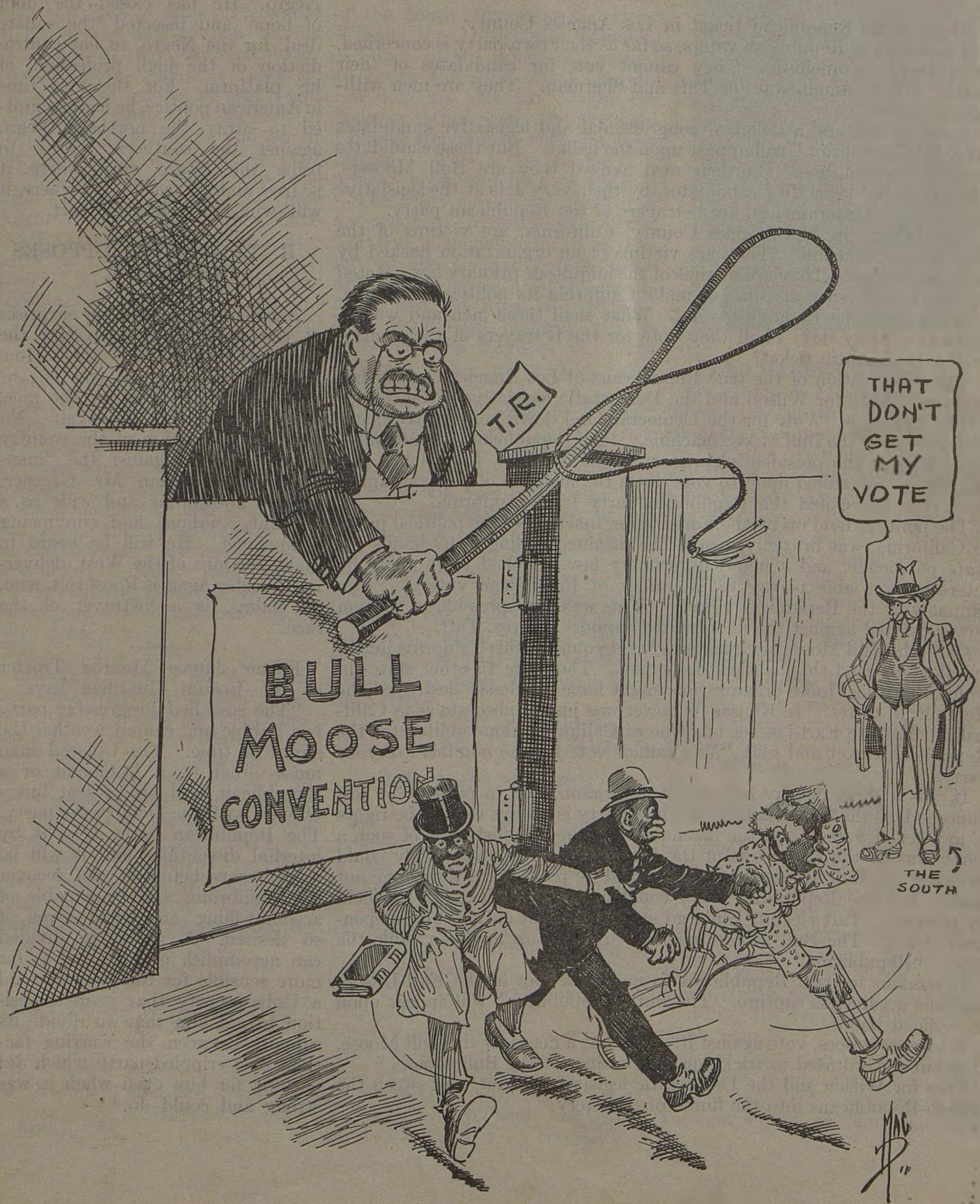

The Big Bull Moose After Negro Delegates



Republicans Vote for Wilson

There is no Republican ticket in Los Angeles County.

Thousands of Republican voters, so far as their own party is concerned, have been disfranchised. They cannot vote for candidates of their party. They cannot vote for Taft and Sherman. They are men without a party.

A set of electors, a ticket of congressional and legislative candidates labeled "Republican," will appear upon the ballot. But these candidates are not Republicans. By their own avowal they are Bull Moosers. Moreover, the legislative candidates, by their very acts at the legislative convention at Sacramento, are betrayers of the Republican party.

Republicans in Los Angeles County, California, are victims of the Earl-Lissner machine. They are victims of an organization backed by state patronage. They are victims of the iniquitous primary law enacted by the Earl-Lissner machine to make California its political plaything.

What shall the Republicans do? What shall these men and women without a party do? Shall they vote for the betrayers of their party, or the Democratic ticket?

