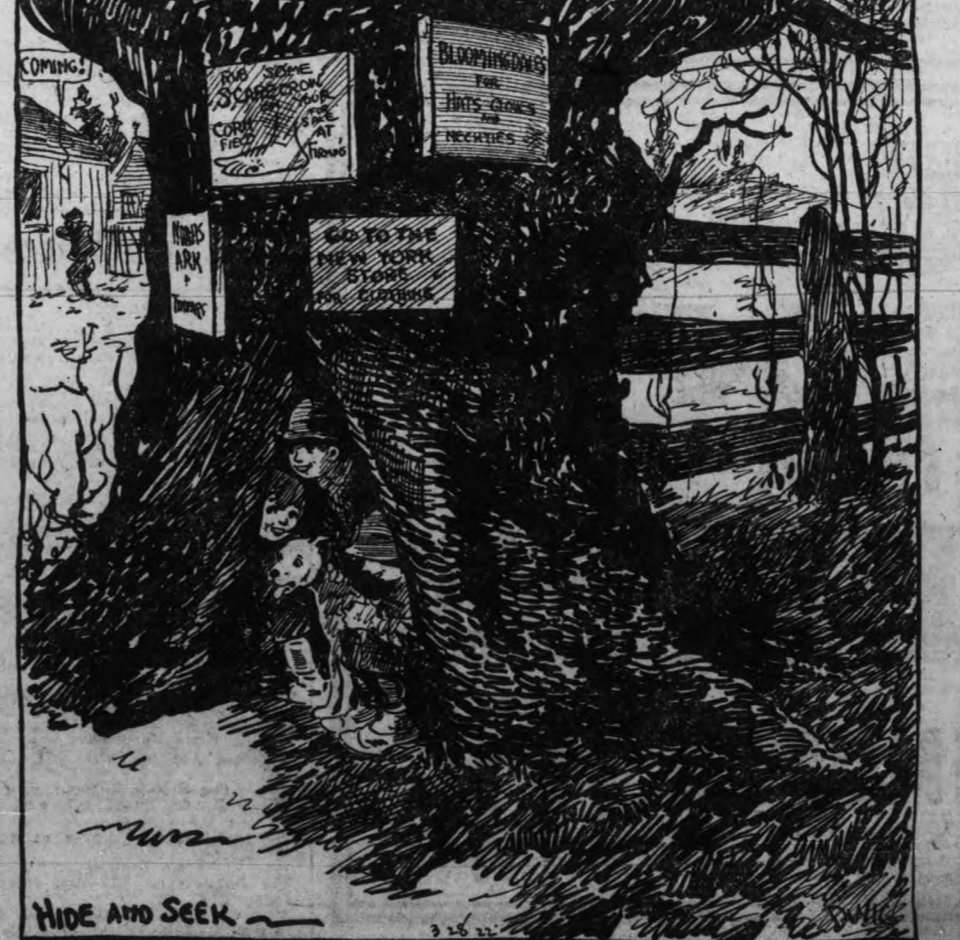

PROTECTION FOR OAK BAY SHIPPING

Turkey Head Breakwater Is Endorsed By Council

"The Municipal Council is prepared to give favorable consideration to the project for a breakwater at Turkey Head, Oak Bay, provided that it can be built without expense to the municipality, and in connection with this project is prepared to give public access to the waterfront to Turkey Head, and to permit the removal of the necessary rock on that point."

The above resolution was adopted by the Oak Bay Council last evening after hearing a report on this question. This issue has occupied considerable attention in the district.

Some years ago an appropriation was voted in the Federal estimates for a breakwater at Oak Bay, but the amount was never expended. Recently the question came up again, when owners of property in the district to be affected asked the Council for its opinion, and the Dominion District Engineer was also requested to report on the matter.

The desire is for a breakwater capable of protecting shipping, of sufficient length to provide a shelter for steamers, and a wharf for the handling of passengers and freight. Since the matter was taken up with the Council some weeks ago a committee has been engaged on the question, and Councillor Crease was able to make a report yesterday, as a result of which the motion was drafted to express the opinion of the Council on the subject. It is assumed now that the way will be clear for proceeding with the engineering plans.

