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Wth the tyme that the grete & myghty toure of babylone was bylded men haue spoken with dyuerse tonges. In suche wyse that dyuerse men be strange to other and vnderstode not others speche. Speche is not knowen but yf it be lerned. comyn lernynge of speche is by heryng / & so alwaye he that is deaf is alwaye dombe / for he maye not here speche for to lerne. So men of fer countrees and londes that haue dyuerse speches yef neyther of hem haue lerned others langage. nether of of hem wote what other meneth / though they mete and haue grete nede of informacyon and of looz in talkyng & of speche be the nede neuer soo grete neyther of hem vnderstondeth others speche no more than gaglyng of gees. for Jangle þ one neuer soo fast that other is neuer the wyler / though he shrewe hym in stede of good morowe. This is a grete myschyfe that foloweth now men kynde. But god of his mercy & grace hath ordeyned double remedye. One is that somme may lerneth and knoweth many dyuerse speches. And bytwene strange men of the whiche neyther vnderstandeth others speche. Suche a man may be meane and tell eyther what other wyll meane. That other remedye is / that one langage is lerned vled and knowen in many nacjons and londes. And soo latyn is lorned knowen and vled speyally on this halfe grece in alle the nacjons & londes of Europe. Therfore clerkis of her goodnes and curtosye make and wyrtyn theyr bokes in

latyn. for her wyrtynge & bokes sholde be vnderstode in dyuerse nacjons and londes. ¶ And soo Ranulphus monke of Chestre wrote in latyn his bokes of Cronycles that descrypeth the worlde aboute in lengthe and in brede. And maketh mencyon & mynde of doynge and dedes of meruayles and of wondres. and rekeneth the yeres to his last dayes / fro the fyrste mahyng of heuen and of erthe. And soo there in is grete and noble Informatyon & looze to hem that can there in rede and vnderstande. ¶ Therfore I wolde haue these bokes of Cronycles translated out of Latyn in to Englyshe / for the moo men sholde hem vnderstande & haue therof conynng informacō & loze. ¶ The clerke answereth. Bokes of cronycles be wryten in latyn. And latyn is vled & vnderstanden on this halfe grece in alle the nacjons and londes of Europa. ¶ And comynly Englyshe is not soo wyde vnderstode vled ne knowen. And thenglyshe translacōn sholde no man vnderstande but Englyshe men allone. Thenne how sholde the moo men vnderstode the Cronycles though they were translated oute of latyn that is is soo wyde vled & knowen. in to Englyshe that is not vled & knowen but of englyshe men allone. The Lorde ¶ This questyon and doubt is ealy to asloyle. ¶ For yf these Cronycles were translated oute of Latyn in to Englyshe / thenne by þ soo many the moo men sholde vnderstande hem. as vnderstode englyshe & no latyn. ¶ The clerke. ye can speke rede & vnderstande latyn / theñe it nedeth not to haue suche an englyshe

trallacōy ¶ The lord ¶ I denye this argumēt. for though I can speke rede & vnderstande latyn / there is moche latyn in these bookes of Cronycles þ̄ I can not vnderstande / neyther thou without studyng auplement and lohyng of other bokes. ¶ Also though it were not nedefull for me / it is nedefull for other men that vnderstande no latyn. ¶ The clerke. ¶ Men that vnderstande noo latyn maye lerne & vnderstande. ¶ The lord. ¶ Not all for some maye not for other maner belynesse. Some for olde / som efor de faute of wytte / some for defaute of catell other of frendes to fynde hem to scole / & some for other dyuerse defautes & lettes. ¶ The clerke. ¶ Hit nedeth not that alle suche knowe the Cronycles ¶ The lord. ¶ Speke not to straptly of thynge that nedeth. for straptly to speke of chynge that nedeth oonly thynge that is & maye not fayle nedeth to be. And so it nedeth that god be / for god is & maye not faylle. And soo for to speke no man nedeth for to knowe the Cronycles. for it myght & maye be that no man hem knoweth. Other wyle to speke of thynge that nedeth / somwhat nedeth for to susteyne or to haue other thynge therby. And so mete & dynke nedeth for the hepyng & susteynaunce of lyfe And so for to speke noo man nedeth for to knowe the Cronycles. But in the thyrde maner to speke of thynge that nedeth / alle that is proufutable nedeth. & so for to speke all men nedeth to knowe the cronycles. ¶ The clerk ¶ Thenne they that vnderstande no latyn maye are & be enformed and I taught of hem that vnderstāde latyn

¶ The lord. ¶ Thou spekest wonderly / for the lewde man wote not what he sholde are / & namely of lore of dedes that come neuer in his mynde ner wote of whom compny he holde are. Also not all men that vnderstande latyn haue suche bokes tenfor me lewde men also some conney not & some maye not haue whyle / & so it nedeth to haue an englyshe translacion. ¶ The clerke. ¶ The latyn is bothe good & fayr. therfor it nedeth not to haue an Englyshe translacion. ¶ The lord ¶ This reison is worthy to be plunged in a pludde and lede in powder of leuones & of shame. ¶ It myght well be þ̄ thou makest oonly in myrthe & in game. ¶ The clerke. ¶ The reasion must stande but it be allopylled. ¶ The lord. ¶ A blere eyed man but he were all blynde of wytte myght see the solucion of this reasion And though he were blynde he myghte grope the solucion. But yf his feeslyng hym faylled. for yf this reasion were ought worthe / by suche maner arguyng me myght proue þ̄ the thre score and ten Interpretours & aquyla Symachus Theodocion and Origenes were lewdly occupyed whan they translated holy wytte oute of hebrewes in to grue / and also that Saynte Iherom was lewdly occupyed whan he translated holy wytte out of hebrewes in to latyn. for the hebrewes is bothe good and fayr / and I wytte by Inspracion of the holy goost. And alle these for her translacions ben hyely preyled of alle holy chirche : Thenne the forsayd lewde reasion is worthy to be powdred / leyed a water & plouled. Also holy wytte in latyn

is bothe good and fayr. And yet for to make a sermon of holy wytte alle in latyn to men that can Englyshe and noo latyn/it were a lewde dede/for they be neuer the wyser. for the latyn but it be tolde hem in Englyshe what it is to mene. ¶ And it may not be tolde in englyshe what the latyn is to mene without translacion out of latyn in to englyshe. Thenne it nedeth to haue an englyshe translacion/ and for to kepe it in mynde that it be not foryetē it is better that suche a translacion be made & wyrtten than sayd & not wyrtten/and soo this forsayd lewde reasoun sholde mene no man that hath ony wytte to leue the mahynge of Englyshe translacion. ¶ The clerke. ¶ A grete dele of the le bokes stondeth moche by holy wyrtte/by holy doctours/and by phylosophy/thenne these bookes sholde not be translated in to englyshe. ¶ The lord. ¶ It is wonder that thou makest soo febell argumentes and haste goon soo longe to scole. Aristotles bokes & other bokes also of logyke & of phylosophye were translated out of grue in to latyn. ¶ Also atte prayeng of kyng Charles Johan Scot translated denys bokes out of grue in to latyn/& thenne out of latyn in to frenshe/thenne what hath englyshe trespassed that it myght not be translated in to Englyshe. ¶ Also kyng Alured that founded the vniuersyte of Drenford translated the beste lawes in to Englyshe tonge. And a grete dele of the psalter out of latyn in to Englyshe. And caused Wyrtfryth bysshop of wyrcetre to translate saynt Gregories bokes the Dyalo

gues out of latyn in to Saxons. ¶ Also Cedmon of whytby was enspired of the holy goost and made wonderpoylyes in to englyshe nyghe of all the storpes of holy wyrtte. ¶ Also the holy man Beda translated saynt Johans gospell out of latyn in to englyshe. ¶ Also thou wotest where the Apocalyps is wyrtten in the walles and roof of a chappell bothe in latyn and in frenshe. ¶ Also the gospell and prophecye and the right fayth of holy chirche muste be taught & preched to englyshe men that can noo latyn. Thene the gospell & prophecye & the right fayth of holy chirche muste be tolde hem in englyshe / and that is not done but by englyshe translacion for suche englyshe prechynge is very translacion.& suche englyshe prechynge is good & nedefull. thene englyshe translacion is good & nedefull. ¶ The clerke. ¶ yf a translacion were made þ myght be amended in ony popnt. Some men it wolde blame. ¶ The lord. ¶ yf men blame þ is not worthy to be blamed/thenne they ben to blame. Clerkes knowe well ynough þ no synfull man dothe soo well that it ne myght do better/ne make so good a translacion þ he ne myght be better. Therefore Digenes made two translacions. And Iherom translated thyes the psalter. I desyre not translacion of these the best þ myght be for þ we re an ydle desyre for ony man that is now a lyue. But I wolde haue a skylfull translacion that myght be knowe and vnderstonden. ¶ The clerke ¶ Whether is pou leuer haue a translacion of the Cronycles in Ryme or in prose. ¶ The lord. ¶ In prose.

for comynly poble is more clere than
 ryme / more easy and more playne to
 knowe & vnderstande. ¶ The clerke
 ¶ Theñe god graunte vs grace rede-
 ly to gygne/wypte & wysdome wyle-
 ly to worche. Hyght & mynde of righ-
 te menyng to make tranllacion trul-
 ty & trewe. Pleasyng to the Trynyte
 thre perlones & one god in mageste/
 that euer was & euer shall be & made
 heuen & erthe & lyght for to shyne / &
 departed light & derkenes. And cal-
 led lyght daye & derknes nyght/and
 soo was made euctyde & morowe ty-
 de one daye/that had nou morowe ty-
 de. ¶ The seconde daye he made the

 glorpyous & blyssfull/& taught his dis-

 ¶ Johan Treuysa your prest and
 bedeman obedyent & buron to wer-
 ke your wylle/halde in herte/thenke
 in thought & mene in mynde your ne-
 defull menyng & speche that ye spake
 & sayde that ye wolde haue englyshe
 tranllacion of Ranulphus of chestres
 boke of Cronycles. Therefore I wyll
 fonde to take that trauayll & make
 englyshe tranllacion of the same bo-
 kes as god graunteth me grace. for
 blame of bakbyters wyll I not blyss-
 ne / for enuye of enemyes / for euyl
 spytynge & speche of euyl spekers wyll
 I not leue to doo this dede / for tra-
 uayll wyll I not spare. Comforte I

haue in medefull makyng & plecyng to god & in knowynge that I wote þ it is your wyll. for to make this tralacion clere & playne to be knowen & vnderstondey. In some place I shall lette worde for worde & actyf for actyf & passyf for passyf arowe right as it stondeth without chaügyng of the ordre of wordes. But in some place I must chaüge the ordre of wordes and lette actyf for passyf & ayenwarde / & in some place I must lette a reison for a worde / & telle what it meneth. But for all suche chaügyng the menynge shall stande & not be chaunged. But some wordes & names of couñtres / of londes / of cytees / of waters / of ryuers of montayns & hylles / of persones & of places must be lette and stande for hem self in her owne kynde / as Alya. Europa Assyca and Syrya Mount Athlas Syna & Dieb Marach Jordan and Arnon Bethleem Nazareth Jherusalem & Damalcus Hanibal Ralyn Alluerus & Cyrus & many such wordes & names / yf ony man make of these boke of Cronycles a better englyshe translacion & more proufytable god do him mede. And by cause ye make me do this medefull dede he that quyteth all good dedes quyte your mede in þ blysse of heuen in welthe & lyhyng with all the holy sayntes of mankynde & the nyne ordres of angelys. As angels. archangels. pryncypales. potestates. virtutes. dominaciones. Trones. cherubyn & seraphyn to see god in his blyssfull face in Joye without ony ende Amen.

After solempne & wysse wryters of Arte & of scyence that had swetenes & lyhyng alle her lyfe tyme to stude & to trauaylle about connyng & knowleche of kynedly thynges & about sobrenes & redynes of the wes. they ben worthy to ben hyely prepsed / as though it were puttyng & medlyng togyder profyte and swetenes. for they wrote & lette to vs wryten meruaylles & wondres / grete beryng out & dedes of our forn faders of skalworth. Ryght wysse & worthy & of dyuerse maner men that were in olde tyme. ¶ For in the makynge of boke of stoyes that ben to vs sente & byquethen by grete belynesse of the wryters of Cronycles blasen and shynen clerely the right rewle of thewes. Ensample of lyhyng / knowynge of goodnes / the metyng of the thre wayes of the vertues of dyuynyte / & the metyng of the four wayes of the four pryncypal vertues of thewes of Royale clotyng. Of the whiche thynges our lityll connyng myght not take knowleche ne folowe the fourth / but belynes of wryters to our vnconnyng hadde shadde and stremed mynde of Auncient & olde dedes. for why shotte lyf dull wytte slowe vnderstandynge & ydell occupacions lete vs to knowe many thynges foryetynnes alwaye lyhyng the crafte of a stepdame is enemye of mynde. ¶ Also now in our tyme. Arte Scyence and lawe were losse. Ensample of noble dedes

were not knowne. Nobylte and fayre maner of spekyng were alle loste. But the mercy of God almyghty hadde ordeyned lettres and wrytynge in remedye of the vnperfychtynesse of mankynde. I praye you / who sholde knowe Emperours / wondres of the Phyllosophers / or elles folowe the Apostles. But theyr noble dedes and theyr wonder werkes were not wrytten in hystories and soo kepte in mynde. Who sholde knowe Lucyllū but Seneca in his Epytles hadde wrytten his dedes. Wrytynge of Poetes is more worth to praysyng of emperours than alle the welche of this worlde and Rychesses that they wold whyle they were a lyue. For storye is wrytynesse of tyme. Mynde of lyfe. A Hellagper of oldenesse / storye woldeth passyng doynges / storye putteth forth her professoures. Dedes that wolde be loste storye reneweth. Dedes that wolde flee out of mynde. Storye calleth agayne dedes that wolde dye. Storye kepeth hem for euermore. Wherefore amonge other noble traualours of the .iii. pathes arne molte worthy to ben praysed fayre flourysshers and embelysshers of wordes and of metre / that haue of theyr traualle goten grete prys and laude / we maye not full prayse hem that in hystories meten and descriuen alle the worlde wyde. But withoute onny drede they shall receyue theyr mede of hym that rewardeth and quyteth alle them that well werke. ¶ By the worthynesse and enlample of noble wryters that herto fore haue wrytten not boostynge of myne owne dedes ner scornynge / ne blas-

myng other mannes dedes. I haue cast and ordeyned as I maye to make and to wryte a treatyse that I haue gadred oute of dyuerse bookes of the estate of the Honde of Brytayne / otherwyle called Englonde vnto the knowleche of hem that shall come after vs. Thenne specyall lordes that knewe myne entente / and hadde desyre to knowe grete mennes dedes prayed me besely / that I sholde also wryte the famous hystories / and acounte the yeres from the begynnyng of the worlde vnto our tyme. ¶ Tho toke I hede that this mater as Laborintus Dedalus house hathe many halles and hurnes wonderfull wayes wyndynge and wrynklynge that wyll not lyghtely be opened and shewed. He shamed and drede to take on me to graunte soo ferefull a boone. For ydenesse and slouthe lette grete werkes that men wolde wryche. My wytte is full lypell to vnynde the wrappynge of soo wonderfull werkes. The mater is large. Wryters therein ben many and grete. Also for the fulnesse thereof men ben alle sadde and take the lasse hede and lyghtely wolde fynde fawte on this symple werke. And as Enemys whette theyr tonges and bende theyr browes. Of suche men speketh Gregorius Nazauzenus that wyll lyghtely blame defawtes of other men / and not folowe soo lyghtly goodnes. Alle this I hadde in mynde. And also I knewe myn owne pouerte and shame and drede after soo noble spears that sowned as trompes to put forth myn barayne speche hool and

Inochynge as who reacheth by mulber-
ryes and scructh lecherous men that
lyueth in lyhyng with soure grapes.
¶ For ye after the labour of Hercules
and after the fyrst tourneyes stryfe &
Foules of Olymppe a Ppymeye bul
keth hym to bataylle & arapeth hym
to fyght. Who myght chenne leue to
lawhe. Also who wolde shouto to scor-
ne yf I pype with an ooten reed / and
vnhyghte so noble a mater with mo-
wynge gruntyng and whytlyng af-
ter soo noble spekars that sowned at
the beste. And of hem fayre facounde
and resonable speche flowed and stre-
med alle her lyfe tyme. But I haue
well in mynde what Booz sayde to
Ruth that was shamefast / and lees-
se by the eres after his Rypmen.
He sayde noo man shall wrathe the.
And to his rypmen he sayde. Yf the
wyl with you Rype / forbode you
her not. And her for to leele or gley-
ne noo man shall lette. ¶ The Poes-
te also Mantuanus Maro Virgili-
us sayth Ethicoꝝ libro decimo. And
Diacius as sayth Hugucio Pylanus
in diuinacionibus iuis Capitulo per-
uiso. ¶ Whan Enemys despyled
Diacius And bare hym on honde
that he hadde taken somme of Ho-
meres Verlis / and medled amonge
his and called hym a gaderer of ol-
de wryttinges. He answereth and
sayde it were ryght grete strengthe
to wreste a maas ouer of Hercules
honde. Therefore I praye you that
noo man blame me / though I fa-
re as sonde and allhes. for though
they be dym and foule hem selfe /
they clenle other thynges and make
thyne full bryghte. And many oꝝ

ther thynges that haue not in hem
selfe yet gyuen to other. ¶ Soo say-
the the Poete Satiricus. I fare as a
whelstone that maketh yron sharpe
and kene. ¶ Item Gregorius in
suo Pastozan sayth. I haue pepnt-
ted a well fayre may. And am my
selfe a foule pepntoure. Therefore I
truete on that Charyte that Grego-
rye speketh of in his Omelye / that
wytte vertues and strength that vn-
connyng denyeth. And aunte me
in to Repyng that is full of trauayll
and wakyng / in caas delpysed of
enypous men and proude. And yet
I hope it shall be prouffyttable to
good studycis and meke. I shall
entre in to the teldes of oure for-
faders. And folowe the Rypmen /
yet yf I maye in ony wyle leele and
gadre somme what of the cormmes
that fallen from Lordes bordes that
somme tyme were rulsylled and les-
te theyr relect to her childeren. And
also yf I myght gadre ony scrappes
of the releef of the .xii. hypes or lepes
And somme what putto and entrea-
ce wryttinge of Autours as a dwerf
syttyng on a geants necke / whertho-
ugh yonglynges mowe be brought
to loore. And gretter men to vse and
belynes lette / mowe be enfourmed
& taught by this short treatysle / that
haue not seen the grete volumes and
large that ben of storpes wryten.
Not subtylte of sentence / ne fayre
flourysshynge of wordes. But swes-
tenes of deuocion of the maters that
Regne in this kooke. In the whi-
che boke and treatysle well nyghe all
the Problemes and questyons of the
wylest men ben planted. Also mas

ny thynges that ben not wryten in other bookes. I haue gadred of the compne as though it were of a stoye and wryten in this treatyse/by cause men sholde knowe hem after our tyme. for somdele by malyce of enemyes/somdele by the slouthe of wryters knowleche of grete dedes is soonynghe losse and foryeten/that scarcely bare names of places we haue not in mynde. Though feynnyng and lawes of mysbyleued and lawles men. And wondres and meruaylles of dyuerse countrees and londes ben plantid in this booke / suche seruen and is good to be knowen of Crysten men. **C**hirgyle sought golde of wytte and wysedome in the fenue of Ennii the Poete. **A**nd the childeren of Israhell in her goynge in to the londe of byphelle spoyled the Egyptians that is in other bookes wryten well wyde and parcelmele plantid. Here is putte togyder myrthe to sadnes / and hethen to Crysten people eueryche amonge other that straunge stoyes ben soo abregged / shorted and lengthed / that the hystoie is hole and sothnes not chaunged. Neuerthelesse more certayne somme is holden than other. **F**or Augustinus de ciuitate dei sayth. We sholde trowe and worshyppe the myracles of god / and not hem dyspreue by dysputacion / wondres ben not alle to be vntrowed. for somme telle many wondres whiche thou shalte fynde that thou woldeste not byleue. And yet they ben full soth kynde may not do ayenst god lord of kynde Also of many thynges þe semy full soth. Ne theles skylfully it is to be doubte. **P**lydor⁹ Echi. xv. sayth. **P**f

reason is vncertayn of the byldyng of Rome. what wond though men be vncertayn of þe byldyng of other Cyties & townes. wherfore we shal not blame makers & wryters of hystories that dyuersely speken and wryten. for longe passyng of tyme and olde of dedes make hem vnkowen and wryters to erre. Therfore Iherome sayth it is semely to byleue theyr sawes that gaynlape not our byleue ne sothnes that is knowen/wherfore in the wrytyng of this hystoie. I take not vpon me to afferme for trouthe all that I wryte / but suche as I haue seyn and redde in dyuerse bookes. I gadre & wryte without enuye and compny to other men. **F**or the Apostle sayth. Not all that is wryten is sothe. But he sayth all that is wryten is wryten for our doctryne & loore. And though I take it of other mennes. I calle this stoye myn. And for that I wryte otherwhyles myn owne wordes & sentence of olde men. The Auctours that I in the fyrst begynnnyng of this booke take for shelde and defence me for to saue and kepe ayenst enemyes that me wolde despise strangely and blame. fyrste for my selfe and for myn owne name I wryte this lettre. **R.** **T**here I wryte and reherse the names of Auctours / of whiche this Cronycle is specpall gadred and drawen. **J**osephus Iudeorum hystoric⁹ in signis qui ab inicio seculi vsqz ad decimumquartum annum Domitiani libros antiquitatum viginti nec non et de subuersione ciuitatis Iherosolime gentis qz sue captiuitate septem conscripsit. **E**gesippus de excidio urbis quem transtulit Ambrosi⁹

This werke I departe and dele in seuen bookes. ¶ The fyrste booke descriueth places contrees and londes and all the wyde worlde. The other sixe bookes by the nombre of the lixe ages that conteyneth berynges and dedes from the begynnynge of the worlde vnto oure tyme. Methelles in the fyrste booke of this werke as who descriueth generall comyn and speccial Mappa mundi is portrayed & peynted therin / whiche is the clothe that the shappe of the wyde worlde is peynted Inne. Thenne in his chyet partes the worlde is deled. And for this storpe is trauallyd by cause of Britayne euery pynce & londe is descri

ued vntyll we come to brytayne laste of all as moost specyall. And there in ben conteyned fyfteen chapitres ne defull to the knowleche of the Floude of Brytayne as though it were an Inbryngynge to gretter knowleche in other bookes that foloweth / that who that maye not come to full knowleche of the full storie maye by suche foyledynge haue lykynge to leue shrewdenes and synne. ¶ The seconde booke auentureth for to telle berynge and dedes with descripcion of the lasse worlde. And for the ages of the worlde be not alle euen and of berynge and of dedes / and euery booke is euen and conteyneth lyke. There fore the seconde booke conteyneth the berynge and dedes of the foure ages fro the makynge of oure forsmest fader to the biennynge of the Temple of Jewes. ¶ The thrydde booke from the Tranmygracion of the people to the comynge of Cryste. ¶ The fourthe fro Cryste to the comynge of the Saxones. ¶ The fyfth from y^e Saxones to y^e Danes. ¶ The sixthe from y^e Danes to the Normas ¶ The seuenthe from the Normans to our tyme that is vnder the regne of kyng Edward the thrydde after the conquest. And so by the propherye of Vlaxe this grete storie is departed in vii. stremes so y^e bothe holed & shoood goddes people maye passe therby.

Touchynge the seconde take hede of two estates. One fro the begynnynge of the worlde to Cryste / that is called the state of mylgyng. The seconde state fro Cryste to the worlde ende / that is named y^e state of grace & of mercy. for the thrydde take hede of thre tymes. The fyrst was in the fyrst age vnder the lawe of kynde comyn to all men. The seconde in the seconde age was the lyuyng of mylbleued men / whan maymetre began in Nynus tyme kyng of Nynue. One the Romayns. Willelmus

tificis ſayth / that Marianus ſcotus /
and the monke pyloned in Hagun /
cia a towne of almayn about the ye /
re of grace a thouland thre ſcore and
xvi. looked beſely in bokes and acoun /
ted and fonde that Dyonisius exigū
accordeth not with the Goſpell in a /
countynge of yeres. for this ſcot Ma /
rianus accounted alle the yeres from
the begynnynge of the worlde and
putte to .xxii. yere that lacked of De
nys acountes. And wrote a grete Cro
nycle and an huge / the whiche book
Robert byſſhop of herforde deflored /
and that for it is that the comyn cro
nycles that foloweden Denys ſayl /
led all dawe. for Iherome in transla
tyng the Cronycle of Eulebii ſayth
that yeres lacke bytwene Cryſtis pal
ſyon and Veſpaſianus tyme. And al /
ſo .xii. yeres lacke aboute Decius ce /
ſaris tyme as it is ſhewed in the .vi.
age. This errour befallerh for dawes
and monethes were unrekened that
kyngeſ regned ouer full yeres. Alſo

¶ The brede of þe erthe fro the southe to the north / that is from the clyf of Ocean in Etyopia the londe of blake men to the mouth of the ryuer of Chanay is well nyghe haluendele lasse than the lengthe / & conteyneth .liiii. Therefore they that acounte Affryca the thyrde parte acounte not by space and mesure of lengthe and brede. But by dyuerse dysposicions better and worse and departe Affryca fro Europa and Asya as a soie membre þ is not fro membrys that ben hole and sounde & in good poynt at the best. Also Affryca in his kynde hath lasse space. And for the sturenes of heuen it hath the more wyldernes. And though Affryca be lpyll. it hath more wyldernes and waste londe / for grete brennyng of the hete of the sonne. Thenne Europa for all the chele

and grete colde that is therein. for why all that lyueth & groweth maye better endure with colde than with hete. But mesure ruleth bothe. ¶ Pleni⁹ libro. vi. Therefore it is that Europa nouryssheth and byngeth forth fayr men larger and gretter of body myghter of strengthe / hardyer and bolder of herte and fayrer of shappe than Affryca. for the sonne bene alwaye abydeeth vpon the men of affryca / and draweth out the humours & maketh hem short of bodyes / blacke of skyn / cryple of here. And by drawing out of spirites maketh hem coward of herte. The contrarype is of northeren men. In the colde without stoppeth smale holes and porus / and holdeth the hete within / & so maketh hem fatter gretter & whytter within / & so hardyer & bolder of herte.

The mouth & see hath two names and is called Gaditanus and Athlanticus also. Also euery draught is full drawe in the space of. xxviii. thousand pace/ the londe is drye withoute socour. and addres and serpentes falleth cherto / soo that but it be wynter there maye noo may come thereinne. ¶ R. Marcianus sayth that the yates of Caspii be shette with yron barres and in spryngyng tyme faste barred for serpentes and adderes. And the mayster of hystories sayth that atte the prayers of kyng Alexander the hylles of Caspii were closed and Joyned toggydes. Paul⁹ in hystoria long libro primo. There ben many swole/ wynges and whyrlynges of watter by the see bynkes tweyne ben in the see of myddell erthe bytwene Italpe and the Flonde Sicilia / thylke two swolowes ben called scylla and carybdys/ of the whiche speketh Virgyle & sayth Scilla is peryllous in the rightsyde/ and Carybdys in the lyfte syde. Other swolowes and perylls of water ben in Ocean. One is in the weste clyue of Bytayne and is called the nauell of the see / the other

is bytwene Bytayne & Gallicia / & it is sayd that these swolowes twyes in the nyght & dawe swoloweth in streemes & flodes & caste hem vp agayn. Also it draweth in shypes & casteth hem agayn as swyftely as an arowe to a mans syght.

The thyrde axeth what countree & place is paradyle in erthe. for the fyrst four maner wytnesses we haue that paradyle is in erthe / fyrst stoyres that lychened Sodome er it were ouertourned to paradyle. The seconde wytnes is of hem that assayed / wrote & sayd that they had seen that place. The thyrde wytnes ben the four Ryuers that renne out of paradyle / for the hede of thylke ryuers ben not founden in see ne in freshe water ne in londe that men dwell Inne / though kynges of Egypte & many other trauaylled wel ofte & lought there after. ¶ Therfor Plydor⁹ . xiii. Ethi. sayth / that Iherome toke hede that other vnderston dyng behoueth of the ryuers of paradyle than auctours wryten ¶ Also Basilus in exameron . Plydor⁹ Ethi. libro. xiiii. and Josephus libro primo layen that waters fallyng of the hyghest hylle of paradyle maken a grete ponde / and out of that ponde as it

were a welle the four Ryuers spryngen. ¶ Petrus caplo. xiiii. Of the whiche four Ryuers the fyrst is Phylson / & is to menyng full weryng of plente That Ryuer Phylson palleth in to Inde & draweth with hem golden grauell. Phylson hath another name and is called Ganges of a kyngde of Inde whiche was named Gangarius / but ganges is to saye / felawshyp & companye / for it recepueth .x. grete Ryuers that rennen therto . The seconde is called Gyon & Nylus also / & gooth aboute Ethiopia & Egypte. The thyrde is Tygris / & as Josephus sayth dyglath also h is to saye sharpe / for it is swyfte as Tygris / whiche is a right swyfte beest / & Tygris palleth towarde Assyria that londe. ¶ Plydorus libro. xiii. The moost certayne auctour Salust⁹ sayth that there cometh a welle out of Teranes the hylles of Armenye & sprygeth out of the fote of the hylle that is called Cancaus / & that welle is the hede of tweyne ryuers / of Tygris & of Eufrates / the whiche two Ryuers somtyme ben departed a sonder & somtyme medlyd toggyders / & of tyme they ben swolowed in to the erthe / and after spryngen vp agayn. And longe after goon about Mesopotania that londe & downwarde in to yreed see. ¶ And though men rede in boke that Nylus cometh out of paradyle. Yet some men affermen & saye h Nylus spryngeth in the weste syde of the londe of Ethiopia not fer fro the hylle that is named Athlas / & gooth about Ethiopia & downwarde by Egypte. Seche the properte of Nylus in the chapitre Egyptus. The fourth wytnesse and

proof that suche a place is in erthe that is called paradyle/is olde fame and longe durynge/for men shall by leue olde fame that is not withsayde But fame of Paradyle hath endured without ganyng sixe thousand yere & more. for fro the begynnyng of the worlde vnto our dayes it hath endured. And fame that is falle endureth not so longe / for it falleth out of mynde or is dyscreued by sothnesse knowen. ¶ Of the seconde questyon that axeth in whiche syde of the worlde and in what place paradyle sholde be. Though that short wytted men and lypyll of assaye saye that paradyle is longe sayllynge out of the erthe that men dwelle Inne/and also departed from the erthe / and is as hyghe as the mone/it not to be byleued/for nature and reason both with saye it . for yf paradyle were departed atweyne fro the erthe that men dwelle Inne/ne water ne ayer myght bere suche a burthen . Also the super occupyeth all the myddell space bytwene thair and the mone/there paradyle is not there/for there no thyng myght lyue therein. Also yf paradyle were soo hyghe/somtyme it sholde take awaye the light and make eclypse of the mone/but of suche an eclypse herde we neuer . Also yf paradyle were soo hyghe and departed a sonder from euery londe and erthe/how sholde the four Ryuers that sprynge out of paradyle passe by the ayer and the wyde see and come in to londes that men dwelle Inne . And yf men saye that paradyle is soo hyghe that in one place it contynueth to the erth that men dwelle Inne . Thenne the

erthe is enlonge & not roude all aboute as wyle men descriuen hit/but that maye not stonde . for it is knowe by experyence & assaye þ in euery eclypse of the mone the erthe maketh a roude shelde/therefore the erthe with alle his partyes must nedes be roude. And so wyle men conclude that paradyle is in the vtermost endes of the east / & that it is a grete contree of the erth noo lasse than Inde or Egypte/& a large place & couenable for all mankynde to dwelle Inne/yf mankynde hadde not synned. ¶ Of the thyrde that axeth of paradyle what maner place it sholde be. ¶ Vlyd. xiiii. ca. iiii. sayth/that this name paradyle ytourned out of grue in to latyn is as moche to saye as an orchard/but paradyle in hebrewe is called Eden / þ is to saye lykynge/the whiche tweyne I put togyder maketh an orchard of lykynge. ¶ R. No wonder/for in þ place is all thyng þ accordeth to lyfe. ¶ Vlyd. li. xiiii. There is helthe / for the ayer is attemperate/neither to hote ne to colde so that nothyng þ lyueth maye depe therein/that wyrcelleth Enok & hely þ yet ben there a lyue. ¶ Johes damascen⁹ That place hath fayr weder and myrthe. for it was the celer and place of all fayrenes/noo maner tree leseth there his leues / ne floures there fade. There is myrthe & swetenesse of fruyte & trees that growe there. ¶ Genesis scdo ca⁹ It is wryten euery tree therein is swete to ete and fayr to syght . Therinne is sykernes and surete / for the place is hyghe. ¶ R. Petrus ca. xiiii. sayth. That the water of the grete flood cometh not in paradyle. Though some men saye

that paradysse is hyghe as the mone/
that is not soche in wordes and in de
de but that speche is saued by an excu
sacion of spekyng that is called yper
bolica. So that they that speken wol
de mene that paradysse in heyght pas
seth all other londes. ¶ Treupla. So
we prayse an erthly man Jordan or
Johan / & saye that he was the best
man that euer was / and yet he was
neuer soo good as cryste. Soo in wor
des that subtyll men well dypne the
menyng is trewe & good. ¶ But alas
as Pseudozorus sayth libro. ii. caplo. vii.
Dure waye to paradysse is fast stop
ped by cause of the synne of our for
fader / hit is closed all aboute with a
brennyng wall / so that the brennyng
therof arecheth to heuē / as some men
wolde wene paradysse is closed with þ
wall to holde out mankynde. Angels
stonden on that wall to kepe well pa
radysse that none euyll goostes mowe
come therin.

¶ De Alya et prouinciis eius Pseudo
rus libro. xiiii. Caplin. xi.

U Pseudozorus sayth þ Alya hath
the name and is called after
a woman that dwelled there
in / whiche was named Alya. In Alya
ben many prouynces and londes the
whiche I shall descriue & rekenne alle
alonge & begynne with Inde. Inde
hath in the west syde the sonne rylng
in the south the see Ocean / in þ west
the Ryuer of Inde / in the northe the
hulle that is called Canalus / & soo
Inde is ended. In Inde ben men
of colour & hewe dyed. In Inde is a
byrde that is named Phitacus / Ele

phantis. Peper / & a tree that is called
Hebanus / yuozy & precyous stones / be
ryls. Crylopallis. Carbocles. Adamā
tes / & golden hylles / to the whiche it
is full harde for to come. For dragōs
and grypes & for dyuerse maner men
grylely & wonderly shapen. Amonge
all the londes of this worlde Inde is
gretttest and moost ryche / strengeste
and moost full of people. In wonder
and meruaylles moost wonderfull.
In Inde a croppe of a fygge tree is
soo grete & soo wyde sprad / that ma
ny companyes of men may lytte atte
mete well Inough there vnder. That
cauleth the goodnes of the londe / tem
perure of weder and plente of water
¶ Plinius libro. vi. caplo. xix. In
Inde ben many kynnes and peoples
Some of hem tylleth þ londe / some
vleth chaffare & marchandysse / some
knyghthode & chyualrye / and some
ben grete clerkes. In Inde ben trees
that haue toppes as hyghe as men
shall shote with an arowe. Also of a
gobet bytwene tweyne knottes of a
reed in Inde men make a boot that
bereth thre men attones ouer a depe
water. In Inde ben men of fyue
Lubyte longe that were not seke ner
yelde vp the breth. Also there ben Sa
tiri and other dyuerse men grylely
and wonderly shapen. There Inne
ben men of a Lubyte longe / and ben
named Pygmey. These Pygmey ge
ten childern & engenderyn in þ fourth
yere / & were hore in the fyfthe. They
gadre a grete hooft / and ryden vpon
wedres and Rammes to fyght with
Cranes / and destroyen theyr nestes &
her egges. For the Cranes þ ben theyr
enemyes sholde not encrease & were
b ii

to many/there ben hely phylosophers
that beholde on the sonne all the day
longe. Also some haue hedes as it we
re houndes. And the doys that they
make is lyk to berkyng of houides
than to mannes doys / they ben clo
thed in wylde beestes skynnes / and
armed with her owen tethe and nays
les and lyuen by huntynge and haw
kyng. Other there ben that haue noo
mouth and lyuen by odour & smelles
& ben clothed in molle & heery tottes
that growe out of trees. Other were
hore in yough & wexen blacke in elde
In some hylles of Inde ben men þ
haue the sooles of theyr fete ouertor
ned and .viii. fyngers in one honde.
¶ Tull de tult. lxxx. In one contree
of Inde euery man hath many wy
ues/ but whan the husbonde is dede/
the wyues shall goo togydres & loke
whiche of hem was beste beloued of
the husbonde/ and she shall be buryed
with hym and put in the erthe quych
and a lyue. And in that contree that
is the fayrest hadde and fortune ac
counted and also worshyp that ony
wyfe myght haue. ¶ Petrus. xix. .vi.
In Inde ben trees that ben called
trees of the sonne & of the mone. Pre
stes that ete of the apples of thylke
trees lyuen .v. C. yere/ they were cal
led the trees of þ sonne/ for eueryche
of them quaked & shook as soone as
the sonne beame touched his toppe / &
answerde men that stode about. The
same doyng was of the trees of the
mone. By these trees the grete kynge
Alysaüder was forboden that he shol
de neuer come in Babylon. ¶ Pld.
libro. xv. Dffyr is an flonde of Inde
there Inne is grete plente of golde.

and the passage therto out ofe Grece
is by the reed see.

¶ De Parchia Pldor^o libro decimo
quarto. Caplm. xii.

Pldorus sheweth that Par
chia that kyngdom for mygh
te & strengthe of men of that
londe þ her name spradde in to þ lon
des of Assiria & Media/ & was won
te to contene all þ londe of four cons
trees/ of Assiria. Media. persida/ & of
Carmania/ þ whiche londe perchia
stretcheth in lengthe fro þ see þ is cal
led Caspius vnto þ reed see/ & in bre
de from þ Rpuer of Inde to þ Rpuer
þ is called Tygris/ that is the begyn
nyng of þ londe that is named Meso
potania. ¶ Trogus libro. x. caplo. li.
Parchii the men of Parchia in þ lan
gage of the countree of Scicia were
outlawes / and whan the kyngdome
was taken from the men of Media
to the men of Persida / thenne were
the Parchi as it were praye to the byc
tours and were as it were vnknewen
amonge men of the east londes vnto
þ tyme þ men of Macedonia becam
kynges & lordes of londes. Thenne
afterwarde they serued the Macedo
nes whan the Macedones were byc
tours in the east londes. But atte last
they were parteners with the Ro
mayns and deled Lordshyppe with
hem. These Parchii vleden the mas
ners of men of Scicia/ that put hem
out somtyme/ therfore her armes and
wepen ben fettery/ swelling wyttes/
gylefull espyes/ men they acouite vpo
lente/ & wymmen mylde/ & euer they
ben vneasy to her owen neyghbours

or to straunge men. They ben comynly styll and styll of speche/more redy to doo thay for to speke/therfor they holdeyn pryue good happes and bonchypes/as well as euyll happes & melchypes. They ben obedient to theyr lordes for drede and not for shame/they ben all dyspoted to lecherpe w^{ch} theyr owen wyues / eueryche of them hath many wyues. Noo trelpaas amonge them is punysshed soo greuouly as auowtree by her lawe / therfore they forbeden theyr wyues open syght/feltes and company of other men/they spuen scarcely and by lityll mete/and ete noo fleshe but veneson. ¶ Giraldud. xvii. Thylke men after they lefte kynge Selencus dwelleden vnder the kynge Arlaces. And therfore they were called Arlacide. That kynge Arlaces taught hym fyrst lawes / he gadred knyghtes and byided castellis Lytees and stronge walled townes. And atte last Arlaces the kynge Joyned the kyngdom of Hircania to his Emppre / and soo men of Hircania longed to his Emppre. Amonge the whiche afterwarde among other kynges come Metridates. Metridates soone after the dethe of Crassus consull of Rome / he regned & helde the kyndome .xliii. yere. In the whiche tyme he dyde many vyages and had many fayr vyctories/as it is declared within forth in his place. ¶ Trogus libro. xliii. Parchii y men of Parchia ben in the myddell bytwene Scitas men of Scicia & Medes men of Media that londe/and Parchii haue many bondmen amonge them/for they ben neuer made free / theyr free men ryden al waye on hoilback/and theyr

bondmen goon a fote. And in bataylie they fyghten on hoile. They gone to preuy offyce and to comyn festes/ but they teche belesy theyr childery to ryde & to hote. And eueriche of hem by his richesse and power fynde to theyr kynde hoilmen in batayll for to fyght/they conne not fyght in comyn maner/ner they conne not belesse castelles ne stronge walled townes they fyght on hoile rennyng in full cours and tournyng agayn. And ofte in strengest and hardpest fyght/they feyne for to flee and sodenly tourne and fyghte agayn that they mowe the looner wynne and sice theyr ennemyes. In batayll they ble tabours and noo trompe/and they mowe not endure longe for to fyght. Noo men holde hem awelde and withsonde yf they were as stronge and stalworthe to endure/as they ben angry and hasty to fyghte. Theyr buryenge is wonderfull/for bestes teren/eten and all to halen theyr fleshe. And they burpe oonly but the bones.

¶ De Assyriis Pliodorus libro decimo quarto. Caplm. xliii.

TAke hede y Assyria hath the name of Assur Semes lone/ for he was the fyrst y dwelled therein after Noes flood/this lond Assyria hath in y east syde Inde/in the south Media/in y west y Ryuer Tigris/& in y north the hylle y is called Tancalus/there ben the yates of Calpie/there the hylles be longe and narrowe. ¶ Trogus li. xlii. Egeus was kynge of Athenes. Medus was Egeus lone & folowed the dedes of Salon
b iii

that was his owne stepfader / & bylde the Cyte of Media & called the Cyte Media also in worshyp of his moder that was named Medea. That londe Medea hath in the north syde the see in the east Inde / in the west Caldea & in the south Persida. ¶ Psudo. li. xiiii. Persida is J named & hath the name of Perseus þ conquered þ londe & made hit a worthy londe that was to fore vnworthy. Persida hath in the east Inde / in the west the reed see / in the north Media / & in the south Carmania. In that persida began fyrst wptchecraft in Nempmoth þ Geants tyme that after the spredpng of many langages & tonges went in to Persida / & taught men of þ londe to worshyppe the fyre & the sonne that is called in her langage el. The chyef cyte of that londe was named Elam after Elam Semes sone / that cyte was called afterwarde Elamayda / & is now called Persipolis / of that Cyte speketh holy wryt in li. Machabeoz. And of that cyte they had the name / they were somtyme called Elampte in Aitibz aploz. ¶ Mesopotanea lyeth bytwene Tygris in the east syde / & Eufrates in the west syde / & begynneth out of the north bytwene þ two hylles Taurus & Lancalus & hath Babylon in the south syde. ¶ Psudo. li. xv. Though Babylonia were afterwarde cailed a parte of Caldea / it was fyrst so solempne that it conteyneth Assiria Caldea & Mesopotanea thre londes. The chyef cyte of Babylonia was Babylon the cyte þ Nempmoth the Geant bylded / & Semeran⁹ the quene afterward made that Cyte more. ¶ Petrus ca. xxxvii. The Cyte

is called Babylon and the lond Babylonia / though that one be well ofte take for that other / but the tour is called and named Babell. ¶ Draicius libro secundo. Babylon was bylded as a Castell / and walled with foure walles square all about. Euery walle was fyfty cubytes in brede and four tyme so moche in heyghte. The lengthe of euery walle from one corner to a nother was sixtene myle / the walles were alle aboute foure hondred and four score foilonge that is foure and fourty myles / the walles were made of brende tyle / and of glue in stede of mortar / soo that nether water ne fyre myght hem shyfte ne departe. In this Cyte were ay hondred pates and a dyche witout that was seen. The ryuer Eufrates ranne by the myddell of the Cyte thorough oute. Netheles Cyrus kyng of Persida toke that cyte afterwarde and destroyed it / as it is afterwarde wryten. ¶ Jerome sayth that of the Relect of this Cyte were bylded two grete Cytees in Persida. And the place of Babylon is now wyl dernelle and fulle of wylde beestes. ¶ Caldea as Cassidea hath the name of Casseth Nachors sone. Nachor was Abrahams brother. Caldea is a grete kyngdom belydes Eufrates in Samaar a felde of that kyngdom the tour Babell was J bylded. ¶ Josephus libro primo. That tour Babel was bylded two hondred lxxii. paas hyghe / the lengthe somdele lasse to hem that behelde hit nyghe for the brede was soo moche. ¶ R. Somme men saye that the tour was thre myle hyghe. ¶ But Puo Carnotensis sayth in his Cronycle that this

four was fyue myle and almost two hundred paas hyghe and foure myle brode. ¶ Arabia is sette by south Caldea / and hath in the east syde Perli/da / and in the west the reed see. In Arabia is stoor myrre and Laneil / and a byrde that is called Phenix. The northeest porcion of Arabia is named Saba / and is called Saba after Saba Thus lone. This Saba is beclpypped in thre sydes with the reed see. ¶ Josephus libro primo. In this Arabia in the contree of Madyan is the mount of Syna / the mount Dieb is a partpe of the mount of Syna / & is hyghe and hath grete plente of gras and of leele. But it is harde to come therto / for hyghe Rockes and scarres. Moyses was the fyrst may that ladde thyder beestes / hit is named also the mount of Couenaunt and of drede. for god almyghty ther vpon made thondrynge and lyghtynynge and gaf the lawe to the folke of Israell that were at the hylle foote / soo that noman durst approche to it but he were purefyed and made cleane. ¶ Treupla. Fenix is a wonder byrde / for of all that kynde is but one a lyue. ¶ R. In the contree of Arabye towarde Cyrcius is the hylle that is called mons Libani / that hylle departeth thre londes a sonder. Arabia Jude / and Fenis / that hylle is full hygh soo that snowe lyeth alwaye in some syde of that hylle. And it is a certayn marke and token to shypmen that saylley in the grete see and ledeth hem to dyuerse mowthes and hauens hit is an hylle of helthe and plente. For Cyprielle Cedre trees and herbes growen theron that droppen gome &

smelle swete / by the whiche trees gome and swetnes seke men ben heled / and denyng destroyed. ¶ Siria hath the name of Cyrus Abrahams newew And lyeth bytwene the water Eufra tes in the east syde / and the grete see in the west syde / and hath in y northe syde Armenia and Capadocia / and in the southe syde the see that is named Arabicus / and conteyneth many prouynces / that ben Comagena. Palestina. Fenys. Chanaan. Idumea. & Judea / that is the Jurye. Damal/ cus was somtyme the chyef Cyte of that prouynce. Eleazar Abrahams seruaunt bylded and made that Cyte Damal/ cus. Raisyn kyng of Damal/ ke helpe awaye the ten lpygnages of Israhell the kynges of Juda. Damal/ cus as moche to saye as the dyngge of blood. for there Chaym slowe Abell and hydde hym in the sonde.

De Regione Judee. Caplm. xiiii.

Judea is a kyngdome of Siria / a parte of Palestina and hath the name of Judas Jacobs lone / and was somtyme called Cananea of Cham Moes lone / cyther of the ten maner of people that the Jewes put oute of that londe. ¶ Petrus. Judea is taken in many maner oherwhyle for the londe of byhelle. And thenne it hath the name of the Jewes and of Judas. And soo it is taken in this speche. The grete pompeus made Judea tributaryes. And oherwhyle it is taken for the Royalme of Juda / and soo it is wyrtten of Joseph / that whan he herde that

Archelaus reigned in Judea/he drad
 for to goo thyder. And somtyme it is
 taken vonly for the lotte of the lygna
 ge of Judas/ & so speketh holy wryt
 te & sayth . Judea and Iherusalem
 drede ye not . ¶ **Gir. d. iii.** In this
 Judea þ londe of byhest/the lengthe
 therof is fro Day to Berlabee . And
 Iherome sayth in Ep̄la ad Darda
 nu/that it is scarcely an .L. and .lx.
 myle in lengthe/and the brede is fro
 Joppen to Bethleem scarcely .xlvi.
 myle of that londe . ¶ **But scdm̄ libz**
Numeroz. Judea is beclpyped in this
 maner about. And hath in the southe
 the dede see / and thenne it stretcheth
 forth by Syna and Lades berne vn
 to the streme of Egypte that renneth
 westwarde in to the grete see/and in
 the northlyde the hylle that is named
 mount Taurus / and in the east the
 hylle mount Libani / and the begyn
 nyng 'of the see Tyberiadis & of the
 streme Jordan that spryngen arte fo
 te of mount Libani both Tyberiadis
 & Jordan. Thenne Jordan renneth
 in to the dede see/ & departeth Judea
 and Arabie. This londe Judea was
 byhote to our forn faders/ but not all
 had . ¶ **As Paule sayth ad Hebreos.**
 Alle they ben dede & relcepueden not
 the byhestes . And so it must be/ that
 there ben two londes of byhest erthly
 & goostely. In þ one is heuenly Ihe
 rusalem/ & in that other erthely Ihe
 rusalem/by the whiche erthly Iheru
 salem the heuenly Iherusalem is be
 tokened. This londe Judea is riche
 & fruytfull/and hath plente of wyne
 and of spycerye/of Cedres/of Cypres
 se/of bame/of Olyues/of Pomegar
 net/of Palmes/of fpygges/of Mylke

& of hony/ & hath in the myddell as
 it were in the Nauell of the erthe the
 Lyte Iherusalem. ¶ **Plydorus li. v.**
ca. p̄ii. The Jewes layn that Sem
 Noes sone þ is named Melchisedech
 also made & bylded the Lyte Iheru
 salem after Noes flood and called it
 Salem. but afterwarde a people that
 were called Jebusey dwelled therein
 and named it Jebus. Soo of thylke
 two names Jebus & Salem is ma
 de one name Iherusalem. Afterwar
 de Salamon called that Lyte Iheru
 sololima/ & Poetes that speken thoz
 tely callen the Lyte Solima in her
 thozte speche . And after that helius
 Adryan the Emperour called þ Lyte
 Helya/and walled it and made it mo
 re about soo that our Lordes Sepul
 cre that was somtyme withoute the
 Lyte is now closed within. ¶ **R. Ne**
cheles it semeth that Iheronimus in
 Ep̄istola ad euangelistū presbiterū
 wylly saye that Salem Salim that
 Melchisedech made & dwelled Inne/
 was a nother Lyte than Iherusa
 lem / there he sayth that Salem is a
 towne belyde Sycolim that yet is
 called Salem . And there in is seen
 the Palays of Melchisedech . ¶ **And**
 therof speketh holy wrytte Genelis
 and sayth that Jacob wente in to
 Salem the Lyte of Sychem/that is
 in the londe of Canaan. ¶ **W. de Re.**
libro primo. No welle is within Ihe
 rusalem but waters ben gadred and
 kepte in Cystersnes. for the Lyte is so
 sette that it hath in the northlyde the
 moūt of Syon/and is dysposed that
 the water that falleth downwarde &
 southwarde with the dependaunt to
 warde Iherusalem taketh no fylthe

but is cleue I noughe and renneth in to the Lyte & maketh noo fylthe but renneth in to þe Cysterne as though it were lakes and welle stremes. And some therof renneth in to the brooke that is called (torrens Cedron) and maketh the brook (torrente Cedron) were and be well the more. In the toppe or somet of the mount Syon was a Ryall tour made for sayrenes & defence. In the syde of mount Syon was the Temple as it were in the myddell bytwene the tour & the Lyte. The Lyte was lower than the tour. And therfore ofte holy wrytte clepeth Jherusalem the doughter of Syon. For as a doughter is mayntened and defended by the moder & subgette to the moder/soo the Lyte was lower & subgette to the Temple and the tour also. The grete Constantinus arered there somtyme the Chirche of the holy Sepulcre. Myshpleued men myshpode neuer that Chirche. And that is as men suppose. For euery yere on Ester euen cometh fyre fro heuen & tendeth and lyghteth the lampes therein. But whan that myracle began fyrst it is vncerteyn & vnkowen. Salamon þe kynge walled this Lyte some tyme with thre walles all about. Netheles not oonly for strengthe / but for dyspnyccion of dyuerse maner men that dwellen therein. The prestes & clerkes that serued in the Temple. And also the kynge and his meyne dwelleden within the fyrste walle by the mount of Syon. Within the seconde walle dwelleden Prophetes & myghty men and stalworth/so speketh holy wrytte that Oida the prophetylle dwelled in Jherusalem in the seconde dystinccion

on. Within the thyrde walle dwelled the compyn people and men of crafte. ¶ R. fast by Jherusalem in þe north tyoe of þe Temple is þe moūt of Dlyuete for plente of Dlyues. ¶ Saynte Austyn sup Johēn calleth it the hylle of crysme & vncion / the lyght & of fatnes the hylle of medycyne & of feydyng. for the fruyte of Dlyue is full of lyght lyknyng & vncuous / & it was speccally þe hylle & the moūt of light for it was byshyne with lyght of the sonne aldaye. And with lyght of the Temple all nyght. In þe hylle Salamon whan he were mad and alle by shrewde for loue of women he buylde Temples & hyghe places for mawmetrye soo sayth holy wrytte Romanos lido. x. capto. But that moūt ascended Cryst in to heuen. And in that mount he shall deme the worlde atte last. Atte fote of that moūt spryngeth the brook (torrens Cedron) & renneth in to the valepe of Josaphat bytwene the brynke of (torrens Cedron) & the mount was the Dycharde þe Cryst wente in oft for to bydde & praye. In þe Dycharde Cryst was taken by whiche was a thorp þe heet Bethlamany In that moūt was þe lypyll street of prestes that heet Bethphage. In the syde of the hylle was the towne of Iazar Martha & Marpe mawdeleyn / þe towne was named Bethania. ¶ Hug In the north syde of the moūt Syon is the moūt of Caluarpe there Cryst deded on the Rood / and is called Golgatha in the langage of Syria. Golgatha is as moche to saye as a bare sculle. for whan theues and myshdoers were byheded / the heedes were lefte there / and soo atte the laste

the sculles weren all bare. **C**Other wondres of the Temple lobe in li^o bzo Regum. **C**Plydorus libro .xv. capitulo primo. Also in the Royalme of Juda is the see of wyldernesse / that is the dede see / and from Iherusalem two hondred furlonges that make fyue and twenty myle and departeth Judeam. Palestinam and Arabiam. **C**Plydorus Ethi. libro desimotercio / that lake stretcheth from the ende of Judea not fer fro Jerico vnto Zores of Arabia leuen hondred furlonges and foure score the whiche maken four score and fourteen myle. That lake is in breede an hondred and fyfthty furlonges / and stretcheth nyghe to þ contree of Sodoma / that lake is called Lacus salinarum / for salte is made there. Also there is moche glue in that contree / and therfore it moeueth not with wyndes for the glue withstondeth alwaye for water that hath glue stondeth styll / and that lake susteyneth noo shypppe ne none other mater but it be glewed. **C**Petrus ca. l. Nothyngge maye vndo the glue of that place but oonly the blood þ is called (sanguis menstru^o) **C**Plydorus libro .xvii. hit is also called the dede see. for that see bynggeth noo thyngge that is quycke and a lyue / soo that it recepueth neyther water fowles ne fysshes soo that what quycke thyngge that dyppech therein / anone it leepeth vp agayn and alle dede thynges it swoloweth soo fer forth that a lanterne with light flecteth and swymmeth / and yf the lighte be queynt / it dyppech doune and drencheth. **C**Joseph^o libro xxi^o that was assayed and I knowey in that

grette prynces tyme Vespasianus by two men that bonden her hondes besynde and were caste in there / but anon they were cast vp agayn. **C**Plydorus li. ix. ca. iii. That Royalme is called Pentapolis. Also for fyue wycked Cytees that there were a dreynt & I biente to asshes that were some tyme more riche and more plenteous than Iherusalem. for Saphers and many other precyous stones and golde also were fonde amonge the claye of that londe. **C**As Job wytnelleth xxxiii. caplo. But now there semeth somer shadowe and lykenesse of fyre bothe in herbes and in trees for apples that there growen semeyn so fayr and so tye / that who that hem seeth wyllleth hem for to eten / but thylk apples fallen anon to asshes as they ben handled and smoken as they were a fyre. **C**R. But there is a nother Pentapolis in Affryca.

CDe Regione Canaan. Capltij. xv.

CAnaan is a Royalme of Siria / and is named Canaan for Canaans children were the tyrtte that dwelled there Inne after Noes flood / and conteyned leuen nations all acurled as it were by hevyrtage of Cham Noes sone. **C**Tre upla. Cham was Noes sone and had his faders curs / for he lowhe his fader to scoryn whan he sawe his preuy members all bare and vneheled whyse he laye a sleep. **C**R. Palestina is a prouynce of Syria / and that hyghte somtyme Philistea. The chyef Cyte therof hyghte Philistini / & now is named Alcalon / and after the Cyte is

the prouynce called Palestina or Philistea. And men of that countree ben called Palestini & Philistei also. for in the speche of hebrewe is no .p. but in stede of .p. they vse .ph. therfor philistei & palestini ben all one/ & be also called Allosili/that is to saye alpens and straunge men / for they were alwaye alpens and straunge to the folke of Israhell. That prouynce hath in the touche syde Egypte/in the west Tyrus/in the north Judea/and in the east Idumea. Idumea hath the name of Edom. Edom and Esau is all one Jacobs brother. That Idumea is a strong londe hilly and hote & stretcheth to the reed see. ¶ Psalms libio. ix. In this Idumea is Jacobs welle / that welle chaungeth hewe & colour four sythes a yere. And is thre monethes pale as althes / other thre monethes reed as blood/ & thyrp thre monethes grene as as gras/ & fourth thre monethes clere as water. Palestina was to conteyne Samaria. The chiefe Lyte of that londe was somtyme called Samaria/now it is called and named Sebalte. Samaria hath the name of the hylle that is called Somer. And Samaria lyeth bytwene Judea and Galylea / men that dwelled in Samaria were dryuen oute and Assirii were brought Inne. Assirii holden Moyles lawe/ but in somme thynges they dylcorde fro the Jewes/ and also they ben called Samarite/that is to saye keepers. for whan men of the londe were taken/they were ordeyned wardyens of hem. ¶ Sychem that hyght Sychima also is a lityll londe in Samaria/ & hath the name of Sychem Emors sone & first

dwelled therin. Also there is a Lyte that hyght Sychem and now is called Neopolis/ & Lyte Jacob bought somtyme with moneye and grete traual/ and gaf it to Joseph his sone aboute his lotte. ¶ Soo sayth Iherome Genesis .xvii. Capitulo. And this was a Lyte of refuge and of socoure. ¶ Soo it is wryten Josue .xx. Capitulo. for that londe was de tribu and of the lygnage of Issachar. And there were Josephs boones buried / after they were I brought oute of Egypte wptnes of holy wrytte. ¶ Josue ultimo Capitulo. In that place Josephs bretheren fedden and kepte droues and flockes of bestes. But afterwarde Abymalech Jerobabels sone destroyed that place & slowe the men that dwelled therein/ & sewe salt therein for the londe shold nomore bere fruyte and corn wptnesse Josue Capitulo nono. And there is Jacobs welle where Criste rested by whan he was wery of waye & of gonyng. ¶ Galylea is a londe bytwene Judea & Palestina & is double / the ouer Galylea & the nether Galylea/ & Joyney togydres. And also to Syria & to fenicia. In eyther Galylea is good londe & plente of corn and of fruyte/ grete lakes and huge prouffitable and helthfull. And somme lake he is soo grete and soo full of fysh that men calle it a see/ so the lake of Tyberiadis is called the see of Tyberiadis. And Genosar that lake is called also. Also in & west syde of the nether Galylea toward the grete see falle by the Lyte ptholomayda that is called Acres also is a welle that tourneth in to glas all metall that is

cast therin. ¶ Cedar is a londe in the ouer syde of Palestina & hath the name of Cedar þ̄ dwelled therin / that Cedar was. Ismaell oldest sone / the offspring of Cedar and of Ismaell were afterwarde named Ismaelite. & also Agareni more rightfulli than Saraceni. for they come of Agar þ̄ was Ismaels moder & serued Sara. But afterwarde for pryde they toke wrongfully the name of Sara / and called hem selfe Saraceni. ¶ Metho di⁹. These men haue none house but walke in wyldernesse & dwelle in tabernacles & in tentes / & lyue by praye & by venelou. These men shall some tyme gadre togydres and goo out of wyldernes and occuppe the londes aboute eyght wekes or yeres / that is viii. lythes seuen yere. And they shall ouertourne Cytees and townes & slee preestes & defowle clerkes & holy places and teye her beestes to Tombes of holy sayntes that shall befall for wyckednes of euyll lyuyng of crysten men. ¶ R. This doying semeth fulfilled in the laste tyme of Eracl⁹ themperour whan that false prophete Machometus occupped Perlida / and made Egypte and Affryca subgette / and wrote & brought in the false lawe & secte of Saralyns / as it is Juner more playn wrpyen after Eracl⁹ tyme. ¶ Fenicia is a londe in the whiche is contepned two londes Tyrus & Sydon & hath in þ̄ east syde Arabia / in the south syde þ̄ reed see / in the north the moūt Libani / & in þ̄ west the grete see. ¶ Pseudo⁹ li. ii. caplo. v. Phenix Agenoris sone betoke rede lettres to the Phenices that ben men of fenicia & therfor that colour was called Phe

nice⁹. And afterward the lettre chaūged & that is was called punice⁹ þ̄ is reed. ¶ Hug. L^o fenix. for Phenices were fyrst fynders of lettres / yet we wypte capytal lettres with reed colour in token & mynd that Phenices were fyrst fynders of lettres.

¶ De Egypto prouincia Capitulū .xvi.

¶ Egypte hath þ̄ name of Egypte Danays broder / & hyght somtyme Aeria / & hath in þ̄ east syde the reed see / in þ̄ south the ryuer Nylus & blacke men / in þ̄ north þ̄ grete see & þ̄ ouer partye of Siria / & in the west Libia. Egypte is zelde besraynd / & hath water & moysture oonly of the Ryuer Nylus / & is ryche of corn of fruyte and of Marchandysse. ¶ Petrus ca. lxxxiiii. Egypte apenst kynde of other londes whan it hath plente of corn / it is bareyn of pasture & grasse groweth afterwarde in tyme. There ben Locodrylly & Pporamp also þ̄ ben water horses. Egypte hath in the east syde a grete wyldernesse & dyuerse maner beestes wonderly shap / & in the west Canopea the whiche flonde is the ende of Egypte / & begynnynge of Libia. there is þ̄ mouth of Nylus / for there Nylus falleth in to þ̄ grete see. ¶ R. Though men rede in bokes þ̄ Nylus þ̄ is named Gyon renneth oute of Paradyse. Yet it is sayd that Nylus spryngeth vp in the west ende of Ethiopia not fer from the hylle that is named mons Athlas. And thenne Nylus gooth forth about Ethiopia and douyn in to Egypte and ouerfloweth the playne

countrees of Egypte/and by cause of
 slyme that renneth therwith it ma/
 keth the londe fatte and good to bere
 corn and fruyte. ¶ So sayth Ihero/
 me vpon the prophete Amos by god/
 des owen ordynauce. Nylus ouerflo
 weth & watreth all þ̄ londe of Egypte
 for heepes of grauell stoppe his cours
 that it may not lightly falle in to the
 grete see. But after that it hath so be
 flowe & watred the londe the heepes
 of grauell departe and falle/ & thene
 the water falleth in to the chanell a/
 gayn and renneth in to the grete see.
 ¶ Nethales Pfydorus seyth libro. xiii.
 That Nylus is dryuen agayn & lette
 of his cours with the northeren wynde
 And so the water swelleth floweth &
 waxeth grete. ¶ But Beda in libro
 de naturis sayth þ̄ þ̄ northeren wynde
 bloweth in Maye & stopped the cours
 of the water of Nylus with heepes of
 grauell / and soo the water aryleth
 & ouerfloweth the londe. But whan
 the wynde ceaseth the grauell to she/
 dech / and the water falleth in to the
 chanell and soo renneth downwarde
 in to the grete see.

De Scicia superioze et inferiori.
 Capitulum .xvii.

Here take hede of two londes
 that eche of hem is named
 Scicia / the ouer is in Alya/
 and the nether in Europa. The ouer
 Scicia is a grete londe in the northe.
 and hath moche wyl dernes by cause
 of grete colde and chele and stretcheth
 somtyme eastward vnto Inde/north
 warde towarde Ocean/and southe/
 warde to the hylle Caucasus/ & west

warde vnto Germanya / but now it
 is made lasse & endeth in þ̄ west syde
 to Hyrcania/in þ̄ whiche londe ben þ̄
 hylles Iperborcy/grete grypes/golde
 & smaragdes & other precyous stones
 ¶ Trogus libro. ii. Thylke men des
 tyngeth not nether marke her feldes
 by boundes/ne by dyches / they haue
 none houses for to dwell in/theyr wy
 ues & her childern they lede in cartes
 and they ben clothed in wylde beestes
 shyntes/wolley clothes ble they none
 they lyue by mylke & hony. they retche
 not of golde ne of syluer / they make
 nothyng þ̄ they drede to lese/they ac/
 compte no trespas gretter than robbe
 ry/theyr men of warre & vyctours de
 syre nothyng but worlshyp/they were
 neuer subget yet to ony man/they o/
 uercame Deloz þ̄ kyng of Egypte in
 warre and batayll/they chaced & fer
 red Dari⁹ þ̄ kyng of Perle & made hē
 flee/they sloughe Cyrus þ̄ kyng also/
 they destroped zephirona & his riches
 zephirona was þ̄ grete Alylands Ca/
 pytaryn/thryes they conquerd Alya/ &
 Alya was afterwarde to hem a. M. &
 .v. L. yere/ þ̄ men of this people be by
 hem selte/ & þ̄ wōmen by them selte.
 Also they made kyngdoms of dyuers
 se londes. The men made of Perchia
 & Bactria/ & þ̄ wōmen of Amazonia
 kyngdoms myghty & strong. And so
 it is among hem vncertayn & vnkno/
 we whether is more worthy & more
 noble in nature & kynde/ men or wō/
 men. In the fyrste Journey in Alya
 after that they had dryuen chaced &
 pursued Daloz the kyng of Egypte/
 In þ̄ tournyng agayn they abode. xv.
 yere for to make peas in Alya/ but wy
 ues made grete pleyntes and sorowe

that her hūbondes were soo longe from home / & soo the men were sente fore and tourned home and dwelled with theyr wyues. In þe seconde Journey the men were by treason slayne & the wyues toke grete wreche of the enemyes. In the thyrde Journey the men were out & absent for yeres toggyder. And the wyues wedded her owne seruauntes and bonde men that were leftte at home for kepyng of beestes. But whan her lordes and hūbondes hadde the vyctorye and torned home agayn. The wyues and the newe hūbondes gadred hem toggyders and arrayed hem in a grete batayll to fyght agayn theyr olde lordes & hūbondes that were comyng homeward / and whan they mette toggyders / fortune was vnkable and vnkedfaste ones with that one syde & este with that other / that the lordes bethought hem and concluded to fyght otherwyle with theyr owne bonde men than wth theyr enemyes of straunge londes / & caste awaye her owne Armour and wepen of knyghtes / and bare whyppes in her hondes / and soo feerde the chorles and the falle wyues that had broken theyr wedlocke that they had shamefull dethe / for some were slayn with yron / and some were hanged full hyghe. After this Journey was peas in Scicia vnto the tyme of Darius kyng of Persida. Theñe Darius was ouercome of the Scites / men of Scicia. And in the tournynge homeward he ouercome Macedones / that ben men of Macedonia of that londe / & warred vpon Athenienles / men of Athenes. ¶ Bactria is a lond that Chan Noes sone dwelled fyrst in / &

stretcheth fro the see Caspius vnto the Ryuer of Inde / and hath in the weste syde the mount Cancalus / and in þe southe Perchia. This hylle Cancalus is lengest of alle the east hylles & moost famous / and stretcheth fro the endes of Inde vnto þe hylle that is named mount Taurus. Soo that mount Taur^s and Cancalus is conteyned all one hylle / but some men saye that the west syde of Cancalus that is towarde Armenia / is & heyte moūt Taurus. That mount Cancalus hath in þe northsyde the see þe is named Caspius and Hircania that londe / and in the southsyde Perchia and Assiria and Babylon. That hylle by cause it stretcheth to dyuerse countrees and londes hath many & dyuerse names / that hylle is hyghest on the east syde. And for wytnesse of snowe that lyeth alway thereon / it is called mons Cancalus / that is to saye the whyte hylle. ¶ Albertus sayth that hylle is soo hyghe that men that dwelle there by seen the sonne bene in the west syde thre houres within nyght / and soo many hours to fore the daye in þe east syde of the hylle. ¶ Hircania that londe hath in the east syde the see Caspius / in the south Armenia / in þe northe Albania / and in the weste Iberia that londe / and lyeth by þe syde of the moūt Cancalus / & hath the name of that wood that is called Hircania. In that londe ben dyuerse wyld beasts and fowles. Tygris that beste & Pantera also. That londe is wyde and large / and hath .xl.iiij. maner men. Some tyllen londe / and some lyuen by huntynge / & some eten mans fleshe. There ben byrdes that ben

called Hyrcane/her fethers thynen by nyght. ¶ Iberia that londe lyeth vnder mount Taurus/and lyeth westwarde faste by Pontus/and Jsyneth to Armenye. ¶ Albania that londe hath in the east syde the see Caspius & stretcheth downward by the mouthes of the northe Ocean vnto the waters that ben named Heotydes. And the men of that londe ben born with whyte heer and with Jelowe eyen ypeyned/and seen better by nyght than by daye The houndes of that londe ben soo grete soo grym and soo stronge þ they throwe downe bulles and sleen Lyons. One of thylke houndes was sent to kynge Alplauder and faught within Lykes with a lyon and an olyphaunt and with a wylde booz / and had the maystrate. ¶ Gotha is the nether parte of Scitia towarde Circiū to that londe Gotha lyeth that Flonde Goclandia/that Flonde hath plente of all maner marchaundyse / and hath in the northsyde Dacia/and in the southsyde Ocean / and is called Gothia of Gos Japhets sone / the men of that countree ben redpyle called gothy than gogy / and ben right stronge men/grete/grym/and sturne and of hem come the Dacies in Europa. Seculy in Affryca. Amazonas in Alya. ¶ Armenia that is called also Ararath. Ararath hath the name of Armeni⁹ Jalon knyght/the whiche Armeni⁹ whan he had ylost Jalon his kynge of Thessalia/he ga dred knyghtes that royled aboute/& toke Armenya and dwelled therein/that londe stretcheth to þ moūt Taurus and Lancalus from the see Caspius vnto Capadocia / and hath in

the length .xi. C. M. paas/ & in brede vii. C. myle/ther is that hylle moūt Ararath there Noes thyppe abode after Noes flood. And ther be two Armenies the more & þ lasse/the ouer & the nether. And soo ben two Panonyes also.

¶ De Capadocia Caplm. xviii.

Capadocia that londe nouryshed & fedeth many horses/ & hath in the east syde Armenia in the west Alya þ lasse/in the northe Amazonia/ & in þ south moūt Taurus/therby lyeth Scicilia & Glauria vnto the see Silicus þ stretcheth towarde þ Flonde of Cypus. The lasse Alya Joyneth to Capadocia in þ east syde/ & is beclipped & closed in the other sydes with þ grete see/for it hath in the northsyde þ mouth & see that is called Eulin⁹ /in the west þ mouth & see Propontides/ & in the south the see of Egypte. This lasse Alya conteyneth many pynces & londes. for fyrst in þ northsyde it conteyneth Bythinia in the begynnynge vpon the see ayenst Tracia / & is named also the more frigia. The chyet Lyte of Bythinia is named Nychomedia. Thenne is Galathia and hath the name of men that were Gally that come atte prayer of the kynge of Bythinia to helpe hym in his warres & dwelled in that londe Galathia /but tho that londe was called Gallogrecia/ & the men of that londe Gallogrecy / as men ymedled of gallis and of grecis but now they ben called Galathe/ & to hem Poule wryteth his epytyle. ad Galathas. The thyrde is the lasse

frigia / & hath the name of frigia
 Europaes doughter Agenors dough
 ter / & that frigia was named Dar
 dania also of Dardanius Jupiters
 lone / in þ londre is the Lyte of Trope
 that is named Ilium, also Trope is
 named after Troos Ericoni⁹ lone þ
 was Dardani⁹ lone / that was Jupi
 ters lone. That londre hath in the east
 syde Lydya / & in the west the mouth
 & the see Euxyntus. The fourth is
 Lidia / & is in the east syde of the east
 frigia. In that Lidia regned soumy
 me the riche kyng Cresus. But whan
 that londre was to lypyl for twoo bre
 theryn that were kynges that hyghe
 Liddus & Tivrenus / hit happened by
 lotte that Tyren⁹ went out with ma
 ny men & gate hym a londre in the o
 uer parte of Galia / & called his lon
 dre Tirea. It semeth that the see Ti
 renus hath the name of this kyng
 Tivrenus. as the londre Lidia hath the
 name of his broder Lidd⁹. The chyf
 Lyte of Lidia is called Smyrna / to þ
 cyte saynt Johan euangelyst wryteth
 in the Apocalypsis / the chyf ryuer of
 Lidia is named Pactolus / & byngeth
 forth golden grauell as Poetes tellen
 The fyfth prouynce of the lasse Alpa
 is called Pamphilia & Isauria also.
 the chyf cyte of that londre is named
 Selencia / that cyte Selencus Anthio
 chus bylded & atered. Thenne is Sci
 licia / & conteyneth Licia / & that is cal
 led Licaonia / therin were noble cytees
 Lystris & Derben as it is wryten in
 actibus Apostolor. By thylke cytees
 men saylle oute of Syria to Italia.
 But the chyf Lyte of all these was
 Charlis downwarde towarde the see
 Amalonia / þ londre is some in Alpa.

& some in Europa / & is nyghe to Al
 bania. The fyrst Amazones were the
 wyues of Gothes that toke wreche
 of her husbondes dech that were tray
 tourly slayne. for they toke prayes &
 slowe men & saued wpmmen / & lved
 longe without husbondes. And after
 warde made hem two quenes / that
 one lad þ ooste & mayntened þ warre
 & warred fast / that other quene was
 at home & reuled the londre & gouer
 ned the people at home. And these w
 men heldey vnder honde a grete dele
 of Alpa about an hondred yere. And
 atte last the wpmen wolde haue chil
 deryn / & toke husbondes of the nexte
 contrees aboute / & certayn tymes lete
 theyr husbondes lve by them / & cer
 tayn tymes absteyned them / but they
 slewe all the men childeryn / & saued þ
 mayde childeryn / & taught hem for to
 shote & to do dedes of armes & of chy
 ualrye. And for grete brestes sholde
 not lette hem to shote / of euery may
 dre of seuen yere olde they brente of þ
 right breste / & therfore they were cal
 led vrimame / that is to saye / brente
 brestes. And they were named Ama
 zones / that is to saye without breste.
 Hercules was the fyrst that chastyled
 the ylle dysposicion of these w
 men. And thenne Achilles. And atte laste
 the grete Alpauder. ¶ And though
 Plydorns Ethi. xiiii. sayth. That
 the grete Alpauder destroyed Ama
 zones. Necheles the storpe of Alpa
 uder sayth / that whan kyng Alpa
 uder axed of hem trybute. Thalestris the
 quene of Amazones wrote to kyng
 Alpauder in this maner. ¶ Of thy
 wytte is wonder that thou desprest to
 fyghe with wpmmen. for yf fortune

fauour vs & thou be ouercome it shal be grete shame & vplonpe whan þart ouercome of wþmen. & yf our goddes be wroth with vs and þ ouercome vs for to wyne the maystrye of wþmen thou getest but lpyll worlhypp. Lyng Alyslauder was pleased with this & graüted hem fredom/ & sayd wþmen must be ouercome with fayrenes & lo ue and not with steornes and drede.

Trog^o libro .ii. This quene Thalestris after that she hadde ben kynge Alyslaunders lēmen .xl. dayes she tour ned agayn in to her owen londe. And afterwarde in short tyme fyll in with her owen people.

De Affryca et eius prouinciis Plydorus libro. xiiii. Caplin. xix.

Alle autours of hystories wyt nelle that Affryca hath þ name of Affer Hadpans lone Abrahams lone that was goten on Cethura. Affryca stretcheth forth frō the endes of Egypte by the south by the nether Ethiopia vnto the hylle of Athlas/ & is closed in with the grete see both in the east syde & in the north syde also/ & hath in the west syde the west Ocean.

R. Joseph^o li. p^oca. viii. & Plyd li. ix. sayn that this Affer had his oost towarde Libia/ & ouercome his enemyes by the helpe of þ more Hercules & named the men & the londe after his owen name Affryca. Hercules wedded Ethea Affers dough ter & gate on her Dederym. Of Dederym cam Pharon. This Affryca cōteyneth many pynces & londes. fyrste it conteyneth þ west dele of Ethio

pia/thenne Libia. Tripolis. Getula. Numidia/ & two Maritania. Of all these now by ordre is our speche. Ethiopia hath thre partes/ the fyrst is hylly & montuous / & stretcheth fro the mouit Athlas vnto Egypte/ the myddell parte is full of grauell/ the thyrd that is þ east parte is almoost all wyl dernes that parte is bytwene þ south Ocean & the Ryuer Nylus/ & hath þ reed see in the east syde/ & heyre Ethiopia of the colour & hewe of þ men of the londe that ben blacke men / & is for þ grete brennyng and heet of the sonne / whiche is to hem full nyghe. In Ethiopia ben many dyuerse people wonderly & gryselely þ shapen/ some are named Goromantes & some Trogodite which ben swyfter than hertes/ & some curle the sonne for his grete hete/ some ete serpētes & addres some hunte Lyons & Panteris / some dygge caues & dennes & dwelle vnder erthe & make her noyle with grūtpng & chyryng of tethe more than with voys of the throte/ some goo naked & do noo werke/ some without hedes & haue mouth & eyen in þ brest/ among some of hem ben foure footed bestes without eeres/ and Dlyphantes also some of hem haue an hounde for her kyng & dyuyneth by meouyng & slyryng of hym/ some lyue oonly by honyloukles Jdryed with smoke or with the sonne. Ther ben also Cameleons & Basilisc^o Dnycornes Camels Pardes & Dragons þ haue in her brayn & hedes many precyous stones. Camelyen is a flecked best in colour lyke to a Lyparde/ & so is Pardus & Panthera also/ & somdele of the kynde. But

Panthera is frende to all maner beest
tes saue to the dragon alone / for hyt
he hateth as deth. Basiliscus is kyng
of serpentes that with smell & syghte
sleeth beestes & fowles. ¶ *Pludor* li.
xiii. In Affryca among the people þ
ben called Trogodite is a welle that
maketh hem that drynke therof to ha
ue good voys shryll and clere. Also a
monge the other people Garaman
tes is a welle all the daye soo colde þ
noman may drynke therof / & all the
nyght it is soo hote that noman may
touche. ¶ *Libia cyrenensis* that londe
hath in the east syde Egypte / in the
southe Ethiopia / in the west þ peryl
lous place of the see that is called the
more Syrtes & Tragodites also / & in
the northe the grete see. ¶ *Plud* li. v.
sayth. That Libia hath the name of
that wynde that is named Libs & is
the wynde that bloweth out of Affry
ca. Dr Libia hath the name of Libia
Epaphies doughter / þ Epaphie was
Iupsters sone. That woman Libia
regned in that londe Libia. And the
people of that londe heyght Phutey
of Phut Chames sone. ¶ *Tripolitana*
that Regyon hath in the east syde
Aras philenorn the antres & wyndes
of that people that ben sette byt wene
the people Trogodite & þ more Syr
tes. Syrtes maiores ben peryllo⁹ pla
ces fast by the grauelly see that is na
med mare Arenosū / & Tripolitana
hath in the southe syde Getulos and
Garamantes that stretcheth vnto þ
Ocean of Egypte / & hath in þ west
syde Splançiū vnto the lake that is
called Lacus salinar / & in the northe
syde he hath the see of myddell erthe.

and the peryllous place that is called
Syrtes minores / þ lasse Syrtes. Ges
tula is the myddell londe of Affryca
& hath the name of Gethes that fol
ke of the Gothes. And in an *Omely*
Saynt Gregoie sayth that thylke
mey haue noo fyllhers.

¶ *De Numidia puincia.* Caplm. xx.

Numidia hath in the east syde
Syrtes minores þ lasse Syr
tes a peryllo⁹ place in the see
in the southe Ethiopia / in the weste
Mauritania / & in the northe the see
Siculus. In that is Rulcida & Car
tago the grete Lyte that was in this
maner arered & buyldeed as Auctours
tellen. ¶ *Pludor* libro. xv. caplo. xiii.
fenyces men of fenicia that londe
wente fro the reed see & buyldeed these
Lytees fyrst in Syria they bylde Sy
don and Tyrus. In Affryca Hyca.
In Boecia Thebe / & the mouth of
the west Ocean Gades. for in olde
tyme the fenices were grete marchaū
tes and passed in to dyuerse londes
with marchaūdsle that they brought
and recepued therfore londe & place
to bylde on Lytees & townes. ¶ *Tro
gus* libro. xviii. Dydo whilhe was na
med Elyssa also wente out of fenicia
with a grete compani of yonglynges
chosen / and saylled fyrst in to Cypri
And there this womman Dydo
toke with her four score maydens for
to bynge forth childern. And come
in to Affryca / and therefor ease and
reste of her men þ were wery of sayl
lynge she bought as moche londe as
she myght bedlyppe with an oxes hyde

And hpytte the hyde vnto a thwonge
 that was full longe and small / and
 beclyppe therwith a grete place. And
 called it byrla that is a thwonge .
 ¶ Pldorus libro .xv. Di Cartada
 that was a newe towne. After the na
 me was chaunged and the place cal
 led Cartago/and thus Cartago was
 J bylde .lxxii. yere tofore the Lyte of
 Rome. ¶ R. Papias sayth the same.
 And hyltorpes telle that Rome was
 bylde the fourth yere of Achas kyng
 of Juda. Thenne yf we acounte re
 deiy & put togyder four yere of Achas
 xvi. yere of Jonathas/and .lii. yere
 of Dzas that regned tofore Achas
 it foloweth that Cartago was foun
 ded about the fyrst yere of Dzas the
 kyng. ¶ Netheles Pldorus libro .v.
 Ethi. et Magister in hystoria scolasti
 ca sayen as it semeth that Cartago
 was founded aboute the .xxxiii. yere
 of kyng Dauid. ¶ Marianus sayth
 that Cartago was bylde aboute the
 .iiii. yere of Amazias kyng of Juda
 thenne it maye not stonde that Dir
 gilius and frigijs dares in his hysto
 ry of þ batayll of Troie sayen that
 Eneas sawe that woman Dydo. for
 Eneas was dede thre hondred yere &
 more er Cartago was founded that
 Dydo founded/or ther was a nother
 Dydo and older than she/or Carta
 go was rather J bylde . ¶ Therfore
 Saynt Austyn libro p^o confessionum
 sayth that wyle men denpen þ Ene
 as sawe Cartago or Dydo that wō
 man. ¶ Therfore Drosius libro .iiii.
 sayth that Cartago is all about .xxii.
 thousande paas / and euery walle is
 xl. cubytes hyghe/and .xxx. foot bro

de / and the Lyte is beclipped with
 the see well nyghe all about out take
 faucibus that thre thoulande were o
 pende. ¶ Mauritana is the name of
 two londes/the fyrst Lezarenlis that
 hath in the east lyde Numidia/in the
 southe the grauell of the Dcean/in
 the west the Ryuer Malua / & in the
 northe the gewys of the grete see.
 ¶ Tyngitina is the last prouyuce of
 Affryca/and hath in the east lyde the
 Ryuer Malua / in the northe the see
 Gaditan^o / in the west the hylle Ath
 las and the see Dcean. Mauritania
 hath þ name of Mauron that is blac
 ke as it were the countree of blac
 ke men . In this Affryca is the hylle
 Athlas in the west lyde and ende not
 fer from Dcean. And Athlas is soo
 hyghe ouer other hylles that lewde
 men meney that it retcheth to þ Mo
 ne. There is ofte by nyght J seen fy
 re famy and sature/whiche ben spy
 rytes of thayer dyuersly shewed. Also
 there is ofte herde tymbres pypes and
 trompes. ¶ Augustin^o de ciuitate dei
 libro .xviii. Athlas was an Astrono
 myen Promotheus brother / therfore
 some feyren that Athlas bereth heuē
 And of this man Athlas þ hylle hath
 his name & is called Athlas also / &
 it is soo hyghe that lewde men mene
 that it bereth heuen. ¶ Take hede þ
 puni/peni/punici/& punices also ben
 called fenices affry & cartaginēles as
 they were men of fenicea of Affryca
 or of Cartano/for þ woman Dydo þ
 founded Cartago was a comelynge
 and come fro fenicea.

¶ De Europia et ei^o partibz. Ca. xxi.

U Sydonus libro.iiii.sayth that Europa hath þ name of Europa Agenors doughter kyng of Libia & Jupyter kyng of Creta rauylhed Europa Agenors doughter. But this Europa is the thyrde dele of this wyde worlde. And begēneth fro the Ryuer Thanay & the water Meotydes / & stretcheth downward by the north Decean vnto the endes of Spayne atte Flonde Gades / & is besclipped by east & also by south with þ grete lee. In Europa ben many prouynces & Flondes þ whiche now shall be descryued. But fyrste take hede þ in the northsyde of the worlde the waters Meotydes & þ Ryuer Thanays depart a londre the more Alya & Europa / the Ryuer Thanays hath the name of Thanas the fyrst kyng of Scicia / that Ryuer Thanays begynneth fro the hylles Ripheis & gooth douyn in to the see of myddell erthe. ¶ **U**lyd li.xiiii.the lower Scicia. þ londe is full of colde / & begynneth from the Ryuer Thanays & stretcheth bytwene þ Ryuer Danubi⁹ & the north Decean vnto the Germania þ cōtree Allania is a parte of the lower Scicia & stretcheth somdele fro the waters Meotydes towarde Dacyan. ¶ **M**ysia þ londe is closed in the northeest with þ mouth of Danubi⁹ & Joyneth in the southeest to Tracia / & in the southe to Macedonia / in the west to Hyltria / & in the southweest to Dalmacia. Mysia is a good londe of corn & of whete / therefore the olde Cereris called it a berne. ¶ **S**clauia is a parte of Mysia / ther ben also two londes epyther is named Sclauia / the more is

named properly Sclauonia & conteyneth some of Dalmacia & Sarmatas & hath wylde men / & lee theues. the lasse Sclauia stretcheth fro Wandalia & Bohemia vnto Saxone. And therin ben more mylde men & people ¶ **P**annonia hath þ name of of Peninus Alpibus / that ben hylles that ar called Alpes. And thylke hylles de parte Pannonia & Italia / there is a nother Pannonia beyonde þ waters Meotydes in the ponde Scicia / out of the more Pannonia hynny wente an hontyng / & passed longe by many reys & waters & folowed the trace of hertes as Erodotus sayth / & soo atte last the fonde the lasse Pannonia and tourned home agayn / and toke with hem grete strengthe & cam agayn in to the lasse Pannonia & put out the men that were therin / and called the londe Hongaria / But a parte therof is named Bulgaria / & hath in the east syde Mysia / in the south east Hyltria / in the west Alpes the hylles that so be named / in the west Gallia Belgica / that is fraunce / & in the northe that Ryuer Danubi⁹ & Germania þ londe. This londe Bulgaria hath daynes of golde & hylles in the whiche men dygge marbell & salte good atte beste.

De Grecia et eius prouinciis. Capitulum .xxii.