The organization of the true Republicans of Los Angeles County has declared, "Vote for Wilson and the Democratic legislative ticket."

The dictum is, "Vote for the Democrats and down political treachery and trickery of the Bull Moose machine. Real Republicans, one and all—those who at the presidential primary voted for Taft, La Follette and Roosevelt—are called upon to vote down the machine of personal ambition, that has exiled the Republican party from California.

The political hold up by the Earl-Lissner machine of the political party in California, was brazenly open. The machine, holding in its hands the state patronage, and a nefarious primary law, couched to promote its interests, was able to say to thousands of Republican voters. "You cannot vote the Republican ticket." This was an expression of wanton power exerted against the unorganized support of Pres. Taft.

Of all the Bull Moose organizations in the country, this California machine alone exerted this political despotism. There are 15 other states in which the Bull Moose organization might have ruthlessly destroyed the Republican ticket. In Kansas its power was just as absolute as in California. Yet the Earl-Lissner machine of California alone obliterated the Republican ticket and said, "You cannot vote for the nominees of your party."

It was a sheer display of force of an organization in power. It was unneeded, as the establishment of a new party is always within the rights of any set of voters; and the machinery for the establishment of such a party was at the finger tips of the Earl-Lissner machine. They could have put the Bull Moose ticket in the field by petition, as they have not done. But the Republican party could not put its ticket in the field by petition. Taft electors could go upon the ballot only as an independent ticket. The Bull Moose machine, by hold up methods, stole the name "Republican."

It remains for real Republicans to make the loot of the Earl-Lissner machine a valueless capture. The word "Republican" will appear upon the official ballot.

Wherever it does, vote against it. It is but a mask for the Bull Moose. It is but a word used to trick you into voting for the Bull Moose.

Vote for Wilson and the Democratic legislative ticket, and sweep the pseudo-Republicans into the limbo of treachery.

ROOSEVELT DENOUNCED BY LEADING NEGROES

R. C. Ranson, editor of the A. M. E. Review, says:

"Col. Roosevelt is trying to win the South at the expense of the Negro. He has closed the 'door of hope' and bisected 'the square deal' for the Negro, in flat contradiction of the high profession of his platform. For the first time in American politics, he has attempted to array the northern Negro against the southern Negro, to bribe the Negro vote where it is free and to exclude it where it will win him white support.

R. T. GREENER OPPOSES ROOSEVELT

Another one of the big surprises of the past week or so was the announcement that the Hon. Richard T. Greener, one of the foremost Republicans of the race, would not support Roosevelt. No man in this section of the country is more bitter against the "man-on-horseback" than Mr. Greener, who is known far and wide as a brilliant, studious and convincing campaigner. He will be heard in many sections of the West, delivering speeches against Roosevelt, who, he claims, is a 'betrayer of the race.'

Editor James Monroe Trotter of the Boston Guardian says:

"The so-called Progressive party is a bubble and cannot weather the storm of time. The Colored man must either be a Democrat or a Republican, and his present interests are with the Democratic party. The Republican party is split by internal dissensions and it will be many years before it can recover its equilibrium and be capable of accomplishing any good—even if so desired. A party so divided can accomplish nothing. It is far more sensible for the Negro to aid a United party that is in a position to aid him than to divide its support between the warring factions of a crippled party which did nothing for him even when it was strong and could do.

"Examine the Colored men who are supporting the Democratic party and it will be found that they are among the more intelligent people among their race who have seen the light a little in advance of the masses and are now serving as Emancipators to lead their people from political slavery. Compare the leaders of the Negro Democracy with the leaders of the Negro Republicans and see if the former are not a higher type of men in average ability and political insight. Ask any of these Negro Democrats how they have fared at the hands of the Democratic party and they will explode the ancient myth of Democratic antagonism to the Negro race."

IDA WELLS-BARNETT

Ida Wells-Barnett shows up Roosevelt's perfidy.

She said: "that after bringing on himself the wrath of the 'Southern gentleman' for entertaining Booker T. Washington, 'He had to do something to take away the bad taste,' and to accomplish this he dishonorably discharged three companies of Negro troops after the Brownsville affair when they would not and could not accuse each other."

Think of it, Roosevelt wanted to break the solid South and he has done so. He has taught the Negro political sense and the solid Colored Republican vote has been broken. This is the traducer of a race, 'hoist upon his own petard.'

The white man of the South has a peculiar temperament. Pres. Taft sought to gain favor by removing all the Colored federal office holders, an act of political expediency, and yet when the selection of a Republican nominee was in order he was defeated in every Southern state where they held direct primaries.