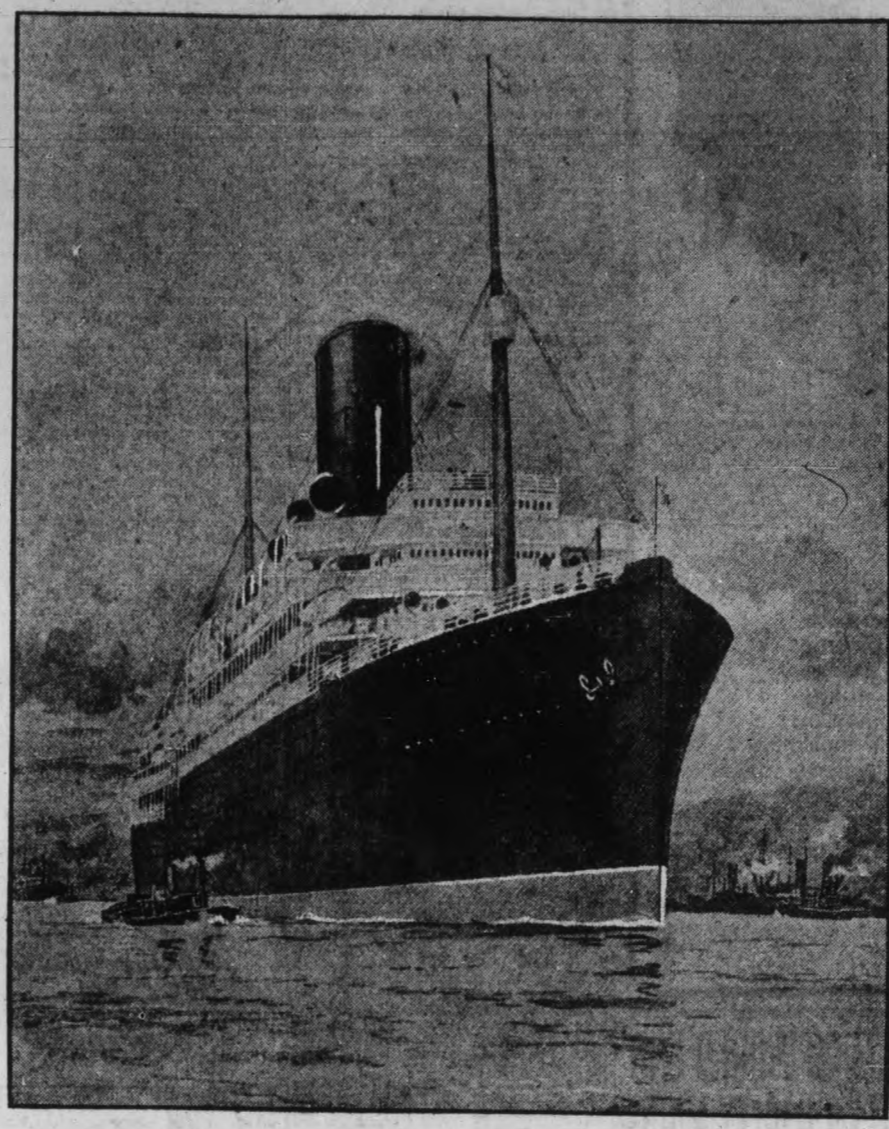

C. P. R. ARGUMENT ON FREIGHT RATES

Board at Ottawa Heard W. N. Tilley

Ottawa, March 28.—(Canadian Press)—"We think we are performing a very good service for the grain growers of the prairies at a very moderate rate," said W. N. Tilley, K. C., of Toronto, at the close of his argument for the Canadian Pacific Railway at the hearing of the equalization of freight rates case yesterday before the Federal Railway Commission. Mr. Tilley had occupied some five hours in his statement to the Commission.

Mr. Tilley contended that "from the time the new rate scale was adopted in 1916, no charge card was made against the Canadian Pacific Railway of discrimination."

Earlier in the day, Mr. Tilley had argued that the railway he represented was a national system and the law of averages must be considered in arriving at the idea of whether such and such a rate was unjust or not.