Autors tellen þ Greece with the prouynces therof is lady of kyngdomes. Mourshe of knyghthode & of chyualtrye. Moder of philolophie. fynder & mayster of

Arte & of science. And hath the name of one Grecus that reigned there somtyme. Netheles that londe is called comprily Ilyric⁹. The men therof ben called Greci Graii Achei Achini Argini Acciti Ioues Jonii & Ellen⁹. But whan the grece Constantyn made Constantinopolym the chyfe Lyte of the myrre of Rome. Thenne were the Grekes called Romanii/as it were men of newe Rome soo sayth Raban⁹. And vnto this dape þ Grekes be but Romayles/& were somtyme stalworth/orped/& best men of armes and natheles subgette to lawes. ¶ Pseudo d. p. ca. xvii. In this londe was somtyme the stude & the scole of Pallas & Minerua/of gretest arte & science of knyghthode & of chyualtrye. And the clergie & þ chyualtrye helde soo togydres that in the comyn prouffte was alway good spede. And the olde Graii auentured & gate many thynges by clergie & dedes of armes/but þ vertue heled & withdrowe in hem that cam afterwarde & passed from the Grekes to the Latyns. So that tofore were welles/ben now but lakes / or more verply drye chanelis without water. For now they holde synonys feynyng Dlices gyle. Atrenis cruelnes & fyght with sleight & with cautelys & not with armure & wepen. This londe Grecia is fast by the grete see/& conteyneth many prouynces/that ben Tracia. Lacedemonia. Macedonia. Achaia. Archadia Thessalia Elladia & Boecia. Tracia is called Epyrus also / for Epyrote dwelled therein & hath in the south syde the see Egysu/in the west Macedonia. In

Macedonia dwelled somtyme dyuerse men that hyght Massagete Sarrinate and Gothy. ¶ Pseudo d. libro xv. In this londe is a well that queth chery brennyng brondes/and tendeth brondes that be acquncheth. The chyfe Lyte of this londe is Constantinopolis in the east syde openly I seen bytwene the two sees Ponticus and Propontides/and openly I seen out of water & of londe. And was somtyme the chyfe Lyte of the east/right as Rome was of the west/and hyght somtyme Bylanciū. ¶ Of this Lyte Willelmus libro quarto Regum speketh in this maner. The grete Constantynus bylded and made this Lyte euen and pere to Rome / and demed that the Emperour sholde not be þ chyfe the Apostles were chyfe & namely I crowned. And he brought also many relyques of holy Sayntes that myght helpe ayenst theyr enemyes. Ymages of falle goddes and crypodes delphicos that were Appolynes ymages he brought to be scorned and spyght to them that behelde hem and lawe. Soo this Emperour wouchedsauf to bylde the chyfe Lyte of the Emprre in good corn countree where there is good temprure of heuen and of weder belyde the londe Mylia that hath grete plente of corn and fruyte. That Lyte is I seen and shewed to alle schyppmen that saylley thyderwarde out of what londe that they come of Alpa and of Europa. And is well nyghe beclipped all aboute with the grete see and is cornerd within the clyppynge of the walles fast by the see syde. And is beclipp

ped with a walle of twenty thousande paas. There with hepes & hupples of stones & of grauell caste in to the see belydes þe Lyte/the londe is eched & made more. Also the Ryuer Danubius that is called hystre also / is I lete & I lad in to dyuerse places of the Lyte by goters vnder erthe. In this maner whan the water shall renne in to þe Lyte/men take out a barre that the water is stopped with / & lete the water renne / & stoppen whan hem lyketh. And so Danubius fyndeth water I nough to an hondred streetes. In this Lyte Constantyn⁹ arered & bylded two famous chirches / but Iustinianus the Emperour bylded afterwarde the thyrd chyrche in worshyp of Diuina Sophia / that is our lorde Cryste that Agia calleth Diuina Sophia / in Englyshe the wysdome of god. And men telle that þe werke palleth all the byldyng of the worlde / & is more noble than men canne telle. Thyder brought Saynte Helene the holy crosse þour lorde deyed on. Thesre resten thapostles Andrew & James that was called frater domini / in Englyshe our lordes broder. There resteth Mathias & Prophetes also. Helizeus. Samuell & Danyell / & also Luke the Euangelyst & Marters full many / also Confessours Johan with the golden mouth. Basyleus & Gregorius Nazzenus & virgynes Agatha and Lucy. ¶ Lacedemonia that hyght Spartania also is a prouynce of Grecia fast belyde Tracia Men of that prouynce ben called Lacedemonnes of Lacedemon Semelis sone and ben called Spartani also. ¶ Trogus

libro .iii. These men somtyme besegged the Lyte Helena .x. yere togyder & were wery & agreued of playntes & of grutchyng of her wyues. And drad also that longe abydyng from home in warre and in batayll holde make hem children at home. And ordeyned therfore that maydens of her londe holde take yonglynges eueryche after other. For they hoped to haue the stronger children of euery womman assayed many men. But for the shameful doynge of the moders the children that were gotten and brought forth in that maner were called Spartani. And whan they were .xxx. yere olde they drede loze of nede and of melchyte / for none of them wylt who was his owen fader. Therfore they toke hem a leder and a Capytayne one Phalantis Aracius sone / and toke he noo leue of her moders / but wente forth and were cast hether and theder by dyuerse fortunes. And atte last came in to Italia / and droof oute the men that dwelled there. And made the chyfe Lyte Artarentum. ¶ Macedonia hath þe name of Macedo Deucalyons neuwe / and was called somtyme Emathya of Emathys the kyng / that hath in the east syde the see Egeus / in the south Achaia / in the west Dalmacia / & in þe north Mysia In this prouynce is the hille mons Olympus & departeth two londes. Tracia & Macedonia. ¶ Petrus ca. xxxvii. The hille palleth þe clowdes. In þe upperest of that hille come no clowdes wynde ne reyne / vpon þe hille letters þe were wyrtten in powder were founden without hurtyng or weme at

Lacedemonia.

peres ende soo fowles maye not lyue there/for the ayer is to clere. And phylosophers may not dwelle there to lerne the cours of þ sterres without sponges watred & holden at her nolethyrles to make thyrker þ ayer that they drawe to cole with her herte. There is also mons Athos that retcheth to þ clowdes the shadowe of that hylle and retcheth to the flonde Lempnū. That flonde is from that hylle .lxx. myle. ¶ Dalmacia/that londe hath in the east syde Macedonia/in the west hyltria/in the north Mysia/& in þ south the see Adriaticus. ¶ Achaia hath the name of Acheus the kyng / & is well nyghe an flonde closed in the see. for it hath in the east syde the see Tiren? & in the north the see Dreticus/in the south the see Ionius/& oonly in the west it Jopneth to Macedonia and to Attica. The chyfe Lyte of that londe is named Corinthus/there kyng Alylander gadred his hooft for to wynde all the worlde. Thyder paule wrote his ppytyle ad Corintheos. ¶ Archadia that hyghe Scicionia also/and hath the name of Archas Jupytters lone/& is an angle or a comer of Achaia/& lyeth bytwene the two sees Ionius and Egeus and is shapen as a playn leef. Therin is Albeston that wyll neuer quenche be it ones sette a fyre/the ve ben also whyte Dusels though Dusels be blacke amonge vs there ben whyte. ¶ Thessalia Jopneth in the south syde to Macedonia/& was some tyme Achylles countree. And there began Laphyte. Thylke men chastysed & tamed horses first with bydles & satte on her backes. Therefore the

lewde people supposed that it had be all one body man and horse that they satte vpon. And therefore an hondred hoilmen of Thessalia were called Centaury / that name is gadred of tweyne/of Centū that is an hondred & aura that is the wynde. And so þ name was to hem gyuen Centauri / as it were an hondred wynde wagger/for they wagger the wynde faste in her rydyng. ¶ Trogus libro .xiiii. In this prouynce is the hylle Pernalus. Poetes acouite that hylle noble & famous & hangeth with two copped stones. In the toppe therof is þ Temple of Delphicus Appollyn/& in the wendynge of the myddell playn is a pytte/out of that pytte phylosophers were enlpyred. And dyuerse answers were gyuen out of þ pytte. Therefore yf noyle of men or of trompes lowne in a valaye/the stones answeren eueryche other/& dyuerse Ecco lowneth Ecco is reboūdyng of noyle. Pylodor? libro .xiiii. In this prouynce ben two Ryuers / sheep that drynke of þ one shall were blacke/& sheep that drynke of that ocher were whyte. And yf they drynke of boche they shall were splecked of dyuerse colour. Also in this prouynce ben thylke lykyng places to walke in that Phylosophers & Poetes callen Tempore florida/that is lykyng place with floures. Of this place wryteth Theodolus & Quidi? Also in this prouynce was the thyrde partyculer flood and fylle in Deucalyons tyme prynce of that londe/that prynce saued men that fledde to hym in shyppes and bootes. Therefore poetes feyned that he and his wyf Pyrra

mons.

Ecco.

Elladia. taste stones & made men. ¶ Elladia that londe hath the name Ellena the kyng that was Deucalpons sone and Pyrras also. Of this Ellena þ Grieskes were called Ellenenes. This londe is named Attyca also of Athis that was Grauius doughter / & lyeth by twene Macedonia & Achaia / & Joynech in the northe lyde to Archadia. This londe is very Grecia / & hath two partes. Boecia is that one / & Peloponensis is þ other. The chyfe cyte of this londe is called Athenes / there was somtyme a grete stude of leaure & of clergye / & men of all nacyns & londes come thyder for to lerne. Athenes that Cyte was bylde in this maner. ¶ Aug. de ci. li. xviii. That tyme þ Egypte was smoten with god almyghtyes wretche vnder Moyses honde / some Egypcyens dradde lest Egypte sholde be lost / & fledde out of Egypte to other londes. And soo Licrops fledde out of Egypte in to Grecia / & there he bylde þ Cyte of Attene that was called afterwarde Athenes. In this maner as Darro sayth. An Dlyue was sodeynly seen in that Cyte Attene / & a water brake out sodeynly in an other place. Thenne Licrops axed counseyll of Appollyn Delphicus a mawmete in the moūt Parnasus / & axed what these sholde be to mene. And he answerde & sayde that the Dlyue betokened þ goddesse Minerva / & the water betokened Neptuneus / & sayd that it was in power & choyle of Lytezevns / after whether of the two goddes the Cyte shold be named. Therefore the Lytezevns bothe men & wōmen gadred hem togpdras

as it was the mauer that tyme / that bothe men & wōmen sholde come to comyn counseyll. Thenne in that counseyll men gaf the dome for Neptuneus & wōmen for Minerva. And for ther was one wōman moo than men. Minerva hath the maystrye / & the Cyte was called by her name Athene. For Minerva in the speche of greue is called Athena. Thenne was Neptuneus wode wrothe & made þ flodes of the see to rylle & ouerflowe & hele the londes of them of Athenes as deuels may lyghtly do suche checkes. Thenne for to please Neptuneus & for to abate his wrathe & his anger wōmen were punysshed by double payn / that one was that no woman sholde afterwarde come in comyn counseyll / that other payne was that no childe sholde afterwarde bere his moders name To þ prouynce Elladia leueth Elepontus the grete mouth of the grete see / & hath the name of Elle frigus suster that fledde the malycie and the pursute of her stepdame & was drowned in that mouth & see. And for that happe / that see & the londe aboute is named after Elle Elepontus. ¶ Darro sayth. That fast belydes that place ben men that hele symptyng of serpentes with touche and with spotyll. ¶ Trogus libro secundo. Athenienles men of Athenes vled fyrste crafte of wolle of wyne & of oyle / & taught to cere & sowe / & to ete a comes / they floyrshed fyrst in lore of clergye & of lawe. The fyrst kyng of that londe hyght Licrops. After hym come Grianus þ hyght Grianans also. Thenne his sone Athis gaf his name to that

londe & called it after hymselfe Athenienlis. Thenne after Athis reigned Amphigionides. In his tyme was þ grete flood in Thellalia. Thenne afterwarde the kyngdome descended to Erictonius. After hym reigned Egeus. And after hym his sone Theleus. Theñe Theleus sone of Demophon he helpe the Grekes ayenst þ Trojans. ¶ Boecia. Orelonde that name of bos / that is an oxe / whay Ladius Agenores sone atte his faders helte sought his suster Europa that Jupyter had rauyshed / & myght not tyn / de her / he dradde his faders wratthe. & he coude none other rede but fledde as an outlawe. It happened that he folowed the fore of an oxe / & fonde þ place that the oxe laye in / & called it Boecia / & bylded there þ Lyte Thebe. In that Lyte (bella ciuilia deto / nuerūt) & there was Appollo born & Hercules in thylke moze Thebanus allo. In that londe is a lake wonder full & wode. for who that drynketh therof shall brenne in wodenesse of lecherpe / there ben also two welles in þ londe / who that dryketh of that one he shal be forgetfull / & who that drynketh of that other he shall haue good mynde. ¶ Petrus. Take hede that men of Thebe in Egypte are called Thebey. And men of Thebe that is in Grecia are called Thebani / & the men of Thebe in Judea ben called Thebyte.

U Sydoruz libro .xiiii. We rede in stoyes that Grekes dwelled somtyme in Italia / & cal

led that londe the grete Grecia / that londe hyght some tyme Hesperia of Hespera the terre that laddo the Grekes whan they saylled thyder & was her looesterre. Hespera that is Venus Afterwarde that londe hyght Saturnia of Saturn⁹ þ dwelled there. for Saturnus hydde hym selfe there in that londe for drede of his owen sone Jupyter / & called that londe Lacum that is Saturn⁹ hydles. After that / þ londe hyght Eulonia of Eulonius Olixes sone. But atte last that londe was called Italia of Italus rege / siculor kyng of Sicilia / & is the noblest prouynce of all Europa / & is closed in the north syde with the mouth & see Tyrenus / & in þ west with the sydes of the hylles that hyght Alpes. Out of thylke hylles spryngen thre þ noblest Ryuers of all Europa / that ben called þ Ryuer Danubi⁹ / & Rone. ¶ Sydor⁹ libro .xii. In this Italia is Letheroes welle that heled loze eyen / there is also the lake Clitorius who that drynketh of þ lake no wyne shall hym greue. ¶ Plinius libro scdo caplo .xviii. faste by þ hylles that ben called Alpes Apennini is that welle Nouacius that wellethe and spryngeth in the hote somer and drye / and fordrpeth in colde wynter and wete. ¶ Treuisa. Alpes Apennini that ben Penicus hylles. Haniball was a grete duke and hyght Penitus also / and wente by Alpes to Rome. Therefore of the two names Alpes & Penitus is that one name shortly made Apennini And so ben many lettres left of þ two ¶ Paulus libro scdo. In this Italia ben many prouynces and Landes

that bey called Calabria Apulia Lã
 pana Beneuentana Tulcia Emilia
 Liguria Lombardia Calabria Apu
 lia is a parte of Italia & lyeth east
 ward vpon y^e see / & is departed from
 the flonde Scicilia with an arme of
 the see. Grekes were the fyrst y^e buyl
 ded therin. The chyef therof is Dion
 dusium / & hath the name of that wor
 de of grue Bunca / that is an hertes
 hede. for y^e Lyte is shapen as an her
 tes hede / fro thens mey saylle to the
 holy londe. In this londe Apulia bey
 hote welles & holsom. ¶ The more
 Campania is a londe in the myddell
 bytwene the demaynes of Rome and
 Apulia. The chyfe Lyte therof is La
 pua & hath that name of Capacitas
 that is ablenes to receyue & to take.
 for y^e Lyte receyueth & taketh Inough
 of all plente / & is couēted the thyrde
 Lyte after the moost famous Lytees
 Rome & Cartago. In y^e londe bey
 famous Lytees Notelis & Puteolis /
 there bey Virgyls bathes that were
 somtyme in grete worthyp. But ther
 is a nother lasse Campania in Gal
 lia senocensi that is fraunce. The
 chyfe Lyte of that Campania is cal
 led Treca & Trecentis also / that is
 Troys in Champayn. ¶ In this
 Italia were somtyme dyuerse lordes
 eueryche after other that were Gre
 kes. Janus Saturn⁹ Italus Eneas
 & his offsprynge. And afterwarde Gal
 ly senocenses that bey frenche men
 vnder duke Brenius. ¶ Thenne af
 terwarde aboute the yere of Grace
 four hondred. Gothy hynny Wanda
 ly / atte last vnder y^e yere of grace fyue
 hondred. .xlviij. In the prynce tyme

Justinus Narcencartularius prayed
 Longobardy for to come in to Italia
 & of the Longobardy yet to this dape
 y^e hyther syde of Italia from Alpes
 well upghe to Rome hyght Lombard
 dia. How Longobardy cam in y^e na
 me. ¶ Paulus. Roman⁹ dyaconus in
 pn^o. li. hy storie Longobardi / sayth in
 this maner. Wēnyly y^e hyght Longo
 bardy also & haue y^e nauē of her lon
 ge berdes / wente wth two dukes Iboz
 & Ayon & her moder Gambara that
 was full redy & wyle out of Scandi
 nania an flonde of Germania in y^e
 north syde. This Scandinania is I
 called an flonde not for it is in y^e see
 But for in the playn of the bynkes /
 it is alwaye walshen with wawes.
 Out therof wente Wynnyly & war
 red in Scormiga & ouercome y^e Wan
 dales. Thenne dyed the dukes Iboz
 and Ayon & they made hem a kyng
 Agelmundus Ayons lone the whiche
 regned ouer hem .xxiii. yere. In his
 tyme a comyn woman hath .vii. chil
 dery atte one burthen as it shall be
 after more clerely shewed. One of
 hem y^e was named Lauillius was the
 seconde kyng of Longobardys / & reg
 ned after Agelmundus / whan Agel
 mundus the kyng was to bolde vpon
 his owen truste / y^e Bulgarys cam vp
 on him on a nyght & slowe hym stan
 dyng. After hym Lethen regned and
 was the thyrde kyng of y^e Longobar
 dys / and regned fourty yere. After
 hym Hyldecock. After hym the fyfthe
 Gudehoc regned in Adocæs tyme
 that was Italicus & ladde his men
 to the londe of Rugorum. After hym
 the sixthe Claffo. After hym the

Teuente Lato that Waccho sloughe Lato & outlawed his sone for euermore. Waccho was Lato broders sone/ & so whan Waccho was dede/his sone Waltaricus was the .viii. kyng of Longobardis & reigned .vii. yere after hym. The .ix. Andoenus þ laddde fyrst the Longobardis in to Pannonia. After hym his sone Albuinus was þ .x. kyng of the Longobardis. Narles Patricius prayed this kyng Albuinus to come with his men and take Italia That was in Justinus themperours tyme/the yere of our lord .v. C. lxxviii. & that was after that Longobardes had dwelled in Pannonia .xlii. yere. Of this Albuinus conquest & of his wonderfull ende. Seche withyn forth in his place about the yere of our lord .v. hondred .lxx.

Auctours wryten & tellen that the Cyte of Rome is J buyl/ ded in Tulcia that is a parte of Italia. Of the fondacion therof & gouernynge. Auctours wryte many dyuerse doynges & specpally. ¶ Martinus de condicione eius. ¶ Magister vero Gregorius. Of the wondres of the Cyte wryteth shortly many thyn ges þ ben worthy to be kepte in mynde. ¶ Martinus. It is wryte that many kynges reigned about the place of Rome. ¶ For Eustodius sayth That after that towre Babel was J bylte & men begonne to speke dyuerse tonges & langages. Noe with certayne men toke a shyp & saylled in to Italia. And buylde a Cyte of his name

& ended there his lyfe. Thenne Janus Japhets sone þ was Noes sone buylde Janiculū by yonde the Ryuer Tyberis. There is now a chirche of Saynt Johan that hyght Saynt Johans chirche ad Janiculū. About þ tyme Nemproth that hyght Saturn⁹ also whiche was gelded of his owey sone Jupyter/come to the for/ sayd Janus kyngdome/ & buylde a Cyte there as Capytoll is now. Also Italus that tyme þ kyng with Sciculis men of Scicilia come to Jan⁹ & to Saturn⁹ & bylte a Cyte fait by þ Ryuer Albula. That Ryuer is now called Tyber & is a Ryuer of Rome. Also Hercules Italus sone buylde a Cyte named Galeria bynethe þ Capytoll. After þ Tyberis þ kyng come out of the east. And Euander þ kyng out of Archadia and buylde Cytees ¶ Virgilius accordeth herto & sayth/ thenne the fader Euander at Rome was maker of towres. Thenne after warde come Romulus & closed with in one walle all thylke Cytees about and made one grete Cyte of all closed in one/ & brought gentylmen & noble oute of Italia with theyr wyues for to dwelle therin. ¶ Tycus. Whyle that Cyte was poore / was no place more holy/ne ryche of good ensample. But afterwarde ryche gadered & encreaced / and syn they haue ben coueytous and lecherous. ¶ Marcus. Two brethern that were born at one burthou Remus and Romulus buyl/ deden Rome in the hylle palatinus. And was buylde the .xi. kalendas of Maye. Tho began the .vii. Olymp⁹ that was the fyrst yere of Acham kyn

ge of Juda/and .iiii. C. liiii. yere af
ter the takyng of Troye. ¶ R. But
more verily as Solinus sayth .iii. C.
e. xxxiiii. after the takyng of Troye
¶ Marc. The whiche Cyte of Rome
was afterwarde wonderly I hyghte
with walles/with toures/with yates
with Temples/with Palays/e with
dyuerse e wonderfull werkes / e had
on the walles .iii. C. lxi. toures e con
teyneth about .xxii. myle withoute h
is by yonde Tyber e y Cyte Leonina
But as men layen it conteyneth all
about .xlii. myle and had in all .xvi.
pryncypall yates .x. a thylhalfe Ty
ber that were named Porte Capuena
porte Apia/porte Latina/porte Alina
ria/porte Matronii/porte Leuycana/
porte Numentana/port Salaria/port
te Princiiana/e porte Colina. Also by
yonde Tybre ben thre yates/e thre in
the Cyte Leonina. ¶ Grego. Among
the wondres of this Cyte that yet ben
seen sayth it is a grete wonder of soo
many defensible toures/of so many
byldynges of palayces whether it we
re by wytchecraft or by mannes dede
¶ R. So that now ben verityed the
versys that Hildebert⁹ eps Lenonean
made / e Willel. Halmelbu. putteth
hem in his book of kynges as here fo
loweth. Rome nothyng is pere to the
Though thou neyghe all fallyng be
On all thou shewest thy boude. How
grete thou were whan y were soude.

¶ De palaciis Rome.

There were many palayces cry
stale e nobly I bylde in Rome
in worshyp of Emperours e

of other noble men also. Amonge the
whiche y gretest e the moost palays
of all was in y myddell of y Cyte in
token of one pryncypalite of all the
worlde wyde. Also the palays of peas
therin Romul⁹ dyde do sette his owen
ymage of golde e sayd. Hit thall ne
uer fallie tyll a mayde bere a childe.
And y ymage fylle whan Cryst was
born. Dyoctesian⁹ palays hath pylers
as hyghe as a stone caste/e soo grete
about y an .L. men alle a yere wor
chyng shold vnneth heve one of thyl
ke pylers. Also there was a palays of
lx. Emperours/e yet standeth a part
therof/h all Rome may not destroye
¶ De templis. ¶ There as Patheon
the Temple of all maxmetrye was/
is now a chirche of all halowen/e by
cause our lady is after Cryst is chyef
e holyest of all mankynde/h chirche
hath y name of our lady / e is called
sancta Maria rotunda/that is yroude
chirche of our lady/e hath in brede y
space of .ii. C. lx. fote. fast by y Tem
ple is an arche of marbell/e y is the
arche of Augustus Lezars dydorpes
e grete dedes. In that arche ben alie
his grete Actes descryued. There is
also Scipions arche/he ouercome ha
niball. Atte saynt Steuen in pylcina
was the Temple Dlouitrez y was
made of crystal e of golde/there was
Astronomye I grauen and I pernted
with sterres e lygnes of heuen. Sayn
te Sebastyan destroyed y Temple.
Also the Capytol was arayed with
glas e with golde as it were the mys
rour of all the worlde aboute. There
the Consuls e Senatours governed e
rewled alle the worlde as moche as

was in her power. And there was Jupiters Temple / & in that Temple was Jupiters ymage of fyne golde littyng in a trone. ¶ Here take he de that oonly thre Temples were in Rome that had flamynes / that were bysshops to serue fals goddes & maometrye & hyght flamynes as it were fplamines of filo þ is a threde that they bonde about her hede / whan they myght not in the holy daye lustre on her pylons & her cappes for hete. In Jupiters Temple serued flamen dialis / that is the day bysshop. for Jupiter was called diespiter / that is the fader of the day. Also in Mars Temple was flamen Marcialis / that is Mars bysshop. And in Romul⁹ Temple was flamen quirinalis / þ is quirinus bysshop. for Romul⁹ was called quirinus also. ¶ De domibz. ¶ In Rome was an hous I made well nyghe all of golde & belette with precious stones. Men sayd that / that hous was worthe well nyghe þ thyrde parte of all the worlde. In that hous euery londe & prouynce had an ymage I sette by Nygromancye. Eueryche of thylke ymages bare his owen londes name wyrtten on his breste. And a coherbelle of syluer hanged about his necke. So that yf ony londe rebelled or arose ayenst Rome / anone þ ymage of that londe tourned his backe towarde the ymage of Rome & þ belle about his necke sholde ryng. And the preestes that kepte that hous eueryche by his cours warned the prynces of þ doynge. There was also an horsman of bras on hyghe on the coppe of that hous & moeued also with a spere in

his honde & tourned the poynt of his spere towarde that londe that wolde soo aryle. And soo the Romaynes myght lpyghely come vpon thei enemyes vnware. In þ hous also was a fyre that noo man myghte quenche. And men axed of þ craftes man that made it how longe it sholde endure. And he answered and layd / hit sholde endure for euermore vnto that a mayde had born a childe / and the same nyght that Cryste was born that hous fylle downe / and the fyre was quenched the same nyght and tyme. Also Deaneus Appollo that man closed a confeccion of byrmstone and of blacke salt in a vessell of bras / and sette it a fyre with a candell that he had halowed in his maner / & made there a bath with bathynge places þ alwaye were hote. There was also in an hous an ymage of yron / and was named Bellefrontes ymage / whiche weyed .xv. thousand pounde with his hors that he sat on / and henge in the ayer with noo poste ne pylle bynethe vnder sette / ne holde with cheyne aboue / but Adamante stones that were in the dawte and in the Arches aboute drowhe euen the yron eueryche to his syde so that the yron ymage myghte not downward ne vpwarde ne towarde neyther syde / but henge alwaye euen a mydde. ¶ De Artificiis ¶ There is a place in Rome in Traclia & is called Theatrum / that is a place to stonde or lytte Inne / for to loke well aboute / there in is wonderly grauen cabans and dennes / dyuerse outgoynge benches & leges all aboute / and is hoole and sounde all oy

marbell Stone / & this werke is sette vpon .vi. crabbes I hewen of harde marbell Stone. In that place maye no man so pryuely speke/ne to hymselfe ne to another man/but all þe sayth be herde all about. Fast by Augustus Cezars palays is a walle made of brente tyle & stretcheth douward out of the hyghe hylles by the pate porte Almaria / that walle is made vpon grete arches & huge/that walle stretcheth a dayes Journey from Rome in a grete conduyte/vpon that walle the waters & stremes of the welles of the montaynes rennen in to Rome/& thenne it is departed in dyuerse conduytes & pypes of bras / & soo ranne somtyme in to euery palays of Rome for the water of tyber is hoollom & good for hors / & vrhoollom & euill for men/therfore the olde Romayns made freshe water come out of four partes of the Lyte by wayes craftely made/& therof men myght take alle that they wolde whyle the compyns of Rome were in her floures. By that walle is the bathe that Syaneus made of the whiche bathe was spoken to fore. In Albestorio a place þe hyght Statuariū Cezaris were made whyte stoles for Emperours. Also there was a candellstyck made of a stone þe hyght Albeston / whan it was ones Jceynd & sette a fyre & I sette without ther coude no man queuche it with no craft that men coude deuple. ¶ In this maner it myght be þe Geant Pallas about the yere of oure lorde a thoulande & .xl. that yere was founde in Rome a Geantes body burped hole & soude/þe space of his woūde was

four fote longe & an half/the length of his body passed the heygth of the walles/atte his hede was I founde a lanterne brennyng alwaye that noo man coude quenche with blast ne with water ne with other crafte/vnto the tyme that there was made a lypyll hole vnder the lyghte bynethe that the aper myght entre. Men sayen þe Turnⁿ slowgh this Geant Pallas whan Eneas fought for Lauina that was Eneas wyfe. This Geantes Epptaphium is this. The wrytynge of mynde of hym that laye there was this: Pallas Euanders sone lyeth here hym Turnus the knyght with his spere slowghe in his manere. ¶ De statuis et lignis. There was atte Rome a Bulle of bras in the shap of Iupiter ouercast & shap to men þe loked thereon. That Bulle semed lowhyng and startelyng. There was also the ymage of Venus all naked in the same maner as Venus shewde her self to þe man Paris somtyme of Trope/& was soo craftely made that in the mouth & lypes that were as whyte as ony snowe semed freshe blood & newe. There is also at Rome a wonder copped pyler and is Romulus pyler / that pyler pylgrymes and palmers that fast can lpe calle hit saynt Peters corn hupple and sayen that whan Nero theemperour had rauylshed it/hit torned in to an hyl of stone as grete as hit was before of corn Amonge all pylers Julius Cezars pyler is moost wonderfull/and hath in the heygth two hondred & fyfty fote. In þe coppe therof in a roude thyng of bras ben Julius Cezars boones

& allhes. Of that Pylar & Arche ben
 verses I made that ben thus to me/
 nunge & namely of the ouermest sto/
 ne. Yf þ stone is one/telle what craft
 brought hym vpon. And yf they be
 many stones/tell where they Joyney
 at ones. This arche & pylar is I fou
 ded & sette vpon four Lyons. Pylgry/
 mes full of lesynges calle this arche
 & pylar Saynt Peters Nelde & lye &
 sape that thylke man is clene of syn/
 ne that maye crepe vnder that stone.
 There ben also in Rome two grete
 horses of marbell stone. For in Tybe
 rius tyme two yonge philolophers
 Diaricellus & fibia come to Rome &
 yeden all naked. And whan themp/
 rour axed hym why & wherfore they
 wente so naked/they answered & sayd
 for we haue forsaken all thyng/and
 for alle thyngge is to vs naked & bare
 & openly knowen / ye syr Emperour
 & all that þ spekest in coulepyl & pry/
 uete we knowe atte best. ¶ Treupla
 The fyrst poynt of this doynge & an
 swere techerh / that who þ forsaketh
 all thyngge forsaketh his cloehes. And
 so it foloweth that they that ben well
 clothed & gooth about & beggeth and
 gadreth moneye & corn & catell of o/
 ther men forsaketh not alle thyngge.
 ¶ R. Themperour assayde & fonde
 soch all that they sayd / & at her owen
 prayer made in mynde of hem two
 grete horses of marbell. There is a
 nother sygne & token before þ Popes
 palays an horse of bras & a man lye/
 tyng theron & holdeth his right hon/
 de as though he spake to the peple &
 holdeth his byrdell in his lyfte honde
 & hath a cucko bytween his hors heres

And a seke dwert vnder his feet. Pyl
 gryms callen that man Theodericus
 And the comyns calle hym Constan
 tinus / but Clerkes of the courte calle
 hym (Marcus & quint^{us} curius) also
 this sygne stode iomtyme tofore Ju
 pyters awlter in þ Capytoyll vpon
 four pylers of bras. But Saynt Gre
 gory threwe douy hors & man & sette
 hym to fore the Popes palays. They
 that calle hym Marcus telle this reas
 son & shyll. There was a dwert of þ
 hynred of Helsenis/his craft was Ny
 gromancye. Whan he had subdewed
 kynnes that dwelled nyghe hym and
 made hym subgette to hym. Thenne
 he wente to Rome to warre with the
 Romayns. And with his craft he bes
 nam the Romayns power & myght
 for to smyte / & beleged hem longe ty/
 me I closed within the Lyte. This
 dwert went euery day tofore the sons
 ne rplyng in to the felde for to do his
 craft. Whan the Romayns had el/
 pyed that maner doynge of þ dwert
 they spake to Marcus a noble knyght
 & behyght hym lordshyp of þ Lyte / &
 a memorypall in mynde for euermore
 yf he wolde defende hem & saue the
 Lyte. Thenne Marcus made an hole
 through þ walle longe er it were dape
 for to abyde his craft to cache this
 dwert. And whan it was tyme þ cucko
 lange and warned hym of the dape.
 Thenne Marcus reyled to / & by cau
 se he myght not hytte þ dwert with
 wepen he caught hym with his hon/
 de & bare hym in to the Lyte. And
 for drede lest he sholde helpe hymselfe
 with his craft yf he myght speke/he
 threwe hym vnder the hors feet / and

the horse al to frade hytt). And therfore that ymage was made in remembrance of this dede. They þ call that ymage & sygne (quint⁹ cursius) telle this skylle & reason/there was somtyme in the myddell of Rome a grete clyfte or hole in the erthe/out of that hole come smoke & bymstone & slewe many men/thenne (quintus cursius) toke couleyll of Phebus & armed hē & entred in to the hole/thenne anone flee a cuckow out of the hole & thene the erthe closed togpder & so the hole was stopped. A nother sygne is Colloseus ymage þ is called also the ymage of the sonne or of Rome. There is grete wonder how it myght be gotten or acered/the ymage is so grete þ lengthe therof is six score foot & six/this ymage was somtyme in the Flonde Herodius .xv. fote hygher than þ hyghest place in Rome. This ymage bare in his right honde a spere alle roude J shape as the worlde/& in his lyfte honde a swerde that betokeneth myght of batayll. In token that it is lasse maystrye to wyne & to conquerre than it is to kepe & to saue þ/that is conquered & wonne. This ymage was of bras but it was soo Rpally or uergylt that it shone in derknes & gaf grete bemes of lyght. Also it moeued about with the sonne in suche a maner that alwaye his face was toward the sonne. Alle the Romayns that come therby worshypped that ymage in token of subgeccōn & of thraldom. Saynt Gregory destroyed that ymage wth fyre/for he myght not destroye it with strengthe. Of that ymage is only J lefte the hede & the right hon

de holdyng the spere/that is the Roudenes & the lykenes of þ worlde. For of all that ymage lefte nomore vnbrente that hede & þ honde bey nowe tofore the Popes palays vpon two pylers of marble/& wonderly by crafte of meltyng þ bras was J gotten/that þ here semeth softte to a mānes lyght & the mouth as though it were spekyng. ¶ Polict. libro. ii. For to hyghte the noblete of this Cyte þ Romayns made a womans ymage in bras/that ymage helde in her honde a spere the shape of the wyde worlde. And whan the ymage was full made hem lemed that the legges were to feble for to bere suche an ymage/hit was soo grete & soo hygh. But the craftelmay that hit made answerd & sayd/the legges shall dure alwaye & bere the ymage at the best & neuer fayll vnto a mayde bere a childe/but þ legges faylled & the ymage fylle douw whan Cryste was born. Faste by Despalianus palays is a stone that is called Parius/in þ stone is J keruen a whyte sowe with .xxx. pygges that gyue water to hem that wpll wellthe there. There is also a table of bras þ forbedeth synne therin bey wryten the chyef popntes of the lawe/there bey wryten as it were rules in metre/the menyng therof is vnderstanden in this wrytyng nexte folowpng. Every nyght where a cocke/waketh some may er it dawe All his songe in a flocke/maye lyke noman by the lawe. Whan somer is hote/the throtle syngeth with mery note. Whan þ daye gooth awaye/the byrde is styll and leueth his laye. In towne as it longes/þ osull twytereth

mery songes. At nyght for drede/trus
ly no longe doth he grede. Whan flou
re spryngeth on rote/the nyghtyngale
in his note. Twiterich well fawnyng
with swete songe in the dawnyng.
Trall maketh his fare with mouth/
thenne chiterich the stare. Of morow
longe kynde / they haue at euen noo
mynde.

four whyte hoises sholde drawe vnto
the Capytoyll. There of spekech
Quidius/with four hoises all snowe
whyte/þ shalt syre Emperour wende
yet amonge all this worshyp. for he
sholde not forpete hym selfe/this one
Anoye he hadde. A chorle was with
hym in his chare / & smote hym al
waye in the necke / and that for two
skylles / that one was for he sholde
not be to proude of þ grete worshyp/
that other skylle was for euery man
sholde hope to come to that worshyp

yt he made hym selfe worthy by his
dedes. Whyle þ chorle smote þ byctour
he sholde ofte laye to hym in this ma
ner (Nothololitos) that is to laye
knowe thy selfe/as who sayth be not
to proude of this worshyp. And also
that dape euery man had leue to laye
to þ byctour what somener he wolde
& noo blame sholde be take therfore.
And so were many dyspyteous wor
des layd to Julius Cezar/& he toke
therof no maner wretche. One layde
to Juli⁹ at suche a tyme Saluealue
that is hapll balard/& a nother layd
hayle kyng & quene CR. Loke within
in Juli⁹ Cezar. In vita Johānis
elemolinarii. Whan themperours of
Rome were crowned sholde come to
hym craftes men þ make Tombes &
axe of hem of what maner stone oz
metall they sholde make theyr Tom
bes/as who sayth þ shalt depe/gouer
ne myldely þ people. Hug. ca. clar⁹
Whan the Romayns wolde warre in
ony londe/one sholde goo to thendes

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ner gownes they vled & were called pretaxata palmata & candidata / the fyrst maner gowne pretaxata gentyl menschildery vled for to were of. xiiii yere olde / þ̄ seconde maner palmata vled vptours for her noble dedes / the thyrde maner gowne candidata vled lordes & maystres rulers of the lawe.

¶ Hug. ca. fastus / the dayes þ̄ the Romayns well spedde were named fasti that is leeffull . for it was leeffull to hem thylk dayes to vbe dpuerle doynge & dedes / the days þ̄ the Romayns myspedde were called nephasti as it were not leeffull / & they helde thylke dayes & wrought not / but for no loue ne deuocions / but for drede of euyll happes.

¶ Hug. ca. v. The fest of thylke dayes is called qnquatria þ̄ is the fyue blake dayes for the sorow & bytternes þ̄ the Romayns had whan the frenshe men and hanyball beleged them al about. for theñe no Romayn durst ones go out of þ̄ towne.

¶ Hug. c. classis. Whan Romulus had ordeyned for the comyn prouffyte he departed a sondre the grete & þ̄ mene / & called eyther parte classis . In worlhypp of hem he ordeyned a moneth & called it Mayus / þ̄ is the moneth of þ̄ grete men / the mene men were called þ̄ seconde classis / & in worlhypp of hem he ordeyned a moneth & called it Junij that is þ̄ moneth of yonger men. Afterwarde the Romayns were departed in four partes. In the fyrst parte were consuls & doctours. In þ̄ second classis were tribuni & mey of lasse dignyte. In the thyrde were free men / & in þ̄ fourth were bondmen. Tribun⁹ is he that receyueth trybute & payeth

knyghtes. And a leder or capytayn of thousand knyghtes hyght Tribun⁹

¶ Hug. c. calon. The Romayns vled somtyme in euery moneth to make a fayre / & the fayre began þ̄ fyrst dape of the Nonas & dured to þ̄ fyrst dape of Idus . Idus is as moche to saye as delyng & departyng / for theñe the fayre was departed . Also for the begynnynge was oftyme vnknowe to marchauntes & to chapmen / therfore the fyrst dape of þ̄ moneth hyght halende of calo calas that is calle & crye A cryour sholde stande vpon a towre & as many dayes as were from that dape to the begynnynge of þ̄ fayre he sholde crye calo . Therfore it is that in some moneth in the kalender hath but four Nonas / and some hath sixe. And that done for theues that were hydde in wodes for to alpye chapmen sholde not knowe whan þ̄ fayre sholde begynne.

¶ Hug. c. mereoz. Somtyme knyghtes after that they were. lx. yere olde were not compelled for to do ony dedes of armes. But men yaf hem feldes / or townes / or somewhat elles of þ̄ comyn tresour wherby they sholde lyue. And theñe suche a knyghte was called emeritus or emerite milicie / as it were a knyght sette out of the nedefull dedes of chyualtye.

¶ R. Therfore Anatarii þ̄ is by yonde Tyber hight emeritoria / for suche knyghtes spent what they had to fore gotten & I wonne.

¶ Hug. c. lita. It was vblage in Rome that the Lyteseyns sholde doo not elles to fore none but dylpate of the comyn prouffyte / therfor comyn wemen of Rome were called nonarye / for they shold not to fore

none goo out to her comyn place/lest they sholde lette yonge men from the comyn prouffyte. ¶ Hug. capi. nepa. Somtyme in Rome fader & moder sholde not noyssh & teche her owen childery. for it was suppoled þ they wolde be to tendre & not chastyle and bete hem. Neyther maystres that were all straüge & out of the kynne sholde teche childery of Rome/lest they wolde recche to lypyll of the childery & bete hem to soze/therfore maystres sholde teche the childery of Rome that were not to neygh ne to ferre of her owne kynne. ¶ Hug. ca. ples. There were somtyme in Rome that serueth of nought elles but for to gete childery/ & dwelled alwaye in the Lyte & were not cöpelled to dedes of armes. And suche men were called proletarii/that is to saye geters of childery. ¶ R. Ne theles in Hanybals tyme they were cöstreyned for to go out for scarlenes of knyghtes. ¶ Valer. libro. ii. An honored pere & .lx. after þ the Lyte was J bylde/was no deuoise made bytweene a man & his wyfe. Ne theles Tarbilius a bastart was þ fyrst that left his wyfe only/for þ woman was bareyn though he semed J meued of reason/ yet he was not all blaimles for he put coueyse of childery to fore þ feythe of wedlocke. ¶ Vlydor⁹ libro. vi. Though the Grekes wypte fyrste in waxe with popyntels of yron/the Romayns ordeyned þ noman sholde wypte with popyntels of yron but with popyntels of bone. ¶ Poli. li. ii. Who þ wyll loke bookes of storpes. Amonge all men þ were syth Rome was fyrst made/he shall fynde þ the Romayns

were moost coueto⁹ & proude/he shall fynde also that þ maystrye þ they had in the worlde about/they gate it with punysshing of people by fals wyles & by gyle/soo ferforth that vnneth ony of her prynces lyued his lyfe kyndely to his ende. Therfore euery Romayn that ouercometh other is ouercome with flatering & with fayre wordes. And yf wordes faylle / yettes shall him awelde. yf yettes faylle. worshypp maketh hem prysoner. ¶ Pol. li. xvii. caplo .xi. Whyle the Lytees of Italia loued peas & worshypped right wylnes and leued false oches/thenne they had lyhyng & welthe in her owne londe. But whay they yeue hem to falthede & to stryfe. Anone the pryde of the Romaynes/or the wodenes of duche men / or somme other wreche of god almyghty falleth vppon hem / vnto the tyme they amende by penaunce and contricion. for trespassse of that people putteth awaye alle pryncypalyte / or maketh her prynce more mylde.

¶ De Germania et eius prouinciis. Vlydor⁹ Eth. xiiii. Caplm⁹ xxvi.

Vlydor⁹ sayth. That very Germania hath in the east by the mouth of the Ryuer Danubius/in the south þ Ryn that Ryuer/& in þ north & in the west the see of Dcean/there ben two londes/ether is called Germania / the ouer Germania stretcheth belydes Alpes to that mouth and colle of the grete see þ is called Adriatic⁹/there the see is as it were lakes in the contrées of

Aquilia. The other Germania is lower towards the west about the Ryn & commonly called Alamania or Teutonia. In either Germania be many prouinces & londes/that be Boemia. Westfalia. Bauaria. Turingia. Sueuia. Saxonia. Franconia. Lotharingia. Frisia. & Selandia. ¶ Paulus li. p. The north countree is fer from the sonne & holosome for men to dwelle in and able to bring forth children/therefore it is that there is more multiplication & encrease of men & children in the north countree than in the south that is full nyghe the sonne & unholsom & sekely for men to dwelle in. And so though every londe & countree haue his owen proper name. Nevertheless all y countree & londe from the Ruer Thanays vnto the west is called Germania. for it gendreth and bringeth forth mo men and children than it maye well susteyne. Therefore it is so often goon dyuerse men oute of y lye of y world in to other londes by lotte or ayenst her wyll or her good wyll for to gete other londes/so dyde Gothys. wadali. Saxons. wynnly & Longobardi. ¶ Boemia is the fyrste prouince of the east Germania/and hath in the east lye Mysia & Alania in the south the Ruer Danubius & Pannonia/in the west Bauaria and Turingia/ & in y north & north west Saxonia/ & is closed almost aboute with hylles & wodes and hath grete plente of lele & grasse that smelleth full swete & of dyuerse wyld beestes. Amonge the whiche is one beste & is

Nota Anim called Booz in the langage of Boemal Booz mia / but he defended not hym selfe

with his hornes/ but he hath a large Rruell as it were a bagge vnder his chynne/therin he gadreth water and beteth in his rennyng skaldyng hote & threweyth it vpon huters & houdes y pursue hym & skaldeth of the here of hem & bienneth hem full sore. ¶ Turingia hath in the east Boemia / in the west Franconia / in the northe Westfalia / and in the south the Rruer Danubius. ¶ Franconia is as it were the myddell prouince of Germania / and hath in the east Turingia/in the west Sueuia/in the north a parte of Westfalia/and in the south the Bauaria and the Rruer Danubius. ¶ Bauaria hath in the east the Rruer Danubius & Retica. ¶ Westfalia hath in the east lye Saxonia/in the west Frisia/in the north Ocean/in the south a parte of Fraunce & of Sueuia. ¶ Sueuia hath in the east Bauaria/in the west the Rruer that is called the Rruyne/in the north a parte of Franconia/and in the south Retica and Alpes. ¶ Saxonia hath in the east Alania/in the west Westfalia in the northe Ocean. And men of that countree be more lyghter and stronger on the see than other scomers or theups of the see/and pursue her enemyes full harde bothe by water and by londe & be called Saxones of Saxun that is a stone. for they be harde as stones and vneasy to fare with. In the hylles of Saxonia is well nyghe all maner of metals founden reserued tyn. In Germania be saltwelles/of the whiche welles is salt made as whyte as ony snowe. fast by that hille that copet

is dygged in/ is a grete hylle of whiche hylle the stones smelle as swete as vyolet. Also fatte by the monasterye of Saynt Mychell is marbell founden the fayrest that may be. ¶ *Secunda capitulo .xxv.* The olde Saxones haue noo kyng but many knyghtes of her owne rule. But in tyme of batayle they cast lotte whiche of her knyghtes shall be leder and capytayn. And they folowe hym that is so cholen by lotte as chyfe lord and mayster dueryng the batayll. But whan the batayll is done thenne shall he be as he was before/ that is to wete he & other allliche grete of power and of myghte. ¶ *Plinius libro .v.* Frisia is a londe vpon the coste of the west Ocean And begynneth in the south syde fro þe Ryne & endeth atte the see of Denmarke. Men of Frisia ben hyghe shauen about. And euer the more gentyll man and noble the hygher he is thorne. The men ben fayre of body cruel and bolde of herte/ and vse speres in stede of arowes / and loue fredome moost of ony thyng. Therefore they suffre noo man to be a knyght that wolde be her lorde. Netheles they ben gouerned and ruled by domes men & Judges. And euery yere the chefe of hem selte her owen Judges. They loue well chastyte and kepe belely her children and suffre hem not to marvytill they be foure and twenty yere olde. Therefore they haue stronge and stalworth children/ they haue no wodes / therefore they make hem fyre of turues. ¶ *Selandia* is a lytill londe vpon the see/ whiche renneth thurgh the londe and causeth .xxvii. flondes

and aboute eueryche a shyppe maye saylle/ and hath in the east Hollandia in the north Frisia/ in the west Dcean/ and in the south Flandria. And is enuyroneth with water & hyghe bankes to holde out the rylng of the see and floodes/ there is good corn londe & scarlete of trees for the Rotes may not take depenes ne fatnes for saltnes of the erthe. The men ben grete of bodye and mylde of herte. ¶ *Paulus libro primo.* In the weste syde of Germania is a people called Scriboni that hath snowe all the somer tyme/ and eteth rawe fleshe and ben clothed in ghoot bucke shynnes. In her countree whan the nyght is short men maye see all the nyght the sonne bemes. And after in the wynter whan the daye is shorte/ though men see the lyght of the sonne/ yet the sonne is not seen. Item fast belyde that people Scribonius vnder the clyf of Ocean is a denne vnder an hyghe stone / therein slepen seuen men & haue longe slept and ben hole & sounde in bodye & clothyng & all withouten weme for whiche cause þe comyn people haue hem in grete worthyp & reuerence/ they ar suppoled Romayns by her clothyng. Ther was a man some tyme þe for couetyse wolde strypp one of hem & haue his clothyng/ but for with his arme waxed al drye. It may be þe god lyst to kepe he so hole & sounde for mysbyleued men in tyme to comyng sholde thurgh hem be couerted and tourned to good byleue.

¶ *De Gallia et Francia. R. Capitulum .xxvii.*

It is wryten in storpes that Gallia whiche is frauncia hath þ name Gallia of whytenes of people. Gala is a worde in grue & is lac in Latyn/and mylke in Englyshe. Therefore Sybilla called hem Gallos þ is whyte/ & sayth that the mylky neckes ben wellshen with golde. ¶ Hug. c. Gala. By the dyuersyte of heuen is dyuersyte of colours of face of quantyte & gretenes of bodye of maners & of wytte. Therefore in Rome ben heuy men. In Grece light. In Atryca gplefull. In Gallia wycty men & wple. ¶ R. here take hede as Augustin⁹ de ci. dei li. ii. ca. v. toucheth / that Gally in one maner speche were þ priestes that were in the Temple of that goddesse that hyght Cybeles/ & haue þ name not of that londe Gallia/ but of þ Ryuer Gall⁹ that is in frigia. Alle they þ dranke of þ Ryuer sholde were wood & were all gelded in theyr mynde of þ childe Athys that thylke goddesse Cybelis loued with all her myght. That childe were wood and gelded hym selfe for fraude & gple þ he had done to that goddesse Cybeles/ so sayth Quidi⁹ de falsis. But of Gally þ ben franci & frenshe men. ¶ Eutropi⁹ li. ii. sayth Galli ben wel hasty & her bodyes palsey the comyn stature of other men. But it is founden by assaye þ as the Galli ben more hasty than strong in the fyrst rese or bront/ soo after warde in fyghtyng they ben more feble than wymmen. for as they ben lyke Alpes in gretenes of body/ so they ben some what lyke to the snowe þ lyeth vpon the Alpes that breketh oute in swote

and melteth with hete of fyghtyng as snowe dooth with hete of the sonne. ¶ Sir. capto. xvii. Thenne Gallia with his partes alle hole hath in the north syde Germania/ in the east the Ryne/ in the southeest the Alpes/ in the west the see Ocean that is called bothe Brytannicus and Gallicus that is Englyshe and frenshe. for it departeth Englonde & fraunce / in the southe the see of Wyddell erthe that wellsheth about by the prouynce of Narbon. In Julius Cezars tyme Gallia was departed on thre. But for dyuersle happes that befelle afterwarde in that londe/ the contree and londe that stretcheth from the Ryne to Seyne / from that one Ryuer to that other is now called Gallia belgyca that is very fraunce/ and that countree þ stretcheth from thens to the Ryuer of Leyr is called Gallia Lugdunensis. The ouer parte therof hyght Burgūdia. And the nether parte is called Neustria. And the countree that stretcheth from the Ryuer of Leyr to the water of Geroude is called Gallia aquitanica/ þ is Guyan. And stretcheth oute of the east fro the Ryuer of Roen vnto the west Ocean. The ouer parte therof hyght Celta that is heuenly and hye/ by cause that hye montaynes ben therein. fro the Ryuer of Geroude to the see of Wyddell erthe and to the montaynes that be called montes Pyreney / grete hylles of Spayne is called Gallia Narbonensis. And nowe some therof is called Gothia. And some Valconia/ that is Galcony. And soo Gallia all hole is closed aboute with thre

noble waters with the Rynne in the north syde/with Roeyn in the east/and with the bruttyshe Deceay in the west syde. In Gallia bey many quareys & noble for to dygge in stones/& belyde Parys is grete plente of a maner stone that is called Gilpus/ & is called whyte plastre also/whan that stone is biente & tempred with water & tourned in to plastre /thenne men make therof ymages/walles/chambres/paments/& dyuerse maner werkes that dure longe Inough. Ther is that fayre flour the Lyte of Parys/whiche is noyce of thewes/boteler of lettres thynnyng in Europa/as Athenes dyde somtyme in Grecia. ¶ Gir d. p. The frensche men that bey called franci also & many othe men þ strengest of Europa come of þ Troyans. for after that Troye was taken Antenor with his men fledde awaye by waters that hyght Paludes Neotydes & by the Ryuer Thanays and dwelled in Pannonia/& bylde there a Lyte & called it Sicambria. Of that Lyte he & all his were afterward called Sicambri. After Antenors deeth they ordeyned hem two leders & cappytains Trogotus & franco. And of thylke franco they were afterwarde called franci. ¶ Turpinus de gestis Trololi sayth/that whan kyng Charles had made Spayne subgette and was come home to Parys agayne/he made all the bonde men of Gallia free in worshyp of Saynte James & of Saynte Denys. But they sholde euery yere offre foure pens to the chirche werke of Saynt Denys. And soo they were called franci Sandi Dyo-

nisi / that is to saye Saynte Denys free men. And soo it came about that Gallia was called francia by cause of þ fredom. Othe men tellyn that Valentinianus the Emperour called hem francos as it were ferancos þ is sterne & wyther in þ langage of Attica þ is Grecia. For Sicambri þ bey frensche men were trybutarye to Rome longe tyme to fore Valentinian⁹ tyme also. But whan Alani men of Alania were ennyes to Rome. Sicambri had her trybute forgyuen for .x. yere for to warre apenst þ men of Alania. And whan the .x. yere were done & Alani ouercomen / þ Romayns axed theyr trybute. And Sicambri warned hit & wolde none paye. Therfore Valentinian⁹ theemperour warred vpon hem with a grete oost/& had the vyctorye. Thenne for þ mylhappe Sicambri were sore wrothe & warred in the londes of Rome / & also on þ londes þ were subgette to Rome also. Therfore Sicambri were afterward called franci as it were feranci/that is wyther & sterne. And of that duke franco they were called franci as it were francoes men. Also of her fredom þ kyng Charles gaf them they bey named franci/þ is free men for to mene ¶ Trevisa. But how þ euer they come to þ name. franci be frensche men & hyght bothe Sicambri & Galli/& so it is all one people Sicambeii Galli franci & frensche men. ¶ R. franci made hem a kyng that was called ferramundus Marconurus lone/and made all the londe subgette fro Sicambria vnto the Ryn. ¶ Will. de re. libro pri⁹ Whan ferramundus was

deed they made his lone kynge that hath thre names/ & hyght Clodion/ Clodius/ & Crinic^o. And of hym kyn ges of fraunce were called Crinici. After Clodi^o they made his lone kyn ge þ hyght Merone^o. And after hym kynges of frauce were called Hero/ nyngi vnto Ppp^o tyme. In þ same maner kynges lones of Englonde had names after the names of theyr fader/ as Edgars lone was called Ed garingus/ & Edmūdus lone was na med Edmūdingus. Comynly he that cometh of the kynges blood is called Adelingus. ¶ *Gr. d. p.* After Hero/ neus reigned his lone Childeric^o. him crystened Remigi^o. This Childeric^o atte prayr of the Romayns put that people Gochi Arriani out of Guyan whay he was deed his lone Childeber tus helde the kyngdom with his thre brethern. Theodericus/ Clodonur^o & Clotari^o this was in the tyme of the grete Pope Gregory. After this Chil debert^o reigned his broder Clotarius/ he wedded saynt Radegunde. And af ter hym reigned his lone Childericus with his thre brethern Carbert^o Gū dian^o & Sigelbert^o. After Childeric^o reigned his lone Clotarius/ he begate Dagobert^o & his luster Batylidis/ vn der this Dagobert^o Pipin^o was the grettest may of the kynges hous. And that was in the tyme of Eraclius the Emperour. After Dagobert^o reigned his lone Clodoni^o/ in his tyme saynt Benets body was translated & born out of the prouynce Beneuentana in to frauce. After Clodoni^o reigned his lone Clotari^o. And after hym his bro der Theoderic^o. In his tyme Ebro

nius that was the grettest of the kyn ges hous purloved saynt Leodegari^o & dyde hym moche woo & tene/ & mar tred hym atte last. After Theoderic^o reigned Clodone^o. And after hym his ponger broder Childebert^o. Atter him his pong lone Dagobert^o. And after hym the kynges lagnage faylled. for after hym reigned his broder Danpell that was a clerke. But frauci chaū ged Danpels name & called hē Chil dericus. After hym reigned one of his kyn þ was called Theodericus. And after hym his brod Hilderic^o/ he was putte down for grete nycete & made a clerke/ & lpyed as a monke in an ab baye. And thenne faylled the lagnage in meny of ferramūdus blood/ but yet it lasted and dured in a woman/ that was Batylidis Dagobert^o luster. In this maner Batylidis was wedded vnto Aulsebertus & had by hym a los ne that hyght Arnold/ thenne this Arnold^o lone hyght Arnulphus/ that Arnulph^o wedded duc Pipius dough ter. Pipin^o was þ grettest of the kyng. Dagobertus hous/ kyng Dagobert^o was Batylidis broder. This Arnul phus was afterwarde made byshop Metensis. Thenne his lone Anlegis lius gate Pupin^o that hath two other names Detulus & Breuis. ¶ *Will. d. re. li. primo.* This Pipin^o gate Char les that hyght Tutidis & Marcellus also. And had that name Tutidis of Tudere that is beten & bounled. for he bete out of fraunce all tyrantes & Saralyns that warred therein & de/ stroubled the londe and people. This Charles folowed the sentence of his forfaders & helde the kynges of fraū

te in his retenuē. And he hym selfe was called an Erle and helde hym payd and contente with that name. ¶ **Giraldus.** This Charles gate the leconde Pipin⁹ & Charles the grete/ that was afterward a monke. This leconde Pipin⁹ was of kynges kynde for he cam of Batyldis that we spa ke of byfore & therfore he was made kyng of fraūce by assente of all the chynalrye & by auctorite of pope Ste uen that was pope next after Zacha rie. This Pupinus gate Charles the grete. This Charles was made kyn ge after his faders dethe the yere of our lord .vii. C. lxx. for his noble de des þ Romayns chole hym afterwar de for to be Saynt Peters aduocate. Afterwarde Patrici⁹ & thenne Empe rour & Augustus. And fro that tyme themppie of Constantynople toined fro the Romayns to þ frensche men for they wolde not helpe the chirche of Rome ayenst þ Longobardes that warred ayenst the Romayns. This Charles gate Lowys þ was afterwar de Emperour. This Lowys gate the ballid Charles þ was Emperour allo The ballid Charles gate Lowys. Lo wys gate Lochari⁹. Lochari⁹ gate Lo wys þ last kyng of this lygnage. whā this Lowys was dede. franci toke Hughe duke of Burgoyne and made hym her kyng. This Hugh gate Ro bert. Robert gate Harry. Harry gate philip. Philip gate Lowys. Lowys reg ned in Harri clerkes tyme the conque rours lone. The grete Charles of spri ge regned in fraūce vnto Hughis ty me þ was called Capet by his lurna me. Of hē come other hēges of fraū

ce as it is within in his place openly declared/ kynges of his ofspyrng reg ned in Italia & Alamania vnto the yere of our lord. ix. C. xii. whan Con radus kyng of duche men toke them pyre to hym selfe. ¶ **R.** Longe after warde as the comyn fame. A woman that was quene of fraūce by herytas ge wedded a bocher for his sayrenes. Therfore in reproof of þ dede frens she men ordeyned amonge hem selfe þ no woman shold afterwarde be hey re of þ Royame of fraūce. ¶ **Gir.** þ Romayns were somtyme vycours of all the worlde / but stalworth men & wyght that dwelled in fraūce ouerco me hem in many batayls. But atte last in Caius Julius Cezars tyme Gallia þ is fraūce was made sub gette/ & lo occupied by Romayns a bout a foure hondred yere vnto þ last tyme of Valentiniānus theemperour/ whan dyuerse men of straunge lon des warred in Gallia. for fyrst Wan daly & hynny/thenne Sueui & Bur gundi that bey of Sueuia a londe of Almanā that is Almayn. Thenne Gothys & Sicambri/thenne Norways & Danes made hem selfe Lycees in Gallia. In Gallia þ is fraūce bey many prouynces & londes / that bey Braban. flaūdres. pycardie. Normā dye. the lasse Breytayne. Pextow. Guy an. Angeoy. Gascoyne. Burgoyne. Sa lina prouincia. Campania the lasse/ that is Champayne. And Aluerne al lo is in fraunce. ¶ **flaundria** that **flaundria** is flaundres a prouynce of Gallia belgyca/ and is vpon the cōste of the see Dcean/ and in the north frisia/ in the east Germania / in the southe

Pycardia / & in the west Ocean / & in the north a parte of Englonde. And though flaüdes be a lityll londe hit is full plenteuous of many proufftable thynges of ryches / of pasture / of bestes / of marchaüdyle / of Ryuer / of hauens of the see & of good townes. The men of flaüdes ben fayr stronge & riche / & bynge forth many childern / & ben peasible to her neyghbours / & trewe to straügers / noble crafty men / & grete makers of clothe / whiche is sente aboute well nyghe in all Europa. The londe is playn & scarle of woode / therfore in stede of woode they brenne turues that smelleth worse than wode / & maketh fowler allhes

Brabacia. ¶ Braban is by south east flaüdes / & is plenteuous of marchaüdyle and mahyng of clothe. For of the wulle þ they haue out of Englonde they make the clothe of dyuerse colours / & sende it in to other prouynces & londes as flaüdes doth. For though Englonde haue wulle atte best / it hath not soo grete plente of good water for dyuersly colours & hewes as flaüdes hath & Braban. Netheles atte london is one welle that helpeth well to make good scarlette / & so is atte lyncoln oñe certayn place in the broke that passeth by þ towne. ¶ Pycardia is a prouynce of Gallia & hath that name after the towne þ hete Ponticus / that now is called phytyn so sayth Erodotus. Pycardia hath many noble castels & townes as Amyens Belgis or Belnacus Tournay & many other. And lyeth bytwene flaüdes in the north syde / & Normandye in þ south syde / & hath in þ west syde the see / &

the south syde of Englonde. There ben two Pycardies / þ one is ner fraunce / and eyther Jopneth to thendes of flaüdes & of Braban / þ men therof ben bopst^o men of dedes & haue greter speche than other men of fraunce.

¶ Normandye þ hete Neustria also & hath that name of Norwayes that saylled out of Norwaye & out of Denmark / & gatte a countree vpon the cleues of Ocean in Gallia / & called it Normandye. The chyfe Lyte therof is Roan vpon the mouth of the Ryuer of Seyne. There Seyne renneth in to the see of Ocean. Normandye hath in the south þ lasse Brytayn / in the west þ frenshe Ocean / & in the north west the south syde of Englonde

¶ The lasse Brytayn hath the name of Britons þ twyes occupped þ londe fyrst by Brien^o that was kyng Belinus broder / & eftloncs by Brytons that were pursued and greued by the Saxones in Hertygers tyme kyng of Brytons / as is wryten and conceyved in the storpe of Brytons. This prouynce hath in the east syde Andegavia that is Angeoy / in the north Normandye / in the south Guyan / in the west Ocean Aquitanycus / that is the see that is by the syde of Guyan. ¶ Giraldus in toppicis. In this Brytayne is a welle / yf the water of that welle be take in a bugles horn / and poured vpon a ston nexte to the welle / be the wedder neuer so fayre ne drye / anone it shall reyne. And in fraunce is a welle fast by the castell of Palsence / the water therof is right good for men and nought for wemen. Roman say hete

Brabacia.

Pycardia.

tas water of that welle with fyre ne with ony crafre that ony can deuple .
Pictauiā h̄ is Peytow / is a prouynce of Gallia Narbonensis. Englysh men Scottes & Pytes saylled & dwelled there / & called h̄ coūtree Pictauiā. And the chyfe Lyte Pictau⁹ h̄ is Peyters so seyth Erodotus / this prouynce stretcheth ferre vpon h̄ Dceay / & in the east syde Turonia / therby passeth the Ryuer of Leyr / in the south syde Spayne / in the north h̄ lasse Brytany & the see of Guyan / & in the west the see of Dceay . The men of h̄ londe ben of the condicions of frenshe men by cause they medle with them & of h̄ coūtree h̄ is so nyghe to them. Soo h̄ they be now stronge of bodye fayr of face hardy of herte & fell of wytte.

De Aquitania Caplm. xxviii.

Aquitania that is Guyan / & hat that name Aquitania of Aquis h̄ ben waters . for the water of h̄ Ryuer of Leyr goth about a grete dele of h̄ londe / many a pertyculer prouynce is comprehended vnder h̄ name of h̄ londe. Plini⁹ sayth that it hath in h̄ north & east Gallia Lugdonensis / in the south and east it stretcheth to the prouynce of Narbon
Audegavia h̄ is angeoy a prouynce of Gallia & as it were in the myddel bytwene Gyan and lpyll Brytany.
Balconia h̄ is Galcoyn & was so tyme contepned vnder guyan / & hath in the east syde the hylles Pyreney / in the west the west Dceay / in h̄ south east the playn of h̄ prouynce of Tholous / & in h̄ other syde it neyghe to

Peytow . In that londe ben many wodes hylles & wyne. And h̄ Ryuer Garonna departeth bytwene that londe & the prouynce of Tholous / & entreth in to the see of Dceay faste by Bourdeux / whiche is chyfe Lyte of that londe. The men of that londe ben called Balcones / as it were wacones. The grete Pōpe⁹ put hem down of mount Pyrene⁹ & gadred hem all in to a towne whan Spayne was ouercome so sayth Erodotus the wyter of hystories. The men of that londe ben now called Balclenses & ben swyft and hardy and vse balles and arbestres and gladly doo robbe and reue / and soo they be stronge theups / they ben clothed in slyght clothes & fowle .
Burgundia is a partye of Gallia Denelenles & stretcheth vnto Alpes Pyreney / and hath that name Burgundia of Borough townes that Austrogoty bylded therin whan they purposed to destrope Italia / this londe is full colde towarde Alpes Pyreney. Men that dwelley towarde that syde of Burgon haue botches vnder the chynne I swollen and bagged as though they were double chynned / that is by cause of grete colde of waters of snowe that melteth amonge hem alwaye.

De hyspania. Trogus libro vltimo and Plydonus libro decimoquinto. Caplm. xxix.

Trogus sayth that Trigonias is Spayne all hole / & the hylles Pyreney Joyney Spayn in h̄ north syde to gallia narbonensis & is

closed in the other sydes alle aboute with the see of Ocean & with the see Tirus. And so Spayne is well nyghe all an Ilande. for it is beclipped with þ see well nyghe all about. But ther ben two Spaynes the hyther be gynneth fro the playnes & valeys of Pyrenis/ & stretcheth by Cantabria & endeth at Cartago spataria/the yonder Spayne conceyneth þ west party vnto the see Gaditan^o/where as Hercules sette his pylers belyde the mouit Atlas. This Spayne is a playn londe & hath grete plente of castels of houses of metall & of hony/ & hete somtyme Hesperia of hespera the eue sterre that lad þ Giekes thyder & was her lodesterre. Afterwarde hit was called Hiberia of the Ryuer Hiberus/ but at laste it hete Hyspania of þ Ryuer Hyspalus/ or of Hyspanus þ Hercules ordeyened gouernour & kyng there. In Hyspania ben .vi. prouinces as Terraconensis Lusitania Galicia Beticia Tingitina Asturia & Arogonia.

¶ Ptolemy li. xv. ca. ii. This Cartago of Spayne is called Spataria. for to haue dyfference bytwene this Cartago & the grete Cartago of Affryca þ Scipio consull of Rome destroyed. Affry men of Affryca made this Cartago spataria. And atte last Gothy destroyed it. for gothy were lordes of Spayne long tyme & specpally in honorius themperous tyme. But afterwarde the Sarasyns were ouercome of Charles the grete/ & lost þ west londes of Spayne Galicia & Lusitania/ & helde oonly the east londes & countrees of Spayne.

¶ Gades is couenably fyrst sette amonge þ Ilandes of the grete see & standeth in the weste ende of Spayne in a mouth of þ west Ocean/there þ grete see Ocean breketh in to the Inner londes & departeth a sonder Affryca & Europa. Tyries cam saylpyng out of the reed see & occupied þ Ilande & called it Gades in his langage. And Gades is to say beclipped. for it is beclipped al about with þ see/ & is from the londe an. L. paas & .x. there as Hercules sette his pylers whiche ben right wonderfull as it were in þ vttermest ende of the worlde. And tho pylers ben called after þ name of the Ilande Gades also ¶ Hug. c. Gade. And to gyue knowleche þ there is no place ne lodne further westwarde þ stronge man Hercules sette tho pylers there by Gades. Thenne eastwarde from these pylers & from þ Ilande Gades ben þ Ilandes Baleares þ ben called maiorica & minorica/therie is there þ Ilande Sardinia/ & hath in the south syde Affryca/ & in the north Scicilia/ and hath nether addres ne venym/ but ther groweth an herbe that is called Apium whiche maketh men lawgh hem self to dech/ this Ilande hath hote welles & hollom/ whiche water maketh the ups and men that forswere hymselfe blynde yf theyr eyen touche the water of thylke welles. ¶ The Ilande Corsica is couerd with many forlondes stretchyng in to the see / therin is noble leese and pasture for beestes/ there in is a stone that is named Aconites

Coisica hath in the east syde the see Tyren⁹ in the south the Flonde Sardinia. xxx. myle thens/ in þ west þ Flondes Baleares/ & in the north þ see Ligustic⁹ & Liguria a pynce of Italia & is. viii. score myle in length &. xxvi. in brede/ & hath þ name Coisica of a womay that hyght Coisa. This Coisla had a boie þofte lefte company of other bestes & swam in to þ Flonde & came home in moche better poynte than he wente out. Coisla sawe that & wayted her tyme & toke a boote & followed after the boie in to that Flond & sawe that there was londe for to bere corn & grasse/ & brought thyder fyrste men that were called Liguers. ¶ Aradia that is called Aradiū also is an Flonde that is all one Lyte norfer from the Lyte Tyrus & hath many shypmen that ben full stronge in fpyghtyng. ¶ Cyclades ben. liii. Flondes togyder & ar named of Cyclon in grue whiche is a cercle in Englyshe. for they ben sette all rounde as it were a cercle about þ Flonde that hyght Delon. Netheles some men sayen þ they be so called by cause of hygh rockes þ ben all about them. The fyrste of them is Rhodes towarde the east/ & these Flondes ende towarde the north in the clyf of the lasse Alpa/ and hath out of the south in to the north fyfety myle / & out of the east in to the west two. L. myle. The myddell Flonde of of them is named Delon þ is to save I shewed. for it was somtyme byshyne with the sonne to fore other londes after Noes flood. The same Delon is called Diritigia. for Diritigie ben called cōturnices Turlewes/ whiche ben

there grete plente. And in that place Lacona bare Appollyn delphic⁹. Samos otherwyle called Samia is an Flond. In whiche Pythagoras Juno & Sybylla were born. In þ Flonde is whyte cleve & reed. Of whiche cleve men make erthen vessel at beste. ¶ Cypri⁹ Cyprius: þ Flonde hyght paphon & cychun also & is beclpypped in þ south with þ see of Phenicia/ in þ west with þ see Pamphilic⁹ & in þ north west with scailia & is. viii. score myle in length &. vi. score &. v. in brede. In þ yle bras & craft of bras was fyrst I fouūden. The wyne of that londe is strengest of all wy nes. ¶ Creta þ Flonde hath þ name of one Cret⁹ þ dwelled therein/ þ Flonde hyght Centapolis also/ þ is a londe that hath an. L. Cytees/ for therein were an. L. cytees somtyme. And there was Saturnus & Jupyter born & were fyrst kynges there. And of right it longeth to Grecia of olde tyme/ & hath in the south syde the see Libicus & in the north þ see of Grecia & stretcheth out in to the east & in to þ west/ & was the fyrste londe that was parfpyght and noble in craft of rowyng with oores. Armes and shotyng with arowes / and yaf lawe wyrtten / and taught men ryde on horsbacke. And there was the craft of Mulyske and syngyng of ydeis dactilis fouūden/ they of Creta made it more and yaf it in knowleche to other londes about/ þ Flonde is now called Candia. In that Creta noia Flonde ben many sheep & gheet/ and tur Candia fewe roes and hertes. Therin ben no foxes ne wolues ne addres ne luche venomous bestes. And that londe hath teth soo venym þ yf men bynge ony

venemous bestes or wormes of other
londes they depen anone / & though
ther be no grete venemous bestes in þ
londe / yet ben there Attercoppes vene
mous þ ben called Spalangia in that
londe. ¶ Drosi^o sayth þ this Flonde
is. viii. score & vii. myle in lengthe / &
an. L. myle in bredde. In this Flonde
is one of þ four Laborint^o as it shall
be sayd after ward. ¶ Treuisa. for to
late men haue knowleche what Labo
rint^o is / it is an hous wondly bylded
& wrought with halkes & hurnes toz
nynges & wyndynges so dpuerlely by
wondfull wayes & wyrcles þ who þ
gooth in to þ hous & wolde come out
agayn / though he retorne hytherwar
de & thpyrwarde / east / west / north / or
south ward whyther euer he drawe &
for all þ wayes he can chese / though
he trauayll neuer so sore / he shalbe so
maled þ out can he not goo / but yf he
haue þ craft þ serueth therfore. ¶ Sci
cilia þ Flonde was somtyme called
Trinatria / as it were thre square by
cause of. iii. hylles þ ben therin. The
hylles ben called peloz. pachinū. liberū
& afterwarde was called Scicilia of
scicul^o þ was Ital^o brother / & þ londe
hyght somtyme Scicania of scican^o þ
bynge & hath in þ north syde Apulia
a parte of Italie & is departed fro þ
part with grete watres of an arme of
þ see / or cloney by erthshakynge thus
sayth Salusti^o / & þ see bytwene Scici
lia & Italia is now. iii. myle brode / &
is called Regiū / þ is to saye broken of
In þ see ben two grete perilles wond
full & wyde I knowe / þ one is scilla /
þ other is caribdis. men of þ londe cal
le scillama grete stone þ is seen aboue

the wat shapen as a man beclpypped a
bout w^c houdes hedes & feynen & say
þ it semeth þ þ wawes barketh þ be
teth therupon. Caribdis is a peryllo^o
whyrlpyng see þ casteth vp water & wa
wes & swoloweth hē in agayn thries
in a day. ¶ Plys. li. xiiii. In this Flon
de men ered fyrste with plowe for to
sowe in corn & other seedes / and there
was comedia / longe of gesses fyrste
foudey. ¶ Beda de naturis. The lon
de of Scicilia is holowe & full of ca
ues / & moche sulphur or bymstone &
glue / so þ the ayer & fyre hath waye
I nough therto / & fyre closed in þ ca
ues & in þ chynnes within þ erthe stry
ueth with the ayer & other thynge þ
ben contrarpe to fyre / & þ caueth oft
smoke & brennyng leyte to breke oute
in many places. And somtyme the
strengthe of the wynde that is with
in maketh to breke out heepes of gra
uell and of stones. for suche doyng it
is that the brennyng of the hylle that
is called the mount Ethna dureth so
longe. ¶ Plydorus libro. xiiii. That
hylle mount Ethna towarde þ south
east hath many chynnes and holowe
dennes or caues within the erthe full
of bymstone that receyueth moche
wynde and engendred fyre and smos
ke. ¶ R. In that place ben seen dy
uerse fygyres and shapen and herde
ruffull voys and gromynge. Therfore
some men meney that soules ben the
re in payne / as it semeth that Saynt
Gregorpe maketh mynde in his dya
loge. ¶ Cir. in top / there is a welle
in scicilia yf a man cometh therto clo
thed in reed / anone þ water of þ welle
spryngeth vp as hyghe as þ mannes

hede / & for ony other colour or hewe the water meueth not. There ben also Lycades/byrdes that syngen well in the best wyse / & they haue a pype open vnder the throte / & syngen better whan the hede is of than whan it is on / & better whan they ben dede than whyle they ben a lyue. Therfor herdes of þe londe byhede them for to haue the swetter songe. And in þe londe is a Lyte called Palerna that yeldeth euery yere more of certayn rente than þe kyng of Englund hath of syker rente of Englund. ¶ Psd. li. xiii. In Sicilia ben two welles þe one of hem maketh a barayn woman to beare childern. And that other maketh a childyng woman barayn. In Sicilia is salte agrientinus wonderfull & contrarpe to other salt. For it melteth in fyre & lepeþ & spercleth in water. Belyde Sicilia is an Ilande that is called Eola / & hath þe name of Eolus. Poetes feyney & sape that Eolus is god of wyndes. for whyle he was ruler of þe .ix. Ilandes eueryche of hem hyght Eola. By rylsng of moysture of myste and of smoke he wolde telle whan it sholde rayne. And therfore symple men supposid that he had the wynde in his power & myght. The same .ix. Ilandes hyght Vulcane that is fyr / for fyr brenneth there alway. There ben other Ilandes in the see Eulinius. That see Eulinius is a grete parte of the see of Wyddell erthe. Amonge the whiche Ilandes the Ilande of Colchos is famous / there as Jason fette the golden flyes / as it shall be declared after aboute the barayll of Trophe. And Pathmos is an

Ilande in the same see / there as saynt Johan the euangelyst was whan he was exiled out of other londes.

¶ De Insulis Oceani. Pseudo. li. bro quinto. Caply. xxxi.

Insule fortunate that ben the gracpous Ilandes and ben of good temprure of wynde & of weder. I sette in þe west Ocean. And of some men named paradylle by cause of goodes of the londe & of temprate weder / there ben gracpous tymes the hylles ben couered with corn / and herbes growe as it were grasse / therfore by cause of plente of corn and of fruyte they ben called fortunate þe is gracpous. for there ben trees of seuen score fote hyghe. There is the Ilande Capria þe is þe Ilande of Gheet. for there ben many gheet & waders also. There is þe Ilande Lanaria þe is the Ilande of houides. ¶ Dacia þe is Denmarke is an Ilande þe Joyneth to the northe syde of Germania. Men of þe Denmarke were somtyme full sterne & good men of armes. Therfore they occupped somtyme grete countrees in Brytayne & in fraunce / & ben called daci as it were dagi / for they come of þe gothes. Ther ben many men in dacia & ben fayr of stature & semely of face & of heer / & though they ben sterne ayenst theyr enemyes / they ben esy & myldeto good men & trewe. But it maye not be forgoten þe they broughte grete drynkyng in to Englonde. ¶ Wynthlandia that Ilande is by west Denmarke / & is a bareyn londe / and dymmen men out of byleue they selle wynde to

the shypmen that come to theyr portes & hauenes as it were closed vnder knottes of threde. And as the knottes be vnknytte þ̄ wynde wexed at theyr wyllle. ¶ Icelonde that Flonde hath in the east lyde Norwaye/in the north the frozen see/þ̄ is mare congelatum. The men of þ̄ londe ben shorte of speche & trewe of theyr wordes & clothed in wylde bestes skynes/& ben fysshers & haue one man bothe kyng & preest. There ben gersawcons and gentyll hawkes/& there ben whyte beers that breken the yse for to drawe out fyssh there ben no shyp in þ̄ londe ne corn but ootes & þ̄ is for grete colde. That Flonde is from Irlande & from Brytayne thre dayes saylling. ¶ Solinus de mirabilibz. Tyle is the vtermest Flonde of Oceane bytwene the north & þ̄ west cost by yonde Brytayne. And fewe men knowe that londe. ¶ Plinius libro scdo. Tyle hath the name of the sonne for from spryngynge tyme whan the daye & nyght be euen vnto heruest tyme it is alwaye byshyne w^{ch} the sonne/& este from þ̄ tyme to spryngynge tyme agayne/whan the daye & nyght be euen aboute September it hath no lyght of þ̄ sonne/but alwaye derke nyght & no daye/& therfore the londe is not couenable for men to dwelle in. In somer for hete/and in wynter for colde & derkenes/& by cause therof there maye no corn growe/also the see is there harde I froze. By tweyne that Flonde & Brytayne ben þ̄ Insula. scã Flondes þ̄ hyght Scandia. Lingos. & dia. lingos Bergion. Nethes Tyle is. vi. dayes et bergion. saylling out of Brytayne. ¶ R. Gir. in top. for Saynte Austyn de ci. dei.

speketh of Tyle/& sayth that it is a Flonde of Iude & þ̄ trees of Tyle leete neuer theyr leues/but beware þ̄ thou be not begyled by lyknes of names. For that Flonde of Iude is called Tylis in the noiartyf caas / & the Flonde of Oceane is named Tyle in the noiartyf caas/& ben lyche in ocher. As yf thou canst declpne thylke two names & speke latyn so sayth Pseudo: rus Ethi. libro. xv. ¶ Norwaye lieth cheth somdele east towarde Denmarke & Gothia/& hath in the south syde Scotlonde/& in þ̄ north lyde Icelonde. The Flonde is brode beclpyed aboute with the see & is full sharpe & colde/& hath many hylles & woodes wylde bestes whyte beers barwlons & brockes & scarlete of corn. Men of þ̄ londe lyue more by fysshynge & hunting than by brede & corn. In þ̄ north lyde of that londe many nyghtes in the somer tyme aboute the styntynge of the sonne/the sonne goth not down but shyneth alle nyghte. And este as many dayes in the wynter about the styntynge of the sonne/the sonne arysech not to gyue hem lyght / therfore all þ̄ tyme they must werke by candel lyght what werke that hem nedeth. In þ̄ londe is a welle þ̄ tourneth tree & lether in to stone/& it abyde therein a yere hole. The men of þ̄ londe ben shypmen & theues op the see. ¶ Treuisa. for to knowe what the styntynge of the sonne is to menyng take hede that the sonne stynteth twyes a yere/ones atte somer whan it gooth none hygher/& eftsones at wynter whan it gooth noo lower/& so in eyther tyme is the styntynge of the sonne.

De Hybernia. Caplm. xxxii.

Hibernia that is Irlonde / & was of olde tyme incorporate in to the lordshyp of Bryayn so sayth Girald^o in sua topographia where he descriueth it at fulle. Yet it is worthy & semely to prayse & londe with larger praylyng. for to come to clere & full knowleche of þe londe / these tytles that folowe opene the waye. Therefore I shall teill of þe stede & place of þe londe how grete & what manner londe it is / wherof þe londe hath plente & wherof it hath defaute. Also of what men þe dwelled therein fyrst. Of maners of men of that londe. Of the wondres of þe londe / & of worthynes of halowes & Sayntes of þe londe

De situ Hybernie locali. Irlonde is þe last of all þe west Ilandes & hight Hybernia of one Hyberus of Spayne that was hermoni^o broder. for these two brethern gate & wan that londe by conquest. Or it is called Hybernia of that Ryuer Hyberus þe is in þe west ende of Spayne. And þe londe hyght Scotlonde also. for Scottes dwelled there somtyme er they cam in to that other Scotlonde þe longed to Brytany Therefore it is wryten in the Marti^ologe. Suche a day in Scotlond saynt Bryde was born / & þe was in Irlonde. This londe hath in the southeest syde Spayne thre dayes sayllynge thens a sydehalfe / & hath in the east syde þe more. Brytany / thens a dayes sayllyng / in the west syde it hath the endeles Ocean / & in the north syde Irlonde thre dayes sayllyng thens.

Solin^o. But the see that is bytwe

ne Brytany and Irlonde is alle the yere full of grete wawes & vnely. So that men may selde saylle sekerly by twene / that see is six score myle brode

De eius quanto et quali. Irlonde is an Ilande grettest after Brytayne & stretcheth northwarde from Brendans hylles vnto the londe Colubina & cōteyneth. viii. dayes Journeys / eue ry Journey of. xl. myle. And from Deuelyn to Patryks hylles / & to the see in þe syde in brede is four dayes Journeys. And Irlond is narrower in the myddell than in thendes / all other wyse than Brytayne is / as Irlonde is shorter northwarde than Brytany / so it is lenger southwarde / the londe is not playn but full of montaynes / of hylles / of wodes / of mareys / & of mores. The londe is soft / rayny / wyndy & lowe by þe see syde / & within hilly & lony.

Solin^o There is grete plente of noble pasture & of leese / therefore the beestes must be ofte dryuen out of theyr pasture lest they ete ouermuche for they sholde shende hem selfe yf they myght ete at theyr wyll.

Sir Men of þe londe haue comynly theyr helth / & straungers haue ofte a peryllous fluxe by cause of the moysture of the mete. The flesshe of hyen is there holsome / & swynes flesshe unholsome. Men of that londe haue no feuer but oonly the feuer Ague / & þe right selde. Therefore the holsomnes & helthe of that londe and the clenness out of venyme / is worth all the boost and rycheffe of trees of herbes of spycerpe of ryche clothes and of precyous stones of the east londes. The cause of the helthe and holsomnes of that lon

de is the attemperate hete and colde that is therinne. ¶ In quibus rebus sufficit. In this londe ben moo hpen than oxen/more pasture than corne/more grasse than leed. There is grete plente of lamoy / of lampraves / of celis / & of othee see fylle. Of egles / of cranes / of pecokes / of curlewes / of sperhawkes / of golhawkes / & of gen tyll fawcons. Of wolues / and righte shrewd myle. There ben attercoppes blood soukers & eestres that doon none harne. Ther ben fevers lityl of bo dye and full hardy & stronge. There ben bernacles fowles lyke to wylde ghees / whiche growen wonderly vpon trees as it were nature wrought a gayn kynde. Men of relygion ete bernacleson fastyng dayes by cause they ben not engendred of flesshe wherin as me thynketh they erre. for realon is apenst that. for yf a man had eten of Adams legge / he had eten flesshe. And yet Adam was not engendred of fader & moder / but that flesshe came wondrly of the ethe / and so this flesshe cometh wonderly of the tree. In this londe is plente of hony & of mylke / of wyne & not of wyne yerdes ¶ Solinus & Pnydorius wryten / that Irlonde hath noo bees. Netheles it were better wryten y Irlonde hath bees & noo bynperdes. ¶ Also Beda sayth / that there is grete huntynge to robukes. And it is I knowe y there ben none. It is no wonder of Beda for he sawe neuer y londe / but some men had tolde hym suche tales. Also there groweth that stone Saxogonus & is called Iris also / as it were the rayn bowe. Yf y stone be holde apenst

the sonne / anone it shall shape a raynebowe. There is also founden a stone that is called Sagates and whyte Margery Perles. ¶ In quibus rebus deficit. Whete cornes ben there fulle smalle vnnethe I clenled with mannes honde Reserued men. Alle beestes ben smaller there than in othee londes. There lacked well nyghe alle maner fylle of freshe water that is not gendred in the see. There lacken vnkynde fawcons ger fawcons patrychis felaunte nyghtyn gales and pyes. There lacken also Roo and bucke and plespyles wountes and othee venemous beestes / therfore somme men feyney and that favorably that Saynt Patryke clenled that londes of wormes and of venemous beestes. But it is more probable and more skylfull / that this londe was from the begynnyng alwaye without suche wormes. for venemous beestes and wormes dyen there anone yf men bynge hem thyder out of othee londes. And also benyme & popson brought thed out of othee londes / leesen theyr malyce as lone as it passeth the myddell of the see. Also powdre and erthe of that londe caste and lowen in othee londes dryuen awaye wormes so ferforth y yf a turfe of that londe be putte about a womme it sleeth hym or maketh hym thrylle the erthe for telcape awaye. In that londe cockes crowe but lytyll to fore dave / so y the fyrst crowyng of cockes in that londe / & y thyrde in othee londes ben lyke ferre to fore the dave.

