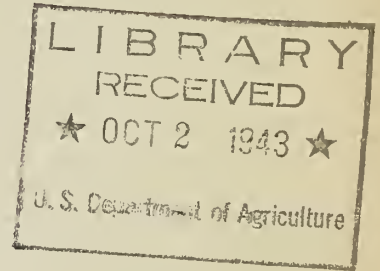

CIRCULATION PRIVILEGES AND RESTRICTIONS

1. The current issue of the periodicals which are starred in the list will remain in the Library reading room for a period of one week. These periodicals may be borrowed for overnight and week-end use.

2. All indexes, abstract services, government manuals, etc., will be reserved for reference use in the Library only.

3. Certain other periodicals, designated by technical divisions as necessary for continuous reference will be reserved for use in the Library or for circulation in Little Rock only.

4. Other periodicals can be circulated On Request to regional and field offices. They will be routed in the order in which requests are received by the Library, except that priority will be given to regional divisions having a primary interest in the subject matter.

5. A time limit of three days will be set on circulation to each regional office division and of five days to each field office, except where the request list is very short, or when the subject matter is of primary interest to only one or two divisions or offices, in which cases arrangements may be made for a longer loan period.

6. Since circulation to field offices will not begin until circulation to regional offices is completed, it is of the utmost importance that routing be kept definitely to schedule. Even so, it will often be several weeks after date of issue before a requested periodical can be expected to reach field offices.

7. If the request list for any periodical becomes too long, the list will be closed and subsequent requests held on a waiting list to replace cancellations on the active list.

8. It is hoped that staff members of the agencies located in the Donaghey Trust Building and the Donaghey Building will use the current issues of periodicals held in the Library reading room whenever possible, so that some preference in circulation may be given to the agencies located at a distance from Library.

The Librarian will notify you regularly during the week a periodical in which you are interested is in the reading room. You will then have opportunity to see it more promptly than if you wait for it to be routed to you. At the same time you will speed its circulation to others.

In asking to see periodicals regularly, therefore, please indicate whether you prefer notification or circulation.