Col. Roosevelt seeks to win the South by making a pawn of the hitherto pliable Negro, and the Democratic party of the South is going to kill him politically. In these border states—where he has a newspaper chance—the Negroes who do vote are flocking to the Democratic party, and mark you, Sir, they are being welcomed. Although you must be thoroughly surprised, I know whereof I speak, so keep on in your good work and continue to fight for justice for all Negroes.

THE VICTORY IS WON

So far as the election of Gov. Wilson is concerned, the victory is won. We have fought the fight, and kept the faith, and have planted our banner on a victorious field. The election of Gov. Wilson gives us no farther concern; that is conceded. It is the part California is to play in the eternal destruction of Roosevelt and his third term anarchy. We have faith in the honesty and common sense of the voters of this state;

and look for a big plurality for Wilson at their hands next Tuesday. In every great crisis, that has confronted this country, the Negroes have fought and voted on the right side. That they will live up to their time-honored traditions, in the present contest between patriotism and anarchy, we have no reason to doubt.

For the past six months, the *Liberator* has devoted most of its space in showing the misfortunes that would overtake the Negroes in this State and Nation in the event of a National victory for Roosevelt and his so-called Progressive Party. The perfidy of the National Progressive party is so well known that it need not be discussed here. To understand what the national success of Roosevelt and his Bull Moose party would mean to the Negroes of the nation, the Negro voters of California have only to review the results of its local victory. If the colored voters of this city and County wish to endorse the color line policy, pursued by the Progressives, all they have to do is to vote for Roosevelt. If they are satisfied with the treatment given them in the parks, and the closing of the "Door of Hope" to our women, and the drawing of the color line in the public service, why let all such show their unfitness for citizenship by voting for Roosevelt. But the manly, thoughtful Negro voters will cast their votes for Wilson and thereby rebuke the Lissner-Johnson bunch for their base betrayal. If this is done the Negro will win, for himself, the lasting respect of the people of this State. If the Negro hopes to break down the color line in the public service, established by the Lissner - Johnson - Alexander - Pridham bunch, and regain their lost places in the parks, and smash the color line in the nurse training school at the County Hospital, the latter inaugurated by Pridham, they must join the Old Line Republicans next Tuesday and crush the Lily White Progressive machine in this State. This the manly Negroes will do.

A VOTE AGAINST PRIDHAM IS A DUTY DONE

Every colored voter in the 5th Supervisorial district owes to him or herself, as a sacred duty, to go to the polls early on Nov. 5th and vote against Pridham. Although his defeat is practically conceded, every colored voter in the district should be on hand and cast his vote against him, and so make his defeat as crushing as possible. In drawing the color line at the County Hospital against the women of our race, he has inflicted an injury from which it will take years for the race to recover.

Mr. E. D. Goode, his opponent, is a man of the people, and believes that the nurse training school of the County Hospital holds the same relation to the people as does the public schools. Let every Negro in the 5th district vote for Mr. E. D. Goode and send Pridham to private life.

THE BIG STICK AFTER THE NEGRO

True to their brutal instincts, the Lissner-Johnson - Roosevelt bunch have sent Negroes out whose duty is to call at the home of every Negro and demand his name and how he is going to vote. Every Negro, male or female, who refuses to give his or her name, is threatened by being given to understand that he or she will be starved out. That if they do not vote for Roosevelt they will be blacklisted. Was there ever worse slavery? Vote against the whole foul brood and free yourselves.

MR. HENRY H. LYON

See to it that your friends and every member of your family vote for him.

What we have said of Judge Rives is equally true of Judge McCormick. The record he has made is the strongest argument in favor of his re-election. His re-election, which is certain, means that the criminal department of the Superior Court, over which he presides, is to be conducted for the next six years as in the past—in the interest of law and order. Endorse him with your vote and ask your neighbor to do the same thing.

**VOTE AGAINST NORTON
EARLY AND OFTEN**

We especially urge the colored voters of the Second Supervisorial district to go to the polls early on Nov. 5th, and cast their solid vote against R. H. Norton, the Bull Moose candidate for Supervisor. Mr. Norton is a Lissner-Pridham candidate and if elected will be used against any advancement of the Negro. Mr. E. B. Hunt, Socialist candidate in the Second district, will, if elected, see to it that every voter, without regard to race or creed, gets a square deal. Mr. Hunt, like the Socialist Party, knows neither race nor color; but look upon all as citizens of the United States. The fact that the Socialist Party nominated a colored man for councilman and gave him 40,000 votes shows their friendship for the Negroes. Vote early and solid for E. B. Hunt for Supervisor Second District.

KIRK FOR CONGRESS

Thomas H. Kirk is the Democratic candidate for Congress from the Ninth District. He is a man of scholarly attainments but he is also a practical man.