Graldus sayth that Calera Noes Nece drad the flood & fledde with thre men & fyftwemen in to þe flonde & dwelled there in fyrst þe last yere to fore Noes flood. But afterwarde Bartholan⁹ Seres lone that come of Japhet Noes lone come theder with his.iii. lones by happe or by craft .iii. C. yere after Noes flood & dwelled there & encreaced to the nombre of .ix. M. men. And afterwarde for stenche of hareyns of geantes þe they had kylde/they deyden alle save one Ruanus þe yueth a .M. and .v. C. yere vnto Saynt Patryks tyme. And enfourmed the holy man of the forlaid men/ & of all theyr doyniges & dedes. Thenne the thyrde tyme come thyder Nymeth out of Sychia with his foure lones & dwelled there two. C. yere & .xvi. And at last of his ofsprynge by dyuerse myshappes of warres & of moreyn they were clene destroyed & the londe left voyde .ii. C. yere after. The fourth tyme fyue dukes that were brethern Gandi⁹. Genandi⁹. Sagandi⁹. Rutheragus Sclauus of the forlaid Nymethis succelours come oute of Grece & occupped that londe & deled it in fyue partes: And euery parte contepned .xxii. candredes. A candrede is a countree that contepneth an hondred townes / and they sette a stone in þe myddell of the londe as it were in the nauell and begynnyng of fyue kyngdomes. Atte last Sclau⁹ was made kyng of all the londe. The fyfth tyme whan this nacion was .xxx. yere togpyder / they were feble/ four noble men that were Myllesius the kynges lones come out

of Spayne with many other in a nauye of .lx. shyppes. And two of the worthpest of these four brethern that hyght Hyberus & Hermon deled the londe bytwene hem tweyn. But afterwarde couenaunt was broken bytwene hem boche & Hyberus was slayn theñe Hermon was kyng of all þe londe. And from his tyme to þe fyrst Patryks tyme were kynges of þe nacion .vi. score & .xi. & so fro the comynge of the Hybernienlis vnto þe fyrst Patryk were a .M. yere & .viii. C. They had þe name Hybernienles & Hybernici of the forlaid Hyberus / or ellys of Hyberos a Ryuer of Spayne. They were called also Gaptels & Scottes of one Gaptelus þe was Phenius new/this Gaptelus coude speke many langages after þe langages þe were made at Nemproths tour / & wedded one Scota Pharoes doughter. Of these dukes come the Hybernienles. Men saye þe these Gaptelus made the Iryshe langage & called it Gaptelias as it were a langage gadred of alle langages & tonges. Atte last Belin⁹ kyng of Brytany had a lone þe hight Gurguncius. As this Gurgunci⁹ come out of Denmarke atte Irlondes Orades/he fonde men þe were called Balclenles & were come thyder oute of Spayne. These men prayed & besought for to haue place to dwelle in. And þe kyng sente hym to Irlonde þe was tho voyde & wast / & ordeyned & sente with hem dukes and capytayns of his owne. And so it semeth þe Irlond hold long to Brytany by right of olde tyme / from the fyrst Saynt Patryk vnto fedlinudi⁹ the kynges

tyne .iiii. L. yere regned .xxxiiii. kyn
ges eueryche after other in Yrlonde.
In this fedlinudi^d tyne Turgeli^d
duke & capytayn of norweyes brough
te thyder men of norwepe & occupped
that londe and made in many places
depe dyches & castels scngle double &
treble & many wardes strongly wal
led / and many therof stande yet all
hole. But Yrllthe men retche not of
castels. for they take woodes for cal
tels & mareys & mores for castell dy
ches. But atte last Turgelius deyde
by gylefull wyles of wymmen. And
Englyshe men seen that Gurmūd^d
wan Yrlonde & made thylke dyches
and make no mencyon of Turgeli^d
And Yrllthe men speke of Turgeli
us / and knowe not of Gurmundus.
Therfore is to wete that Gurmūdus
had wonne Brytayn & dwelled ther
in / & sent Turgeli^d with grete streng
the in to Yrlonde for to wyne that
londe / and by cause Turgelius was
capytayn and leder of that byage &
Journey & seen among them. therfore
Yrllthe men speke moche of hem as
a noble man that was seen in þ lon
de and knowen. Atte last whan Gur
mundus was slayn in fraunce. Tur
gelius loued the kynges doughter of
meth in Yrlonde. And her fader be
hyght Turgelius that he wolde sen
de her hym to the lowe lacherin with
.xv. maydens. And Turgelius pro
myled to mete hem there with .xv. of
the noblest men that he had. And hel
de couenaunt & thought no gyle / but
there come .xv. yonge berdles men
clothed lpeke wīmen with short swor
des vnder her clothes / & fylle on Tur

gelius and slewe him right there & so
he was traytourly slayn after he had
regned .xxx. yere. Not long after thre
brethery Amelanus Syracus & Jou
rus come in to Yrlond with her men
out of norwaye as it had ben for los
ue of peas and of marchaundysle and
dwelled by the see sydes by assente of
Yrllthe men that were alwaye ydell
as paules knyghtes. And the Nor
wapes byldeed thre Lytees. Deuelyn
Waterforde and Lymeriche / and ens
created and after were rebelle apenst
men of that londe & brought fyrste
sparthes in to Yrlonde. So fro Tur
gelius tyne vnto Rotheryphs tyne
kyng of Cannaccia that was the last
þ was kyng of all þ londe were .xvii.
kynges in Yrlonde. And so the kyn
ges that regned in Yrlonde from the
fyrste hermons tyne vnto the laste
Rotheryphs tyne were in all an hon
dred four score and one kynges that
were not crowned neyther enoynted
ne by lawe of herpytage / but by mygh
te maystrye & by strengthe of armes.
The seconde Harry kyng of Englon
de made this Rotheryph subgette the
yere of kyng Harryes age fourty / &
of his regne .xvii. the yere of our lord
de .xi. L. lxxii.

pitulum .xxxiiii^r

Solinus sayth þ men of this
londe ben stronge of nacioy
houseles & grete fyghters / &
acoūte right & wrong al for one thyn
ge & ben syngell of clothyng scarce of
mete cruell of herte & angry of speche

& drynketh fyrste blood of dede men
 that ben slayn / & theire welshen theyr
 vylages therwith / & holden hem pay
 de with flesshe & fruyt in stede of me
 te / & with mylke in stede of drynke / &
 vlc moche playng ydlenes & hūtpng
 & trauayll full lypyll. In theyr child
 hode they ben harde noysshed & har
 de fedde / & they be vnlemely of ma
 ners & of clothyng / & haue breche &
 holes all of one wolle / & strayt hodes
 that stretcheth a cubyte ouer the shol
 ders behynde & foldpnges in stede of
 mantels & of clockes. Also they vlc
 no sadles bootes ne spores whan they
 ryde. But they dryue theyr hoises wth
 a chambred yerde in the ouer ende in
 stede of byttes with trenches & of by
 dles of reest / they vlc byddles þ lette
 not theyr hoise to ete theyr mete / they
 fyght vnarmed naked in bode / ne
 theles with two dartes & speres / and
 with brood sparches they fyght with
 one honde / these men forsake tylpung
 of londe & hepen pasture for beestes.
 They vlc longe berdes & long lockes
 hangynge down behynde her heedes.
 They vlc no craft of flaxe of wolle /
 of metall ne of marchaūdyse / but gy
 ue hem to ydlenes & to slouth & reke
 ne reste for lpyhng and fredom for ry
 chesse. And though Scotlonde the
 doughter of Irlande vlc harpe tym
 bre & tabour. Nethelste Iryssh men
 be connyng in two maner instrumē
 tis of mulyke in harpe & tymbre that
 is armed with wyre & strenges of bras
 In whiche instrumētes though they
 playe hastely & swyftely / they make
 right mery armonye & melodye with
 thycke tewnes werbles & notes. And

begynne from bemoll and playe secre
 tely vnder dymme sowne vnder the
 grete strenges and tozne agayn vnto
 the same. Soo that the gretest partye
 of the craftte hydeth the craftte / as it
 wolde seme as though the craftte soo
 hydde sholde be ashamed yf it were
 take. These men ben of euyll maner
 in her lyuyng / they paye no tythes /
 they wedde lawfully / they spare not
 theyr alves / but þ broder weddeth the
 broders wyfe / they ben bely for to be
 traye theyr neyghbours & other / they
 bere sparches in theyr hondes in stede
 of staues & fyght ayenst them þ trust
 moost to them. These men ben vary
 able & vnstedfast trechours & gylefull
 who that deleth with them nedeth
 more to be ware of gyle than of craft
 of peas than of biennynge bondes /
 of hony than of galle / of malyce than
 of knyghthode. They haue suche ma
 ners that they ben not strong in war
 res and in batayll / ne trewe in peas /
 They become gossybs to them þ they
 wyll fallely betraye in the gossybide
 & holy kynrede. Eueryche drynketh
 others blood whan it is shed / they lo
 ue somdele her noyce & her playfers
 whiche þ louke the same mylke that
 they louked whyle they were children
 And they pursue theyr brethern theyr
 colpns & theyr other kyn / & despyse
 theyr kyn whyles they lyue / & auenge
 theyr dech whan they ben slayn. Soo
 longe hath the vlage of euyll custo
 me endured amonge them / that it
 hath goten the maystrye ouer them &
 tourned treason in to kynde soo fet
 forth that they ben traytours by na
 ture / and alpens & men of straunge

londes that dwelle amonge them for
lowen theyr maners / þ̄ dnnethe there
is none but he is belmytted w^f theyr
trelon also. Among them many men
pyssen lyytynge & wymmen standynge
There ben many men in that londe
foule shapen in lymmes & in bodye .
For in theyr lymmes they lacke þ̄ bes
nesyce of kynde / so that nowhere ben
none better shapen than they þ̄ ben
there well shapen / & none worse sha
pen than they that be euyl shapen .
And skylfully nature hurt & defouled
by wychednesse of luyng byngeth
forth suche foule gromes & euyl sha
pen of hem / that with vnlawfull de
lynge / with foule maners & euyl ly
uyng so wychedly defouleth kynde &
nature. In this londe & in wales ol
de wyues & wymmen were woonte &
ben as men layen ofte for to shape
them selfe in lyknesse of hares for to
mylke theyr neyghbours kyen & stele
her mylke. And oft gerhoüdes renney
after hem and pursue them & wene
that they ben hares . Also somme by
craft of Nygromancye make fat swy
ne for to be reed of colour & selle them
in markettes & fayres. But as loone
as þ̄ swyne passe ony water they cor
ne in to theyr owen kynde / whether
it be strawe heye gras or turues. But
these swyne maye not be kepte by no
crafte for tendure in lyknesse of swy
ne ouer thre dapes. Among these won
dres & other take hede that in the vt
termest ende of the worldde falled ofte
newe meruaylles and wondres . As
though kynde playde with larger lo
ue secretely & fer in thendes / than o
penly & nyghe the myddell / therfore

in this Flonde ben many gryfly won
dres and meruaylles.

Meruaylles of Irland Caplm. xxxv.

WAny men telley þ̄ in the north
lyde of Irlande is the londe
of lyfe. In þ̄ Flonde no man
maye deye / but whan they ben olde &
be vexed with grete seknes / they ben
born out in to þ̄ next londe & deye the
re. There is a nother Flonde in Ire
londe that no woman theris maye
bere a childe / but yet she maye conce
ue. Also there is an Flonde in whiche
no dede body may roten. In vltonia
that is vltter is an Flonde in a lake
wonderly departed in tweyne. In þ̄
one parte is grete dysturbaüce & dyl
comfort of fendes. And in that other
parte grete lpyng & comforte of ho
ly angels. There is also Saynt Pa
tryks purgatoire that was shewed
at his prayers to comferme his pre
chyng & his loze whan he preched to
mylbyleued of sorowe and of payne
that euyl men sholde suffre for her
euyl werkes. And of Joye and blyße
that good men shall resceyue for her
holy dedes . He telleth that who that
suffreth the paynes of þ̄ purgatoire /
yf it be enioyned him for penaüce / he
shall neuer suffre the paynes of helle.
but he dye fynally without repetaüce
of synne / as þ̄ ensamble is sette more
fulle at this chapytres ende. ¶ Treui
sa But truly no man maye be saued /
but yf he be very repentaunt what
somerue penaunce he doo. And every
man that is very repentaunt atte his

lyues ende / shall be sekerly saued / though he neuer here of Saynte Patryks purgatoꝛe. There is an Flond in Cannate Salo þ is in the see of Lonaccia halowed by Saynt Brians / that hath no myle / there dede bodies ben not buryed / but ben kept out therche & roten not. In mamonia is a welle / who that washeth him with the water of þ welle he shall wepe hore on his hede. Ther is a nother welle in Dlonia / who someuer is wellþe therin / he shall neuer wepe hore after warde. Ther is a welle in Downstre or Homonia / yf ony man touche þ welle / anone shal falle grete rayne in all the prouynce / & þ rayne shall neuer cesse / tyll a preest þ is a clene mayde synge a masse in a chappell faste by / & blesse the water / & with mylke of a cowe that is of one heer belpyrngge the welle / & so reconyle the welle in this straunge maner. At Glyndal can aboute the Diatoꝛe of Saynte Keywyn withges bereth apples as it were apple trees and ben more holysom than sauerye. That holy Saynt brought forth these apples by prayers for to hele his childe þ was seek. There is a lake in Dlster & moche fylshe therin whiche is .xxx. myle in length & .xv. in brede. The Ryuer Bay rennech out of þ lake in to the north Ocean. And men say þ this lake began in this maner. There were men in þ contree þ were of euill lypng (coētes cū brutis) And there was a welle in that londe in grete reuerence of olde tyme / & alwaye couerd / & yf it were leste vncouerd / the well wolde rylse and drowne all the londe. And soo it

happed that a woman wente to that welle for to fetch water / & hped her fast to her childe þ wepte in the cradle and leste the welle vncouerd / than the well sprange so faste that it drowned the woman & her childe & made alle the contree a lake and a fysshponde. for to preue þ this is soth it is a grete argument þ whay the weder is clere. Fylshers of that water see in þ grounde vnder the water rounde towres & hyghe shapen as steples & churches of that londe. In the north syde of Jrlonde in the contree of Dlliriens / euery leuen yere atte prayer of an holy abbot / tweyne þ ben wedded a man and a woman must nedes be exiled & forshapen in to lykenes of wolues & abyde out leuen yere. And atte the ende of leuen yere yf they lyue they come home agayn & take agayn theyrown shappe. And thenne shall other tweyne go forth in theyr stede and so forshapen for other leuen yere. Ther is a lake in this lond / yf a pole of tree be pyght and stycked therin that parte of þ shafte or poole that is in therthe shall tourne in to prou. And that parte that abydeth in the water shall tourne in to stone. And the parte that abydeth aboue shall be tree in his owne kynde. Also there is a lake þ tournech hasell in to allhe / & allhe in to hasell yf it be don therin. Also in Jrlonde ben thre samon leepes / there as samons leepe apenste a roche a longe speres lengthe. Also in Lagenia is a ponde / there be seen colmans byrdes / the byrdes ben called certelles & come homly to mānes honde / but yf men doo hem wrong of harme / they

gone awaye & come not agayn / & the water there shall were bytter & styne. And he that dyde the wrong shall not avertere without wretche & mischypf but yf he doo amendes. ¶ R. As touching Patryks purgatoire. Ye shall vnderstande / that the seconde Saynt Patryke þ was abbot & not bysshop / whyle he preched in Yrlonde laboured & studied for to torne thylke wycked men þ lyued as beestes out of her euill lyfe for drede of paynes of helle And for to conferme hem in good lyf And they sayd they wolde not tourne but some of them myght know some what of the grete paynes / & also of blysse that he spake of. Thenne saynte Patryke prayde to god almyghty therfore. And our lord Ihesu cryste appered to Saynte Patryke & toke hym a staf / & ladde hym in to a wyllde place and shewed hym there a roude pytte that was derke within and sayd / that yf a may were very repentaunt & stable of byleue and wente in to this pytte and walked therein a day & a nyght / he sholde see the sorowes and the paynes of euill men / and the Joye and blysse of good men. Thenne Cryste danysshed out of Patryks syght. And Saynt Patryk arered and buylded there a chirche / and put therein chanons Regular / and closed the pytte about with a walle / and is now in the chirche yerde atte east ende of the chirche / & fast shytted with a stronge doore / for noman sholde goo in nyctely without leue of the bysshop or of the pryour of the place. Many men wente in and cam out agayn in Patryks tyme / and tolde of paynes

and Joye that they had seen / and the meruaylles þ they sawe ben there yet wyrtten. And by cause therof many men torned & were conuerted to right byleue. Also many men went in & came neuer agayn. In kyng Steuens tyme kyng of Englonde a knyght þ hyght oweyn wente in to Saynt Patryks purgatoire / & came agayn and dwelled euer after durpng his lyfe in the nedes of thabbaye of Ludensis þ is of thordre of Cysters and he tolde many wondres þ he had seen in Patryks purgatoire. The place is called patryks purgatoire / & þ chirche is named Reglis. Noman is enioyned for to goo in to þ purgatoire / but couñsellid þ they sholde not come therein / but take vpon hym other penaunce. And yf a may haue auowed & be stable & wolde nede goo therein / he shall fynde goo to the bysshop / and than he shall be sente with lettres to the pryour of the place / and they both shell couñsellid hym to leue / and yf he wyll nedes go therto / he shall be in prayers and in fastyng .xv. dayes. And after .xv. dayes he shall be houseled and lad to the doore of the purgatoire with processyon and letanye / and yet he shall be counsellid to leue it. And yf he be stedfast & wyll entre the doore shall be opened / and he þ blyssed and goo on goddes name & holde forth his waye. And the doore shall be faste shette tyll the next daye. And whan the tyme is the pryour shall come and opene the doore. And yf the may be comen he ledeth hym in to the chirche with procesyon / & there he shall be .xv. dayes in prayers and in fastyng.

De ꝑroniis sanctorꝝ Caplm. xxxvi.

Here Geraldus maketh mynde þat as men of this nacyon ben more angry than other men & more hasty for to take wreche whyles they ben alȝue. So sayntes & halowes of this londe ben more wrechefull than sayntes of other londes. Clerkes of this londe ben chaste and sayen many prayers & done grete abŷtynence a daye & drynketh all nyght. So þat it is acouñted for a myracle / that lechery regneth not there as wyne regneth. And they þat ben euyl of them ben worst of all other. So good men among them though they be but fewe ben good atte best. Prelates of þat counȝtree ben full slowe of correccion of trespaaŷes & hely in contemplacion & not in prechynge of goddes worde. Therfore it is that the sayntes of þat londe ben confellours & no martyr among them / & no wonder. for all the prelates of this londe ben choleyn out of abhays in to the clergye / & done as monkes sholde / what clerkes and prelates sholde do is to them vnknowen / therfore whan it was put ayenst the byllshop of Cassyll how it myght be þat so many sayntes ben in Irlonde & neuer a martyr amonge hem all lyth þat the men ben so shrewde & so angry / & the prelates soo recheles & slowe in correccion of trespaaŷes. The byllshop answered frowardly ynough & sayd / our men ben shrewd & angry ynough to hemselfe / but to goddes seruañtes they leye neuer honde / but do to hem grete reuerence & wořshyp. But Englyŷhe men come in to this londe þat

can make martres & were wonte to vñe that craft. **CR.** The byllshop sayde so by cause that kyng Harry the seconde was tho newe come in to Irlonde fresshly after the martyrdom of Saynt Thomas of Caüterbury. **CSir.** In this londe in Wales & in Scotlonde ben belles & staues with croked heedes & other luche thynges for relyques in grete reuerence & wořshyp. So þat men of this londe dreden more for to swere vpon ony of thylle belles & golde staues than vpon the gospel. The chyfe of alle luche relyques is I holde Ihesus staf / that is at deuelyn / with the whiche staf / they saye þat the fyrst Saynt Patryk droof the wormes out of Irlonde. **CAuguŷtin⁹** de ci. dei. c. vii. Vñ men are how it maye be þat dyuerse maner bestes & of dyuerse kynde that ben kyndly gotten bytwene male & female come & ben in Irlondes after Noes flood. Men supposen þat luche bestes swam in to Irlondes about. And fyrst to the next & so forth in to other. Or els men seyllynge in to Irlondes brought with hem luche bestes for loue of hūtpng or angels at god almyghtyes cōmaunde / mēt brought luche bestes in to Irlondes about / or the erthe brought hem forth fyrste & fulfilled tho goddes cōmañdement þat cōmañded þat erthe to bryng forth gras & quycke bestes.

De Scotia. Caplm. xxxvii.

HIt is a comyn sawe that the countree whiche now is named Scotlonde is an out stretchyng of þat north parte of Brytayne / &

is departeth in the south syde fro Brytayne with armes of þe see / & in the other sydes all about beclipped with þe see. This londe hete somtyme Albania / & hath þe name of Albanactus þe was kyng Brutus sone. for Albanactus dwelled fyrst therin / or of the pryncce Albania / þe is a countree of Scicia and nyghe to Amazona / therfore Scottes ben called as it were Scites. for they cam out of Scicia. Afterwarde þe londe hete Pytaunia / for the Pyctes regned therin a .M. yere and .lxx. Or some men telle a .M.iii. C. lx. yere. And atte last hete Hybernia as Irlande hyght. ¶ **G**ir. in top. for many skylls / one skyll is for affinite & alpe þe was bytwene them & Irlande men for they toke wyues of Irlande & þe is openly seen in her byleue / in clothe ge in langage & in speche in wepyng and in maners. Another skyll is for Irlande men dwelled there somtyme ¶ **B**eda li. p. Dute of Irlande þe is the propre countree of þe Scottes come Irlande men with her duke þe was called Renda. And with loue and with strength made hem chyfe Sees & Lytees besyde the pyctes in the north syde. ¶ **G**ir. Now the londe is shortely called Scotlonde of Scottes þe come out of Irlande & regned therin. iii. C. xv. yere vnto þe Rede Williams tyme that was Malcolin broder. ¶ **R**. Many euydencis we haue out of this Scotlonde þe is oft called & herte Hybernia as Irlande doth. ¶ **T**herfor Beda li. ii. c. i. sayth that Laurence archibishop of Dunbar was archibishop of Stottes þe dwelled in an flonde þe hete Hybernia & is next to Brytayne.

¶ **A**llo Beda li. iii. c. xvii. sayth. pestilence of moreyn bare down Hybernia ¶ **A**llo li. iii. c. ii. sayth / that þe Scottes þe dwelled in the south syde of Hybernia. ¶ **A**llo li. iii. c. iii. he sayth þe Chadde was a yonlynge & lerned the rewle of monkes in Hybernia. ¶ **A**llo libro. iii. c. xxii. Egtrydus kyng of northumberlond destroyed Hybernia ¶ **A**llo libro. iii. c. xv. The moost dele of Scottes in Hybernia. And in the same Chapitre he clepeth Hybernia proprely named. That west flonde is an hondred myle from eueryche Brytayne / and departed with the see bytwene. And called Hybernia that countree that now is called Scotlonde / there he telleth that Adanman abbot of this flonde saylled to Hybernia for to teche Irlande men the law full ester daye / & atte last cam agayn in to Scotlonde. ¶ **V**lydor⁹ Ethi. xiii. Men of this Scotlonde ben named Scottes in theyr owne langage & pyctes also. for somtyme her bodye was pepnted in this maner / they wolde somtyme w^e a sharp egged tole prycke & kerue her owne bodyes / & make theron dyuerse fygures & shappes / & pepnte hem with Inke or with other pepnture or colour / and by cause they were so pepnted they were called Pycti / that is to saye pepnted. ¶ **E**rodor⁹ Scottes ben light of herte / straunge & wylde ynough / but by medlynge of Englyshe men they ben moche amended / they ben cruell vpon theyr enuyes / & hateth bondage moost of any thyng / & holde for a foule slouthe yf a man deye in his bed / & grete woorthyp yf he deye in the felde. They

ben lypyll of mete & mowe fast longe
 And etey selde whan the sonne it vp.
 and ete flesche fylle mylke & fruyt
 more than brede. And though they
 ben fayer of shappe / they ben defou-
 led & made vnseuely ynoughe with
 theyr owne clothyng. They prayle
 faste the vslage of theyr owne forsa-
 ders. And despyse other mennes
 doyng/her londe is fruytfull ynough
 in pasture gardyns & felde. ¶ **G**ir.
 de p. c. xviii. The prynces of Scottes
 as þ kynges of Spayn ben not wonte
 to be enoynted ne crowned. In this
 Scotlonde is solempne & grete myn-
 de of Saynt Andrew thapostle. for
 Saynt Andrewe had the north con-
 trees of þ woilde Scytes & Pytes to
 his lotte for to preche and conuert the
 people to Crysten byleue. And was at
 the last martred in Achaya in Gre-
 cia in a cyte that was named Patras
 And his bones were kepte two hon-
 dred .lxxii. yere vnto Constantynus
 themperours tyme. And thenne they
 were translated in to Constantinople
 & kept there an .L. and .x. yere vnto
 Theodosi⁹ themperours tyme Then
 ne Vngust kyng of Pytes in Scot-
 londe destroyed a grete parte of By-
 taryn & was besette with a grete hooft
 of Byttons in a felde called Merke.
 And he harde Saynt Andrewe speke
 to him in this maner. Vngus. Vngus
 here thou me Crystes apostle. I pro-
 myse the helpe & socour / whan thou
 halt ouercomen thyn enmyes by myn
 helpe / thou shalt gyue the thyrde de-
 le of thyn herptage in almes to god
 almyghty & in worlhypp of Saynte
 Andrew / & þ lpygne of the crosse went

to fore his hooft / & the thyrde dape he
 had vyctorye & toined home agayn /
 & deled his herptage as he was bodey
 And for he was vncertayn what Cyte
 he sholde dele for Saynt Andrew / he
 fasted .iii. dayes / he & his men prayde
 Saynt Andrew þ he wolde shewe hē
 what place he wolde chele. And one
 of þ wardcyns þ kept þ body of saynt
 Andrew in Constantinople was war-
 ned in his sweene þ he sholde go in
 to a place whyder an angell wolde le-
 de him. And so he cam in to Scotlon-
 de with seuen felaws to þ toppe of an
 hylle named Ragmunde. The same
 houre light of heuen belhone & beclyp-
 ped þ kyng of Pytes þ was comyng
 with his hooft to a place called Car-
 ceuan. There anoy were heled many
 seke men. There met with the kyng
 Regulus the monke of Constantyno-
 ple with the Reliques of Saynt An-
 drewe. There is founded a chirche in
 worlhypp of Saynt Andrewe that is
 hede of alle the chirches in the londe
 of Pytes that is Scotlonde. To this
 chirche comen pylgryms out of alle
 londes. There was Regulus fyrst ab-
 bot and gadred monkes. And soo all
 the tyenthe londe that the kyng had
 assygned him / he departed it in dyuer-
 se places amonge abbayes.

And for this Flonde lyeth vnder the north hede of the world / hit hath light & bryght nyghtes in the somer tyme. So þoftyme at myd nyght men haue questyons & doubte whether it be euen tyme or dawnyng. þ is for þ tyme of the yere / þ the sonne goth not fer vnder the erthe by nyght. And men wene that Julius Ceſar
made there ſuche bathes. ¶ R. But
Ganfr. monemutēlis in his brytons
book ſayth that Bladud made thyl/
ke bathes/by cauſe that William had
not ſeen that brytons book/wrote ſo
by tellng of other men or by his ow
ne gheſſng as he wrote other thyn/
ges not beſt aduyledly. Therefore it ſe
meth more lothly that Bladud made
not the hote bathes ne Julius Ceſar
dyde ſuche a dede / though Bladud
buylded & made the Lyte/but it acor
deth better to hendly reaſon that the
water renneth in the erthe by veynes
of byrmſtone & ſulphure/& ſo is ken/
dely made hote in that cours/& ſpryn
geth vp in dyuerſe places of the Lyte
And ſo there ben hote bathes þ wal/
ſheth of tetres ſoores and ſhabbes.
¶ Treuiſa. Though men myght by

trafte make hote bathes for to dure
longe ynough / this acordech well to
reaſon & to phyloſophye that treateth
of hote welles & bathes/that ben in
dyuerſe londes/though the water of
this bathe be more troubylly & heuier
of ſauour & of ſmelle than other hote
bathes ben þ I haue ſeen at Akon
in Almayne & at Egges in Sauoye/
whiche ben as ſayre & clere as ony col
de welle ſtreme. I haue ben bathed
therin & allayed them. ¶ R. Claudi⁹
Ceſar maryed his doughter to Arui/
ragus kyng of Brytons. This Clau
dius Ceſar bylded Glowceſtre in the
weddyng of his doughter. Brytons
called this Lyte fyrſt after Claudius
name / but afterwarde it was called
Glowceſtre after one Glora/whiche
was duke of that contree/& ſtandeth
vpon Seuarn in the Marche of En/
glonde and wales. Shrowelbury is a
Lyte vpon Seuarn in the Marche of
englond & wales I ſette vpon the top/
pe of an hylle/& it is called Shrowel
bury of Shrobbes and fruyte that
grew there ſomtyme on þ hylle. Bry
tons called it ſomtyme pengwern þ
is the hede of a ſayr tree. Shrowelbu
ry was ſōtyme the hede of Powelpe. þ
ſtretcheth forth thwert ouer the myd/
dell of wales vnto the Iryſhe ſee.
Notyngham ſtandeth vpon Trente/
& ſomtyme hete Snotyngham þ is
the wonnyng of dennes. for the Da
nes dwelled there ſomtyme & dygged
dennes & caues vnder harde ſtones &
rockes and dwelled there. ¶ R. Lyn/
coln is chyfe of þ pynce of lyndelape
& was ſomtyme called Caerludcoyt.
and afterwarde Lyndecolpy. It is

uncerteyn who bylded fyrst this Cytte but yf it were kyng lud. & so it semeth by menyng of þ name. for caer is byrtyllhe & is to saye a Cytte/ & copt is a wode/ & so it semeth þ caerludcopt is to saye luddes wode touyn. Kyng Lepr was Bladuddis sone & buylded Leprcetre as it were in the myddell of Englonde vpon the Ryuer Sos & vpon fosse the kynges hys wape.

¶ Wode pon. li. iii. Caplm. clviii.

Worde is a grete cyte in eyther syde of þ water of Dwole þ lemed as fayr as Rome vnto þ tyme þ þ kyng William þ conquerour had with brēnyng & suppr defouled it & the coūtree about/ soo þ a pylgrym wolde now wepe & he sawe it / yf he had knowen it to fore. ¶ Gaufr. Ebrancus the fyfth kyng of Brytons bylded Porke & called it after his owne name Caerbrianch. he bylded also two other noble Cyttes/ one in Scotlonde & is called Edenburgh/ & a nother towarde Scotlonde in thendes of Englonde & is called Alcliud. ¶ R. Edenburgh is a Cytte in the londe of Pytes byt wene the Ryuer of Twede & the Scotysllhe see. And hete somtyme the castell of maydens/ & was called afterwarde Edenburgh of Eoan kyng of Pytes that regned there in Egfridus tyme kyng of Northūberlonde. Alcliud was somtyme a noble Cytte & is now well nyghe vnknewe to all Englyllhe men. for vnder the Brytons & Pytes & Englyllhmen it was a noble Cytte vnto the comynge of the Danes/ but afterwarde about

the yere of oure lorde .viii. C. lxx. hit was destroyed whan þ Danes destroyed þ coūtrees of Northūberlonde/ but in what place of Brytany þ Cytte Alcliud was bylded/ auctours telley dysuerlely. ¶ Beda li. i. seyth hit was bylded by weit þ arme of the see þ departeth bytwene þ Brytons & the Pytes somtyme there Seuerus famo⁹ walle. endeth westwarde / & so it semeth by hym hit is not fer from Caerleyl. for that Cytte is sette atte ende of þ walle. Other wyrters of storyes wyrtten that the Cytte of Alcliud is þ Cytte þ now is called Aldburgh/ that is to saye an olde touyn/ & standeth vpon the Ryuer Dwole/ not fer for Burgh byrgge þ is xv. myle westwarde out of Porke & it semeth that he preueth that by Gansfryde in his book of dedes of Brytonnes. he wyrteth that Elydurus kyng of Brytons was lodged at the Cytte. Alcliud by cause of solace & huntynge And sonde his broder Ageloy Mal kyng in a wode nyghe there belyde þ hyght Calatery. But that wode Calatery/ whiche is Caltres in Englyllhe retcheth almost to Porke & stretcheth toward the north by Aldburgh in lengche by space of twenty myle/ the moost dele of that wode is nowe throwen down and the londe ȝ tyllid. Other men wolde suppose that Alcliud was þ Cytte that now is called Burgham in the northe countree of Westmerlonde fast by Lomberlonde & standeth vpon the Ryuer Eden the Cytte is there yet wondly seen. Deme ye now where it is bylded. ¶ Treuila hit is not harde to assopple yf men take hede that many townes here one

name/as Cartago in Affryca & Car-
tago in Spayne. Newport in wales &
Newport in þ̄ paryshe of Barkeley/
wetton vnder egge & wotton ballet/
wyckwar/wyck payn & wyck in þ̄ pa-
ryshe of barkeley. And .ii. thyre tow-
nes eyther is called hāpton/as south/
hāpton & northāpton. Soo it semeth
by þ̄ storyes/þ̄ one alcluid was in yorke
thyre/a nother in westmerlonde/& o-
ne fast by in þ̄ right syde of þ̄ west ar-
me of the see þ̄ departeth englonde &
scotlonde. But þ̄ alcluid was a right
strong Lyte as Beda sayth/& þ̄ cyte
standech faste by a Ryuer þ̄ is called
cluid/& ther is no luche ryuer in yorke
thyre/nether in westmerlond as men
of þ̄ contree telle me/some men say þ̄
þ̄ ryuer cluid is now named sulwach
Sulwach is but .v. myle fro caerlepe.
¶ Caerlepe is a Lyte in the contree
of northenglonde towarde the north
west/and hath another name whiche
is Luguball. Leyll the .vii. kynge of
Byrons buylded Caerlepe. ¶ In
this Lyte is somwhat of that famo⁹
wall that passeth Northumberlonde.
¶ W. de pon. In this Lyte is yet a
tyre chambred hous made of vawte
stones that neuer myght be destroyed
with tempest of weder ne with bien-
nyng of fyre. Also in þ̄ contree fast by
in westmerlonde in þ̄ fronte of a thre
chambred place is wryten in this ma-
ner. Marii victorie/what this wrytpn-
ge is to lape I doubte somwhat /but
yf it were so þ̄ some of the Lombres
laye there somtyme whan the consull
Mari⁹ had put hē out of Italie/but
it semeth better þ̄ it is wryten in myn-
de of Marius kynge of Byrons that

was Aruiragus lone. This Marius
ouercome in that place Rodryk kynge
of Pytes/so sayth Sancti. in his by-
tyllhe booke. ¶ William Malmesbury
sawe neuer that booke. At hagustaldes
chirche is a place of foure score myle
out of yorke north westwarde the pla-
ce is as it were destroyed so sayth W.
li.iii. de pō. That place longeth some
tyme to þ̄ bysshopyrche of yorke/ther
were somtyme houles with vyce ar-
ches & voutes in the maner of Rome
Now þ̄ place is called Hestoldesham
& Hegleham also. ¶ Beda li.iii. ca. i.
sayth þ̄ þ̄ place fast by þ̄ longe walle of
the werke of Rome in the north half
¶ Ther is dyfference bytwene the
pynce of Lyndeffar & the chirche of
Lyndefarne. For the prouynce of Lyn-
deffar and Lyndelape is all one and
lyeth by cest Lyncolny/and Lyncolny is
the hede therof. Of the whiche sayth
Beda li.iiii. ca. xi. that Sexnolphus
was fyrste bysshop there /but Beda
sayth li.iiii. ca. xliii. that Lyndeffars
chirche is an Flonde þ̄ is called Haly
Flonde in þ̄ Ryuer Twede next Ber-
wyk. And so it is gadred of Bedaes
lawes that Twede renneth in to the
famous arme of the see that now de-
parteth Englyshe men and Scottes
in the east halfe. And in þ̄ arme ben
thre Flondes/þ̄ one is Maylros that
now is called Menros. Theñe aboue
towarde þ̄ west is Lyndeffars chirche
that is called Haly Flonde. Theñe þ̄
thyrde aboue is vpwarde & that is the
Flonde farne/and is called also far-
ny Flonde. Thenne vpwarde aboue
that two myle is a Ryall Lyte vpon
the bynke of Twede that somtyme

hyght Bebenborgh that is bobbes cyte/ & now is called Bamburg / and hath a right strong castell. ¶ **G**ir. in itinere. Two Lytees there ben eyther is called Caerlegyon & Caerleon also. One is Demecia in south wales that is named Caerulc also. There the Ryuer vlike falleth in to seuarne fast by Glamorgan. Bellinus kynge of Brytons somtyme bylded that Lyte And was somtyme the chyfe Lyte of Demecia in south wales. Afterwarde in Claudius Cezars tyme hit was I called the Lyte of legyons whan atte prayer of Genius the quene Velpasianus & Arinragus were accorded and Legyons of Rome were sente in to Yrlonde / tho was Caerleon a noble Lyte and of grete auctoryte & by the Romayns ryally and walled aboute with walles of brente tyle. Grete nobley þ was there in olde tyme is there yet in many places seen/as the grete palayles Gyantes towres/noble bathes. Releef of the Temple places of the atres/that were places hye & ryall to stonde and sytte in. And to beholde about / the places were ryally closed with ryall walles þ yet somdele ston/deth right nyghe cloos. And within the walles and without is grete buyl/dyng vnder erthe/water conduytes & wayes vnder erthe and strewes also thou shalt see wonderly made with strapte syde wayes of brethynge that wonderly cast vp heete. In this Lyte were some tyme thre noble churches/ one was of Saynt Julius the martyr & therein a grete compayne of virgyns/ þ other was of Saynt Aaron/ that was of the ordre of blacke cha

nons/that churche was with hem nobly adourned/the thyrde churche was the chyfe moder churche of all wales and the chyfe see. But afterwarde the chyfe see was tourned out of that Lyte in to Meneuia/that is Saynte Daupes lond in west wales. In this Caerleon was Amphybalus I born þ taught Saynte Albone. There the messagers of Rome come to the grete Arthurus courte/ þf it is leefull to trowe. ¶ **T**reuisa. ¶ **G**ir. was in doute whether it were leefull for to trowe it or no/hit were a wonder swene as men wolde wene for to haue euermore in mynde/ & euer be in doute / þf all his bookes were luche what loze were therein/ & namely whyle he maketh none euydence. for in neyther syde he telleth what moeueth so for to saye. ¶ **R**. There is a nother Lyte of legyons there this cronycle was bytrauaylled / as it is clerely knowen by þ fyrst chapitre of this boke. ¶ **T**reuisa/ þ is to vnderstondyng in latyn wrytyng. for he þ made it in latyn torned it not in to Englyshe/ ne it was torned in to Englyshe in þ same place þ it was made fyrst in latyn. The vnderstondyng of hym that made this Cronycle is thus wryten in latyn in the begynnyng of this boke. ¶ **P**resentem Cronica cõpilauit frater Ranulphus cestrensis monachus / that is to saye in Englyshe. Broder Ranulphus monke of Chestre Compyled & made this present cronycle. ¶ **R**. The Lyte of Legyons that is Chestre ston/deth in the marche of Englonde toward wales bytwene two armes of the see þ ben named Dee/ & Mersee.

This Cyte in tyme of Brytons was hede & chiefe Cyte of all Benedocia/ that is in northwales. The founder of this Cyte is vnknowe. for who þ seeth the foundamentes of the grete stones wolde rather wene þ it were Romayns werke or werke of Gyantes. than were made by lettyng of Brytons. This Cyte somtyme in brytysh he speche hete Carthleon Legecestria in latyn/ & Chestre in Englyshe and the Cyte of Legyons also. for there laye a wynter þ Legyons of knyght þ Juli⁹ Cesar sent for to wynne Irlande. And after Claudi⁹ Cesar sent Legyons out of þ Cyte for to wynne þ Flondes þ be called Britades / What euer William Malmebury by tellyng of other men mette with this Cyte This Cyte hath plente of lyeode/ of corn of flesshe of fyssh & specyally of pyp of lamon/ this cyte rescepueth grete marchaūdysse & ledeth out also. Also nyghe this Cyte ben salt welles Metall & oore. Northūbries destroyed this Cyte somtyme. But afterwarde Elfreda lady of Mercia bylded it agayn & made it moche more. In this Cyte ben wayes vnder erth with bowtes & stonewerke wonderly I wrought thre chambred werkes/ grete stones I graue with olde mennes names there in. There is also Julius Cezars name wonderly in stones I graue/ & oth^r noble mennes also with the wrytyng about. This is þ Cyte þ Ethelfridyde kyng of Northumberlonde destroyed/ & sloughe there fast by nyghe two thousande monkes of the Wynster of Bangor. This is þ Cyte that kyng Edgar cam to somtyme with

seuen kynges that were subget to hē. A metrer breketh oute in this maner in praylyng of this Cyte. Chestre call tell tou as it were / name take of a castel. It is vnknowe/ what may bylde this cyte now. Tho legecestria chele/hete now tou of legyones. Now wallthe & englyshe / holde this tou of grete pris. Stones on walle/ semeth werke hercules alle. There long with myght/ to dure þ hepe is I hight. Sax on smale stones/ sette vpon grete benattons. There vnder groude/ lotyng double bout is founde. That helpeth w^o londes/ many men of westren londes. fyssh flesshe & corn lowe/ this cyte tou hath ynough. Shippes & chafre/ see water bynygeth ynough thare Godestalle there is/ þ was emperour er this. And ferth henry kyng/ erth is there righten dwellyng. Of kyng haralde / powder is there yet I halde. Bachus and marcurius / mars and venus also lauernus. Protheus and pluto/ regney there in þ tou. ¶ Treuila God wote what this is to meane. But poetes in her maner of speche feyney as though euery kynde crafte and luyng hath a dyuerse god euery che from other. And so they feyned a god of batayll & of fyghtyng and called hym Mars. And a god of couetyse of richesse & marchaūdysse and called hym Mercurius. And so Bachus he is called god of wyne. Venus goddesse of loue & beaute. Lauerna god of thefte & of robberye. Protheus god of falschede & of gyle. And Pluto god of helle. And so it semeth that these verles wolde mene / þ these forlayde goddes regne & ben serued in Chestre

Mars with fyghtyng & cockyng. Mercurius with couetyse of rychele and marchaundyse. Bacchus with grete drynkyng. Venus with loue lewdely. Lauerna with theft & robbery. Protheus with falsheede & gyle. Thenne is Pluto not vnserued god of helle. ¶ There Babylon loze more myghte hath trouthe the more.

TAke hede that Englonde conteyneth .xxii. shyres & prouynces / that now ben called Eildomes / reserued Cornewayll and the flondes. ¶ Also. These ben þ names of the Eildomes & shyres. Kent Southsex Southereye Hamphyre Barokshyre that hath his name of bare ooke þ is in the forest of wyndelore. For at þ bare ooke men of þ shyre were wonte come togydres & make theyr treaties & there take coulell & aduise. Also wyldshyre that hete somtyme þ pupnce of lemeran. Somersete Dorsete Deuenshyre þ now is called deuonia in latyn. These .ix. south shyres tample departeth from þ other dele of Englonde / whiche were somtyme gouerned & rewled by þ westsaxon lawe. Eestsax Wyddelsex South folk North folke Herfordshyre Huntynondonshyre Northamptonshyre Cambryggelshyre Bedfordshyre Buphyngghamshyre Leycetre shyre Derby shyre Notyngghamshyre Lyncopnshyre Yorkshyre Duramshyre Northumberlonde Caerleppshyre with Comberlonde Appelbysshyre with Westmerlonde Lancas

shyre that conteyneth fyue lityll shyres. These .xv. north & east shyres were somtyme gouerned & rewled by þ lawe whiche is called denelawe. But Drenfordshyre Warwykshyre Gloucestreshyre Wyrcetreshyre Herfordshyre Shropshyre Staffordshyre Cheshire shyre. These .viii. myddle & west shyres were somtyme gouerned & rewled by the lawe called Mercia in latyn & merchene lawe in Englyshe. It is to wete þ Yorkshyre stretcheth from the ryuer of Humber vnto þ ryuer of Teyse / & yet in Yorkshyre ben .xxii. hondredes / hundred & candred is all one. candred is one word made of walshe & Jyshe / & is to menyng a couitree that conteyneth .x. townes / & is also in Englyshe called wepentak. For somtyme in þ comyng of a newe lord / ternautes were wonte to yelde vp her wepen in stede of homage. Duramshyre stretcheth from þ ryuer Teyse vnto the ryuer Tyne / & for to speke proprely of Northumberlonde it stretcheth fro þ ryuer Tyne vnto the Ryuer of Tweede / that is in the begynnyng of Scotlonde. Thenne yf the couitree of Northumberlonde that was some tyme from Humber vnto Tweede be now acompted for one shyre & for one Eildome / as it was some tyme. Thenne ben in Englonde but .xxxii. shyres / but yf the countree of Northumberlonde be departed in to .vi. shyres / þ ben Euerwykshyre Duramshyre Northumberlonde Carlepylshyre Appelbysshyre & Lancasshyre. These ben in Englonde .xxxvi. shyres without Cornewayll & also without the flondes. Kyng william conquerour

made all these prouynces & shires to be descryued & meten. Thenne were fouiden .xxxvi. shires & halfe a shire. Townes .lii. M. four score. Daryllthe churches .xlv. M. & .ii. Rynghytes fees lxxv. M. Wherof men of relyggon haue .xxviii. M. xv. knyghtes fees. But now wodes ben hewen doug & þ' londes newe tyllid & made moche more than was at þ' tyme & many townes & byllages buylded / & so ther ben many moo byllages & townes now than were in þ' tyme. And were as afore is wryten that Cornuayll is not sette amonge þ' shires of Englonde / it maye stonde among them well ynough. for it is neyther in wales ne in Scotlonde but is in Englonde & Jopneth to Deuenshyre. And so maye ther ben acōpted in Englonde .xxxvii. shires & au halfe with the other shires

Drwallo þ' hete Moliuncius also made fyrst lawes in byrtayn þ' whiche lawes were called Moliunci⁹ lawes / & were solempnely obserued vnto William conquestours tyme. Moliūci⁹ ordeyned amonge his lawes / þ' Tytees Temples and wayes þ' lede men therto / & plowmen solowes sholde haue pryuelege & freedom for to saue all men þ' wolde flee therto for locour & refuge. Theñe afterwarde Marcia quene of Brytons that was Gwytelin⁹ wyfe. Of her þ' prouynce hadde the name Mercia as some men suppose. She made a lawe full of right of wytte & of reason / &

was called Merchene lawe. Gyldas þ' wrote þ' hystories of Brytons touned these two lawes oute of Bryton speche in to latyn. And afterwarde kyng Alured⁹ touned all out of latyn in to Saxon speche / & was called merchene lawe. Also the same kyng Aluredus wrote in Englyshe & put to a nother lawe þ' hete westsaxon lawe. Thenne afterwarde Danes were lordes in this londe / & so cam forthe the thyrde lawe that hete Dane lawe. Of these thre lawes Saynt Edward the cōfessour made one comyn lawe þ' yet is called Saynt Edwardes lawe. I holde it well done to wryte here & expowne many termes of these lawes. Myndebruche hurtynge of honour & worshyp. In frenshe blelchur dhonour. Burchbruch in frenshe blelchur de court on de cloys. Grichbruch bryng of peas. Myslkenyngge chaungyng of speche in court. Shewyngge lettyngge forthe of marchaūdyle. In frenshe dyspleyer de marchandyle. Hamlokne / or hamfare a rele made in hous. forstallyngge / wronge or lete doug in þ' kynges hre wape. frythloken surete in defence. Saka / forfayt. Soka / sute of court / & therof cometh loken. Theam / sute of bondmen / fygghtyngtwyte. Amersement for fygghtyng. Blodewyte. Mersement for the dyng of blode. flytwyte / amendes for shedyng of blode. Leyrwyt / amendes for lyeng by a bondwoman. Gulteswite / amendes for trespas. Scot / a gadyng to werke of baylyes / hyddage / tayllage for hydres of londes. Danesgheld / tayllage peuen to the Danes þ' was of euery bonata terre þ' is curry

Oxe londe thre pens. A wepentake & an hondred is all one. for the cou'tree of hondred townes were wonte to gyue by wepen in þ' compng of a lorde. Lestage Custome I chalenged in chespynges & fayres stallage custome for standyng in stretes in feyre tyme.

The kyngdom of Brytany stode without departyng hole & all one kyngdom to the Brytons the fyrst Brute vnto Julius Cezars tyme. And fro Julius Cezars tyme vnto Seuerus tyme this londe was vnder trybute to the Romayns. Netheles kynges had of þ' same lond from Seuerus vnto þ' last prynce Graeyan successours of Brytaysnys faylled And Romayns regned in Brytany. Afterwarde þ' Romayns leftte of the regnyng in Brytany/by cause it was fer from Rome/of for grete belynesse that they had in other syde. Thenne Scottes and Pytes by mylledyng of Maximus þ' Tpraut pursued Brytany and warred therinne with grete strengthe of men of armes longe tyme vnto þ' tyme þ' the Saxons came atte prayeng of the Brytons ayenste the Pytes/& put out Gurmunde the Gyrllthe kyng with his Pytes & the Brytons also with her kyng þ' hete Lareatic & drof hem out of Englonde in to Wales. And soo the Saxons were bydours & euery prouynce after his strengthe made hem a kyng/& so departed Englonde in to seuen kyngdoms. Netheles afterward these .vii.

kyngdoms eueryche after other come all in to one kyngdom all hole vnd þ' prynce Adelskon. Netheles þ' Danes pursued this lond fro Acheiwulfis tyme þ' was Alredus fað vnto þ' thyrde Saynt Edwards tyme about. C.lxx. yere/& regned therin contynuelly .xxx. yere. After þ' Danes þ' thyrde Saynt Edward regned therin .xxiii. yere & a lpyll more. And after hym haralt helde þ' kyngdom .ix. monethes. And after hem Normans haue regned vnto this tyme. But how long they shal regne/he wote/to whom no thyng is vnknewen. ¶ R. Of þ' forsayd seuen kyngdoms/of her merkes / mires & bou'des/whan they began & how longe they endured here shall I somwhat shortly telle. ¶ Alfr. The fyrst kyngdom was þ' kyngdom of kent þ' stret cheth fro þ' east Ocean vnto þ' Ryuer of Tamyle/there regned þ' fyrst Hengist & began þ' regne by þ' acōptyng of Dyonyle þ' yere of our lord. iiii. C. lv. þ' kyngdom dured. iiii. C. lxxviii. yere vnder .xv. kynges vnto þ' tyme þ' Balred was put out/& Egbert kyng of westsaxon Jyned þ' kyngdom to his owne. The seconde kyngdom was of southsaxon þ' had in þ' east syde Kent in þ' south þ' see & þ' Vle of wyght/in the west Hāpshyre/& in þ' north Sothery/there Ella regned fyrst w' his thre sones/& began to regne þ' yere after the compng of þ' Angles euen. xxx. but þ' kyngdom within a short tyme passed in to other kyngdoms. The thyrde kyngdom was of eastsaxon/& had in the east syde the see/in the west the contree of London / in the southe Tamyle / in the north Southfolke.

The kynges of this countree of Essex from the first Sabertus tyme vnto the tyme of the Danes were .x. kynges/whiche were subgett to other kynges. Nethelsof test & lengest they were vnder the kynges of Mercia & vnto that tyme that Egbert kyng of westsaxon Joynded that kyngdom to his owen. The fourth kyngdom was of east Anglis & conteyned Norfolk and Suffolke & had in the east syde & in the north þe see/in the north west Cambrygelshyre/in the west Saynte Edmundes dyche & Hertfordshyre/and in the south Essex. This kyngdome dured vnder .xii. kynges vnto the tyme that kyng Edmund was slayn. And thenne the Danes toke wrongfully bothe the kyngdoms of east Angles & of eastsaxon. Afterwarde the Danes were putte & dryuen away or made subgette. And the elder kyng Edward Joynded bothe þe kyngdoms to his owen. The fyfth kyngdom was of westsaxon & dured lengest of all these kyngdoms & had in the east syde southsaxon / in the north Tamyle/in the south & west the see Oseeay. In that kyngdom regned Cerdrych with his sone Kenryk and began to regne the yere of our lord .v. C. xix. And after the comynge of Angles .lxxi. so sayth Denys the other kyngdoms passed in to this kyngdom. The sixte kyngdome was of Mercia & was the grettest of all. The marches & the meres therof were in the west syde the Ryuer Dee faste by Chestre & Seuarne faste by Shrowesbury vnto Byrystow/in the east þe east see/in the south Tamyle vnto Lon-

don/in the north the Ryuer Humber. And so eastwarde & downwarde vnto the Ryuer Mersee vnto the corner of Wythall/there Humber falleth in to the west see. Penda Wythbes sone regned first in this kyngdom the yere of our lord .vi. C. xxvi. so sayth Denys: And fro þe comynge of Angles an .L. lxxv. yere/this kyngdom dured vnder .xviii. kynges about .ii. C. lxxiii. yere vnto the last Colwulf/to the whiche Colwulf the Danes betoize þe kyngdom to kepe whan Burdred þe kyng was put out/but þe elder Edward the kyng put out þe Danes & Joynded the kyngdom of mercia to his owen kyngdom. Nethelsof atte begynnynge this kyngdom of Mercia was departed in thre / in west Mercia/in myddell mercia & in east mercia. The seventh kyngdom was Northamymbroz/þe is the kyngdom of Northumberland the meres & marches therof were by west & by east the see of Oseeay / by south þe Ryuer of Humber & so downwarde toward the west by the sides of the shires of Northyngham & of Derby vnto the Ryuer of Mersee/and by northe the Scottyshe see / that heete forth in Scottyshe weryd in Brytysh/the Scottyshe see in Englyshe. This kyngdom of Northumberland was first deled in two prouynces/that one was the south syde and hete Depra/and that other was the north syde & hete Brenicia as it were two kyngdoms. And the Ryuer departed these two kyngdoms that tyme. for the kyngdome of Depra was fro the Ryuer of Humber vnto the Ryuer of Tyne. The kyngdome of Brenicia

was fro Tyne to the Scottys the see
 And whan Pryces dwelled there as
 Beda sayth li.iii. c. ii. That Nynyan
 that holy man conuerted men of the
 south spde. Iuda þ kyng regned there
 fyrst & began to regne the yere of our
 lorde .v. L. xlviij. soo sayth Dyonyse.
 Iu Depra regned the kyng Elle the
 yere of oure lorde .v. L. xlix. Thele
 two kyngdoms were othe whyle as
 it is sayd departed bytwene two kyng
 ges & somtyme all hole vnd one kyn
 ge. And dured as it were .xx. Englysh
 the kynges .iii. L. and .xxi. yere. Atte
 Olybrutus & Elle were slayn in the .ix.
 yere of her kyngdom / the Danes slo
 we hem. And Northumberlonde was
 voyde without kyng .viii. yere. Then
 ne afterwarde the Danes regned in
 Northumberlonde .xxxvi. yere vnto
 the oonyng of the kyngdome of Adel
 ston / he made subgette þ kynges Da
 nes Scottys the & Waluþe / & regned
 fyrst all one in Englonde & helde the
 kyngdom of Englonde all hole & all
 one kyngdom that was the yere of
 our lorde .viii. L. xxvii. That Rpuer
 of Mersee was somtyme the marke
 and mere bytwene the kyngdom of
 Mercia & the kyngdom of Northum
 berlonde / that maye be shewd in two
 maners. fyrst by the proprete of this
 Mersee / that is as moche to saye as a
 see / that is a bounde and a mere. for
 it departeth one kyngdom from a no
 ther. Also it is wryte in Cronycles of
 Henry and of Alfrede / that kyng Ed
 warde the elder fastned a castell atte
 Maūcestre in Northumberlonde / but
 that Lyte Maūcestre is fro þ Rpuer
 of Mersee scarcely of thre myle.

De episcopatus et sedibus. Afr.
 Caplm .lii.

Incius was the fyrst kyng cry
 stened of the Brytons / in his
 tyme were thre archibishops
 sees in Brytany. One was atte Lon
 don. A nother atte Yorke. And þ thyr
 de atte Carulke the Lyte of Legyons
 in Glamorgan / that Lyte now is
 Called Caerleon / to thele Archibys
 hops sees were subgette .xxviii. bys
 hoppes and were called flamynes /
 to the Archebysshops see of London
 was subgette Cornewayll & all myd
 dell Englonde vnto Humber. To
 Yorke all Northumberlonde from þ
 bowe of Humber with all Scotlonde
 To Caerleon all Wales / there were
 in Wales leuey bysshops & now ben
 but four. Tho Senary departed En
 glond & Wales. ¶ W. de pon. li. p. 1.
 But in Saxons tyme though Saynt
 Gregory had graūted London þ prys
 uelege of tharchebysshops see. Nethe
 les saynt Austyn þ was sent in to En
 glonde by Saynt Gregorye tourned
 tharchebysshops see of London in to
 Caūterbury. After saynt Gregoryes
 dape atte prayer of kyng Athelbert &
 Lytezenys burgesles of Caūterbury
 there tharchebysshops see hath durtch
 vnto now. Saue þ in the meane tyme
 Ofa kyng of Mercia was wrothe
 with men of Caūterbury / & benam
 hem that worshyp. And worshypped
 Adulphe bysshop of Lychefeld with
 tharbyshoos pall by assente of Adri
 an the pope vpon caas by yestes sente
 Netheles vnder Kenulph the kyng ic
 was restored to Caūterbury agayn.

The worlhypp of the see of York hath dured there alwaye and dureth yet though Scotlonde be withdrawe fro his subiection by passyng of tyme. ¶ **G**ir. in itinere li. p. The archebyschops see was I tourned out of Caerleon in to Henevia that is in þ west syde of Demecia vpon the Jrythe see. in Saynte Daupds tyme vnder kyng Arthur / from Saynt Daupds tyme vnto Sampsons tyme were in Henevia archebyschops .xxiii. After warde spyle a pestylence in all Wales of the pelowe euyll that is called the Jaundys. And thenne Sampson the archebyschop toke with hem the palle & wente in to Bityayn Armonya þ lasse Bityayn & was there byschop of Dolensis. from that tyme vnto þ fyrst Harryes tyme kyng of Englonde were at Henevia whiche is called Saynte Daupds .xxi. byschops alle without palle / whether it were for vncornyng or for pouerte. Netheles alwaye fro that tyme the byschops of Wales were sacred of the byschop of Henevia of Saynt Daupes. And the byschop of Henevia was sacred of the byschops of Wales as of his suffragans and made no profession ne subieccion to none other chirche. Other byschops that come afterwarde were sacred at Caunterbury by compellyng & heest of the kyng. In token of that sacryng and subieccion Boniface archebyschop of Caunterbury that was legate of the crosse longe in eury cathedrall chirche of wales solempnely a masse / he was þ fyrst archebyschop of Caunterbury that so dyde in Wales / & that was done in the secon

de Harryes tyme. ¶ **R**. But now ben but two prymates of all Englonde of Caunterbury and of Yorke. To the primate of Caunterbury ben subget .xiii. byschops in Englonde & .iiii. in wales. The primate of York hath but two suffraganes in Englonde þ ben þ byschops of Caerleyll & of Durham. Of all these sees & chaüging of her places I shall shewe you here felowynng. Take hede in the begynnynng of holy chirche in Englonde byschops ordeyned theyr sees in lowe places & symple þ were couenable for contentynng placõ for prayers & deuocõ. But in William conquerours tyme by dome of lawe Canon it was ordeyned þ byschops sholde come out of smale townes in to grete Lytees. Therfor was the see of Dorchestre chaüged to Lyncoln. Lychfeld to Chestre. Tetford to Norwyche. Shyrborn to Salysbury. Welles to Bath. Cornewayl to Exetre / & Selesey to Chycestre. The byschop of Rochestre hath no paryssh but he is tharchebyschops chappellayn of Caunterbury. syth þ see of Caunterbury was fyrst ordeyned by saynt Austyn / it chaüged yet neuer his place. Chicestre hath vnd hẽ only southsex & þ Ile of wyght / & had his see fyrst in Selesey in þ tyme of tharbyshop Theodore / & þ see dured there .iii. C. xxxiii. yere vnder .xx. byschops fro the fyrste Wilfrede vnto the last Stigande atte commaundement of kyng William conquerour chaüged the see from Selesey to Chycestre.

¶ **D**e episcopis occidentalibus. Wilhelmus. Caplm. liii.

Hauc mynde that all the prouynce of Westlaxon had alwaye one bysshop fro the begynnyng vnto Theodorus tyme. By graunt of kyng Illa kyng of westlaxon the fyrst byryn^o ordeyned a see at Dorchestre þis a symple towne by south Drenford helyde Wallynforde bytwene þ metyng togyder of Temse & Tame / whan byrinus was dede Kenwalcus the kyng ordeyned a see at Wynchestre as his fader had purposed / there Agilbert a frenshe man was fyrst bysshop of all the prouynce of Westlaxon. fro þ tyme the Lyte & the see of Dorchestre perteyned & longed to the prouynce of Mercia. for þ Lyte stondeth within Temse. And Temse departeth bytwene Mercia & Westlaxon. After that Agilbert was put out of wynchestre that tho hyght Wynnton. Ther was there an Englyshe bysshop there þ was called Wyn. Some men suppose þ the Lyte hath the name of this Wyne and is called Wynchestre as it were Wynes Lyte. Atte last he was put out & after hym come Lentherius the forladyd Agilbertus neuewe. After Lentherius Hedda a whyle was bysshop there / whan he was dede Theodorus tharchebysshop ordeyned two bysshops to the prouynce of westlaxon. Danyell at Wynchestre / to hym were subget two countrees Sothery & Southampshyre. Adelyn at Shyrborn / to hym were subgette six countrees. Barkshyre. Wyltshyre. Somerlete. Dorlete shyre. Deuenshyre / & Cornewapll. ¶ Treuisa. It seemeth by this that Westlaxon conteyned Sothery Southampshyre Bark

shyre Wyltshyre Somerlete shyre Dorsetshyre Deuenshyre & Cornewapll. ¶ Will. Afterwarde in elder Edwardes tyme to these two sees were ordeyned by comaundement of Formolus the pope thre other sees / at Welles for Somerlete / at Ryrton for Deuenshyre / & at Saynt Germain for Cornewapll. Not full longe afterwarde the sixth see was sette at Ramelbury for Wyltshyre. At last by comaundement of kyng William coquerout all these sees saue Wynchestre were tourned & chaunged out of small townes in to grete Lytees. for Shyrborn and Ramelbury were tourned in to Salesbury. Now to that see is subgette Barkshyre Wyltshyre & Dorlete. The see of Welles was toined to Bath / ther to now is subget all Somerlete. The sees of Ryrton & of Cornewapll were chaüged to Excetre / therto is subgette Deuenshyre & Cornewapll.

¶ De orientalibus episcopis Willelmus. Caplin. liiii.

It is knowen þ the rest Saxones alwaye fro the begynnyng to now were subget to the bysshop of London / but the prouynce of east Angles that conteyneth Northfolke and Suffolke had one bysshop at Donwyke. The bysshop hete felix and was of Burgoyne & was bysshop xvii. yere. After hym Thomas was bysshop spue yere. After hym Boneface .xvii. yere. Thenne Byls afterwarde was ordeyned by Theodorus and reuled the prouynce whyle he myght endure by hym selfe allone.

After hys vnto Egbert⁹ tyme kyng of Westsaxons an .L. xliii. two bysshops rewled þ̄ prouyce/one at Donwyck & a nother at Elyngham. Netheles after Iudecans tyme kyng of Mercia left & was oonly one see atte Elyngham vnto þ̄ fyfth yere of William conquerour/whan Herfast⁹ the xxiii. bysshop of þ̄ esterne chaüged his see to Tetford/& his successour Herbertus chaüged þ̄ see fro Tetford to Norwiche by leue of kyng William þ̄ Rede. The see of Ely þ̄ is nygh ther to þ̄ fyrst kyng Harry ordeyned the .ix. yere of his regne & made subget ther to Cambrygshyre þ̄ was tofore a parte of þ̄ bysshopryche of Lyncoln. And for quytynge therof he gaf to þ̄ bysshop of lyncoln a good toung called spaldēg.

De episcopis Merciorū Willelmus Caplm̄ .lv.

Here take hede þ̄ as the kyngdom of Mercia was alwaye grettest for þ̄ tyme/so it was deled in mo bysshopryches & spycially by grete herte of kyng Offa/whiche was .xl. yere kyng of Mercia. He chaüged tharchebysshops see fro Saunterbury to Lychfeld by assente of Adrian the pope. Thenne þ̄ prouynce of Mercia & of Lyndefar in the fyrst begynnyng of her crystendom in kyng Wulftrans tyme had one bysshop at Lychfeld/the fyrst bysshop þ̄ was there hete Dwyne/the seconde hete Celach/& were bothe Scottes. After hem þ̄ thyrde Trumpher/the .iiii. Jarmuann⁹ the .v. Chedde/but in Edelfredes tyme that was Wulfers broder whan

Chedde was dede. Theodorus tharchebysshop ordeyned there Wpntrede Cheddes deken. Netheles apud Hynsdou after that for he was vnburon in somme poynte he ordeyned there Serwulf abbot of Medamstede þ̄ is named Burgh. But after Serwulfs fourth yere Theodorus tharchebysshop ordeyned fyue bysshops in þ̄ prouynce of Mercia. And so he ordeyned Bolel at Wrceter. Luda yn at Lychfeld/þ̄ forlayde Serwulf at Chelstre. Edelwyn at Lyndeley atte Lyte Sydenia & he toke Eata monke of the abbay of Hylde at Whytby & made hem bysshop of Dorchestre belydes Drentord Tho this Dorchestre hete Dorcyug And so þ̄ see of þ̄ longed to westsaxon in Saynte Brynes tyme longed to Mercia from Theodorus tharchebysshops tyme. Also whan Ethelrede kyng of Mercia had destroyed Kent. This bysshop Serwulf toke Pyctas bysshop of Rochestre that come oute of Kent & made hym fyrst bysshop of Herford. Atte laste whan Serwulf was dede Hedda was bysshop of Lychfeld after hym/and Wylfred fled out of Northumberlond was bysshop of Chelstre. Netheles after two yere Alfrede kyng of Northumberlond dyed/and Wylfrede tourned agayn to his owne see at Hagustalden. And so Hedda helde bothe the bysshopryches of Lychfeld & of Chelstre. After hym come Albyn that hete Wor also/and after hym come thre bysshops. Torta at Chelstre. Wotta at Lychfeld. And Eata was yet at Dorchestre. After his deth bysshops of Lyndeley helde his see .iiii. L. liii. yere vnto Remigi⁹

chaunged the see of Lyncoln by leue of þ fyrst kyng William. But in Edgars tyme bysshop Leofwin⁹ Joynd bothe bysshopyches togyder of Cheltre & Lyndeffar whyle his lyf dured.

De episcopis Northūbranis. V. de pon. li. iiii. c. xi. Caplm. lvi.

AT Yorke was one see for all the prouynce of Northumberlonde. Paulinus helde fyrst þ see & was ordeyned of the bysshop of Laüterbury / & helde that see of Yorke seuen yere. Afterwarde whan kyng Edwyne was slayn & thynge were dystroubled. Paulinus went thens by water wape in to Kente from whens he come fyrst & toke with hym þ palle Will. li. iii. And so the bysshopyche of Yorke cealed. xxx. yere / & the vlc of the palle cealed there an. L. xxb. yere vnto þ Egbert the bysshop that was the kynges broder of the londe recouered it by auctorpte of the pope. **CR.** Whan Saynt Olwold regned Aydanus a Scotte was bysshop in Brienicia þ is the north syde of Northūberlonde. After hym finian⁹. After him Salmannus. **W.** vbi s. Atte last he wente in to Scotlonde with grete indignacion for Wilfrpde vndertoke hē for he helde vnlawfully easterdaye / xxx. yere after þ Paulinus was goon from Wilfrpde was made bysshop of Yorke. **Beda** li. iiii. But whyle he dwelled longe in fraunce aboute his sacryng at exityng of quartadecimanox / that were they þ helde esterdaye the .xiiii. daye of the mone Chedde was I take out of his abbaye of Lel

tyng & wrongfully put out in to the see of Yorke by assente of kyng Olwy But .iii. yere afterwarde Theodor⁹ tharchebysshop dyde hym awaye and assigned hym to the prouynce of Mercia / & restored Wylfred to the see of Yorke. But after Wylfred by cause of wrath that was bytwene him and þ kyng Egfrpde was put out of his see by helpe of Theodor⁹ tharchebysshop þ was corrupte with some maner mede / this was done after þ Wylfred had ben bysshop of Yorke .x. yere. Thenne atte Instance of the kyng Theodorus made Bolam bysshop of Yorke / & Lumbert at Hagustald chirche / & Eata atte Lyndeffar chirche þ now is called holy Jlonde in the Ryuer of Twede. Aydanus fouded fyrst the see. And Theodor⁹ made Eadhedus bysshop of Repoun þ was comen agayn out of Lyndeelaye. Wilfred had be abbot of Repoun. Theodor⁹ sente Trunwin⁹ to the londe of Pyetes in thendes of Englonde faste by Scotlonde in a place þ hete Candida cala & Whyterne also. There Saynt Nynyan a Bixton was fyrst foundour & doctour. But alle these sees out take Yorke saylled lityll & lityll. for the see of Candida cala that is Galles wape þ longed tho to Englonde dured many yeres vnder .x. bysshops vnto that it had no power by destroyng of the Pyetes. The sees of Hagustald & of Lyndeffar was somtyme all one vnder .ix. bysshops about foure score yere & ten / and dured vnto the comynge of the Danes. In that tyme vnd hyngar and Hubba Ardulph the bysshop yede longe about with Saynte

Luthberts body vnto kyng Aluredes tyme kyng of Westlaxons. And the see of Lyndefar was sette at Runege Bre þ is called Runyngylburgh also that place is now called Hbbelforde vpon Twede. Atte last the .xvii. yere of kyng Egbert kyng Edgardez loe/þ see was chaüged to Durham/ & saynt Luthberts bodye was brought thyder by the doyng of Edmund the bysshop. And fro þ tyme forwarde the see of Hagustalde & of Lyndeffar say led vterly. The fyrst kyng Henry the ix. yere of his regne made the newe see atte Caerleyll.

De Archiepiscopo Cantuariensi. Capitulum .lvii.

The archebysshop of Caüterbu ry hath vnder hym .xiii. in Englonde and .iiii. in Wales/ he hath Rochestre vnd hym/ & þ see hath vnd hym a parte in Kent allone. London hath vnder hē Essex Myddelsex & half hertfordshyre. Chychestre hath vnd Southsex & þ Isle of wyght. Wyncestre hath vnder hym Hampshyre & Southerye. Salesburp hath vnd hym Barkshyre Wyltshyre & Dorset. Exceetre hath vnd hē Deuenshyre & Cornewapll. Batho hath vnd hē Somersete shyre allone. Wyrceetre hath vnder hē Glowcestreshyre Wyrceetreshyre & half warwickshyre. Herford hath vnd hē Herfordshyre & some of Shropshyre. Chestre is bysshop of Couentre & of Lychfelde/ & hath vnd hē Chestre shyre Staffordshyre Derbyshyre half Warwyckshyre some of Shropshyre & some of Lancastreshyre fro the Ry

uer of Mersee vnto þ Ryuer of Rypyl Lyncoln hath vnd hym the prouynces þ ben bytwene Tanysle & Humber þ ben the shyres of Lyncoln of Lepceetre of Northampton of Huntynghdon of Bedford of Bokyngham of Drensford & halfe Hertfordshyre. Ely hath vnder hym Cambrygeshyre out take Merlonde. Noxewhyche hath vnder hym Merlonde Norfolk & Suffolke. Altharchebysshop of Caüterburp hath four suffryganes in Wales that ben Landaf Saynt Daupes Bangor and Saynt Allaph. The archebysshop of Porke hath nowe but two bysshops vnder hym / that ben Durham and Caerleyll. ¶ And so ben but two prymates in Englonde. What one of hem shall doo to that other and in what poynt he shall be obeyent and vnder hym. It is fully consayned withyn aboute the yere of our loide a thousande .lxxii. to fore the fyrst kyng William. And þ bysshops of Englonde by comaundement of the pope. The cause was handled & treated bytwene the forsayde prymates / and ordeyned & demed that the prymate of Porke shall be subget to the prymate of Caunterbury in thynges that longen to the worschyp of god & to þ byleue of holy chirche. So that in what place euer it be in Englonde that the prymate of Caunterbury wyll hote and constrayne togadre a counseyll of clergye/ the prymate of Porke is holden with his suffryganes for to be there and for to be obeyent to the ordynaunce that there shall be lawfully ordeyned. Whan the prymate of Caunterbury is dede /

the primate of Yorke shall come to Caüterbury & with other bysshops he shall sacre him that is chosen. And so with other bysshops he shall sacre his owen primate. If the primate of yorke be dede / his successour shall come to þ bysshop of Caüterbury & he shall take his ordenaūce of hym & doo his ooch with profession & lawfull obedyence. After within about þ yere of our lord .xi. C. four score & .xv. in þ tyme of kyng Rycharde bey retons lette for right of the partye for eyther primate / & what one primade dyde to þ other in tyme of Thurstin^o of Thomas and of other bysshops of Yorke from the conquest vnto kyng Harryes tyme the thyrde. Also there it is sayd how eche of them starte from ocher. This place is but a fore spekyng & not a full treatyse therof. Therefore it were noyefull to charge this place w^t al thylke retons þ there bey made.

Brytons dwelled fyrst in this
Ilonde the .xviii. yere of Hes-
ly the prophete / the .xi. yere of
Siluius Posthumus kyng of Latyns
xlviij. yere after the takyng of Troye
to fore the buyldyng of Rome four
hundred and .xxiiij. yere. ¶ Beda li^o
p^o 21^o They come hether and toke her
cours from Armorik þ now is that
ocher Brytany / they helde longe tyme
the south couñtres of the Ilonde.
Hit befelle afterwarde in Vespasian^o
tyme duke of Rome þ the Pyetes ship
ped out of Scicia in to Oceay and

were dyspued about with the wynde &
entred in to the north costes of Irlon-
de and fonde there Scottes & prayed
to haue a place to dwelle in / & myght
te none gete. for Irlonde as Scottes
sayd myght not luteyne both people.
Scottes sente þ Pyetes to the northly
des of Brytany / & behyght hem helpe
ayenst the Brytons þ were theyr ene-
myes yf they wolde aryle. And toke
hem wyues of her doughters vpon su-
che a condycion yf doubte fylle / who
sholde haue right for to be kyng / they
shold rather chese hem a kyng of the
moder syde than of the faders syde /
of the women kyng rather than of the
mey kynde. ¶ Bantr. In Vespasian
themperours tyme whan Mari^o Arui-
rag^o lone was kyng of Brytons / one
Roderph kyng of Pyetes cam out of
Scicia & gan to destroye Scotlonde /
thenne Marius the kyng slewe this
Roderph / and yaf the north parte of
Scotlonde that heete Catheresia to
the men that were come with Rodes-
rych & were ouercome by hym for to
dwelle in. But these men had none
wyues ne none myght haue of the na-
cion of Brytons / therfor they saylled
in to Irlonde & toke to theyr wyues
Iryllhe mens doughters by that co-
uenaunt that the moder blood sholde
be put to fore in succession of herytage
¶ Sir. c. xvii. Netheles Sirinus sup
virgiliū sayth þ Pyetes ben Agatyrles
that had some dwellyng place about
þ waters of Scicia / & they ben called
Pyetes of peyntyng and smyptyng of
woundes that bey seen on her bodys
for they hadde moche flewme and
were ofte boxed and lete bloode /

and had many woundes seep on her bodye. So that they semed as men we re peynted with woūdes therfore they were called Pyctes as peynted men. These men & the Gothes ben all one people. for whan Maximus the Tyraunt was wente out of Brytayne in to fraunce for to occupye thempyre. Thenne Gracian^o & Valentinianus that were brethern & felaws of thempyre / brought thyle Gothes oute of Scicia with grete yestes with flates rpng & fayre byheltes in to the north countree of Brytayne. for they were stalworth and stronge men of armes. And soo these & bybours were made men of londe & of countree / & dwelled in the north couñtres & helde there Cyttes & townes. ¶ Canfr. Carancius the Tyraunt howe Bassianus by helpe & treason of the Pyctes that come in helpe & locour of Bassianus and gaf the Pyctes a dwelling place in Albania that is Scotlonde / there they dwelled longe tyme afterwarde I medled with Brytons. ¶ R. Thenne lpth that Pyctes fyrst occupied the north syde of Scotlonde. It semeth that the dwelling place that this Carancius gaf hem is the south syde of Scotlonde that stretcheth from the thwert ouer walle of Romayne werke to the Scottyshe see / and conteyneth Gallewaye & Lodouia that is Lode / waye. ¶ Therof Beda li.iii.ca.ii. speketh in this maner. Nynyan the holy man conuerted the south Pyctes Afterwarde the Saxons come & made that countree longe to Brenicia the north parte of norhumberlonde vnto the tyme þ Rynadius Alpinus sone

kyng of Scotlonde put out the Pyctes & made that countree þ lpth bytweene Tweede & the Scottyshe see longe to his kyngdom. ¶ Beda li.i.ca.i. Afterwarde longe tyme the Scottes were ledde by duke Renda & come oute of Irlonde þ is the propie countree of the Scottes & with loue or with strength made hem a place faste by the Pyctes in the north syde of þ arme of the see that breketh in to þ londe in the west syde þ departed in olde tyme bytweene Brytons & Pyctes. Of this duke Renda the Scottes hadde the name and were called Dalrendines as it were Rendaes parte. for in her speche a parte is called Dall. ¶ Gir. p. The Pyctes myght haue no wyues of Brytons / but they toke hē wyues of Iryl the Scottes & prompled hem fayr for to dwelle with hem / & graunted hem a londe by the see syde / there the see is narrowo / þ londe is called now Gallewaye. ¶ Marian^o. Iryl the Scottes loded at Argayll þ is Scottyn clyf. for Scottes loded there for to doo harme to the Brytons / or for þ place is next to Irlonde for to come a londe in to Brytayne. ¶ Beda. And so þ Scottes after the Brytons & Pyctes made the thyrde people dwelling in Brytayne. ¶ R. Thenne after that come the Saxons atte prayeng of the Brytons to helpe hem ayenst þ Scottes and Pyctes. And the Brytons were soone putte oute in to Wales. And Saxons occupied the londe lpyll & lpyll / and est more to the Scottyshe see. And so Saxons made the fourth maner of men in the Ilonde of Brytayne. ¶ Beda libro quinto caplo. ix.

for Saxons and Angles come out of Germania / yet some Brytons that dwelleg nryghe calle hem shortly Germans. ¶ R. Netheles aboute the yere of our lord. viii. C. Egbertus kyng of Westlaxon comaunded & bad alle mey to calle the mey of the lond Englyshmen. ¶ Afr. Thene after that the Danes pursued the londe aboute a .ii. C. yere / that is for to saye fro þ forlaid Egbertus tyme vnto Saynt Edwards tyme / & made þ fyfth maner of people in the Flonde / but they faylled afterward. Atte last come Normans vnder duk William & subdued Englyshe men & yet kepe they þ londe & they made the sixth people in the Flonde. But in þ fyrst kyng Harryes tyme come many flemynge & receyued a dwelling place for a tyme besyde Maytros in the west syde of Englonde & made þ seuenth people in the Flonde. Netheles by comaundement of the same kyng they were put thens & dryuen to hauerfordes syde in þ west syde of Wales. ¶ R. And soo now in Brytany Danes & Pytes faylley all out. And spue nacions dwelley therein that ben Scottes in Albania þ is Scotlonde. Brytons in Lambria þ is Wales / but þ flemynge dwelle in that is west Wales / & normans & Englyshe men ben men medled in all þ Flonde. for it is no doubte in storyes how & in what maner were put awaye & destroyed out of Brytany. Now it is to declare how þ Pytes were destroyed & faylled. ¶ Cir. p. c. xvii. Brytanye was somtyme occupied with Saxones / & peas was made & stablyshed with the Pytes / thenne the Scottes

that come with the Pytes sawe that the Pytes were nobler of dedes and better mey of armes / though they were lasse in nombrie than the Scottes. Thenne the Scottes haupng therof enuie tourned to theyr naturall treason that they haue ofte vled. for in treason they passe other mey / & ben traytours as it were by kynde. for they prayde alle the Pytes specyally the grete of to a feste / & wayted her tyme whan the Pytes were merry and had well dronke / they drewe vp nayles þ helde vp holowe benches vnder the Pytes / & the Pytes vnware & so deynly fylle in ouer the hammes in to a wonderfull pytfall. Thenne the Scottes fylle on the Pytes & slowe hem & lefte none a lyue. And soo of two people the better werryours were hole destroyed. But the other that ben the Scottes whiche ben traytours res all vnylke to the Pytes toke profyte by þ fals treason. for they toke all that londe & holde it yet vnto this tyme / & calle it Scotland after theyr owne name. In kynged Edgars tyme Rynadius Alpinus sone was duke & leder of the Scottes and warred in pyte londe and destroyed of pytes he warred six sythes in Saxon & toke all the londe þ is bytwene Tweede & the Scottyshe see with wronge and with strengthe.

AS it is knowen howe many maner people ben in this Flod ther ben also many lagages &

tonges. Netheles Wallshmen & Scot
tes þ ben not medled with other naci
ons kepe nycge yet theyr fyrst langa
ge & speche/but yet tho Scottes þ we
re somtyme cōfederate & dwelled with
pytes drawe som what after theyr spe
che. But the flemynge þ dwelle in
the west syde of Wales haue leste her
straunge speche & speken lyke þ Saxons
Allo Englyshmen though they had
fro þ begynnynge thre maner speches
Southern northern & myddell speche
in the myddell of the londe as they co
me of thre maner people of Germa
nia. Netheles by cōmixion & medlynge
fyrst with Danes & afterwarde with
Normans/in many thynges the coun
tree langage is apparyd. for some
vse straunge wlastryng/chytryng/har
ryng / garryng & grylbytryng. This
apparyng of the langage cometh of
two thynges/one is by cause þ childe
ren þ goon to scole lerne to speke fyrst
Englyshe/& than ben compelled to
construwe her lessons in frenshe & þ
haue ben vled lyn the Normans come
in to Englonde. Also gentylmens
childern ben lerned and taught from
theyr yonthe to speke frenshe. And
vplondellhe men wyll cōterfete & ly
kene hem self vnto gentylmen/& ar
bely to speke frenshe for to be more
sette by. Wherfore it is sayde by a co
myn prouerbe. Iacke wolde be a gen
tylman yf he coude speke frenshe.
¶ Trevisa. This maner was moche
vled to fore the grete deth. But syth
it is somdele chaūged. for syr Johan
cornewayl a mayster of gramer chaū
ged þ techynge in gramer scole & con
struction of frenshe in to Englyshe

& other scoolmaysters vse the same
waye now in þ yere of our lorde. M.
iii. C. lxx. þ. ix. yere of kyng Rycharde
þ secōde & iene al frellh in scoles & vse
all construction in Englyshe/wherin
they haue auantage one waye/that
is þ they lerne to soluer theyr gramer
And in other dylauantage. for nowe
they lerne noo frenshe ne can none/
whiche is hurte to them þ shall passe
the see. And also gentylmen haue mo
che leste to teche theyr childern to spe
ke frenshe. ¶ R. Hit cometh a grete
wonder þ Englyshmen haue lo grete
dyuersyte in theyr owey langage in
lowne & in spekyng of it / whiche is
all in one flonde. And þ langage of
Normandy is comen out of a nother
londe / & hath one maner lowne as
mong all men þ speketh it in Enlon
de. for a may of Rente/Southern/
Western / and Northern men speken
frenshe all lyke in lowne & speche.
but they can not speke theyr Engly
she soo. ¶ Trevisa. Netheles there is
as many dyuersle maner of frenshe
in þ Royame of frauce as is dyuers
le Englyshe in the Royame of En
glonde. ¶ R. Also of the forsayd tong
ge whiche is departed in thre is gre
te wonder. for men of þ east with the
men of þ west acorde better in lowne
ge of theyr speche than men of the
north with men of þ south. Therefore
it is þ men of Mercu þ ben of myddell
Englonde as it were parteners with
the endes vnderstande better the syde
langages Northern & Southern than
Northern & Southern vnderstande ey
ther other. ¶ W. d. p. li. iii. All þ langa
ges of the Northumbres and speky

ally at Yorke is so sharpe slyttinge/
frotting & vnchape þ we sothern men
maye vnneth vnderstande þ langage
I suppose the cause be þ they be nygh
to the alpens þ speke straügly. And
also by cause þ the kynges of Englon
de abyde & dwelle more in the southe
countree than in the northe countree.
The cause why they abyde more in þ
south coūtree than in þ north coūtree
is by cause þ there is better corn londe
more people moo noble Cytees/and
moo proufftable hauenes in þ south
countree than in the north.

HOr the maners & the doying
of Wallshmen & of Scottes
ben to fore somewhat decla
red. Now I purpose to telle & declare
the maners & þ condycions of the me
dyd people of Englonde. But þ fle
mynges þ ben in the west syde of wa
les ben now corned as they were En
glyshe/by cause they companye with
Englyshmen. And they be myghty &
strong to fyght/and ben the moost en
myes þ Wallshmen haue & vse mar
chaüdyle & clothyng/& ben full redy
to put hem selfe to auentures & to pe
ryll in the see & londe by cause of gre
te wyunnyng. And ben redy somtyme
to goo to the plowe/& somtyme to de
des of armes whan place and tyme
axeth. It semeth of these men a gre
te wonder þ in a boon of a wethers
right sholder/whan the flesshe is so
den awaye & not rosted /they knowe
what it haue be don/is don/& shall

be don/as it were by a spyrte of pro
phete & of wonderfull craft. They
telle what is done in ferre countrees/
tokenes of peas or of warre/the state
of the Royame/sleyng of men/and
spousebreche suche thynges they de
clare certepnly of tokenes & lygnes
that be in suche a sholder bone. ¶ R.
But the Englyshmen that dwellen
in Englonde and ben medled in the
Flonde & ben ferre fro the places that
they spronge of fyrst/tourney to con
trarye dedes lyghtely without enty
slyng of ony other men by her owen
assente. And so vnealy also full vnpa
cyent of peas / enemye of belynes &
full of slouthe. ¶ W. de pon. lib. iii.
saph/that whan they haue destroped
her enemyes all to groude/thenē they
fyght with hem selfe and sleeth eche
other/as a voyde and an empty sh
make wyrcheth in hit selfe. ¶ R. Ne
theles men of the south ben easyer &
more mylde than men of the northe.
for they be more vnstable more cruell
& more vnely. The myddell men ben
somdele parteners with bothe. Also
they vse hem to glotonye more than
other men & ben more costlyer in me
te and clothyng. He suppoeth that
they toke that vyce of kyng Harde
hunt that was a Dane. for he hete
sette forth twyes double messe at dy
ner & at loper also/these men ben spe
defull on hors & a fote/ able & redy to
all maner dedes of armes / and ben
wonte to haue vydoire & maystrye
in euery fyght where noo treason is
walkyng / and ben curpous and can
well telle dedes and wondres that
they haue seey. Also they goo in dys

uerse londes vnnethe ben ony men ry-
 cher in her owen londe or more gra-
 cyo⁹ in fer & in straunge londes. They
 can better wyne and gete newe than
 kepe her owen heritage. Therefore it
 is that they be spradde so wyde & we
 ne þ euey londe is theyr owen. The
 men ben able to all maner slepyght &
 wytte/but tofore the dede blondryng
 & halpy. And more wyse after the de-
 de/& leueth of lpyghtly what they ha-
 ue begonne. ¶ Pol. li. vi. Therefore
 Eugenius the pope sayd that Englysh
 she men were able to doo what euer
 they wold/& to be set & put tofore all
 other ne were þ lpyght wytte letteth/&
 as Hanyball sayd that the Romayns
 myght not be ouercome / but in her
 owen countree. Soo Englyshe men
 mowe not be ouercome in straunge
 londes / but in her owen countree they
 be lpyghtly ouercome. ¶ R. These
 men despisen her owen & prayse other
 mennys. And vnneth ben pleased ner
 apayed with theyr owen estate/what
 befalleth & becometh other men/they
 wyl gladly take to hem selfe. Ther-
 fore it is that a peman arapeth hym
 as a squyre. A squyre as a knyght. A
 knyght as a duke. A duke as a kyn-
 g yet some goo about & lpyke to all ma-
 ner state & ben in noo state. for they
 that wyl take euey degre be of noo
 degre. for in beryng outwarde they
 ben mynstrales & herawdes. In tal-
 kyng grete spekerys/in etyng & dryn-
 kyng glotons/in gaderyng of catell
 hucksters & tauerners/in arape touer-
 mentours/in wynnynge argy/in tra-
 uayll tantaly/in takyng hede dedaly
 in beddes Sardanapaly / in chyrches

maxmetys/in courttes thonder/only
 in pryuelege of clergy & in prebendes
 they knowleche hem selfe clerkes.
 ¶ Treuisa. As touchyng the termes
 or latyn as argy tantaly dedaly sar-
 danapaly/pe must vnderstande hem
 as the poetes feyned of them). Argus
 was an herde & kept beestes / he had
 an hondred eyen / & Argus was also
 a shyp a shypman & a thapman/& so
 Argus myght see before & behynde &
 on euey lyde. Therefore he that is wy-
 se and ware and can see that he be
 not decepued maye be called Argus.
 And so the Cronycle sayth in plurell
 numero that Englyshmen ben Ar-
 gy/that is to saye they see about whe-
 re as wynnynge is. That other wor-
 de tantali/the poete feyned that tan-
 talus slowe his owen sone/wherfore
 he is dampned to perpetuell penaun-
 ce / and he standeth alwaye in water
 vpp to the nether lyppe. And hath
 alwaye rype apples and noble fruyte
 hangyng down to the ouer lyppe/but
 the fruyte ner þ water may not come
 w:thin his mouth/he is so holde and
 standeth bytwene mete & drynke &
 maye neyther ete ne drynke/& is euer
 an hongred & a thyrst that wo is him
 a lpye/by this maner lpykenes of tan-
 talus they that do right nought/ther
 as moche thyng is to do in euey lyde
 ben called tantali / it semeth that it
 is to saye in trauayll they be tantali.
 for they do right nought therto. The
 thyrde worde is dedali. Take hede
 that dedalus was a subtyll and a slye
 man/& therfore by lpykenes they that
 ben subtyll and slye ben called dedali
 The fourth worde is Sardanapaly.

Ye shall vnderstande that Sardanapalus was kynge of Assyriens & was full vnchast & vled hym to lye softe. And by a maner of lykenys of hym they that lye vnchastly ben I called Sardanapaly. ¶ R. But among all Englyshe men medled toggydres is so grete chaūgyng & dyuersyte of clothyng & of aray & so many maner & dyuerse shappes that well nyghe is there ony man knowen by his clothyng & his araye of what someuer degre that he be. Therof prophced an holy anker in kynge Egelfredus tyme in this maner. ¶ Henricus libro sexto. Englyshe men for as moche as they vse them to dronkelownes / to treason and to rechelesnes of goddes hous. fyrste by Danes / & thenne by Normans / and atte thyrde tyme by Scottes that they holde moost wretches and lest worth of all other / they shall be ouercome. Thenne the worlde shall be so vnstable & so dyuerse & varyable / that the vnstablensse of thoughtes shall be betokened by many maner dyuersytes of clothyng.

After that places and countrees ben rekened and descriued of the worlde wyde / the ordre of the tale of storye areth that beryng and dedes of the worlde be also descriued. But every thyng is for somwhat

& that is more. ¶ Trevisa. Here this auctorite of the phylosophre is to mene / that all thyng þ is resonable and kyndly ordeyned for a nother thyng / as a mene for to come therto & for to saue. It is ordeyned for better thyng & more noble than is that thyng that is so ordeynng / therfore eeryng and lowyng & dounyng of londe is ordeyned for to haue good corn. And good corn is better than all the other dele. Also medycyne is ordeyned for hele / & hele is better than the medycyne. Also mete and drynke & other thynges be ordeyned for the lyf. And the lyf is better and more noble than the mete and drynke. And all other thynges that be soo ordeyned for the lyf. ¶ R. Than syth that the more worlde is made for the lasse as holy wyte sayth. The more shall serue the lasse / and now the more worlde is descriued in our forlawes in the fyrst book. Than is it skylfull somdele to descriue þ lasse worlde also / from the begynnyng of his forne dedes / that it myght be knowe what maner thynges it is / and howe grete / that is soo iypyl / and dooth so grete dedes in the more worlde that is so grete & soo huge. And also the worcher and the maker of all thynges that hath with hym shaply reasons of all maner thynges. Whan he had made the more worlde / than he made the lasse. And though he made hym lord of þ grete worlde / yet he prynced on hym the lykenesse of the grete worlde / for a man & þ worlde be lyke in thre thynges. In length / in brede / in kyndely dysposicion and vertues worchyng.