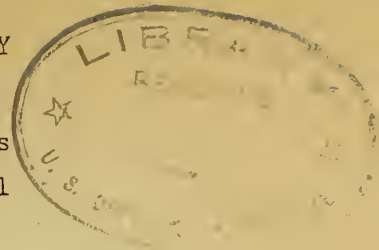

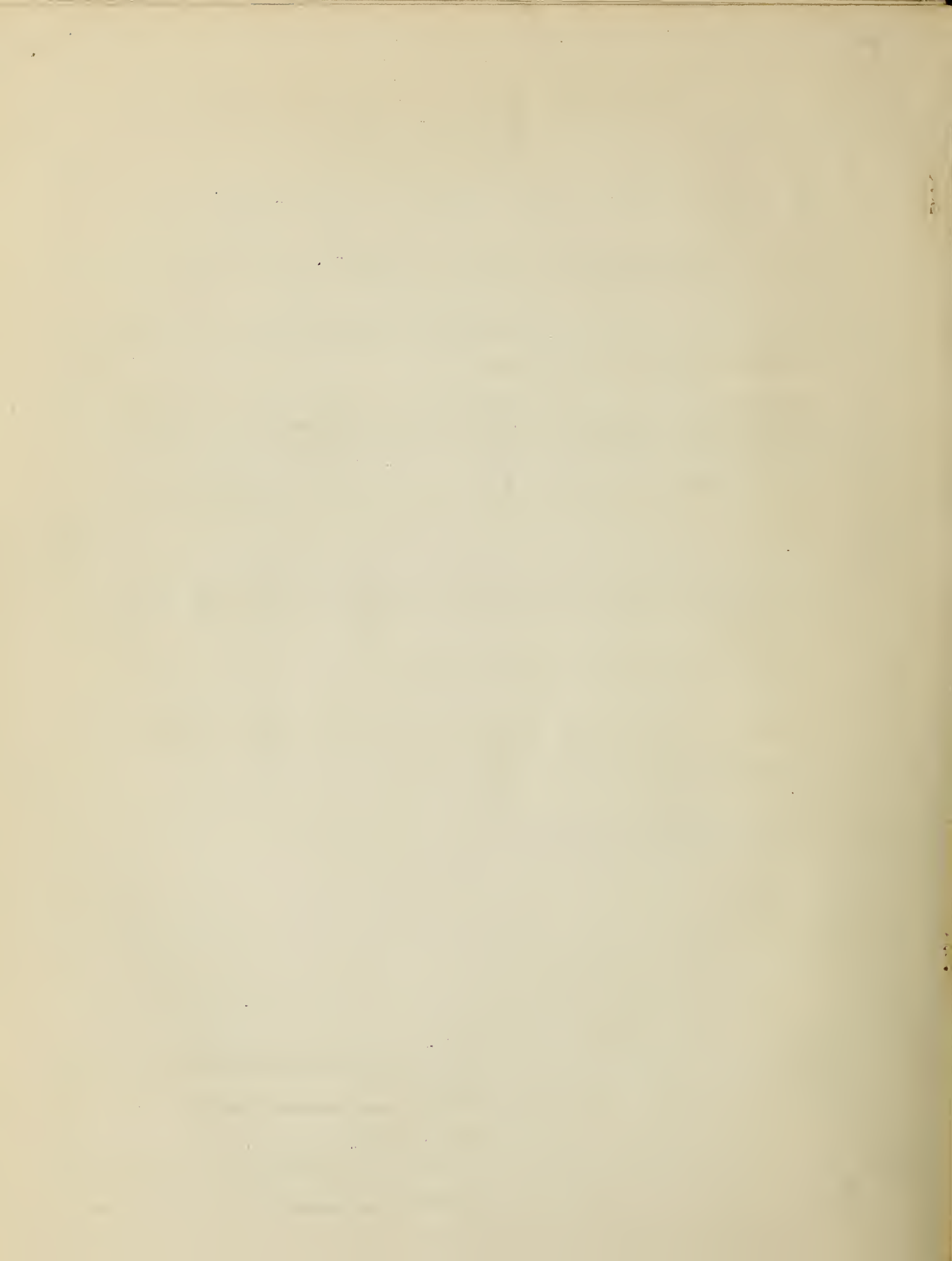

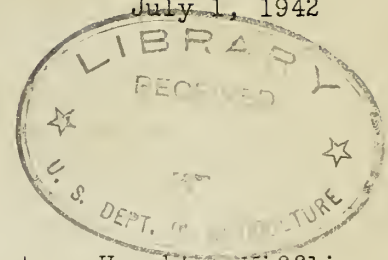

Twenty-four introductory plus twenty-five concluding pages develop a comprehensive view of both farm and nonfarm migration within our Nation. They also afford friendly appraisal of Soil Conservation and of Farm Security activities, and make challenging proposals concerning the future of the family-size farm. By way of illustration, wage and hour regulations applying to only the one and one-half percent of farms that employ four or more hired hands at one time would protect one-third of all farm laborers and at the same time ease the competitive impact of industrial farming upon family farming. Current budget experiences emphasize the argument of universal susceptibility to migrancy. The facts and proposals presented should prove sufficiently disturbing to aid the open minded toward fruitful thinking on issues that promise to persist until adequately understood and properly treated.

Intervening discussion affords ready selection of emphasis to the leisurely reader. Chapters on cotton, tractors, erosion, seafaring, and unemployment discuss causes of migration. "Keep moving" regulations, types of migrant employment in the East, the Midland and the Westland, inclusion of one time Rotarians in the migrating stream, the difficulty of extrication from a wandering career, and ineffectiveness of a defense industry program by way of solution combine to trace "the trail to journey's end." Such special problems as "settlement", health, housing, education, and liberty receive separate treatment.