"Any test you can apply," Mr. Tilley told the Commission, "no rate since 1916, the relationship is fair on many of the commodities mentioned in the hearing and is particularly fair as to the grain trade."

Views Expressed on Estimates in Ottawa Commons

Ottawa, March 28.—Hon. W. S. Fielding, Minister of Finance, said in the Commons last evening he was sorry Mr. Meighen, Leader of the Opposition, had found it necessary to enter into a general discussion on the estimates at this time. The Government had not made any claim of great economy in regard to the estimates. Not one member of the Government had discussed them. Mr. Meighen had not found time to examine the estimates but had found lots of time to criticize.

The Government, said Mr. Meighen, last year had included the sum of \$11,000,000 for railway betterments in the estimates. This sum was not needed this year because the betterments had been placed on the land and the estimates were reduced by that amount. The Government had reduced the vote for the Soldier Settlement Board from \$15,000,000 last year to \$12,000,000 this year, but it had not done so in the interests of economy. The reduction simply meant that the soldiers had been placed on the land and the work done by the previous Government. There was a reduction of \$4,000,000 in the vote for soldiers' civil re-establishment. This again was not economy, but was due to the fact that the further the country was removed from the war, the more the work of this department contracted.

Last year the Government's ship-building programme had been completed. This year there was no estimate for shipbuilding.

When these facts were revealed, it developed that the Government was \$8,000,000 over the total estimates of last year. In every respect in which economy could have been exercised, there had been an increase. Consequently it behooved the Opposition to see that the estimates were examined scrupulously before voting an bloc. He asked that the vote stand for some days until the Opposition had a chance to examine the estimates, when they would confer

BRITISH LORD CHANCELLOR GAVE REBUKE TO CARSON

London, March 28.—In a speech in the House of Lords yesterday, Lord Birkenhead severely censured Lord Carson, the former Ulster leader, and now Lord of Appeal, for his speech at Burton last Saturday, in which he attacked the Coalition and Mr. Lloyd George, and asserted that the Government had abandoned Ulster.

The Lord Chancellor declared no judge has the right to go into the country and make political speeches. Viscount Birkenhead's severe rebuke to Lord Carson was the sensation of the parliamentary day. Viscount Birkenhead spoke with intense feeling and vehemence, and his sentences of censure poured in torrents from his lips.

Lord Carson was absent through illness, and Viscount Birkenhead intimated that had the subject of his remarks been present, he would have been still more outspoken.



The Federal Income Tax Law and How to Meet It

Supplied by J. H. Ross, Assistant Inspector of Taxation.

The Federal Income Tax Law was amended in 1921 by an Act modifying some of the penalties imposed by the Act of 1919; but in general the law remains unchanged.

1. You must get and get for yourself the form on which your return has to be made. The Government does not send you a form without being asked. All forms are obtainable at the Assistant Inspector's office, 409 Post Office Building, Victoria, B. C., or from any one of the 97 Post Offices on the Island.

2. You must fill in the form with accuracy and completeness, and calculate the amount of tax for which your income makes you liable. The Government does not make the calculation for you—it only checks up your figures and statements.

3. You must deliver to the inspector of Taxation by April 29 (April 30, 1922, being a Sunday), not only the form you have filled in, but also the tax itself, of an instalment of 1/2—not less than one-fourth.

4. If you pay less than the whole tax on April 29, you must pay the balance in three two-monthly instalments with 6 per cent. interest.

5. If you are late in sending in your return, 5 per cent. (but not more than \$500) is added to your tax. In the case of companies and executors, the penalty is \$10 for each day of default, but not more than \$50.

6. If you send in less than a fourth of the tax as estimated by yourself, to begin with, then, besides the 6 per cent. regularly charged on the tax, you are liable to a penalty of 4 per cent. on the deficiency at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum.

The Government's Sources of Information. The Government does not rely on the taxpayer alone for information as to his income. It may call on any person who has had dealings with him to produce books or other documents showing the facts, and these must be produced under severe penalties.

Fiduciaries (trustees, executors, etc.) have to give information as to estates under their care.

The agent in Canada of anyone resident outside Canada must make a return of any income collected for such non-resident, but such income is not made subject to tax merely because an agent in Canada was employed to collect it.