And fyrst though the length of a mānes bode that is from þ̄ soole of the fote to the toppe of the hede/be suche six as the brede þ̄ is from the one syde of the rybbes to the other syde & ten soo moche as þ̄ depnesse þ̄ is from the rygge to the wombe. ¶ Netheles Plinius li. vii. c. xviii. sayth/that as moche space as is bytwene cinit/that is the popnt þ̄ is in the sprmament euen apenst h̄ in the other syde of the erth soo moche is oute of the east in to the west/ & so it is in the bode of a man that as moche as is from the soole of the fote to the toppe of þ̄ hede/so moche is bytwene his two lengest fyn- gres endes & he stretche out his armes & handes a brode. ¶ Also Plinius the right c. xvii. sayth þ̄ the stature & the mesure of a childe whan he is thre yere olde is euen halfe his mesure & his stature þ̄ he shall haue whan he is of age yf he lyue so longe. The seconde as we see in the worlde so we see in a man/that the membres & the partyes helpeth & standeth eueryche other in stede & bynēmeth his woo. For the ouer lymmes gouerneth & yeueth / the nether lymmes bereth & serueth/the myddell resceyued & deled about the other lymmes. And in the eyther worlde yf a l̄me is out of his owne place & entred to an other place than in his owne/anone is grete dysturbaūce made as whan the ayer is enclosed with in the erthe/than therthe quaketh / & whan within the cloudes than is grete thondryng. Also in the bode of a man whan the lymmes be wyrted out of her owne places/or yf þ̄ humours be apayred / than is ache sekenesse &

sozowe. Also whan the l̄mes be well arayed & as they sholde be in shappe colour & hewe maner quantyte gretenesse & smalnesse moeyng and place than hath the man good peas & quyet & is in good hele & reste. The contrarpe falleth & the lymmes be euill & not rightly arayed. Therfor Plato yaf his dome & sayd suche ordenaunces & dyspolycion & shappe as a man hath in his kyndly membres & l̄mes suche kyndly maners & dedes he foloweth. Also as it is in þ̄ partyes of the grete worlde/that they be so ordeyned & I sette that the hyghest of the nether kynde touche the lowest of the hyghe kynde. As oyltres & shelyfthe that be as it were lowest in bestes kynde/passeth but lypyll the perfeccion of lyfe of trees & herbes / for they maye not meoue hem/but as culpes of the see waggeth with the water/els they cleuen to the erthe/and maye nether see ne here/taste ne smelle/but oonly feele/whan they be touched. And the laste of the erthe toucheth the lowest of the water / & the ouermooft of the water toucheth the lowest of the ayer and so vpwarde by degrees anone to the ouermooft heuen. Also the hyghest in bodely kynde/that maye be cleded skylfully mannes bode kyndly and partfyghtly dyspoleth/arecheth to the lowest of the nexte ouerkynde that is mannes soule that holdeth the lowest degree of spirytes & of ghoostes that haue knowlege and vnderstandyng. And therfore it is called oryson as it were the next marche in kynde bytwene bodely and ghoostly thynges. By the soule me gooth vp from þ̄ lowest
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kynde by degrees of knowleche and of connyng anone to the ouermooft knowleche and vnderstandyng. And whan the soule is alle clene withoute earthely lpyng it rechet otherwhyle to holy spyrtes that be no thyng bodily. Also man hath somwhat compne with thynges that be partes of the grete worlde. for Gregory in an **D**mely sayth/that a man hath beyng with stoness/lyuyng with trees & herbes/felyng with beestes/knowledge & vnderderstandyng with angels. Also in mannes bodye semeth erthe in fleshe & bones/water in blode & in other humours/aper in the longes/tyre in the herte/& is called homo in latyn/& antropos in grieke/and is as it were a tree tourned vplodoun/& hath an heude with here as it were a roote & hath armes and thyes as it were bowes. Touchyng the thyrd lykenesse that is vertuous worchyng/we see as Gregory seyth in an **D**melye of p'aduent that the worlde was atte begynnyng thryuyng & strong for to bryng forth chylde as it were in youth/and was full of hele and so freshe/and grene/and by grete richesse it was fatte/but now it is abated with elde and as it were dryuen towarde the dethe with ofte & many dyscales. So in a mannes youth the bodye is thryuyng/the breste is strong/the nolle is bolde/the armes be full. But in his elde the stature boweth and croketh & stupeth a downe/the bolde nolle abateth / the brest is dryuen oft with many syghes and soore/the brest shorteth & in all the bodye myght & strength abateth. And though there were none other

sekenesse in olde men / for the moore dele/hele is sekenesse. Also as we see that in the moore worlde be two contrary moeynges / one is kyndely/by the whiche the planettes and nether welkes meoue out of the west in to the east. That other is vyo' lent / by the whiche they be J'raup' shed ayenwarde with the moeyng of the ouermooft welken or fyrmente out of the east in to the west. Soo it fareth in a man that the fleshe coueyteth ayenst the spyrte / and the spyrte ayenst the fleshe. for the nether knowleches/and wyttis fyght ayenst p' reason. And yet a man hath comyn worchyng and suffryng lyke to many other partyes of the moore worlde. for he is slowe and heuy as the erthe / and fleteth awaye as the water/and withdraweth sodeynly as the aper/and heteth as the fyre/chaūgeth as the mone/fyghteth and flecth as mars/coueteth as mercurius/go' the out of kynde as Juypter / and is cruell as saturnus. Also Plinius li' bro septimo capitulo tercio sayth that as the vtter partyes of the grete worlde wellet and spryngeth full of myracles woundres and meruaylles as in Inde. Ethyopia blew men londe and in Affryca. Soo in mankynde kynde hath slyly and craftely made wonderfull werkes and myrth. for fyrst in a mannes face/there be ten lynnes other fewe moo/there is soo grete dyuersyte / that amonge many thousande men vnnethe is one founde in face lyke to a nother. In Affryca be many that haue wyrchyng tonges/soo that thynges that they preyse

they shende and slee with her preylyn
ges / soo that trees that they preylen
waxen drye & childer deye. So in Tri
uallis & in Syricis be men that slee
with her syght what they beholde &
loke on longe/namely & they be gre
ued & wrothe/ whyle they loke so and
beholde/and these haue in eyther eye
twey blackes. ¶ Also among vs Bar
ro sayth/hynde hath I gendred and
brought forth venym in some mēes
eyen / soo that none euill is founde/
that ther nys somwhat lyche I founde
in manixynde. Soo some partes of
a mannes bodye be forbyson and bo
dyng of wondres. Soo Pirrus kyng
of Epirothes had a grete too in his
right fote / the touchyng of that too
was a good medycyne apenst venym
& that too myght not be biente with
the other body whan the other partes
of his bodye was biente. So auctours
telle also. ¶ Plini⁹ li. vii. c. xvii. sayth
that some men be geten & born with
gendryng stones cleuyng togydres as
it were all one. Some be born with
one bone all hole in stede of teth/and
that bone is harder and sharper than
ony mannes toth. So Pruly kyng of
Bythimia had a sone that had a bo
ne in his mouth in stede of his other
teth/one bone all hole and that bone
was so harde/that whan the other de
le of the bodye was biente/that bone
myght not brenne also. ¶ Ibidem c.
xviii. Some men lyue and eueriche
of hem hath the bones of his bodye
cleuyng togydres as it were all one
bone all hole and without mary/the
se men be neuer a thyrst also they swe
te neuer more. ¶ Treuisa. Some mē

telle some man in Irlonde hath one
bone all hole in oo lyde in stede of all
his rybbes. And Thom Haywarde
of Barkley hath in the moold of his
hede polle and forhede but ore bone
all hole/therfore he maye well suffre
grete strokes aboue on his hede with
out hurte. ¶ Also Plinius li. vii. c. xxi.
sayth/that some men had in alle the
bodye senerwes euen strayght thwerte
ouer & crosse wyle/and passyng won
derfull in strengthe/some maye dure
to renne without werynesse / some be
passyng cleere of syght / as a knyght
that hyght Strabo stode in a waytes
place and sawe the nauyes & shyppes
of puny that were from hym an hon
dred .xxxv. myles. ¶ Also Plinius li.
xi. c. xliiii. sayth / that Tyberius Ce
zar sawe more clerely in derkenesse
than in lycht/soo that whan he was
ked in y nyght he myght see all thyn
ge clerely about. ¶ Also Plini⁹ li. vii.
c. xxvii. Some were wonder myghty
of mynde/as Cyrus kyng of Perle/
that to all the knyghtes of his hooft
pat certayn names. ¶ R. And Seneca
pr^oli^o declamacionū sayth of hym
selfe that he was so myghty of myn
de/that he reherled two thousand na
mes arewe by herte in the same ordre
as they were sayd. And that he reher
led moo than two hondred vles that
oher men had yeuē & began atte las
te/& reherled anone to the fyrst with
outen ony faylle. Also he sayth that
Lyneas Pyrrus messager kyng of
Epirothes. This Lyneas the secon
de daye h he came to Rome/he salued
& grett the Senatours & spake to eue
ryche of the people about hym by his
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owne name. A nother sayth that Cypreas had made a grete makynge of poesy/for he reherled it atte fyrst he ryng more swyftly than he þ had made it. ¶ Also Pli^o li. vii. c. xxvii. sayth that some were noble & wyle of wytte as Julius Cezar þ was wonte to re/ de & wryte what men sayde with a good auyment all attones. Also he vled to wryte quayres & endyte lettres & wryte pitles al attones. ¶ Also Pli nius li. vii. c. xviii. sayth þ some men haue more strength in the right syde/ & some haue more in the lefte syde/ & some be lyke stronge in eyther syde. Also men be heuier than women and dede mennes bodies be heuier than quych/ & sleppng than wakynge heuier also. Of the careynes of dede men renneth foule moysture & humours & they lygge vpryght/ & of the careynes of dede women/ yf they lygge neuelynge & downe right / as though kynde spared shame. ¶ Also li. vii. c. xvii. we rede þ oo man lough that daye þ he was born/ & put awaye a mānes honde þ groped & handled him. ¶ Also c. xx. He speketh of some men þ neuer lough/ of some þ wepe neuer/ of some þ spytte neuer/ of some þ bok balked neuer ¶ Trevisa. Rogger bagge was a full olde man at wotton vnd egge in Gloucestreshyre/ he spytte neuer/ he coughet neuer. ¶ Also Seneca vbi prius c. iiii. And as it is among other bestes/ so it is in mankynde þ somtyme one of mankynde is both may & woman/ & suche is called Hermofrodita/ & was somtyme called Androgynus/ & in englyshe is called a Scratte & a cōpted among meruaylles & won

dres/ but now among vs it is depnte for it is selde seen. Also we haue I seen & herde þ some chaūge wonderly her shape. for we sawe in Affryca a may/ de þ same daye þ she sholde haue ben wedded transformed & toined in to a man/ & anone forthwith berdech & mē bried & lymmed as a man & wedded a wyfe within a shorte tyme after. ¶ Also saynt Aug^o d. ci. d. li. iii. c. xxx toucheth þ Agell^o li. Atticaruco nocm sayth/ þ women be somtyme tourned in to men/ it is no magell tale/ but it is soth as þ lettres be wryten. Therfore Agellus sayth þ in a Lyte called Smyrna/ he sawe a mayde tourned in to a man the same daye þ she sholde haue ben wedded. Also luche one was brought to Rome to the Senators in tyme of Lasciuus crassus/ & Cassius longin^o consuls of Rome/ & by heste of dyupnours þ toke hede of weder/ and of chytryng of byrdes/ it was born in to wylde Jlonde. ¶ Also Titus liuius speketh of hennes þ we re tourned in to cockes. ¶ And Auicenna li. viii. de aialibz speketh of an henne þ had ouercome a cok in fyghs tyng/ & after the fyghtyng & the bycs toye/ she rered vp the tayle as a cok/ & had anone a spore growyng on the legge & a cresse on the hede as it were a cok. ¶ Also c. v. Trogus seyth that in Egypt be. vii. childern born at one byrthen/ & these dayes yf two twynnes be born/ it is selde that the moder & the fyrst childe lyue longe after the byrth/ & namely yf the one be a knas uechilde & that other a mayde. ¶ Also c. xii. And somtyme a woman conceyueth two childern & is but a lypyll

tyme bytwene / & so the childery be afterward born / one after a nother and be persyght ynough / as it was of Hercules & his broder Hyspyde. And so it ferde or happened of þe woman that bare two childer / one lyke to her hul / bonde / & þe other to the coppers / & of that woman þe in the .vii. moneth after her byrthe / in the seconde moneth after she bare twey childer. Some women here alwaye mayde childery / & some alwaye knaue childery / & some alwaye chaügen & berey somtyme a mayde childe / & somtyme a man childe / some be bareyne & conceue of no man / & some conceue of some men / & of some men conceueth not. ¶ Also ca. xiii. Some here childre lyke to hem selfe / & some lyke to the fader / & some lyke to no man / some here dougthres lyke to the faders / & some lyke to hem selfe. Some here childre lyke to her forsadres. Ensample is Nycus the noble peyntour at Bylanciū that was born of a fayr moder & wente out of kynde / & had one hande as a blewe man. ¶ Hug. ca. malo. He sayth þe womans kynde is suche / that she conceueth childery lyke to thynge that they see peynted & shap / for the worchyng of the soule whyle the body is in getyng of a childe / sendeth inwarde lykenesse & shap þe seeth without / & rauysleth the ymages thereof as it were to his dysposycion / & so they vlen in Spayne for to byng fayre horses & gentyll & holde hem before the mares and in her syght whyle they conceue. And they vse also to peynt fayre culuers or dowues in places there culuers were wonte to dwell

¶ And Quintilianus defendeth & excuseth a woman that was accused of spoulsbreche / for she had born a blew man / & he leyed for her that suche an ymage was peynted in her bedchamber whan she conceued that childe.

¶ And Ppocras wrote of a woman that sholde be dampned to the deth / for she had born a fayr childe þe was not lyke to her selfe / ne to the fader / but Ppocras made men assaye / & it was founde þe suche an ymage was peynted in the fader & moder bedchamber / whyle that childe was conceued & so the moder was laued. ¶ Plinius li. vii. ca. xiii. Therefore in a man be many dyuerlytees / for swyftnesse of thought & chaügyng of wytte in the conception empynteth in many dyuerse lykenesse & thappes. In other bestes wytte is as it were not chaungeable / therefore amonge hem all / the brode is lyke to þe same kynde. ¶ Augustinus de ci. dei li. xvi. c. vii.

Of brodes that be wöderly shapen. me areth yf they come of Adam & Noe. Some of hem hete Cyclopes and haue but one eye in the forhede / some haue bothe þe shap of man & woman / & gendreth to gyder & geteth & cōceue & berey childer as þe cours cometh about. For ones he shal gete childe / & he shal estones conceue & go with childe in his tyme as it goth about. Some women conceue at .v. yere olde / & lye not ouer viii. yere / some haue thyres without hāmes & be wöderly swyfte & hete Cycos
h iii

podes/for they lye neuelyng & downe
 right in the somer tyme & deffenden
 hem selfe with þ shadowe of her fete
 from the hete of þ sonne / wherto we
 answere & saye þ it nedeth not to trowe
 we þ ther be so many maner myshapen
 men as men speken of. Necheles
 reason as is I peuen of wondre shape
 children þ be among vs suche reason
 men maye peuen of dyuerse maner
 people þ be wonderly shapen. for god
 knoweth where & when it nedeth to
 make ony maner thyng/he knoweth
 the fayrenesse of all creatures/& with
 what lykenesse & vnlykenesse of partys
 they be medled togydres. Certaynely
 in our tyme was a man born in
 the east that had two bodies vnto the
 myddell of the wombe/& bynethe but
 one / but yet for all þ we shall trowe
 that he come of Adam. Therefore su
 che as be wonderly shape/outher they
 be nought/outher they be no men/ou
 ther yf they be men / without doubte
 they come of Adams kynde . Tou
 chynge Antypodes þ men speketh of
 & syngeth/that they be men in the o
 ther syde of þ erthe/& her fete toward
 oures / & her hede pondewarde & tresp
 den hyderward/that may be trowed
 by no reason/there is no stoye þ ma
 keth vs haue knowlege/but oonly by
 gessyng of mankynde suche a tale is
 founde. Though þ erthe be roude all
 about/& somdele hangynge within þ
 holownesse of heuen/natheles þ erthe
 is not bare in þ syde. for it is beclyp
 ped and closed within the water/and
 though it were bare & not soo closed/
 yet foloweth not þ men sholde dwelle
 there . ¶ R. But he wolde meane as

Marcian⁹ seyth in his Astrologye that
 þ lygne Capricorn⁹ þ Soote maketh
 somer to þ Antypodes/& the Cancer
 the lygne maketh to them wynter/&
 þ is acompted beyode þ syde of Ethio
 pia blew mēnes lorde/ther men to
 nyen well nyghe her fete toward mē
 nes fete þ dwelle about þ flond Tyle
 vnder þ north sterre. ¶ Treuisa. Here
 take hede þ the cercle þ sonne holdeth
 his cours in by þ yere/is deled in .xii.
 partes/& euery parte therof is called
 a lygne/& euery lygne hath a propre
 name. These be þ names of þ lygnes
 the Weder/the Bole/the Twynnes/
 the Crab/the Lyon/the Mayde/the
 Balance/the Scorpion/the Archer/
 the Goot/the Stewe/the fyfthe. Al
 so .xii. monethes be in the yere/& eu
 ryche moneth entred in to a lygne/as
 it falleth for þ moneth/& so in Mar
 che it entred in to the Weder/in Apr
 le in to þ Bole/in May in to þ Tw
 nnes/in June in to the Crabbes/& so
 forth arewe by monethes & lygnes/so
 þ in December the sonne in þ Gote/
 thay Marcianus wyll meane whan
 he seeth þ the Goot maketh somer to
 the Antypodes/that whan the sonne
 is in the Goot/than it is somer with
 hem. But in December it is mydwē
 ter moneth. And whan he seeth þ the
 Crabbe maketh hem wynter/he me
 neth þ whan the sonne is in þ Crabbe
 than it is wynter with hem / that is
 June/that is mydsomer moneth / &
 thus it is declared what is to meane
 the Goot maketh hem somer / & the
 Crab wynter. ¶ Vlyd. ethi. xi. Somt
 yme byrthes be born wonderly shapen
 for to be boodyng and tokynnyng of

wonders that shall befall / but than they lyue not longe. As in Exerles ty me kyng of Perse / a mare foled a fore & booded þ the kyngdom shold be vndo. And in þ grete kyng Alypander in his tyme was brought forth a best wonderly shapen / for þ ouer partes of hē were shapen as the partes of a man / but they were dede / & þ nether partes were shapen as the partes of dyuerse maner bestes & were a lyue & betokened sodeyne slepynge of the kyng / for þ werse partes lyued lenger than þ better. ¶ Treuisa. William wayte of Berkeley lawe a childe with twey hedes & twey neckes born & crystened at Mele in Loreyn the yere of our lord .M.iii. L.vi. that yere the kyng of fraunce was taken at batayll of peyers / this childe had twey armes & twey legges as other childer haue / & he had þ thyrde legge growynge out aboue the buttockes behynde / & the thyrde arme by twene þ twey shuldres. ¶ Item Pseudorus li. xi. c. iii. Somtyme is gryseful & wonderly chaūgyng of shappes of men in to bestes / & is doo by wordes othe by wytchecraft. Some hath & recepueth luche chaūgyng by the same kynde / some by corrupcōn passeth & chaungeth in to other kynde / & soo of calues rooted cometh bees / and of horsles rooted cometh thauers. Therfore Dupde sayth. Vt thou craft haue / take armes holowe for the crabbe. Scorpio byngeth hayle / to styng with croked tayle. ¶ Aug^o li. xviii. c. vi. In the mater of wonderfull toyng chaungynge & shapynge of men & women it is to holde / that fendes & euyl men now make noo kynde ney-

ther chaunge that is made. Neuertheles almyghty god suffreth lykenesse of thynges dyuersely for to seme / soo that the fantalpe of a man that gedreth lykenesse of dyuerse thynges in thought & in dremynge or sweuenynge whan the wyttes be lette & take none hede / maketh to seme lykenesse of bodyes that is not present / also of ymagines and of dyuerse lykenesse & shappes of thynges that neuer were made / and so men wakynge semeth that they see lykenesse & shapen of dyuerse thynges & of bestes / as men seme slepyng and metynge wonderfull sweuenes / and seme somtyme that they be many heuy byrthons / but & they be byrthons fendes bere hem / & soo god that demeth rightfully suffreth mankynde be oft so begyled. ¶ R. Of this mater loke within more playnly after the betayll of Troye.

Though man as it is sayde be lyke & accorde to the worlde in two thynges that be conteyned therein. Netheles in many poyntes of mannes condycion of his prerogatyue & his worthynesse / he is dyuerse & vnylike to þ world. for though mannes bodye were made fyrste of erthe / yet it was so couenable & so accordynge to the soule / that in mannes bodye was euensesse of complexion accordynge to hymmes rightfulnessse of stature / fayrenesse of shap. And soo sholde the bodye be afterwarde buyng to the soule withouten ony rebellyon / & bynge forth childe without

ony synne & lyue without ony defau-
te of strengthe/and be translated and
chaunged in to blyffe of heuey with-
outen deyng & deth. Also he sholde ge-
te and conceyue childe without sha-
me/and a woman sholde bere childe
without sorowe & woo/and haue me-
te & drynke without swete & trauapll
steryng & moeyng in lymmes with-
outen ony mylfare/and to all this pa-
radysle was geuen mankynde for to
dwell in/and woman for to be man-
nes felowe/paradysle to wonyng place/
the tree of lyfe for mete & all crea-
tures for solace/and atte last god hē
selfe for to be mannes mede. But
allas that so noble a banyour felle so
soone/that was erly brought forth/&
put in worshyp he knewe not that he
sholde be lyke to bestes whan he dyde
that was forbode. for that daye forth
the bodye that is corrupt by synne gre-
ueth the soule. The fleshe couepteth
apenst the soule/and mannes wyttes
tourne and assente lychtly to euyl. A
mannes owne meynall wyttes be his
owne enemyes/so that all mannes ly-
fe is in temptacion whyle he lyueth
here in erthe/and the dyspolycion of
the soule ruleth meētenceth helpeth &
comforteth þ bodye. But agaynwar-
de the wretched dyspolycion of the bo-
dye dysfourbeth the soule. Also man
is euer fayll yng & wayward/he may
not stedfastly abyde/he falleth lycht-
ly/but he maye not lightly aryle. Pro-
fyte of byrthe is sorowe & care in ly-
uynge / and man muste nedes deye.
¶ Plinius li. xvii. c. xiii. And though
all other that be made haue shelles/
ryndes/skynnes/wulle/here/bristles/

feders/wynges/outher scales. Man
is born without ony helynge or heue-
ryng naked and bare/anone at his
byrthe he gynneth for to wepe atte be-
gynnyng lyke a best / but his lym-
mes fayllen him and maye not helpe
hym selfe / but he is febler than ony
other best/he can none helpe/he may
nought doo of hym selfe but wepe
with all his myght. Noo best hath ly-
fe more brutyll & vnicker. None hath
sekenesse more greuous/none more ly-
kyng to doo otherwyle than he shol-
de/none is more cruell. Also other bes-
tes loue eueryche other of the same
kynde and dwelle togpyder and ben-
not cruell/but to bestes of other kyn-
de that be contrarye to hem. But
man tourned that maner doyng v-
p so downe / and is contrarye to hym
selfe and cruell to other men/and yf
he maye not reche for to greue other/
thenne he becometh angry and cruell
to hym selfe. ¶ R. And yet to all the-
se man hath twey mylhappes & that
rightfully/one is of hym selfe within
so that he that threwe awaye peas &
restle warred within hym / in his ly-
uynge he hath neyther peas ne rest but
warre & stryfe within. A nother myl-
hap man hath withoutforth/so that
he that wolde not be subgette to god
that is aboute hym now he feeleth his
vnderlynges rebell to hym/soo þ the
creatures that were geuen may to so-
lace of burtelnesse to susteynyng of
comforte to bere vp feblenesse to seruy-
ce and subieccion to myrour and shes-
wyng of wōdres. Now for the moost
dele they flee mannes lychte & his fe-
lawshyp fro his companye & hateth

his handlyng and wyll nought of his
lordshyp / and dredeth loze to lyue &
dwelle with hym.

ADam was made of erthe in
the felde of Damalke the .vi.
daye of the worlde & brought
in to paradylle / and lynnede the same
daye / and was put out after mydday
and so he fylle out of the state of In-
nocence & of welth in to the daley of
wretchednesse and of woo. Man in
his begynnynge myght take well swe-
te mete in goddes owne hous / but he
despyred that he sholde not & assayed
that was forbode / and fylle out of hys
in to lowe / out of lyghte in to derke-
nesse and slyme / out of his owen lon-
de and contree in to outlawyng / out
of his hous in to waylyng and trou-
ble / out of fruytes in to wepyng and
woo / out of praylynge in to dole and
sorowe / out of myrthe in to stryfe / ou-
te of loue in to hate / out of Joye and
welthe in to payne and teene / out of
helthe and grace in to gylte and syn-
ne / out of peas in to payne / out of ho-
lynnesse in to offence and wrath. ¶ Me-
thodius. This Adam the .xv. yere of
his lyfe begate Caym / that is comu-
nely called Caym / & his syster Calma-
na Chan. xv. yere after þwhan Adam
was. xxx. yere olde he gate Abel & his
syster Delboza / but Abel was slayne /
and his fader & moder made dole &
sorowe for hym an hondred yere.
¶ R. As Hebrewes sayth. Adam be-
gate Seth the yere of his age an hon-
dred and thrytty / and lyued afterwar-

de .viii. L. yere / and so Adam lyued
in all .ix. hondred yere and thrytty.
¶ Trevisa. There were thre score &
ten that toined holy wrytte out of He-
brewe in to Greue / and they be called
the thre score & ten. ¶ R. Adam deyed
& was buryed in Ebron that is called
also Carycharbe / that is to meane
the Lyte of four that be Patryarches
that be buryed there / that be Adam.
Abraham Ysaac & Jacob. Seth ga-
te Enos whan he was an .L. yere ol-
de & fyue / and lyued afterwarde .viii.
L. yere / but the thre score & ten sayen
that Seth was two .L. yere and .v.
whan he begate Enos and lyued af-
terwarde .vii. L. yere and .xv. But
the thre score & ten sayen that Enos
was nyne score yere and ten whan he
gate Caynan / and lyued afterwarde
leuen hondred yere and fyftene. He
sayth specyally that Enos called fyr-
ste goddes name / for dpoyn caas he
fonde fyrst wordes of prayeng. Other
as Hebrewes tellen / he fyrste founde
ymages to worshyp of god for to wa-
ke the slouth of mannes mynde in to
god almyghty. Caynan thre score ye-
re olde and ten gate Malalell / and
lyued afterwarde .viii. L. yere and .xl.
But the thre score and ten putteth
an hondred yere to fore the leuenty / &
withdraweth an hondreth afterwar-
de. Malalell fyue and sixty yere olde
gate Jareth / and lyued afterwarde
eyght hondred yere and thrytty / but
the leuenty setteth an hondred to fore
fyue and sixty / and withdraweth an
hondred afterwarde. Jareth an .L.
yere olde and .lxii. gate Enoch / and
lyued afterwarde .viii. hondred yere.

Adam was made
of earth in the
6th day of
of Damalke

in this the seuenty accordeth with other. Enoch .lxx. yere olde begate Matufale / and lyued afterward .iii. C. yere & helde god almyghtyes way and was translated & broughte in to paradysle / but the seuenty letteth an C. yere before ths .lxx. This Enoch was fynder of lettres & wrote some bookes / soo sayth Judas the Apottle in his epistle. He tro weth that Adam dyed in Enoches tyme. And as in Caymes childern. Lameth the seuenth was warste / soo in Sithes childern Enoch the seuenth from Adam was beste. Matufale an hondred yere olde four score & seuen gate Lameth / & lyued afterwarde .vii. C. yere and .ii. that was vnto Noes flood. Lameth an .C. yere olde foure score & tweyne gate Noe / and lyued afterward .v. C. yere four score and ten.

O Aym Adams fyrste sone begate Enoch / he gate Irad / he gate Manapell / he gate Matufale / he gate Lameth. This Lameth toke tweyne wyues. Ada & Sella & gate tweyne sones on Ada. Jabell þ was fader of hem that woned in tentes & in pauplons. And Tuball that was fader of organystre & of harpers. And Lameth gate on Sella Tubalcayn þ was a mythy worchynge with hamer / & his suster Noema / she founde fyrst weuyng craft. ¶ Josephus. Caym gadred rychele vyolently by strength / & made men to be lechours & theues / and tourned symple lyuyng of men to fyndynge of mesures and

weyghtes / he ordeyned marixes & boudes of felde & of londes and buyld a Cytte and walled it / for he full soore drad them that he had greued. ¶ Plydous li. xv. ca. ii. Men were fyrst naked & vnarmed / not lyker apenlt beltes / nouthet apenlt men to defende & kepe hem fro colde and fro hete / than by belynelle of kynde wytte / they be thought theym of buyldynge / therfore they buylde theym smale cootes and cabans and keuerd hem with smale twygges and with reede / that her lyf myght be the more saue. ¶ Petrus .i. xxvii. Lameth the seuenth from Adam and moost shrewe / was the fyrste that brought in bygamyng / and so spoulsbreche apenlt the lawe of god & of kynde / and apenlt goddes owne dome. ¶ Josephus. Jabell ordeyned fyrst floizkes of beues and markes to knowe one from a nother. And departed kyddes from lambes / and ponge from the olde. ¶ Petrus. Tubalcayn founde fyrst mytches craft. Tuball hadde grete lykyng to here the hamers sowne. And he fonde proportions and acorde of melodye by weyght of the hamers. And soo he vled hem moche in thacorde of melodye / but he was not fynder of the Instrumentes of mulyke. for they were fonde longe afterwarde. ¶ R. Here wyle men tellyn / that though Tubal vled fyrst mulyke for his pleysyr / whyle he was an herde & kept beestes / for all that was not he that fonde fyrste the resonne of acorde in mulyke by wyghtes / but Pythagoras fonde that / therof loke within the thyrde boke of Pythagoras. ¶ Petrus. xxvii. Lameth

an Archer but somdele blynde had a ponglyng þ ledde hym whyle he hunted for playe & lphng/other for loue of bestes skynnes/for men etc no fleshe before Noes flood. And it happed that he slough Caym þ lopted amonge the bulshes & wende þ he had bey a wylde beste/ & for his leder warned hym not/ he slowe him also. And therefore lpth that Cayms synne was punysshed seuenfolde þ is in the .vii. generacion / for Lameth was the .vii. from Adam in that lyne . Lamethes synne was punysshed seuen & seuenty folde/for seuen & seuenty childer þ come of hym were dede in Noes flood/ other for many generacions were bytwene Lameth & Cryste þ payed rau some. ¶ Josephus. No man shall trove that it is fals/that is redde of so longe luyng of men þ were somtyme/for they luyed fayre lyfe / & had couenable & clene mete and drynke. Also for blyssfull vertues þ they vled/ & made hem besye about Astrologye and Geometre that they myght neuer lerne/ but yf they luyed six hōdred yere atte lest/for in so longe tyme is the grette yere of the sterres fulfyllid. ¶ Petrus. Sethes childer were good men vnto the .vii. generacion . But afterwarde men mylused men / and womyn mylused women. ¶ Genesis Goddes lones toke mennes doughters/that is to saye. Sethes lones toke Cayms doughters & begate Geantes. ¶ Petrus .xxix. And it myght be that Incuby/suche fendes that lye by women in lphenesse of men made Geantes be I geten / in the whiche Geantes gretenesse of herte answer

reth & acordeth to the hugenesse of bodye. But after Noes flood were other Geantes born in Ebron/ & after were other in Chan a Lyte of Egypte & thylke Geantes were called Tythanes/of hem come Enachym. His childer woned in Ebron / of hem come Golpas ¶ Josephus That tyme men wylt as Adam had sayde / that they sholde be destroyed by fyre or ellys by water. Therefore bokes that they had made by grette trauayll & studie / he closed hem in two grette pylers made of marble and of viente tyle . In a pyler of Marble for water / and in a pyler of tyle for fyre. for it sholde be saued by that maner to helpe of man kynde. He sayth that the pyler of stone escaped the flood / and yet is in Syria . ¶ Genesis . Chan whan Noe was fyue hondred yere olde he begate Sem. Cham . and Japheth . That is to saye / whan he was so olde/he hadde these thre lones geten/ and he made the shyp an hondred yere afterwarde of tymbre planed well smoth / and was glewed within and withoute . The shyp was thre hondred cubytte longe/and fyfty cubytte brode/and thrytty cubytte hygh from the kele to the hatches vnder the cabans and housyng. Noe made a wyndowe in his shyp and a doze on the syde downward / & housyng & cabans with dpuerle flozng. The wyndowe was a cubytte hygh. ¶ Trevisa. Here men maye wondre how the wyndowe was made bynethe in the syde of þ shyp for comyng in of water. Doctor de lra moeueth this doubt & lpth that there we haue fenestra that is

a fenestre & a wyndowe / the lettre of
 Hebrewe hath Lucerna / that is a lan-
 terne / & some men seyen that planter-
 ne was a carbuncle or some other pre-
 cious stone þ̄ shone & gaf lyght clere
 ynough there it was lette. But some
 other saie / that þ̄ wyndowe was all
 hole of crystall stone / by whiche lyght
 entred & helde out water. Many other
 wyndowes were in the shyp / & so nes-
 ded / for the shyp was full grete & hug-
 ge / & had in full many beestes. ¶ Pe-
 trus. xxx. This shyp was made lome
 dele to the lphenes of mannes bodye.
 in the whiche the lengthe from the
 soole of the fote to the toppe of the he-
 de is suche six as the brede / þ̄ is from
 the myddell of the syde rybbes in that
 one syde / to the myddell of the syde
 rybbes in þ̄ other syde. Also the leng-
 the is suche ten as the depeneste / that
 stretcheth from the rygge to the wou-
 be. ¶ Trevisa. ¶ If the man be of full
 shappe as he sholde be / nother to gre-
 te ne to small. ¶ Hugo de Ar. This
 shyp myght not receyue so many bel-
 tes & other thynges & so grete / but the
 cubyttes were cubyttes of Geometrye
 for þ̄ comune cubytte þ̄ me vlech con-
 teyneth but a fote & an halfe / that is
 six spannes. A spanne stretcheth from
 the ende of the thombe to the ende of
 the myddell fyngre / whan the hande
 is stryght. But a cubytte of Geome-
 trye conteyneth six comune cubyttes
 that wyl be nyne fote longe. ¶ Gen
 Chan whan þ̄ shyp was made. Noe
 in the yere of his lyfe six hondred en-
 tred & yede in to þ̄ shyp / the fyrst dape
 of the seconde moneth þ̄ is of May.
 And in .viii. dapes he brought in to

the shyppe all that he was warned to
 bynge in er our lord sente rayne here
 vpon the erthe. And so the flood was
 made & occupied þ̄ erthe well nygh al
 a yere. The water of the flood passed
 xv. cubyttes aboute the hyghest hylles
 for þ̄ werke of mankynde defouled þ̄
 aper so hyghe as me troweth by wor-
 shyppe of fyre þ̄ smoked & spryn-
 kled vp lo hyghe. This yere ended þ̄
 fyrst age of þ̄ worlde / from Adam to
 Noes flood vnder .x. generacions þ̄ we
 spake of rather. ¶ And Joseph^o li. i.
 c. iiii. And also the Hebrewes saie þ̄
 this fyrst age of þ̄ worlde conteyneth
 two .M. yere. vii. C. and .lvi. ¶ But
 the seuenthy turneres & Pysydorus li. v.
 sayth two thousande yere. vii. C. and
 two and fourty. ¶ But Jerom seyth
 not fully two thousande. ¶ And Me-
 thodi^o sayth two thousande / for here
 he leueth the odde yeres þ̄ be ouer the
 thousandes / for he caldeth & accomps-
 teth the ages of þ̄ worlde by thousan-
 des & lette the other dele abyde.

 þ̄ flood withdrew. Noe wen-
 te out of the shyp the .xxvii.
 dape of the seconde moneth that is
 May. Chan oure lorde behote & pro-
 mysed Noe / that no suche flood shol-

 couenaunt / he sette his bowe in the
 cloudes / that is the rayne bowe. ¶ Pe-
 trus. xxxii. The rayne bowe is to-
 ken of twey domes / of the dome that
 was done by water . for me sholde
 not drede it / and of the dome that

shall be by fyre for me holde drede it
 Therfor the bowe hath twey colours
 the vtter is watry/for the dome of wa-
 ter that is passed/þ yinner is fyry for
 the dome of fyre shall be. And holy
 sayntes tellen þ the rayne bowe shall
 not be seen .xl. yere before the dape of
 dome. Also they saye þ it neuer appe-
 red fro Adam to Noes flood. Also no
 rayne bowe was seen all that tyme/
 nouthen fleshe ne fyssh efen ne wyne
 dronken. for that tyme was as were
 spygyng tyme/ & tho was ynough &
 plente of all helthfull thynges / that
 was afterwarde chaüged through syn-
 ne. But after þ flood mankynde had
 leue to ete fleshe & fyssh/that rather
 ete herbes & rotes. Noe lyued after the
 flood .iii. C. yere and .l. and he lyued
 in all .ix. C. yere and .l. and so deped
 & lefte thre sones a lyue. Sem Cham
 and Japheth/ of tho whiche thre ca-
 me all maner of mankynde. ¶ Gen.
 Thay two yere after the flood Sem
 was an hondred yere olde and gate
 Arpharath and lyued afterward fyue
 hondred yere. Arpharath was fader
 of Caldeis/and gate Sale/whan he
 was an hondred yere olde and .xxxv.
 as Jerom sayth. ¶ But Vlydorus li-
 bro lecto. and hebrewes layen .xxxv.
 yere/and lyued afterware .iii. C. yere
 and thre. But the seuenty and Luc al-
 so foloweth hem. Arpharath whan
 he was an hondred yere and .xxxv. he
 gate Carnay / and lyued after thre
 hondred yere and .xxx. Carnay an
 hondred yere olde and .xxx. gate Sa-
 le of hym come the olde Samaryta-
 nes and the Iudes/and lyued after-
 warde four hondred and .viii. peres/

and .xxx. soo the seuenty tellen. He-
 brewes sayth that Sale whan he was
 thyrty yere olde gate Heber. Of this
 Heber they were called hebrewes.
 And Sale lyued after that he gate
 Heber four hondred yere. But the se-
 uenty and Vlydor⁹ accompte the hon-
 dred yere before the thyrty and thre
 hondred yere after the .xxx. Of He-
 ber hebrewes haue the name/the he-
 brewes saye that Heber .xxxiiii. yere
 olde gate Phaleth / and lyued after-
 warde four hondred .xxx. yere / but
 the seuenty putteth an hondred befo-
 re the foure and thyrty. hebrewes
 saye that Phaleth thyrty yere olde
 gate Ren that hete Ragan also/and
 lyued afterwarde two hondred yere
 and nyne/but the seuenty and Vlydo-
 rus putten the hondred before the .xxx
 and afterwarde two hondred and .ix.
 this hete Phaleth rightfully for Pha-
 leth is to laye departyng. for langa-
 ge was departed in his tyme that ra-
 ther was all one in the buyldyng of
 the towre of Babel. And so men we-
 re departed in to dyuerse londes. Ra-
 gan .xxxii. yere olde gate Sarug and
 lyued afterwarde two .C. yere and
 seuen/soo saye hebrewes/but the se-
 uenty and Vlydorus setten an hon-
 dred before two and thyrty and af-
 terwarde two hondred seuen. hebre-
 wes saye that Sarug .xxx. yere olde
 gate Nachor and lyued afterwarde
 two hondred yere and tweyne. But
 the seuenty and Vlydorus put an hon-
 dred yere before the thyrty and two
 hondred afterwarde. hebrewes saye
 that Nachor .xxix. yere olde gate Tha-
 re & lyued afterwarde .L. yere and .ix.

but the seuenty put an hondred yere
 byfour nyne and twenty. ¶ And Ply
 dore sayth/that Nachor was seuenty
 yere and nyne whan he gate Thare.
 ¶ The hebrewes & Plydorus layen/
 that Thare .lxx. yere olde gate Abra
 ham Nachor & Aray / & lyued after
 warde an .L. yere and .xxx. but the
 seuenty put the .L. yere before the se
 uenty yere. ¶ Petrus .xxxviii. And so
 the seconde age of the world is ended
 fro Noes flode to Abrahams byrthe/
 & contepneth .x. generacions and .ii.
 L.yere four score and .xii. ¶ So seyth
 hebrewes Josephus and Jeronim.
 But the seuenty & Saynt Austyn a
 counten a thousande yere & two and
 seuenty and .xi. generacions. ¶ But
 Plydorus acounteth .ix.L. yere and
 .xlii. And Methodius a thousande.
 The caas of this dyuerlyte is/for the
 seuenty and Saynt Austyn allo put
 ten to eueryche faders age from Ar
 pharath to Nachor an hondred yere.
 ¶ Beda. As Noe was the .x. from
 Adam/so Abraham was the .x. from
 Noe. Methes Luc in his genologye/
 whan he layth (Qui fuit Sale) that
 is to meane/that was Sales lone/&
 so forth that was Chaynas lone/that
 was Arpharas lone. There Luc folo
 weth the seuenty/that putten one ge
 neracion moo than the hebrewes put
 ¶ Augustinus de ciuitate dei li.xv.c.
 .xiii. Whan in many translacions is
 dyuerlyte founde that maye not stan
 de / than the fyrste langage that the
 tournyng and the translacion is ma
 de of/shall be moost bylcued. ¶ Beda
 The tournyng & translacion of the
 seuenty/was fyrst not fully tourned/

redely / other it was afterwarde ap
 payred by mysbyleued men. ¶ Eules
 bius. fro Adam to Abraham is noo
 storpe founde in grue nother in straū
 ge langage. ¶ Methodius. Noe had a
 lone bory two thousande yere and an
 hondred after the begynnyng of the
 worlde/that lone was called Jonys
 tus. Noe paue hym lordshyp anone to
 the see Elichoza / to hym god als
 myghty yafe wytte & wysedon that
 he sholde fynde scyences of Astronos
 mye / and that he coude telle before/
 what sholde befall and come after
 warde / and specyally of the begyn
 nyng and endyng of the four chyfe
 kyngdoms. And soo he knewe þ fyrst
 of Cham the Assyrens sholde regne
 of Cham come Belus. Afterward of
 Semthe Medes the Perles & y Greces
 Thenne of Japheth the Romayns.
 Jonytus she wed all this to his disc
 ple Nemproth. Therefore Nemproth
 had grece desyre to regne/& regned in
 Babylon amonge Chames children
 they gate and helde Assyria in Egyp
 te/for to Nynus regned in Assyria vp
 on the Assyres. ¶ Josephus libro pri
 capitulo.v. After that Noe was dede
 in Phalates tyme / than all the men
 of the worlde had one langage and
 tonge. Noes childer by techyng and
 ledyng of Nemproth trowed and by
 leued þ good happes & good spede is
 not of god almyghty/but by mannes
 owne vtues & dedes/also they wende
 þ god almyghty wolde departe hē by
 enure/þ he myght þ more lghely ma
 ke hem subget. Also they dradde þ an
 other flood sholde come/& buylded a
 well hyghe towre of brent tyle & glue

in stede of moister in the felde that he
 te Sannaar/there Babylon was af-
 terwarde buyld/but god almyghty de-
 parted hem/for they sholde not make
 deslencion & stryfe amonge hem selfe
 This Neproth was Thus lone. Thus
 was Chams lone/& Cham was Noes
 lone. That place is called Babell &
 is to save shedyng. for there at god
 almyghtyes heest/the langage & the
 tonges of the buylders were shadde &
 scatred. Heber was holden gyltles of
 conspyracion in the buyldyng of the
 towre/and therfore he was spared as
 gyltles in y shedyng of tonges. ¶ Pe-
 trus. xxxv. Chan Nempioth a strong
 hunter of men & is a Tyraunt vpon
 men/he put Assur out of y londe & be-
 gay to regne among Chams childer
 in the Lyte of Babylon & he buylde.
 Netheles Semiramis the quene after
 warde made this Lyte well more. Af-
 terwarde Nempioth wente to y men
 of Perle & taught hē to worshyp the
 fyre/& fouided there the Lyte Nynue
 Afterward Nyn^o & Semiramys ma-
 de that Lyte more. ¶ Aug^o de ciuita-
 te dei li. xviii. c. primo.

 the londes & eueryche folowed

 tolde moie pryse of freedom than of
 sauacion & of hele/loo & it was grete

wonder of hem that had leuer be lost
 & lpyll/than be vnderlynges & seruaū-

 out of lpf. Therfore by goddes ordes
 nauce it is do & some men be kynges

 They that come of Cham helde the
 londe by the southe Oceay vnto the
 see Gadytan thre hondred countrees
 foure scoze and fourtene vnder .xxx.
 langages and tonges. ¶ Augustinus
 li. vi. They that come of Japheth/
 helde the londe from the hylle that he-
 te mons Taurus in Salicia. North-
 warde towarde the north Oceay the
 halfe dele of Alpa & all Europia vn-
 to the Hyptylthe Oceay that is the
 Englylthe see .iii. l. countrees vnder
 xv. langages and tonges / and lefte
 eche londe & people his name / of the
 whiche many be now chaūged other
 of kynges of londes other of the sa-
 me londes / other of maners of men
 of londes. Other thynge stande as
 they were/so that yet it is seyn of who-
 me that they come. As the Assyres
 come of Assur. And the Heberwes
 of Heber. Of somme is noo realou
 knowen / as that that me sayth that
 Egypcyans pcrteyne to Melraym/
 and Ethyopens to Thus. ¶ Joses-
 phus libro primo capitulo quinto. Of
 Thus vnto nowe the Ethyopens be

called Chusey / and the Egypcyans
 Mylrey. And soo when men were to
 scatred in to dyuerse londes / somme
 chaüged names as hem lyked / as the
 grees / oher for fayrenesse of wrytyn-
 ge / oher for lykynge of reders / oher
 for to make her owen self the nobley
 of her forfads. ¶ Hug. c. frilia. Ofte
 names be lette for maner of doynge.
 As whan we wyll meane þ the Troy
 ans be ferfull we calle hem frigios.
 And yf we wyll meane that they be
 gentyll and noble we calle hem Dar
 dans. yf we wyll mene þ they be stron
 ge we calle hem Troyans. Yf hardy
 we calle hym Hector. ¶ Plydor. li.
 xiiii. c. ii. Men of the east lownen her
 wordes in the throte as Hebre wes &
 Syres men of myddell londes / in the
 roof of þ mouth as Grees & Alyans
 Men of the west breeketh her wordes
 bytwene the tethe as Spaynols & Ro
 mayns. ¶ Augustin. de ci. dei li. xvi.
 c. xviii. But lyth that men were fyrst
 scatred in to dyuerse londes / though
 the kyngdoms of Assyrens in þ east /
 of Egypcyans in þ south / & of Shy-
 tes in the north / that is in Grece be-
 gynne as it were attones. ¶ Augusti-
 nus li. xviii. c. p. Netheles the kyng-
 doms of Assyrens of Medes / that is
 of Perles of Grece of Romayns fo-
 lowed eueryche after oher / and were
 pryncypally amonge oher. Netheles
 the fyrst & the last were more noble &
 dured lenger. Oher kyngdoms and
 kynges longed to these kyngdōs. Al-
 so berynge & dedes of men of Athe-
 nes be gretter in loos and fame than
 they be in dede / so sayth Salustius &
 Darro also / & that is for that wryters

& phylosophres of Athenes were so
 tempne of wytte & preyled the dedes
 hugedly & ouer melure. ¶ R. And for
 the treatysle is full & generall of the
 four chyfe forlayde kyngdoms from
 the begynnyng of the kyngdome of
 Assyres to the ende of the kyngdom
 of Romayns ageth longe wrytynge &
 processe / therfore of the fyrst kyngdo-
 mes as it were of the same age with
 the kyngdom of Assyres / fyrste we
 shall wryte.

The kyngdom of Shytes in
 the north by cause of age and
 of tyme ageth the seconde pla-
 ce in ordre / & is lette after the kyng-
 dome of Assyres / and began in Sa-

 ste kyng that was there. Sarug was
 Abrahams fader grauntyre. It les-
 meth that the Ryuer Thanays hath
 the name of this kyng Thanaus /
 the whiche Ryuer in the north syde
 of the world departeth bytwene Alya
 and Europa. This kyngdom was
 neuer ouercome / but thryes it conque-
 red Alya / & ouercome Darius kyng
 of Perles / and slowe Cyrus the kyng
 and dyde awaye Zephyron that was
 the grete Alyfaüders leder. ¶ Petrus
 capitulo .lx. Also a nother kyngdom
 was in the west / and was the kyng-
 dome of Scicions that is of Archa-
 dia a parte of Grece in Europa / and
 dured vnder Agylaus fyrst .ix. hon-
 dred yere thre score and enleuen. Agy-
 laus is a lorde as it were a kyng ou-
 ther an Emperour. Afterwarde this

kyngdom) endured vnder one and .xxx. kynges from y. .xxiii. yere of Nachor Abrahams grauntspre vnto Zenlypp^o tyme that regned the yere of Help the preeft .xvii. Therfore one kyngdom) in Archadia hete somtyme Agealea. Nethes it hete afterwarde Palapomenlis/there was one of the kyngdomes of Sicce. ¶ Nethes Denys sayth that the kyngdom) of Scicions began the yere of Thare fyfty / that was .xx. yere er Abraham was born. Thare was Abrahams fader. In this kyngdom) the fyrste kyng was Lycrops and regned fyue and fyfty yere. A nother kyngdom) as it were of the same age with these forsayde kyngdoms was the kyngdom) of Egypte in the south/and began in Nachors tyme Abrahams grauntspre. ¶ Regnum) Egyptior. ¶ This kyngdom) had fyftene grete lordshyppes and called hem Dinastias/from the fyrste Hyneus other lones to Abrahams tyme. Afterwarde Thebey men of Thebes helde .xvi. grete lordshyppes and called hem Dinastias. Than Dyapolitani that were called Pharaones that were kynges of Egypte helde .xviii. grete lordshyppes/and called hem Dinastias. Dinastia is grete lordshyp and power durynge in a prouynce that chole kyng o pther Emperour. And so this kyngdom) of Egypt dured vnto the tyme of Cambis that was Cyrus lone. Cyrus was kyng of Perse/and gaf whyle he lyued y kyngdom) of Assyrya that was tho tourned to the Medes to his lone Cambis/and called hym Nabugodonozor also/and his prouynce Dlofer

nes and subdued Egypte. And Egypte was vnder leuen kynges of Perse/and after wente from the Perles and hadde ten kynges of her owne/for to Othus that hete Archarexerles. Allo the twelue kynges of Perles put out Nactanabo the laste kyng of Egypte vnto Ethiopia/and wanne the kyngdom) of Egypte. Afterwarde that kyngdom) dured vnder thre kynges vnto the seuenth yere of the grete Alexander/after that the kyngdoms of Egypte and of Perse were vnder the Grekes thre hondred yere vnder .xiii. kyngis that were called Lagydes/and Tholomeus vnto Julius Cezars tyme/outher as some mey meane vnto the fyftenth yere of Augustus Cezar that ouercome Cleopatram Denys doughter. Denys was Ptholomeus and the laste Laged. Egypte from that tyme felle to the Romaynes/And soo alle the kynges of Egypte from the fyrst begynnyng vnto Alysaunders were four score and enleuen. The kynges of Egypte were fyrste called Dyascenes/and than Pharaones/and atte laste Lagydes. ¶ Josephus libro octauo capitulo. The kynges of Egypte hadde in her childhode other names. But whan they were made kynges they were called Pharaones/for a kyng is called Pharaon in the langage of Egypte. The kynges of Alexandria were called Ptholomeis whan they were made kynges. And the kynges of Romaynes were called Cezars. Salomon wedded a kynges doughter of Egypte. I rede of noo kyng of Egypte after hym that was called Pharaon.

¶ **Regnum Assirioꝝ.** ¶ **Augustin⁹** li. xvi. c. xviii. The fourth kyngdom but the eldest of tyme is the kyngdome of Assiryes / & began in the east vnder Belus Nemproch / the .xxv. yere of Sarug that was Abrahams fader grauntfyr. This kyngdom had lordshipp of al Alya out take Inde. ¶ **Petrus.** lx. And it dured a thousand yere .iii. l. and tweyne vnder .xxxvii. kynges / vnto the last Sardanapall⁹ the kyng that deped the .vii. yere of Ozias kyng of Juda. Than Arbaces that hete Arbadius also þ kynges stpwarde & his traytre / for he slough hym & tourned the kyngdom of Assiryes to the Medes / that is to vnderstande in hope & not in dede. ¶ **R.** for after Sardanapallus from the .vii. yere of Ozias kyng of Juda to Manasses kyng of Juda aboute an hundred yere and twelue / the Assiryes hadde seuen myghty kynges / though they hadde not the kyngdome all hole / of whiche these be the names. Arbaces. Phulle. Teglatalalar. Salmanasar. Senacheryb. Assaradon. Sargon. Netheles some wpll meane that after Sardanapallus deth / from the seuenthe yere of Ozias the kyng to the yere of the Transmygracion of the Jewes one and thrytty / the hoole kyngdom of the East stode with the Medes two hundred yere and sixty vnder .viii. kynges / from the fyrste Arbaces vnto Astrages that was Darius vncl and Cyrus grauntfyr. Cyrus ouertourned this Astrages / and tourned the kyngdom of Medes to the hole kyngdom of Perles / and left the kyngdom of Hyrcans to Astrages.

¶ **Regnū Babylon.** ¶ **Netheles** in Senacheryb kyng of Assiryes tyme / & in Ezechias tyme kyng of Juda come vp þ grete kyngdom of the Babylons & Caldeys and dured vnder .vii. kynges / whose names were Heredac þ hete Baladac also. Nabugodonolor. Emmerodoc. Regular. Labofardac. Baltalar þ hete Nabar also / hym slough Cyrus J losped to his vncl Darius / & tourned his kyngdom to the kyngdom of Perle & of Medes the yere of Transmyguracion of the Jewes .xxxi. and soo passed .ii. l. yere and .lx. from the .vii. yere of Ezechias kyng of Juda / in the whiche yere began to faylle the hole kyngdom of Assiryes vnto þ yere of Transmyguracion .xxxi. tho began the hoole kyngdom of Perle. ¶ **Regnum Perlar.** ¶ **¶** Than the hole kyngdom of Perle from the yere of Transmygracion .xxxi. vnto the seuenth yere of the grete Alylauder that was from the fyrst Cyrus to the last Darius Arsam⁹ sone dured two hundred yere and .xxxv. vnder .xiii. kynges / that was Cyrus the fyrste. Cambyses the seconde / his fader Cyrus gaf hym a nother name and called hym Nabugodonolor / and paue hym Synyue with the kyngdom of Assiryes whyle he was hym selfe a lyue. Vnder hym befelle the stoye of Judith / the .iii. Ermendes magus / the .iiii. Darius Taplis sone / the .v. Exerles / the .vi. Archaxerles þ hete Longimanus also / vnder hym were Eldras & Neemias / the .vii. Exerles the .viii. Fogodia / the .ix. Dari⁹ Nothus. Noth⁹ is a ballard eyther he þ is

geten of a worthy fader / & born of an
 vnworthy moder / the .x. Artharexer /
 les þ hete Aluerus also vnder hē was
 Hester / the .xi. Dthus / the .xii. Aisa
 nius / the .xiii. Darius Arsan^o lone /
 the grete Alylaüder ouercome him / &
 tomed þ kyngdom of Perles to þ ho /
 le kyngdom of Macedons at Grece.
¶ Regnum Macedony **¶** Netheles
 this kyngdom of Macedones began
 rather vnder the fyrste Cranaus the
 xiiii. yere of Dzas kyng of Iuda / &
 so dured .vi. C. yere & .xxvi. vnto the
 last Perleus þ Romayns slough hym
 the .ix. yere of Dnias the bysshop þ he
 te Menelaus also. Netheles there we
 re other kyngdoms in Grece eueryche
 after other ordeyned / of þ whiche the
 fyrst was Archadia atte Scicions þ
 people / & was I tomed thens to þ Pe
 loponenles as it is sayd before. A no /
 ther kyngdom of Grece was among
 the Argyues / & was I tomed thens to
 Mercens. An other was at Athenes þ
 Lyte. An other among the Lacedemo
 nes / these were þ Spartans. An other
 at Epyrus þ is Tracia. An other at
 Macedonia. **¶** Regnū Romanoy.
¶ The kyng of Rome I wolwed by
 all these kyngdoms / as it dyde other
 kyngdoms of londes / & made hem al
 longe & be obeyssaüt to the kyngdom
 of Rome. In this maner the kyng /
 dom of Rome began vnder Janus þ
 fyrst kyng of Italpe / & dured vnto
 the .vii. yere of Darius Arsan^o lone
 kyng of Perles / hym slough the grete
 Alexander / & so the kyngdom of Ro
 me dured at that cours .viii. C. yere &
 four score vnder .xxvii. kynges / of the
 whiche .xxvii. kynges six the fyrst we /

re Latyns. The .xiiii. that came af /
 terward were Albanes. The other se
 uen that came after þ the Lyte was
 buylded were Romaynes / of the whi
 che Romulus was the fyrst / & Tar /
 quinus the proude was the last. After
 ward kynges were put out of þ Lyte
 & were from yere to yere two consuls
 choley. After consuls Trybuncs ple /
 bes & doctours ruled þ comonte vnto
 Julius Cezars tyme .iiii. C. yere thre
 score & four. Afterward they left of þ
 name of kynges & called her chyfe lor
 des Cezares Emperours & Augustes
 of the whiche Julius Cezar was the
 fyrst of a consull & dutatour made an
 Emperour / his successour & neuewe
 was Octavian^o Augustus & brought
 all þ kyngdoms of þ worlde in to one
 kyngdom all hole. Than Philyp the
 xxviii. Emperour was the fyrst Em
 perour þ was crystened. Than þ grete
 Constantyne made Constantynople
 the chyfe Lyte of thempyre & left Ro
 me for to be chyfe see of the Pope to
 saynt Peters successours. Whan them
 pyre was translated & tomed to þ gre
 te Charles kyng of fraüce. Pupinus
 the kynges lone / than þ name of the
 Emperour lette allone at Constanty
 nople. **¶** Augustin^o de ci. dei li. xviii.

In Saruges tyme Belus Nēp
 rothis lone kyng of Babylon
 went in to Assyra / & wan it
 afterwarde within a short tyme / and
 whan he had regned .lxx. yere than he
 deyed / & his lone Nynus regned after **Nynus.**
 hym & began to regne þ yere of Cha
 i ii

re Abrahams fader euen .xxx. & was
 kyng well nyghe of all Alya out take
 Inde .liiii. yere. In the yere of his
 kyngdom .xliiii. Abraham was born
 before the buyldyng of þe Lyte of Ro
 me nygh a .M. yere & .iii. C. ¶ Dio
 sius li.i. The yere before þe buyldyng
 of the Lyte of Rome a .M. and .iii.
 C. Nynus kyng of Assyrens for co
 uetyse to make his lordshyp grete/ba
 re out armure & lyued cruell yf fyfty
 yere in all Alya in warre & in batayll
 And arose out of þe south/& from the
 reede see & destroyed in the northe vp
 on the see þe hete Eulinū/þe stretcheth
 fro the Ryuer Chanay to the endes
 of hyberia & Armenia. And soo this
 kyng Nynus ouercome men of Sci
 cia Barbarica/that were yet no war
 reours but styll men & peaslyble/and
 made hem knowe strength/& taught
 hem to lyue by mannes blood/that ly
 ued before honde with mylke of beel
 tes. And atte last he slough Zoroastes
 kyng of Bactryans þe was tynder of
 wytchecraft/but atte laste deyed why
 le he belegyed a Lyte þe was tourned
 from hym/he was hytte with an aro
 we & so he was slayne. ¶ Petr^o. xxxvi
 Nynus Belus sone / whan his fader
 was dede/had Assyrya & the Lyte Ny
 nyue/& named after his name/& ma
 de þe Lyte Nynnyue chyfe of his kyng
 dome/and enlarged the Lyte gretely
 by thre Journeys. for Nemproth had
 beforehonde founded that Lyte/and
 slough also Cham that hete Zoroas
 tes/also kyng of Bactria that wrote
 the seven scyences in .xiiii. yllers/in
 seven of brasse/& seven of brente tyle
 for to saue hem bothe apenst fyre and

water/but Nynus brente his booke.
 ¶ Pylodorus li. viii. Aristotle of Zoro
 astes/he wrote that he made twenty
 hondred thousande verses of wytche
 crafte/& Democritus made þe crafte
 more afterwarde in Ppocras tyme.
 ¶ Petr^o. xxxvi. Of this Nynus maw
 metrye began in this maner. Whan
 Belus was dede/his sone Nynus for
 to haue some comfort of his sorowe/
 made an ymage of his fader/& he dy
 de that ymage so grete worshyp & res
 uerence/that he spared all euill doers
 that fled to þe ymage/by ensample of
 this doynge many men made ymages
 to her lyef frendes. And so by ensam
 ple of Belus mawmet/come forth o
 ther mawmetti. Also of Belus name
 come forth þe comune names of maw
 metti in dyuerse langages & tonges
 for some men calle her mawmet beel
 some Baall/some Baalym/& some
 yaued her mawmete a surname and
 called her name Belphegor / & some
 Belesub. ¶ Alexander in mytalog.
 ¶ Idolatria mawmetrye. ¶ Of the
 buyldyng forth of mawmetrye. come
 well nyghe the feynyng of Poetrye.
 for whan Syrophanes of Egypte
 had an ymage of his sone that was
 dede/that ymage he called pdolum/
 that is lykenesse and shappe for lyke
 nesse of sorowe. Whan he had made
 þe ymage in mynde of his sone / that
 ymage was gretely worshypped of
 his seruauntes. It was refuse and
 socour to mysdoers / as he hadde f
 ordeyned. And whyle he sought helpe
 and remedye of sorowe / he founde
 seede and spryngynge of well more
 sorowe. for þe olde errour in worshyp

of mawmettes gan to sprede. Nether
 les the same maner doyng was not
 ordeyned and comfermed of all men.
 for phylolophers worlhypped oo god
 & yaued hym many names for many
 maner doynges & worchynge that
 he worcheth and lyueth/for he yueth
 lyfe/seleth for he yueth selyng. Jupp
 ter that is helper for he helpeth. ¶ Al
 so Plato in the booke called Phylolo
 phus sayth / that Poetes by cause of
 wynnynge & of fauour peynted reions
 scyence & myght h were graūted to the
 vble of lyupng in many maner shap
 pes/ & yaf to eueryche a propre name.
 And so connyng of tyllng of feldes
 he called Cereus/connyng of tyllng
 ge of bynes he called Bacchus/ & acou
 ted foule dedes of men amonge god
 des. ¶ Pldorus Ethi. li. viii. They h
 Paynymys called goddes the were men
 And as they bare hem in her lyf bet
 ter or werle/so they were worlhypped
 after her deeth. But by fals loore of
 fendes/men h come afterwarde wor
 lhypped hem for goddes / that were
 fyrste worlhypped oonly for mynde.
 And thay for to make it more solēp
 ne come feynynge of Poetes. ¶ R.
 Augustinus de ci. dei li. ii. ca. xi. The
 Poete with his lyppe speketh of thre
 maner of goddes for some they calle
 goddes as Mars and Jupyter/some
 halfe goddes as Hercules & Romul.
 And some vertuous men h men tro
 wed that had somwhat of godhede
 as Hector & Achilles. Of mawmetrye
 come many maner of euill doyng.
 ¶ Suche is that that Jerom speketh
 vpon Vlape. xviii. And sayth h the
 Egypcyans and well nyghe all men

of the east londes worlhypped fortun
 ne/that is god of happes/as they me
 ne/the ymage of fortune is J sette in
 a place that is well knowen / & hath
 in his righte honde an horne full of
 mede/all that lyteth about foundeth
 to taste of that horne the laste dape of
 Nouembre. And yf they fynde than
 the horne full it boodeth a good corn
 yere / and yf they fynde it voyde or
 emptye / than they make sorowe.
 ¶ Trogus libro vii. Whan Nynus
 was dede/his wyfe Semiramis with
 her sone Nynus that hete Nynyan al
 so regned in this maner. The wo
 man durst not betake the kyngdome
 to the yonge childe/neither she durste
 her selfe regne openly. Therefore she
 dysguyled her selfe in the childes ly
 che the moder for the sone/a woman
 in stede of the childe. for eyther had
 a smale voyce and mene of stature.
 Therefore they hydde her armes and
 her thyes with dyuerse helynges and
 her heede with a cap. And for me shol
 de not saye that she hadde ony thyng
 with newe maner clothyng/she hygh
 te that her people sholde goo clothed
 in the same arape/and yet the people
 vble the same maner clothyng. Than
 this woman dyde many grete dedes/
 and whay she hadde ouercome the
 enemye of al enemyes/thay she kno
 wleched what she was and how she
 hadde done/thay that doyng torred
 her to right grete worlhypp/for she o
 uercome Ethiopia blewe men londe
 and Inde also. And atte last she des
 yred her owne sone and bade hym
 for to lygge by her/and he slough her
 whay he had regned two and forty

pere. But her sone Nynus helde hym appayed with the trauayll of his sad & moder / & was after ward selde I see amonge mey & lpued & were olde amonge women. And his successours kynges that come after him folowed the ensample of hym / & gaf answere to the people by messagyers þ̄ sholde go bytwene. ¶ R. That maner doynge was vled vnto kyng Sardanapalus tyme.

The nombre & the lūme of this seconde age / loke before in this boke. ¶ Gen. Than Aram gate Loth Sarray & Melcham. Aram deyed before his fader Thare in Vr Caldeorum a place in Caldea / & loo Nynus deyed the yere of Abrahams age enleuen. ¶ Petrus. ix. Semiramis Nynus wyf for she wolde regne after her hulbonde Nynus / she wedded her owne sone that she had by her hulbonde Nynus & had by her sone a childe that echyd and enlarged Babylonia & made it more. ¶ Gen. Than Thare myght not suffre the wronge that hym was I doo of woishypping of fyre in Caldea / there they had I slayne his oldest sone Aram. he wente out of that cou tree with Abraham & Nachor / and Arams meyne vnto Charram in Me

sopotania & deyed there after .ii. C. yere & fyue. Abraham whan his sad Thare was dede / he wente douyn out of Charra in to Sychem & thens in to Pentapolis. Afterwarde he pyght his paupllon bytwene Betell & Haze And hōger was strong / he went douyn in to Egypte & tolde there þ̄ Sarray was his wyfster. ¶ Josephus li. i. c. vii. Abraham lerned in Caldea & wente douyn in to Egypte & was the fyrst þ̄ taught the Egypcyans Arismetrye / & Astrologye þ̄ was vnknewen to hē before. Abraham was full ryche and wente oute of Egypte to the place of the folsayd paupllon / & for cryfte of Herodes he departed from Loth and wente fro hym vnto the vale of Nabrie belydes Ebron. ¶ Petrus. xlii. Ebron þ̄ hete Chebron also / is a Cytte & hete also Caryatharbe of Caryath þ̄ is a Cytte in Arabe / that is four for four the grettest Patryarkes were buryed there. Adam, Abraham, Isaac & Jacob. ¶ R. But Joseph is buryed in Sychem belydes mouit Effraym as it is sayd aboue in the boke of Josue in the last chapytre. ¶ Genelis. Whan Abraham come ayeen from the batayll of four kēges / he gaf tythyng of all þ̄ he had gotten to Melchisedech kyng of Salem / and Melchisedech offred brede and wyne. ¶ Decime Melchisedech. ¶ Hieronimus in epistola ad euangeliū. et Petrus. xliii. He redeth that Abraham gaf fyrste tythynges / but Abell gaf rather the fyrste that god sente hym of all maner kynde. The hebrewes telle that this Melchisedech was Sem Noes sone / and telleth that he luyed vnto

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Plaac. They telle also that from Noe vnto Aaron all the eldest sones were prestes / & blessed the people in offryn ges & festes & receyued & had the fyrst byrth of bestes. And me sayth þ̄ luche were the fyrst byrthes þ̄ Elau solde to his broder Jacob. Also some men me neth that annus. Jubileus þ̄ is the pe re of grace / toke þ̄ begynnyng of the bycrope for the delyueraunce of pryso ners. Jobell is forpeuenesse epyther the begynnyng therof come Jobele^e epyther Jubileus the pere of grace / & is ordey ned the .L. pere / for Loth was tho fyr ty pere olde. for Abraham þ̄ was con nyng in the craft of knowleche of the planettes and sterres / knewe that the temprure þ̄ cometh of hyghenesse & lowenesse of planettes & sterres cometh ayen to temprure atte fyfty pere And so Abraham ordeyned some ly henesse here in erthe þ̄ he sawe in the sterres & planettes. ¶ **Petrus. liii.** Ab rraham had a sone Ismaell born of his seruaunt Agar / the whiche Is maell was Circūcyded whan he was xiiii. pere olde. The Arabes vlen yet that maner of doynge. Ismaell was her auctour. ¶ **Genesis.** This Isma ell was afterwarde in Archer & ga te on his wyfe that was of Egypte twelue dukes leders of people þ̄ called hem selfe Sarapyns / as though they were I come of Sarra / but they be de rylp Agarenes / for they come of Ager Ismaels moder. Also they be called Ismaelytes / for they come of Isma ell & be Madyanptes also. ¶ **R.** Dur lorde yaf Abraham & his childery the Circūcysson / for to make & departe his people from other nacions. ¶ **Pe**

rus. xlvii. for Abrahams name was chaūged whan he was Circūcyded / therfore Hebrewes yeuen her childery names the .viii. daye whan they be Circūcyded. In the olde testament me redeth that men were warned of four mennes names before the byrth of Ismaell Plaac Sampson & Jos lyas. In the newe testamente oonly of Johan baptyst & Cryst. ¶ **R.** And whan that was I doo / it bodeth & be tokened grete grace & merytes & ver tur. Soo me redeth in Remigius lpf. ¶ **Genesis.** This pere Sodoma was destroyed & bothe delyuered & wente in to Segor a lytyll Lyte there belyde an hylle. And was wyne dronke & in his sleep he gate Moab on his oldest doughter / & Amon on his other dous ghter. Of Moab come the Moabytes & of Amon þ̄ Amonytes. ¶ **R.** Of the place of Sodoma þ̄ is called now the dede see / loke aboue in the fyrst boke in the prouynce of Alya in the chapit re Judea that is the Jurpe.

 Abrahams seruaūt was sente for
 Abrahams. to fette a wyf for Vlaac/and brought

 ac. ¶ Petrus. lix. hebrewes layen that
 Lethura is a comune name / and is
 to vndstandyng I coupled. And sayth
 that this Lethura was Agar/and of
 a lemmen was made a wyf after the
 dech of Sarra / lest perauenture the
 olde may sholde haue be holden and
 reputed for a lechour yf he had wed-
 140 36 de ony ether than he had lepe by befo-
 re. Vlaac was fourty yere olde whan
 he wedded Rebecka that bare no chil-
 144 44 de twenty yere after. ¶ Augustinus li
 bro. xviii. Ette last Tryconydes was
 seyne a woman that hete Trycona/
 þ Grees calle hyr Mynerua & hete
 Pallas. Also of Pallas the Honde of
 Tracia there was she nourysshed/ey-
 ther of Pellas the Geant þ he slough
 ¶ R. here take hede that this Gean-
 te Pallas was a nother Geant than
 the Geant Pallas that Turnus E-
 uanders slough in Eneas tyme ¶ Au-
 gustinus vbi s̄. This mayde Pallas
 that hete Mynerua founde by many
 craftes/ & specyally wull crafte / and
 was lyghter trowed a goddesse. for
 me wyll well lytyll whens she came.
 200 60 Vlaac had twey twynnes born of Re-
 becha Elau and Jacob. ¶ Augusti-
 nus vbi s̄. The kyngdom of Argy-
 ues began in Grecia vnd Inachus
 Jlis fader. Jlis hete Jo also / and
 Inachus regned fyfty yere. And that
 kyngdom dured fyue hondred yere &
 four and fourty vnder .xiiii. kynges

vnto the last Acrypyus / hym slough
 Perli⁹ / though it were not by his wyll
 the .xii. yere of Delboza Juge of Il-
 raell. And therefore Perlius drad full
 soore & leste the Argus & tourned the
 kyngdom to the Mycenes. Abraham
 an hondred yere olde thre score and
 fyftene deyed & was buryed in Ebron
 ¶ Petrus. lxxvi. The langage of he-
 brewe and of the vslage of olde latyn
 is for to accompte the lasse nombre
 before the more/contrarye to the ma-
 ner that latyn vbleth nowe. for nowe
 we seyn in latyn Abraham lyued an
 hondred yere thre score and fyftene.
 But the hebrewes layen in this ma-
 ner. Abraham lyued fyftene thre score
 & an hondred yere. ¶ Aug⁹ de ci. dei
 li. xviii. feroneus Inachus sone was
 the seconde kyng of Argyues / & reg-
 ned sixty yere. This feroneus Argo-
 lycus yafe fyrst lawe ins Grees & ord-
 deyned that caules sholde be pleted to
 fore Juges. Therfor he called the pla-
 ce of domes. forum. after his owne na-
 me/his broders name was fogons. &
 this fogons coude moche Astrologye
 and ordeyned Temples to worshypp
 fals goddes/therfore he was reputed
 & taken for a god/among them that
 worshypped suche false goddes. His
 sylter was called Jlis/and Jo also.
 she saylled in to Egypte and taught
 meny there lettres and tylling of fel-
 des. Therfore after her dech she was
 honoured as a goddes among theym
 ¶ Pseudo. li. iii. Jlis ordeyned fyr-
 ste Trompes/therfore the Amalones
 called her ofte to bataylwarde with
 Trompes. ¶ R. That me redeth
 that Jupyter raupshed Jo/and on

hvt begate Epaphus. It is but a fa-
 ble and feynnyng of Poetes/for noble
 fame of eyther perlon. For Poetes
 feyne many noble perlonnes geten of
 Jupyter / for the kyn sholde be hol-
 de for the more gentyll and noble.
 But So was in the tyme of Plaac.
 and Jupyter was after in the tyme
 of Joine. Thessallus Grecus lone
 regned in Thessalia. Jacob after þ
 he had bought the fyrt byrthes and
 apply geten his faders blesyng by
 his moder counsayll/he wente downe
 in to Melopotania. ¶ Petrus .lxxiii.
 The fyrst byrthes were specyall pro-
 fytes and worlhypp that the eldest son
 he hadde in her kynrede vnto Aaron
 for they were clothed in specyall clo-
 thyng in offryng of sacryfye / & had
 her faders blesyng / & double porcion
 in festes and in delynge of herytage/
 and they sholde blesse her lasse. Ja-
 cob begate his fyrste sone Ruben on
 his wyfe Lya. This yere was a lypyll
 flode in Achaia that hete Atica / that
 londe was vnder Dgiges the kyng þ
 renued the Lyte Atthen and buylde
 Elentis. This yere Jacob four score
 yere olde and enleuen begate Joseph
 on Rachell. ¶ Petrus .lxxiiii. Whan
 the fourtene yere were doo / in the whi-
 che Jacob serued for his wyues. Laban
 made couenaunt with hym that
 all the speckled lambes & kyddes that
 sholde be ewed durynge his couenaunt/
 sholde be Jacobs mede / and all that
 were of oo colour whyte or black / shol-
 de be Labans owne. Therfore Jacob
 toke grene yerdes of poplers of almo-
 de trees / and of platans and pylled
 of the rynde in some place of the yer-

des / and in some place pylled hem Anno
 not / and soo he made the yerdes spe-
 ckled and made hem in the weterynge
 place befoze þ shepes eye when they
 sholde conceue / for they shold concey-
 ue lambes lyke to the shadowodes þ
 they sawe of Rammies in the myroure
 of the water in the conceuyng. And
 for they sholde not all be speckled lestte
 the gyle were knowen / therfore in the
 fyrste conceuyng tyme he leyde soo
 yerdes / but not in the later concey-
 uynge tyme. And soo Jacob founde
 a newe maner tomyng of kynde with
 kyndely craft to fyght ayenst kynde.
 ¶ R. Loke more of this mater aboue
 li. ci. c. p. i. Whan Jacob was come
 ayene with his wyues and childery er
 he came to his fader twelue yere befo-
 re the deth of Plaac. Joseph sixtene
 yere olde was solde in to Egypte to
 one that hete Putephar that was E-
 nunchus & mayster of Pharoos knygh-
 tes. ¶ Trevisa. Eunuchus is he that
 is gelded / and suche were somtyme
 made wardens of ladyes in Egypte.
 ¶ Augustinus super Genesim. This
 Putephar was not soo Eunuchus as
 they that were gelded in her childe-
 hode / for he hadde wyfe and childer
 and Joseph had wedded his dough-
 ter / but this Putephar sawe that Jo-
 seph was fayre / and bought hym for
 to mysuse hym. Therfore god made
 this Putephar so colde / that he mygh-
 te neuer after haue to doo fleshely
 with his owen wyfe / noo more than
 though he were Eunuchus I gelded.
 And therfore as he þ was moost wor-
 shipfull / he was made byshop of god
 helyopolis. Apis the .iii. kyng of Ar

¶ Harro telleth why he was called Serapis & seith that the chiste that he was put in / was called Seron in grewe / & therfore Apis was named Seronapis / and afterwarde by withdra wyng of lettres as me vseth he was called Serapis. That whyte speckled ore þ̄ meny of Egypte / for it was worshypped a tyue / it was called Apis / & whan þ̄ ore was dede / they ordeyned hem a nother ore that was also whyte speckled & tenderly nourysshed and worshypped. ¶ Hug. c. Apes. That Bole here Apis þ̄ was wonte to come out of the Ryuer Nylus / & warne by his pleyng & startyng what was to comyng. ¶ Petrus. Some telle that euery yere in Serapis feste / come vp a Bole out of the Ryuer Nylus / and had a whyte marke in the right shol-
der shapen as a newe mone. And whan the Egypcyans came to hym with all maner musyke & myrthe / þ̄ Bole was lyfte vp in to the eyer as it

were with Jolyte. And with the meo-
upng & styntyng of that Bole / the Egypcyans meoued and stynte vpon the erthe / but þ̄ Bole vanysshed out of theyr syght that same dape. Therfore þ̄ Egypcyans worshypped þ̄ Bole for that man Apis / and a Lowe in stede of Plis that woman / & a Bole also for Jupyter. Therfore it was a grete abhomynacion amonge the Egypcyans to slee nete or ete ther fleshe. Argus the fourth kyng of Argues began to regne & regned six and forty yere. In his tyme Grees had lede brought out of other londes and gan to ere and lowe / and haue corne tyllled therinne. ¶ Jacob an hondred yere olde and seuen and forty blesyd his childery / and yaf to eueryche of them his blesyng / and deyed & was enoynted & kepte thryfty dayes / and atte last born in to Ebron and buryed there in the double graue. ¶ Petr⁹. It was the maner of mysbyleued men for to kepe a dede bodye nyne dayes without oynment and make sorowe for hem nyne dayes / and washe the bodyes nyne dayes for to wytte whether the soule were a palyed or noo. Afterwarde they kepte the bodyes forty dayes enoynted. But it was the maner of Jewes for to kepe dede bodyes seuen dayes without oynment / and afterwarde thryfty dayes enoynted. ¶ Augustinus li. bro decimo octaua. He sayth that Prometheus Rapetus lone and Athlas the Astronomer his broder made men so sayth Quidius in magno. Netheles that is layd / for of men that were vnconnyng & boystous as beestes /

they made connyng men and wyle.
Plydorus. xiii. Also for me redeth þ
 they made ymages of men goo and
 walke on the grounde by a certayne
 crafte. Also these fonde fyrst a ryng of
 prou & closed therein a petyous stone
 and called it a nayle/for as the nay
 le is closed in the flesshe/so is suche a
 stone closed in the metall. **H**ug. ca.
 Annulus. Annulus is a ryng sayd of
 anus & ers. for somtyme theues and
 mansleers whan they were taken shol
 de here an ape on her necke and holde
 her mouth atte apes ers/ but this fou
 le vslage ceaced / & theues mansleers
 whan they were taken shold here ryng
 ges of prou on her fyngres. And ther
 fore gentylmen for to haue dyuersyte
 & dystyncion from suche bybours/
 made hem rynges of golde or of syl
 uer. **P**lydorus li. xix. in fine. **G**en
 tylmen vled her rynges of syluer & of
 golde on the fourth synger that is cal
 led the leche/by cause of more heygh
 tyng & fayrenesse / for in that synger
 is a veyne that stretcheth to the hert.
 But Romayns hadde rynges of the
 comune tresorpe/gentylmen had ryng
 ges/and other had solidi / that were
 hole & sounde. free men of blood vled
 rynges of golde / fre men that came
 of bonde men vled rynges of syluer/
 but bonde men vled rynges of prou.
 Somtyme it was a grete dyffama
 cion for a man to vle mo rynges than
 one. **A**ugustinus de ci. This Pro
 motheus had a broder þ hete Athlas
 & was an Astronomer/therefore men
 feyned that he bare heuen. Also a gre
 te hylle in Affryca hete athlas/by this
 man Athlas name/& the lewde peo

ple wene that that hylle here vp heuen Anno
Petrus. He sayth that Trycolom⁹
 wente that tyme in his thyp þ was **Jacob.**
 peynted with a dragon in to Grece/
 and made there more crafte of tyllyn
 ge of feldes. Also þ tyme Ceres that
 woman þ the Grees calle Demetra
 without Instrumentes that she fonde
 vp of eerynge crafte / she fonde also
 vp melures of whete/for before they
 deled whete by hulples small or grete
R. After that tyme Grees began
 to haue tylthe of corn so sayth Plydo
 rus li. v. **J**oseph an hondred yere **Joseph.**
 olde & ten deyed in Egypte/and was
 enoynted with swete oynementes / &
 kepte vnto þ goynge of the childern of
 Israell oute of Egypte an hondred
 yere & .xliiii. in the whiche tyme the
 Hebrewes serued the Egypcyans. Al
 so as Josephes brethern deyed euery
 che after other / they were burped in
 Ebron. Netheles afterwarde her bos
 nes were born in to Sychem with Jo
 sephes bones / that place here nowe
 Neapolis the Cyte of Samaritanes
 And so from that tyme that Jacob
 come in to Egypte/vnto þ tyme that
 the Hebrewes the childern of Israell
 wente out of Egypte were two hon
 dred yere and fyftene.

Amonophis in his tyme Moyles was born. ¶ Iohanes li. lxxdo. This Pharao hated the childer of Israell / for vertue of wytte / for connyng of tra- uayll / for plente of rycheſſe / and for fayrenelle of childern. Therfore he bethought hym ſellyche & gylefully to bere a downe y childern of Israell & holde hē lowe / leſt they wold multiply to faſt & aryſe ayenſt hē. Alſo he put vpon them charges of many maner werkes / for to make biente tyle / for to dygge dyches about the rennyng ge ſtremes of the Ryuer of Salus / & for to bere ſen & claye. And yaf hem nought to mete but ſmall chaſte / for he wolde ſo ouercome hem with tra- uayll & with hunger / that they ſholde haue no wyll for to lygge by theyr wy- ues / & ſo it ſhold folowe y childre ſholde faylle. Alſo one y was a wryter of holy lettres / & wyll what was to come / warned Pharao kyng of Egyp- te / that one ſholde be born of the he- brewes / that ſholde bere downe the pryncypate of Egyppte / and aryſe the kynde of Israell / & make hem full grete. Therfore it was comaunded y the men childern of Israell ſholde be ſlayne whan they were born. ¶ Pe- trus. But yet for all this the people multiplyed faſt / & Pharao comaun- ded the mydwyues of Egyppte y they ſholde ſlee all the men childern of he- brewes / & kepe the mayde childern. for he helde women kynde well feble to be rebell. And natheles well lykyn- ge of lecherye to the Egypcyans / and whan Pharao myght not ſo haue his wyll / he commaunded to throwe the men childern in to a Ryuer anone as

they were born. He troweth that for y ſynne the Egypcyans felle in to y errour for to woulthyp an oxe / y they called Apis in ſtede of god. ¶ Gen. Therfore Moyles was hydoe thre monethes whan he was born. but atte laſt he was done in a ſcaf of rycheſſes ſhapen as a lypyll boot glued well a- bout & throwen in to y Ryuer. Than Thermut Pharoos doughter ſonde hym & toke hym vp of y water / & ma- de hē as it were her owne ſone & cal- led hym Moyles. ¶ Joſephus li. lxxdo Moyles is a name made of two na- mes of grewe / of moy / y is a water / & elis y is ſaued / & ſo Moyles is ſayd as he y is ſaued by water. Alſo this childe Moyles hated all the wymens breaſtes of the Egypcyans / & wolde lu- ke no womans breaſte of the Egypcy- ans / but he was ſlyly brought to his owne moder / & ſhe fedde hym. And whan he was thre yere olde / god al- myghty made hym ſo fayre of ſhap / & of ſtature / that whan he was born by ſtretes / all y were about hym leſte of her werke and occupacyons for to loke and beholde on that childe were they neuer ſo ſterne ne angry. Than on a daye Thermut Pharoos dou- ghter broughte the childe to Pharao. for he ſholde ſee the childe / and ma- ke hym as it were his owne ſone. Than the kyng hadde wonder of the fayrenelle of the childe / and toke his owne crowne / in the whiche the yma- ge of Juppter was grauen / and ſette it on the childes hede / but the chil- de anone threwe downe the crowne / & trade thereon ſpytoully with his fete / and there ſtoode one that was god.

Eleopoles preest and cryed and sayd /
 this is that childe that our god bade
 vs slee / that we drede no more / and
 wolde anone haue slayne the childe.
 But there was a wyle man & layd /
 that the childe had to doo by vncon-
 nyng of childehode / and soo he saued
 the childe. ¶ Petrus li. ii. In euyden-
 ce of this exculacion of þ childe / were
 brennyng coles broughte before the
 childe Moyses / and anone he put hem
 in his mouth & skalded the poynt of
 his tonge / the Hebrewes crowed that
 by cause therof he had afterwarde a
 lette in his tonge. This childe Moy-
 ses was so fayre that men that behel-
 de hym / toke so grete hede to the fay-
 renes of hym / that they put of all an-
 gre & teene / and toke hede to the fay-
 renes of the childe. He sayth that a-
 bout this tyme Hercules ouercome An-
 theus in wrastlyng. ¶ Joseph⁹ li. ii.
 The Ethiopes blue men warred vpon
 Egypte / and the dyuynours had
 answerd that they sholde take a leder
 of Hebrewes and vnnethe they gate
 Moyses & made hym her leder and
 capytayne. Moyses was connyng in
 dedes of bataylle & forloke the waye
 by the water Nilus & ladde his hooft
 by a wylde ruelle that was full of ser-
 pentes. Netheles he put Liconias by
 nyght ayenst the serpentes. Liconie
 be byrdes of the londe of Egypt that
 haten and destroyen serpentes and be
 mylde ynough to mankynde. And so
 came vnware vpon the Ethiopes / &
 closed theym in a Ryall Lyte Saba.
 Afterwarde Cambyses the kyng cal-
 led that Lyte Meroen after his sylter
 name. That Lyte is full stronge by

cause of walles of dyches and watres
 that renne about that Lyte / and is
 sette bytwene the Ethiopes and the
 Egypcyans vpon the Ryuer Nilus. ¶
 Charvis þ kynges doughter of Ethi-
 opes lawe the fayrenes of Moyses / &
 delyuered hym the Lyte vpon a coue-
 nauit that he sholde wedde her to wyf
 ¶ Petrus libro secundo. This is that wo-
 man of Ethiopia / for þ which Marye
 and Aaron stroot with Moyses
 in deserte / whan Moyses wolde torne
 agayne in to Egypte / his wyf wolde
 not assente. Therfore Moyses as a
 man that was connyng in the cours
 and worchyng of the sterres and pla-
 nettes / made twey rynges / one of
 mynde / and a nother of forgetyng-
 nelle / and kepte the ryng of mynde
 with hym selfe / and toke his wyfe
 the ryng of oblyuon / and soo he tor-
 ned home agayne. ¶ Genesis.
 That tyme whan Moyses vlyted
 his bretheren in the londe of Jeth-
 sen / he slough a man of the Egyp-
 cyans and hydde hym in the sande /
 for he hadde smyten a man of the He-
 brewes. On the morne a man of the
 Hebrewes / putte that ayenst Moyses
 berde / and Moyses dradde sore / and
 auoyded for drede in to the londe
 of Madyan / and wedded Zephora
 a preestes doughter of that londe /
 and gate on hyr Serlay and Elpe-
 ser. ¶ Petrus libro secundo. This
 preeste was prymate in the londe of
 Madyan aboute the reede see / his
 propre name was Raquell / and had
 twey surnames Jethero and Lynes-
 us and had seuen doughters that we-
 re herdes and kepte beestes / for that

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offyce of keepng of beestes was that tyme ordeyned for women & specyally in the londe of Trogodytes. The kyngdom of Athenes began vnder Cyropis. fables telle þ on his wyfe Latona. Apolyn lorde of wytte & of wyledom was geten by Jupyter. Deucalion began to regne in Thessalia/ in his .xii. yere was þ thyrde partyculer flood & the brennyng vnder Pheeton. ¶ Aug^o li. xviii. This flood destroyed a grete parte of Grece. Ther many men fled in to shyppes to Deucalion kyng of Thessalia & were saued. Deucalion occupped þ tyme the mount Pernalus/ for this hadde Poetes feyned þ Deucalion & his wyf Pyrra threwe downe stones & arered men ¶ Plidor^o li. xiii. c. lxi. Whan Ryuers waxen ouer mesure/ they do not only harme in the arplyng/ but the bode & betoken harme þ shall come afterwarde. ¶ Diosi^o li. ii. Also the sonne þ tyme brennte not oonly Ethiopia/ blewe mennes londe/ but it brennte also þ londe of Scicia so greuouly þ men myghte not endure/ & bycause herof myþbleued men feyned þ fable of phetou

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Moses. iiii. score yere old with his broð Aaron four score yere olde & thre/ spake to Pharao kyng of Egypte/ for he holde depyuer god almyghtyes people & lette hem do sacrefyce to god. But Pharao was fast & harde in his Malycie/ and wolde not suffre the people go/ wherfore Egypt was smyten with ten grete wretches & punysshmentes. ¶ Au

gustin^o li. xviii. That tyme that god toke wreche in Egypte / some of the Egypcyans dradde lest Egypte sholde haue fynally be destroyed/ & wente in to other londes / & so one Cyrops saylled in to Grece & buylde the Cytte Atthen/ that was called afterwarde Athenes ¶ R. Loke more of Atthen in the fyrste booke. c. Grecia scilicet Alladia. Netheles Coyntheus that fyrst was named Spyrta was buylde spue yere before Atthen. ¶ Petrus li. bro scdo. There were many wretches in Egypte/ without the ten grete wretches/ therfore some dayes in the Kalender/ be called dayes of Egypte/ by cause that in tho dayes felle wretches in Egypte. Of the whiche dayes we sette in the Kalender but in euery moneth tweyne/ in mynde of þ wretches that god toke in Egypte. Neuerthesles there were many moo wretches taken in Egypte. It is not to be demed ne crowed though the Egypcyans were connyng in knowleche of the sterres & planetes/ that they founde that these dayes were peryllous and forboode / in begynnyng of werkes and of wayes/ and in blood lettyng. Than whan Moses was four score yere olde/ he ledde the folke of Israell out of Egypte in the same daye of the yere that Jacob & his childer entred in to Egypte/ whan Israell wente out of Egypte the Moneth was .xv. dayes olde/ & was four hondred yere & .xxx. after that Abraham went out of Carram that was in Mesopotania / in þ lond of bybeste. whan Israell went out of Egypte / aboute .vi. C. men/ and bare with hem Josephs bones/

and the boones of his .xi. bretheren/
 that ben called Patryarches & buryed
 hem in Sychem soo sayth Iherom.
 Israell toke with them meele & flou
 re/spronge with oyle / and vled that
 thrytty dayes. A pyler of a clowde
 wente before Israell & ladde hem by
 daye/and a pyler by nyght/whan Is
 raell wente out of Egypte/the reede
 see opened & lette hem passe/and dren
 ched all the Egypcians that toke the
 same waye in the openyng of the see
 for to pursue. ¶ Josephus. The ope
 nyng of this see shall not be vntro
 wed/for me redeth that the see Pan
 philicum opened before kynge Alexan
 der Macedo/and also before his hooft
 whan he pursued Darius. ¶ Petrus
 li.ii. The water of this see is not ree
 de of kynde/but it is dyed of reede cly
 ues and erthe that lyeth there about.
 Therfore also there be founden ree
 de precious stones/and there is foun
 den sharpe vermylon. This see is de
 parted in twayne / that one parte is
 called the see Persicus / and that o
 ther the see Arabicus. ¶ Johannes
 lib^o tercio. Thrytty dayes after that
 Israell wente oute of Egypte / they
 faylled corn/and our lorde gaue hym
 curlews Hanna and water of the sto
 ne in Oreb / yet that place is watred
 with rayne as god gaue water that
 tyme by Moyses honde. Thre monethes
 after that Israell wente oute of
 Egypte. Moyses wente vp in to the
 hylle / and fasted forty dayes and
 forty nyghtes/and receyued the lawe
 /and seuen monethes he made the
 Tabernacle/by ensample that was
 shewed hym on the hylle/and soo the

Tabernacle was arered the fyrst day
 of Aprille in the seconde yere of her
 outgoynge of Egypte. from this tyme
 me to the buyldyng of the Temple in
 Iherusalem / is compred four hon
 dred yere and four score. Also this tyme
 as some men telle. Yo that womā
 wente from Argyues in to Egypte &
 there she was called Ylis / and was
 wedded to Thelegon / and hadde a
 childe that was called Epaphus.
 ¶ Petrus libro quarto capitulo deci
 mo sexto. After the seconde yere of the
 outgoynge of Egypte / twelue clypes
 were sente to the londe of byhelle / &
 come agayne for grutchyng of the
 people and despeyr of wanhope / the
 childer of Israell were forbodey to
 goo forther. Therfore they touned
 agayne in to wyldernesse / and were
 there punysshed forty yere. and none
 of them entred in to the londe of by
 helle oute take Caleph and Josue.
 The sixthe yere after the outgoynge
 of Egypte Eryston buylded þe Tem
 ple of Appollyn Delphicus. Also
 that yere Cranaus the seconde of A
 thenes began to regne / and regned
 nyne yere / his doughter was called
 Athys / of hyr Atthya that londe
 hath the name. ¶ R. Loke before in
 the fyrste booke / ta^o Grecia scilicet
 Gladya. That tyme the Hebrewes re
 ceuyed lettres / and Grecia bynes.
 Also Lacedemon Semelis lone buyl
 ded Lacedemonia that Lyte and the
 ferth Eritonius of Scicionis. Ar^o
 chas kynge of the Argyues gaue his
 name to that londe Archadia and cal
 led after his owne name / but that
 londe Archadia hete rather Licionia

Egypte hete rather Acrea/and hath that name Egypte of one Egyptus þ regned therein . Danaus the tenth of Argyues regned fyfty yere. ¶ Quidius li.º. p.º. Danaus & Egyptus were twey brethern . And Danaus by his fyfty doughters slowe Egyptus fyfty sones in one nyght/out take one that sholde regne after him. Danaus doer of many euill dedes wente vp to the Argyues/ & by gyle put out Sreuelus that had ofte saued hē whyle he was neddy & outlawe and regned hym self. He croweth that in that tempest wente out by that man þ was called Liber pater & hete Dyonysius Bacchus Allo he made vp Argyues & pauē the Grekes vse of vynes. ¶ Augustinus de ciuitate dei. He sayth that the grete Mercurius was in that tyme/this Mercuriº was Māya Athlas dough/ter sone . This Mercurius was connyng in many craftes/ & there he was made amonge hem as he were a god but the grete Hercules was somdele later than he. ¶ R. This grete Hercules had a surname Dalaneº so sayth Marianº li. i. c.º. fyue hondred fourty & fyue . Allo this is þ Hercules that slough Bulyrus the Tyraūt so seyth Duide. ¶ Josephus. This Hercules wedded Ethea Affers doughter. Affer was Madyans sone . Therefore Hercules wente with Affer to wyne Libia / & that londe was than called Affryca by Affer the conquerours name. The fourty yere after the outgo

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ing of Egypt. Aaron an hondred yere olde & thre & twenty dyed in Dieb Allo the same yere Moses whan he had lyued fourty yere in Egypt/four

ty yere in Madyan / and fourty yere saue thrytty dayes in deserte/six score yere olde almost/he deyed in the hylle mount Abarim ayent Jerico that towne / and was burped of our lorde in the vayle of Moab.