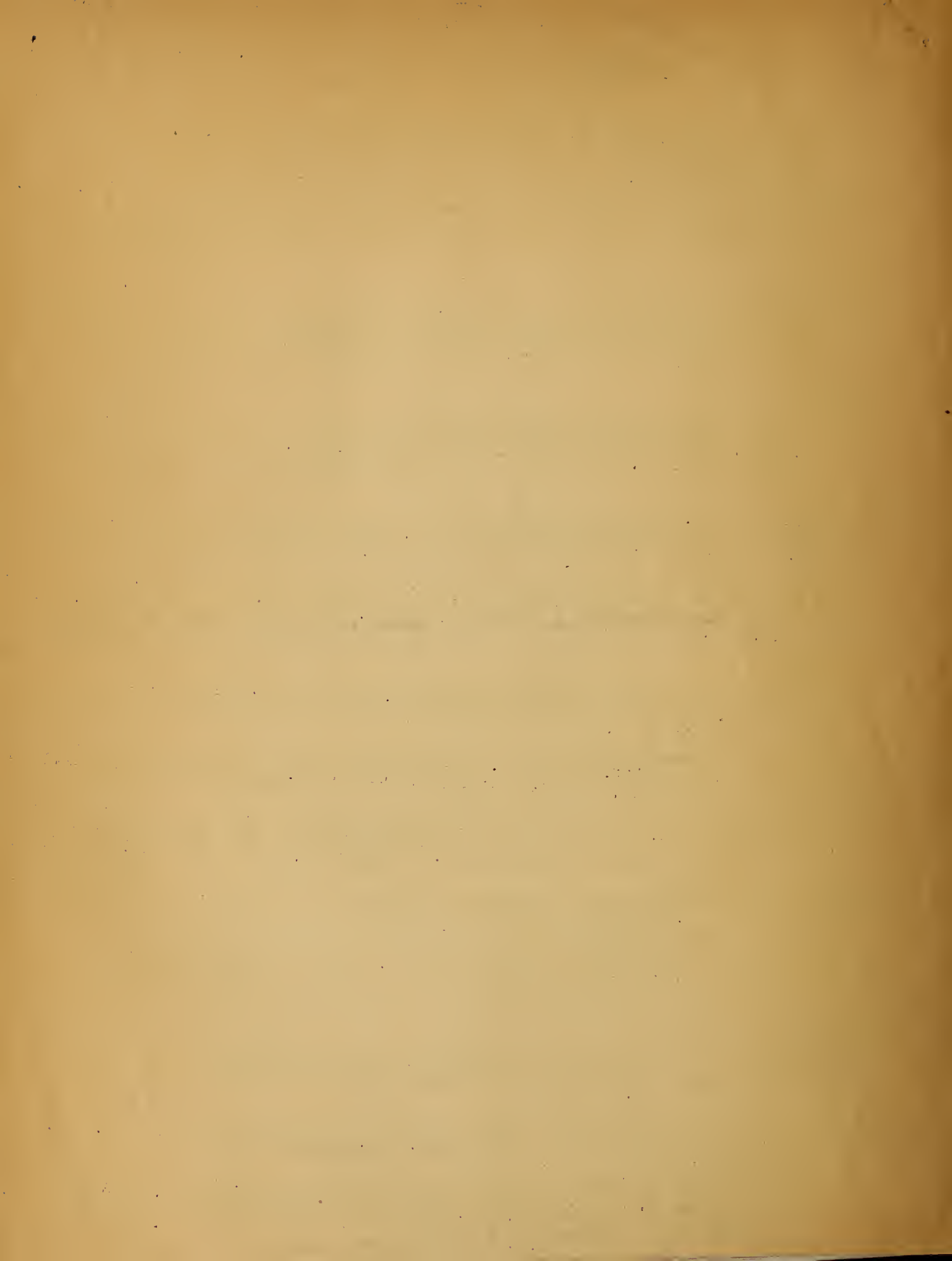