Special attention of all employers of labor is drawn to the fact that they have to send in for personal examination returns on Form T-4 of all employees paid at a rate of \$1,000 a year or more, or in excess of \$500 during the year. Fees and other remuneration of Company officials and directors, lawyers' retaining fees, ministerial and other salaries paid by churches, all must be reported by Friday of this week.

All companies must in addition file statements of dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders.

Who Comes Under the Law? Everyone with \$1,000 a year (or \$2,000 if he or she is married) who ordinarily resides in Canada, or has lived in Canada 183 days during the year, or is employed or carries on business in Canada, or is paid for services rendered in Canada (but in this last case, only on the income so earned).

How Much is the Tax? The normal tax is 4 per cent. on incomes up to \$5,000, and 8 per cent. on incomes exceeding \$5,000. There is a surtax on incomes over \$5,000, and this rises from 1 per cent. on the first \$1,000 over \$5,000 to 6 2/3 per cent. on anything over \$10,000.

When net taxable income is \$5,000 or more, there is an additional tax, consisting of 2 per cent. of the combined normal tax and surtax. Anyone having such an income pays normal tax, surtax and additional tax.

You Must Apply for a Form. You must not wait till some official sends you a form to fill up. The law insists on your getting a form for yourself. You can get it from the Inspector of Taxation for your district, or from any Post Office on the Island.

Sending in Forms and Paying Tax. The form, when filled up, must be sent or handed to the Inspector of Taxation by April 29, along with any supplementary financial statements which may be necessary to give a full and complete account of the 1921 income. Allow plenty of time for possible delay in the mails. Also, retain some evidence of mailing.

Along with the form, as already stated, there must be sent at least one-fourth of the tax itself. The remainder may be paid in not more than three instalments—two for April and six months after April 30—with 6 per cent. interest from that date to the date of payment.

It is strongly advised that the first instalment, being based only on the taxpayer's estimate, should be well over the one-fourth required, to obviate the risk of penalties. The more you pay the more interest you save.

Every payment should be made by money order or certified cheque. Make the cheque payable to the Receiver-General of Canada.

Exemptions and Deductions. To the question "What income has to be stated?" Your revenue for the calendar year 1921, from salary and fees, business profits, rents, interest, dividends, etc., from other sources, including that received from another country.

What Deductions Are Allowed in Calculating Normal Tax? 1. \$1,000 if you are unmarried or widow or widower and without dependents.

2. \$2,000 if married.

3. \$2,000 if unmarried or a widow or widower with dependent child or brother or sister under 18, or with a dependent parent or grandparent.

4. \$2,000 if a widow or widower with dependent child under 21, or with incapacitated child under 21.

5. \$200 for each dependent child under 18.

6. Dividends from companies doing business in Canada, which have themselves paid normal tax.

7. Exemptions from All Income Tax. In addition, the following four items are entirely exempt from Federal Income Taxes:

1. Interest on any Dominion of Canada War Bonds issued free from income tax.

2. Pensions granted to any member of His Majesty's forces or their dependents on account of disabilities suffered in the Great War.

3. Money made by speculation outside the ordinary course of your business.

4. Legacies, gifts and proceeds of life insurance policies, but not money saved by the investment of these.

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FAMOUS RACE-TRACK PLUNGER HAS PASSED. New York, March 28.—"Jack" McGuinness, who amassed a fortune by some of the most daring plunging known to the race track, lies dead in his Brooklyn home. McGuinness, who was born in Brooklyn 53 years ago, was in the racing game for many years before falling health caused him to sell his string of winning horses. "Jack" often told, with a touch of pride, the story of his first "killing" at odds of 50 to 1, made with Tribes Hill, a scraggy, ungainly three-year-old that he bought for \$100 as a weed-out and which he bet on at 50 to 1 where no one offered to bid for him when he was placed on the block. McGuinness trained the horse himself, as he continued to do with the other winners that followed Tribes Hill. Before the colt left the track, he had brought his master \$25,000. Other winners which carries the McGuinness colors were Frank Hill, Mopac, Collector Jessup, Sam Jackson, Sweet Alice and Inspiration.