Isolue Moses seruaūt ruled the people six and twenty yere so sayth Josephus. Netheles the scrypture rekened not the yeres Josue the fyrste yere of his leedyng/ tadde the people in to the londe of by heste . And the Ryuer flum Jordan opened and lette them passe/and Josue offred the Ester offryng and reuewed the Circumcyson that was forboien fourty yere in wpldernesse. And whan they ete of the fruyte of þ londe/than Manna faylled that had dured fourty wynter. ¶ Petrus. Eusebius in his Cronycle sayth/that that yere was Jubileus the yere of grace/ and was the one and fyftpest yere of grace/as though there were a passed from the begynnynge of the woilde two thousande yere fyue hondred and fyfty/that is one and fyfty tymes fyfty yere/than for to take of euery fyfty yere one yere of grace / it cometh to one and fyfty yeres of grace. But by the seuenthy there were passed many moo yeres . ¶ And Beda foloweth the Hebrewes/and proued that there lacked seuen yere of two thousande fyue hondred and fyfty. The fyrst yere of Josue Eruthonius the fourthe kyng of Athene was the fyrst that brought Charpote in to Grece as me

sayth. Netheles before were Charpottes in other londes. ¶ Augustinus li. xviii. This ordeyned fyrst pleyes to Apolyn and to Mynerua. Also that tyme Bulyrus the Tyraunt kyng of Egypte vled his Tyrannye on his gelytys / for he slough men and offred hem to goddes. He sayth that he was Neptun^s lone begeten on Libia Epaphus doughter. Jolue departed the londe of Palestynes to the Jewes. Also that tyme fenix & Cadmus twey brethern of Thebe that is in Egypte wente in to Syria / & regned at Tyrus and at Sydon two Cytres that so were called. Jolue kyng of Creta rauylshed Europa the doughter of Agenor kyng of Libia. Afterwarde Altrius kyng of Creta wedded Europa to wyfe. ¶ Augustinus li. xviii. Jupyter on Europa that he rauylshed / he gate Radamantus Sarpedon & Myrnos that regned after him in Creta. ¶ R. Netheles Marianus li. i. c. lxi. sayth that Altrius on Europa begate these thre lones. ¶ Plydor^s li. xiiii. Agenor kyng of Libia begate thre lones. Siler. fenix. Cadmus / & one doughter that was called Europa / whan Jupyter had rauylshed her he put hyr in his schyp þ was J peynted with a Bole. And therfore poetes feyne that Jupyter was tourned in to a Bole. Agenor had his thre lones that they sholde goo seche theyr sylter that was so rauylshed & ladde awaye and forbade hem to come agayn / but yf they brought theyr sylter with hem And by cause they coude not fynde her / they drad the wrath of her fader Siler abode in a countree & called it

Scilicia after his owne name. And fenix abode in fenicia. But Cadm^s chose his exilyng in Grecia / there he folowed the stepe of an oxe / and come to a countree & abode there & called it Boecia Oxlonde. Afterwarde he buylded there the Cytte of Thebe. ¶ R. Loke more herof in the fyrst booke capitulo Grecia. ¶ Augustinus li. xviii. Jupyter regned in the Flonde Creta / and his fader Saturnus was put out and wente to Italpe. ¶ Henricus. This was a wyched man and a grete warryour / & conquered Grece There after his deth the Grekes þ were full of ielnynges / helde hym god of heuen / & named hym god of goddes / for his grete power and myght. The men of Creta for he was buryed amonge hem / wolde speke of his byrcels. Therfore the Grees called hem lyers. ¶ Alexander in mith. De ray stoye sayh that Saturnus the fader / and Jupyter the lone had twey kyngdoms Joynyng togyder in Creta / and for endes & boundes of feldes was a batayll bytwene hem and Jupyter hadde the maystrye / & Saturnus was chaled out and wente in to Italpe / and there Janus the kyng receyued him to a parte of the Emppre by cause he couth skylle in bynes in reepnyng & in tyllynge of feldes / and he was called Saturnus of Sauristas that is plente / for he made grete plente in that londe. ¶ Eutropius. This Saturnus flemed his lone Jupyter oute of Grece to the endes of Tuscia not fer from the place of Rome / he hydde hym there in a place & called the place Saturnia after his

Anno. owne name/and after he called it La
 Abraham. cum/that is his hydyng place/there
 he taught boystous men to bylde/ere
 Jolue. and lowe and sette dynes. for before
 they lyued by Achorines/and dwelled
 vnder bowes & twygges wouen to ge
 der. Also this ordeyned paines of bral
 se/therfore the vplondelike men helde
 hym a god. ¶ R. And though poetes
 meane that Iuppyter gelded Satur
 nus/for he sholde not gete childern to
 supplante hym. Necheles the storye of
 Rome sayth that Saturnus gate pp
 cus in Italye. ¶ Alexander in mych.
 Other myghty Geantes founded to
 put out this Iuppyter/this Iuppyter
 was full cruell & destroubled the peas
 after that his fader was put out and
 ouercome the Geantes with gynnes
 of warre/mie feyned that he lyghened
 out Geantes. Petr^o. Jolue er he dy
 ed helde water on the erthe before the
 people/in token of the couenaut that
 was made bytwene god & the people

 de of a lowe in token of couenaunt
 made. ¶ Hug. caplo fedus. fedus þ
 is a couenaunt is sayd of feda a lowe
 that is slayn/as it were to mene that
 is blood þ breketh the couenaunt/shol
 de in that maner be shadde. ¶ Petr^o.
 But the hebrewes helde oute water
 in token that as the water is all shad
 de & nought I left/so he that breketh
 the couenaunt sholde be decd and all
 his kyn. Also men in olde tyme vled
 to arere & enhaunce sygnys & tokens
 that myght longe dure in mynde of
 hem that come afterwarde. And soo

some men arered & enhauced stonys &
 huples of stonys in mynde of coues
 ueuauntes.

¶ Othonpell.

Caplm. xvi.

After Jolues deth Israell ser
 ued Chulay kyng of Melopo
 tania. viii. yere. Necheles this
 viii. yere he acompted with Othonp
 els tyme Calephs broder by the he
 brewes. But the yeres of reste and of
 thraldome were acompted to gyder
 vnder Juges of Israell/the lothnesse
 of the acomptes wolde not stande in
 the hystorye. ¶ Augustinus li. xviii.
 About this tyme that woman Latho
 na bare Appolyn in to the flonde De
 los. ¶ R. But not that other appolyn
 Delphycus that had longe before he
 but that Appolyn that serued þ kyn
 ge Admetus with the latter Hercules
 He sayth that this Lathona was the
 same woman that hete Isis. Than
 Othonpell was leder of Israell four
 ty yere for to reken the forsayd. viii.
 yere of thraldome. Neptunus regned
 and was the fyfth kyng of Athene.
 Cadmus regned in the Lyte of The
 bes / of his doughter Semela was
 born Denys Bachus that was called
 also Liber Pater/that in the fre fader
 In his tyme was Lynus of Thebe
 in Egypte the grete chauntour in his
 floures. fenix buylde Bythinia that
 hete somtyme Mariandina. ¶ Plydo
 rus li. scdo caplo. v. And as fenix va
 ue the fenices some rede lettres. ¶ R.
 Therof loke more in the fyrst booke
 capitulo. xv. fenicia. ¶ Plydonus li
 bro secundo. The lettres of grace that

Cadmus yaf hym speleth wordes & stonidith for nombres. ¶ R. The letters of Grece from the fyrste to the tenth as A stonideth in ordre of A b c. so they stande for nombre amonge þ Grekes/for the fyrst standeth for one & the seconde for tweyne. & the thyrde for thre/and soo the fourth vnto the tenth. But the .xi. letter standeth for twenty/the .xii. for thrytty/the .xiii. for forty/and soo vnto an hondred for an hondred standest the .xix. lettre than the .xx. standeth for the one and twentyest for thre hondred / the .xxii. for four hondred. & so forth. ¶ Petrus Crafte & yle of yron was founden in Egypte. The dedes that me telleth of Demetra & of Day perlius mo/der befelle that tyme. And the Lyte Corynthy was buylded that tyme.

¶ Apoth.

Caplm. xvii.

Apoth was leder of Israell four score yere for to accomp/te .xviii. yere / in the whiche Israell serued Egion the fatte kynge of Moab. Also for to rebene one yere of Sangar the duc & leder that slough the six hondred men with a plowe share. This Apoth vled eyther honde for his right honde/and was Jeraes sone. Jhera was Semynus sone. ¶ Petrus. Some tellen that Semynus was a vyle persone of the lynge/nage of Benyamyn / and was ofte named in reprooue to all his offspringe/for he was so vyle and vnworthy Nacheles these hebrewes meene that these Semynus was Benyamyn/as though he were soo named by chaun/

gynge eyther withdrawynge of some what of the begynnyng of the name for where we sette Semynus / the hebrewes lette Jampyn that is a rynge that longeth to the right syde/and maye be layde Semynus in Latyn. Rycholomus came in a longe shyppe to Elenis / and deled there wheete. And Ditus kynge of Molos and of Tracia rauylshed Proserpina / hys hounde that was called Cerberus/ swolowed vp a man that was named Pypyton / that come with The/leus to rauylshe Proserpina. And the same hurde Cerberus wolde haue eten Theleus also. But Hercules came the meane tyme and laued hym. and therfore he was receyued in to helle. Acheus buylde Achaia. Denys Liber pater duke of Athene was born of Semela as some men saye and to ke Mylcerea of Perseus that slough that hoo: Gorgon/that was so fayre that she astonped men that behelde her fayrenesse. Also that tyme frigus and his syster Elles fledde the malys/ce & the purslyte of theyr stepdame/ and were drowned in the see that is called Elepontos. And for a wether was paynted in the lygne of her shyp therfore me feyned that the wether with the golden flees bare hem forth by the ayer. Laomadon the .viii. kynge of Scicions regned fyfty yere. Amphyon and Zephus regned in Thebe the Lyte of Grece/and put out Cadmus. Tros regned in Dardania. that is frilia/and warred afterwarde as penst Tantalus kynge of Athene for the rauellshyng of Gammedes. Of this Tros the Troyans haue her na

 was a full swyft hois of a woman þ
 was called Bellefrontis lhypp. Jon
 the strong man called the mey or A/
 thenes Jones by his owne name. De
 nys that hete Liber pater also / war/
 red with the Indes and buyded the
 Lyte Nylan. This Denys ordeyned
 fyrste women in his hooft with mey.
 Pelops fyrst kyng of Polopome⁹ was
 hede of the Olympies. Netheles after
 warde he was ayenst Troje & ouer/
 come of Dardanus. In Apoehes ty/
 me duke of Israell/the latter Hercu
 les a nother than we spake of before/
 was in his floures. ¶ Trogus. This
 Hercules was stronge and tamed the
 worlde & ouercome the Amalones &
 passed in to Inde and warred there/
 and ouercome the Trojans & war/
 red in Libia & was lorde of Spayne.
 ¶ R. This Hercules ouercome Anthe
 us the Geant of Libia/so sayth Duy
 de in magno li. viii. And slough Ge
 reon the Geant kyng of Spayne/&
 ladde his catell & his beestes thorough
 Italye in token of the maystrye And
 he begate the kyng Latyn on the dou
 ghter of Janus/& he slough a Lyon.
 He slough the serpente Ydra in þ wa
 ter Lerna. And he ranne a furlong at
 one breth/and he restored the tourna
 mentes & Joustes of mount Olymp/
 he ouercome the Centaures & pyght
 his pylers in the see atte Flondes Ga
 des/and he dyde twelue grete dedes.

Hercules.

¶ Treuisa/the Centaures were men
 or Thessalia/they were the fyrst that
 chastyled hoises and ledde hem with
 bydles & rode on horbaches ¶ Augul
 tinus li. xviii. And after his grete de/
 des he feile in a grete lekenesse / that
 was soo paynefull and loore that he
 myght not endure. Therfore he thre/
 we hym selfe in to a fyre & brent him
 selfe. ¶ R. Claudianus li. vi. de raptu
 Proserpine/et Virgili⁹ Eneydis. viii.
 Eciay Duidius metha. li. ix. Rekey
 the grete dedes that Hercules dyd/of
 the whiche dedes. The fyrst was the
 vycorpe that he had of the Centau/
 res. The seconde the slepyng and the
 hupldyng of Lyons in a wood that
 hyght Menia. The thyrde þ chalpyng
 of þ foules that hyght Arpyes. The
 fourch the takyng of the golden ap/
 ples out of the Dycharde of the lueny
 doughters of Athlas þ Geant/& the
 slepyng of the dragon þ kept þ place.
 The .v. the chepyng & þ tyeng of
 the grete houde Cerberus þ deuoured
 Perpteus in the rauellhyng of Proser
 pina. The .vi. þ beryng down of Dio
 mede kyng of Tracia that fedde his
 hoise with mennes fleshe. The .vii.
 the destroyng of Ydra the serpente in
 the water Lerna. The .viii. the ouer/
 comyng of Achelous that chaunged
 oftyme in to dyuerse lykenesse & shap
 pes. The .ix. the throwyng downe of
 Antheus the Geant of Libia þ toke
 ayen myght & strength as ofte as he
 touched the erthe. The .x. the slepyng
 of the catte that caste oute fyre of his
 mouth as me sayd. The .xi. þ slepyng
 of the booz in Archadia. The .xii. the
 beryng & holdyng vp of heuen whyle

Achlas the Geant rest hym whan he was wery. but in p. xiii. dede he dyd on a corlette of dyamer & deyed. Here take hede that these .xii. dedes that be acompted to Hercules sowneth p storye as it is told so doth the seconde of the lyon & the .xi. of the booz / eyther it pertteneth only of coueryng of the wes. & than the tale is a fable / but the menyng is ful of truth & of sochnesse So the thyrde of the Arppes and the fourth of the takyng & p rauellhyng of the golden apples. Eyther it toke neth & sowneth the storye I medled with a fable / so dooth all his other dedes of the twelue. Also here take hede it semeth that it is not all one Hercules that these .xii. dedes be ascrybed to. for Saynt Austyn de ci. dei libro xviii. ca. xiiii. sayth that it was a nother Hercules that these dedes be arected vnto / & a nother Hercules that ouercome Antheus the Geant in wraltelyng. And also Boecius in sine. iiii. libri de consolacione telleth that same of Antheus among the .xii. dedes of Hercules. Also Saynt Austyn vbi supra eciam ca. xix. sayth that there were many Hercules. And also Sampson for his wonder strengthe / was accounted Hercules. And frigus Dares in his boke of p batayll of Troye sayth that Jalon wanne the golden flees at Colchos had a surname and was called Hercules. Therfore Duidius metha. xiii. sayth. Menia vnder furt & the Trojans vader Hercules And Duidius .viii. metha. arreteth the slepyng of the booz of Archadia to Meleandrus. And also .vii. metha. he ascrybeth the chalpyng of the Arppes

to Boreas sones that hyghten Zoas & Calaius / therfore many wyle men telleth that Hercules is the lurname of noble men & stalworth that passeth other men gretely in boldenesse & in strength / & so it semeth all by kyndly menyng of that name / for Hercules is layd of Heros / that is a may & of cleos that is blys / as though Hercules were to menyng a blyfull may and glorpyous.

¶ Eusebius in Cronica. Apoth. Capitulum .xviii.

In Apoth tyme namely in grete fables were founden & meleyth that Jlopus foude fyrst tables for hyght & enhaunce kyndely sochnesse / for p pryupte of kynde sholde not be despyled / therfore kynde of thynges & by dpuerle maner of doynge he feyned names and worchyng of goddes. ¶ Alcyn in mitch. And soo he feyned that after the flood men come of stons & of trees / but that was feyned / for the maner of dwellyng of men in the olde tyme / for some wente about as they were bestes. ¶ Augustinus li. xviii. c. xiii. After Josues dech vnto the batayll of Troye fables were feyned in Grecia. As that Vulcanus in grete hete and brennyng of lecherie with Mynerua gate Erutonium foted as a dragon that is a fable and a Poetes feynyng and sawe. But the soch meanynge is that in the Lyte Athere was a Temple of Vulcanus and of Mynerua / in that Temple was a childe founde beclpypped aboute with a dragon / that betokened that

 brought theym whete it is a fable. Al
 so of Hypnotaurus that a beste closed
 in Laborpntus Dedalus howse / and
 whan men wente in to that howse/
 they were so begyled that they coude
 not come out. Also of Centaures that
 were medled of mankynde & of horse
 kynde. Also of Cerberus the hounde
 of helle that had thre hedes. Also of
 frirus and his syster Elle that were
 born of a wecher by the eyer & flew
 as foule. Also of Gorgon y strompet
 that she was heered with addres and
 tourned in to stones men that behelde
 hir. Also of Bellerofront that he was
 born of a fleynge horse with fethres &
 wynges/his horse was called Pega/
 sus. Also of Amphion that he pleed
 stones and drowe hem to hym with
 swetnesse of his harpyng. Also of De
 dalus the carpenter and his sone Pea
 rius y made hem wynges of fethres
 and fley as foules. Also of Antheus
 hym slough Hercules. Antheus was
 the sone of the erthe / therfore whan
 he felle downe he rose agayne with
 more strength. ¶ Plydorus li. xi. Also
 Geron the Geant kyng of Spayn
 that was slayne of Hercules / & was
 delcrued in thre lykenesses and shap
 pes/it is a fable. For there were thre
 bretheren so well acordynge togydres/
 that it semeth that they had one soule
 one wyfte & one wyll. Also the strom
 pettes Gorgons heered as serpentes

had one eye and tourned in to stones
 men that behelde them it is a fable.
 But ther were thre slytres all of one
 fayrenesse / men that behelde them
 they made hem as styllle and as sted/
 fast as stones. Also the thre Serenes/
 that were halfe maydens halfe foules
 and hadden wynges and talentes as
 hawkes / and one of hem sange that
 other pyped & the thyrde harped and
 drowe to hem warde shypmen y sayl/
 led in the see to shyp wrake it is a fa
 ble. But there were thre hoores that
 broughte men y dled hem in to myl/
 chyfe/and therfore me seyth that they
 broughte hem in to shypbruche. Also
 that me seyneth that Scylla was a
 woman beclayped aboute with hedes
 of houndes and with grete berkyng
 of houndes that is sayd / for the wa/
 wes of y see Siculus that flasheth &
 wassheth vpon that rocke that is cal/
 led Scilla maketh suche maner noyse
 men that sayllyeth therby be so aferde
 that they wene that the wawes berke
 that wasshen on that rocke. So they
 feyne that the serpent Ydra with .ix.
 hedes / and yf one hede were smyten
 of/than grewe vp thre for one. The
 soch tale is that Ydra was somtyme
 a place that wonderly and perplouly
 caste vp water/and yf oo water were
 stopped the water brake vp in many
 places and wapes. Hercules sawe that
 and destroyed the swolowe and clo/
 sed all the wapes/therfore me seyneth
 that he destroyed Ydra the serpente.
 ¶ Plydorus lib^o primo capitulo. xxxi.
 fables be sayde of fando/that is spe
 kyng/not for they be sothe in dede/
 but feyned in spekyng. Doetes brough

te in fables for thre skylles/for lphynge of talkyng and of fayr spekyngeluche be the fables of Plantus and of Therencius & fables that be comonly tolde. Also for helthe and enhaunchyng of kynde so me sayth that Vulcanus halteth/for the fyre is nener euey Vulcanus is feyned god of fyre. So Chymera is feyned a best of thre maner shappes and kyndes and betokeneth the ages of mankynde. The fyrst yowth of a man is cruell as a lyon. The seconde age of manhode is sharpe of sight as a goot/eyther synketh by lechery as a goot. The thyrde age is elde and boweth as a dragon and wasteth alwaye / and so the fable of Ppocentaurus that was feyned medled of hors kynde & of mankynde betokeneth the swyfte passyng of mannes lyf. Also fables be feyned for derke fayr and mystyall spekyng of thewes. As whan me speketh and feyneth that thynge that can no reason speke to hem selfe that by the tale that is feyned the soth betokenyng be remeoued to that that is sothly done in dede. Soo Diace speketh of the moule and of the wessyle. And Plopus and Auenet of the fox and of the wolfe and in libro Iudicij of the trees of Lybanus and so speketh Demostenes of wolues and houndes feyned for the delyueraunce of the aduocates and lawers. ¶ R. And that is that Saynt Austyn sayth in his boke de mendacio. Fables he sayth though they haue no sothnesse in hem self. Ne theles they represente and enduce to mannes mynde sothnesse that they betokene and sygneyfe. ¶ Augustinus

libro tercio capitulo tercio. By auctoryte of the Romaynes it was affirmed þ the goddesse Venus was Eneas as moder / and that god Mars was Romulus fader. But I and so Darro byleue it not/the wyter of the storpes of Rome that sayth pryuely it were prouffitable to Cytelyns that stronge men and oyped trowed that they were begoten of goddes though it were fals. That in that maner the mennes hertes sholde be the bolder & haue trust in the lygnage of goddes and auenture them to the gretter dedes & doo myghtely with the more boldnesse in trust of gracypous ende by cause they holde them selfe of the kynde of goddes. ¶ Alexander in myth. Macrobius super sompniū Scipionis sayth/that some fables be feyned by cause of lphynge / luche of Menandre and Therencius / and luche longeth not to phylosophres. And some fables be feyned by cause of prouffyte in excytyng and comfote / in the whiche fables the mater that me speketh of eyther the ordre of tellynge of þ thynge that is feyned is feynnyngly tolde that is to vnderstande/oo fals is tolde by a nother fals. Soo it fareth in Esopus fables and in Anians fables also / & these fables be not pertynent ne longe not to phylosophres. Also some tyme a soth sawe is tolde by a feyned tale & luche were the feynnynges of Esodus and of Dipheus whan they spake of dyuerse dedes of kynde of goddes and luche a tale is no fable but a tale lyke a fable. And yf luche a tale is tolde by lykenesse of foule thynge and harlottrye than it lenz

 Abrahā. dypunes/but suche as be tolde by ly/
 Apoth. kenelle of fayrenelle & of honelle per
 teyneth to philosophres. So Plato fey

 arafe from deth to lyue & tolde many
 thynges of þ euerlastyng lyf of man/
 nes loule. ¶ R. And Boete feyned þ
 phylosophye appered to hym in the ly
 kenelle of a mayde. In this maner
 maye a dypune vse eniamples mane/
 rely in his talkyng & spekyng. ¶ Pe/
 trus. In Apoches tyme the latter Ap
 pollo þ was Latonaes sone as þ Gre
 kes telle foude vp the arte of phylyke
 & made harpes. ¶ R. Nacheles Plydo
 rus li. iiii. ethi. sayth / & Mercurius af/
 terwarde in Gedjons tyme put .viii.
 strenges to the harpe that was before
 fouden / & he put to the strenges and
 streyned hem in this maner. The Ry
 uer Nylus had be vp & beflowed the
 londe / & was ebbid in to the chanell
 agayn. Than laye many bestes dede
 on the felde / & amonge other laye a
 dede snayle / whan this snayle was ro
 ted the senewes were streyned within
 the skynne of þ snayles housle & low/
 ned as þ wynde blew theron easely
 theron & softely / than Mercurius to/
 ke hede therto / & made an harpe to þ
 lykenelle therof & gaf it to Diphous
 the harper. ¶ Treuila. I rede amon
 ge the wondres of Inde þ snayles be
 there so grete & soo huge that a may
 maye be herbeured in a snayles housle
 ¶ Petrus. Also that tyme the forlaid
 Mercurius foude vp an Instrument
 of musyke / & called it Siringa & is
 made of rede & of pypes & hete Sirin
 ga by the name of þ womay Siringa

that was Cadmus wyfe / she wente a
 waye from her hulbonde for loue of
 musyke & of melodye. It is vncertay
 ne whiche Mercurius this was / whe/
 ther Mercurius Hermes or Mercurius
 Trimegistus the phylosopher or the
 grete Mercurius. for Iosephus spe/
 keth of thre of the whiche euery was
 called Mercurius. ¶ Plyd li. v. Also
 that tyme in Grece was foude vp an
 Instrumente of musyke þ hete chorus
 ¶ Petrus. Strabus sayth þ þ Instru/
 ment with twey pypes by one pype þ
 the eyer gooth in / & by that other the
 lowne gooth out. ¶ Augustinus de ci.
 li. xviii. c. xiii.

¶ Delbora.

DElbora that woman was a
 prophetyste of the lygnage of
 Efram / this Delbora with
 barache of the lygnage of Neptalyu
 ruled the peple of Israell .xl. yere for
 to reken. xx. yere in the whiche Jaby
 byng of Lanaan pursued Israell / in
 her tyme the kynges of Argyues say/
 led that had regned .v. C. yere & .xl.
 that was from the fyrst Inachus to
 the fyrst Pelops tyme kyng of Pelos/
 ponensis / & than the kyngdon corned
 to þ Decenes. That tyme began the
 kyngdom of Laurentines in Italpe.
 After the deth of Janus & of Satur
 nus þ had longe regned there / there
 regned Prycus Saturnus sone. ¶ Au
 gustinus de ci. dei vbi s̄. About þ tyme
 dyed Denyle þ hete also Liber pater /
 þ warred in Inde / & had in his hooft
 mey & womey medled togydres. Nas
 cheles atte laste Perleus slough hym.

his golden burpels is yet seen in Thel
salia helydes Appolyn Delphicus in
moüt Pernalus. Myda the riche kyn
ge regned þ tyme in frigia. Of hym
poetes scryned many thynges/as it is
wrytten in mytholog. fulgencii et Alex
andri. And Ilius Appolyns sone byl
de Ilium in Troye.

Gedyon that hete Iheroboall
was leder of Israell .xl. yere
for to reken .viii. yere that
Israell serued Madyanptes & Ama
lehytes. ¶ Josephus sayth that the
Lyte Tprus was buylde in Gedyons
tyme aboute two hondred yere & .xl.
before Salamons Temple. ¶ Petr^o.
Mynos kyng of Creta Jupytters so
ne occupped the see that tyme / & gaf
lawe to the men of Creta . That tyme
the stronge man Theseus Egeus
þ kynges sone of Athene slough My
notaurus in the tomanente/therfore
men of Athene that were trybutarpe
before were quytted & free of all try
bute . Mynotaurus was a grete may
of stature / & therwith all right mygh
ty and stronge & full delyure in wral
telyng and was kyng of Mynos Bo
cher. Therfore he was called as it we
re Mynops taurus that is a Bocher.
About that tyme Theseus rauysshed
Elypn/and hyr two brethern Castor
and Pollux fette hyr and brought hir
agayne /and toke Theseus moder &
chaled Theseus cut of þ contree. Also
we sayth that Dedalus was that tyme
in his floures. This Dedalus ma
de byrdes of metall by crafte & spyry

te closed for to flee aboute . We sayth Anno
also that he made ymages that moe
ued hem selfe/he was the fyrst that de
parted fete of ymages a cwynne/for
oher men Joyned he togydres. ¶ Ply
dorus li. ix. This Dedalus had a ne
uwe called Perdix & toke him to his
lore. This Perdix was subtyll & cons
nyng of crafte & bethought hym in
his ymagynacion to haue some spede
full maner of dypung of tymbre & to
ke a plate of yron and fyled it & ma
de it cothed as the rygge boone of a
fyshe and than it was a sawe . Also
this childe bethought hym and made
the fyrste compas and wrought ther
with. Therfore his mayster Dedalus
toke grete enuye to the childe & thre
we hym downe of an hyghe towre &
brake his necke . Therfore Dedalus
with his sone Pcarus at Creta fleygh
and come in to Scicilia /and there he
made fyrst Laborintus oher wyle cal
led Amale. ¶ Petr^o. for Dedalus flee
awaye soo wyftely after he hadde
slayn his neuewe /me feyneth that he
flew with wynges as a byrde by the
ayer. ¶ Plydorus libro decimoquinto
Laborintus is a maner buyldynge
wonderly buylde with daungorous
walles/therin Mynotaurus was clo
sed /yf ony man wente thyder in with
out a clewe of threde it were full har
de to fynde away out /they that open
the pates sholde here dredefull thon
dryng. ¶ Hug. capitulo labor. We go
the a downe as it were by a hondred
grees or steppes /there be also in der
henesse wonder manye dpuerle wyng
dnynges & tournynges /and suche fou
re be in this worlde of suche houses.

& myght neyther fynde/for to shewe
the deuocion & wyll þe they had for to
seche for to be sene seche belesely in an
other elemente þe they myght not fyn-
de in erthe/men of Athene henge vp
roopes in the eyer & men tottred ther-
on & moeueth hyder & thyder. for they
wolde be seen seche the bodyes in the
eyer aboute þe erthe/& whan men felle
of the tottres & were hurt loze it was
ordeyned among hem þe ymages lyke
to þe bodyes shold be sette in þe tottres
& moeue & tottre in stede of he þe were
fallen/þe game is called Dillu in la-
latyn/& is coponed & made of tweyn
of alle cilles that is to moeue & os-
oris that is a mouth / for they that
tottred soo moeueth apenste mennes
mouthes.

abymalech **A**bymalech Gedjons sone
borne of his concubyne was
leder in Sychem after his fa-
der thre yere. And slough his owne

bretheren thre score and ten out take
one that were born of dyuerse wyues
that tyme was the batayll of Archene
bytweene the Lapchtes and Centau-
res. ¶ Palefatus libro de incredibili-
bus lapyth. That Centaures were ro-
ble hoile men of Thessalia that fau-
ghte apenst Thebees men of Thebe
in Egypte. Thola of the lygnage of
Isachar was Juge in Israell thre
and twenty yere. In his fourthe yere
Medea wente from her husbonde
Egeus kyng of Athene in to the fl-
londe Colchos there she was borne.
¶ Trogus. xliii. Aboute that tyme
Famius Pycus sone regned in Ita-
lye/in his tyme Euandre came oute
of Archadia/and rescyued and toke
feldes/and the hylle mount Palatyn.
This famius hadde a wyfe called
fatua/and had ofte a spyryte of pro-
phceye. Therefore yet oft they that ha-
ue a spyryte of prophecye be called
fatui. Tho Hercules hadde slayne
Gereon the Geant kyng of Spayne
and ladde his bestes thurgh Italye
in token of the vyctorie / he laye by
this famius doughter vnlawfully
and begate Latynus that regned af-
terwarde in Italye. ¶ Drolus libro
primo About this yere Belozes kyng
of Egypte warred fyrste apenst Scy-
tes. Yet fyrste he sente Messagers /
and wylled his enemyes to be subget
to his lawe. And the Scytes answer-
de/a dulle kyng and moost ryche mo-
ueth batayll apenst poore men and ne-
dynamely whyle it is in doubtte what
ende the batayll shall haue / prouffy-
te cometh thcrof none/but grete open
harme & damage. And not long after

the dede acordeth with thanswere for they compelled þe kyng of Egypte for to flece & chased & spoylled his oost/ & wolde haue spoylled all Egypte had they not be lette by watteres of the Ryuer Nilus. Than in þe tomyng ayen they warded. xv. yere in Alya & made Alya trybutarii. And her wyues sente theym worde/ þe but they wolde come home / they wolde haue childeren by men of the contrees about. The meane tyme among the Scytes two ymall yonglynges by fraude & by deceyte of the grete warre were put from home & toke with hem grete multytude of peple/ & strength & warded in the countrees of Pontus & Capadocie. & whan they hadden do grete destruccion/ thā they were hylde of men of the contrees about. Than her wyues exiled & weddowes armed hem and toke wreche of her hulbondes deth/ & whan they had made peas by strength & by dedes of armes. they toke men of other londes to lye by hem for to haue childeren & slough her owne men childer & kepte her mayde childer and brente of her right breste/ atte laste tweyne of these wyemen were quenes Mersepia & Lampeto/ & departed her hoost & kept and mayntened hem in batayll eyther by her cours. Than whan they had ouercome a grete dele of Europa/ & many Lytees of Alya / they sente home þe better part of her hoost with proys that they had taken. Than enemyes slough Mersepia þe quene/ & the other women that were lette there for to kepe Alya. And her doughter Synope regned after her moders deth / & gathered a synfuler Joye of vertu by euer

lastyng chastyete. Men wondred so grete Anno tely of this woman/ that whan Hercules had best of his lorde/ for to warre apenst the quene/ he gathered all the grete strength of the yonge men of Grece & ordeyned .ix. longe shyppes & selle vpon the women that were vnwarned/ for him was leuer to stele vpon hem/ than come vpon hem with a batayll openly. Than whan the two quenes that were systres were lodeynly ouercome. Hercules gaue Menalypa to his systre Anthiopa/ & wedded her systre Polita to his knyght Theleus/ & receyued the armure of þe quene in pryce of redempcion. Atte laste after Dithia the quene Pentabilia the quene was in the batayll of Troye/ and dyd many grete dedes apenst the Grekes.

¶ Jayr of Galaad of þe lygnage of Manasse was Juge of Israel. xxii. yere & had. xxx. sones & made hem pryces vpon. xxx. Lytees & called þe Lytees by his owne name Anoc Jayr þe is to saye Jayrs townes. ¶ R. Some telleth that Cartage was buylde the thyrde yere of Jayr but loke in the fyrst boke ca. Affryca scz Numidia. The. xvi. yere of Jayr Ninoy of Egypte amended armure apenst Dedalus in Scilicia / and was hylde of Cotalus sones. ¶ Plydorus libro primo. Carmentis Nympha / otherwyle called Nychostrata kyng Latyns moder fonde and broughte latyn lettres. ¶ Plydor. li. nono. The langage of latyn was departed in four. The fyrst was vnder Ja

nus & Saturnus & was called Pylke and Latyn vnder kyng Latyn. And other kynges of Tulkay. In that langage were .xii. tables of lawe wrytten. Also Romayn that began after kynges were made subget. And that langage vled Plantus & Tullius Virgilius & Lator/but mixt langage encreaced after that themppre encreaced & was huge. After the dethe of Iare Israell serued the Phyllytims & ammonytes .xviii. yere that be accompted to the yeres of Iepte that was duke afterwarde of Israell.

IEpte of Galaad of the lynnage of Gaad/a comyn womannes sone was Iuge of Israell .vi. yere/kyng Latyn famirus sone began to regne in Italy and regned there .xxii. yere. Of hym the kynges of Italy hadden that name & were called kynges Latyns. ¶ Plydorus li. viii. In this kyng Latyns was Sybylle Eritrea in her floures/and was called Eropyla & was born at Babylon/she warned the Grekes that wente to Troye/that Troy sholde be destroyed/& that Dimerus sholde wryte lesynges afterwarde. There were ten Sybylles/& this is the fyfth in nombie & is put before other. The fyrst Sybylla was of Perle/the seconde of Libia/the thyrde was Delphica in Appolyns Temple before the batayll of Troye. Dimerus wrote many of her verses in his boke/the .iiii. was Tymeria of Italye/the .v. was Eritria/of hyr is now our speche/the

vi. was Samia born in the flond Samos/the .vii. was Cumana born in Campania/the brought .ix. boke of Torquin⁹ Pulcus kyng of Romayns in y^e whiche were wrytten y^e domes of Rome/the .viii. was Elepontia born in a felde of Troye/me redeth y^e she was in kyng Sirus & in Salons tyme the .ix. was frigia/me redeth y^e she pphecyed in Anchila/the .x. was Tyburtina other wyle called Albimeia/y^e boke of hem all be worthy praylyng for they wote moche of Cryst & also of paynes. ¶ R. Netheles it semeth y^e Saynt Austyn li. xviii. c. xvi. wyl me ne y^e Sybylla Eritrea was in Romulus tyme/& she wote moche of Cryst & that openly as ic foloweth in these verses of hyrs. Token of dome y^eerth shal of swete become wete. Out of heuen y^e kyng endles shal come to syght And that in fleshe presente for to deme the worlde. And so forth Sybylla hath many moo verses. The hede letters of these verses & of other as they be wrytten in latyn spketh thus. The sus Crystus goddes sone laupoure. ¶ Plydorus li. iiii. Sybylla is a name of offyce and not of persone/and is sayd of Spos that is god and of beele that is thought/and so Sybylle is sayd as it were a woman that hath the goddes thought. Therefore as a man that prophecyeeth is called a prophete. So a woman that prophecyeeth is called a Sibylle. Vnder these dayes in kyng Latyns tyme/was the sayllynge made that is called the sayllyge of Argonantes / that sayllynge was cause and occasyon of the batayle of Troye and began in this ma-

nere. ¶ Trogus libro scdo. After Nep-
 tunus þe successour of Erutonium the
 kyngdom of Athene felle to Egeus/
 that had geten his sone Theleus on
 his fyrst wyfe / & atte last whan that
 wyf was dede / he wedded Medea the
 kynges doughter of Colchos / and ga-
 te on hyr Medus . Atte laste Medea
 dradde her steplone Theleus whan
 he come to age / & toke with hyr / hyr
 sone Medus & wente home to hyr fa-
 der in to Colchos. After Egeus his so-
 ne Thele^s regned in Athene / he wente
 somtyme with Hercules & warred
 and ouercome the Amalones . After
 Theleus his sone Demephon regned
 & halpe & assysted the Grekes a-
 geynst the Troyans . ¶ Trogus libro .xlii.
 Than Pelyas kyng of Poloponeus
 that is of Thessalia dradde lest Ja-
 son the noble wolde warre in his lon-
 de & put hym out. Jason was Elons
 sone. Elon was Pelyas owne broder.
 Pelyas brought Jason in wytte for
 to fetch the golden flees at Colchos
 and hoped therby that the yong may
 tholde be dede / eyther by longe sayl-
 yng in the see / eyther in batayll a-
 geynst the stronge nacionis. ¶ Frigius Dares
 Therfor Pelyas made Argus ordey-
 ne a well fayre shyp couenable to his
 sayllynge and passage. ¶ Petrus. Of
 this name Argon cometh this name
 Argonante. Argonante were stalwor-
 the yonge men gadred all aboute for
 Jalons vyage / than Jason saylled
 forth with these men & landed fyrste
 in frigia / tho Laomedon regned there.
 ¶ Trogus. But Jason was put
 out of frigia / & come in to Colchos
 and ouercome the kyng & slough his

sone Egealms / and toke the golden Anno
 flees and ladde with hym Medea the
 kynges doughter & made hyr his wyf Abraham.
 Natheles afterwande he forloke hyr
 and put hyr awaye. But afterwarde
 whan kyng Pelyas sone was put out
 of Thessalia. Jason recoūlepylled & to
 ke ayen his wyf Medea with his stepl-
 sone Medus & gadred a stronge mul-
 titude of yong men & went in to Col-
 chos & restored Dypedly his wyues fa-
 der þe was put out of his kyngdom &
 yaued hē many Lytees to his kyngdō
 in recompensacōn & amendement of
 þe olde wrong. ¶ Frigius Dares Than
 Jason whan he had subdued Colchos
 he had with him at his prayng Hercu-
 les Castor Pollux Pelcus of Scicia /
 Thelamon of Salimina & come in
 with .v. shyppes by nyght in to frig-
 gia & slough Laomedon the kyng &
 destruyd Ilium in Troye. He rauyl-
 shed Helyona the kynges doughter &
 yaued hyr to his knyghte Thelamon
 to wyue / for he was þe fyrst þe entred in
 to Troye. There was taken a grete
 pray & Jason tomed ayen wth his men
 whan Pryamus Laomadons oldest son-
 ne herde & wyft of all this / he streng-
 thed Ilium þe is Troye with yates &
 with walles & began for to regne.

A Bessa of Bethlem was Ju-
 ge in Israell seuen yere / in his Abella.
 seconde yere Pryamus kyng
 of frigia that is kyng of Troye sent
 te Athenor to the Grekes and sayd S²
 that he wolde gladly foryeue all tres-
 passes þe they had doo before / yf they

wolde sende ayeu his syster Helyona
þ they had rauylshed. The Grekes
wolde not. Pryamus arayed for þ ba-
taylor & made his oldest sone Hector le-
der of other men. Alphylander that hete
Parys also Hectors brother assenteth
herto & sayth / that whan he hunted
somtyme in the wood called Idoa/he
slept & dremed þ Mercurius brought
before him Juno Venus & Mynerua
for he sholde deme whiche of hem we-
re fayrest / & Mynerua behete him w-
sedom. Juno worshyp / & Venus behe-
te hym the fayrest wyfe of the worlde
yf he wolde deme þ she were the fay-
rest. Helenus the other broder. prophe-
cyed þ contrarve & sayde / that yf that
Alphylander þ hete Parys also / toke a
wyfe of Grece / the Grekes wolde co-
me & destroye Ilium that is Troye.
That woman Cassandra pphced
the same. Nacheles shypes were a-
raped / & Parys with Anthenor were
sente in to Grece / and when tho men
came in to the Ilande Cytheria to the
feste of Juno. Helena kyng Menelaus
wyfe came for to see the fayrenesse of
Parys / and Parys rauylshed hyr and
toke hyr with hym in to Troye.
Than was Pryamus glad ynough /
wenyng therby recouer his syster He-
lyona. Than Menelaus kyng of La-
cedemonia made a grete and greuous
playnte to his broð Agamenon kyng
of Melcenes of the rauylshyng of his
wyfe / & gadred passynge strong men
Achylle. Patroclus. Olyres. Ajax. Nel-
tor with other stalworth men seuen
and forty / and hadde shypes redy
in the haueu in nombre a thousande
and .ii. C. & had answere of Appolyn

Delphicus / that Ilium is Troye
sholde be destroyed in the .x. yere. The
Grekes toke vp theyr ankres & sayl-
led on the see & toke grete prayes / &
toured home ayeu. In the mene ty-
me Agamenon sent messagers Olyres
& Dyomedes to kyng Pryam to wytt
yf he wolde yelde vp Helyon and sen-
de hir home agayn. Pryam bethough-
te hym and hadde anone in mynde
the wronge of the Argonances / the
deth of his fader / þ rauylshyng of his
syster / the despylyng of his messenger
Anthenor / therfore he forsoke peas / &
ordeyned for to warre. Than whan
the host was gadred on eyther syde.
Hector slough Prothelelaus / & slough
and felled to the grounde many men
tyll þ his colyn Helyona sone Ajax
Thelamomus knowleched kyntede
bytwene hem / & soo lette hym of his
rees. The mene tyme trewes was ta-
ken for two yere that they myght bu-
rye her men that were slayne / but af-
ter two yere they receyued a stronge
batayll / in the whiche batayll. Hector
slough .x. stalworth dukes / & Achylles
on þ other syde / slough .iiii. stalworth
men & noble / and the batayll dured
four score dayes contynuelly in harde
fyghtynge & stronge. And after that
was trewes taken for .iii. yere / & after
that trewes they receyueth & appoynt-
ed to fyghte and slough many men
on eyther syde. And Andromach Hec-
tors wyf warned Hector by hyr drea-
me that he sholde not that daye wen-
de in to the batayll. Nacheles Hector
went to batayll / and was slayne of
Achylles. And whan Hector was
buried were trewes taken for an

pere. And whan Hector's mynde dape was holden Achilles was there at & loued right hertely Polycena kynges Pryam⁹ doughter / and axed to haue hyr to wyfe / & withdrew hym from the batayll / and sayd þ it was euyll done to destrouble all Europa for the rauylshyng of Helyne / but atte laste he went forth atte prayer of the Grekes / & was wounded of Troilus that had slayn many Grekes / therfore he was angreye & wroth & slough Troilus & Menon allo. Than was Hecuba wonder wroth Pryamus wyfe / & bethought hyr of gyle / & sette Achylles a dape whan he sholde come & fetche home his wyfe Polixena þ was hyr owne doughter. And whan the dape was comen. Alysaüder otherwyse called Parys slough Achilles gyle / fully / therfore they hadde answer of goddes þ the Grekes sholde haue the vycorpe by Achilles lygnage. Neoptholomius Achilles sone wente forth in to bataylle / in the whiche bataylle Parys & Ayax were wounded to deeth epyther of other. Thenne the .vii. yere of the spege / came Pantalylea quene of Amalons in helpe & socour of the Troyans / and brake the spege of the Grekes & brente many of theyr shyppes. Netheles she was slayn of Neoptholomius that she had wounded. After þ Anthenor & Eneas coulepylled for to delpyuer Helyne / & for to delpyre peas. Pryamus toke grete indygnacion of theyr counseyll and sayd they sholde dye / yf euer they were so wode to counseyll that estones. Therfore they toke grete indygnacion / & sente Polydamas to the Grekes & profred

to betraye the Lyte for her owne sauacion. The Grekes graunted peas to these .iii. to Anthenor Eneas & Polydamas & to all theyr retynue / & the Lyte was opened by nyght to þ Grekes. Than Pryamus fledde to thaurties of theyr goddes / & Neoptholomius purloued him and slough hym. Eneas hydde Polixena atte his owne fader Anchyles atte prayer of Helyne. Andromach had freedom graüted to seche Polixena & was longe sought / & atte last founde & slayn of Neoptholomius at hyr faders Tombe. Eneas for he had hydde Polixena / was þ hote to be a go. The londe was left to Anthenor. Helyne wente home ayene with Menelaus. This syege of Troie dured .x. yere and .vi. monethes. And were slayne of the Troyans er þ Lyte was betrayed six hondred thousande thre score & sixtene. And whan the Lyte was betrayed thre score & .xviii. thousande was slayne. Than Eneas wente out of the coultre with four & twenty shyppes / and with hym thre thousande men & thre hondred. And with Anthenor thre thousande / with Andromach & Helyne two thousande.

Aylon of the lygnage of Zabulon was Juge of Israell ten yeres. Netheles the teenty acounten hym not. And therfore Eusebius acouiteth his yeres with the yeres of Josue / of Samuell / and of Saull / for the scrypture speketh not of theyr yeres. Netheles they sette mo yeres / thay be founden by Josephus /

so that froth the goyng out of Egyp
 te vnto Salomons Temple were. iiii.
 hondred yere & four score. ¶ Abdon þ
 hete Labdon also was Juge of Isra
 ell. viii. yere / in his thyrde yere Trope
 was taken .viii. L. yere and .xliiii.
 after Abrahams byrth thre hondred
 yere & forty / after the goynge out of
 Egyppte / the yere of kyng Latyn in
 Italpe .xxv. before the buyldyng of
 Rome four hondred yere & two and
 twenty. ¶ Augustinus li. xviii. c. xvi.
 After that Trope was destroyed / yet
 whyle kyng Latyn regned in Italpe
 the Grekes that tourned agayne &
 hadden in the waye many myshap
 pes. ¶ For Varro libro. iii. de hystoria
 sayth that Dyomedes were torned in
 to foules / & Dyomedes was no more
 seen / so that he was holden a god. his
 Temple is solempne in the Honde
 Dyomedea / not far fro mount Gar
 gay in Apulia. He sayth that foules
 be / and flee about this Temple and
 serue wonderly and sprynge water.
 ¶ If the Grekes or any of the kynde
 of the Grekes come thyder / the byr
 des make hem good semblaunt / & yf
 any other come / they wounde hem
 with theyr grete bylles / & for to con
 ferme the same. ¶ Varro telleth not
 a fable lesyng / but sothnesse of stoye
 of that famous dyupneresse sorceresse
 and wytche Tyrt / that transfourmed
 Hlixes felawes in to beestes. And of
 the Archades that by lotte swam ouer
 a pole / and thay were tourned in to
 wolues / & lyued with wylde bestes / &
 yf they ete there noo mannes flesshe /
 they sholde after nyne yere swymme
 home ouer the poole / & tourne ayene

in to shap of mankynde. He sayth als
 so þ Demenetus whan he had tasted
 of the sacrefyce of Archad was tour
 ned in to a wolfe / & after .ix. yere he
 was restored ayene to his owne shap
 of mankynde / and dled afterwarde
 Geantes dedes / & had the maystye
 in a tournyng of Dlympe. ¶ Plinius
 li. xvi. c. xxii. That men be transfour
 med in to wolues / and ofte in to her
 owne shappe / we trowe it be fals. Ne
 theles auctours of Grece tellen that
 Archades were ledde to a poole in the
 same londe / and henge her clothes on
 an ooke / & swam ouer the poole / and
 in wylde nesse tourned in to wolues
 and dwelled .ix. yere among wolues
 And yf they kepte hem all that tyme
 & ete no mannes flesshe / they sholde
 swymme home agayne and take her
 owne clothes & her owne shappe. and
 be .ix. yere older than they were whan
 they wente out / but there is no lesyng
 so grete / but it maye be cofirmed.
 ¶ Augustinus li. xviii. c. xvi. That
 what shal we saye to all this saynges
 Certaynely whan we were in Italpe
 we herde ynough of woman holtelers
 of that londe that vled to yewe these
 that was by wytched to men that tra
 uaylled by the waye / and anone the
 men tourned in to beestes & bare he
 up charges & hadden kyndly wytte &
 reason / and whan they had done her
 serupce / they tourned ayene in to her
 owne shappe. ¶ Also Epuleus in his
 booke sayth that soo it happed hym
 selfe that he toke suche denyng / and
 hadde his wytte and reason and was
 made an alle. ¶ R. Willel. de re. li.
 scdo / telleth suche doynge of tweyn

more vnto

 Augustinus

wytches or enchanteresses/that dwel-
led in the hyghe waye to Rome ward
And yf ony gest come allone they tor-
ned him in to a beest. And so come by
them a mynstrele þ̄ coude moche myr-
the/ & they transformed hym to an as-
se and solde hym to a riche man for a
grete some of money. Netheles with
suche warnyng þ̄ he sholde neuer pas-
se water/ & his warden kepte hem be-
sely longe tyme. Netheles in passyng
of tyme he toke lasse hede of his alle/
& escaped þ̄ water/ & torned ayene to
shap of mankynde/ the warden of þ̄
asse folowed after & axes after his as-
se of euery man þ̄ he mette. And he þ̄
had ben an asse / & was tourned to a
man ayene sayde that he had ben an
asse & was becomen a man/ & his war-
den ledde hym to his lorde/ & the lord
ledde them bothe to Leon the pope/ &
the olde wytches were conuyt before
the pope/ & knowleched the dede/ the
pope doubted of this thyng/ & Petr^o
damianus a connyng man of lecture
comfermed the maner doyng by en-
sample of Symon magus that tour-
ned faustinus in to his owne shap &
made his owne childer drede him ful
soore. ¶ Augusti^o vbi s̄. It is to be by-
leued that fendes may not doo but at
goddess suffraunce & so they maye ma-
ke no mankynde/ neyther transfour-
me ne chaūge bodes. Netheles it se-
meth somtyme that they chaūge lyke-
nesse & shap of thynges that god ma-
de & wrought. Soo that the fantaspe
of a man that chaūgeth in thought &
in metyng of dreames by dyuerse ma-
ner thynges & taketh the lykenesse of
bodies with a wonder swyftenesse

though noo bode be presente/ whan
the wyttes of the bode be absente &
lete of theyr woichyng & the ymage
& lykenesse þ̄ is in thought & in fanta-
sye is as it were empynted in the ly-
kenesse of some best & semeth to other
mennes wyttes in the same lykenesse
And so a man maye seme to hym sel-
fe / suche as he semeth in metyng of
sweuenes & soo hym maye seme that
he bereth byrthens & charges. But &
they be veray byrthens & charges fen-
des bere hem that men maye be so be-
gyled. for one Priestancius tolde þ̄ si-
che an hadde befelle his owen fader
that he toke suche venym by these in
his owne house & laye in a bedde as
he were slepyng/ and no man myght
hym wake/ but after manye dapes he
awoke and tolde as it were a sweuen
how him was befallē/ for hē thought
that he was made an horse and bare
corn amonge other beestes to knygh-
tes that were at Rethica/ and it was
founde right as he tolde it was done
in dede. He sayde also that he sawe a
philosopher at home in his hous/ whi-
che phylosopher expownded to hym
many secretes of Platoos boke/ whi-
che thynges he had bodey him expow-
ne before & he wolde not. And whan
me axed of the phylosophre / why he
wolde expowne in an other mannes
houle/ that he had denyed in his ow-
ne/ nay quod he. I dyd not soo/ but I
mette that I dyd. And in that maner
by the ymage & lykenesse of fantaspe
it was shewed to that one wakyng
what that other mette in his sleepe.
Therefore that the Dichades torned
in to wolues by wytchecraft of Circa

 by craft of men. As it is knowen þ
 an hynde was brought in stede of E-
 phigenia Agamenons doughter & she
 was ladde awaye . The foules that
 at Dymedes Temple / that spyn-
 gen water & flateren the Grekes / is
 by excitynge of þ deuyl to bryng men
 in wytte to hyleue Dymede be made
 de a god & so begyled in worshyppng
 of fals goddes . ¶ R. Loke more of
 this mater in the fyrst boke caplo Hy-
 bernia. ¶ Giraldu in top. fendes &
 wpyked men maye not chaunge kyn-
 de but by suffrauce of god / they may
 chaunge lphenelle & shappe and lette
 mēnes wyttes & begyle men so þ thyn-
 ges seme not as they be / but by streng-
 the of fantalpe & of wytchecraft men
 haue lempng by feyned shappes / but
 it is not vnlytstynge þ we trowe that
 god as he maketh thynge of nought
 so he chaūgeth one in to an other for
 to take rightfull wreche / eyther for
 shewe myght or mercy / so he tourned
 Lothes wyfe in to an ymage of salte /
 & water in to wyne / eyther chaūge the
 lphenelle without and leue the kynde
 vnchaunged withyn.

After the destruccō of Trope
 Eneas with his fader Anch-
 les and his sone Alcanius /

with twelue shyppes come in to Sch-
 cile / and there Anchises deyed / than
 Eneas wolde haue saylled in to Ita-
 lye / but tempest droof hym in to Af-
 fryca / there he was right well beloued
 of Dydo the quene. But soone after
 he foiloke and lefte Dydo and came
 in to Italye . ¶ R. Yf it be soth that
 Trogus & Papie & other wyle men
 wyrtē / this quene Dydo buylde Car-
 tage thre score yere and twelue before
 the buyldyng of the Cyte of Rome /
 that was buylde the fourthe yere of
 Achany kyng of Juda . Than is it
 trothe þ Eneas sawe neuer Dydo the
 quene of Cartage. for Eneas was be-
 fore and deyed thre hondred yere and
 more er Cartage was buylde. And so
 meaneth & wyrteth Sapnte Austyne
 primo libro confessionū in fine / and
 sayth that wyle men denye that Ene-
 as sawe Cartage. ¶ Hug. caplo Elis-
 sa. This Dydo was called Elyssa þ
 is Dirago a manly woman for hap
 that felle afterwarde for she slough
 her selfe manly . ¶ Trogus li. xviii.
 Atte laste this Elyssa pygmalpons
 doughter / whan she sholde haue be
 compelled of the people to take an
 husbonde / she wente in to a grete fy-
 re that she had made / & so she slough
 her selfe manly and was longe after
 worshypped for a goddelle. ¶ Marc^o
 Than Eneas came in to Italye &
 was cofedred & sworn to kyng Euan-
 der þ tho regned in .vii. hylles / these
 two faught & warred apenste Latyn
 kyng of Latyns & Turnus kyng of
 Tuscan kyng Latyns doughter hus-
 bonde. In þ batayll Pallas Euan-
 dres sone and Turnus were slayne.

¶ **R.** Metheles Trogus li^o xliiii. wy^r tech that Eneas in his fyrst comyng fonde so grete grace with kyng Latyn þ he entred in to a parte of the kyng^r doyn / & wedded Laury kyng Latyns doughter / þ was Turnus spoule / & so both Latyn & Eneas confedred togy^r der / toke batayll apenst Turnus for the gylefull maryage of Laury / & La^rtyⁿ & Turnus were bothe dede in þ batayll. And Eneas afterwarde was kyng of cyther hēgdom / of Latyns & of Tulkans / & buyld a Cyte & called it the Cyte Lauinium by the name of his wyfe / & warred afterwarde apenst the kyng of Melcene in Tulkay / & in that batayll Eneas was slayn / & left after him his sone Alcanius þ he had gotten on Creula at Troyc. **¶** **Vlydo** rus ethi. Julius was Eneas sone & he te fyrst Alcani^o by the name of a Ryuer in frigia þ lo hete & was afterwarde called Iulus by the name of Iulus kyng of Troyc. **¶** **Hug. c.º** Julius. Aft ward whan þ kyng of Melcenes was slayn in a syngler batayll of Italwoz / the men / than Alcanius was called Julius. for his fyrst spryngyng of berde that tho was fyrst sene / for the fyrste spryngyng of berde is proprely called Julius / & is a name of two syl^lables by cause of metre **¶** **R.** Here take hede that but the yeres of Eneas regnyng be accounted within the yeres of kyng Latyn / the acomptyng of this storpe shall fayle / for þ storpe sayth þ kyng Latyn regned .xxxii. yere & spe^rcially whyle Eneas / whan Troyc was taken come in to Italpe þ .xxv. yere of kyng Latyn as alle hystories telley. **¶** **Trogus lib^o xliiii.** Alcanius

Eneas sone began to regne amonge the Latyns and regned .xxxviii. yere / and lette the Cyte Lauinium that his fader Eneas had somtyme J buylde and buylde the Cyte Alba a longe vpon the Ryuer Tyber / þ Cyte was hede of that kyngdom thre hondred yere / by the name of that Cyte kynges Latyns were called kynges Albanes. Reges Albani. **¶** **Eutrop^o.** This Alcanius nourysshed vp full myldely his broder Siluius Posthum^o. for he was born of his stepdame Lauina after his faders dethe / and was called Posthumus / for he was born after þ his fader was buryed and was called Siluius / for he was nourysshed in a wood. A wood is Silua in latyn. By his name the kynges of Latyns were afterwarde called Silues. Alcanius whan he had regned .xxxviii. yere / he left the kyngdom to Siluius Posthumus / for his owne sone Iulus was yet of tendre age so sayth Marianus libro p^{ri}º. Of this Iulus the meynpe that be called familia Iliorum had that name. Sampson was Juge in **¶** **Strall** .xx. yere / in his tyme befelle that / that fables telley of Ulixes of Grecia / how he fledde Scilla and Sirenes / therof speketh Palefatus libro primo incredibilium and sayth that Scilla was a woman that vled to robbe her gesses / and sayd that Sirenes be comyn wymen that begyled men that saylled on the see. Also that tyme Drestes slough Pirrus of Egypte in Appolyn Delphycus Temple. Also some saye that Dimerus was that tyme / but to speke of his tyme olde men dys^riden / for some saye that

 yere. In his tyme felle a grete hunger
 in the lond of Israell. And the stoire
 of Ruth þ was of Moab felle. Hector's
 childern toke Ilium that is Trope
 & put out Anthenors offspring by hel-
 pe of Helenus Pryam's lone. Siluius
 Posthum's Eneas & Alcanius his bro-
 der geten on his stepdame Lauina /
 was the thyrde kyng of Latyns & be-
 gay to regne & regned .xxix. yere in
 the whiche yere Brutus Siluius lone
 that was Alcanius lone occupied
 Brytayne as storpes reherlen. It se-
 meth that hystorpes dyscordey that
 telle of this Brutus fader / for the hys-
 toire of Brytons sayth that this Bru-
 te was Siluius lone / the whiche Sil-
 uius was Alcanius lone. But thysto-
 ire of Rome sayth that Alcanius ga-
 te Julius / of the whiche came þ meys-
 sy familia Julioz & maketh no men-
 tion of Siluius. Thay yf this Julius
 had two names & was called Siluius
 also / that one of thystorpes sayleth /

for me sayth that this Brute whan
 he was fyfteen yere olde / slough his fa-
 der at huntynge / and all hystories ac-
 corden that Siluius Posthumus was
 Eneas lone & not Alcanius lone / &
 lyued longe after vnslayne & regned
 also / thay it is loth that this Siluius
 Posthumus was not Brutus fader /
 but vpon caas for thystoire of Rome
 sayth that Alcanius after Eneas dech
 nourysshed by tenderly Siluius Posthu-
 mus / therfore he is acompted his fad-
 herto I wold assente withouten doub-
 te / ner that me redeth þ Siluius was
 slayn of his lone Brute **T. Gantre**
 This Brute slough his moder in his
 byrthe / and his fader afterwarde at
 huntynge whan he was .xv. yere olde
 Therfore he was put out of Italye
 & wente in to Grece / and there by hel-
 pe of the Trojans he ouercome Pari-
 dralus the kyng of Grece / & wedded
 his doughter Innoges / he delpuered
 the Trojans & saylled thens / & had
 answer of the goddes & landed in Af-
 fryca. Than he passed þ auetures of
 Philenes þ lake called Lacus salinax
 the salte lake / the Ryuer Malus / and
 Hercules pylers / and came in to the
 see Tyren / & founde there Corneus
 & wente in to Espan & ouercome there
 Gopharius duke of Peptow / & Tur-
 nus Brutus neuewe was slayne at a
 Lyte called Turmp eyther Turon
 by his owne name. And thay Brute
 had good wynde & saylled in to Bry-
 tayne / and helde Brytayne atte the
 clyf of Totenes in Cornewale / and
 was fyrst kyng of Brytayne all hole /
 and destroyed the Geantes that dwel-
 led there in & called the flonde Brys

tayne by his owne name / and called his felawes *Brytons* / & betoke *Cozenwayll* to *Corneus* and buyld a *Cyte* and called it *Trinouantum* as it were newe *Trope* / that *Cyte* now is called *London* and is vpon *Tamyle* *Brute* begate thre sones. *Lotrynus* *Camber* and *Albanactus* / and dyed whan he had regned four and twenty yere in the *Flonde*. The kynges of *Scicions* faylled whan they hadde regned an hondred yere thre scoze & tweyne. *Samuell* after *Hely* was *Juge* in *Israell* twelue yere / soo sayth *Iosephus* libro octauo. *Natheles* the *icrypture* speketh not therof / from his tyme began the tymes of prophetes. *Tempora prophetarum*. And in his thrydde yere *Dauyd* was born. *Petrus*. This *Samuell* ordeyned fyrste companye of clerkes in queres for to synge / and than me sayd that they prophced / that is to meane they worshypped god besely. Afterwarde *Samuell* was *Juge* in *Israell* vnder *Saule* .xviii. yere. *Lotrynus* *Brutus* eldest sone began to regne as it were vpon the south see to the *Rpuer* of *humbre* / and named that parte of the *Flonde* *Leogria* / that is *Englonde* as it is sayde in the fyrste booke in the chapytre of *Brytayne*. But *Albanactus* was slayne & *Camber* dyed. And *Lotrynus* after that he had regned .xx. yere was slayne also in batayll / that his wyf *Gwendolena* made apenst hym by cause of a strom pete called *Estrylda*. And *Gwendolena* regned after her husbond .xv. yere.

Saul of the lygnage of *Ben Anno* *Spamyn* was the fyrst kyng of *Hebrewes* & regned .xx. yere / lo sayth *Iosephus* / of the whiche yeres *scrypture* speketh not. ¶ *Petrus*. for *Saull* regned .xviii. yere whyle *Samuell* lyued / & two yere after his deth. The .iiii. kyng of latyns *Eneas* *Siluius* was *Posthumus* sone & began to regne & regned .xxxi. yere. ¶ *In* some hystories *Posthumus* broder *Latinus* *Siluius* is sette the .iiii. & this *Eneas* is sette the .v. but in this place *Eneas* is sette the .iiii. The .xvii. duk of *Athene* *Codrus* *Melautus* sone began to regne & regned .xxi. yere / after his deth kynges of *Athene* faylled. ¶ *Augustinus* li. xviii. ca. xliiii. The *Deloponeus* men of *Thessalia* rebelled apenst them of *Athene* / than was answer peuen of goddes / that on whether syde the duke were slayn that syde sholde haue the maystrye. Therefore the knyghtes were charged ouer al thyng to take good kepe of kyng *Codrus*. *Natheles* *Codrus* toke a poore mannes clothyng & a byrthen of faggottes on his necke & entred in to the strength of his enemyes / & there was stryfe arered among the peole / and a knyght slough hym / that he had rather wounded with an hook / whan it was knowen that *Coreus* wente awaye without batayll & the *Athenes* were delpuered. *Codrus* had leuer dye & his men haue the maystrye / than lyue & his men be ouercome. After his deth comonte was gouerned by maystres / for there was noo lawe / but lyng of lordshyp vnto the tyme that *Salon* *ys* noble maker of lawes was

 ¶ R. This dyuerslyte befalleth / for
 Plydorus sayth that Samuell & Sa
 ull ruled the people .xl. yere. ¶ Nethe
 lesse Josephus li. viii. and the May/
 ster of the storpes acorden that Sa/
 muell ruled the people allone .xii. ye/
 re / & after hym Saull regned .xx. yere.

¶ Dauid Salomon. Captiv. xxix.

Dauid. **D**avid of the lagnage of Ju/
 Salomon. da was the seconde kyng of
 re / fyrst .vii. yere in Ebron vpon Ju
 da all one / & after .xxiiij. yere vpon al
 Israell. Latynus Siluius the fyfthe
 kyng of Latyns regned fyfty yere.
 The seconde Jxion kyng of Corin/
 the regned .xxxviii. yere. Andonicus
 buylde the Cytte Ephelus. And Salo
 mon is born. ¶ Plydorus li. v. Carta
 ge is buylde. ¶ Petrus. Some wyll
 meane that Carthedon Cirius buyl/
 de Cartage. And other wryte that his
 doughter Dydo buylde it. ¶ R. And
 yf there were but thre score yere & ten

bytwene the buyldyng of Cartage &
 of Rome as Trogus & Papias acor/
 den / than it semeth þ Cartage was
 buylde about the fyrst yere of Ozias
 kyng of Juda as it is leyd in the fyr
 ste boke of the prouynce of Affryca &
 Numidia. ¶ Galfr. and Alfr. Mem/
 prici⁹ the fyrst kyng of Hytons reg/
 ned .xx. yere. This called his broder
 for acorde & slough him, and toke the
 kyngdom with strength / and vled ty
 rannye in the people / & begate on his
 wyf a noble yong man called Ebran/
 cus / & forsoke his wyf atte last & vled
 Zodomaye as a shrew sholde / but atte
 laste at huntynge he was etey of wol/
 ues. Dauid the kyng dyed the .xxix.
 daye of December at the tour of Sy
 on in Jherusalem / and was buryed
 there with grete rychesse / of the whi/
 che richesse afterwarde Hyrcanus the
 bysshop yaf Antiochus Demetrius
 sone thre thouland talentes for to go
 from Jherusalem. ¶ Trevisa. A ta/
 lente is a grete weyght / & ther be thre
 maner talentes / þ lest is of fyfty pou
 de / the myddell of thre score poude
 and .xii. the moost an hondred poude
 and .xx. ¶ Sequit in hystoria. This
 Dauid while he had peas / made son
 ges & ympnes / some of thre metres /
 & some of fyue / & made also organs
 of dyuersle maner & other Instrumen
 tes of mulyke / in whiche the dekenes
 sholde laye ympnes and longes / and
 four men maystres ouer other Emau
 in the myddell. Alaph in the right sy
 de. Ethan in þ lyft syde / & Edithym
 to ouer see the cymbals. Also there we
 re .xxiiii. bysshoppes and had vnder
 hem .xxiiii. preestes .xxiiii. dekenes &

four & twenty porters/the thyrde parte of hem serued in the Temple/and the meane tyme the other two partes ordeyned for her owne hous. Salomon regned in Israell somwhat of yeres whyle his tader Dauid was a lyue/the whiche yeres be acompted to Dauid & not to Salomon. And after that his fader was dede he regned xi. yere. Also Jerom in epla ad Vitalem presbiteru sayth/that Salomon whan he was. xi. yere olde gate a lone on Pharoes doughter. Also me redeth of Achan the kyng that gate a child whan he was. xi. yere olde. Also this Salomon whan he had slayne Joab Semey & Adonias / & whan he had receyued wytte & wysedom of god in the hylle/and peuen dome of the two strompettes. He cast in his herte to do thre thynges/ fyrst buylde a Temple to alinyghy god a kynges palays to hym selfe/and to walle Iherusalem with thre walles/within the fyrst wal le dwelled preestes & clerkes that serued in the Temple and the kyng & his husholde/in the seconde walle woned stalworth men & prophetes / and within the thyrde walle were inhabyte with comyn people & craftes men. Salomons mete was euery daye. xxx choruz of tere floure/and .lxxx. choruz of mele / ten fatte oxen / and an hondred weders / withoute venelson pultrye and wylde foule. Chorus conteyneth the mesure of .xxx. bullshels/ Salomon wrote also thre bokes/that one is called parabole Salomonis & puerbia also/the seconde hete Ecclesiastes/the thyrde Cantica canticor/ He dysputed also of kynde of trees/&

of herbes/from the Cedar that groweth in the wood Libanus/ vnto the ylope that groweth out of the walles. Also he tolde moche phylosophye of the kynde of beestes/ he founde vp also hallyng and coniuitions for to slake lekenesse / & other for to caste fendes out of men that they combed. Also he founde vp fygures and pryntes to be grauen in precyous stones/that sholde with the rootes of some herbes be holden to the nose thrylles of men that hadden fendes within hem/and put out the fendes. This craft was moche vled amonge the Hebrewes before the comyng of Cryst. Therefore Josephus libro octauo sayth/that he lawe Eleazarus the couiurour in presence of Vespasian the prynce heled men that hadden fendes within hem in this maner he putte a vessell with water to the mannes nose and hete the fende / that he sholde ouertourne the vessell whan he wente out/and so it was done / Also Salomon to fynde a spedefull craft for to clenre and cleue stones / he enclosed a struccion byrd in a glas/& the struccion broughte a worne that hete Chamyr out of wyldernesse and touched the glas about with the blood of that worne/ and so brake the glas and deliuered his byrde. Than the fyrst yere of Salomon was the outgoynge of that nacyon Ionica of Lacedemonia. Dme rus was in that passyng / Ionica is a nacyon of Grekes/ The .iiii. yere of Salomon y seconde moneth that was four hondred and four score yere after the comyng out of Egypt / Salomon begay to buylde the Temple

 che golde / that whan the Romayns
 sette it on fyre / there ran a streame of

 here the wysedom of Salomon. ¶ Pe
 trus. He sayth this quene sawe a tree
 in the Temple/ on the whiche tree o
 ne sholde be an hanged/ and by caus
 se of his deyth/ the kyngdom of Jewes
 shold be destroyed/ the quene warned
 Salomon / and anon the tree was
 throwen in to a depe pytte vnder erth
 & how it fleet afterwarde about Try
 stis tyme in a ponde called Probatica
 Piscina/ it is vncertayne. He troweth
 þ this tree was the rood tree. ¶ Gan
 fr. Ebranc Nemprius sone was the
 sixth kyng of Brytons / and reigned
 sixty yere/ this man was bothe fayre
 and stronge/ and on one & twenty wy
 ues he begate twenty sones & thyrty
 doughters. The fayrest doughter of
 all was Gwalaes. Ebranc sende the
 se doughters to Albia Siluius kyn
 ge/ for he wolde haue hem maryed to
 the blood of Tropy/ by cause that the
 wymen Sabynes fledde the beddes
 of the Latyns. Also Ebranc by ledyn
 ge of Alaracus occupied a parte of
 Germania. Ebranc beyonde Hum
 bre buylde that Cyte of Yorke in the
 Marche of Northumberlonde/ and of
 Scotlonde/ he ordeyned the Cyte Al
 clyud. And he buylde withyn Scotlon

de the castell of Maydens that nowe
 is called Edenborough. Afterwarde he
 sayled in to fraunce with a grete nau
 ye/ and come ayene wonderly ryche.
 Albia Siluius þ sixth kyng of Latyns
 regned .xxxix. yere.

¶ Roboas Abdas Asa. Caplyn. xxx.

Roboas Salomons sone reg
 ned oonly vpon two lagnages
 Juda and Benyamyn. xviii.
 yere so sayth Josephus libro. viii. ca
 pitulo quinto/ and .xvii. yere as other
 wryten. Roboas forsoke the counseyl
 of olde men/ & was ruled by the coun
 seyll of yonglynes/ that tyme Jero
 boam Nabathes sone reigned in Sa
 maria vpon ten lagnages of Israell
 xvii. yere. But Josephus libro .viii.
 caplo. vii. sayth that he reigned twoo
 and twenty yere. This Nabath for
 the people sholde not tourne her herte
 to her lorde Roboam whan they wen
 te to do sacryfye in Iherusalem/ he
 made two calues of golde to be wor
 shypped of the people in Dan and in
 Bethell/ and so this Nabath was cau
 se of mawmetrye in Israell. The
 varyaunce in the coutyng of yeres of
 the kynges of Juda and of Israell/
 maye be determyned by that / that a
 parte of the yere is taken for the hole
 yere / eyther for some kynges reigned
 with her faders / er that they reigned
 allone / or for the kyngdoms were o
 therwhyles without kynges. for the
 boke of kynges were gadred of dy
 uerse wrytynges of prophetes. Ther
 fore the begynnynge bothe of þ kyn
 ges of Juda and the kynges of Is

raell be dyuersely lette / and therfore
 suche dyscorde maye not lightly be de
 termyned / we trouwe it happeth by
 defaute of wryters that be ofte begy
 led in nombres and in propre names
CTreuila. for we speke of the kyn
 ges of Juda & of the kynnes of Is
 raell . here take hede that the lyne oz
 ofsprynge of Jacobs childery were
 called the lygnages of Israell . And
 so the lyne oz ofsprynge of Judas Ja
 cobs sone was called the lygnage of
 Juda / & the ofsprynge of Benyamyn
 was called þ lygnage of Benyamyn
 and so of other. **C**Dauid and Salo
 mon were kynnes of all the lygnages
 of Israell / but for Roboas Salo
 mons sone was harde and sterne / the
 ten lygnages forsoke hym and made
 hem a kynge by hym selfe and called
 hym the kynge of Israell / for he was
 kynge of the more parte of Israell.
CTwo lygnages abode with Roboas
 the lygnage of Juda and of Benya
 myn. And for the lygnage of Juda
 was the worthyer lygnage / the kynge
 of these two lygnages was called the
 kynge of Juda / and Cryst come of þ
 kynnes of Juda. **C**Iosephus li. viii
 ca. v. Sulac kynge of Egypt spoyled
 and toke awaye the sheldes of golde
 that Salomon had sette in Iherusa
 lem. Roboas sette sheldes of brasse in
 her stede. Sulac wente & subdued Sy
 ria . **C**Abas Roboas sone was the
 fourth kynge of Juda & reigned thre
 yere / that is to saye two full yere and
 the thyrde dele of the thryd yere. And
 for he trusted in god he sholde ouerco
 me Jeroboam that faught apenste
 hym & slough sixty thousand. **C**Ala

the rightfull Abas sone reigned .xli. Anno
 yere and destroyed mawmetrye and
 clenched the Temple and slough the **Dauid.**
 kynge of Egypte / and atte last he had **Roboam**

 kyng of Iuda. .xlii. brethern & al baals
 prestes & regned. .xxviii. yere. Achalia
 kyng Alarias mod was Achabs dou-
 ghter & regned in Iuda. .vi. yere & slo-
 we all p hynge's childery of Joram's
 hous excepte Joas Alarias sone/ for

 p was herde in sharpe wyle/ a prest of
 Jerlm sayd. Now is a pphete born p

 Israell. And Zacharias Joyade the
 byshops sone was stoned to dethe of
 kyng Joas bytwene the aulter & the
 Temple. Our lord in p gospel called
 hym Barachias his sone by cause of
 his myldenelle & goodnelle. Barachi-
 as is as moch to ley as goddes owne
 blessyd sone. Leyeth Bladudus sone

These. xiii. yere in þ whiche me sayth þ the kyngdom of Juda was without kyng/ some storyes acompteth hē not / other acomptehem among the. xxi. yere of Amalpas the kyng/ els shall not so many yeres be founden there as Eutropius acompteth from the. xxv. yere of kyng Latyn/ in þ whiche yere Troye was destroyed vnto þ buyldyng of Rome that was in all. iiii. C. xxii. yere. Jeroboam Joas sone regned in Israel. xli. yere. The. xiii. kyng of Latyns Euentinus Siluius regned among the Latyns. xxiii. yere. Dzas þ here Azarias Amalpas sone regned in Juda. lii. yere/ this kyng loued well erthe tyl kyng. Also this kyng wolde haue taken vpon him & entremeted of thoffyce of preest/ & was synyten with lepre or meselype/ & halfe a grete hylle claf & felle vpon his gardens. Arbaces othervyle called Arbactus þ fyrst kyng of Medes slough Sardanapallus the last kyng of Assyres & regned amonge the Medes. xxi. yere. And thofaylled the hole kyngdom of Assyries þ had contynued from Belus & Ny-

nus to the last Sardanapallus a. M. Anno yere & .iiii. C. Netheles after Sardanapallus were myghty kynges in Assyria vnto þ destroyeng of Nynue/ though they were not full & hole kynges. ¶ Trog⁹ li. This Sardanapallus was a man more wretche thā ony womay/ his stuard Arbaces fonde hē spynnēg reed sylke on a dystaf in womans clothpng among companye of comyn wymen/ for to receyue some of þ huyr. Therfore Arbaces toke grete indygnacōy & exited his knyghtes against þ kyng in conspiracie & atte last þ kyng was ouercome/ & wente in to his ryall place & brent hēselfe w^t moche rychelle. ¶ R. Comentator. i. ethi. c. xiiii. sayth þ one wrote on Sardanapallus tombe in this maner. So moche I had as I ete & drank. ¶ And saynte Austyn de ci. li. ii. c. xvii. Vnderstandeth þ Sardanapallus hymself whyles he lyued ordeyned þ to be wryten on his tombe whan he was dede. for it was the maner that tyme þ kyngis ordeyned the wrytyng þ shold be wryten on her tombe after her deeth. The xiiii. kyng of Latyns Procas Siluius regned amonge the Latyns. xxi. yere that tyme. fydon foude vp & yaf the Argvues mesure & weyghtes. ¶ Trogus libro tercio. Lygurgus kyng of Leges Lacedemonies yave lawe to his people / the tenor of his lawes is thus. The people is enformed to be buxom to the prynces/ and the prynces to do the people right & reason. He techeth all men to be skylfully scars or mesurable/ that the trauayll of knyghthode be not destroyed by grete wastynge and spendyng. Alle that shall be

bought & solde/shall be bought & solde not for moneye/but for chaūgynge of marchāūdysle/he dyd awaye vble of moneye as it were mater of vyce or synne. He departed the gouernaūce of the comonte by degrees/& yauē kyn/ges knyghtes power of batayls/& to Juges power of domes / & to the Senatours kepyng & mayntenynge of y^lawes. & yafe the people power for to chese Juges whom they wolde / the londe & groude he dealed euen amonge all men / that egalyte of enherytaūce of londes sholde make hem all lyk he myghty & strong. Her yonglynges sholde holde hem appayed all the yere with one clothe/he suffred no man to be gayer than other/ne no man to fare better than other of mete ne of drynke. He bade that childern of .xiiii. yere sholde not vble hem in chepyngene in feyres / but in feldes vnto they come to mannes age. Nothyng sholde be sprad vnder theym whan they sholde slepe/they sholde lyue without de/lycious mete. Maydens sholde be wedded without erdownyng of gyftes/for to constrayne wedloke to faster whan no wedloke were bounde with byrdels of endowpyng. He ordeyned that olde men sholde be more worshypped than ryche. He ordeyned no thyng to be holden of other men / but as they wolde holde it hem selfe. And for his Lyte y^l was out of good rule & oute of good lyuyng/sholde the rather come to rule & receyue the lawe / he feyned that Appolyn was fynder of this lawe. And for he wolde that his lawe sholde last euermore/he bonde the people by othe and made hem swere not to

chaunge this lawe tyll he came ayene And feyned hym that he wolde goo to Appolyn Delphicus and axe counseyll of hym yf ought sholde be with/drawe of this lawe or made more. Ne theles he wente in to Creta that Jlonde/& was there tyll he dyed / & whan he sholde dye he bade throwe his bodye in to the see / lest he were born to Lacedemonia and the men that were sworn to his lawe wolde wene that they were dyscharged of theyr othe. Craneus the fyrst kynge of Lacedemonia regned there .xxviii. yere. ¶ Gan Cordeylla kynge Lypers doughter after hir fader regned in Brytayne fyue yere / but atte laste her sylster sones Morgan and Lunedagius put hir in pylson / and Lunedagius regned in Brytayne after Cordeylla .xxxiii. yere/he slough Morgan that was rebel ayant hym in Glammorgan in wales / and by cause of that happe that countree is called Morgans londe. After Lunedagius regned Ryuallo/ after hym Gurgustius Siluius/after hym Jago/after hym Rymnarchus after Gorbodio / he had twey sones ferrex and porrex/this porrex for couetyse of lordshyp slough his broder Therefore her moder was full wroth and fylle with her maydens vpon the mansleer whyle he slept/and hacked hem alle in gobbettes. Afterwarde was discorde in the londe that greued the people full sore vnder fyue kyn/ges vnto Noliuncius Donwallons tyme. The fyftenths of Latyns Amilius Procas yonger sone regned thre & fourty yere/but his yeres be acompted with his brodris Munitors yeres

Munitor Procas sone was put out of his kyngdom by his owne broder Amili⁹ & lyued in his owne felde after warde/ & his doughter Rea other wyse called Estilia / for she sholde haue no childe was cholen to be a mayde in the Temple of þ goddesse Velca. And the .vii. yere of hyr Eme Amilius/ she bare twey childery at oo childe/ Remus & Romulus/ & she sayd that god Mars gafe hyr with childe/ & therfore she was buryed quycke / & the childery were leyd in a wood & a woluelle þ had lost hyr welpes fedde oft the childery & made hem souke of her owne tetes. But faustulus þ heord elpyed this doynge & toke awaye the childe from the wyld best & nourysed hem vp amonge his bestes with mete of wood and of felde. Than whan the childery come to age & had den wytte & strenght/ they saued ofte the bestes from strong theues/ but at last the theues toke Remus & broughte hym to Munitor/ for he sholde punyshe hym as a thefe that had stolen his bestes. And whan Munitor toke hede of the chappe of the childe. he aduysed hym longe and bethough te him how his doughter childery were layde somtyme in þ wood. Than in the meane tyme come faustulus the herde & brought with hym Romulus. Thenne afterwarde whan Munitor knewe þ the childery were his doughters sones/ he & the childery entended to see his broder Amilius. ¶ Eutrop. faustulus the herde þ kepte the kynnes bestes founde two lytill brether layde by the bynke of the Ryuer Tyber & brought hem to his wyfe þ was

called Acta laurenčia/ & for hyr fayre Annes & concupylcence of hir dylordynate lust she was called Lupa in latyn þ Dauyd. is a woluelle in Englyshe. And therfore the hous of comyn women is called yet lupanaria in latyn. These childery Remus & Romulus wared stronge & gadred to hē many herdes & theues & slough Amilius vpon þ Ryuer Alba & restored her grauntfyr Munitor to his kyngdom ayen. ¶ Martin⁹ Natheles whether þ womay was called Lupa or no/ the olde wrytynge in marble & in other stoness at Rome she weth yet / that a woluelle fedde the twey brether with her mylke/ a woluelle is lupa in latyn. Zacharias Zeroboams sone regned in Israell .vi. monethes. hym smote Sellum Sabes sone & regned oo moneth. ¶ Petr⁹ by veray acomptes eyther the kyngdom of Israell/ after the deth of Jeroboam was thre and twenty yere withoute kyng eyther this Zacharias began to regne the .xv. yere of Ozias & soo regned all thylke thre & twenty yere that he not acompted to hym/ for aile that tyme he lyued a wyched lyfe/ and for he amended him and lyued .vi. monethes good lyfe/ therfore .vi. monethes be acompted to him in þ .xxxviii. yere of Ozias. Manacn Gaddias sone regned in Israell .x. yere. Moors yaf the Egypcyans lawe in his tyme a Lambe spake and tolde redy tales. The Lacedemonies rayed batayll ayenste the Helcenes/ and atte last were agreued by playntes of her wyues/ for they were so longe from home/ & ordeyned that þ women that were lefte at home eueryche

 sholde take many men for they hoped in that maner to haue þ stronger childern. ¶ R. Loke more herof in the fyrste boke capto Grecia scz Lacedemonia. ¶ In Corynth were euerie yere ordeyned Judges in stede of hēgis The fyrst Olimpias began þ tyme so leyth Eusebius in his Cronycle. This yere Phaceas Danaens sone began to regne in Israell & regned two yere.

Joathan Jolyas sone regned in Juda. xvi. yere. In his fyrste yere Phacea Romelias sone began to regne in Israell and regned .xx. yere. This fyrst yere of Joathan as Josephus & the hystoie of Assyria & Beda telley after .iiii. l. yere and .vi. after the destruccion of Troie the fyrste Olimpias was ordeyned by the Grecis vnder Esculis Juge of Athene in the whiche Olimpias Corebus of Athene was the fyrst vyctour. ¶ Hug. Olimpus is the name of an hylle in Grecia atte chf named Aten/that hylle is called Olympos. for myrthe & clerenesse of weder that is there as it were the myrthe of god. There the Grecis haue theyr tonamentes from .iiii. yere to .iiii. yere/so that .iiii. yere was bytwene the tonoyes in the whiche .iiii. yere prynces be ordeyned & cholen/ & þ space of .iiii. yere is called Olimpias. Isychus Praxonidis sone ordeyned fyrst Olimpias. ¶ R. The Olimpias begēneth atte stynting of þ sonne in þ wynter that is whan the daye is shortest/ for the Grekes begynneth here yere than

¶ Hug. c. Olimpus. Olimpiades be playes ordeyned vnder þ hylle Olimpus in woishyp of Jupyter. In the whiche playes who þ hath the maystrye sholde haue what he wolde axe & was holden ones in .v. yere lest it shold be forgeten & it were lenger forborn/ & for it sholde greue men with grete cost yf it were offer vled. The glathphalazar kyng of Assyria went vp in to Israell & destroyed the conytree beyonde Jordane and toke prysonners two ygnages of Israell & an halfe/ & ladde with hym to Assyria/ and that was the begynnyng of the thraldome of the ten ygnages of Israell. ¶ Pol. libro octauo. Iheron sayth that this kyng of Assyria had fyue names. Salmanasar. Senacheryb. Phulle. Theglathphalazar. Sargon. Therfore it is noo wonder though this kyng be named in dyuerse stories by diuerse names. ¶ R. Now some wyl meane þ these names be names of dyuerse kynges þ regned in Assyria after Sardanapall? euerie after other. as Arbaces Phul Theglathphalazar Salmanasar Senacheryb Assaradon Sargon. After hym the grete kyngis Merodac & other vnto Balchazar regned in Babylonia vnto Darius. Cyrus tomed her kyndom to þ perses. Therfore after Sardanapallus þ was the last hole kyng of Assyria/ come kynges eueriche after other and warred with nacions that dwelled aboute hem for to recouer woishyppe and dygnyte and broughte the ten ygnages of Israell in seruage & regned vnto Ezechias tyme kyng of Juda/ whan Senacheryb fled out of

Juda and was slayne of his owne
loners in the Temple.

A Cham Joathans sone reg-
ned in Siria .xvi. yere / in
his .iiii. yere Rome was full
buylded in the hylle Palatynus of the
two bretheren twynnes. Remus & Ro-
mulus the .xxi. daye of Apryll in the
begynnyng of the .vii. Olympas
from þ yere is the kyngdom of Ro-
mulus acompted .xxxix. yere. ¶ Mar-
tinus. He redeth that this kynges reg-
ned longe before about that place in
Italye / & specially Janus. Satur-
nus. Pyrus. Jamius / & Latynus reg-
ned vnto Eneas aboute .ii. l. yere.
¶ R. Chan from Eneas to this Ro-
mulus. Italye was vnder .xv. reuol-
tes .iiii. l. yere and .xxxii. And after
that from that the Cyte was buylded
to the last yere of Tarquinus the prou-
de. He regned at Rome vnder .vii.
kynges aboute two hondred & .xlvi.
yere. And afterwarde vnder consules
vnto Julius Cezar four hondred &
four and fourty yere. ¶ Eutr. Chan
whyle Romulus regned / his leder fa-
bins slough Remus Romulus broder
with an heordes rake. ¶ Marcus. I
not yf that was done by his broders
wyl / the cause of his dech was thus.
Remus sayd that a synge walle was
not strength ynough for the newe Cy-
te and for to make that good / he lepe
ouer the walle at oo lepe. ¶ Titus
for these bretheren twynnes were of
one age / they put vpon dyuynyng whe-
ther of hem sholde rule the Cyte that

was buylde as the older and gretter Anno
mayster. Chan whan they were in þ
hylle Auentinus .vii. fowles shewed Dauid.
hem to Remus þ be called Vlters / & Achas.
afterwarde suche two / þ were .xiiii.
vlters shewed hem to Romulus. Chan
they stryued & eyther sayd þ he had þ
better diuynacō of foules. Remus for
he had fyrst / & Romulus for he had þ
more nombre / & so Remus was slayn
in þ stryfe. ¶ Marcus. But þ more co-
myn sawe is þ Remus was slayn for
he lepe ouer þ newe walles of Rome
¶ Eutr. Chan Romulus the fyrst of
the Romayns for by his name þ La-
tyns were called Romayns / & he nam-
med the Cyte after his owne name &
gadred people all aboute & challe an
hondred of the eldest & wysse & dyd
all thynge by her coulepyll & called hē
Senatours bycause of her elde or age
for senex in latyn is olde in Englysh
& he named hem fadres by cause of þ
charge & hepyng þ they had / & he ma-
de her names be wryten with lettres
of golde / and therfore they were cal-
led fadres wryten. He chose a thou-
sande warrycours and called them
Milites by that nombre Mille / that
is a thousande. Milites be Ryngh-
tes in Englyshe. ¶ Titus. And
whan Romulus hadde gadred to his
Cyte a grete multitude of flemed mē
of mysdoers and heordes & of vn wor-
thy persons / Chan men that dwelled a-
bout hem helde hem but harlottes
and wolde not yeue hem her dought-
ers to wyues / for they were soo vn-
worthy. Chan Romulus sette vp gam-
mes and prayed all the nacions abou-
te to come and to see. And whan they

were comen the Romayns rauysshed her maydens/the fayrest mayde of al was yeuey to duke Thalassus. Ther fore in weddyng of Romayns me cryed Thalassus. ¶ R. Augustinus de ci. dei li.iii. c. xi. sayth that Tytus liui⁹ treateth how by cause herof was warre longe duryng bytwene the Sabynes & the Romayns. Atte laste whan þ̄ Sabynes fylle/one Tarpenis dougghter made couenaunt with Taci⁹ kyng of Sabynes þ̄ she wolde delyuer to him and to his men the towre Torpeya where her fader was lorde. so that the Sabynes wolde yeue her the broches that they bare on her lyft armes/of the whiche Dydde maketh mynde libro pu⁹ de fastis. The Sabynes entred in atte pates of Rome & bruled & ouerlaye that mayde wylfully with sheldes þ̄ they bare on theyr lyfte spdes. Whan the Romayns herd that they arayed hem for to fyght & faught tyll they were nygh destroyed. But the Romayns wyues that were þ̄ Sabynes daughters wente with her here spradde & childer on her armes wepyng bytwene the chylthrons & cryed peas and made peas/so that her kynges sholde regne togydres / & the people sholde putte her owne names before the names of her felawes but the name of the kyngdom sholde leue to the Romayns. ¶ Eutr. Ther of it come that euery Romayne had after ward two names. But loone after Taci⁹ kyng of Sabyns was slayne by assent of Romulus/that semeth well/for he made no sorowe for hym neyther toke wreche but he graunted hem freedom that dyd that dede. ¶ R.

Tytus liuius and other wryten that whyle Romulus tolde his people atte water of Capre/he was couered and heled with a thychke clowde. But Augustinus de ci. dei li.iii. c. xiii. vnderstandeth with other as it semeth that Romulus was smyten with lyghtnyge and all to dallhed/so that no thynge of his bodeye myght be founde. Or as some Romayns wryte/he was all to haled and drawen of his owne Senatours for his trueltee. Than one Julius Proculus that was atte grete workyng amonge the Romayns sayd that Romulus appered to hym in his slepe and hyght hym & the Romaynes that they sholde workyng Romulus in stede of god & calle hym Quirinus/for he vled a spere and a spere is called quiris in the langage of Sabynes/and therfore knyghtes of Rome be called Quirytes as it were spere men. In this maner the people of Rome were lette that the slough not the Senatours for the deth of Romulus. And namely for that tyme fylle the eclypps of the sonne. Therfore the Romayns wende that the sonne had be soyr for Romulus deth. ¶ Augustinus de ciuitate dei libro. xviii. caplo xiiii. In Romulus tyme was Tales Pyllelius in his floures the fyrste of the seuen wyle men. ¶ Pseudo libro secundo. This Tales was the fyrste that serched naturell philosophy causes and workyng of heuen kynde of thynge / and afterwarde Plato departed his doynge in four / in Arithmetryke. Geometrye. Musyke/and Astronomye. ¶ Pol. vii. This naturell philosophy & dyuynour serched kyn

de and vertues of thynges & warned
and tolde before the Ecllyples of the
sonne and of the mone / & he trowed
that moysture is the begynnynge of
all thynges / & me sayd that he lyued
vnto the .lxxviii. Olympiad. ¶ Au-
gustinus li. viii. Tales dysciple was
Anaximander / he chaunged the for-
sayd oppynyon & trowyng of his may-
ster and sayd / that euery thyng hath
his owne propre begynnynge & causes
wherof it is gendred. Anaximenes
herde this Anaximander & sayd the
the eyer is cause of alle thynges. His
dysciple was Anaxagoras he sayth þ
the Inwyttte of god is maker of alle
thynges. He taught Archelaus & De-
mocratius. And Archelaus taught So-
crates / and Socrates was Platoos
mayster. ¶ Augustin⁹ de ci. d. li. xviii.
c. xxxv. The other six wyle men were
in the tyme of the Transmygracion
of the Jewes. Nathelesse they lefte no
bokes after hem wryten / but the tau-
ghte men by honelle of luyng / these
be the names of these wyle men. Pita-
cus Aplytenus. Salon Atheniensis.
Chylon Lacedemonius. Pyrradrus
Corinthus. Alcobolus Lydyus. By-
as Pyene⁹. ¶ Valerius li. iiii. ca. pñ⁹
In this Tales tyme / some fysshers
solde a draught of fyssh with þ nette
tho was drawen the golden metebor-
de that was in Appolyn Delphicus
Temple. And by cause of that borde
there fylle stryfe amonge hem / & the
fysshers sayd that they had solde the
fyssh that was taken. And the mygh-
tyer syde that fortune hadde bought
the bergayne. Than for wonder and
noueltee of this doynge me axed cou-

seyll and reede of Appolyn Delphyc⁹ Anno
and he demed that the borde shold be
yeuen to the wyllest man. Than the
borde was yeuen to Salon / and he
sente it to Byas / and Byas yaued it
to Pyracus / and soo fro one to other
tylle it was yeuen to Salon agayne.
Tho Salon halowed the borde to
Appolyn. Dzee Elaas sore sloughe
phalce the kyng of Israell and reg-
ned for hym .ix. yere. And whan the
ix. yere were done / the folke of Isra-
ell were brought in to seruage. Chat
tyme Myda the ryche kyng regned
in frigia.

¶ Ezechias.

Caplm. xxxiiii.

Ezechias was the .xiiii. kyng
of Iuda. In his seconde yere
were the Lyte Syraculana and
his chyrdre yere the Lyte Latyna in
Scicilia were buylde. The kyng of
Babylon worlhypped this Ezechias
with yestes. For he hadde herde telle
that the sonne that they worlhypped
in stede of god / had tourned ayene at
the prayer of Ezechias. And so he vn-
derstode that the sonne had done the
kyng grete worlhypp. Therefore he sen-
te messagers with ryche yestes and
desyred to knowe the reason & cause
of that wonder. Than Ezechias she-
wed alle his tresorpe. Scnacherpb o-
ther wyle called Salmanasar was
kyng of Caldees and ouercome Dzee
kyng of Israell / and beleged Sama-
rya thre yere and gate it. Also he toke
ten lynnages that is to saye the leuch
other lynnages pylsoners in to the
hylls of Medes belydes the Ryuer
m i

Anno. Gothan. ¶ Girald. That is beyon-
 Dauid. de the hylles of Calpy where Alyfau-
 Ezechias. der enclosed & closed twey foule ma-

 people & bryng hem out. Also the Je-
 wes abyden this Antecryft & beleue þ
 he is Messyas that is Cryst. ¶ Petrus
 In the fyrst takyng in to seruage of
 þ thre lynguages. He treweth þ To-
 bpe was taken & left with kyng Drec-
 pyloner in Nynue / his storie was
 fulfilled vnder Manasses Ezechias
 sone / eyther atte moost the .xx. yere of
 Solvas the kyng. Than the kyng of
 Assyres brought men of dyuerse lon-
 des in to Samaria to kepe the londe
 of Israell. And they for drede of ly-
 ons that were cruell & steyne / weren
 made holders of the lawe of Jewes /
 & called Samarite & Samaritan /
 & be keepers / they be called also Chu-
 tet & Jacobytes / that be supplanters
 but they left not her mawmetrye. Ro-
 mul^{us} dyed whan he had regned .xxxix.
 yere as it is sayd before / & the Sena-
 tours ruled the comyns of Rome the
 space of an yere & an halfe / & space of
 tyme was called inter tempus / as it
 were a tyme bytwene. Numa Pompe-
 lus began to regne amonge the Ro-
 mayns & regned .xliiii. yere . This
 Numa had no batayl with men that
 dwelled aboute hym / he ordeyned to
 the Romayns lawes & good luyng
 for they lemed rather by customes of
 batayls thenes and tyrautes lawles:
 This descreyued or departed the yere
 without redy acomptes in .x. monethes.
 ¶ Hug. ca. Janus. for the Ro-
 mayns as the Hebrewes began her pe-

re fro the moneth of Marche vnto the
 tyme of this Pompeius / but he putte
 Januare & februare to the begyn-
 nyng of the yere / & so the yere lefte a-
 monge the Romayns incorrate vnto
 Julius Cezars tyme. ¶ Eutr. Numa
 ordeyned ornamentes & serymonyes /
 & all worlhyppes of goddes byshop-
 pes dyupnes / & Mars prestes / & other
 mynystrs of presthode euery by due
 ordie / & forboden dayes & other . He
 yaf a Temple to god Janus / & an
 other w^{ith} fyre to þ goddelle Belca / & hir
 maydens to be worlhypped / that the
 lyght sholde be warden of Emperre.
 & wake & shyne to þ lykencesse of ster-
 res of heuen. And Numa sayde that
 he had all these to the kepyng of the
 noble goddelle. Also he buylde the Ca-
 pytoyll & vered it from the fyrst fun-
 dement. He ordeyned fyrst peny to his
 people & called it by his owne name
 Numus . ¶ Plydorus li. xvi. ca. xvii.
 Pecunia cometh of Pecus that is a
 beste. for Pecunia that is money was
 fyrst made of lether & of bestes skyn-
 nes. Afterwarde Saturnus made mo-
 ney of brasse with wrytynge aboute.
 Atte laste this Numa made mo-
 ney of syluer & wrote his owne name
 about. Therfore Numus that is a pe-
 ny hath that name Nummus of Nu-
 ma:

¶ Manasses Ezechias sone be-
 gan to regne and regned fyf-
 ty and fifti yere. In his tyme
 Sybyll Erophyla was in her flou-
 res in the flond Samia. And Nycha

media in Bythinia was buylde that was called somtyme Archacus. Mida the riche kyng of frigia dranch blode of a boole and dyed. Manasses an euill kyng before god / after that he had made the stretes of Iherusalem reed with blood of prophetes / and made Playas the prophete to be sawed with a sawe of tree / and ladde to pryson in to Babylon. Yet atte last this Manasses repented hym and wepte and dyde penaunce / and soo by grace amended his lyf. The hebrewes leyen þat Playas whyle he was sawed with out Iherusalem belyde the welle Siloe axed water / meny yaue hym none / than god from heuen sente water in to his mouth / and soo he yelde vp his soule. Siloe is as moche to saye as sente. Playe hadde prayed. and it was graunted of god in the sege of Iherusalem / that meny of the Lyte that wente thyder sholde fynde the water / and enemyes myght there noo water fynde. In mynde of that dede / the people buryed hym vnder an ook called quercus Rogell / faste by the water of Siloe. Kynges cealen at Athene and Iuges be ordeyned to rule the people. Tullius Hostilius the thyrde kyng of Romayns regned. xxxii. yere. ¶ Eutrop. This was the fyrst kyng of Romayns that ware purple / a maner reed clothyng of kynges and broudied & ryuelde / and after longe peas he arayed batayls and ouercome the Albans and the fidenates / and atte last he was smyten with lyghtnyng in his owne hous / and soo he dyed. ¶ Augustinus li. iii. c. xi. from Alcanus tyme to Romulus / the hede of

the kyngdome leste with Albans / Anno whan the Lyte was buylde / was grete stryfe and longe / bytweene the Romayns and Albans / the ende of the stryf was put vpon thre knyghtes on that one lyde / and thre knyghtes on that other lyde / so that of whether lyde the knyghtes ouercome other / that lyde sholde be hede of the kyngdom. Than on the Romayns lyde cam togeder thre knyghtes / euery of them was called Diacius / and were borne at one byrthen. And on the Albans lyde cam also togeder thre knyghtes euery of them was called Luricius / and were also borne at one byrthen. The thre Luricius of the Sabyngs lyde / fyrst slough tweyne of the Diaciuses of the Romayns lyde / thanne the thyrde Diacius sawe that he was left allone in right grete peryll / he feyned for to flee that he myght sodeprly falle vpon the thre whan they were departed and vnware / purpollyng to take his auantage / and so it was done for they ran after hym vnwysely euery after other. and he slough euery by hym selfe as they came to his honde eche after other. Therefore the hede & the name tourned to the Romaynes of the kyngdome. But Diacius syster that was spouled to one of the Luricius sawe that her broder had slayn and spolled hyr spoule / she myslayd her brother angerly for the sleenge of hyr spoule / therefore her brother was wroth & slough hyr also. ¶ R. This Tullius Hostilius had batayl a penynt fidenates / and prayed Metius kyng of Albans to come with hē / & assyste hym both for olde kynrede & alpyance

Anno. and for newe couenaüt and frenshyp
 Dauid. made after the deth of the thre Luria
 Maualles. cies. But whan Tullius Hostilis fel
 le on his encmyes. Metius withdrew
 hym/nathelesse Tullius hadde vnto
 rpe/and toke Metius kyng & drowe
 hym with horsles/and threwe downe
 the Lyte Alba / and toke the men &
 rychesse and sente hem in to Rome.

411 84 Archilotus and Symonides the en
 chaunters were that tyme in her flou
 res/and the Lyte Bylans was buyl
 de in Tracia/þ now is called Con
 stantynople . Among Maualles sone
 regned two yere so wrpte the Hebre
 wes/ but the seuenty sayen that he reg
 ned twelue yere . This Amos lyued
 an euill lyfe / and was slayne of his
 owne seruauntes. ¶ R. It may hap
 pe that by cause therof that the yeres
 of this age be dyuersely acompted as
 monge dyuerse men/and that the ye
 res from the buyldyng of þ Lyte pal
 sen by .x. yeres / the whiche .x. yeres
 443 110 the seuenty put .x. to. Josyas Amos
 sone a childe of .viii. yere olde began
 to regne and regned in Juda .xxxi.
 yere . This Josyas the .iiii. yere of
 his regne corrected euill doers as he
 had ben an olde man/and gladly her
 de the wordes of Deutronomii that
 is Moyles boke of the lawe/and des
 troped mawetpwe with the hygh pla
 ces. ¶ Trenisa. hygh places be Tem
 ples that were in greues vpon hie to
 tes or hylles to worshyp mawmettes
 in. Chan foloweth in þ storpe. This
 Josyas brent the boones of fals pro
 phetes and fals prestes that worshyp
 ped and serued fals goddes. And hel
 de the Esterdaye in mynde of passage
 through the reed see. And atte laste he
 faught with Pharao Nechao kyng
 of Egypte/and was slayne/and left
 after him thre sones. Eliachim other
 wyse called Jeconias. Joathas other
 wyse called Sellum / & Mathanias
 otherwyse called Sedechias . Ancus
 Marcius the fourth kyng of Romay
 nes Numaes neuewe born of his dou
 ghter began to regne & regned .xxiii.
 yere . This Ancus for the grace that
 he sawe in Tarquinni⁹ Priscus/ma
 de hym warden of his heyres/ but he
 quyte it full euill. Jeremias was El
 chias the byshops sone and began to
 prophete & prophecied .xli. yere vnto
 the destroyng of the Lyte / without
 that tyme that he pphecied in Egyp
 te. This Jeremias sawe thre toke
 nynges / a yerde wakyng / a crocke
 breynyng/and his owne bregydell J
 roted belydes the Ryuer of Eufrates
 He made the Lamentacions for the
 deth of Josyas kyng of Juda. Also
 that woman Oida and Sophonias
 the prophete prophecied of them and
 is made mynde in þ boke of kynges.
 Tarquinius Priscus the fyrst kyng
 of Romaynes regned .xxvii. yere .
 This Priscus doubled the nombre of
 Senatours/ he ordeyned games and
 playes / and made walles and vyles
 and other stronge places/and pryuy/
 and atte laste Ancus sone that was
 his precessour slough hym. ¶ Tytus.
 Whan Ancus was dede/ he sente tray
 coully Ancus sones av huntynge / for
 he wolde hym selfe be ordeyned kyn
 ge in the meane tyme . Also he chele
 Seruius Tullius to wedd his dough
 ter and to be his heyre after hym.

Therefore Ancus sones conspyred as
penst hym & hyred herdes to flee hym
Therefore the herdes feyned a plepe/
& as it were to haue a rightful dome
they appelled to þ kyng. In the whi
che caule & plee whyle the kyng toke
hede to þ one/that other herde slough
hym. Joathas Jospas myddell sone
whan his fader was dede/& his elder
broder forlaken was ordeyned by the
people kyng of Juda & regned thre
monethes / as it were from the fyrst
dape of Januar to the fyrste dape of
Auerell. Pharao Mechao kyng of E/
gypte lad hym bounden in to Egypt
& made his elder brother Elyachym
kyng & trybutarii to the kyng of E/
gypte/& called hym Joachym in to/
ken of subieccion. Than this Elya/
chym that was soo called Joachym
regned .xi. yere and lyued atte worst/
for he slough Dryas the prophete / &
pyloned Jeremye and brente Baru
chis booke.

¶ Nabugodonosor. Caplm. xxxvi.

The grete Nabugodonosor be/
gan to regne in Babylon / &
regned .xxxiii. yere & ouerco/
me the kyng of Egypte / & occupped
the londe from the Ryuer of Egypte
to the Ryuer Eufrates/and was lor/
de of all Siria without Judea. ¶ Jo/
sephus li. x. c. vii. sayth/that this Na/
bugodonosor in the fourth yere of his
regne went in Judea that is the Ju/
rye & wan Iherusalem & toke Joa/
chym pyloner/& made hym trybuta/
rye/& left hym in the waye/natheles
he toke with him pyloners noble chil

dern that were descended of kynges. Anno
Anania Azarias. Misael/& Danyel
and ladde them with hym in to Ba/
bylon with the vessel of the Temple
fro þ tyme forwarde this kyng Na/
bugodonosor was Emperour of Cal/
dea of Syria of Egypte & of Judea
that is the Jurpe. ¶ Petrus. Vnder þ
tempest & teone/the rachabytes Jo/
nadab Rachabs sones childern that
folowed her faders bestes and com/
maūdementes / and dranke no wyne
ne lette bynes ne lewe ledes/they wen
te tho in to Iherusalem to saue hem
selfe. Joachym the kyng herde telle
that the kyng of Egypte wolde este/
fyght apenst Nabugodonosor and de/
nyed hym trybute that he had promy/
sed hym. Therefore Nabugodonosor
was wroth and wente & toke Iheru/
salem and hylled all the stronge men
and Joachym the kyng also & thre/
we hem without the walles vnbury/
ed / and crowned there his sone Je/
conias kyng. ¶ Here we shal yeue cre/
dence to Jerom that sayth ther were
twey Jeconias. Done in the ende of
the four fourtene generacions/and a
nother in the begynnynge of the other
fourtene generacions/and so it maye
seme that the comune letter of Ma/
thewe is full scars for vnlearned men
to vnderstande: There he saythe:
Josyas gate Jeconias and his
brethern in the Transmygracion of
Babylon/for it lholde be contynued
in this maner that meane & vnlearned
men myght vnderstande. Josyas be/
gate Jeconias and Jeconias. And
Jeconias gate Salatyell/and eyther
Jeconias was called Joachym soo

Anno. sayth Josephus / & the text muste be
 Dauid. vnderstande in this maner. In to the
 Nabugodonosor. Transmygracion that is about the
 tyme of the tyme of the Transmygra
 cion. ¶ Trevisa. The Transmygra
 cion of Babylon was the takynge of
 þ folk of Israel in to bondage in to
 Babylon. ¶ Petrus. On the bodye of
 the elder Joachym þ was so thro wen
 without the walles were foude lettres
 & fygures apenst þ law of god / & the
 name of the maynette Codonalia þ
 he worshypped. ¶ Joseph^o li. x. c. viii
 Jeconias otherwyle called Joachym
 Joachis sone was made kynge by Na
 bugodonosor / & reigned but thre mo
 nethes / that was vnto the moneth of
 Jupll. for Nabugodonosor drad hē
 lest he wolde haue mynde of his fads
 dech & holde with the Egypcyans a
 penst hym / therfore he Nabugodono
 sor tourned ayene & beleged Jherlm.
 And the kynge Jeconias by couēseyll
 of Jeremye yelde hym wylfully with
 his moder & all his housholde to Na
 bugodonosor / & so this Jeconias was
 taken pyloner & .ii. M. prynces with
 vii. M. craftes men / amonge the whi
 che were Mardocheus & Ezechiell þ
 was yet a childe of þ blood of prestes
 & so this Jeconias otherwyle called
 Joachym lefte in pylon in Caldea
 xxxvii. yere tyll Nabugodonosor was
 dede & his sone Nabugodonosor also &
 Enylmerodach Nabugodonosors o
 ther sone toke hym oute of pylon.
 ¶ Petrus. L. xliiii. from this Trans
 mygracion that was made the .viii.
 yere of the regnyng of Nabugodono
 sor / some rekeneth thre score & ten of
 the bondage of Jewes / but properly

to speke / these that yelde hett wylful
 ly be called the Transmygracion / &
 other þ weren Itaken afterwarde a
 penst her wyl be called pyloners & bō
 dage. Mathanias Josyas thyrode los
 ne was ordeyned kynge of Nabugodo
 nosor / but he was sworn þ he sholde
 serue hym trybutarpe / & was also cal
 led Sedechias & reigned .xi. yere. ¶ Jo
 sephus li. x. ca. ix. Ezechiell began to
 prophecye & prophecied in Babylon
 to hem þ were in bondage / after that
 they had taken þeple of Jeremye the
 prophete out of the londe of Juda / &
 this Ezechiell sente his pphercye in to
 Jherlm / but the kynge Sedechias tro
 wed not his pphercyes / for hym semed
 þ the pphercyes of Jeremye & of Eze
 chiell were not acordynge. for all the
 pphercyes acorded þ Jherlm sholde be
 taken / & that the kynge sholde be lad
 a waye pyloner in to Babylon. But
 it semeth that they dyscorded in that
 that Ezechiell sayd / that Sedechias
 sholde not see Babylon. Natheles the
 re sayng were true of both. for whan
 Nabugodonosor toke Sedechias / he
 put out his eyes in Reblatha & ladde
 hym so in to Babylon starke blynde.
 Salon one of the seuen wyle men dy
 de awaye the olde dragons lawes / &
 gaf his owne lawes to men of Athē
 ne. ¶ R. Of this Salon spekerh sayn
 te Austyn d. ci. d. li. ii. ca. xvi. Agellus
 spekerh more openly li. xxi. et Trog^o
 Pomp. li. ii. in this maner. In Salons
 tyme men of Athene had no lawe for
 euery of them had lpyng of regnyng
 in stede of lawe. Atte last Salon a
 man of grete rightwylnesse was elect
 and cholen / that wente so ryghtfully

bytwene the people & the Senatours that he hadde thanke on eyther syde. ¶ Valerius li. viii. c. vii. This at his laste ende daye whan his frendes came aboute hym & talked/he arered & lyste by his hede & behelde hem / one asked hem why he dyd so/he answered & sayd / what euer it be þe talke of whan I haue vnderstanden it than I shall dye. Danuell the pphete expounded Nabugodonosor the kynges sweuen. Here take hede that Danuell seeten syghtes/thre vnder Nabugodonosor/thre vnder Balthasar/the .vii. & the .viii. vnder Darius/the .ix. & the .x. vnder Cyrus. Natheles other prophetes longe before the takyng of Iherlm & of the people/propheced of the takyng & so dyd Vlajas Dzee Michias & other whan the takyng was towarde/& whyle it was in doyng/and so dyd Sophonias Jeremias & Ezechiel/& some durynge the takyng & the bondage/as Danuell Abacuh/& som afterwarde as Aggeus & Zacharias Yet some vnderstande that Danuell lawe that syght the .xxxv. yere of Nabugodonosors regne. Nabugodonosor beleged Iherlm/for trybute was warned hym. The kyng of Egypte arayde hem and wente out as though he wolde haue broken the siege. Therefore Nabugodonosor went from the syege & chased the kyng of Egypte out of Syria. And therfore prophetes sonnes & fals prophetes scorned Jeremias & sayd/the Babylon shall not torne agayne as thou saydest & prophespedest/but Jeremias sayd þe contrayre & therfore he was fyrst put in pylon & than in a lake in slyme vnto þe thro

te. Than the same yere the .x. moneth Anno Nabularday prynce of chualtye of Dauid. Babylon beleged Iherlm/& the Lyte was closed thre monethes/and for grete hunger women ete her own children to the mesure of a span . That yere the fourth moneth the kyng was taken in the dawynge/in the waye of wylternelle & brought to Nabugodonosor in Reblata/there his eyen were put out/& he was bonden & led in to Babylon/& there was penyng to hym a laxatyfe drynke/in presence of the kyng & of all the fest/& for shame he dyed soone after . Also that yere that was the .xix. yere of Nabugodonosor Nabularday biente the Temple and hous of Iherlm & destroyed the walles/& toke awaye the vessell with the pylers / & toke the men pyloners / & toke Jeremias out of pylon. Natheles Nabugodonosor lette Jeremias dwelle with Godolia / & he lette the Rachabytes go fre. And so the Temple was biente four hondred & foure and thyrty yere after that it was buylde so wryten Hebrewes. But more verly Vlodonis & the seuenthy wryten .iiii. hondred and .xliiii. yere . After the buyldyng of Rome an hondred yere thre score and one. ¶ The fourthe age of the worlde endeth from the begynnyng of the kyngdom of Dauid to this takynge of Iherusalem & of the Jewes/that is called the Transmygracion. This Transmygracion & takynge was done the .xi. yere of Sedechias in þe moneth of August/& dured foure hondred yere thre score & thryttene six monethes and ten dayes by sixtene generations . Nathelesse

Anno. Mathew by cause of some pryue me-
 Dauid. nung letteth .xiiii. generacōns / but P-
 Nabugodo sidorus & the seuenty tellen that this
 nosor. age conteyned .iiii. C. yere. lxxxiii. And
 in case this dyscordyng of yeres hap-
 peth / for the comyn translacion sayth
 that Almon regned two yere / & some
 seyen that he regned .xii. yere. Therfo-
 re yf the .xiii. yere that the kyngdom
 of Iuda was without kyng after the
 dech of Amalpas / be put to these ye-
 res / than the yeres of this fourth age
 shall be .iiii. C. lxxx. and .xvi.

The fyfthe age of the
 worlde began from þ

 wyll reken seuenty yere of the pryso-
 nung & bondage of Jewes from this
 xi. yere of Sedechias as Eusebius dyd
 by auctoryte of Zacharie the prophete
 than he shal ende this seuenty yere in
 the seconde yere of Darius Itaplis
 sone / but it semeth that Iosephus &
 Jeroms glose reken thele seuenty ye-
 re from the .xiii. yere of Iolyas þ kyng
 in the whiche yere Jeremias began
 to pphcepe vnto þ fyrst yere of Cyrus
 But redely to acompt the seuenty ye-
 res that enden in þ thyrde yere or in
 the last yere of Cyrus / be proprely the

peres of takyng & bondage of the Je-
 wes. But the yeres þ ende in þ secon-
 de yere of Darius be proprely þ yeres
 of the full Transmygracion & of the
 Temple ¶ Petrus. C. liiii. The men
 of Iuda drad the face of Nabugodo-
 nosor for the dech of Godolpas. who
 me they hadde slayne. Therfore they
 went with theyr childern & catayl in
 to Egypt / and Jeremias went with
 them apenst her wyll. And for he pro-
 phecped alwaye that they þ wente in
 to Egypt at þ tyme sholde be destrop-
 de / therfore they stoned hym to dech /
 the fourth yere of that Transmygra-
 cion. Necheles þ Egypcyans worship-
 ped the prophete & buryed hym besy-
 des the burpels of kynges / for he had
 with his prayers dryuen away the ad-
 dres & cocadrylles from the Egypcy-
 ans ¶ Treuisa. A cocadrylle is a .iiii.
 footed best that lyued both in water &
 in londe / & is comynly .xx. cubet long
 ge with clawes & teeth strongly ar-
 med / his shynne is soo harde / that he
 recked not of strokes of harde stones.
 He rested by day in water & by nyght
 in lond. The cocadrylle allone amon-
 ge beestes meoueth the ouer Iowe soo
 sayth Plydoire. Than it foloweth in
 the storpe. Also the prophete gaf a to-
 ken to þ kynges of Egypte / that her
 maynettes sholden falle whan a
 mayde had born a childe. Therfore
 the preestes of mysbyleued men orde-
 ned hē an ymage of a mayde with a
 child & worshipped it in a preuey place
 within the Temple. Also this Jere-
 mias knewe that the Temple sholde
 be destroyed / & toke the shryne of the
 testament with all that was therin /

& made it through his prayers be swa-
 lowed in to a stone bytwene the hylles
 of wyldernesse where Moyses & Aa-
 ron ben burped / and he marked the
 stone with his synger / & wrote therein
 goddes owne name / and from that
 tyme hydderto and to the worldes en-
 de the stone is hydde with a clowde /
 so that the place may not be knowen
 neyther that name of god maye not
 be redde. He sayth that atte fyrst ary-
 syng atte dape of dome. Moyses and
 Aaron shall bynge that thyrne / and
 sette on the hylle Syna / there the ho-
 ly Sayntes shall be gadred to abyde
 the ayene goynge of god. The kyng
 Nabugodonosor the four and twenty
 yere of his kyngdome wente downe
 in to Syria and made subget to him
 Amoy and Moab. and ouercome Eg-
 gypte and slough the kyng of Egyp-
 te and ordeyned there an other kyng.
 Also atte laste the Jewes that he
 founde there he ladde hem in to Bas-
 bylon. Nabugodonosor the seconde ye-
 re of his kyngdome mette the swe-
 uen of ymage of four maner thyn-
 ges made / and was full soore aferde
 This seconde yere is not acompted
 from the fyrste begynnynge of his
 kyngdome / but from his grete kyng-
 dome whan he hadde made subgette
 other nacjons aboute / and brought
 the relyfe of Israell and of Juda
 out of Egypte / that yere befelle the
 seconde syght and vylsion of Dany-
 ell of the Angell that delyuered the
 childern out of the ouen . That yere
 befelle the thyrde vylsion that is cal-
 led the kynges pylle / in the whiche
 he telleth that he was hym selfe beto-

kened by the tree that was I seey. Anno A
 And atte laste for his pryde he sholde
 be shapen before as an ore and behyn
 de as a lyon. not by chaungyng of bo
 dye / but by chaungyng of dyspolycōn
 of wytte / and of lemyng / and that he
 sholde ete hey as an ore tyll seuen tys-
 mes were tourned in to seuen mones /
 thes atte prayer of Danyell. ¶ Perus 169 8
 xvi . After the whiche tyme he was
 chaūged in to his owne shappe ayene
 but he regned no more / but he ordeyn-
 ned seuen Juges for hym selfe / & dyd
 penaunce vnto seuen yeres ende / and
 ete no brede ne flesshe / ne dranke noo
 wyne / but ete herbes and pottage by
 counseyll of Danyell. Seruius Tul- 114 13
 lius the .vi. kyng of Romayns come
 after Tarquinius pulcus and wed-
 ded his donghter & regned four and
 twenty yeres. ¶ Eutr. libro xxi. This
 was a noble wommans lone that
 was taken. He pafe thre hylles to the
 Lyte of Rome Quirinalis Equilin⁹.
 and Diminalis / and made dyches a-
 bout the Lyte / this ordeyned fyrst per-
 sonale trybute to the Romaynes. In
 his tyme were founden eght hondred
 thousand and seuen thousande bur-
 ges in Rome. ¶ Tytus. This hadde
 maryed his donghter Tullia to one
 Tarquinius superbus / she made hyr
 owne hulbonde to conspyre with the
 comynthe of Rome. & y Senatours for
 to slee her owne fader. Therefore this
 Tarquini⁹ mette with the kyng vps-
 on a tyme & threwe hym downe of a
 staire / and soo the kyng was soore
 hurte & wente homewarde / and was
 slayn by the waye of men y Tarqui-
 nius had hyred to doo that fals dede.

Anno A And Tullia the kynges doughter her
 Transmi. de herof & toke hyr chare/and wente
 Ab Vrbe. to grete her hulbonde that was made
 newe kyng/and by the waye she lad
 hyr chare ouer hyr faders bodye. Eze
 chiell þ prophete was to drawen with
 hoises in Caldea by þ doyng of hem
 þ were lefte of the lygnages of Dan
 and of Gad / and that for he hadde
 warned hem that they sholde not co
 me ayene to Iherusalem. Also that
 yere he sawe lyghtes & vylions of the
 newyng of the Temple. ¶ Josephus
 libro.x.c.ºxi.

After the grete Nabugodono
 lor his sone Nabugodonoz
 regned in Babylon ten yere.
 he put moche more to his faders Roy
 alte. for Megasten in libro Judicioꝝ
 that in strength & grete dedes he pal
 sed Hercules. And he destroyed Libia
 and Hyberia / and pulled & drough
 out of places grete stones as it were
 hylles and sette there trees and made
 there an Orchard that was called sul
 pensilis /that his wyf myght stande
 in that Orchard and see home in to
 her owne couñtree where she was born
 & she was Darius doughter. Darius
 was Astrages sone. Astrages hete Al
 luerus also. Also this kyng beleged
 Tyrus thre yere and thre monethes.
 ¶ R. Nachelesse Marcianus speketh
 not of this seconde Nabugodonoz/
 but he sayth that Enlmerodach and
 Balchalar were brethern. That ty
 me were in theyr floures Anaximan
 der & Anaximines Phylosophres Ta

les dyscyples. ¶ Petrus. L. lxxii. This
 Nabugodonozs brother Enlmero
 dach began to regne whan his broder
 was dede/ & anone he toke Joachym
 kyng of Juda out of pylon/ þ had be
 in pylon & in bondes. xxxvii. yere/ &
 he sette his trone aboue al kynges tro
 nes þ were with hym in Babylon. he
 dyd hym this grace & mercy / for his
 broder Nabugodonoz in the tyme
 of his faders mylchpfe had do many
 euyll dedes. And whan his fader was
 restored ayen to his owne shap. he put
 his broder Enlmerodach in pylon/
 þ was accused to his fader. And Joa
 chym was there in pylon vnto the
 deth of the seconde Nabugodonoz.
 Therefore this Enlmerodach whan
 he began to regne toke Joachym out
 of pylon / for he drad leste his fader
 wolde ryle from deth to lyue / as he
 was somtyme tourned fro the shappe
 of a best in to the shap of mankynde.
 And by couñsell & looz of this Joa
 chym/ he toke out of the erthe his fa
 ders bodye & cutte it in an .L. peces/
 & deled the peces to an .L. vulters for
 to ete . for Joachym sayd his fader
 sholde neuer ryle befor all the vulters
 come to geder. This Enlmerodach
 hadde thre lones/ one hyght Egestari
 us & Regular/ that other hyght Labo
 Sardachus/ & þ thyrde hyght Naba
 & Balchalar/ to hym fylle the kyng
 dome. ¶ Petrus. L. lxxix. In this En
 nylmerodachs tyme was Suzanna
 accused þ is not in Danpels boke of
 hebrewe/ but is called a fable/ not for
 feynyng that is therinne / but for so
 me what fals is radde therin/ of the
 preestes that they were stoned to deth

for Jeremie sayth that they were bren-
te in fyre. Also for we saye that it was
wryten of Danpell/and natheles it
was wryten of one that was of Gre-
ce/ & þ semeth well by some maner a
cordyng of wordes that be not in he-
brew.

Balthasar regned in Caldea
& in Babylon/in his fyrst ye-
re Danpel sawe his.iiii.sight
of .p.iii.wyndes in þ see/þ is.iiii.ang-
gels of the.iiii.bestes/of þ lyon/the be-
re/the pardus/ & þ booz / that is of þ
four chyfe kyngdoms of the worlde/
& of the.x.hornes/ þ is of the other .x.
small kyngdoms that sprang oute of
the fourth beest / & sholde be subdued
of a lyppl horne / that is Antecryste.
¶ Petrus. l. lxxiii. This Antecryst vn-
worthy of the lpgnage of Day/shall
be born of the sede of fader & moder
in a derke place of Babylon/ & after
that he is conceyued/ an euill spryete
shall lyght in to his moders wombe/
& by vertue of hym the childe shal af-
terwarde be pned born & waken & be
called the childe of losse or of lesynge.
And therfore the fyrste ten hornes be
smyten of his face/that is to saye/he
shall slee fyrst thre kynges of thylke
ten/the kyng of Affryca/the kyng of
Egypte/ & the kyng of Ethyopia / &
thenne the other seuen kynges shall
yelde them to that fals vyctour Ante-
cryst . He shall haue wonder wytte &
connyng/ for by wytchecraft he shall
worche wondres & fynde tresour that
is hydde. He shall circūspde hym and

calle hym selfe Messyas that is Cryst Anno A
Jewes shal falle to hym/and he shal
buyde the Temple ayne / and sette
his trone therin. He shall tourne men
to hym with drede with pestes & with
wonder werkes that he shall worche.
He shall slee Enoch & Hely/he shall
greue god almyghtyes holy people þ
shall be betaken vnto his honde vn-
to the tyme and tymes and halfe a ty-
me/that is vnto a yere and two yeres
and halfe a yere . ¶ And Remigius
sayth that Antecryst shall feyne hym
dede and aryse agayne. But atte last
Cryste shall slee hym / eyther by his
owne heest or by seruyce of Saynte
Mychaell tharchangell. ¶ And Jero-
nimus super danielē sayth that An-
tecryst shall be slayn in his owne ten-
te in þ moūt of Dlyuete where Cryst
ascended in to heuen. ¶ And Remigi-
us sayth that Cryste shall not come
vnto the dome tyll Antecryst be slayn
but men that shall be saued/shall ha-
re. xlv. dayes for to do penaūce Ther-
fore take hede that though it be wry-
ten in Mathew & in Marke. xiii. that
noway knoweth þ houre but the fa-
der allone. Yet goddes lone knoweth
it / for he is the same god that is the
fader. But therfore it is sayd that he
knoweth it not / for he maketh not
vs knowe it that be his hymmes and
holy chirche here in erthe . It is not
spedefull to vs to knowe that daye.
¶ Austyn in glosa sayth . The laste
daye is vnknowen to vs/for we shol-
den be ware of all / and soo we shol-
den be demed to day or to morow. ¶ Tro
189 28
gus li. ii. About that tyme at Athene

Anno A after the deeth of Saloy the wyfe/one
 Transmi. Phylstratus bothe hym selfe that he
 Ab Vrbe. bledde/and sayd þ the grete maysters
 hadden byten him so/for loue that he
 had to the people & comyntee. Ther/
 fore were many knyghtes assygned
 to kepe him/ & he regned atte Athene
 xxxiiii. yere. ¶ Pot. li. viii. The wyfe
 of this / egged hym for to slee/one þ
 had kyssed his doughter in the hyghe
 waye/ & he answerde & sayde / yf we
 slee them that louen vs / what shall
 189 29 we do to hem that haten vs. Danpell
 sawe the fyrst syght & vylson of the
 whether or shepe that had hornes not
 all lyke/that is to vnderstande of the
 kyngdom of Medes & of Perles/ & of
 goot buck that is the grete Alysaüder
 that was drad & betokened by that
 buck/and on hym grewe four hornes
 that were his successours. One tyll
 home that is Anthiochus Epyphan⁹
 come of one of the four hornes/for he
 come of Seleucus / that was somty/
 me plegge & pylsoner at Rome / but
 he escaped thens & wente and warred
 in the kyngdom. & defouled the Tem
 190 30 ple. The sixth syght of Danpell was
 whay Balthasar with his concuby/
 nes dranke of the vessell of tho Tem
 ple of our lorde/the whiche vessell his
 grauntfyr the grete Nabugodonosor
 had brought out of Jherusalem. Bal
 thasar sawe an honde wryte before
 hym on the walle these wordes. Ma
 ne techil phares/that is to vnderston
 de/nombrie wyght & delyng / whiche
 Danpell expowned & sayd god hath
 tolde & nombried thy kyngdome that
 is now fulfyllled . for the fyrst þ arte
 weyen in a balaunce / and founden

that thou hast lass /that is thou lyuet
 te lass whyle than thou wendest. for
 the seconde / thy kyngdome is deled
 from the and yeuen to the Perles .
 for the thyrde/than the same nyghte
 Cyrus & Darius come and toke the
 Lyte Babylon & slough Balthasar.
 ¶ Darius. Whay Cyrus had wonne
 the rest londes and come toward Ba
 bylon/the Ryuer Eufrates let hym/
 and a bolde knyght and a fayre that
 the kyng loued well auentured hym
 in to the water and was drowned .
 Than the kyng was sorpe and wros
 the and made his auowe/that he wol
 de make that grete Ryuer soo shalde
 without depnelle/that the water shol
 de not come to womens knees that
 wolde wade ouer. Therefore in the bro
 de felde he departeh þ Ryuer in four
 hondred and thre score chanel / and
 so destroyed the Ryuer that was won
 te to renne thugh the myddel of Ba
 bylon/and so enemyes wente in and
 toke the Lyte that me wolde wene
 myght not be buylde ne destroyed by
 mannes dede . ¶ Petrus. C. lxx. So/
 me wryte that Balthasars moder/
 for whome the Dichearde Sulpenli/
 lis was made/was Darius doughter
 and for Balthasar had no sone/Da
 rius Cyrus came soyped and Jyoned
 to Cyrus / occupped that kyngdome.
 ¶ Petrus. C. lxxvi. Whay Balthasar
 was slayne. Darius toined the kyng/
 dome of Babylon and of Caldea to
 the perles and Medes. That yere be
 felle the seuenth vylson of Danpell.
 for Danpell sued Dari⁹ tyll he was
 done & putte in to the pytte of Lyons
 in Medea for that he worshipped god

And the same yere befelle the .viii. as
 uplyon of Danpell/for þ Angell Ga
 bypell certefyed hym of the fynall ta
 kyng & bondage comyng by the Ro
 mayns. And of the comyng of Cryst
 after seuenty wekes of yeres. for Ga
 bypell sayd leuenty thort wekes be up
 on thy people/that be wekes sette not
 of dayes/but of yeres/so that one we
 ke conteyned .vii. yere. And he sayth
 thort wekes. for we sholde vnderstan
 de yeres of the mone/ & not of the son
 ne / for a yere of the mone is thorter
 by .xi. dayes than a yere of the sonne
 ¶ Treuila. A yere of þ sonne is from
 a day of the yere to the same another
 yere / but a yere of the mone is from
 pryme in a monethe of the yere. to the
 fyrst pryme in the same moneth of a
 nother yere/ & that wyl be .xi. dayes
 rather in the seconde yere than in the
 fyrst yere . Ensample whan pryme
 goth by one/ than faylleth the pryme
 the thre and twenty daye of Janua
 ry/ & the next yere after it shall falle
 the .xii. daye of Januarie/ & that is
 xi. dayes rather. Than it sueth in the
 hystoie. Than seuenty wekes of ye
 res of the sonne / maketh foure hon
 dred yere four score & ten. ¶ Beda re
 keneth this seuenty wekes of yeres of
 the mone from the twenty yere of Ar
 taxerles the kyng/that yere Neomi
 as had leue & buyde the Temple vn
 to the .xviii. yere of Tyberius Cesar
 that yere Cryst suffred deth. Astyca
 nus hystoie acordech with Bede tou
 chyng the begynnng/but he endeth
 the seuenty wekes in the .xv. yere of
 Tyberius Cesar/in that yere Cryste
 was baptyfed. ¶ Tetrullianus reke

nech this yeres from the fyrst yere of Anno A
 Darius. þ yere was goddes worde she
 wed to Danpell tyll Tytus destroyed
 the Temple. The .ix. uplyon of Da
 nyell was of a man clothed in lynnē
 whos bodye was of Crysoliticus. And
 the .x. lyght was of þ after folowynge
 of the kynges of Perse & of kyng Aly
 launders successours & of antecryst. Da
 nyell sa we the .iii. yere of Cyrus kyng
 of Perse. ¶ R. It is vncertayne how
 longe Danpel lyued/but netheles me
 redeth in the fyrst chapitre of his bo
 ke þ he dured vnto þ fyrst yere of Cyr?

¶ After the deth of Dari⁹ of Me
 dia þ was made Assuerus ep
 ther Astyages sone. Cyrus hel
 de the hole kyngdom of þ east & sette
 his see in Persia/though þ kyngdom
 of Media were more worthypfull/for
 the mey of Persia had auauced hym
 to be kyng. This Cyrus was Darius
 syster sone & Astyages doughter sone
 ¶ Trogus libro p^o Astyages other
 wyle called Assuer⁹ had but one dou
 ghter & he met in his slepe that a vy
 ne sprange out of his doughters pry
 ue chole / and bespradde alle Alya.
 Than dreame reders expowned this
 sweuen/and sayde that his doughter
 sholde haue a childe þ sholde be lorde
 of Alya & put hym out of it. That
 the kyng drad & yauē his doughter to
 a symple knyght / that was pryuely
 born/for his doughter sholde bere no
 noble childe. And also whan his dou
 ghter was with childe / he toke hyr
 to hym / and whan the childe was

Anno A born/he betoke it to one Arpag⁹ that
Transmi. was his secretarpe / for he sholde slee
Ab Urbe. the childe. And he troweth þ the kyng
dome shold somtyme falle to the kyn
ges doughter / & betoke the childe to
an herde þ kepte the kynges bestes / &
cōmaunded hym to ley the childe in a
wode there to be deuoured. And whan
the herde had leyde the childe in the
wood/he tolde his wyf therof/whiche
was lyghter of childe the same tyme
& she prayde þ he wolde fette the chil
de to hyr & she wolde nouryshe hym
& that he wolde lepe her owne sone in
the wode for hym. And whan the her
de came to the childe/he foude a byt
che peuen it souke & kept it from bel
tes & foules. ¶ **Petrus. L. lxxiii.** And
whan the childe was brought to the
herdes wyfe/it made to her good sem
blaunt as though it had knowen hyr
& she named the childe Spartatus þ
is a welp in the langage of Perse.
And whan the childe was of age and
strength/& that he coude goo about &
playe with childer/his playe feres cal
led hym Cyrus/& made hym her kyn
ge in playes/& he chastyled sore them
that were rebell to his bestes. Wherfo
re the fadres of the childern were ag
grieved & complayned to kyng Astya
ges on the herdes sone/than þ kyng
sente after the childe / & axed why he
ferde so wiche childern/he answer
de boldely & sayd that he dyde so as a
kyng sholde. The kyng wondred þ
the childe was so bolde & so stedfast/
& toke hede þ the childe had sygnes &
tokenes of a kyng/& he toke the her
de a syde pryuely & lerned the loch all
how it stode. Natheles the drede of

his neuewe was asslaked / for he trow
wed that the meanynge of his dreas
me reders/was fulfilled in the kyng
dome of childeren. Therefore to the
same man Arpagus / to whome he
hadde rather bytake the childe to slee
he bytoke to nouryshe and to fedde/
and tolde hym that that childe was
the herdes sone / but he made Arpa
gus pryuely ete his owne childe / for
he had broken his behest. And whan
he hadde eten his childe/than he tol
de hym all. It befelle that Astyages
made this Arpagus leder of his oost
for to warre apenst his enemyes of
perse / and the kyng lefte hym selfe
in Medea. Thenne Arpagus bethous
ghte hym and had in mynde of that
euill dede þ the kyng had done hym
and counseyled thooft to chele Cyrus
and make hym the kyng of Perles.
And than they called hem Cyrus as
they wolde meane/though Astyages
stryue this shall be heyre. ¶ **Trogus**
libro primo. In the meane tyme Ar
pagus sente a letter to Cyrus that he
shold haue mynde how he saued hym
and losse his owne childe for loue of
hym. Arpagus myght not sende this
letter openly for the kyng / therefore
he toke out the bowels of an hare &
put the letter within the hare/and for
the fraude sholde not be knowen he
sende it on a daye as it were venyson
And whan the letter was redde : Cy
rus was warned in his slepe that the
fyrst man that he mette erly on the
morow / he sholde take hym with
hym on his way. Than erly on mo
row he mette one Sebar þ was esca
ped out of pylon / and was borne in

Perse. He dyde of his gyues & ladde hym with hym to Persypoll/there he gadred the people & bade hem hewe downe a grete wood/& made hem a grete fest a morowe. And whan he sawe them mury & well atte ease with mete & drynke/he axed hem whether hem were leuer the trauayll of the rather daye/eyther the fest of that daye Than Cyrus sayd/who þ foloweth the Medes he shall haue the trauayll of yesterdape / & they þ foloweth me shall haue suche festes. Than anone he araped hem to batayll ayenst Astyages. ¶ Petrus. L. lxxiii. Than Astyages drad loore & made his Colyn Darius to be his sone Adoptin⁹/ & whan the batayls cam togyder & began to fyght. Cyrus & Perles began for to flee/than her wyues & her moders came fast ayenst hem & shewed hem her pryue choles / & axed of hem wyl ye crepe in to your moders wombe & be born ayen / than the men were ashamed & tourned sodeynly ayene & felle on her enemyes & hadden the vyctory Cyrus bare hym to Astyages as his neuewe after the vyctorye/and not as his vyctor / for he graunted hym the kyngdom of Hyrcans whyle he lyued & he graūted the kyngdom of Medes to his eame Darius as to his moder brother / & hoped that it sholde torne to hym ayene. ¶ Petrus. L. lxxiiii. Cyrus whan he had herde Vlayas prophete that was wryten of hym an hondrea yere & .xx. before/in this maner to my Cryst whos right honde I haue take ic. He delpuered the Jewes the fyrst yere of his kyngdom & made free nygh fyfty thousand men / &

restored hem the holy vessels of golde Anno & of syluer fyue thousand & thre hundred/& yaued hem leue to goo ayene & builde the Temple in Iherusalem. Aggeus meoued hem moost therto þ was tho yong/& not yet a prophete. & also Zacharias the prophete meoued hem/that blessyd Salatyels sone and called him Zorobabell that is to saye mapster of Babylon. But for many of hem in Caldea & hadden there possession & wyues & childer/hem was the lother to go thens & abyden vnto the thyrde yere of Cyrus.

Danyell prayde to god for the delpueraunce of the people & Darius kyng of Medes/the fyrst yere of his kyngdom purposed to delpuer the peple.but he dyed soone and he fulfilled it not. Therefore Cyrus the fyrst yere of his kyngdom yaf the Jewes the same leue/but the people was slowe/therfor Danyel prayd god that as he had yeuē the kyng wyl to delpuer the people / that he wolde yeue the people wyl for to wende homewarde agayne. ¶ Petrus. L. lxxiiii. Than the .iii. yere of Cyrus þ Jewes wenten vnder Zorobabell the duke / and vnder Johan the grete preest. And this was the .lxx. yere of the bondage and takynge / soo sayth Iosephus and Jeroms glose vpon Ezechiell / that tyme was from the .xiii. yere of Josyas the kyng the .iii. yere of Cyrus / though Eusebius in his Cronycle by auctoryte of Zachar

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rie the prophete sayth that the secon-
de yere of Darius Itaplis sone was
the .lxx. yere of this takyng & bouida-
ge. Necheles it may be determyned in
this maner. The seconde yere of Da-
rius was .lxx. yere of the fyfth age of
the worlde & of the destroyng of the
Temple. But the .iii. yere of Cyrus
was the .lxx. yere of the fyrste takyng
that was done the .xiii. yere of Josias
the kyng. Than the Jewes wente ho-
me agayne & leyde the foundament of
the Temple/& the Samarytans her-
de therof & came to hē & aspyked hem
to buylde the Temple/for they wor-
shypped all one god & had vnderstan-
de Moyles boke. The Jewes answe-
red & layden/though we worshypp one
god/natheles it falleth not vs to byl-
de one hous. Therfore the Samary-
tans were wrothe/and lette her werke
with suggestyons & with yestes onto
the seconde yere of Darius Itaplis
sone. ¶ Drosius libro pñ. In kyngde
Cyrus tyme Phalaris a Tyrant of
Scicilia punysshed men oft rightful-
ly/though he were hym self vnright-
full. Thenne one Parilius a craftes
man of brasse delyred to plese the Ty-
rant & made hym a brasen boie with
a doze in the right syde / where men
that were dampned sholde goo in to
the bole for to be tormented/& whan
they were within & the doze closed &
fyre made there vnder/the noyse and
crye of hem that were tormented shol-
de passe by dyuerse wyndynges & for-
nynges/so that it sholde seme gryse-
ly roryng of boles & of bestes / & uot
mannes gronyng. But Phalaris the
Tyrant was well appayed with the

dede/& wroth with the doer/& made
him fyrst assaye the tourment that he
had wyckedly brought vp to torment
other men/and punysshed the craftes
man by the craft that he had founden
That yere befelle that / y me redethy
of Crelus the ryche kyng of Lyddus.
for whan Cyrus warred apentst y Ba-
bylons. Crelus kyng of Lyddushelpe
the Babylons/but he was ouercomē
& fledde/& whan the Babylous were
cealed Cyrus toke Crelus & dyde by
hym grete worshypp / & that toined to
eyther of them grete profyte . For the
strengthe that come out of Grece to
warre apentst Cyrus tourned agayne
for the curtolpe that was done to Cre-
lus . This Crelus had a doughter y
hyght fanatica whiche had a spyry-
te of prophete/& euer counseyllled hir
fader to leue the warre/wherfore Cre-
lus axed counseyll of y goddes y be-
gyled hym with a verie & a worde of
double vnderstandyng . Cyrus alyn
passe shall/and than kyngdomes ma-
ny lese. Therfore Crelus was rebell
apentst Cyrus & was taken the thyr-
de tyme . ¶ Petrus . C. lxxvi. Cyrus
smote Crelus belydes the Ryuer A-
lym and brought the lyddes/that we
re noble men of armes/by sleight tot
wretchednesse and slouth . For whan
they hadde lost her hoises and her ar-
mure/he made hem to vlc tauernes/
playes/papes/and nyce craftes with
comyn woman and strompettes and
euylly hyung men/and in this maner
as it were shewyng loue & good wyll
he ouercome by lykyng and lecherye
hem that he myght not ouercome by
batayll. And so the kyngdom of Lyd-

des faylled that had stonde two hondred yere and .xxxi. ¶ Trogus li. p.ii. There had be noble kynges of Iydes/but none so gracypous as Landalus that loued his wyfe to moche by cause of hyr beaute/ & wolde speke of hyr & prayse hyr to all maner men/ & atte laste he shewed her naked to one Gygy that was his one felawe. By that dede he made his felawe a spousle breker & his owne enemye/ & there for he losse bothe his kyngdome and his wyf.

The seuenth & the last kyng of the Romaynes had thre names. Lucius Tarquinius and Superbus / he slough his wyues fader Seruius Tullius & reigned .xxv. yere. This foude vp fyrst dyuerse maner tormentes among the Romayns as bandes/boleyerdes/plates/batte/prylsons/gynes/chepnes/outlawpnyng/ & exilyng / he ouercome the Dultes & the Gabyes/and made peas with the Tuscans. ¶ Augustinus de ci. li. ii. c. xiiii. Atte last he buylde a Temple of Iuppter in the hylle Larpelus/ & for they foude a mannes hede in þ place whyle they dygged/they called þ place Capitoliū/wherfore theyr pphetes & dyuynes tolde that/that place sholde be hede of the worlde. ¶ Titus li. & Aug. d. ci. li. i. c. xix. Somtyme whyle this Tarquin⁹ Superbus besyged the Cyte Ardea þ was rebelle to Rome/his sone Tarquinius sextus & Lucrecias hulbonde Tarquin⁹ collatin⁹ satte at soper & talkede of the chasty

te of her wyues/lette be quod Collatinus/ & lette theyr owne dedes prayse our wyues. Therfore as it were by al sent they came by nyght to Rome/ & foude Lucrecia al one wakyng about wolle werke / & other mennes wyues were a slede/ & some about gyglotrye wherfor Sextus Tarquinius wayted his tyme & was lodged by Lucrecia in gestwyle/ & came vpon her whyle she slepte with his swerde drawen to lygge by her maugre her tethe/and sayd but thou suffre me lye by the. I shall put a naked churle dede with the in bed / and thou shalt lygge dede with hym also. Than whan this Sextus had done that dede/the woman went hyr waye sorowfully / & sente to hyr fader & hulbonde & prayed them to come home out of the oost/ & enformed them the myshappe that hyr was befallle / and they paue feyth & credence to hyr messagyer. And she toke wresche of the dede/ & slough hyr selfe before hem with a pryue knyfe that she bare. ¶ R. Wyle men here saye that Lucrecia here slough not hyr selfe/for no vertue but for shame & for angre/for neyther man ne woman sholde be punysshed without gylte/neyther gylte without Juge. But for the Romaynes coueyte moost praylyng of men/ & worldely worshyp. This Lucrecia had drede yf she lyued after that dede lest the people wolde wene that she were assentpnyng to the dede. And thorfore in token that she was soyr therof/ in conseruyng her good loos & name and in a voydyng the despyte/and in example of good woman she wolde no lenger lyue. of this happe speketh

Anno **A** a dytoure or retrypcon as Saynt Aus
 Transmi. sty de ci. li. i. c. xix. toucheth Tweyne
 there were / and one brabe spousage.
 Ab Drbe. ¶ Eutr. By cause of this dede þ peo/
 ple gadred togeder / & put downe & de
 posed his fader from his kyngdome.
 & exiled him & his childern / the hoost
 that was with the kyng at Ardea / for
 loke Tarquin⁹ the kyng. And whan
 the kyng came to Rome & fonde the
 pates closed apenst hym / he & his chil
 dery wente away. After that kynges
 were put out of the Lyte / & two con/
 suls were ordeyned to gouerne the co/
 montee / that were Junius Brutus
 & Tarquinus Collatinus Lucrecias
 husbonde. But er the yeres ende Lu/
 crecias husbonde was put out of his
 offyce of consull for hate of his na/
 me / by cause he was called Tarqui/
 nus. for the Romayns wolde that
 no man that bare that name sholde
 bere offyce in the Lyte / neyther dwell
 therin / & that in despyte of the spoule
 brekynge that Tarquin⁹ Sextus had
 done. ¶ R. Austyn de ci. li. ii. c. xiiii. et
 xv. sayth that Lucrecias husbond was
 put out of his offyce within the yere /
 by fraude of his felaw that ocher con/
 sull. ¶ Aug⁹ li. iii. c. xiiii. and Tytus.
 Whan Tarquinus was so put of / he
 sente messagers in to the Lyte / & his
 messagers had preuy counseyll with
 the sones of Brutus the consull / and
 with Dicelles the brethern of Brutus
 wyfe. The coulepll was / that Tar/
 quinus sholde be brought to his estate
 in the Lyte apene / but this came out
 by a seruaüt of the Dicellies / & was
 knowen and tolde to the Senatours.
 Than Brutus the consull dyde them

to deeth euerychone. ¶ R. Virgyll spes
 keth herof in fine sexti libri Eneidis.
 ¶ Eutr. li. p^{ri}o. Than Tarquinus ga
 dred helpe on euery syde & warred a/
 yenst the Lyte / for he hoped to be rel/
 tored in that maner / & in the encour
 tryng & fyghtyng. Brutus the consul
 & Arnus Tarquinus slough eyther
 other / and Tarquinus faught thryes
 in thre yere apenst the Romaynes &
 was ouercomen. Therfore he wente
 in to Tulculus with his wyf & lyued
 there. xiiii. yere. But the forsayd Bru
 tus the consull was so poore whan he
 dyed that he had no moneye to burye
 hym with / but as it was gadred a/
 mong the people. ¶ Petrus. l. lxxvi.
 and Trogus libro primo.

O Prus whan he hadde wonne
 Alya. he entended to warre a/
 yenst the Sythes / there Tha
 nurus the quene of Sythes and Mel
 sagetes that be alle one nacyon came
 apenst hym. Though she myght has
 ue withstande his entre in to hyr lon
 de & all hyr enemyes / and haue hol
 den hem of atte passage of the Ryuer
 Araxes. Netheles she wylfully suffred
 them entre to haue the elper fyghtyn/
 ge within the londe that she knewe.
 Also for the Ryuer behynde hyr ene/
 myes sholde not lete them escape by
 flyght. Cyrus set his pauplyon within
 her londe with grete plente of mete &
 drynke & feyned hym to flee / & with
 dra we him as it were for drede. The
 quene had sente her yonge sone with
 the thryddele of her oost apenst Cyp⁹.

¶ Whan he come to the deynceous me
te and drynke/he was vnconnyng of
chryualtye & he & his men were rather
ouercomen with dronkenes than with
dedes of armes. Than Cyrus came
vpon hym & slough hym. Whan the
quene herde therof/she wept not ther
fore/but for solace & comfort she desy
red to take wreche/& begyled Cyrus
with suche a maner gyle. She as it
were sleynge for hyr sone þ was newe
wounded drow Cyrus in to a narowe
daleye bytwene hygh hylles & slough
Cyrus & .ii. C. M. of his men of Per
se/so that not one escaped to bere ho
me tydynge. The quene hade smyte
of Cyrus hede / & throwe it in a fla
kette full of mannes blood/& despy
led hym in this maner/now fylle thy
selfe with the blood that hast euer de
syred/& thus Cyrus was dede / after
that he had regned nobly and vally
xxx. yere and alwaye done grete de
des. ¶ Petrus. L. lxxxviii.

Ambyses Cyrus sone regned
after his fader. Floras cal
led hym Artaxerles & Allue
rus. Macheulle in the storpe of Judith
he is called Nabugodonosor. In this
Cambyses tyne befelle that is redde
in thystorpe of Judith. ¶ Trogus. L.
lxxxix. And noo wonder though he
were so called/for his owne fader Cy
rus called hym Nabugodonosor/and
whyle he was a lyue / he made this
Cambyses that was his owne sone
to regne .xii. yere among the Assyries
in Assyrie. But atte last whan his fa

der was dede/he helde the holt kyng/
dome of þ eest. viii. yere. This Cam
byses suffred not the Temple of Jhe
rusalem to be buylde durynge all his
tyme. Also the fyrste yere of his holt
kyngdom he slough Arphaxath/that
wolde haue regned in Media. Whyle
he wold be worshipped in stede of god
of Israell as he was ouer all. Judith
the wydowe sloughe Dylfernes the
prynce of his hoolt in þ syege of Be
thulia the seconde yere of his Empp
re. Than Cambyses the fyfth yere of
his kyngdom destroyed Egypte. He
forsoke the vlagges therof & destroyed
the Temple & buylde Babylonia in
Egypte. And whan he tourned thens
he dyed in Damaske the .viii. yere of
his kyngdom. ¶ Valeri⁹ li. vi. This
Cambyses made stryke of de skynne
of a Juge/for he had yeuyn fals Juge
mente/& made hem to sprede & to ta
ke it about the chayre there as the Ju
ge sholde sytte in plee for to deme / &
made that Juges sone Juge in that
place in stede of his fader/& made su
che verses to be wryten vpon the chay
re sytting on this see. Justyce loke þ
stedfast be. Kepte honde & eke ceres/
from yestes/& from mennes prayers.
Take lanterue lawe / lyghte vnder
skyn to drawe. Thou syttest in place
yet / where thy fadfader was sette.

After Cambyses one Hermey
des that was one of the seuen 228 68
wyle men that ruled the kyng
dome of perles / wedded Cambyses
n ii

Ab Vrbe. doughter / and made it as though he wolde not regne by the tittle of his wyfe / but as though he wolde haue kepte the kyngdome to one Mergus Lambyles brother / þ̄ yet was a yong childe. Natheles Lambyles had slayne before this Merg^o within þ̄ Temple / & noo man wyll therof / but this wyle man Hermeydes. After .vii. monethes of his kyngdom / this Hermeydes lyeng on his dech bed & he had a fayre yonglynge to brother / ordeyned hym kyng & sayd / that that yonglynge was Mergus Cyrus lone & Lambyles brother. Suche hydynge of kynges myght lyghtly be done in Perse. For no man goth in to kynges of Perle but men of meyne. One of the wyle men began to haue suspocion of this doyng / & had a doughter amonge the kynges concubynes / & charged his doughter pryuelly / that she sholde by nyght grope the kynges hede & take hede yf he had eeres. And whan it was knowen by the wenche that the kyng hadde none eeres / the .vii. wyle men conspyred to gedre & slough him & so these two brethern regned scarily one yere. Than these .vii. wyle men treated bytwene hēself which of them sholde wedde the kynges doughter & be kyng of that kyngdom. Than all they accorded þ̄ they sholde erly a morow come in to a place of the paleys before the Temple yates / & whos horse neyde fyrste / he sholde be kyng by the shewyng of the goddesse. Than one of hem Darius Itaplis lone spake pryuelly with the keper of his hors & charged hym that he sholde make his hors assaile a mare that nyght in

the same place where they sholde come to gedres a morowe. Soo it was done / & whan the wyle men came to on the morowe / anone Darius horse began to nepe / for he had mynde of the mare / and so Darius was made kyng & regned .xxxvi. yere.

Darius regned ouer an hundred and .xxvii. prouynces / and Zorobabell Salatyels lone was right famplyer with hym / & had counseilled him er he were kyng that he shold make his auowe to god of Israell that yf he were kyng / he sholde restore the Temple of god / & yelde the holy vessels agayne. Therfore Zorobabell began boldly to buylde the Temple / and Zacharias and Aggeus the prophetes comforted him well therto / & sayd that god was wrothe with hem / by cause goddes house was desolate / & they dwelled in houses that were well buylde and laydey that it was a token of goddes wrath that they sewe moche and gadred lypyl. But the prynces of Perse that were beyonde the Ryuer letted the werke of the Temple. Therfore Zorobabell wente to Darius and had greece worthyp of hym and slept in his owne chambere. ¶ Josephus li. xi. The kyng put forth a redels erly a morow and axed of the thre wardens of his bodye / whiche is the strengest of these thre / kyng / wyne / or woman / and promysed them yestes that gaf redeste answer. The fyrst sayd that the kyng is the strengest of all for this skylle

for a man is aboue all bestes/and the kyng is aboue men/ & men dooth all thyng þ he comaūdeth. The seconde sayd þ wyne is strengest by this reison The kyng is not aboue other men by strength of his wytte/ & wyne ouer cometh the strengthe of mānys wytte Zorobabell sayd a woman is stronger than eyther of the twayne/ & women peueeth lyfe & fedynge to kynges & to hem that sette bynes/ & whan kynges be comen to strength / they Jeoparde theyr lyfe for women. And he tolde þ he lawe a kynges concubyne peue the kyng buffettis/ & whan she lough the kyng lough/ & whan she was wroth the kyng was wroth also. Netheles he sayd/ truthe is stronger than all these thre. for all these be they neuer so fayre/so grete & strong they shall passe & fayle/ but sothnes & truth shall neuer dye ne chaunge/ but euer dure. This sentence pleased more all men/ & the kyng graūted hym the vessels of the Temple/ & lycenced hym to go & bylde the Temple & yauue hym lectres of warrant þ no man sholde lette hym. Than þ seconde yere of Dari⁹ Itap⁹ sis the. viii. moneth þ werkmen wroughe for to bylde the Temple & fulfilled it the. vii. yere þ was the. xlii. yere of the kyngdom of Perles from þ fyrst yere of Cyrus/ whan they had leue to bylde the Temple/ & so it is soth þ is sayd in the gospell/ in. xlii. yere this Temple was bylde. Whan the Temple was bylde it was halowed the. xii. moneth þ is in Marche. And this is the seconde halowynge of the Temple & was done in Marche. Netheles the fyrst halowynge in Sa⁹

lomons tyme was done in heruelle. Anno A The thyrde was dono in wynter in Transni. Judas Machabeus tyme. ¶ Petrus Ab Vrbe. L. lxxxii Also this yere the fyre þ was taken awaye of þaulter/ the fyrst yere of the takynge in to bondage & hydde in a pytte. it was foude brennyng. Of the shryne of the testament how and whan þ Jewes came there to it is vn/ certayne. But yf it be soth þ Epiphanius that the shryne sholde not come out of the den of the stone where Jeremias had hydde it tyll þ daye of dome. Than it is sothe þ the hebrewes made a nother to the lyknesse of the olde shryne þ Moyses made. for it is redde that among þ prayes þ the Romayns toke out of the Jurpe/ they toke the shryne of god a candelstyk & a mete borde. And so whan þ Temple 234 14 was full bylde in þ moneth of Marche. Aggeus & Zacharyas dyed. This yere kynges were put out of Rome & 242 82 Consuls began to rule þ comonte as it is sayd before. And there were made tway Consuls / that yf þ one wolde outrage. that other myght refreyne. & these tway Consuls were cholen and chaunged from yere to yere lest they wolde outrage yf theyr offyce dured longe tyme ¶ Titus. After that Tarquinius was put out Rome/ the Romayns hadden peas among hem self whyle Tarquinius warred apenst hē but in the fyfth yere began stryfe bytwene the grete rulers & the comonte in this maner. It was vsage & custome among the Romayns that warryours shold warre vpon her owne coste/ but tho by cause that they warred oft/ they must borowe moneye of the

Anno **A** grete maystres/ & of the rulers of the
 Transmi. Lyte/ & the dettours that myght not
 paye her moneye at her daye they we
 Ab Urbe. re put in pylon. And therfore began
 stryfe / and the comyne people went
 thre myle oute of the Lyte vnto the
 hylle mount Sacer/ but atte last peas
 was made vpon suche a condycyon/
 that the people shold haue grete may
 stres & trybunes/ that sholde maynte
 ne & defende them ayenst the grete.

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Pitagoras the Phylosopher
 dyed that tyme. ¶ Trogus li
 bro. xxii. This was of the na
 cion of Samia a riche marchautes
 sone called Maratus/ but Pitagoras
 was well richer than his fader. for he
 myght forsake more than his fader
 myght gete. This wente fyrste in to
 Egypte/ and after in to Babylon to
 lerne the cours of the sterres. & to kno
 we þe begynnynge of the world. Thens
 he tourned agayne in to Creta & La
 cedomonias for to knowe Mynos &
 Ligurgus lawe. Than he tourned to
 the Lyte called Ciuitas Croconion/
 that was all out of rule. And there he
 was .xx. yere and taught there ver
 tues and thewes/ and taught theyr fa
 der and moder childern and olde wo
 man eueryche by hem selfe / and atte
 last he wente to Methapontus & dyed
 there. This same sentence is wryten
 of hym Pot. li. vii. ca.ºiiii. but there is
 more putto in this maner Pitagoras
 with ofte dysputynge brought aboute
 that olde moders putte awaye her no
 ble araye of golde and of other royal

te/ as though suche araye were Instru
 ment to lecherie / and therfore they
 dyde them awaye and offred hem in
 the Temple of Juno. Pitagoras
 sayd that chastyie is veray noble ar
 raye of olde moders. Thre hundred
 yongmen were sworn togyder and ly
 ued in a felawshyp by hym selfe as it
 were a companye of pryuy colpyracy
 ayenst hym/ and tourned the Lyte a
 yenst hem selfe. So that the people of
 the Lyte gadred hem in to one hous/
 and wolde haue brente hem / and in
 that stryfe were sixty dede and the o
 ther were exiled. This Pitagoras
 was of grete auctoryte in olde tyme/
 that his oppnyon passed al other mē
 nes sentences. Also it was ynough to
 conferme ony sentence. yf Pitagoras
 sayd soo. ¶ Valerius libro. iii. ca.ºvii.
 They that herde hym dyde hym soo
 grete worthyp / that they sayd. It is
 not lawfull to make neyther doubte
 ne questyon of loore that he had tau
 ght. And me axed hem ony realon of
 lawes that me sayd / they pafe none
 other answere but that Pitagoras
 sayd so. ¶ Plydorus libro primo seyth
 that Pitagoras founde fyrst this let
 ter .V. to the lykenesse of mannes lyf
 ¶ Agell libro octauo capitulo octauo.
 Alle the money that ony of Pitagos
 ras companye hadde / it was openly
 put forth amonge hem / and soo the
 companye was stedfast ande trewe.
 Also they that came to his loore axed
 besely of thewes and of kynde/ of cal
 tyngge of mouth and of semblaunt of
 araye and shape of bodye. Also he or
 dyed couenable tyme to be styll &
 to speke. ¶ Hug. Dydascolus. Pitag

goras had this maner by the .vii. scyences/none of his scolers holde before .vii. yere axe reason ne skylle / but besely herkyng what he sayd/and he holde byleue what the mayster sayd. tyll that he had sayd/and so than he myght hym selfe fynde skylle & reason ¶ Pol. libro. vii. This Pythagoras vled to grete contynence & abstynence that he ete neyther fyssh ne fleshe. Also after his deth men wondred soo moche of hym/and his auctoryte was so grete that men made a Temple of his hous. and worshypped hym in stede of god and in caas toke occasion of his lawe. For he sayd whyle he was on lyue/that a phylosophers hous is an holy place of wytte and of wysedome and veraye Temple of god. All so he taught men to byleue that mennes soule shall neuer dye/ but lyue for euermore/ & for to haue mede or payne after theyr deseruyng in theyr lyfe. Mathes me sayth that he broughte wyckedly the fable of a thousand yere after the deth. ¶ Jeronim^o contra Ruf. Pythagoras sayth that soules after the deth passe fro bodye to bodye. ¶ And Virgilius sexto eneydis sayth ofte they begynne to wylle to tourne to bodye. ¶ Tullius de natura deoz li. iii. Whan Pythagoras founde newe conclusyon in Geometrye / he wolde offre an oxe to the Mules/and that Jtrowe was done/for he wolde not offre to Appolyn Delphicus. for he wolde not sprynge the aulter with blood. ¶ Trevisa. It is wonder to speke of the Mules. for some poetes feyne that the Mules were the doughtres of Jupyter and of mynde. And some feyne

that they were the doughtres of Meno and of Telbya. ¶ Pol. li. v. c. iiii. Men of Athene brente Pythagoras bokes/ & exiled hem also/ for they doubted of her goddes whether it were soth or noo/ of som what that me spake of her goddes. ¶ Agell^o li. v. whan that Pythagoras was yong and was belye to gete spedeful maner beryng of byrthen to gete his lyuelode with/ he bare a byrthen of many Jup stalkes bounden in a shorte roop. Democrit^o the phylosopher mette hym/ and saw the yonglyng do spedly his dedes/ & had his byrthen bouiden as it were by crafte of Geometrye/ and axed hym who had bouiden that fagotte. J sayd Pythagoras/ than he made hem vndo the byrthen & bynde it agayne / and sayth y haste wytte for to do well/ yf thou wylt folowe me/ thou shalt wel do better dedes/ and he graunted & lerned of hym phylosophye. ¶ Pol. li. v. One Auallius riche and yonge come to Pythagoras for to lerne parfyghte maner of spekyng / and payed hym halfe his moneye before er he lerned/ and that other halfe he holde paye that daye that he made plee before a Juge and had the maystrye. Atte last whan he had connynge of speche / he forloke his facunde and his connynge before pleders as me troweth / for he wolde not paye that he owed to his mayster. Pythagoras toke counseyll & somoned hym before Juges / and began in this maner/ lerne thou yonge foole / that that J axe is dette to me/ by eyther waye. for yf J overcome the in this cause/ than by right it is dette to me. And yf the dome is yeuen for

Anno **A** the/than is it dette to by couenaunte.
 Transmi. for than thou ouercomest & haste the
 Ab Vrbe. maystrye. Naye sayd Auallius. but let
 ne wyle mayster that by neyther way

 be demed apenst me/than shall I not
 paye by dome. & yf it be demed apenst
 me/than shall I not by couenaüt. for
 I haue not the maystrye. Than the
 Juges sawe y the cause was brygous
 as it were an insoluble/and contynu
 ed the sentence of Jugement to a lon
 ge dape. Soo it is redde amonge the
 men of Athene/that a woman poyle
 ned hyr husbonde and hyr owne sone
 for they had wyckedly slayne hyr so
 ne & her heyr that she had by her fyrst
 husbonde. The olde Juges relpyted
 theyr Jugement tyll an hondred yere
 for on that one syde was grete sorow
 to asloyle / and in that other syde a
 cruell dede to be dampned. ¶ Pseudo
 rus libro.ii.ca.ºxxiiii. Though men
 rede that Tuball of Caymes lpgna
 ge was fynder of consonancye and of
 mulyke before Noes flood. Natheles
 me redeth amonge the Grekes that
 Pictagoras founde the crafte of mu
 lyke by sowne of hamers and by stret
 chyng of cordes & of strenges. ¶ Ma
 rianus libro.ii. It happed that Pic
 tagoras passed forth openly and her
 de smythes bete with hamers on ho
 te prou and acorde eueryche to other
 in certayn ordre of sowne. for the shar
 pe sowne acordeth with y grete/and
 made the smythes to chaüge hamers
 but the same acorde of sownyng folo
 wed alwaye. Than he toke hede that
 the hamers were of dyuerse weyght/
 and hade hym make greter hamers.

And from hamers he tourned hym to
 examine strenges and streyned guts
 tes and senewes of shepe & of beestes
 fastened to dyuerse weyghtes / suche
 weyghtes as he fouden in the hamer.
 And had suche longe and acorde as
 the rather acordyng of hamers made
 with swetenesse of kyndely sowne of
 strenges. Than whan he was conyn
 ge of so grete pryete. he began to fyn
 de nombres by the whiche sownes as
 corde/and loo he spedde to make the
 craft of mulyke. ¶ R. Therefore Tul
 lius de Tusculis questio libro.iiii. spe
 beth of hym and sayth/that Pictago
 ras scolers couthe brynge her mynde
 out of stryfe of thoughtes to rest by
 longe and sowne of strenges. ¶ Au
 gustinus ep. h. contra Rut. Whan yon
 gelynges were wyndronken and wol
 de bete the pates of chaste women.
 Pictagoras bade pppers pype a longe
 made by thendytynge of Spondeus/
 and whan they dyde so/tho the bestys
 alyte of moeuyng of lechery celled by
 the slouth of the maner of townes.
 ¶ Seneca libro.iii. de lira. Pictago
 ras with harpe and strenges celled the
 dystourbance of wyttes. ¶ R. Here wy
 le men I telle that Pictagoras passed
 somtyme by a smythes hous and her
 de a swete sowne and acordynge in
 the smyting of four hamers bypon an
 anuelt/and therefore he lette weye the
 hamers / and founde that one of the
 hamers weyed twyes soo moche as a
 nother. A nother weyed other half so
 moche as a nother/and a nother wey
 de so moche as a nother and the thyr
 de dele of a nother. As though the fyr
 ste hamer were of six pounde/the secon

Anno A Italye. for Pythagoras taught a grete contree of Italye / that somtyme was called the grete Grecia . Other were called Ionycy / that hadden þ name of the yonder Grece / theyr auctour & prynce was Tales & Milleli? ¶ Pldorus li. viii. Other had names of standyng & comynge togydres / as Stocy. Achademyce . Peripatetycy. Stocy had that name of a porche of Athene called Stoa in þ langage of Grece / therein was peynted the grete beryng & dedes of wylemen & of stronge. The fyrst of hem was Zenon þ all synne was lyke grete / & thus he meened that it were a grete synne to stele strawe as golde. & to slee a knyght as an hois / for the best he sayd is not to blame / but the mannes wylle. This Zenon sayd that mannes soule shall dye with the bodye. ¶ Trevisa. I wolde a wyle man had seen his water / & powred it in his throte though it were a galon . Than it foloweth in the storpe / he & his scolers sayde that they sholde not dure withouten ende / and nacheles they despyred lyfe withouten ende. Achademyce hadden þ name of Platoes towne belyde Athene called Achademia. & was in poynt for to falle / there Plato was wonte for to stude. This trowed all thyng was vncertaynly made. Archelaus broughte vp that secte / but Domocritus made it more. But it must be graüted that many thynges be vnknewen & hydde fro mannes knowleche. So god wylle that many thynges passe the knowleche of man. And also many thynges be that maye be knowen by mannes kyndly wyfte. Peripatetycy haue that

name of Wandrynge and of walkyng / for Arystotle was her auctour and was wonte to dyspute wanderynge and walkyng. ¶ Augustinus de ciuitate dei libro. viii. There be thre maner phylosophres of kynde / & taketh hede of kynde of thynges / such were Tales Millelius Pythagoras & they that helde her loore. And some Ethici that toke hede and taught the knowleche and connynge of good luyng and of thewes / such was Socrates and they that helde his loore. and Plato specyally and they that helde his loore. Therfore among all he is praysed for a partyght teacher of phylosophye. ¶ Pldorus libro octauo capitulo sexto. Therfore he is a veray phylosophre þ hath knowleche of thynges that longeth to god and to man / and holdeth all maner waye of right full luyng. But of all maner of phylosophres / they that were called dyuynes were reputed for moost excellent. for they treated of god that is almighty . Nacheles many of hem erred in treatyng of god and of the worlde . And many came to the knowleche of god / nacheles they worshypped hym not as god / but vanysshed awaye in her thoughtes / and sayde that they were wyle / and they were made foolles . The errours of hem brought in afterward many errours in holy chirche. Suche a false error is that dede men shall not aryle at the daye of dome / and that euery martyr is euen and pere to god. ¶ Augustinus de ciuitate dei libro octauo capitulo decimo. They that had right knowleche of god profyted moche to the knowle

che of truth/ & suche was Plato that sayd þ in god is cause of beþng / reason of vnderstandþng / & ordre of gode lyuyng. And therfore god is to vs begynnþng of kynde soþnes of looze & grace of lyfe. Also there were phylosophres þ trauaylled theyr wyttes to fynde & knowe cause of thynges / and maner of lyuyng. Nacheles they were moost prayled þ knewe god / & where he is & that he is cause of all thynges that is wrought & lyght of soþnes & of truche. & well of grace that we shal drynk. To this knowleche they come in this maner / they trauaylled theyr wyttes to fynde the best of all that is god. They knewe that / þ is no body for a bodye maye be fordone & corrupted / for it is made of contrarpe thynges. Also they toke hede þ god is noo lykenesse / that maye be chaūged / therfore he passed all bodyes & all lykenesses. The bodye is seen without the lykenesse of þ bodye is in thought with in / & that þ is in thought within / is no bodye / but lykenesse of a bodye. Than the lykenesse is knowen by a thyng þ is neyther the lykenesse neyther the bodye. & that þ is lykenesse is seen & demed whether it be fayre eyther fowle / is better than the thyng þ is so demed. Ther is no fayrenesse of bodye / whether it be in state of bodye as in shap of length & briede / eyther in moeuyng as in songe / but suche as þ in wytte of may demeth / & þ myght not be / but yf there were a better lykenesse / in the inwytte without swellþng of bodye & cryeng of mannes voyes without lengthe or space of the place & of tyme / but þ is mannes thought

& kynde in wytte of mannes soule / & Anno A that is no bodye / lyth þ the lykenesse that is knowen therby is noo bodye. Transmi. Ab Vrbe. But & our inwytte is no bodye / sholde god make þ our inwytte be a bodye Also our inwytte is chaūgeable & meuable. els sholde no mānes wytte knowe better than other. of that he feleth & knoweth. neyther he that is wytter better than he þ is duller. And yet the same wytte amendeth & proufyeteth & demeth better after than before. But what that is amended & apayed is chaūgeable. Than phylosophres and dryuynges knewen well that no thyng þ is chaūgeable maye be / but by hym that is a stedfast & not chaūgeable. to hym is none other beþng than lyuyng / none other beþng than vnderstandþng / none other beþng than be well. ¶ Eutropius and Marianus.

The peple of Rome made stryfe as though they were myl²⁴⁴ 94 ledde by þ Senatours. Therfore they made hem trybunes as defendours of the people ayenst the consuls. Quintus Marcius duke of Rome that hadde taken the vultes before / was put out of the Cyte and was wrothe and wente to the vultes that he hadde rather taken and hadde helpe of hem and went for to warre and destroye the countree fyue myle from Rome / and ouercome ofte the Romayns / and forsoke peas that they profered / and celled not to warre and greue the Cyte / tyll his moder & his

wyf came out of the Lyte & prayed for the Lyte. Thre hondred noble men called familia fabia faugh allone apenst the Hegenles & weren smyten to deth. The Romayns be byspaged in the mount Algyd / & Lucius Quincius delyuered hem / he was taken from the plough & made a dyctatour he wyped away his sweet & toke on a royall gowne. Egypte forloke Darius kyng of Perle & wolde not be vnder hym. Pompilia a mayde at Rome was taken in lechery & was buryed quych a lyue. Pyndarus & Symonydes the poetes were tho in her flour.

¶ Trogus li.ii. After the deth of Pysistratus the Tyraunt of Athene one of his sones toke a mayde by violence & laye by hyr / & therfore y maydes broder slough hym. That other broder named Elpias helde the kyngdome of Athene after his fader. & made hym be taken that had slayne his brother / and whan the mansleer was compelled by tourment to knowlege the men that were assentynge to the mannes deth / he accused & appelled all the Hylppas the Tyrauntes frenedes / & whan they all were slayne / Hylpias axed yf there were ony moo consentynng to his broder deth. And he answered & sayd. There is no man a lyue worthy to dye but y allone. Than the people knewe the vertue of that yong man / & put Hylpias out of the Lyte. Than Hylpias went anone in to Perle to Darius the kyng & excyted hē apenst them of Athene. ¶ Diosius li.ii. This Darius after that he had recouered by batayll. the Assyries & the Babylons that rebelled apenst

hym / he ordeyned batayll & warre against Antycyrus kyng of Shytes / for he had axed the maryage of his daughter and had it not. And went forth with vii. L. M. men of armes / and loste seuenthy thousande by sodayne resles and sharmysthes. Nacheles in retournyng he chastysed the Macedonynes and the Jones. Also he ordeyned a batayll apenst the men of Athene / for they helped and were assystente to Jones. Nacheles men of Athene with ten thousand mette soo many thousande / and were soo glad to fyght: soo that whan there were a thousande paas bytwene the Hyltrons / the cours was soo spedde that the strokes came before the enemyes. Than there was so strong fyght / that they seemed men on that one syde / and bestes on that other. ¶ Trogus libro secundo. The Perles were ouercome & fled to theyr shyppes / of whiche shyppes many were dreynt and many were taken. In soo grete a vyctoipe it were harde to telle who that gate the pryce. Nachelesse one Lynegyprus a knyght of Athene / after many grete dedes & slaughters / pursued the Perles that fledde to shyppes / there a shyppe that was laded he helde with his right honde tyll it was smyten of and est with the lyft honde & lost it / and whan he had lost both his hondes / he boote on & helde the shyp with his tethe / soo that the stoke of a man faught with his teth as it were a woode best. Two hondred of the Perles dyed there with hyppius the tyraunt. And so afterwarde Darius dyed the yere of his kyngdome .xxxvii. and

leste many lones a lyue. Amonge his lones Artaxerles as he that was begotten in the kyngdom/ & he had the grete Cyrus to his moders grauntsyr that was auauiced to the kyngdom.

Artaxerles Darius sone was the fyfth kyng of Perles/ & regned .xx. yere. This way Egypte that his fader had lost / and put out Arysted/ and warred fyue yere apenst Grece as his fader had begonne. ¶ Josephus sayth that vnder this Artaxerles the leuenthe yere of his kyngdom. Eldras wente downe in to the Turpe/ & Neemias the butler wente downe the .xxv. yere and restored the lawes of Iherusalem in space of .xii. yere. And Eldras hym selfe sayth that he went downe in Artaxerles tyme. ¶ Trogus. Dne Damarachus was exiled out of Athene / and dwelled with kyng Artaxerles/ & loued more his owne londe after they kyng. than the kyng after that he had done hym moche good/ and wrote all the kynges purpose in tables of tree/ and waxed the tables about the wrytynge & sende hym by a prieu messenger to þe grete of Athene. Than the men of Spartania aduyled hem longe what it sholde meane/ for they sawe no wrytynge in þe tables. And atte last kyng Leonidas syster founde out the concepte of the wryter. for she shaued of the wax & than the lettres were seen and redde / and soo they were warned of the warre. for Artaxerles hadde made redy nyne hendred thou

sande of fyghtyng men/ so that it lemed that the hoost dreyd vp the Ryuers/ for hem behoued so moche water. ¶ Drolius li.ii. Artaxerles hadde .vii. L. M. fyghtyng men of his owne kyngdom and .iiii. L. M. of helpe of other londes. And shyppes of uaire with yren knowtes .ii. M. and .ii. L. and .iiii. M. of other shyppes well arrayd/ so that the Ryuers semede scars for hem for to go in / and the see semed scars for hē to sayle in. Than this grete route that was not habpily arrayed to fyghte/ neyther free to go forth and to renne / neyther redy to flee come bytwene places of Termopyles. and four thousande of Spartates felle vpon hem. and leyden a downe and slough on hem thre dayes togeder. ¶ Valerius libro sexto. Whan the grete route was gadred togeder/ one of the Perles sayde / the Grekes shall not only be ouercomen. but they shal be alayed with the multytude of Perles. And a nother spake and sayd the kyng shall haue none enemyes to kyth on his strengthe. Yet a nother spake and sayde / the see is scars for oure shyppes/ townes be scars for our knyghtes / and felde for our other men. Thenne Damarachus answered & sayd/ here be so many men that they maye not be ruled/ & what maye not be ruled/ maye not longe dure/ & soo it befelle. for many that were nought rewled / were ouercome of fewe that were well rewled. Therfore whan the kyng was ouerlette with them of Lacedemones / he sayd that he was begyled/ for he hadde so many men. and but fewe connyng in bas

capll for to fyght. ¶ Valerins lib:iii.
In that fyghtynge one of the Grekes
layd to his felawe / the sonne is
derked with arrowes & shotte of Per-
ses / thou sayste well sayd that other/
for we shold better fyght in shadowe
than in hete of þe sonne. Also me axed
in grete despyte of one that halted/
why he came in to the batayll/and he
answerde & layd. It is my purpose to
abyde & not to flee / and that befalls
leth well for an halt man. ¶ Trogus
libro scdo. Atte laste Leonida kyng of
Athene came on with four thousande
de men / & bete downe a grete parte
of the hoost of Perses / & came vpon
the remenaunte by nyght whan they
were a slepe/& slough of hem & cha-
ced hem & brake & shayled the hoost
euery fro other. Artaxerles myshap-
ped twyes / for he was ouercomen in
batayll on the londe / & wolde assaye
his fortune and hadde on the see/and
there his man were beten & shad and
shayled euery from other. And he þe
had rather hylled & be spradde the see
with grete shyppes was dysconfyte/
& for fere gladd to flee/and vnnethe
escaped away in a fysshers boot. Al-
so there dyed wonder many for hon-
ger / and many dede careyns laye in
the feldes. & afterwarde there came a
moreyn vpon the hoost/so that bestes
and foules folowed the hoost by the
smell of dede careyns. ¶ Herodotus.
The wryters of hystories Euripedes
Balylydes Dyagoras and Sopho-
cles the wryter of gestic were that tyme
in her floures. ¶ R. Jeronimus
in Epistola ad Nepocianum speketh
of this Sophocles and sayth / whan

he took but lytell hede of meyne and
for his grete hulholde for his grete
eld / his sones acculed hym of wo-
denesse. Thenne before the Juges he
reherled and sayd the fable and gette
that he had wryten of Edyppus/and
now in his grete age of wytte and of
wysedom that he sholde come the cru-
elte of Juges in to fauour of the thea-
tre. That tyme Socrates the philo-
sopher was born/and a stone shapen
as a goot felle downe from heuen in
the see Egeus. Artabanus Artaxer-
ses the kynges steward purposed to
be kyng of Perse / and came in an es-
uentyde with his seuen sones in to
Artaxerles chambere / and slough the
kyng and many other. And the kyng
had twey sones/that one hyght Dar-
rius / and that other Artaxerles.
And Artabanus excited Artaxerles
to flee his broder Darius / and sayd
that Darius hadde slayne his owne
fader. But one Dagabaxus knewe
howe the kyng was slayne / and tol-
de Artaxerles howe it stode and howe
Artabanus hadde slayne his fader.
And anone Artaxerles gadered the
people to geder / and made hem co-
me armed before hym / as though
he wolde knowe the nombre of his
knyghtes. Than whan Artabanus
stode before him armed among other
mey/the kyng sayd that his habery-
on was to short/and bade Artabanus
do of his habaryon and chaung with
hym. And whan Artabanus hadde
vnnarmed hym and was naked/ano-
ne the kyng commaunded his men to
flee hym and his sones / and soo Ar-
taxerles toke wreche of his fader deth

and laued his faders trone & his bro-
ders lpf and hym selfe from gyle and
treason. ¶ **M**arianus.

¶ **C**aplm

.xv.

Artaxerles the seuench kyng
of Perle was called Longima-
nus & regned .xl. yere. & began
to regne whan Arthabanus had reg-
ned seuen monethes. Some saye that
chystoie of Hester & of Mardocheus
befelle in this Artaxerles tyme / but I
trowe not / for Eldras the wryter in
this kynges begynnynge telleth þ he &
Neemias tourned fro Babylon & spe-
keth not of Hester / & yf Hester had be
in his tyme. it is to presuppole he wol-
de somwhat haue spoken of hir. But
Hester was in the other Artaxerles ty-
me that was the .xi. kyng of Perles.
& hete Assuerus also. Aboute this ty-
me Dunwallo Moliunci⁹ þ was the
dukes sone of Cernewaple began to
regne amonge Brytons. And whan
the kynges were slayne of Englonde
of Wales & of Scotlonde / he regned
allone in the Flonde / & made hym a
dyademe & a crowne of golde / & ma-
de certayne lawes þ he called Moliū-
ci⁹ lawes / þ whiche lawes afterward
Eldras tourned in to latyn. And af-
terwarde kyng Aluredus made hem
be tourned out of latyn in to Englysh
the. And whan this Moliuncius had
regned .xl. yere / he dyed and was bu-
ryed by the Temple in the Cyte Tri-
nouantum that is London. This is
he that gaf pryuelege and fredom to
Temples / to Plowes / to Cytees / to
Wapes þ ledech therto. ¶ **P**etrus. **E**s-

dras the wryter came downe with the Anno A
kynges lettres / by whiche he shold dis-
charge þ mynystrs of þ Temple of Transmi.
all maner trybute. & put other in. & o^r Ab Urbe.
ther out & chaūge hem as it were to
doyng & punysshynge hem þ were rebel-
le / by dech. by exilyng. by pylson. other
by payeng of catalle. And Eldras ca-
me down with the vessayls of þ Tem-
ple to teche his people in Iherlm the
lawe þ he had wryten / & corrected the
bokes .ii. L. and .xx. of the childeren
of Israell þ were beyonde þ hylles of
Caipy cam with hym at ones / and a
M. & .vii. L. came with hym out of
Babylon. Therfore he chastyled in
his comyng þ childeren of the Trans-
mygraciōs / & specyally prestes for wy-
ues of straūge naciones. Eldras rene-
wed & wrote the lawe þ the Caldees
had biente / & amended þ volumes þ
straūgers had aparyed & gadred al in
to .xxii. bokes / for the Hebrewes shold
haue as many bokes as they had let-
tres. Also he foude vp newe maner ty-
tles & pryches to wryte among the let-
tres that were lyghter to be wryten /
& therfore he was called a swyfte wry-
ter. Also he put some cytes of psal-
mes & telleth that Jewes wrote before
in maner of bydders from the lyft sy-
de to the right syde / & eft from þ righ-
te syde to the lyfte syde. Empedicles
Permenides and Zeno the phylosophes
be in her floures. Empedicles
chele to be buryed in the hylle mons
Ethna that is in Sicilia þ bienneth
alwaye. ¶ **B**oce de consolacōe sayth
that Permenides satte ten yere on a
roche and bethought him of the Arte
of Logyke. But plato afterwarde

Anno A made that arte more & founde therein
 Transmi. many pynnyples & rules. But Aryl/
 Ab Vrbe. totples brought it togeder in to arte.
 Tho was feretpdes the seconde wry
 ter of hystorpes in his floures/nathe/
 les lypyll before Herodot⁹ had wryten
 thystorpes. ¶ R. And Tptus liuius.

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The Romayns sente messagy/
 res & prayed men of Athene
 to sende hem lawes wryten.
 This were Salons lawes/they sente
 not in to Lacedemonia to haue Lpgur
 gus lawes. though his lawes were bel
 te. for they hadde hym suspede as a
 lyer/for he had sayd that he had ta
 ken lawes of Appolyn. The Romay
 nes gadred this Salons lawes in to
 ten tables & put afterwarde twey ta
 bles therto. Therof come afterwarde
 that famous laue of the twelue ta
 bles. as it is wryten in folio de Origi
 ne Juris li. i. scdo in the glose. ¶ Plydo
 rius li. v. Moyses gaf fyrst laue to the
 Hebrewes. feroncus to the Grekes.
 Mercuri⁹ Trymogestus to the Egp
 cyans. Salon to men of Athene. Lp/
 gurgus to the Lacedemones/and Nu
 ma Pompilius to the Romayns. Af
 terwarde the people of Rome myght
 not ne welde not suffre the stryf of the
 maystres & Judges/and ordeyned ten
 men to wryte lawes / & they wryten
 lawes out of Salons bokes/and toz
 ned the laue of twelue tables out of
 grue in to latyn. The fyrst that wol
 de make bokes of laue was the gre
 te Pompeius the consull/but for dre
 de. of euyll spekers he accomplishhed

ne fulfpylled it. Than Julius Cesar
 began to make bokes of lawes / but
 he deyed to soone/And so among the
 Romayns lypyll & lypyll lawes were
 compyled/tyll Constantpne the grete
 ordeyned newe lawes/but Theodosi
 us Minoz made a boke of laue that
 is called Theodosi⁹ coode. And soone
 after Justinianus of well nyghe of
 two thousande bokes & thyrty thous
 sande verses made/ & restored the la
 wes of dygest. The power of consuls
 ceased in the Lyte. And theñe menwe
 re ordeyned rulers in stede of þ twey
 consuls / but the seconde yere after as
 Saynt Austyn toucheth de ci. dei li. i.
 ca. xix. One of these ten men þ hygh
 Appius Claudis had grete desyre and
 luste to enduce & meoue a knyghtes
 doughter to lygge by hyr/ & made fal
 sely one of his seruautes chalenge hir
 for his bonde woman/ & loo Appius
 demed & Jugged hir/ & her owne fader
 slough hyr & made playnte to the peo
 ple of that falschede / the people was
 tho in the hylle Algyd. Than the ten
 men were put out of her offyce / and
 Trybunes and Edyles were putte in
 theyr stede. ¶ Petrus. L. lxxxvi. Nee
 mias a may of Hebrewes kynge Ar
 taxerxes butler came by leue of his lor
 de out of Babylon in to the Jure/ &
 ladde the people. xii. yere/so that that
 the fyfthe yere he began to restore the
 walles & yates of Iherusalem / & he
 ended his werke in two yere & foure
 monethes/ & had so grete lette in the
 buyldynge that halfe the people stode
 armed without the Lyte for to defen
 de the Lyte and the werke/for tpspr
 ge & slechyngge of straunge nations/

and that other dele of the people armed buylde the walles/and leyde stones with that one honde / and helde eueryche his swerde in his other honde. Afterwarde Neemias toke hede that the Jewes had no fyre from heuyn and cledsed a pytte in the valeye of Josaphat where Jeremias had hydde fyre in the tyme of takyng in to bondage. and founde the stocks of the aulter and biennynge coles / and fette water/and he cast of that water on a fagotte of wood & therof come fyre. Than yf thou wylt reken seuen ty wekes of yerres from the twenty yere of Artaxerles whan Neemias wente downe to buylde Iherusalem vnto Cryste/that is vnto the .xxviii. yere of Tyberius Cesar/the whiche seuenty wekes of yerres Danuell prophced to be shorted vpon goddes people / yf myght fynde seuenty wekes of yerres so that thou acompte a weke of yerres of the mone. And a yere of the mone is .xii. monethes of the mone. As it was vled in Moyles lawe/not the yere of the sonne/nepther of Embolysme. And soo seuenty wekes of yerres from this yere vnto Cryste maketh four hondred yerres of the mone and four score and ten without the monethes of Embolismes h maketh foure hondred yere of the sonne & thre score and fyften ¶ Trevisa. An yere of the sonne is the full yere h men vle now in Englonde and other londes. But the yere of the mone is .xii. monethes of the mone. And a moneth of h mone is fro chaunge to chaunge/and so the yere of the mone is lasse by enleuyn dayes than the full yere/and the

moneth of Embolisme fayleth whan .xiii. pymes be in one yere. ¶ R. The nombrie of the wekes and yerres maye be proued in this maner. for Beda libro de temporibz sayth that the kyngdome of Perles dured from this .xx. yere of Artaxerles to the sixth yere of Darius/whan Darius was ouercome of Alysaunders an hondred yere & fyften. And than the kyngdome of Grece dured vnto Julius Cezars tyme two hondred four score & tweyne yerres. Than from the begynnyng of Julius Cezar that regned four yere and seuen monethes to the .xxviii. yere of Tyberius Cezar was foure score yere and .viii. and soo all these yerres amoūte vnto the nombrie of four hondred .lxxv. yerres of the sonne. ¶ Dio lius libro.iii. Tyll a grete dele of the dawe was passed / it semed that the nyght dured. Also hayle stones felle & descended from the clowdes and bete the erthe with veray stones. ¶ Petrus l. lxxviii. Eldras dyed in good age and elde. And Neemias tourned apene to Artaxerles the kyng/but he tourned apene to Iherusalem apenst his endyng dawe/and chastysed hem that trespassed apenst the lawe and dyed & is buryed by the walle that he made in Iherusalem. ¶ Beda de tempore. Hyderto thordre of the holy hyltorie is taken of the bookes of hebrewes that were wryten of dedes and of doynges of yerres. But what dedes and doynges folowed after this / be taken of the bookes of Josephus Afrycan and of the bookes of Machabeyes. Este consuls were made at Rome. Ppocras in this tyme flourysshed

Anno A **C**lydoius libro quarto Appollo fou
 de fyrst arte of Phylsye amonge the
 Transmi. Grekes. Than his sone Esculapius
 Ab Vrbe. made it more/and was smyten with
 lpghtnyng / and that arte was lefte
 spue hondred yere vnto this Artaxer/
 ses tyme. And in his tyme Ppocras re
 newed the arte and craft of Phylsye
 in the flonde Theo. But the twey fyr
 ste artes were vntrusty. that is to saye
 Methodica that taketh none hede of
 tymes of causes of elementes neyther
 of age / but oonly of the euyl and vbe
 tellynge as olde wyues do. The se/
 conde is called Emperita and axed
 not but assaye. The thyrde is called
 Logyca and is alowed & appreued.

After this Artaxerles. Artaxer
 les the .viii. kyng of Perle
 regned two monethes. In his
 tyme Plato was born. And after hyn
 fogodyanus regned .ix. monethes.
 After hym Darius Nothus by his
 surname was the .x. kyng of Perles
 and regned .xix. yere. **C**anfr. and
 Afr. In his tyme Belinus Molun/
 cius sone regned in Brytany. and hel
 de to hym selfe Leogria myddell En
 glonde Wales and Cornewayle/and
 toke that other londe beyonde Hum/
 bre and Scotlonde to his brother Bre
 nicius/and they tweyne acorded in þ
 kyngdom spue yere well ynough/ but
 afterwarde Brenicius was rebell to
 Belinus. and this Belinus ouercome
 hym/and he fledde to the duke Allo/
 brog that is the duke of Ircyll Bry/
 tayne and wedded his doughter/and

had the lordshyp after the dukes dech
 After that he had that ducherye one
 yere / he came in to Brytayne with
 frenshmen & Brytons of Ircyll Bry
 tayne to warre ayenst his broder/ but
 theyr moder that was full olde sprad
 de her heer a brode & shewed her brel
 tes that they had souked & so she ma
 de peas. Than after an yere these bre
 thern made fraunce subgette. and ou
 uercome the Germayns & besyged
 Rome atte last. That tyme the fyrst
 Denys vled Tyrannye in Scicilia &
 furius Lamillus was made dyctas
 tour in Rome & ouercome the Venes
 tans & the falsstes / but he was put
 out of the Lyte by enuye surmysyng
 vpon hym that he had not egaly des
 parted the prayes that they had taken
Cytus. Whan the Romayns bele/
 ged the Degetes/they had many vns
 happes. And furius Lamillus mys
 ned on that one lyde of the Lyte and
 made wayes vnder erthe/by the whi
 che wayes a knyght wente in & toke
 the towre of the Lyte whyle furius
 Lamillus yaf assaute to þ Lyte on þ
 other lyde. And whan men of the Ly
 te sawe that/the yelde them self & the
 Lyte/ but furius Lamillus offended
 the people in delynge of prayes / soo
 that he was called to Jugement/and
 he drad to be condempned. and he out
 lawed hym selfe wylfully/and wen
 te in to the Lyte Ardea. Nacheleste in
 his ablenche he was condempned to
 ten thousande of certayne moneye of
 biasse. But afterwarde he came & bra
 ke the spege of frenshmen.

Artaxerles the sone of Darius & of Paralitides had a surname Mennon / & the Hebrewes called hym Alluerus. He was the xi. kyng of Perse and reigned .xl. yere from Inde to Ethiopia ouer an .L. prouynces & .xxvii. his trone was in the Lyte Sulis. The Lyte that here was called Sulis was called Egbanitanis in the boke of Judith and was chyfe Lyte of the Eremptes. Josephus sayth that Danpell made there a wonder burpell for kynges / so wonderfull h̄ it semed made the same day that is to saye the kynges of Media of Perles & of Perchea were wonte to be burped in that burpell. This Artaxerles othewyse called Alluerus in the thyrde yere of his kyngdom made grete reuell & fest to his prynces / h̄ dured an hondred dayes thre score & ten / in that wonderfull palays h̄ meredeth of in thystoie of Alplaudie. The pylers of that palays were of syluer / the coueryng lyke to the fyrment chambred & hauynge precyous stones of dyuerse colours to the lyknesse of the sterres. Afterwarde he lay with his people .vii. dayes in the Dyrcharde of lphyn / there was a vyne yerde with vynes of syluer / with braunches of golde / and clustres of precyous stones. The pauplons were pyght vpon pylers of syluer of marbell and of Juorpe with ropes of white sylke & of reed. There Vasty the quene was rebell & wolde not come to the kyng / therfore hester was choleyn quene in her stede Democritus the phylosopher dyed h̄ tyme. Agellus spebeth of hym and sayth that he putte out his owne

eyen / & that for thre skylles. The fyrste for his syght lette hym of his holy thoughtes. The seconde for he myght not see wemen without grete temptation. The thyrde for that he sawe shrewes ofte mysdoo. & deden euyl dedes / & that myght he not suffre / but it greued him loore. ¶ Tullius ep̄. xcv. Democritus was wonte to saye / that the hestes of shrewes / & the noyse of the wombe ben in one place / what haue I to doo therwith sayd he / whether this noyse lowne vppwarde or downwarde. ¶ Pol. li. vii. Socrates the philolopher four score yere olde and .xix. dranke popson with stedfast lemblante & dyed. ¶ R. Leste errour befall in the name of Socrates / take hede for there were thre Socrates. One was auctour of doyng & of dedes. Cassiodorus in thystoie called Tripertita prayleth well this Socrates. Selencus Theodericus & Socrates made that stoie. A nother Socrates was of Grece a grete phylosopher & lawer. Of hym libro primo Saturnalium is reherled that noble lawe. Whan he was prayed of his felawes to putte forth somwhat of his noble spekyng he sayd as this place axeth I spare no speche / and the speche that I spare is not couenable for this place neyther for this tyme. Suche a tale is tolde of Ppocras the phylosophe. The thyrde Socrates was platoes mayster of hym is our speche at this tyme. ¶ Pol libro. iiii. caplo. vi. Socrates was reputed the wylest by answeere of Appolyn / and without ony withsayeng he passed the leuen wyle men that were holden wyle men amonge the Grekes

Transmi. wythout comparison not only in wit
Ab Vrbe. te and cunnynge but also in maner of
 good lpyunge therfore Tullius libro.

 he called philosophye from heuen vn
 to erth and stuffed cytees wyth philo
 sophye. Augustinus de ciuitate dei li
 bro octauo capitulo xiiii. ¶ A spiryte
 folowed Socrates and thaught hym
 thynge/Apulius libro suo i de di.
 Socrates sayth and reherleth þ this
 spyrite vled to warne Socrates to le
 ue of his doynge whā the doynge shol
 de haue noo good ende R. Therfore
 calcidius super libru thimeidhe lairh
 that a spiryte folowed and taught so
 crates from his first childhode not to
 compelle hym to do ought but to for
 bede hym to doo thynge not spedfull
 And as in dremes it semeth a man þ

 ray voys/ but by some token that fo
 lowed thoffyce of manny voys/ So
 socrates thought whyle he was wa
 kyng was comforted and taught by
 warnyng of clere token of the spyrite
 ¶ Tullius de diōe libro primo / We
 haue lerned of Socrates that was al
 waye tendaunt to a spiryte that was
 called Demon but he neuer moeued
 hym to do dedes. but wythdrewē him
 ofte fro doynge of dedes/ And therfor
 whan he sholde be dampned to dethe
 he chose to deye in moost rightful ma
 ner. but tho hadde he no token gpyen
 him of his god. Valerius libro primo
 capitulo septimo / ¶ Socrates in his
 olde age vled harpyng and armonye
 of strenges & sayd that it was better

to vse that crafte late thā lerne it ne

 te of musik that arte is right nedeful
 sayd he. And so he heylid hym selfe es
 uer pouer to lerne and ryche to teche.

 crates I can not but that I can not /
 As Jeronim⁹ reherleth epistola xxxv
 Valeri⁹ li. viii. Socrates shamed not
 to take a rehed bytwene his thyes. &
 playe wyth his smal chylder. Pot. li.
 viii. ¶ It is homely and necessarye a
 wyleman otherwhyle to playe/ not to
 putte awaye the vse of vertues/ but to
 refreshe him self and make hym mo
 re stronge to doo vertues of vertues /
 Also Socrates was profitable in ver
 tues þ maketh men lyke god/ for he
 was a mā of good temprure as Agel
 sayth li. scōo/ So that well nyghe all
 his lpyes time he liueth in helch with
 oute sekenesse/ & also in that mozeyne
 tyme that destroyed the Cyte Athene
 Therfore valerius li. scōo/ Sayth þ
 socrates sayde þ many men wolde lpy

 li. iii. de Ira lairh that Socrates wal

¶ Therfore Seneca epistola L. lxxix sayth that Socrates was wel nygh alwaye in bataylle owther in Tyrannyse .owther in fredome harder than bataylle owther tyrannyse Therfore Jeronymus contra Jonium and also Epistola xxxiii. sayth that Socrates had two shrewde wyues that wolde alwaye chyde & stryue. And hadden ofte stryf for hym bytwene them The wyues were called Zantyppe & Alcipias /And on a tyme he blamed them by cause they stryuen for hym & was but a foule thyng / And sayde ye stryue for a man wyth snatted nose wyth a balled fortope wyth heery sholders and wyth croked thyes And at laste both the wyues toined apenst hym/and chydden hym also scarthes by one assente And after greate chydng and dyspytous wordes they threwe on his heede thyre pylle of foure nyghtes pissyng oute of a soler. And he answerde nought ellys but wypte his heede and sayde I wyfte welle & it spolde rayne of thondryng of worded Agellus libro secundo et Pol. li. v One axed of Socrates why he chastised not his wyf. Zantippa that was so full of chydng & of anger oz els

why he putte hir not away from hym And he sayde I suffre suche one at home to haue vlc and custome that I maye the more patiently suffre wronges of ocher men. ¶ Seneca de Ira capitulo tercio. ¶ Token of wraich in Socrates was lowe speche and fewe wordes He was treue & trusty in counsell as Valerius libro octauo. sayth that a ponge may axed counsell of Socrates whether he sholde wedde a wyf oz noo. whether so thou do of the se twene sayth he thou shalt forthyn & he full soze / For yf thou wedde noo wyf. thou shalt haue this disauantage thou shalt be allone. Thou shalt haue noo childe a straunge man shalt be thyne heyr. ¶ And yf thou wedde a wyf thou shalt haue greate besynesse aiwaye/many manner playntes plee of doyng despylyng chydng & stryf of thy wyues dame and vnsekernesse and drede of thy chylders ende . And Seneca epistola xxx. and Pol. lib. vii ¶ One axed of Socrates why pilgrimagis stode him to noo profyte what wonder sayth Socrates/ Whyle thou berest thy self alwaye aboute wyth & The same cause that griueth the maketh the goo from home. what profyted newe londe there the flyght fleeth not the. the diseale of thought muste be putte awaye els shal noo place the please. ¶ Also Pol. libro quinto Capitulo sexto. ¶ One axed of hym who he sholde gete hym best fame/ Who & doth beste sayde he and spekeh lxxl Also Pol. libro septimo / ¶ Platoes scolers hadden enuye to Plato in Socrates scole . And Plato axed of Socrates how he myght escape & enuye

 Whether for mannes soule sholde be

 Socrates whan he was accused leyde
 Men of Athene maye dampne So
 crates but they maye not make hym

Renishmen otherwise called
 Senones by ledyng of bren
 nius ouercom the Romayns

and chaleded hem vnto the Lyte and toke the Lyte vnto the Capptopl.

¶ Titus liuius there the frenshme came in by nyghte by a waye vnder erthe euery after other whyle the romayns slepte. Mallus Torquatus & other Romayns awaked wpyth cryenge of ganders þ fyrst day of Junii and they put of the frenshmen Therefore longe tyme the Romayns halowed the feste of ganders the fyrst daye Junii. Netheles afterward of they called that feste of Junoes Moneth/ for they troweth that Juno warned the ganders & made them to crye In that tyghetyng þ Senatours arrayed them ryally in araye of senatours And loo they latte in theyr howles / ¶ And whan they frenshmen founde them lyttynge in soo Ryall araye they wende þ they were goddes þ be called Genii and spared theym and wente backwarde. Treuila / ¶ God genius is to save a spyrite that foloweth a mā al his lif time therie it foloweth in þ hystorpe / Netheles one of the frenshmen groped and handled the berde of a Senatour called papius / and he vp wpyth a staffe that he had in his honde & smote the frenshman on the heede / Therefore alle the frenshmen were wioch And slough hym fyrst and than al þ Senatours euery one / ¶ Than the frenshmen recepueth a thousand pound of golde for pees & wente theyr waye. Than furius camill⁹ þ rather was put out of the Lyte purloved the frenshmen and slough them. and brought þ golde and Jewels of knightes to the Cite agayne. ¶ And this Camillus did

the thyrde vyage and wente in to þ Lyte agayne and was called the second Romulus. ¶ He besieged some tyme the salilces. And the Capitayne of them ladde oute chylder of the Lyte. as it were for to playe & gaue the to Camyllus and sayde that the Lyte shold be yolden to hym for sauving of the chyldre. And Camyll⁹ not only forsoke the fraude / but he baunde the Capitayns hondes behynde hym and lete hym dryue with yerdes.

And sente him and the chylder to her faders and moders and for that courtoys dede the cyte was yelden to hym that he desired not to gete wpyth fraude and trelon. ¶ Trogus libro xxiiii Thre hondred thousand of frenshmen by ledyng of Belgi⁹ & of Brennius destroyed Ytaly and brente Rome & spoiled Pannonye & Macedon and slewe Tholome⁹ the kynge of Macedonia. Paulus libro secundo / He sayth þ the cause why the frenshmen came in to Ytaly was this. The frenshmen tasted wyne þ was brought oute of Ytaly & were moeued by lykyng of that wyne. and wente in to Ytaly / The leder of them was brenius that regned amonge the frenshmen senones. he came wpyth thre hondred thousand and sente an hondred thousand to spoyll the grekes. Nethelless fast by Appollin delphic⁹ they eslayed & felt þ the Grekes hadden full sharp swerdes & hene Another hondred thousand wente in to Galacia that is in the lasse alpa / ¶ And were fyrst called Gallogreci and after galates. The thyrde hondred thousand lette in Ytaly and bylde Papye. He

 led Appolyn Delphicus temple in þ

 te of the hylle felle vpon the hoost of
 Galles and haylestones slough that
 othe delc/ The duc Brnnius for so-
 re of his woundes myght not endure
 And therefore he slough himself with

O ffyce & dignyte be chaūged
 amōge þ Romains for in ste-
 de of two counsuls he made
 tribunes of cheualye wyth þ power
 of counsuls. Tho began the prouffyte
 of rome tencrece but this dignyte du-

 dyogenes the philosopher prospired.
 Josephus in Pol. li. luo vii. Sayth þ
 dyogenes was Anaximiēs disciple Je-
 ronim⁹ li. luo cōtra Ioninianū saich
 þ he was antistenes þ was Socrates

disciple & þ J trowe sothely for Seneca & Valerius lepyne that Dyoogenes was in the grete Alylandres tyme þ regned longe after Anaxagoras but yf there weren many dyogenes in dyuerse tymes as there weren manyocrates. Jeronim⁹ ꝑtra Joninianum / Dyoogenes vled a double mantel for colde & had a scrpp in stede of his celer / And a staf to lene to & dwellid in pates & outgoyng of pates & knowleched sothe in eche syde and toke hede of the lyf of men þ passed by þ waye for many maners of meyn stanke as hym semed whan þ he punisshed hym self in a tonne / yet he had game that his hous mocued. he tored þ mouth of his tonne toward the south in colde tyme & toward the north in somer tyme wher euer the sonne were Dyoogenes hows tored thyderward. Valerius li. iiii. cap. iiii. Alylander Narcisso came to hym lyttinge soo in his tonne and badde hym axe somwhat of hym / J wolde sayd this Diogenes þ thou woldeste not lette my sonne / Therof came that bylawe that Alysaüder myght lpyghtlyer putte Darius out of his trone and oute of his kyngdome than dyogenes oute of þ state of the vertue / R. Seneca libro v de beneficiis Sayth that Dyoogenes was myghtyer and ryther than Alysaüder. for there was moore that he wolde not Recepue than Alysaüder myght yeue and thenne Alysaüder was ouercome for he founde a man to whom he myght nought yeue and he myght take from dyogenes ryght nought / Seneca epistola lxxxiiii. et Jeronimus ꝑtra / Dyoogenes bare in

his scrippe a dyllh of tree for to drynke of. & lawe a chyldre drynke of the pawme of his honde. And brake his dyllhe anone. & sayd how longe thal a sole bere superfluye fardels J wylt not rather that kynde hadd crafte of drynkyng & he alwaye after drank water of the pawme of his honde he neuer abted contaunce neyther his thought. what euer myshappes befel hym he neuer chaüged semblaüt / he thought neuer of deseale neyther of fortun. he chaüged neuer his purpos for sorowe neyther for melchpof and layde it falleth not to a philosopher to chaüge his wytte for happe of fortune. his deth shewed þ he was vertuous & continent. for whā he was old he wente to the torenement of Olymp. he was takē wyth a feuer in the waye & laye in a dey by þ waye and his frendes wolde haue carped hym thens on a beest. or on a chare but he wolde nat assente but wente to þ shadowe of a tree & layde J praye you go ye hens & cesse. for this nyght J shal alay whether J shal ouercome or be ouercomē. Yf J ouercome þ feuer J shal come to þ tornamēt & yf þ feuer ouercome me J shal go downe in to helle & leyde down his hēde & neck & was there al nyghte. & shewed not only þ he wold dye but also þ he wold putte ouer the feure by deth. & in caas was begyled by ensample & oppinion of noble meyn þ wold gladly dye & helpe to her owne deth J trowe þ he called helle the state of þ lowle after the deth of the body. Valerius libro quarto capitulo iiii. ¶ Dyoogenes we ded wortes vpon a tyme and one

Anno A Aristyppus sayde to hym yf thou
 Transmi. woldest vse flaterye wyth Denys the
 Ab Vrbe. kynge thou ne sholde nede to wede

 dest not flatter wyth Denys. ¶ Al
 so Dyogenes disputed on a tyme of
 wraath and one spitte in his face and
 he sayde I am not wrothe. but I
 doubt whether I sholde be wrothe
 or noo. ¶ Seneca de Ira libro tercio
 Dyogenes pleted ones in caule and
 one Lentulus spitted and threwe ro
 py spotell in his face and he wyped
 his face and sayde I shal laye after
 this that they al be begyled that say
 that thou hast noo mouthe / ¶ Pol.
 libro octauo. One behylde Dyogenes
 and sayde thou haste ryght wanton
 gygly eyen wherfor his disciples wol
 de haue beten the man as a lyer. lete
 be felawes sayde Dyogenes for I
 am suche one by kynde but I refray
 ne me by vertue. R. ¶ Iuuenal libro
 quarto Satira prima. wryteth yf Dy
 ogenes wolde wepe whan he wente
 oute openly amonge men / for he de
 med all that he sawe was wretched
 nelle and woo / But democritus dyde
 he contrarye & lough when he went
 openly oute among men for he helde
 al that he sawe nyestly and fooly. In
 libro de dictis philolophorum. One yf
 was fowleste of alle men shewed his
 hows to dyogenes / yf hows was won
 derly pleasunt and wel belene & this
 Dyogenes spytte in the mannes face
 And men axed of hym why he dyd
 soo and he answerde and sayde for I
 sawe noo soo foule place in his hous
 as his face. Also it was axed him whi

he vled a berde. A woman sayde he
 berded. is vnlemely spght / One sayd
 to hym that one of his frendes hadd
 spoken euyl by hym. I doute layde
 he yf my frende haue layd suche wor
 des by me / But it is openly knowen
 that thou hast that thyng sayde /
 Treuisa. It is wonder that Dyoge
 nes vled soo lewed sophistry / for here
 he maketh noo difference. bytwene yf
 lyer and hym that aculed the lyer &
 warned meny of his lcsynges. ¶ It
 is not one to speke euyl by a man &
 warne hym that a man speke euyle
 of hym. and reherce what euylie was
 layde / ¶ Saint Johan in his gospel
 sayde not that the deuyll was in cryst
 but the Jewes sayde that the deuyll
 was in Cryst. And cryst hym self des
 spyled not god but he reherceth how
 meny bere hym on hande that he des
 spyled god. ¶ Chan it foloweth in
 thystorpe Also one sayd hym yf al mē
 despyled hym. And he sayde wytte &
 wyledom must be despyled of foly /
 Whan euyl spekers blame and myl
 laye a mā. it sheweth that he is right
 good that is of hem myslayde Tuli
 libro primo de tulcail⁹ questione. Dy
 ogenes whan he chold dye bade that
 he shold not be buried but throwen &
 lette lygge in a felde owther vpo an
 hylle / Chan his frendes layden that
 he shold be eten wyth beestes & fow
 les / Nay sayde he but laye a staffe by
 me yf I maye therwyth kepe them a
 waye. Wherto sayd his frendes for yf
 shalt not fele chan sayde he yf etyng
 of the beestes shal not greue me whā
 I shal not fele.

Deny's the Tyraunt kynge
of Scypl deped and the pon
ge Denys toke the kyngdo
me / ¶ Valerius libro quarto Amou
& Phiceas weretwo frendes and De
nys wold nedes slee one of them/and
þ one axed respyte to a certayne dape
that he myghte in themene tyme dyl
pose his goodes.and Cataplle and to
be his felawe to the tyraunt to pled
ge/¶ The dape came and the man ca
me not/¶ Therfore Denys demed þ
other.that was vnwyle pledge Nethe
lesse that other came att houre þ was
sette.¶ Than the tyrant wondred and
forgaue hym þ deth.and prayde that
he myght be one of her felawes.¶ Tul
lius de tuculis qō/¶ One damocles
Denys frende prayled Denys royal
te and ryches and sayd there was ne
uer man that hadd soo grete welthe/
Wpthout sayde Denys essaye my for
tune and my welthe.and he graunted
¶ Than Denys made aray a bedde of
golde and a riche table richely belene
wyth grete plente of depnteous mete
and drynke/noble seruaūtes redy swe
te longes and myrthe pnowe Among
al this he badde hange a bryght swer
de and a sharp euen aboue his heede
by an hors heer and the poynt down
ward euen to his heed warde. ¶ And
whan he toke none hede to all this ly
kyngge for drede of the swerd than de
nys sayd suche is my lyf that þ hol
dest the lyf of welthe and of Joye/
¶ Valerius libro sexto Whan all men
Siraculanes delyred and prayed the
deh of Denys the tyraūt for his cru
elte/¶ An olde wydowe in her last elde
to god prayed for Denys lyf and his

helthe and whan he wyſte therof he Anno A
wondred of the good wyll of the wo
man and axed what her moeued soo Transmi.
to praye. Whan I was sayde she a Ab Vrbe.
Jonge wenche I was ouer sette with
a tyraunt and delyred to be delyuerd 222 32
of hym/¶ And whan he was slayne
one wors than he helde the kyngdom
And whan he was dede than hadde
we the thyrd that was worst of alle
And therfore lest a wors than thou co
me after the/¶ I wolde gyue myne
heed and my lyf to saue thy lyf & thy
ne helthe.¶ Tullius de officiis libro ii
¶ Denys the kyng vled noo barbour
to shaue his berde for he drad the bar
bours ralors ful soore and sweled of
the heer of his berde wyth fyre This
Denys on a tyme came in to a tem
ple where many ymages wer clothed
in golde and he toke awaye the gold
from them and sayde to them þ we
re belyde hym.this clothyng is to he
up for somer and colde for wynter/
¶ Este he toke a crowne oute of anyma
ges hande of Mercurye & sayde. Loo
pe see wel that I take noo thyngge frō
hym but þ he proffrith me wyth his
wylle/¶ That tyme Aristotles in his
eyghtenth yere of age lerned of his
mayster Plato and Nectanabus kyn
ge of Egipte began to regne and reg
ned nynety yere/¶ Pol. libro quin
to furius Camill⁹ Duc of romains
dped byfore is made mynde of his gre
te dedes.¶ Gaufr. and Alfr. Aboute
that tyme Gurguncius kynge of bry
tous that was Helyus sone came ou
te of/ Denmarkhe that warned hym
Trybute that was wont be payed to
hym. And fonde by the Blondes Dr

Anno A chades xxx shypes ful of me balclen
 Transmi. ses. that theder weren dryuen oute of
 Ab Vrbe. spayne syde and he sente hem & thyr
 duc Bartholomew in to Irlond that
 was tho voyde and inhabyte R. Loke
 more herof in the fyrste booke Capi
 tulo hibernia
 ¶ Caplin xxii.

O Thus ocherwyle called Ar
 taxerles the xii. kynge of pers
 regned xxv pere. In this ty
 me whan furi⁹ camillus was dede
 amonge the Romayns ther fyl a gre
 te pestlence amonge them soo þ in þ
 mpddel of þ cite þ erth was opened &
 ther was a grete chynne and a waye
 to helle Atte last the dpuinours sayde
 that that waye to helle abode the bu
 rpenge of a quycke man. ¶ Chan
 marcus cursius an horsman of Rome
 for to saue the Lyte armed hym and
 wente downe in to that clyffe and soo
 the clyffe was closed. ¶ The meane
 tyme the Romaynes faught ageynst
 the galles frenshmen þ destroyed &
 Italy one of the galles profferd hym
 to fyghte wyth one man body for bo
 dy than lucius mallius faught wyth
 hym and slough hym and toke a by
 ce of gold from his necke and dyde a
 boue his owne and so toke a surna
 me for euermore to hym and his of
 sprynge and was called torquatus þ
 is a man wyth a byle / for a byle is
 torques in latyn. ¶ Aug⁹. de ci. de. li. v
 cap. xviii. Sayth that this Torqna
 tus slough his owne sone that hadde
 fougheten for the countrey & wonne þ
 vpyctorve. he slough hym for he hadde
 fougheten ayenste his faders heest lest

þ dede shold haue be ensample of mo
 re harme and despyte of the empyre
 than the worshyp sholde be of þ deth
 of the enemye / Phylpp kynge of mace
 donya that was holdeyn Alylanders
 fader began to regne and regned xxvi
 pere In his tyme demostenes the ad
 uocate fayrest speker of all prospered
 he wente on a tyme to a fayre strom
 pet called layes & was of corynth &
 layes axed of hym an yeste / þ she cal
 led nūmū quātuz & demostenes that
 was greteuly moeued in lust sayd that
 he wolde not bye so dyer & after be so
 ry and forthynk his dede ¶ Pol. li. vi.
 This nūmū quantum maketh x. M
 pens of ours and is worth half þ gre
 ter talentum that is worthy xx thou
 sand pens of ours. Trogus & va. lib⁹
 viii. Demostenes þ aduocate was so
 bely to pntte of all maner lette of his
 speche that nomay spake more cleere
 than he. & though he had a wel smal
 boys. Natheles he vled it soo that he
 had a noble sownyng speche / He ax
 ed of hym ofte what were most sped
 ful amonge wyle men / and he sayde
 mooste spedfull is to the knowleche
 of that he can nought / ¶ He telleth
 of hym that he spake moche and lon
 ge tyme whyle he hadde stones in his
 mouthe but whan the stones weren
 out and the mouthe voyde he was
 more redy to speke / Angellus ¶ Mel
 sagers of þ mololes came to athene &
 þ first day of ple demostenes pleted a
 penst hem & withstode hem: On þ mo
 rowe he was stopped with money for
 he shold not speke ayeste hē. þ thyrde
 day whan þ cause shold be pleted de
 mostnes come forth with wolle aboute

his necke/ & sayd that he had the squynacye/ & therfore he myght not speke apenst the Wolues. Than one cryed & sayd/ it is no squynacye/ but syluery chat him ayleth. And Demostenes afterwarde tolde oute howe it was and acompted it for a grete worlhypp/ and axed of Aristodimus what mede he had taken for to plede for hem. Talcantum sayd he / & I sayd Demostenes hadde well more/ for to holde my peas. ¶ Valerius li. vii. ¶ Twey men had taken monye to a woman to kepe/ & ordeyned that the woman shold deluier the money to neyther of hem by hem selfe/ but to them bothe toggyder. Longe tyme after that one came & sayd that his felawe was dede and begyled the woman & had the money of hyr. Than not longe after his felawe came & axed the moneye / than the woman was purlued harde & greuously/ & Demostenes came & helped hyr in this maner & sayd / lette hem bothe come toggyder & axe hyr money as it was ordeyned whan the money was taken hyr to be kept/ & than the moneye shall be payed & no rather/ & for they came neuer toggydes/ the woman was quyte. ¶ Pseudo dorus li. i. ca. xxxi. ¶ Kyng Phylpp besyged the Cyte Athenes/ & axed ten wyle men of the Cyte to be deluiered to hym/ and he wolde goo awaye from the Cyte and besyge it no lenger. But Demostenes counseylled naye. & tolde this fable of the Wolues somtyme profred frenshyp to the shepherdes on this condicon/ that the shepherdes sholde deluier her houdes to the wolues/ for your dogges sayde they make all þ barpaunce bytwix you

& vs/ wherupon the shepherdes deluiered hem her houdes. Than þ wolues/ whan strengthe & warde of houdes was awaye. slough & deuoured all the sheep at her owne wylle. So sayd he wolde this Phylippe destroye this Cite yf it lacked wyle men of counsayle ¶ Thus kyng of pers touned the Jewes in to Hecanya. The grete Alysaunders is born in macedonia/ & denys is slayne in Siracusa/ The romayns ouercomen the Galles in the whiche fyghtynge one of the Galles axed Marcus valerius a Trybune of Rome to fyght wyth hym in a synghler bataylle body for body/ And why he the faught a Rauey latte vpon the right shulder of valerius and alway smote to the epen of the frensheman and so the Romayn gate the vctorie And was afterwarde called Corin⁹ for a raue is corin⁹ in latyn. & Corin⁹ nus was counsul four and twenty yere after that dede/ Pol. li. septimo.

D Lato þ philosopher died whā he had lyued lxxx yere/ in so grete reuerence þ me doubted long after his dech whether þ he shold be acōpted amōg þ goddes other half godes Plato was most excellēt amōg Socrates disciples & was called Plato for he hadde a brode breste & a brode space bytwene his browes / ¶ For platos in grewe is latū in latyn brode in enghllhe Plato was born in Athenes/ Tullius de di. li. p. capitulo decimo sexto / ¶ Whyle plato was a chylde and laye in his Cradel and

Anno A. Nept/bees late on his lypes & dyuynours layd that he shold lhyne in swe tenesse of eloquence. ¶ Valerius libro pu:ca:iiii°. That nyght that Plato was sette to Socrates loze/he demed that a sway laye on his knees. ¶ Pol. li. vii. This Plato in his fyrst loze of lecture / was taught of Denys. In wrastlyng of Ariston. Argus/he del pyled not the craft of pycture/he seyned hym selfe proufytable to dyuynacions & to gestes. And he trust on his endyptyng & tellynges as olde wpyes vse. & wolde become a fyghtyng man but Socrates forbade hym. ¶ Valerius li. viii. ca: vii. Socrates dyed atte last / & Plato tourned to the looze of hem that folowed Pytagoras loze/& worshypped hem not only for her conynge / but also for they were contynent. After that he went to Theodoris Pyrenensis & lerned Geometrye Than he wente to Egypte to lerne Astronomye. ¶ Pol. li. vii. And many wene that he lerned there the prophecyes of prophetes / but the accomptyngge of tymes suffreth him not to be in tyme of prophetes. ¶ For Austyn li. viii. de ci. ca: xi. sayth that Plato was born about an hondred yere after the deth of Jeremye the prophete. Than about a lity yere after his deth / the bookes of prophetes came in to Egypte in tyme of the kyng Tholomeus. There in that pylgremage of Plato Plato myght not see Jeremias that was dede longe tyme before / neyther rede the bookes of prophecye that were not yet translate in to grue. Nethelesse many thynge be founde in Platoes bokes that acordeth with lawes

of prophetes. ¶ Augustinus li. xvi. ca: xx. et li. confessionū ante finem sayth that Saynt Johannes gospell was founden in Platoes bookes vnto that place / tenebre eam nō cōprehenderūt / that is to saye derkenesse knewe not lyght. for thapostle sayd þ suche phylosophres vanysshed awaye in her thoughtes. I wolde not trowe but þ it is wryten in bookes of holy faders Than Plato departed from Egypte & came in to Italpe & folowed Larentinus Articus þ helde Pytagoras loze. And than he wolde haue gone vnto the Indes & Medes þ couche Nygromancye & wptchecraft / but þ the warre of Caldee lette hym for to passe. And therfore whan he founde Leno & Permenides / he abode with hem & gadred her lawes Shrewes remoued this thre cunnynge in to Sicilia by dyuerse oppynions. for some moeued that he came for to see the hystorpe of kynde / and the reason of brennyng of the montayne Ethna. The seconde sayd that he came atte prayer of Denys the tyraūt to holde with the Lyte Syracuse / & for to teche theyr lawe. The thyrde sayd that he came to reconsyle one Dyon to his countree by foryeuenesse and grace geten of Denys. ¶ Jeronim⁹ contra Joñ. Plato was riche for condycion & tyme. And Dyogenes with his foule feete trade on his bedde þ was wel besene. Than Plato chole a lityll towne called Akademia a myle out of Athene / in that towne was ofte pestylence and erthe shakynge / and therfore he chole þ dredefull place / for suche dredefull happes sholde withdrawe his scolers

from temptation of lecherie/and for
his scolers sholde feele none other ly-
kyng but of thynges that they sholde
leene. ¶ Marc. li. iii. This plato sayd
that ther be twey deches / by one dech
the soule forsaketh the bodye/by that
other dech the soule whyle it is in the
bodye forsaketh and despyseth bodely
lykynges / wrath and anger and all
vnlkyfull dopnges / and this sholde
phylosophres desyre. ¶ Seneca de ira
li. iii. Plato was ones wroth with his
seruaunt/and hete hym do of his ker-
tell and make his shoders naked and
bare/but whan he vnderstode that he
was wroth/he helde his honde & sto-
de as he wolde symte. Than one of
his frendes Pleusyppus axed hym
why he stode soo and what he dyde &
thought/and he answerd and sayd. I
am about to punyssh a man and am
wrothe and worthy to be punysshed.
I pray the sayd he/bete thou this ser-
uaunt lest I bete hym more than it
nedeth by cause of my wrath. noman
is in his power/that is not in his ow-
ne power. ¶ R. Helmande sayde that
Plato vsed to tytle his bookes by na-
mes of his maysters / for they sholde
be of the more auctorite/eyther by na-
mes of scolers þ he well loued. ¶ Pol-
li. vii. sayth that men telley that Pla-
to dyed for shame/for he coude not af-
folye the questyon of shypmen. I trow
we better that it was soth of Home-
rus as Martinus sayth. Ofte these
twey men be taken eyther in stede of
oher for her grete wytte and wysedo-
me and noble spekyng/and also for
breede of brestes. for it is certayn that
noble men and worthy haddey ma-

ny names. ¶ Pol. li. ii. Phylosophres Anno A
that were called Zenofontini had gre
te enuye of Platoes conyng & loos &
feyned of hym suche a tale. ¶ Flama Transmi.
Ab Orbe.
nus þ Phylosopher libro de vestigiis
philosophorum sayth. That though
many men telley that plato yelde
vp the goost wylfully at a derke mea-
nyng of a nombre that was whan
he hadde fultylled yeres of his age /
nyne tymes nyne that is foure scoze
and one. ¶ Valerius libro none capis-
tulo decimo tercio. Homerus for he
myght not affolye the questyon dyed
for shame and sorowe. ¶ R. Grego-
rius Nazanzenus vpon this worde
of the Apostle. The wysedome of
this worlde is folye before god / and
sayde that plato walked vpon the
see chf and buyded heuen / thenne
shypmen sawe hym and lough hym
to scoone. What haue ye sayde he.
They answerde and sayden / alle
that we haue taken / we haue nough-
te and alle that we haue nought pta-
ke we haue. They hadde loued
theyr clothes / and slayne alle that
they myght take/and soo they hadde
nought that they hadde taken. Pla-
to thoughte on fyllhe and wondred/
and ete nought ne slepte. for he ma-
de hym soo belye to fynde the los-
lucion of the questyon and soo he
dyed. ¶ Valerius libro quarto. Pla-
to herde telle that his dysciple Ze-
nocrates hadde spoken moche euyl
of hym and gretely despyled hym.
Neuerthelesse plato toke none heede
of this complaynte / and the Juge
axed hym why he gaf noo creden-
ce to the tale. It is not to be yeuyn

Anno A feyth vnto sayd Plato/that him that
 Transmi. I haue loued soo longe loned not me
 Ab Vrbe. also/ but the Juge swore that he had
 herd suche tales of Zenocrates mouth
 Than Plato answerde & sayde that
 Zenocrates wolde neuer telle suche ta
 les/ but it semed that it were spedeful
 suche tales to telle. ¶ Valerius li. vii.
 After Plato in his stede came his sy
 ster sone Pleusippus/ & after hym Ze
 nocrates Platoes scoler that he loued
 well in the scole called Achademia.
 And therfore they þ came after them
 Politinus. Porphirius. Apuleius & af
 ter had that name of the scole & were
 callid Achademici. As they had the na
 me of Plato & were called Platonici
 ¶ Valerius li. x. Of this Zenocrates
 it is redde that a fayr comyn woman
 of Athenes rescepued mede & vnder
 toke to make hym lye by her & came
 at nyght & laye by hym in his bedde.
 but she myght in no maner wyle ma
 ke hym abate chastyte/ than yonglyn
 ges scorned hyr/ for she myght not a
 bate the phylolophres chastyte. I ma
 de no couenaunt sayd she of an yma
 ge but of a man. ¶ Jeronim⁹ contra
 Iovinianum. Zenocrates leste to the
 men of Athenes but thre hestes of
 Tricolinus lawes/ to worshyp fader
 & moder & theyr goddes & ete no fles
 she. Also in the dyctes of phylolophres
 it is wryten that Zenocrates sawe one
 ladde to be hanged & lough & sayde/
 the gretter theues punyssh the lasse.
 ¶ Valerius li. vi. in fine. Also one Pol
 lemo otherwyle called Pollemius a
 yong man of Athenes was full leche
 rous / soo that he had lphynge & Joye
 not oonly of his euyll doynge. but also

he had grete Joye of euyll loos & myl
 fame. On a tyme he come from a fes
 ste not after the goynge downe of the
 sonne / but after the sonne rysynge &
 wente home & sawe Zenocrates yate
 open/ & was wyne dronken. & enoyn
 ted with oynementes and aparayled
 with garlandes & ryally clothed en
 tred in to the scole in this maner full
 of noble doctours/ & lette hym downe
 there for to scorne that fayre speche
 of þ doctours in his dronkenesse. Atte
 laste euery man had Indygnacioy of
 hym / but Zenocrates chaunged not
 his semblaunt / but he left the mater
 that he spake of. & tourned his speche
 to the mater of sobrenes of pacience &
 suffraunce/ and by his resonable fayr
 & noble speche. Pollemius was com
 pelled to take hede/ & fyrst he drough
 to hym his arme/ that he helde stou
 tely with out his mantell / and than
 he threwe downe the garlande of his
 hede/ & atte last he forsoke al his euyll
 lphynge. so that of a foule bolle & glo
 ton was made a grete phylolopher.
 ¶ Pol. libro septimo. et Augustin⁹ de
 ciuitate dei li. ix. ca. xi.

After Plato come Arystotle a
 noble man of fame and of lo
 re and of grete wytte. Nethe
 lesse not soo noble a speker as Plato.
 But he passed many men in thoffy
 ce of techynge / and was conynge in
 crafte of fayre vtteraunce and she
 wyng to wishfaye all other mannes
 sentences/ he brought vp the secte that
 is called paripatetica. for he vled to

dispute wandryng & walkyng why-
 le Plato lpyed Arystotle gadred ma-
 ny disciples in to his herespe. he ma-
 de bookes of al maner philolophye/
 Nethellele passyng al other. he brou-
 ght logyk in to his right lawe. This
 is called the philolophre. As it were
 he þ beryth the pryce of philolophres
 Soo Rome is called the Lyte. Soo
 Maro the poete and soo Arystotle the
 philolophre/ Netheles some men twoz
 wed that he was a fendes sonne/ for
 he was swpper and swppte and cleve
 of wytte and delyred grete worthyp /
 for by many manere slepyhtes. he v-
 led to wyne and toke worthyp byfo-
 re al other men. Alysaunders de natu-
 ra. Arystotle amonge other taught elo-
 quence fayr and noble speche as it is
 specyally seyn in his comentes home-
 ris/ And in dyte of troye the whiche
 he betoke Alysaunders and in his dia-
 logus of poetes and in his tretice of
 rethoriz / ¶ Arystotle xxviii. yere olde
 was sente in to Athenes and lernede
 there of Socrates thre yere And whā
 Socrates was dede he was wyth pla-
 to xx. yere tyl plato dyed/ and had soo
 grete fauour of plato that plato cal-
 led Arystotles hows/ the redyng hous
 And wold ofte save goo we to the re-
 ders hous. And whan Arystotle was
 ablente/ plato wolde crye vnderstan-
 dyng is awaye. the audience is deef/
 he lpyed after platos deth xxiiii. yere /
 Somtyme techyng Alysaunders
 somtyme wendyng aboute with him
 in to many londes somtyme makin-
 ge bookes somtyme teching disciples
 and so he lpyed in al lxiii. yere. ¶ He
 made Alysaunders bylde agayne the

Lyte stagerik that Phylpp hadde de-
 stroyed and beten doune. Therefore þ
 me of that cyte haloweth a fest dave
 in worthyp of Arystotle & that feste
 is called Arystotileya and the moneth
 þ this feste is halowed in. they clepe
 it stagerytes Arystotle dyed in calcide
 & was brought in to stagerik / Whan
 Allaüder went agaynst þ perles ar-
 stotle was bely aboute phylosophye
 & made an hystoipe of two honderd
 & tyfty lawes. Arystotle put to many
 thynge of philolophye and to ethyk
 that is the science of thewes/ he putt
 that partyt welche. is not in worldly
 rycheffe/ Also to philolophye he put þ
 feyth beyng Treupsa / ¶ In libris de
 celo et mundo and in other bokes al-
 so Arystotle clepeth the welken or fir-
 mamēt that is aboute the four elemē-
 tes þ fyfth body. Than it foloweth
 in the stoipe that he wythdrewe noo-
 chyng of diuynyte/ he made proble-
 mes medicinale of phisik and of kin-
 de in four score bookes/ And proble-
 mes of perspectiue and of methaphy-
 syk/ Treuifa. A probleme is a questi-
 on that is harde to allople. And also
 an hard redels is also called o proble-
 me. Perspectyf is a science that speci-
 ally longeth to the syghte that scien-
 ce techeth howe a thynge is seyn and
 is lasse oother more than it semeth
 Oother euen as moche as it semeth
 euen or croked and ryght as it is or
 other wyle shapen than it semeth /
 ¶ Than it foloweth in thystoipe/ he
 made statutes to Justcpe the Lytees
 of Grece by the whiche statutes phy-
 lyp Determynd and made ende of
 ples bytwene the Grekes/ he lefte

Anno A after hym his sone Nichomachus/
 Transmi. and his doughter Pytharda/and full
 Ab Vrbe. many dysciples/amonge the whiche
 Theofrastus was of grete name. He
 made the booke de Nupciis of sponla
 lys. Arystotle made a thousande boos
 kes and loued to folowe truth / and
 not forsake thyng that was openly
 knowen. ¶ Alycenna prayseth hym
 well libro tercio methaph. suo ¶ And
 Raby Moyles libro primo capitulo
 quarto. And Agellus libro octauo ca
 pitulo tercio. And Johan in suo pol.
 libro septimo. This is he that meo
 ued Archademia more with strength
 of reasons/than it was meoned with
 strong blastes of wēde for thrugh his
 belynelle the Achademici that were
 left after. Plato meoued doubtles well
 nygh of all thynges. ¶ Allo Plinius
 libro suo sayth/that the grete Alylan
 dre brente in couetyse of knowleche
 of the kynde of beestes / and sente to
 Arystotle many thousandes of meny
 of Grece of Alya & of Tracia that
 fedde beestes and fowles wylde and
 tame/and all that be taken with hau
 kyng epyther with huntynge/and had
 all maner bestes in keppng/in hyues
 in layes/in fyshes weres and pondes.
 For he wolde knowe all thyng that
 is brought forth in kynde. Arystotle
 examyned hem all besely/and made
 about a fyfty volumes of the kynde
 of beestes. ¶ Therfore Plinius de na
 turis rerum libro secundo sayth that
 some meny telleth that Arystotle made
 his bookes so shortly and so harde for
 enuy & for veyne glorie. Other saye
 that he made his bookes in that man
 ner/to vse of studyentes as the scyen

ce ageth / for scyence is about thyng
 that is good and harde to knowe.
 ¶ Trevisa. Here take hede that here
 all thyng that hath lyfe and felynge
 is called a beest. Than it foloweth in
 thystoie. Arystotle whay he sholde
 dye/bade that his subtyll bokes shold
 be buryed with hym in his graue.
 For they that come after hym sholde
 haue no prouffyte therof. But I wote
 not by what vertue of kynde epyther
 of craft that I saye not by wondre of
 wythecraft. that sepulchre hath so ap
 propied there to the place that is a
 bout it/that no man maye come now
 in to that place. Some meny saye that
 Antecryste shall knowe that place &
 loke and see the bookes that be there
 hydde/but who dar trowe thynges sh
 be in doubt and vncertayne. Of the
 deth of Arystotle Gregori⁹ Nauzau
 zenus in his treatyse vpon that wor
 de of the Apokle. The wysdome of
 this is foly before god. And sayd that
 in Grece at a place called the blacke
 bygge/the see ebbeth & floweth as it
 were at ones in the same place. And
 Arystotle came and wolde knowe the
 cause why / and behelde it and toke
 hede longe tyme. and for he coude not
 fynde the cause why/for grete Indyg
 nation he spake to the water & sayd.
 For I maye not comprehend and ta
 ke the/thou shalt take me/and so he
 felle in to the water and dreynt hym
 selfe. ¶ Trevisa. It is wonder that
 Gregorins Nauzauzenus telleth soo
 madde a magyll tale of soo worthy
 a prynce of philosophres as Arystotle
 was/why telleth he not how Arysto
 tle declareth the mater of ebbing and

flowyng of the see secūdo meth. why
rellech he not why it is wryten in the
booke of the Apple/howe Arystotles
dred & held an apple in his honde/&
had comfote of the smelle & taught
his scolers how they sholde lyue and
come to god & be with god withouten
ende. And atte laste his hande began
to quake/and the apple fylle downe
from his honde/& his face waxe alle
pale & so Arystotle yelde vp the goost
and dred. Than it foloweth in thys/
toye. Arystotles successour was Theo/
frastus & hadde that name for his no/
ble spekyng of god/sa sayth the may/
ster of thystories sup li. Mach. This
Theofrastus made a booke de Nup/
ciis/of wedloh/and called the booke
Theofrastus Aureolus/there he dys/
puteth clerely of the teene & angust/
she of wedded men. ¶ Jeronim⁹ tal/
keth moche of that booke ayenst Jo/
ninianus. And this Theofrastus ma/
de a nother boke of frendshyp / and
putteth & preferreth frendshyp before
all other thynges of men. He sayth
that this Theofrastus accused hyn/
de/for it yafe lenger lyfe to other beel/
tes than to mankynde. There it is
sayd that is spedefull that frendes lo/
ue well. and not assaye hem that they
loue. Also it is wryten there/that lo/
uyng men haue blynde domes.

The Romayns ordeyned a ba/
tayll ayenst the Sampnytes
that be bytwene Campania
and Apulia/and haue armour of gol/
de & of syluer. The cause of batayll

was the londe of Campania/that is
best londe & moost playne. The chyef
Lyte therof is Capua and is peer to
Rome and to Cartage in gretenesse
and in plente. Than Lucius Papiu⁹
dyctatour or oratour of Rome was
sente ayenst the Sampnytes/and he
tourede ayene to Rome / and bade
Quintus fabius mayster of the hors
men that he sholde not fyght whyle
he were awaye. Nacheles Quintus sa/
we and founde occasion and faught
& spedde well & skomfyte the Samp/
nytes. And by cause therof the dycta/
tour dampned hyn/for he had fough/
ten ayenst his beest in his abience. Ne/
chelesse he was delyuered and saued
by grete fauour of knyghtes of people
And so grete stryfe was arered ayenst
Papius that he was in Jopardy of
his lyfe. But afterwarde in a place
called furcule Landius/the Samp/
nytes had the Romayns closed in na/
rowe wayes & streyte/and ouercome
hem with soo grete shame/that hem
was leuer kepe hem a lyue to shame
and to shendshyp/that ssee hem so clo/
sed and made hem cast of her armou/
re & her clothes and go on a longe re/
we vnder the hylle syde / and had of
hem a condycion / the whiche condy/
cion yf the Romaynes hadde holden
they had ben dede eyther bonde men
to the Sampnytes. ¶ Tytus Liuius
The duke & the leder of the Samp/
nytes called Poncius had ordeyned
his hoost belydes furcule Landines
where the Romaynes sholde passe.
That place is closed with hylles on
eyther syde & hath a playne in þ myd/
dell bytwene high londes with streyte

Anno A entre and strayte outgoynge. Poncius
 Transmi. had sente some of his knyghtes befo-
 re clothed as as herdes þ kepen bestes
 Ab Vrbe. & þ they sholde answer þ hooft of Ro-
 mayns that wolde passe & axe after
 the Sampnytes where they were / &
 the knyghtes to answer þ the Samp-
 nytes were passed to belyege a Lyte
 called Lucrecia that was comfeded
 with the Romayns. And whan þ Ro-
 mayns herde that / anone they wente
 swyftly in to the valey of furcule as
 it were for to spede hem to locour the
 Lyte þ was belyeged / but in the mea-
 ne tyme the Sampnytes knyghtes &
 other hewe downe trees & stopped the
 entre & the outgoynge of the valey /
 & wente in to the toppes of the hylles
 and so the Romayns were compelled
 by mylchpief to axe peas of þ Samp-
 nytes eyther a bataylle of knyghtes.
 Than Poncius the duke answerde &
 sayd / now the batayll is done / & graū-
 ted peas vpon this condycion / that þ
 Romayns shold yelde vpon her clothyn-
 ge & her armour & go all naked lauf
 her pieuce membres in a longe rewe
 vnder the hylle syde / & yelded vpon pleg-
 ges thre hondred horsmen of the Ro-
 mayns. ¶ C. Eutr. The yere that fo-
 lowed after by heest of the Senatou-
 res the dyctator Lucius Papiri⁹ scom-
 fpted the Sampnytes. ¶ Drosius li⁹
 tercio. After that vycory there felle so
 grete pestylence in Rome of deth and
 of lyghtnyng / that all the Lyte ma-
 de sorowe for dede men and for seke.
 Than they loked the bookes of Sy-
 bylle the wysse / & toke counseyll & sen-
 te in to Epydauru a Lyte of Grece
 for to haue a maymette the ymage

of Esculapius / he is feyned god of
 medycyne & sheweth hym to his wor-
 shyppers in the lykenesse of a serpent
 ¶ Item Drosius. Wyues of Rome
 brennyng in wood loue towarde her
 owne hulbondes / made as they tros-
 wed drynkes of loue / & yet the dryn-
 kes were veray popson & deth. A wen-
 che that knewe that doynge warned
 the Senatours therof / than the wy-
 ues were compelled to drynke of the
 same / and by the vyolent popson of
 that drynke many of them felle dow-
 ne sodenly deed / & two hondred wy-
 ues & seuenty that were maystrys of
 the doynge were dampned to the deth
 About that tyme. Guptelinus Sur-
 guncius lone regned in Brytany / his
 wyfe Marcia was right connyng &
 coude many maner craftes / she made
 the lawe called Marcene lawe. ¶ R.
 Loke more herof in the fyrst boke ca-
 de legibus. ¶ Sanfr. Also this Mar-
 cia regned some what of tyme after
 hir hulbondes deth / and after hir reg-
 ned Sicillius / & after hym Rymar⁹
 Dauius / after Dauius Moynus þ
 was full cruell / but atte last a best de-
 uoured hym.

¶ Arlanus otherwyle called Ar-
 taxerles Dthus lone was xiiii
 yere kyng of Perse / and reg-
 ned four yere. In his fyrst yere Ja-
 dus byshop of Jewes prospred. Phyl-
 lyp kyng of Macedonia was deed by
 trayson of one Panlania. ¶ Trogus
 li. ix. This Phyllyp was more bely a-
 bout dedes of armes. thā about festes

& yauie hym more to wyne rycheſſe
 than to kepe it. And for all þ he rob-
 bed alwaye / yet he was euer nedý / &
 loued mercy & fallhede both lyke well
 & was vntruſty in his ſpeche / & wol-
 de behote more than he wolde perfour-
 me. He couth feyne hym gracýous &
 well apayed whan he was wroth / &
 wroth whan he were well apayed. he
 vled to make wrath bytwene partes.
 & gete thanke on eyther ſyde. ¶ Tro-
 gus li. vii. This whan he had fyrſte
 ouercomen the meny of Athenes / he
 lette the pryſoners goo by his good
 wyll / than he wedded Olympiada
 Neopholomeus the kyniges doughter
 of the Mololes and begate on hyr
 the grete Alyſandre. Theſe yauie an
 aſſaute to the Lyte Mathona & there
 his right eye was ſmpten out with þ
 ſtrook of an arowe / but for that wou-
 de he was neuer to ſlower to fyght /
 ne wrother with his enemye / but atte
 laſt meny yelde by the Lyte / & than he
 was mylde & mercýable to hem alle.
 ¶ Trogus li. viii. This Phyllyp was
 enemye to mennes fredome / he nou-
 ryſhed ſtryfe in Lytees / & helped the
 laſte apenſt the more & brought bothe
 in to thraldome / the vyctor and hym
 that was ouercome. Soo he made to
 hym two brether kyniges of Tracia
 ſubgette / that putte her querele in his
 arbytracion to deme rightly bytwene
 hem to make ſpnall peas. He made
 ſubgette to hym the Bardanes & o-
 ther nacion by ſuche maner fraude.
 He made his wyues brother Alyſan-
 dre a yonglyng of .xx. yere olde to vſe
 ſonpncacion alwaye / for he wolde ha-
 ue hym afterwarde the more bounde

to hym & to his ſeruyce. ¶ Trogus li
 bro. xiiii. Phyllyp ſomtyme warred a-
 penſt the Shyttes and ſcomfyted hem
 more with gyle & fraude / than with
 vertue & ſtrengthe. He had with hym
 on a tyme twenty thouſand childery
 of woman & of beeſtes / with twenty
 thouſand noble mares for to do what
 it were in Macedoyne as it were to
 haue ſome maner newe meny to dwel-
 le therein. And on a tyme he tourned
 from the Thebans meny of Thebes
 in Grece that warned hym paſſage /
 & was wounded in his thyghe wonder-
 ly ſore / ſo þ through his thye his horſe
 was ſlayne þ he rode on. Natheles he
 ſcomfyted hem ſolempnely / but that
 daye for þ vyctory he ſemed neuer the
 gladder of there to his owne meny. ne
 the more ſterne to hem þ were ouerco-
 me / but he ſente apene the pryſoners.
 and reſtored apene thre hondred wyle
 meny that were put out. All theſe wyle
 meny whan ſpye of hem were accused
 of the treſpas ſayd that they all were
 euen peres in doying of that dede. Yet
 Phyllyp arrayed an hooſt of two hon-
 dred thouſande fote meny and fyften
 thouſande horſemen to warre in the
 Reame of Perſe & made one Atthalus
 duke & ieder of that hooſt / this dukes
 ſyſter Olympiada was Phyllyppes
 wyfe / and afterwarde putte awaye &
 forſake. Therfor whan Phyllyp ſate
 atte feſte of ſpouſayle without ward
 corples. Panſania a noble yong man
 ſlough hym right there. The cauſe
 therof was this. Atthalus hadde dys-
 pytefully ſcomed this Panſania & do-
 ne hym grete vylenye / fyrſt pryuelý &
 after openly in a grete feſt & reuell / &

Anno A he complayned ofte to Phylpp of the
 Transmi. deeth þæt Alcchalus had done hym/ & had
 Ab Vrbe. none amendes. Therfore he tourned
 his wrath & was wrothe with Philip
 & slough hym in þæt maner for venge/
 ance of that dede. Olympiada Phyl/
 lippes wyfe/ & Alyandre Phylppes
 sone were had in susperrōn/ & not hol/
 den all gyltles of þæt dede. Olympiada
 for that she was forsaken/ & Alyan/
 dre for the despyte that was done to
 his moder. & specyally for Phylpp oft
 reprevued his sone Alyandre / for his
 moder was so forsaken/ & was oft in
 poynnt to rese ov hym with his swerde
 And therfore Alyandre exiled. dwel/
 led a whyle w^c his vnclē in Epyrus.
 ¶ Trevisa: This londe is Tracia/
 & was somtyme the londe of Epyro/
 tes. It foloweth in thystoꝝpe/ he han/
 ged afterward Panlania/ & crowned
 Olympiada with golde/ & brente af/
 terwarde hyr bodye vpon hyr hulbon/
 des bodye. ¶ Trevisa. Who that kno/
 weth this Cronycle a right/ knoweth
 that it was vled somtyme in dyuerse
 londes to brenne noble bodyes whan
 they were deed. & kepe þæt ashes solemp/
 nely in reuerent place. It feloweth
 in thystoꝝpe he hanged Licopatra Al/
 cchalus sylster. This Phylpp was some
 tyme warned & saued hym selfe from
 the vpolence of a charpot. Therfor he
 vndyd all the Charpottes & chares þæt
 were in his kyngdom. Also he auoy/
 ded & withdrough hym from þæt place
 called Charpot in Boecia. and come
 not therin. Nathelesse he escaped not
 Panlaniass swerde / in the hylte of þæt
 swerde was engrauen a Charpot.
 ¶ Pol. li. vi. ca. vi. Whyle Phylppoꝝ

deyned his hooft / he forbode all men
 all maner caryage that gooch vpon
 whyles / & cōmaunded eury ten foot
 men bere about with hem stones and
 ropes. In somer tyme he made men
 bere meeles & floure & quernes on hyr
 neche for .xxx. dayes. ¶ Trogus li. i.

The grete Alyandre whan his
 fader was deed/ began to reg/
 ne after his fader in Macedo/
 nia in his xx. yere of age & regned but
 xii. yere & .vi. monethes. He was gret/
 ter than his fader both in vices & in
 vertues. Natheles his fader was þæt wy/
 ser man of coulepyll/ but the sone was
 the gretter man of herte. The fader
 wolde ofte kepe secrete / & ouercome
 his owne wrath/ the sone vled not to
 leche loue neyther the maner of wrec/
 che / epyther loued well wyne/ & were
 both good drynkers. The fader wol/
 de slee but his enemyes/ and the sone
 wolde slee both his enemyes and his
 frendes. The fader wolde be loued/
 but the sone had leuer be drad / they
 were of one byleue/ the fad pauē him
 to skylfull largenesse of pestes / & the
 sone pauē hym to lecherye. ¶ Vincen/
 cius li. v. The yere of Dthus kyngē
 of Perle. xv. of Phylpp kyng of Ma/
 cedonia. xii. and of Nectanabus kyng
 of Egypte. xvii. Dthus occupied E/
 gypte & put out Nectanabus. Vt this
 Nectanabus drad warre & batayll. he
 wolde not araye & gadre his hooft /
 neyther ordeyne gynnes of warre/ but
 he wolde go secretely in to a pryuate
 place. and take with hym a balsyne of

clere water & make shypes & men of
waxe to the lyknesse of a shyppe in
the see/so that it sholde seme that all
tho meoued & were alpye. Also he wol
de take a yerde of fyre holo we within
as a pype/& he wolde speke in the ho
lownesse of that yerde & calle goddes
about & bynethe/& so he wolde foude
to drowne his shyp of waxe in the ba
sen. And soo it sholde befallē/that by
drenchyng of the war & of the tapres
that were brennyng his enemyes shol
de drenche in the see. He herde telle on
a tyme that Indes. Perthes. Medes.
Arabes & other naciones also had con
spyred to ryle apenst hym/& he brake
on laughyng & wente to do his craft
that he vled/& he knewe by that that
he sholde be ouercome / but yf flyght
myght helpe hym. Anone he bad sha
ue his hede/& toke all the precyous ri
chelle that he had & came in to Ma
cedonia/& sayd that he was an astro
nomer. And Phylpp y kyng was tho
out of the countree & occupped in war
re. & Nectanabus by his enchaūtemen
te & his fantastyck feynyng gate su
che loue of the quene Olympias that
he laye by hyr in lyknesse of Jupp
ter horned/& begate the grete. Alylan
dre. Than whan the quene was with
childe/manly foules flowe about Phi
lypp that was tho occupped in warre.
But amonge other foules/an henne
leyde an egge in Phylppes lappe/&
whan that egge was smyten of his
lappe to the groude/a Dragon lepte
out of the shelle/& crepte all about/&
whyle he wolde haue copen in to the
shelle that he came out of/he dyed a
none. Than Antyphoy a noble dy

upnour was demaunded what that Anno A
sholde sygnefye / and he answerde & Transmi.
sayd/that Phylpp sholde haue a sone Ab Vrbe.
borne that sholde goo aboute alle the
worlde / but he sholde dye er he came
apene. For a dragon is a ryall best/&
an egge hath the shap of the worlde.
Afterward whan Olympias was tra
uelyng of childe/were herde and sene
erthe quakyng lyghtnyng & thondre.
¶ Quintus Lurcius. Alle that daye
late twey egles vpon the coppe of the
hous/that boded and sygnefyed twey
grete Emppres of Europa & Alpa.
¶ Vincencius. The childe is borne &
named Alylandre with fayre here &
fayre eyen/one yelowe/a nother blac
ke. ¶ Hieronimus Epistola .lxxxv.
Alylandre myght not leue y maners
and the vyces and the lecherpe of his
mayster Leonydes / in the whiche he
was enfete whyle he was a childe/&
vled hem whyle he was lorde of the
worlde. and therfor his fader Phylpp
put awaye Leonydes & made Arysto
tle to be Alylandres maystre. ¶ Sene
ca. Alylandre putte that Leonydes af
terwarde to Lyons to be deuoured.
¶ Vincencius. Whan Alylandre was
xii. yere olde/he hadde grete lyknyng
& Joye to be in hoost amonge men of
armes/and to lepe on horle and vled
hym selfe right knyghtly. On a daye
whan Phylpp was absente. Alylan
dre prayed Nectanabus that he wolde
teche hym his craft & he graūted/&
whan they came togyder to a depe
water pytte. Alylandre threwe y wpt
che in the same pytte. And whan he
was dede wounded/he axed Alylan
dre why he dyde so. Thy craftte sayd

Anno A Alylandre is to blame/for it warned
 Transmi. not the this chaūge/there thou lyste
 Ab Vrbe. neuelyng and sholdest telle after these
 chēges of heuen. he answered & sayd. No
 may maye flee his owne desteny:
Treuisa. Nectanabus sayd this lawe
 & was a wyttche. & therfor he is ne
 uer the better to be byleued/but it we
 re a byle shame for a Crysten may to
 byleue this fals lawe of a wyttche. for
 from euery myshap that man is sha
 pe in this worlde to falle in/god may
 hē saue yf it be his wyll. Than it fo
 loweth in the storie. Nectanab⁹ sayd I
 knowe wel by this craft þ myne own
 lone sholde slee me. What sayde Aly
 landre art þ my fader / and he tolde
 Alylandre all thyng by ordre as it sto
 de & dyed anone after. Than Alylan
 dre ordeyned him a graue. & tolde his
 moder of all this. That tyme Philip
 toke grete thought who sholde be his
 heyre & kyng after him. & had answe
 re of Appolyon Delphycus/that who
 þ euer myght ryde his horse withoute
 falle or hurtyng sholde be his heyre &
 lorde of the worlde. Alylandre herde
 telle herof of Phyllyppes horse called
 Bucyfall right peryllous & bytyng. &
 alwaye kept in cloos/& nyed as it we
 re in the royrng of lyons. Natheles A
 lylandre toke the horse by þ mane &
 ledde hym out & lept on his backe/&
 rode hym without hurtyng. Phyllyp
 herde therof & worshypped Alylandre
 as lorde of the worlde. Therefore Aly
 landre in his. xvi. yere faught in cha
 ryottes & had þ bytoure & wanne the
 Cyte Mathona þ his fader had lost/
 And whan he came home/ageyne he
 lawe messagers of perse in his faders

hous chalenge trybute that they were
 wonte to haue for londe & for water.
 What sayd Alylandre chalengeth the
 kyng of perse/the elementes þ be cō
 mune to all men & bestes. Than he
 had Darius leue of & cesse of vnkynd
 full doyng. **G**ir. in top. In an ho
 mely & specyall companye & myrche.
 Alylandre herde a swete harpe / & he
 kytte the strenges & sayd. It is better
 to kytte strenges than hertes. He con
 ceuyed þ by the swete melodye his her
 te sholde be more tourned to lphyng
 than to hardynes/to ease than to chy
 ualke/to lecherie than to vertue / to
 bestly lphyng than to manhode. Na
 theles hystories sayen þ Antygonus
 brake the harpe that Alylandre toke
 grete delyte to here. And sayd it befall
 leth to thynne age/nowe to regne / be
 than asshamed to suffre womes lphē
 ge to regne in a kynges body. **T**ul
 lius. Whyle Alylandre gate fauour of
 men by yettes of moneye / his fader
 wrote to hym in this maner. What er
 rour hath brought the in to that hope
 that þ trowest to haue hem true to the
 þ thou hast ouercome with moneye/
 he that relceyueth is the worse/& also
 more redy to wayte after yettes/there
 by he taketh hede to þ as to a seruaūt
 & a yeuert of yettes. & not as to a kyng

The .xiiii. kyng of perse Da
 rius Arsanus lone began to
 regne the seconde yere of Aly
 landre/and reigned .vi. yere. **T**ro
 gus li. xi. Than Alylandre slough his
 stepdams lone Caranus/and all his

owne hymne that semed able to the kyngdom, for that no mater of stryf sholde leue in Macedony whan he were put of the londe. Than he alayde craftely manye stryues that were besgonne & wente in to Corynth. He began to restore the werre in Perle that his fader had begonne. He made subgette the Lacedemones & the Athenes that were rebell by counseyle of Demostenes. Than þ Athenes with the flemes Thebans yaued them selfe to Darius kyng of Perle. He deled his herytage amonge his frendes / & byleued that Alya were allone ynowe for hym / and therfore he bade the knyghtes spare the thynges of Alya. He left the duller men to kepe his kyngdom Macedonia / & had with hym the sharpest wytted men. Olde men of sixty yere that had traauyld with his fader / he mad them maystres & leders of his hooft. for they put hope in brayne & not in feet / and trust in the vyctorye & not in the flyght. In Alysandres hooft were .xxxiii.M. fote men & fyue thousande horsmen. Therfore it was doubte whether it was more wonder that Alysandre myght wyne the worlde with so lytyll strength / epyther that he durst auette hym with so lytyll strength ¶ Petrus. L. lxxxvi. Than Alysandre passed the see Elepentes / and ouercome Darius dukes and leders that were assembled ayenste hym vpon the Granicus. Than he passed forthe thurgh Lidia thurgh Yconia thurgh Pamphilia and toke the Cyte Sardes that is sette by twene the tway frigies: ¶ Trogus li. xi. Alysandre herde of the compnge

of Darius and dradde the streytnesse Anno A of Places / and wente vp to the hille mount Taurus / and leyde on fyfty Transmi. furlonges / and had the maystreye & came to Charles full of swote & of powder or duste & threwe hym selfe in to a water that spryngeth there / than his senexes began to shrynke so that he shold haue dyed anone / but he had taken a drynke of Phyllyp a Phyllycien. Nathelesse Darius had before yuen to Phyllyp a grete somme of monye for to see Alysandre / and Alysandre had lettres therof & was warned that he sholde in noo wyse take drynke ne medycyne of Phyllyps honde. Nathelesse Alysandre toke trustly a drynke of Phyllyppes honde / but he toke hym fyrst the same lettres to rede. After four dayes Alysandre was hole / and Darius passed the Ryuer Eufrates at mount Taurus with four hondred thousande fote men / & an hondred thousande horsmen & let forth the forwarde & sheltron. There was strong fyghtyng / & epyther kyng was wounded. Darius fled fast away. four score .M. fotemen & .x.M. horsmen of his were slayne / and .xxx.M. were taken. His castels and walled townes were beten to grounde. Darius moder & his wyf and his tway wyf ters were taken / but her lyf was saued and they be to newe maryage taken. Than Alysandre began to lyue lecherously / and loued Barlynes that was taken / and gate on hyr Hercules. Than he desyred to be kyng of the east and went in to Syrya. ¶ Petrus L. xlvi. Than one Saraballa made a subgestion to kyng Alysandre that

Anno A the Jewes wolde be the lasse rebell yf
 Transmi. theyr power were deled a two. and by
 Ab Urbe. leue of the kyng they buylde a Tem-
 ple in the hylle moūt Gazarym that
 dured to the destruccion that was do-
 ne by the Romayns & ordeyned a bys-
 shop there in manasses that had wed-
 ded his doughter / & was Gadus the
 bysshops brother. ¶ Trogus lib. xi.
 Whyle Alylandre was in Syrya ma-
 ny kynges of the east came ayenst hē
 and lordes with crownes & Dyade-
 mes. Some of hem he toke to his cō-
 panie. & some he bename her kyngdo-
 mes & put newe in her stede. & put do-
 ne many gentylmen. & put vngentyl-
 men in her stede. Among þ̄ whiche he
 put of gentylmen & made an vngen-
 tylman lord of þ̄ Sydonies / þ̄ lord
 was wont before to worche for hē / &
 laue vp water of pyttes & wat orchar-
 des & gardens. So he dyd for mē shol-
 de take hede & trust to be auauiled by
 theyr noble dedes / & not by her grete
 blood ¶ Trogus li. xviii. That tyme
 Alylandre fylled þ̄ dyches / & toke þ̄ Ly-
 te Tyrus & heng in croyses all þ̄ dwel-
 led there outake Strakons blood. Tro-
 gus lib. lxxxi. Somtyme were many
 chorles in þ̄ Lyte Tyrus / & conspyred
 togyd̄ & slough her lordes þ̄ were vnc-
 cours long tyme & all her free men. &
 occupped her houles & wedded her wy-
 ues / & begate free childer though him
 selfe were bonde. Nacheles one chorle
 of so many thousand hydde his lorde
 called Strakon / & laued hym goodly
 Than þ̄ chorles come togyder to che-
 se hem a kyng & were assented þ̄ whi-
 che of hē myght fyrst espre þ̄ sonne ry-
 syng on the morowe he sholde be her

kyng. This good chorle warned his
 lorde Strakon of this doynge / & Stra-
 kon coūseylled þ̄ chorle / þ̄ whay they
 were all comyn at nyght in to the fel-
 de & loked eastwarde after þ̄ sonne he
 sholde loke westwarde / & so he dyd / &
 shewed hym wonderly þ̄ lyght of the
 sonne beames shynnyng on the highest
 towres of the Lyte / but hem lemed
 that þ̄ maner doynge come of no chor-
 les wytte / & axed fast who was coun-
 seylour of that dede / and he knowle-
 ched that it was his lorde. Than it
 was knowen howe gretely wytte of
 lordes passed wytte of chorles. Than
 the olde man & his childery had gra-
 ce / and Strakon was cholen kyng.
 This maner doynge of chorles comē-
 ly was vled in euery londe vnto Aly-
 lands tyme. He toke þ̄ Lyte & sloughe
 all that was therein excepte Strakons
 blood. ¶ Iosephus li. xi. Than Aly-
 landre wrote to Gadus prynce of pries-
 tes in Iherusalem þ̄ he sholde ordey-
 ne for hym vntayll & trybute þ̄ he was
 wonte to paye to Darius the kyng.
 Gad^o warned & sayd nay / for he was
 sworn to Darius to paye hym þ̄ try-
 bute / therfore Alylandre was dysple-
 sed with the Jewes. ¶ Petrus li. C.
 lxxxvi. Than Alylandre went forth
 & toke the Lyte Gaza whay he had
 besyged it twey monethes. and from
 thens he went towarde Iherlm. And
 Gadus the bysshop as he was taught
 in his slepe / arayed hym in bysshops
 araye / and wente with other pries-
 tes ayenst kyng Alylandre and shewed
 hym the pphecre of Danyell / in the
 whiche prophecre it was sayd that o-
 ne of the Grekes sholde destroye the

power of the Perles / & that by goddes doyng / & so Iadus gate grace of þyng & relesse of the trybute for. vii yere . ¶ Trogus li. xi. Thay he wan Roodes & Egypte as it were without batayle. Thay he wente to Jupyter Ammon to wytte of hym recede & cou seyll of happeschat sholde befallie / & also of his owne byrthe. for his moder Olimpias was beknowen to Phyllyp. that a grete serpente hadde getey Alyandre on hyr & not Phyllyp / therfore Philip in the last tyme of his lyf tolde openly that Alyandre was not his lone / & therfor he forloke Olym piada and put hyr awaye from hym. Thay Alyandre desyrd to gete him lygnage & byrthe of godhede / & also to put of the sklander of his moder. Thay Alyandre gaue mede to the bysshops & warned hem what answer he wolde haue / & went in to Jupyteres Temple & was worshypped as he were goddes lone. And therefore he were the more proude & vnely & lost the dy sage of the wes þ he had lerned in lectres of grue . Thay he tourned in to Egypte & there he bylde þ Lyte Alex andria / & passed forth & warred vpon the Lyte of Samaritanes & wanne it & yaued it to Macedoyns to dwelle in. for the Samaritanes had slayn one Andromachus þ Alyandre he left to kepe the contree . ¶ Aug^o de ci. dei li. iiii. c. iiii. Pol. li. iii. That tyme Aly sandre axed of one Dyonides a theef of the see þ was taken why he robbed the see / & he answerde & sayd stedfast ly / for þ same shyll that þ robbest all the worlde wyde / but for I do with a lytill shyp. therfor I am called a theef

and for thou doost it with a grete na Anno A
uy / thou art called an Emperour tou /
chyng the cause therof is noo dyffe /
Tranflu.
rence byrwene vs / but vnfortune and Ab Drbe.
vnhappy oute take that he is werke
that steleth moost. Were Alyandre ta
ken all one. he sholde be called a theef
and yf the people were redy to Dyo
nydes comaundement thay Dyonys
des were an Emperour . The lawes
that I flee / thou impugnest and with
sayste hem : Lytill fortune / pouerte
and scarlyte of rychele maketh me a
theef. Grete pryde and couetyse that
mays not be fulfyllid maketh the a
theef. On caas yf my fortune and ris
ches were withdrawe I sholde be bet
ter than I am now. And thou the mo
re fortune and rychele that thou hast
the worle thou shalte be . Alyandre
wondred of his stedfastnesse / and
sayde . I shall assaye yf thou wylte
be the better / yf thy fortune be chaun
ged . Soo that after this thou shalte
wyte it thyne owne maners / and not
fortune what thou trespasseste and
doost amysse . ¶ Iustinus libro sex
to. Whan Syrya was ouercome. Aly
sandre and Darius came este togy
dres in batayll for to fyght . Darius
sente lettres to Alyandre in this ma
ner. Darius kyng of kynges & colyn
of goddes sendeth to his seruaunt Aly
sandre chargyng & comaundyng the
that thou retourne to my seruauntes
thy forsadris that yet lye in thy mo
ders lap. I hope that thou lerne mans
nes offyce / & tyll thou come therto . I
sende to the a scourge a ball & a pur
with golde / the scourge betokeneth þ
to take hede to thy loze / þ bal acordech

Anno A to the playeng of thyne age. & the mo
 Transmi. neye maye releue the in thy way. And
 Ab Vrbe. but þ̄ be obeyssaunt to my cōmaūde/
 mentes & heltes & do as I cōmaūde &
 charge. I shal sende men þ̄ shal scour
 ge the & bynde þ̄ & byng the bouiden
 byfore my lordshyp & mageste. These
 saynges made the lordes þ̄ were with
 Alyland sore abasshed & aferde. Than
 Alylandre answerd hem & sayd/why
 be ye abasshed of these wordes/þ̄ ha
 ue more of brag & of boost than of tru
 ste & of truth. It is þ̄ maner of the fe
 blest houides to berke moost & euer the
 lasse myght they haue/they berke the
 faster. Than Alylandre wrote to Da
 rius in this maner. Alylandre kynge
 of kynges & lorde of lordes and Co
 lyn of goddes sendeth gretynng to Da
 rius. Thou hast sente me a scourge a
 ball & moneye of golde/therby I kno
 weleche that þ̄ hast couenablye graū
 ted me all thyng. for it behoued that
 I vse a scourge among my subgettes
 the rouidenesse of the balle sygnefeth
 that I shall be lorde & Emperour of
 all the wyde worlde/the golde that þ̄
 hast sente me / behoteth me lordshyp
 of all thy rycheffe & tresour/the grete
 boost that þ̄ makest of rycheffe / ma
 keth vs to haue the gretter wyll to
 warre ayenst the. ¶ Trogus libro. xi.
 Atte last Darius was ouercome and
 fledde in to Babylon & prayed Aly
 landre by lettres that he myght rau
 son his men that were taken pryso
 ners. But Alylandre chalenged not
 oonly moneye/ but all the hole kyng
 dome. Este Darius profred Alylan
 dre his doughter / and a grete parte
 of his kyngdom with her. But Aly

landre charged h̄ to delyuer to hym
 his owne/and cōmaunded Darius to
 come mekely & relceyue as the bydor
 wyll ordeyne. Than Darius had no
 ne hope of peas/and cam ayenst Aly
 landre with .iii. L. M. fote men & ay
 L. M. horsmen. Nethelste it was tol
 de hym by the waye þ̄ his wyf was de
 de in trauayll of childe in Alylandres
 warde/ & that Alylandre had buryed
 hyr with grete worshyp. Nethelcs Aly
 landre dyd it not for loue/ but for mā
 hode of hym selfe. Therfore Darius
 wrote to hym the thyrde tyme/ than
 kyng him þ̄ he was curtoys to all his
 & dyde hem no despyte ne enuye. And
 profred hym þ̄ more parte of his kyn
 gedom vnto þ̄ Ryuer Eufrates & his
 doughter with .xxx. M. talentes / for
 the other dele of his men that were ta
 ken prysoners. Alylandre answerde
 thankynge of enemyes is but vany
 te. It nedeth not sayd he flater amon
 ge reles of warre / than he prompted
 hym arape his sheltron / eyther yelde
 hym & his/ namely whyle that lorde
 maye not suffred twey kynges þ̄ be
 lyke grete. Than Alylandre wente
 pryuely in to Darius tentes/ & mette
 happely with Darius and sayde. I
 am Alylandres messager and I telle
 these tydynges. I holde hym no kyn
 ge that hyeth hym slowly in to bas
 taylle. Whether thou be Alylandre
 sayde Darius/ that spekest so boldez
 ly. Nay sayd Alylandre / but I am
 his messager. Thenne Darius brou
 ghte hym in to soper/ where Alylan
 dre of euery vessell that was profre
 red hym to drynke / he dranke of the
 wyne and put the vessell in his bosom

Whan Darius was warned herof by his seruautes/he was wroth & reprobued Alylandre as a these/this maner sayd Alylandre is vled in Alylandris courte.& therfor I wende it be so vled here.& so the kyng was apayed & the noyle ceased. But one that was atte fest knewe Alylandre/& therof Alylandre was loone ware & fledde anon & slough a childe of Perle that helde his horle atte pate & passed the Ryuer & came to his men. Darius folowed Alylandre/but Alylandre charged that none of his men shold passe þe Ryuer.& þe his men shold peue wey & let þe perles passe ¶ Trogus li.xi. Ther was a strong fyghtyng.& at last Darius gan to flee / & Alylandres knyghtes pursued & toke grete prayes full .xxx. dayes. Than that ryche Cyte Perlypolis that was the chyef Cyte of Perle was taken/but Darius fledde with many soore woundes/& his owne coulins put hym in bouides of golde/but atte laste Darius dyed & Alylandre buryed hym with grete solempnyte & worshyp. ¶ Trogus li.xii. The meane tyme messagers came with lettres out of Macedonia/& tolde that Antipater the wardayn & heper of the countree had ouercome Facides kyng of Spartania/that is Lacedemonia / & also Alylandre kyng of Epyres that is Tracia / but Antipater also was fowle borne downe : Also Zephyron Alylandres stuarde with .xxx. thousande faught ayenst the Shytes and were all destroyed. Whan Alylandre hadde herde these tydynges/he made thre daye grete moone & sorowe. than his knyghtes trowed that he wolde re

tourne to his owne countree. Nathelesse Anno A
 lesse Alylandre comforted his knyghtes Transmi.
 to trauaylle and wynne straunge Ab Vrbe.
 londes of the east / and sayd that he fought not Darius body/but his kyngdome and his londe. Soone after he wanne the Mardes & the Hyrcanes. Also Talestris the quene of Amazonas with thre hondred women mette with Alylandre & came .xxxv. Journeyes amonge right cruell men for to haue childer by kyng Alylandre. The syght and the comynge of hyr was wonderfull to all maner men/ and specyally for the message that she brought was wonderfull and not vled. Than she lyued there .xiii. dayes in fleshely lyknyng and wente hyr waye. ¶ R. Nathelesse Alylandres storye telleth that Alylandre axed tribute of the quene of Amazonas/and she wrote to hym in this maner. Of thy wytte is wondre that thou woldeste fyght with woman : for yf it hadde that fortune fauour vs / and yf we be ouercome/than yf we art shamed for euermore / & yf thou ouercome vs yf geteste but lypyll worshyp of byctoyre of women. ¶ Trogus libro.xii.

After this Alylandre toke the clothyng and the Dyademe of the kyng of Perle as though he wolde passe in to the manner & vslage of Macedonia. And for it sholde not seme that all one he trespassed in that doynge/he had his frenches also vse long clothes of golde. Also he deled þe tymes & stempnes of the

Anno A nyghtes among companye of strom/
 pcces/ & put to noble mete & drynke/
 Transmi. lest fastyng destroyed lechery. he hygh
 Ab Vrbe. ted his meles with dyuerse playes &
 had no mynde that grete rychele is
 lost by suche maner doynge & not gete
 ne wonne. Therfore men began to
 haue Indygnacion of hym/ for he for
 soke the vslage & the maners of his
 forfaders. He lette knyghtes wedde
 women that were taken pylsoners/
 for they sholde take & suffre more ea/
 sely the trauayll of chyualltye/ & thyn
 ke the lasse of theyr owne countree.
 He helde that Macedonia sholde be
 stronger/ yf yong knyghtes come af/
 ter ulde fadres. & vled dedes of knygh
 tes within the boundes of theyr ow
 ne byrthe. And sholde be the more stal
 worth afterward yf they pyght her
 tentes as it were in her owne cradels
 Also Alyandre ordeyned fedyng for
 childe/ hors/ & armour for the yong/
 lynes/ hyre & wages for the faders/
 & yf the faders dyed/ the sones sholde
 receyue the wages of the faders/ & so
 her childehode sholde be as it were
 knyghthode & chyualltye. Than whā
 the partyes were chaled. Alyandre
 ware cruell amonge his owne men/
 and hated moost yf ony of his men
 wichsayde hym of ony maner dede.
 260 420 There he slough one Permenyon an
 olde man that was next the kyng/ &
 Permenyons sone Phyleta also / for
 they tolde him that he ouertourned &
 destroyed the maners & the vslages of
 the countree and of his fornfadres.
 Than Alyandre drad lest tydynges
 of that dede sholde come in to Mace/
 donia / he made it as he wolde sende

some of his frendes in to Macedonia
 to telle there tydynges of the vyctory/
 es & of the grete dedes that he had do
 & bade that men sholde wypte lettres
 all that wolde tydynges sende/ & ma
 de the messagers byng hym y lettres
 pryuatly/ for he wolde knowe all men
 nes wyll y wolde lettres sende. eyther
 for he wolde rewarde hem that were
 true/ eyther sende hem that were fals
 in to ferre londes. ¶ Pol. Alyandre
 was oft dronken/ & than he was cruel
 among his meyny/ & so it happed on
 a tyme y he gaue dome ayenst one the
 grettest of his palays y his hede shol/
 de of/ & he appelled anone right. But
 for me vled to appele from the lasse
 to the more / the Tyraunt that was
 wyne dronke tourned in to more wo/
 denesse & sayd/ from whom & to who
 me appellest thou. Iapele sayd he
 from Alyandre the dronke / to Aly/
 andre the sobre. By that answer Aly
 andre abated his wrath/ and put of
 the sentence and dome/ and fully for/
 gaue hym y trespas. ¶ Trogus Than
 he subdued the people y dwelled acce
 fote of the hylle Lancalus/ and buyl
 de the Cyte Alexandria vpon the Ry
 uer Thanays. ¶ R. Here take hede y
 Alyandre buylde .xii. Cytees/ euery
 of hem called Alexandria in dyuerse
 kyngdomes and londes. Atte Ryuer
 Thanays Pontus Shiciany Mella/
 getes Egypte Troada at Tygrys
 and at Staurus/ and made wypte in
 the walles of the Cytees in lettres of
 grue. Alysaundre Juppters colyn.
 ¶ Trogus libro .xii. The men y be
 cloled within the watteres y be called
 Palludes. Meotydes sente a letter to

Alpander in this maner. Vt goddes wolde that the hauynge of thy bodye were euen to the coueptyle of thy soule/the worlde myght not receyue the/whether thou knowe not þ trees that growe longe tyme be roted vp in a lytll whyle / than take hede & beware that þ falle not with the tree whyle þ takelt to che the bowes. Dft the lyon is mete to smale beestes & to fowles & rust destroped yron/there is no thynge so stronge & stedfast that may not be brought in to peryll / & that by a feble thynge & well lytll worthe. What epleth the at vs. we came neuer in thy londe/we maye serue noo man / & we kepe not to regne. And þ hast Joye to pursue theues / & thou arte euery nacyons thef/what nede hastow to ryches that maketh the the more nedy to desyre more rycheffe. To the vyctoye is cause of batayll/no man suffred gladly an alpen lorde. And yf þ art god þ sholdest yeue men benefyce & yettes. & take fro noo man his owne. Vt thou be a man thynke what thou art/thou myght haue frendes of hem that þ hast not greued / & them that thou haue ouercome / thou myght haue hem euer in suspede/bytwene a bondman and his lorde is noo maner frenshyp though they be in peas. One daye at a fest amonge Alylandres trusty fren des was speche of the dedes of Philip the kyniges fader. There Alysaundre began to boost & make hym selfe more worthy than his fader / & a grete dele that were arte fest helde vp Alylandres oyle. but Dlitus an olde man & wyle/trust in the kyniges frenshyp and prayled the fader / and anone

Alpander slough hym for that grete Anno A praylynge / but afterwarde whan the kyniges wodenesse was ceased / he be Transmi. thought hym of the persone that Ab Vrbe. was slayne / of the cause of his dethe / and of the feste tyme / and made soo grete sorowe that he desyred to dye / the teeres brake out of his epen / and he wepte full soore. Than he beclipped the dede corps / and gropech the woundes dnd drewe oute the shafte / and profreth to stycke hym selfe therwith. for this Dlitus syster was Alylandres nozle / this sorowe dured four dayes / and one Calystenes Alysaundres scole fere vnder Arystotle alayed this sorowe vnnethe with grete besynesse. ¶ Trogus libro duodecimo. But not longe afterwarde / for this Calystenes the phylosopher wold not vble the maner and the araye of Perse Alysaundre bare hym on honde that he was a fals elpye / and heete smyte of his lymmes / and threwe the stoke of the bodye in to a pytte and an hande with him. But one Lysymachus a gentyman and a noble / made hym drynke denyen for remedye of his sorowe. Than Alylandre was wrothe for that dede / and put this Lysymachus to a lyon to be eten / but he wrapped a clothe about his honde and put in to the lyons mouth whan the lyon refed. and raled of the tonge & slough the lyon. Alysaundre sawe that and loued hym the more afterward. ¶ Solinus. After this Alysaundre came to the hylles of Caspy there the childe of boundage of the ten lpgnages of Israell were cloled / and prayed for lycence to Alysaundre to go out of that

Anno A clopng. And whan Alysaunders had
 Transmi. vnderstāde that they were closed the-
 Ab Orbe. re for her synne/And that it was pro-
 phecied of hem that they sholde not
 goo thens. Alysaunders closed them
 faster & stopped her oute goyng wyth
 stones and glue and he lawe þ man-
 nes wytte was not suffysaūt to do þ
 dede and prayde god of Israel that
 he wolde fulfyll that werke. And de-
 de than the coppes of the hylles wen-
 te and closed to gyder. & soo the pla-
 ce was closed that noman myght co-
 me therto/ R. ¶ But they shal goo
 oute atte worldes ende and see ma-
 ny men so sayth Josephus/After this
 Alysaunders aboute the tenth yere of
 his kyngdome wente to Inde & he-
 uered þ armour of his knyghtes with
 syluer & wente vp in to the noble Cy-
 te nypla/Thens he ledde his hooſte to
 warde the holy hulle where men hele
 ther preyu harnays wyth puy leues/
 ther with a sodayn doyng of the hyl-
 le his hooſte was moeued to crye to
 god almyghty wyth holy cryes Thā
 he wente to the hylles called montes
 dedaly þ be in the kyngdome of the
 quene cleofilys. And for she myghte
 not wythstande hym wyth armour
 in fyghtyng/she lette the kyng lye by
 her & raūlonned the kyngdom/ The

But Alyandre shall dye / thay he is no god/ what he promyleth to me/ is not nedfull to me. He nedeth no suche thynges. I goo frely wheder me lyketh. Yf Alyandre smyte of my hede and slee me/ he maye not slee my soule. The groyng of hem that suffren wrong. is begynnyng of payne and tourmentes of hem that doth the wrong. Say thay to Alyandre that I drede not

my deth/ yf he wyll oughte of myne/ lette hym come to me. Than Alyandre leste of all pompe and boost/ and came to Dyndimus fere/ and Dyndimus to hym sayd/ why dystourbest y our peas/ what desyrest/ we haue noo thyng/ and what we haue is not nede full to the. We worshyp god and loue men/ we reche not of golde/ we despyse deth. Ye loue golde and hate men/ and despyse god. Than Alyandre sayd/ teche thou me wytte and wysedome that thou hast relcepyed of god as it is sayd. Than Dyndimus answerde and sayd/ thou hast not where on to doo suche a peste / for thy soule is full of couetyse/ than how shall I suffyle to the/ to whome all the worlde suffyleth not / god hath made the lypyll/ and though thou desyre all the worlde. It nedeth the to haue atte last as lypyll londe as thou seest me lye on eyther thy selfe lyppe on. Yf thou lerne this wysdome of me / all thou shalte haue / though thou desyrest nought / for couetyse is moder of pouert. God is my frende. I haue heue for my roof the erthe in stede of my bedde. the Ryuer syndeth me drynke/ and the wode is my mete borde/ fleshe of bestes roteth not within my guttes. I am not burpels of deed bodyes. 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After this . Alylandre aboute
 the .xi. yere of his kyngdome
 paſſed by the eaſt Ocean / &
 the byſhop of the trees of the ſonne
 and of the mone come apenſte hym/
 the byſhop was clothed in wylde be
 ſtes ſkynnes / & ſayd that they ſholde
 entre in to the place yf they were clene

& not pollute in lkyng by women/
 but they ſhold do of her clothes & her
 arape. & for thylke trees were an hon
 dred fote hyghe. Alylandre ſayd that
 it rone oft in that place/naye ſayd the
 preeſt / & ſayd that there came neuer
 rayne ne byrde ne wylde beeft/but the
 trees had wepte in the Eclyps of the
 ſonne and of the mone. ¶ Petrus. C.
 lxxxvii. Preeſtes toke of the apples of
 theſe trees & lyued fyue hondred yere/
 & whan the beame of the ſonne tou
 ched the tree of the ſonne / eyther the
 beame of the mone the tree of the mo
 ne / thay anone the tree wolde ſhake
 & yeue anſwere to hem that ſtode a
 bout. ¶ Vincencius. Alylandre wolde
 haue doo ſactrefyce to the trees/& the
 preeſt ſayd. It is not lawfull to ſette
 encenſe a fyre in this place/ne to ſlee
 beſtes/than Alylandre felle downe &
 clypped & kyſhed the ſtockes of the
 trees/& herde in the ſonne rplyng of
 the tree of the ſonne / ſpekynge in the
 langage of Jude. And at euen in the
 mone rplyng. He herde of the tree of
 the mone ſpekynge in the langage of
 Grece/that one ſholde be lord of all
 the worlde about/& that he ſholde ne
 uer come home in to his owne couñtre
 And therfore he couñſylled hym that
 he ſholde not come at Babylon. For
 yf he came there/he ſholde be ſlayne
 there/not with egge tole/but with de
 nyng þ ſeconde yere after. Also he her
 de þ his moder ſholde wretchedly dye
 & his ſyſtres lyue longe tyme in grete
 welth. ¶ Petrus. C. lxxxvii. Alylan
 dre warned his maſter Arpyſtole of
 this doynge & of other wondres of Ju
 de. ¶ R. Many ſtorpes telley þ whan

Alysandres knyghtes went about the pryuy places of Inde/there was one that blamed grete Alysandres coue tyle / & sente hym a lypyll stone with eyen by his knyghtes. & sayd þ her loz de without doubtte was lyke to þ stone in all maner poyntes . And whan that stone was brought me wondred longe tyme/in whiche syde of þ stone that lykenesse sholde be. Arte last the stone was layd in a balaunce / and it weped vp all þ myght be layde there agayns on that other syde / tyll they layde a lypyll clape apenst the stone in the balaunce on the other syde / & it weped vp the stone lyghtely prough.

¶ Eutropius. That yere Lucius Papius dyctator of Rome that was so noble a warryour / was chosen amonge all þ Romayns to withstande Aly sandre & to putte hym of / yf he wolde come in to Italpe / he ouercome the Sampnytes so worshypfully / that he bete so downe the Lytees. so þ though me sought Samonium in that place Samnium it myght not be fonde.

¶ Petrus. L. lxxxvii. Whan Aly sandre had wonne all the east londes / & wente towarde his owne contree / the messagers of the weest londes of Afrycia of Spayne & of Italpe come in to Babloyne / to yelde hem to his lordshyp & mageste . Natheles he hoped therby to be kyng holy of all the worlde / & for grete lypnyng & Joye / he forgate the answer of the trees of the sonne & of þ mone / & went in to Babloyne to speke with these messagers

¶ Trogus li. xii. Also the stewardes that he had made wardenyngs & keepers of prouynces & of londes mette with

hym there / & were greuously accused of men of londes & of prouynces / and here hem hange there in the syght of the messagers that were comen out of the west londes. Aly sandre toke Darius doughter to wyue / & maryed noble maydens of the contree to men of Macedonia. he lette olde men & toke to hym yonglynges. Also he receyued his moders lettres of the fraude & treason of Antipater steward of Macedonia. he sawe that þ kyng had slayne his men / & that he hym selfe was not rewarded for his grete traualles & drad full loze lest hym sholde worse befall / & ordeyned his sone Lassar drus to empoysen the kyng with venym / the strength and malyce of this venym was so vpolente & tyngnyng / that no bras ne yren / ne no maner metall myght holde it / but only the hoof of an hors fote myght holde it Than atte soper of Thessalus the philypen amonge grete seruyce of mete & drynke. Aly sandre was poysoned / & yaued a grone as though he had be styched thurgh the bodye with a swerde / and drad the handelyng of mannes honde as sore as harde woundes / & axed a toole to slee hym self in remedye of sorowe. his frendes trowed that vnholosome mete that he had eten at sopes / was cause of his sekenesse. ¶ Petrus. L. lxxxvii. Than Aly sandre lost his speche & wrote his laste wyll and wolde not make one man heyre of his hole kyngdome / for me sholde rede after hym of noo man that was his peere / but he made twelue yonge men that were his felawes of youthe. successours of his kyngdom / but that

 Transmi. of hem regned & the other were forsa
 Ab Vrbe. ke/so it is comprehended in Danpell
 ¶ Trogus li.xii. Whan that Alysan

 they axed of hym who sholde be his
 heyr and Emperour after hym / the
 moost worthy sayd he/he was so stou
 te and grete of herte/though he had a
 lone Hercules & a broder Arideus / &
 sawe also his wyf Roxones with chil
 de / he forgate the offspring & lygna
 ge / and ordeyned that the worthiest
 sholde be his successour & Emperour.
 He sawe also that of this maner spe
 kyng and doyng myght come grete
 stryf & enuye. whan he myght not spe
 ke/he toke the ryng of his synger &
 paue it to one Perdica in token that
 he sholde be his successour. Alyandre
 Moyr Alex dyed the yere of his kyngdom .xii. &
 andri mag the yere of his age .xxiii. Strange
 ni. men made sorowe for his deche / as
 though he were her fader / & they that
 were next hym made Joye.as though
 her enemye were ouercome : Darius
 moder ordeyned for his deche / not for
 to put her enemye before hir lone.but
 for she had founde with hym mylde
 nesse/as it were the myldenelle of hir
 lone. Also his frendes prayed to Jus
 ppter & had answer and ordeyned for
 to burye hym in Egypt.not in Mem
 phis/but in the Cyte Alexandria that
 he had buylde. ¶ Pol.li.iiii. In Gre
 ce was neuer man gretter than Aly
 sandre/nethelste Perdica a comble
 tres lone was his successour/and not
 his owne lone. for it is a comyn law
 Sylde eyther neuer Emperours chil
 dre be the faders heyres/for they had

her owne enemyes to be her heyres af
 ter hem/or els heyres that they knew
 not. ¶ Trogus li.xii. Whan Alysan
 dre was buryed . Phylolophres came
 to gyder & sayd. Alyandre hath ma
 de tresour of golde / but nowe is the
 contrarpe. A nother sayd/all the worl
 de was to lpyll for hym yesterdape/
 and nowe four elues is ynough atte
 full. A nother sayd /yesterdape he had
 the people at his heltes/and now the
 people hath him at her best. A nother
 sayd/yesterdape he hadde an hooft/to
 dape is the contrarpe/for an hooft le
 dech hym. A nother sayd /that yester
 dape he bare a downe meny/and this
 dape he is born downe vnder erthe.
 ¶ Petrus. C.lxxxvii. After the grete
 Alyandre in the four partes of the
 worlde regned four kynges : Phyllyp
 Arideus Alysandres broder regned in
 the west in Macedonia in Grece. An
 tygonus regned in the north of Alpa
 and of Pontus Selenchus. Nichanor
 regned in the east of Syrpa & of Ba
 bylon/and after Nichanor Antpoch^s
 sother/kynges that regned after hym
 had the name of hym/& were named
 Antpochi / and euery in the synguler
 nombre were called Antpochus. The
 kynges that succeeded hym/were An
 tyochus Theos. Antpochus Galeri^s
 Antpochus the grete. Antpochus Epi
 phanes. Also in the south of Egypte
 regned Tholomeus Lagus lone / of
 hym kynges hadde that name and
 were called Tholomei / the whiche
 kynges were Philadelphus Euerget
 tes. Philopater otherwyle called Eus
 pater. Philometor. Euergetes Sother
 ¶ Josephus libro .xii.

Tholomeus Lagus sone regned after Alypandrie in Egypte xl. yere. and was called sauour / & had a surname Sother / he put Syrpa to his kyngdome / & warred with the Jewes that were yde in the holy dawe & toke pylsoners of hem & sette hem to sale. In his dayes dyed Jodus bysshop of Jewes. After Jodus his sone Dnias was bysshop. After hym Symon the rightfull. After hym his brother Eleazarus. This Tholomeus was so stronge that he restored Pyrrus kyng of Epyrtes to his kyngdom ayene / after that his enemyes had put him out of his kyngdome. And he ouercome Demetrius Antygonus sone / & restored some of the kyngdom to Selenchus kyng of Syrpa / for the kyngdome was benoyme Selenchus before. Agathocles vled tyrannye in Syracula / of his wonderfull begynnyng me redeth in Trogus bookes. Tholomeus toke Iherusalē by fraude & gyle / & toke many Jewes pylsoners and solde hem for couetyse. Theofrastus the phylosophre had þ name Theofrastus for his noble spe kyng of god almyghty. This Theofrastus & Menandris le in theyr flour. fro this yere the hystoie of Machabeys acompted the kyngdome of Grece. Regnum Grecoꝝ. About this tyme Selenchus kyng of Syrpa bylde Antychia Leodicia and Selencia. The grete Symon Dnias sone is in his prosperite & is called rightfull for his rightfull byleue & worshyppynge of god. The Tarentes dyde grete by

lonye to the messagyers of Rome / therfore they toke with hem Pyrrus kyng of Epyrtes with .iiii. score thousande fote men & .vii. M. horsmen / and .xx. Dylfauntes apenst the Romayns / but Pyrrus was ouercome in the thyrde fyghtyng / & tourned home ayene to his owne countree. After this the Tarentynes & the Cartaginenses togyder warred apenst the Romayns & reyled the bataylles that be called Bella punica. Eutropius. Pyrrus ouercome þ Romayns in the fyrst batayll & occupied Italye vnto the Lyte Pienestes .xxviii. myle fro Rome. And sente hem the pylsoners that were taken a lyue without rauosome / and buryed all that were slayn. And whan he behelde them lye with grysely woundes & sterne terryble and cruell. he heef up his honde and sayd: that he myght be lorde of the worlde yf he had luche knyghtes. Pyrrus profered the fourth parte of his kyngdome that he had gotten to one Fabricius messagyer of Rome. to holde with hym & be on his syde. And fabricius wolde not assente. Than Pyrrus sente one Lynea with grete yestes in message to the Romayns and desyred peas with skylfull condycion. Trogus xvii. But he founde no mannes hous that wolde resceyue his yestes / but was put of / and the pylsoners that were sente agayne were sclaūdred for euermore / for they were taken pylsoners whyle they were armed. Tytus. Lyneas came ayene and sayd to Pyrrus that he had seen the contree of kynges / and sayd that nyghe alle that were there / were luche as Pyrrus

Anno A was holden amonge his owne men.
 Transmi. Than in the seconde bataylle Pyrrus
 Ab Orbe. was overcome/and his Dlyfauntes were slayne/and twenty thousande of his men. For as Pylidorus sayth the Romayns hadde ordeyned swyft ponglynges syttyng behynde horsen men/the whiche pong men lepte downe lyghtely in the fyghtyng & clawed and scoted the Dlyfautes in the foreheade with horlcombes vnto the Dlyfauntes fylle downe and dyed righte there. Than Pyrrus was overcome/and wente in to Tarente and sayled thens in to Grece/there he was afterwarde slayne. Valerius. Pyrrus fabricius hadde castels nyghe togdyres and Pyrrus Phylscpen came to fabricius and promysed hym / that he wolde take to hym his lord yf he wolde geue to hym a couenable mede. Than this fabricius boude this phylscpen and sente hym to his lord / & messagys to warne him of the trelon and of the fallhede / than the kynge wondred and sayd. This is fabricius that is harder to be tourned out of honeste/than is the sonne to be tourned out of his cours. Titus. Pyrrus was prayled of the Tarentynes to warres ayenst the Romayns/and he axed of Appolyn what ende the bataylle sholde haue. And Appolyn answerde hym Amphibolyce/that is he that gaue hym answer of double vnderstandyng. It maye befall the Pyrrus / to scomyte the Romaynes. Pyrrus was comforted with this answer/and came to Eraclea the Cyte of Sampna/there the Romayns the fyrst day were a ferde of the horryble

gretnesse and chappe & smelle of Dlyfauntes/and fledde awaye for drede/ but in þe seconde batayll Pyrrus was sore wounded in his arme/and wente his waye thens. In many places of Italye/blood sprang and ranne out of welles / and rayne of mylke came done fro heuen. Selenchus kyng of Syrya toke many Jewes in to þe Cytees of his kyngdom & grauted hem as grete worship as the Grekes had Eleazarus Symons broder is bissshop of Jewes. The Romayns buylde Venueut in Sampnū. Sanfr. & Alfr. About this tyme Morindus the cruel sone of Dauius regned in Bytayne his moder was called Tangustela. & was Dauius concubyne. This Morindus dyde many cruell dedes / and was eten atte laste of a grete beest of the see/and left after hym fyue sones/ the fyrst was called Gorbomanus/ he loued well rightwysnesse and regned a whyle and dyed. Than the seconde sone Archgallo regned cruelly/ & atte last by the people was put out. Than the thyrde sone Elydurus a mylde man & softe was made kyng/and after fyue yere of his kyngdom/ he hunted in a wood called Calcum/ þe now is called Caltras besydes York. Gaufr. Besyde the Cyte Alcluyd he founde his brother Archgallo maskyng/ that was putte out of his kyngdom/ and kepte hem pryuely in his chambre/and laye in his bedde and feyned hym leke / and sente for the lordes of the londe and compelled hem to restore his brother to the kyngdom/ than Archgallo regned ten yere and dyed. Than Elydurus was restored est to

the kyngdom/ but his twey other brethern Hygenius and Perpdurus warred with hym and pyloned hym in Trynouantum that is London/ and they twey reigned by tymes epyther after other and dyed atte laste. Then Elydurus was take out of pylow / & restored to the kyngdome the thyrde tyme / and lyued afterwarde in peas to his lyues ende. After hym .xxxii. kynges reigned amonge the Bytayne euerpyche after other / amonge the whiche / kyng Bledgaret passed all his predecellours in myltye & w me / lodye / soo that he was called god of glemen. After that Hely reigned .xl. yere and lefte thre noble ones a lyue after hym. Lud. Cassybelanus. & Nesimius. ¶ Petrus ca. CC.

Tholomeus Philadelphus the seconde kyng of Egypte reigned epyght and thyrty yere. he sayth that he ouercome his owne fader / & had in his hooft two hondred thousande foremen twenty thousand horsmen two thousand Charpottes / and four hondred Dlyfautes. ¶ Petrus. CC. This delpyuered the Jewes that were in Egypte and lette them go free six score thousand by tale. and payed to her lordes for euery poll .xx. dragmes of syluer / that is .xxv. s. of our moneye / and sente the vessaylle that were halowed by Jewes to Eleazarus bysshop of Jewes. Also by counseyll of Demetrius that was warden of his bookes / he sente messagers to Eleazarus the bysshop prayeng that

he wolde sende hym wyle men of the Jewes that tholde tourne Moyles lawe out of Hebrew in to Greue. Then Eleazarus sente vnto the kyng of euerly ygnage six men / that draweth to thre lcore and twelue / but the scrpyture vled oft tyme to speke. not of the lypyll nombre yf it be odde ouer the grete. These be called y seuenty that tourned holy scrpyture out of Hebrew in to Greue / and enfourmed Tholomeus the kyng of the knowleche of one god / and of the gouernaunce of the kyngdom / and translated the lawe plalmes and prophecyes. In that translation where they founde ought of the tynpte / they spake not therof. epyther they translated it in a redel wyle / lest we wolde wene that they spake of thre goddes. Also in Plape about the Incarnacion of Cryst / they founde six names of god / & lette but one that is Angelus magni consilii an Angell of grte counseyll / lest we wolde wene that they meaned that mankynde and manhede tholde be the kynde of god and godhede. They fulfyllled this werke in .iii. score dayes and ten / but it semeth that saynt Augustyn de ciuitate dei libro .xviii. capitulo .xlii. vnderstandeth that these seuenty were departed euery by hym selfe in a selle / & translated the lawe without dylcorde of wordes or sentence. Jerom holdeth that they all were cloed in owne hous / epyther that they came togyder the saterdape / and examyned and correte her werke of six dayes. ¶ Augustinus de ciuitate dei libro decimo octauo Capitulo quadragesimo secundo. Seuenty olde men

Anno A of all the ygnages of Israell/euery
 Transmi. by hym selfe of Alexandria in Egyp
 Ab Vrbe. te tourned holy wryte out of Hebrew
 in to Grue. & dylcorded not in wordes
 in sentence neyther in lettynge of wor
 des. And though there were other in
 the tyme of the newe testamente that
 tourned holy wryte out of Hebrew in
 to Grue/that were Aquila. Symach?
 Theodocion/& the fyfth translacon
 the auctor therof is vnknowne / these
 seuenty be sette before all other. In
 our tyme one Jeronimus a preeste a
 wyle man & connyng in thre langa
 ges translated holy scrypture oute of
 Hebrew in to latyn. Jewes saye that
 his translacon is truest. Natheles ho
 ly chirche demeth no man to be putte
 before the auctoryte of so many men.
 Some men wolde amende the trans
 lacion of the seuenty by hookes of He
 brew / but they dar not withdrawe
 what the seuenty hadden more than
 the Hebrewes. but ther they made stry
 kes lyke as vnces be wryten. And be
 also called oboly to shewe that there
 is more than is in the Hebrew boke.
 But what the Hebrewes hadde more
 than the seuenty / they marked with
 markes þ be called astrarices. and be
 shapen as sterres/as it were to hyght
 the defeaute ¶ Plydor^o li. vi. He sayth
 that this Tholomeus hadde seuenty
 413 34 thousande boke in his lybrary. ¶ Pe
 trus ca^o xv. Of dyuerse translacons
 it is ynough to speke at ones. Before
 thyncarnacion of our lorde thre hon
 dred yere & forty & one / the seuenty
 that tourned holy wryte out of Hebrew
 in to Grue were in prosperp^{te}. Also
 after the ascencion of our lorde six sco

re yere & four in Adryan the prynces
 tyme. Aquila made a translacon.
 Than after .liiii. yere in Comodius
 the prynces tyme. Theodoron was in
 his prosperp^{te}. Than after .xxx. yere
 in Seuerus the prynces tyme Syma
 chus made his translacon. Than af
 ter. viii. yere þ fyfth translacon was
 foudey at Jerusalem/& is called the
 comune translacon. for he that made
 it is knowen. Than after .xviii. yere
 in Alyandre þ prynces tyme. Dige
 nes made a translacon with yignes/
 that be called Astariches and obelus.
 & afterwarde he made a nother trans
 lacion with sychis/yignes/and mar
 kes. And all these translated oute of
 Hebrew in to Grue. Many transla
 lated out of Grue in to Latyn. But
 atte last Jerom translated out of He
 brew in to Latyn/and his translacon
 on is holden nyghe in euery place out
 take in the plauter. ¶ Eutropi^o The
 Romaynes dyde the fyrste bataylle/
 that is called Bellum punicum/and
 Cartagenenses ayenst the Affres that
 be men of Affryca. ¶ Treuisa. Men
 of Affryca be called Affri/primi peni
 punici punices & Cartagenenses. Ther
 fore the batayll that is ayenst hem is
 called Bellum punicum and Carta
 genense also/as it were the batayll þ
 is ayenst hem that be called punici pu
 nices & Cartagenenses. Than it folo
 weth in þ storpe. though the Romay
 nes had meoued none armour with
 out Italye before þ tyme. Nathelesse
 for to knowe certapnly the somme &
 nombre of the Romayns/they payde
 a certayne & were accounted & founde
 two hondred thousande foure score

thoulande .xii. thofand/thre hondred
and .xxxi. the bataylle celled neuer
lyth/the Lyte was fyrft buylde. And
fo the Romayns fyue pere contynuel-
ly/& Sicilia ayenft Jheron kynge
of Sicilia/and ayenu the Affres we
re byctours & had þ mayftrye. Chan
the Romayns paue the fyrft bataylle
in Affryca. Her leder was Marcus re-
gulus Confull of Rome. And fyrft
they toke theyr fhyppes & drenched
hem eyther chaced hem/& her fhyppes
And atte last they toke thre dukis of
Affryca/& bete downe the hooft/& to
ke many Dlyfautes & lente .xxvii.
thoufande prifoners to Rome/amon-
ge thefe dedes atte Ryuer Biagada
they flough a grete ferpent & lente the
fhypp therof to Rome for a grete won-
der / for that fhypp was fix fcore fote
longe. Chan þ Cartagynenles men
of Affrica were ouercome & axed peas
And Marcus Regulus wolde graute
none peas/but vpon well harde con-
dycions. Chan the Affres gate with
hem Zanfippus kynge of Lacedemo-
nia & ouercome Marcus Regul^{us} with
all his hooft atte last myfchep/foe þ
oonly tweyne of þ Romayns elcaped
and fledde .xxx. thoufand were deed
flayne. Marcus Regulus & fyue hon-
dred prifoners were holden longe in
bondes. Afterwarde the Romayns o-
uercome the Affres in warre in fee &
in londe/fo that they flough of theyr
enemyes two hondred thoufand and
fix fcore Dlyfautes/& ten were Itake
& þ Cartagynenles Affres lente Mar-
cus Regulus to Rome/& prayed that
they wolde chaunge prifoners. ¶ Au-
gustinus de ci. dei li. i. Natheleffe an

othe was I fwoze that yf they axed it Anno **A**
fholde nought be do. Regulus fholde **Transmi.**
courne ayene to Cartage / he wente **Ab Vrbe.**
forth & dyd awaye his wyf from his
bedde as though he were no Romay-
ne. And in the coulepyll of Senatours
Igadred togyders/he counfeylled the
contrarpe of his owne melleage. And
he layd that it was not prouffyttable
to the comonte of Rome to chaunge
fo many noble prifoners for luche an
olde man as he was. The Romayns
dyd by his coulepyll. Natheles he was
not compelled to go ayene/but þ Ro-
mayns coulepylled hym fpecially for
to abyde at Rome. But by caufe he
fwoze at Cartage to come ayene / yf
he myght not haue auctorpte of an ho-
nelle bourges of the Lyte of Rome
after that he was prifoner / he chofe
for to go agayne/& wente ayene ther
the Affres clofed hym in a ftrayte tree
that was full of pythes withyn forth
of fharpe nayles/& pared of the lyd-
des of his eyen/and made hym ftan-
de fo there & wake to his lpyes ende.
¶ Petrus. L. lxxviii. Tholome^{us} faugh-
te ayenft Antiochus Theos kynge of
Syrpa/but afterwarde they were con-
federed togyder. for Antiochus wed-
ded Beronica Tholomeus doughter
and foilake his rather wyf Laodices
But atte lafte Laodices had grace of
hvr hulbonde & came to hym agayne
& punyfhed hym & his lone that he
had begeten on Beronica/and made
hvr owne lone Antiochus kynge of
Syrpa. A peny of fyluer is fyrft fha-
pen in Rome.

Tholomeus Euergetes Philadelphius brother was the thyrde kyng of Egypte and reigned .xxvi. yere. This is wreche of his syster Beronica / for hys husbonde & hys sone were slayne with venym/detroyed Syria Silicia and a parte of Alysia / & greued Antiochus Galerichus. But whan he herde that the prynces of Egypte had conspyred ayenst him in his absence / he turned agayn to in Egypte & lad with hym grete good / & two thousande & six hundred man mettes. Antiochus Galerichus lefte twey sones after him. Selenchus and the grete Antiochus / but atte last Selenchus was slayne / & his brother Antiochus reigned in Syria .xxxvi. yere and faught afterward with Philopater kyng of Egypte / and fledde / and was well nyghe taken. Ennius the poete is born at Tarent. Cato the questor brought hym to Rome. Trevisa. Questor is he that gadred trybute to Rome / and the domesman was somtyme called questor. Also the wardepens of the tresour were called questores. But nowe chorles and pardonsners be called questores. Than it followeth in the hystorie. Ennius the poete dwelled in the hylle Auentynus with lityll coste. And was contente with the seruyce of a wenche. That tyme a bonde man lay by a mayde of the Temple of the goddesse Belca / & the mayde slough hys selfe for sorowe. Eutropius li.ii. About this tyme .xl. thousande Galles passed the hylles Alpes / and were slayne of Romayns. These Galles hadde a leder called Bysptomarus / and they made

theyr auowe and swore / that they wolde neuer do of theyr gurdels of knyghthode / tyll they come in to the Caspytopll of Rome / and so it befelle / for whan they were ouercome. Enulus the Consul putte them to deth in the Caspytoyle. That yere the grete Antiochus began to regne in Syria. Tholomeus Eupater. otherwyle called Philopater Euergetes sone reigned in Egypte seuentey yere. In his tyme were the dedes doo that be redde of the fyrste Machabeys. Trogus li. xxx. This Tholomeus for his cnyll lityng was called Philopater / for he lefte of the dedes of knyghthode / and gaue hym to sleuth. to lecherye. to childrens nycte. to manslaughter. & to slea his peeres. He spende the nyght in hourdom. and the daye in festes. Atte last he slough Erudices that was his syster and his wyf / and gaue hym all to strompettes and to harlottes. Therefore the grete Antiochus was wroth and wolde haue wonne Egypte had he not be lefte by an hoost that was hyred out of Grece. Atte laste this Tholomeus was deed / and lefte a childe of fyue yere of age to kepe the kyngdome / that he had begotten on Erudices. Than his strompettes were hanged euerychone. Eutropius li. iii. That yere began the seconde batayll called Bellum punicum and dured seuentey yere. In that batayll the Romaynes were more ouercome thanne vctors / and hadde more harme / thanne they were quytte. for Hannibal Auulcaris sone a childe of .ix. yere olde / had sworne to his owne fad atte aulters of goddes that he

wolde yeue the Romayns a bataylle as soone as he myght. Than Hanyball in his .xx. yere of age and .viii. monethes belyeged Saguntyn þ̄ fayrest Lyte of Spayne & moost frende to the Romayns. The Romayns sente a messager to Hanyball praepng þ̄ he wolde leue the spege/bycause of couenaunt that was bytwene hem rather. This prayer was despyled/and the messager wente forthe in to Africa to playne of the couenaunt broken / but they sawe that it was for nought / and tourned home ayene to Rome. Than in the meane tyme Saguntyn was destroyed in this maner Saguntyn was gretefully greued by the spege & by the grete hunger. And one of Hanyballs knyghtes that was frende to the Lyte / wente to the Lyte / and counseilled the men of the Lyte to yelde it vp with alle the golde and syluer and other rycheesse that was therein/ & they sholde escape them selfe a lyue/ but they aduysed hem and toke counseyll/and made a grete fyre / and threwe therein all the golde & syluer/and hem selfe atte laste. Whan the Lyte was destroyed. Hanyball lefte his brocher Astruball in Spayne/ & he hym selfe with an hondred thousande footemen and ten thousande horsemen and fourty Dlyfautes passed the hylles Alpes in spryngyng tyme/ there noman had passed before / and wente in to Italpe. The meane tyme Cornelius Scipio Consull of Rome warred in Spayne. ¶ Drosius. Than Hanyball passed the hylles Pyrenes/ & made hym a waye with yron among the cruell people of Galles: &

he came the .xix. dawe from the hylles Anno A Pyrenes to Alpes. there he was harde Transmi. lette four dayes with Galles/ but he Ab Dobe. made hym waye with yron and with fyre. Nathelesse in the hyghest hylle Appenninus. Hanyball was closed twey dayes with snowe/ there he lost many men Dlyfautes & other bestes ¶ Treuisa. Pyrenus is an hygh hylle of Spayne/ and many hygh hylles in that lyde be called montes Pyreni. Alpes be hyghe hylles in the lyde of Italpe/ therforth Hanyball went to Rome/ & Hanyball hete Penitus also therfor Alpes be called Appennini. as though it were Penitus hylles. ¶ Eutropius. Tho wonderfull meruaylles fered the Romayns. for amonge the Alpes/ it semed that the sonne faughte with the mone. Amonge the Capenes it semed that twey mones were rylen among the falskes. it semed that heuen was clouey. Than whan they herde the comyng of Hanyball. Cornelius Scipio was sent forth to Spayne/ & Hanyball mette with hym and ouercome hym. fyrst at Tycinū/ & bete downe the hoost of Rome. And he ouercome hym eft atte Rpuer Crema Atte thyrde tyme he scomfyte Semprounus with his hoost that come oute of Scicilia Atte fourth tyme he sloughed flameus the Consull and .xxv. thousande of his hoost/ and toke .vi. thousande prysoners. ¶ Tytus. There was soo harde fyghtyng/ that the fyghtyng men wyste not of the erythe shakynge that was whyle they faughte and threwe downe Lytees & claf hylles. ¶ Eutropius libro terciō. Atte fyfth tyme Fabius Maximus

Anno A. was sente apenst Hanyball & pyght
Tranlmi. his pauplans in the hpest hylles & pry
Ab Vrbe. uate place of wodes/ & lorned Hany
 bals strengthe/ & wayted his tyme &
 ouercome hym. The sixthe tyme the
 consuls of Rome Luci⁹ Emilius Pau
 lus & Publius Terencius and Harro
 were sente apenst Hanyball. But fa
 bius Maximus warned hem that Ha
 nyball was so frowarde & so cruell in
 fyghtyng that they sholde neuer ouer
 come hym/ but by taryng of the ba
 tapll & of the fyghtyng/ they were fer
 uent & dyde apenst counseyll / & were
 ouercome at Lanna a strete of Apu
 lea/ there the wynde & y grauell that
 was arrered with the wynde / halpe
 well Hanyball/ there were slayne .xl.
 thousande knyghtes of Romayns/ &
 fyue thousande of peeres of consuls &
 of Senatours were deed eyther Itake
 It is no doubte tho hadde be the last
 dape of the state of Rome/ yf Hany
 ball couth as well haue vled the vcto
 ry as he couth wyne it in fyghtyng
R. hadde he gone anone after the
 vctorye for to take the Cyte. **Ty**
tus. There was so grete slaughter of
 Romayns/ that Hanyball badde his
 men spare the Romayns. **Eutropi⁹**
 Harro the Consull tourned to Rome
 with fyfty horsmen & no moo. The
 Senatours prayled hym well/ for he
 had nought dysparagyde the comen
 te of Rome/ he shaued neuer his ber
 de nor his hede/ he ete neuer lyggynge
 he wolde haue no worlhypp tyll he sa
 we wreche on Hanyball. Tho it was
 neuer seyn before / bonde men & men
 of warre made free / cheues & man
 slers & pyloners were made knygh

tes. **Diosius** Also Poletarii that we
 re oroeprned to gete childer were thay
 made knyghtes. who y sawe thay the
 chpualtpe of Rome/ myght well loze
 be alhamed / for thay the knyghtes
 ne the Senatours were not wyle ne
 couth not ther crafte. **Eutro.** And
 Hanyball profered hem her pyloners
 to raunson. The Romayns anwerde
 & sayd y the bouges that myght be
 taken armed. were not nedeful to the
 Cyte. Therfor Hanyball slough some
 of the pyloners/ and solde some in to
 dyuerse londes. and sente thre bullhel
 of golde rynges that were taken of
 the handes of the knyghtes of Rome
 in to Cartage in token of the vcto
 ry. **Tytus.** Thay the comons of
 Rome were so boyd downe & so bare.
 that they spoyled y Temples of bras
 & of yron to make hem armour ther
 of. for the armour that were offred
 in Temples and halowed to her god
 des / as they vled to doo after theyr
 vctoryes. thay they were taken ayene
 out of the Temples for grete nede
 and myschpfe that they were in. Als
 so hem lacked shypmen to gouerne
 her shyppes/ and theyr trolour suffy
 sed not for wages of warrpours/ ther
 fore the Consuls and the Senatours
 badde that euery man sholde bynge
 his ryches in to the tresorpe. Therfor
 began a grete stryf bytwene y comon
 te & y Senatours. But one of the
 Consuls alayed the stryf in this ma
 ner and sayde / as the grete passeth
 the comons in worlhypp and in dyg
 nyte/ so they sholde passe theym in col
 te & beryng of charge in helpe of the
 Cyte. And soo they ordeprned that

euery in his degre sholde offre all his golde in to the comyn treloze/out take one ryng for hym selfe & a nother for his wyf. And he shold offre a cam prenoll of golde for his sone/& for euery doughter an dnce/and the gretttest sholde begynne fyrst & so it was done. Than there was soo moche moneye brought & offred/that the wardeyns myght not wryte the names of hem that brought moneye & golde/neither brynge in to the treloze all that was brought. ¶ Drosius li.iiii. In the tyme of the myschyfe. Rome was a cite with so many myshappes that the Senatours toke hem to recede for to flee out of Italye/& gete hem other places for to dwelle in. Than dnyngnes that axed counsell of Appolyn answerde the Romayns & sayd/that there sholde be saued yf they myghte gete that God that hyghte Numen matris pessimite. Therfore messagers were sente in to frigia for to fetch the goddesse that hyghte Sybyle & the messager by the waye axed counsell of Appolyn. And Appolyn counseled hym for to gete helpe of Attalus kyng of the laste Alya for to gete this ymage. Also Appolyn counseled hym / that whan the ymage come to Rome it shold fyrst be brought to the best marnes hous of the Lyte. Whan all this was do/one Scipio Nasica was chose as the best may of Rome / & mette with the ymage with a grete multytude of wyues/the ymage hyght Numen matris pessimite/and Sybyle also/that is to vnderstande/moder of all goddesles. And she hyghte Bietnicia that is moder hylles / &

the hyght holy frygya. for she was Anno A
worshypped speycally in a wood of Transmi.
frigia/whiche wood is called Ioea Ab Vrbe.
¶ R. Duidius de fastis sayth that of this hadde it come by among the Romayns/that euery yere y fourth dawe of Aueryll they helde a teste of the vathynge of goddesse Bietnicia. for whan her ymage was brought of frigia hit was walche in the Ryuer Alma there/that water falleth in to Tyber. Than it was Ido with foule songes & gesses of Japes and nyce mynstralcy/& euery luche geste was called Amens. Hanypball the .x. yere of his comyng meoued his hooft out of Lapania anone to the Ryuer Amens atte thyrde stone that is thre myle oute of Rome/and Hanypball hym selfe with noble hoilmey & swyfte/wente anone to the pate of Rome that high te porta Collina. The consuls with drewe not the fyghtynge / but whan the sheltrons were araped on eyther syde/there felle so grete reyne medled with hayle stones h the hooftes were so I thente that vnnethe they myghte holde theyr wepen.and fyght in theyr tentes. And whan it clered & was fayre weder / they wente ofte in to the felde/andefte felle a well grete tempest that este compelled them for to flee. ¶ Eutr. The meane tyme tweyn that were sente to Spayne / eyther hyght Scipio ouercome Akruball : There the hooft of Akrpca losse spue & thyrty thousande. Phylpp kyng of Macedonia behyght Hanypball helpe ayenst y Romayns. The Flonde Sar donia forlabeth the Romayns. Wher for dukes & leders were sent in to.iiii.

Anno A places in Macedonia ayenst Phylp
 Transmi. in to Spayne/ayenst Atruball Sar
 Ab Vrbe. donia ayenst þ Sardens/ & in to Ita
 lye ayenst hanyball. Therfor Lenin⁹
 consull of Rome maketh peas with
 Attalus kyng of Alpa/ & warreth in
 Macedonia / & ouercome Phylp the
 kyng/ & toke Scicilia & thre score Ly
 tees also. & he bete downe. xxvi. Lytees
 & come to Rome with grete Joye and
 worlhypp. for drede of hym hanyball
 that was but four myle from Rome
 482 382 fledde in to Campania. Also þ yere in
 Spayne epyther Scipio that hadde be
 vyctor longe tyme. was slayne of A/
 truball his broder/ but the hooft lefte
 all hole & sounde. Therfore the other
 Scipions sone þ hyght Publius Cor
 nelius Scipio the nobleste man well
 493 383 nygh of all the Romayns is sente in
 to Spayne in the .xxiiii. yere of his a
 ge. Whome the Senatours & the Ro
 mayns hadde take to rede to forsake
 Italpe for drede/ this Scipio drewe
 out his swerde & forbode theym & say
 de not so hardy & behyght þ he wolde
 defende the Lyte and couñtree. Than
 Scipio wente forth & toke Cartage
 in Spayne / therin was grete plente
 of moneye & grete arape for men of
 armes. Than he yelde by the pledges
 of Spayne to theyr frendes / & sente
 Mago hanybals broder. pylsoner to
 Rome. & a well fayre mayde was pyl
 soner amonge ocher/ & he as a mylde
 fader delyuerd & toke hyr to his ow
 ne spoule to weddyng/ & forpauē hyr
 7. 384 her raiñson for her dower. for the whi
 che doyng by assente of the spoule of
 this mayde / well nyghe all Spayne
 tourned to Scipio. The meane tyme

fabius Maximus wanne Tarente &
 slough Cartagplo in Italpe/ & solde
 xxv. thousande pylsoners. Than ha
 nyball tryst not that Spayne myght
 lenger beholden ayenst Scipio/ he sen
 te for his broder Atruball þ he sholde
 come to hym out of Spayne with all
 that he hadde. But the consuls of Ro
 me sette enbulchementes for hym / &
 he defendede hym nobely. But they
 slough hym atte last and .lviij. thou
 sande of his hooft were deed/ and fy
 ue thousande Itake .xliiij. thousande
 bourgeys of Rome were J founde &
 clypped togydres. Also Atrubals he
 de was throwen before his broders ya
 te. Whan hanyball sawe that he ma
 de grete sorowe & fledde in to Brucia
 and the grete Scipio was sente after
 out of Spayne. ¶ Josephus li. xii.

¶ Holomeus Epyphanes the
 G syfth kyng of Egypte Eupa
 ters sone regned .xxiiii. yere:
 ¶ Trogus li. iii. And for he began to
 regne whan he was fyue yere olde.
 Messares of Alexandria prayde the
 Romaynes that they wolde take the
 warde of the childe & defende þ kyng
 dome of Egypte. for Phylp kyng of
 Macedonia & Antychus kyng of
 Syrya hadde cast as it were by coue
 naunt to dele the kyngdom of Egyp
 te bytwene them tweyne. The Ro
 mayns were gladdē of that message.
 & anone sente messagers to the same
 kynges chargyng that they shold hol
 de theym out of Egypt. ¶ Josephus
 li. xii. Thanne Tholomeus wext a

Stronge ponglyng / & sente one Scopa
 a duke of his in to Syrpa. and made
 Syrpa subgette to hym. But not lon
 ge after Antyochns ouercome Scopa
 and was better frende to the Jewes.
 ¶ Eutropius li.iii. After this the gre
 te Antyochns become Tholomeus
 frende / & wedded his doughter Cleo
 patra to wyf / and graunted her in ste
 de of dowcr Syrpa. Inde and feni
 cia. Therefore eyther kyng had of the
 Jewes. But Onias the rightfull Sy
 mons sone was bysshop & warned the
 trybutc / and couelleted that none shol
 de be payed as it were for loue of the
 lawe. Nathelesse it was more for co
 uetysle. for he wolde not go speke with
 the kyng. But his systers sone Jole
 phus wente to Tholomeus the kyng
 & had grace of the kyng and forpeue
 nelle of the trybute of the seuen yeres
 and not oonly that / but he was made
 leder of his kyngdom and tresorer of
 trybutes to his lyues ende .xxii. yere.
 ¶ Josephus li.xii.ca.iiii. This Jo
 sephus wolde assaue the wytte of his
 ponger sone Hyrcanus that was .xii.
 yere olde and had gete him on his bra
 thers doughter. And bytoke hym thre
 hondred yokes of oxen for to ere and
 lowe in wyldeynesse from home two
 Journyes & more and hydde the rey
 nes that the oxen sholde be tyed by.
 Whan he come to the place there he
 sholde erpe / the plowmen radde that
 some of hem sholde wende home to
 the fader & fetch the reynes / þ childe
 sayd nay. but lette slee some of þ oxen
 & lette grepte the flesshe to plowmen
 mete and to kyte reynes of the skyn
 nes to tepe with other oxen. The fa

der wondred therof and sente hym in Anno A
 his owne stede to woishyp the kyng
 Tholomeus / for he hadde a pong so
 ne newly born / the fader profered to
 his sone Hyrcanus grete rychele for
 his coste by the waye / and for yettes
 to yeue the kynges sone / the childe
 sayd naye / and sayd that he coude lys
 ue soberly / and that lesse coste wolde
 do his nede / but sende lettres sayd the
 childe to Arion procurator of Alexan
 dria / and praye hym that he leue me
 as moche as me behoueth / the fader
 hoped that ten talentes were ynough
 to woishyp the kyng with his sone /
 and prayed Arion in his lettres that
 he wolde take the talentes to his sone
 Hyrcanus came with the lettres to
 Arion. And Arion asked how moche
 hym behoued. A thoulande talentes
 sayd he / but Arion wolde graunte but
 ten. And Hyrcanus cast hym in boun
 des. And Arions wyf wente anone
 and complayned to the kyng. And
 the kyng axed of Hyrcanus why he
 dyde so. for suche seruauntes sayd he
 shall be punysshed that can not kno
 we ne make dyfference bytwene the
 small and the grete. Arion herde that
 the kyng allowed Hyrcanes answer
 and his dede / and deliuered to hym
 a thoulande talentes. And anone he
 bought of marchauntes an hondred
 childery lettred / and an hondred may
 dens eueryche for a talente. Whan the
 dape of the fest was come. Hyrcanus
 by cause he was ponge was sette last
 of the wyle men. And the bare bones
 that other men lette were in scoone
 sette to fore hyrcanus. One Triphon
 a Japer sawe this and sayde openly

Anno A to fore the kyng. Too lordē kyng how
Transmi. this childe hath eten the flesshe of soo
Ab Vrbe. many bones/so his fader that is thy
 recepuer and tresorer in Syrpa spoyleth
 the moneye of the men of Syrpa
 The kyng lough & axed of the chil-
 de why he had so many bones to fo-
 re hym. Shylfully lordē kyng sayde
 the childe. For houndes etey the bones
 with the flesshe as thy ghestes done
 this daye / but men that beg nouyrl-
 shed and taught spare the bones / as
 ye see that I spare. On the moorne hir-
 canus axed of eueriche of the kynges
 frendes. what and how moche eche of
 them wolde yeue the kynges sone.
 And he that wolde yeue moost an-
 swerde and sayd scarsely ten talentes.
 Thenne Hyrcanus seyned hym loy-
 as thoughe he myght yeue but fyue.
 But whan the daye of the natpuyte
 was come Hyrcanus the childe gaue
 to the kyng an hondred childery. and
 eueriche of hem bere a talente in his
 honde/and yauē to the quene an hon-
 dred mayde childery/ & eche of them
 also with a talente in her hond. Thā
 euery man preyled hym well. Therfo-
 re the kyng dyde hym grete worlshyp
 and made hym ryche/and sente hym
 to his fader with lettres of cōmenda-
 cion and of preylyng. Natheles his fa-
 der was wroth for y grete yestes that
 he hadde yeuen. Also his elder brether
 had grete enuye at hym for the grete
 worlshyp that he had/so ferforth that
 they warred apenst hym/and tweyne
 of hē were dede in fyghtyng. ¶ Tre-
 uisa. Take hede that a talente is a
 grete weyght of golde or of syluer or
 of other metall/ but there be thre ma-

ner talentes/ the lest weyeth fyfty pou-
 de/ the myddell two and seuenty pou-
 de / and the moost six score ponde.
 Thenne it foloweth in the hystoipe.
 Hyrcanus passed flome Jordan and
 gadred there the kynges tribute of
 straunge nacions many yere togyder
 and he buylded there a wonder towre
 Out of that towre he pursuwed ofte
 the Arabyes men of Arabia alle the
 tyme that Selench⁹ regned in Syrpa
 Whan Selenchus was dede. Hyrcanus
 dradde the cruelte of Antyocheus
 Epyphanes / and slough hym selfe
 with his owne honde. About the fyrst
 yere of this Tholomeus / the grete
 Scipio whiche had nobly I born him
 and done many grete dedes in Spay-
 ne / was made Confull and sente in
 to Affryca. And he made to hym sub-
 get Ammorus duke of thaffres and
 Syphaces kyng of Numydia/ whan
 that was herde. well nyghe all Italye
 forloke Hanyball. Hanyball the .xvii.
 yere of his comyng in to Italye was
 boden by men of Cartage to retour-
 ne home. And so he returned out of
 Italye sore wepyng. And whan Ha-
 nyball was comen / he destroyed the
 peas that thaffres hadde made with
 Scipio. The condycion of the peas
 luche / that thaffres sholde haue but
 thyrty shyppes/ and they sholde yeue
 fyue hondred thousande ponde of
 syluer/ pondo is a ponde/ they shol-
 de also sende home all the pylsoners
 and banysshed men that they hadde
 taken. Hanyball had sente thre spyes
 for to espye Scipions tentes. These
 spyes were taken and ladde aboute
 the tentes/ & made well at ease with

mete & drynke . And thenne Scipio sente them home agayne . Thenne was harde fyghtynge bytweene these two dukes / but Scipio had the vyctorye . And Hanyball was nyghe taken Peas was graunted to men of Carthage / and Scipio tourned agayne to Rome / and was after that called Afrycanus . In this maner the seconde batayll Punicum ended in his tyme . That yere Plantus deyed at Rome / he grande atte querne with a baker for hyre / for hunger / & scarlete of corn . And whan he myght haue whyle he wrote fables & solde them . Whan the seconde bataylle Punicum was done than come the bataylle Macedonicū . that was apenst Phylpp þ kyng . Tytus Quincius ouercome hym & ladde twey kynges sones of Macedonia & of Lacedemonia plegges before his charyot & ladde home to the Romaynes / that Hanyball had take & solde in Grecia / & lete shaue her hedes in token of shauyng awaye of the boūdage . The Romayns warred apenst the grete Antyochous kyng of Syria . for he destroyed the kyngdoms þ were nyghe about him . And also for he helde with hym Hanyball þ was wente out of Affryca . ¶ Eutropius li.iiii. Antyochous saue þ Hanyball spake oft with þ messagers of Rome & had hym suspect & forsoke to haue hym in his coulepyll . And yf he called hym othertwhyles to coulepyll / þ was by cause he sholde not wene þ he was suspect & forsake / & not for to do his coulepyll . But Hanyball coulepyll alwaye for to warre apenst the Romayns / & not for to abyde & layd þ the Romaynes

myght not be ouercome but in theyr owne contree / out of theyr owne contree layd he they maye not be ouercome / but at home they bey brutell and lyghtly ouercome . It nedeth more to wrastle wylly apenst them that bey ouercome and speke not / than apenst them that openly withstandeth . But though his coulepyll was ofte good & spedefull / it was not allowed / for the kyng had hym suspect / & also for making of bagbyters þ wolde not that he were allowed for the kyng / therefore the kynges hooft was ouercome both in the see & in londe . Than Antyocho⁹ the kyng forthought that he dyd not by Hanyballs coulepyll / & made Hanyball pryuy of his coulell . ¶ Eutropi⁹ li.iiii. for Phylpp kyng of Macedonia halpe the Romayns apenst Antyochous / his sone Demetrius þ was pyloner & plegge was sente home ayene . Scipio Nalica the grete Scipio that hyght Afrycanus / his neuwe ouercome Hanyball in bataylle both in the see & in the londe / there he had a surname & was called Alyagenus of Alya þ was ouercome . Than Antyochous the kyng gaue his yonger sone Antyochous Epyphanes to the Romayns pledge for euermore for his elder sone Selenchus / & had peas vpon couenaūt / that he sholde leue Europa & the laste Alya / & holde hym within the hylle mount Taurus / and also he sholde betake Hanyball to þ Romaynes . for he egged & coulepyll to warre apenst Rome . Therefore Hanyball dradde & tourned to Prulpa kyng of Bythinia . ¶ Trogus li. xxxii. The meane tyme whan Emneus Attalus

Anno A the kynges brother of Syria holde
 Transmi. ouercome Pulya/than Hanyball hel
 Ab Vrbe. ped Pulya by a newe slepyght of bat
 ayll. for he hadde dyuerse maner ad
 dres & serpetes closed in erthen stenes
 & threwe hem in to the shippes of her
 enemyes in þe myddell of the batayll.
 than the enemyes were aferde & with
 drewe hē anone. The Romayns her
 de herof & sente messagers and made
 the kyng at one/and axed for to ha
 ue Hanyball in to theyr owne honde
 but Hanyball lyked denyng of his
 owne ryng & dyed at Nychomedia.
 It is certayne of hym / that he late
 neuer to soper without bataylles. He
 was among many wonder fayr may
 dens/and lefte neuer his chastyte/he
 was neuer bytrayed by ymagynacion
 of his owne men/neyther of his ene
 myes. ¶ R. Drosius li.iiii. sayth that
 the flonde called Insula Vulcani/the
 whiche flonde was neuer before seen
 sprang vp of the see at Sicilia that
 yere that Hanyball dyed / and yet is
 there alwaye vnto this daye. ¶ Pol.
 li. vi. Of this Hanyball it is redde /
 that whan Antiochus the kyng she
 wed hym his hooft royally araped
 with golde and with syluer and with
 othe ryche arape / and axed hym yf
 all that suffyled to the Romaynes. I
 trowe sayde Hanyball it is ynough/
 though the Romayns be the mooste
 couetous men a lyue/but he vndersto
 de easely shortely & forwardly/for he
 vnderstode of the praye / & not of the
 strength of the hooft. ¶ Plini^o li. viii.
 ca^o viii. Hanyball ofte whan he had
 the maystre/compelled pyloners of
 Rome to fyght vpon the grauell with

stronge beestes/& promysed one that
 he wolde delyuer hym yf he threwe
 downe an Dlyfaunt. & whan þe beest
 was cast. Hanyball sente horlmen to
 see þe man anone right there. ¶ Pol.
 li. viii. Hanyball sayd that he was not
 worthy his lyfe/that myght be com
 pelled to fyght with beestes / but me
 troweth lothly that Hanyball slough
 the man for grete enuye/for he wolde
 not that a Romayne sholde haue soo
 grete a name & worshyp of a greter
 dede than he hadde herde of before.
 Also for he wolde not dyffame þe bee
 stes by the strength/of whiche he had
 oft aferde his enemyes. ¶ Eutropius
 li.iiii. That yere Scipio Affricanus
 dyed at Auntern / that had be longe
 exiled out of Rome/that was an vn
 kynde Lyte to hym. ¶ Valerius libro
 Whan Scipio was acculed of mos
 nye amonge the Senatours/he ans
 werde and sayd/whan I was all Af
 fryca & made it subget & vnder your
 power. I toke noo thyng therof but
 oonly the name Affricanus. Also the
 richesse of Affryca made me not coue
 tous/neyther the richesse of Alya ma
 de my broder Scipio couetous. for ey
 ther of vs was rycher of enuye than
 of moneye. ¶ Salustius. This Sci
 pio sawe ones a childe gayly araped/
 & sayd. I wonder not that he arapeth
 well his childe/for it helpeth hym mo
 re than dooth his swerde. ¶ Valerius
 Empla Scipions wyf was so good
 ly that though she wyft that hyr hul
 bonde loued one of hyr bonde women
 for she wolde not dyffame her lorde
 conquerour of Affryca by women res
 se and anger. And she abstepned hyr

so from vengeaunce & wretche that she made hyr bonde woman free & maryed hyr right well whan hyr lorde was deed. ¶ Pol. Scipio deped & ordeyned suche a wrytynge on his Tombe atte Lyte Palustris. Thou vnkynde contree receyue thou not my bones ¶ Augustin^o de ci. dei li. i. Scipio Nalica before the thyrde batayll Punicū forbade the lettynge vp or enhaūcyng of the Theatre in the Lyte of Rome that two Judges had arayed for to are re/and Scipio sayd that it is grete enemye to warrpours for to nouryshe slouth & lecherie/and therfore he pleased so strongly in the people/that all the araye therof was solde/and benches stoles formes & all maner subtyltees were done thens. & so he broughte in þ men lholde stande & not lytte for to see playes & myrthes for to saue her owne manhede. That maner was vled among the Romayns fyue hondred .xlviij. yere. ¶ R. Audours sayen þ Theatrum was a place shapen as halfe a cercle/and in the myddel therof was a lytyl hous that was called Scena/in that hous poetes & gestours vp in a pulpyt. reherled poysses gestes & longes/and without were mynstrayls that couñtrefayted the doyng & the dedes that they spake of in her gestes and longes of her lymes & her bodye. ¶ Augustinus li. i. ca. xxxi. These playes that were called Audi Scenici/were fyrst ordeyned by excytpnge of the deuyll / for men lholde be excited to suche dedes. whan they myght here in the Theatre that goddes had done suche maner dedes. ¶ Augustinus li. iiii. ca. xxxv. But in

passyng of tyme/a choyle called Tytus Latynus/was warned by his dreame/that he lholde telle the Senatours/that they lholde restore and renewe the playes that were called Audi Scenici/the playes of the Theatre/and for he was warned twyes & dyd nought therto/he lost his owne lone. And for he was warned the thyrde tyme and dyd nought therto. he felle in a greuous sekenes tyll he warned the Senatours. than he was hole wonder lodeynly. Whan the wonder was seey the Senatours spente four suche monye as they were wonte in playes of the Theatre. as it were to make good for the choyles trespas that was four tyme rechelesse for to warne the Senatours as he was warned. ¶ Petrus L. iiii. The grete Selenchus Sonther the grete Antiochus lone regned in Syrva and in Alya twelue yere/for his fader was slayne in Perse in the Temple of god Naneas/& throwen out gobet mele traytorly by preeltes that begyled hym in to the Temple / and promplyed hym tresour that was hydde vnder erthe.

 Transmi. meaneth that they were Angels in ly
 Ab Vrbe. kenelle of men. Nachelelle secundo
 Machabeoz. It is wryten that a dre
 defull horzman shewed hym forth &
 412 412 all to trade hym / but he slough hym
 not. ¶ Josephus li. xii. About that ty
 me Ihesus Syrahs lone wrote the
 booke called Ecclesiastus & called it
 Panerethon. The thyrde yere of Phy
 lometoz one Aristobolus a Jewe & Pa
 rypaticus þ is of Aristotles looze wro
 te to Tholomeus a declaracion & ex
 posicion of Moyles bokes. ¶ Eutro
 pius li. iiii. That yere dyed Phylpp
 kyng of Macedonia. And his lone
 Perseus was rebel ayenst the Romay
 nes/ but Emilius Paulus Confull of
 Rome ouercome hym in well stronge
 bataylle and slewe .xxx. thousande
 of Grekes/ but he dyde hym worshyp
 as though he were not ouercome. for
 whan he wolde falle downe to his fe
 te/ he wolde not suffre hym / but he
 sette hym besyde hym vpon his seete/
 & releued halfe the trybute that was
 wont to be payed/ and promysed that
 the Macedones sholde be free / for it
 sholde seme that the Romayns war
 red for his ryghtwylnesse and not for
 moneye. ¶ Trogus li. xxxiii. In this
 fyghtynge one Meninus Caton the
 aduocates lone/ whyle he fought my
 ghtely fylle downe of his hors / and
 fanght on his feet / & wolde haue smy
 ten a grete man/ and his swerde felle
 downe of his honde/ he defended him
 with his shelde / & gadred his swerde
 amonge the swerdes of his enemyes
 in syght of both the hooltes/ and had
 many woundes & tourned to his ow

ne syde / other men toke ensample of
 his hardenelle & faught orpedly. And
 the hardenelle of hym was cause of
 the vyctoipe. Perseus was take / and
 than afterwarde Macedonia fylle to
 the Romayns from the fyrst Trane
 us anone to this Perseus/ that londe
 hadde .xxxv. kynges in eyghte hon
 dred yere and .xxiiii. ¶ Plydorus li
 bio sexto. This Emilius Paulus
 brought fyrste bokes to Rome out of
 Grece. Afterwarde Julius Cesar
 chargeth Marcus Varro with that
 doyng for to make hym a lybrarye.
 And amonge Crysten men Pamphi
 lius the martyre gadred a lybrarye of
 bokes of hym. Eusebius wryteth that
 he had a .xxx. thousande volumes of
 bokes in his lybrarye. Than Dryges
 nes passed all that were before hym.
 Jerom sayth that he radde six thou
 sande volumes of Drygenes bookes.
 But Austyppassid þ trauayll of them
 al. for vnneth may a man rede al his
 bokes Antyoch⁹ Epyphanes regned
 xi. yere in Syrya and in Alya/ this
 is he that was pledge at Rome for
 his owne fader/ but he herde speke of
 his brother Nycete and hoped for to
 be kyng of Syrya/ and wente pryue
 ly from Rome/ though some men tel
 leth that he escaped by assente of the
 Senatours. fyrste he was goodly /
 therfore the people yaf hym a nother
 name and called hym Epyphanes
 that is worthy and noble and seme
 ly aboute other. He regned for his bro
 der Selenchus whan his brother was
 ded. This yaued his syster in gyle to
 Tholomeus to wyfe / for he wolde
 by that reioyse Egypte whan he sa

we his tyme. Thenne he wente in to Egypt vpon a tyme as though it were for to see his syster and his newewes/ but he made that Tholomeus was slayne whyle he late at mete/ but the Egypcyans put hym awaye / for he sholde not be kyng ouer hem. But he came apene after two yere and bespoged Alexandria. ¶ Trogus .xxxi. To the messagers of Rome were sente to deliuer Egypcyans / and mete with Antiochus wandring on the see stronde / & dyd her message in this maner. The Senatours & the people of Rome / chargeth & commaundeth the that thou go awaye from theyr fren- des the Egypcyans. Than Antiochus axed respyte & dave to yeue his answer. Than Marcus Publius made with a yerde a cercle in the sonde about Antiochus & sayd. The Sena- tours and the people of Rome char- geth & comaundeth the / that thou ne- uer passe this cercle er thou haue ye- uen thyne answer. If the people of Rome wyll haue it soo sayd Antio- chus. Loo I goo. ¶ R. Than he tour- ned in to the Turpe & dyd many euyl- lournes. Therefore the bysshop Dni- as Symons lone wente in to Egypt and gate frenshyp there of the kyng/ and buylde there a Temple at Eleo- poleos lyke to the Temple of Jewes & sayd that in that dede he fulfyll- ed Playas prophete / that sayd the aul- ter of our loide shall be in Egypte / & mynde of him shall be the endes ther- of. This Temple dured so two hon- dred yere & fyrty vnto Hespaliens ty- me that destroyed that Temple and the Lyte allo. Than bysshop Dnias

dyed as it is sayd. & his twey brethern Ghelus and Johan Arpuen before Antiochus for the bysshopyche / & for to please Antiochus / they tourned to the vsage and doynge of mysbyleued men. so ferforth that they toke names of mysbyleued men / & so Ghelus was called Jason / and Johan was na- med Menelaus / by ensample of hem many of the Jewes brought in doynge and dedes and vlages of mysbyleued men / and made in Jerusalem harlot- tes houles / & places for yonglynges to vse theyr nycete in / and lette hem vncircūcyded & called hem selfe An- tiochenes. Antiochus made Jason bysshop / and put hym out afterwar- de and made Menelaus bysshop that coueyledd Andronicus to flee his bro- ther Jason / for he folowed the kyng in Antiochia to make hym chaunge his purpose / & so it was done. Ther- fore the kyng was wroth and slough Andronicus. ¶ Petrus. L. vi. That tyme that Antiochus solde Jason the bysshopyche and preesthode / the fyre of the sacrefyce acquenched that had dured before vnder water .lxx. ye- re. Antiochus toke Jerusalem by tre- son of the Lytezeyns / and toke thens- ten thousand Lytezeyns & compelled the Jewes to mawmetrye. and slough hem that wolde not. he offred swynes fleshe / and toke awaye þ holy vessell the mete borde and the stone with the lanterne / & the Temple clothes / and lette Juppter Olimpicus ymage euen in the Temple. and forbade the sacre- fyce of Moyses lawe / & in the tour of syon / he put men of Macedonia that hated the Jewes. In this Antiochus

tyme the seuen brethern were slayne & her owne moder. That tyme Mathathias prest in the Lyte Hodyn, by helpe of his fyue sones awrked the lawes of her forfaders. Judas þ was called Machabeus for the pryke & the maystrye he was Captayne amorge them & leder. ¶ Petrus. CC. vii. Mathathias taught the Jewes to fpyght on the laterdape / for the lawe & the people sholde not be losse / but he ruled the people one yere & dyed afterwarde / and made his sone Symon as it were fader & counseyllour / and Judas Machabeus leder of þ hooft. Ennius the Poete dyed in the euyll Articularis / & is buryed in Scipions Tombe. Judas Machabeus kepte the lawes of forfaders full thre yere / & he slough Appolynus duke of Samaria / and faught afterwarde with his swerde. Antiochus wente in to Perse for tribute was vnpayed / & Judas Machabeus ouercome Antiochus leders. Lysia that nourysshed the yong Antiochus / & Tholomeus Gorgias & Nicanor & densed the Temple and renewed it / there gras breves and bullthes were growen / & soo the thyrde halowynge of the Temple was done in Judas tyme in þ moneth of December / that halowynge is named Eucenia & dured afterwarde. Petrus. CC. xi. Antiochus was shamely chaced out of Perse / & herde that his prynce were ouercome in the Jurpe / & manaced the Jewes. And anone he was taken with Antarus / that is ache & sorowe of his bowels & felle downe of his chare & was hurte full soore / and wormes sprang out of his bodye / and

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the stanche of hē greued all the hooft than he bethought him & knowleched that him was befall that sorowe / for he had defouled the Temple of Jerusalem / therfore he made his auowe that he wolde be a Jewe / & delpyered the Jewes & make them peer to the men of Athene. He layd also þ man sholde be subgette to god / & not make hym selfe peer & euen to god / and so he dyed in the montayns. Antiochus Eupater the forslayd Antiochus Epphanes sone regned after his fader & gadred ayenst the Jewes an hondred thousande fote men / & twenty thousande horzmen / and .xxxii. Dylfauntes / and shewed hem the Jule of grapes & of beryes for to sharpe hem to the bataylle. ¶ Petrus. CC. xiii.

Demetrius Sother Selenchus sone wente out of the Lyte of Rome. & occupped the Lytees by the see syde / & began to regne and regned in Alya & in Syrpa .xii. yere for he come to Rome in childhode to accule his vncle Antiochus Epphanes that had put him out of his kyngdome. Therfore whan he herde that his vncle was deed / he wente ayene. & many receyued him for her lord and kyng. Soo that the hooft of Syrpa wolde see Lysia & the yonge Antiochus that was about to regne. Alchimus made prest of Arons order / accused Machabeus to this Demetrius of many maner thynges & dedes / therfore he was sente with Bachides to destroye the Jurpe / but Judas with

stode hem/so that they spede not/ther
 fore. Alchimius tourned ayene to the
 kynge. Nychanor was sente of the kyn
 ge ayenst Judas & was slayne / and
 his hede & his right honde were han
 ged towarde Jerusalem / for he had
 proudly spoken. And Judas was
 connexed in frendshyp with the Ro
 mapns / & the couenaüt was wryten
 in tables of bras. Judas Machabeus
 was slayne of Bachides/and Alchi
 mius & his brother Jonathas rose in
 his stede & was leder of þ Jewes. xix.
 yere. Whyle Alchimius began to des
 trope goddes hous and the werkes of
 prophetes/he was smyten with a pa
 lesye & dyed. Bachides tourned este
 to the kynge/& than two yere the lon
 de was in quete & in peas. Alyandre
 Antyochus Epyphanes sone occupy
 de Tholomayda & Achon/and confe
 dered to hym Jonathas and slough
 Demetrius the kynge/and reigned. ix.
 yere in Syria & in Alya/and wedded
 Cleopatra Tholomeus doughter :
 Demetrius Demetri^s sone that fled
 in to Creta to his moder kyn/whan
 his fader was slayne/he came ayene
 and gadred him strength/& occupped
 the londes by the see syde/and Tho
 lomcus gaf hym his doughter Cleo
 patra to wyf/the whiche he had befo
 re yuen to Alyandre/& soo Tholo
 meus that traytrelly occupped Alylan
 dres Lytees / entred in to Antyochia
 and toke on hym twey Dyademes of
 Egypte & of Alya. Alyandre was o
 uercome of hym & fledde in to Ara
 bia with his sone Antyochus to his
 moders colyns/ but the kynge of Ara
 bia drad Tholomeus strengthe and

sente hym Alylandres hede. Tholo
 meus dyed the thyrde daye after that
 & Demetrius reigned. ¶ Petrus. L. Anno A
 rianini. Tranfimi. Ab Vrbe.
 xix. Jonathas was acculed to Deme
 trius that he had wonne the toure in
 Jerusalem/ but he sente grete pestes
 to Demetrius & gate grace of hym/
 so that he had renewed the pryncypa
 te & the presthode. Thenne Deme
 trius was assured that the londe sholde
 be in peas in his owne honde/he lette
 his hooft goo home euery may to his
 owne place/& helde with him a straū
 ge hooft. Therfore the people had in
 dygnacion of the kynge/& Jonathas
 sente the kynge thre thoulande of cho
 sen men þ chaced the traptours. Atte
 last one Tryphon that was semtyme
 one of Alylandres frendes in to Ara
 bia & brought thens the yong Anty
 chus Alylandres sone & crowned him
 kynge and faught ayenst Demetrius
 and ouercome hym/and chaced hym/
 and Antyochus made frendshyp with
 Jonathas & sente hym vessell pur
 ple & laces of sylke/& made his bro
 ther Symon duke & leder. After that
 Jonathas renewed frendshyp with
 the Romayns and with the Sparcia
 tes. ¶ Eutropius li.iiii. The thyrde
 batayll Punicum aroise/for whan the
 meny of Cartage hadde doo awaye
 theyr shyppes and her armour / hem
 forthought the dede/and for hem lac
 ked both bras and prou / they made
 hem armour of golde and of syluer/
 and made hem twey dukes and le
 ders/eyther hete Altruball/the yonge
 Scipio the grete Scipions neuewe o
 uercome hem both/& toke the Lyte &
 destroyed it with fyre/so that it brente

Anno A .xvi. dayes togyders so that stones we
 Transmi. re biente to allhes & to powder / and
 Ab Vrbe. so Cartage was destroyed aboute the
 seuen hondred yere after that it was
 fyrst buylde. ¶ That is loth for to
 acouite from kynge Danidris tyme. so
 wyll the maystre in Royses / but loke
 more herof in the fyrst booke capto de
 Affryca ¶ Drosius li.iiii. Thany kynge
 Alorubals wyf for manly sorowe
 and womanly wodenesse threwe her
 selfe and her two lones in to the myd
 dell of the fyre/and so the last lady of
 Cartage had right luche a maner en
 de as Dydo the fyrst lady had. ¶ Au
 gustinus li.primo ca:xxix. Whan the
 thyrde bataylle Punicum was ended
 Marcus Lato coulepylled that Carta
 ge sholde be destroyed/but Scipio Na
 lica coulepylled the contrarye.& wolde
 not assente that it sholde be destroyed
 that sekernesse sholde be enemye to
 the brutell wyttes of Romayns / for
 as a wardeyn and keper is nedefull
 to a childe/so is drede nedefull to Ly
 tezeyns / and that was preued by the
 same dede . for whan Cartage was
 destroyed / than fylle many myshap
 pes/cruell stryfe/and treson/theftte/&
 robbery / sleynge of Lytezeyns and
 exilynge/and moche othe sorowe/so
 that the Romayns losse the honeste
 of vertues and of thewes/and suffred
 more cruelnesse and sorowe of theyr
 owne neyghbours & Lytezeyns than
 of straunge enemyes/this knewe well
 Scipio & wolde not assent þ Cartage
 sholde be destroyed/for he wolde þ the
 outrage sholde be chaled by drede.

¶ Holmceus Euergetes reigned
 in Egypt .xxix. yere. And the
 yong Scipio was twyes ma
 de Consul & ouercome the Numans
 tanes & made hem subget in a well
 stronge bataylle in Spayne/the Ro
 mayns sayd that they escaped & had
 not the maysteye / than Scipio axed
 of a knyght þ was called Tyrelus /
 why þ Lyte was somtyme so stronge
 that it myght not be ouercome/& by
 what cause it was afterwarde ouerco
 me & destroyed. ¶ Petrus.xlii. Try
 phon desyred for to regne & caste for
 to slee Antyochnus/but he drad Jona
 thas as hym þ wolde defende Antyo
 chus/therfore he begyled Jonathas &
 slew hym traytorly & his twey lones
 also. And than afterwarde he slew þ
 yong Antyochnus & regned for him in
 Alya . Symon aroos in stede of his
 brother Jonathas/& made frendship
 with Demetrius þ kyng for wretche
 of Tryphon. But Demetrius passed
 to the Medes for to gete helpe to war
 re ayenst Tryphon/but he was take
 & afterwarde slayne of one Arlaces
 kyng of Perse. After him his sone An
 tyochus reigned .ix. yere in Syrya/he
 made fyrst frendshyp with Symon:
 And than he pursued Tryphon that
 flyght by the see syde in to Antiochia
 But atte laste he brake couenaunt of
 frendshyp þ was made bytwene hym
 & Symon/& made one Lendebe⁹ du
 he and leder in the see . for he sholde
 warre in the Jurpe/but he was putte
 abacke & ouercome. Symon renews
 frendscyp with the Sparcyates/that
 ben the Lacedemones & sente the Ro
 mayns a shelde of gold of a thousand

Mnas. ¶ **Treuisa.** Mna is a maner
of other maner moneye / and wepeth
sixty cyclus . Cyclus is a full vnce a /
monge the Hebrewes & amonge Gre
kes and Latyns . Cyclus is a quarter
of an vnce . So in holy bokes of He
brewes Cyclus is I take for an vnce /
& in hethen mennes bookes Cyclus
is I take for a quarter of an vnce :
Thay it foloweth in the stoire . Su
che frendshyp was made bytwene the
Jewes & the Romayns / that Lucius
Consull of Rome wrote to kyngdo
mes of the east londes chargyng that
they sholde not greue the Jewes . Atta
lus kyng of Alya made the people of
Rome eynes of his kyngdome . ¶ **Pe
trus.** L. xv. That yere one Tholo
meus duke of Sheryco that had wed
ded Symons doughter was bede to
the feste / and slough Symon & his
twey sones . But Johan Symons so
ne that ouercome the Hyrcanes / was
called Hyrcanus & herde herof / & occu
pyed Sheryusalem / and pursued Tho
lomeus & beleged hym / and for tho
was the seuenth yere / and Tholome
us had sette Johannes moder with
two sones vpon the walles of the Ly
te / and made hem blede before Johā
nes eyen . Johan sette the Lyte & the
syege & wente his waye . Antyochus
Pontycus kyng of Syrya beleged
Sheryusalem / therfore Johannes Hyr
canus opened tweyne of the eyght tre
sor places that standeth about Daup
this sepulcre / & toke thens thre thou
sande talentes / and yaued Antyochus
thre hondred talentes for to go away
and of that other dele he made places
of locours for poore mey / for to cease

so the people that grutchted for the o
penyng of the sepulcre . Johan pbyl
shop ouercome the Hyrcanes & was
confedered to the Romayns . ¶ **Dio
sius li. v.** That tyme was soo grete
multytude of grete flyes in Affryca /
p they ete & destroyed corn gras & ryn
des of trees / & were adreynt atte last
in the see of Affryca / & afterwarde we
re threwe grete heepes therof a londe
to y clyffes p stanke so foule & so gre
uouly p the smell therof slewe bothe
bestes & foules . At Hunidia were slay
ne four score thousande men / at Car
tage . ii. L. M. men / and at Lyte Dri
ca were deed . xxx. thousand knyghtes
of Rome that were lefte to kepe the
contree . Cartage in Affryca was byl
de ayene by helte of the Senatours of
Rome . xii. yere after that it was del
stroyed / and thyder were brought bur
geys of Rome . Antyoch⁹ regned thre
yere / and in Alya twelue yere . Joh
han Hyrcanus destroyed Samaria /
but Herodes buylde it afterwarde &
called it Sebastey . A duke of p Gal
les wente ayenst the Romayns with
an hondred thousande and four sco
re thousande of men of armes / and
was ouercome in the bygge of Shyp
pes that they hadde made ouer the
water of Rome . Marcurius Teren
cius Varro that was bothe phylosos
phre and poete and wryter of stoires
is born at Rome . ¶ **Drosius li. v.** and
Augustinus li. iii. The hylle mount
Ethna brent passyng that it was won
te to do / so that it sette p Lyte of Ca
thyenens on fyre / and vndede the bor
des of shyppes that come there nyghe
and brent the bowels of mey that we

Tholomeus Sother the sone
 of Cleopatra regned in Egyp
 te .xvii. yere. Marcus Tulli
 us Cypthero is born in y^e vulcenc kyn
 de. Valerius. He kept beestes in his
 youth / & ruled thempyre of Rome in
 his elde. It is wonder that he despy
 led lettres / & was hym selfe a plentif
 ous welle of lettres. This was a no
 ble speker in al maner tonges of wytt
 & of wysedome / & chyet speker with
 tonge. He assayed all doubtres clerely
 at wyll & clensted and enorned all Re
 thoryke. He axed hym somtyme how
 he come to the fayre spekyng that he
 had / noble facunde sayd he is a grete
 gyfte of god almyghty. Who y^e kne
 we howe he sholde haue fayre maner
 of spekyng. He wrote all the gestes of
 Troye subtylly as it myght be closed
 in a note shale. Pol. li. v. ca. vi. Cy
 thero wolde somtyme bye an hous in
 the palays & had no moneye / & borow
 wed of one Scylla / but he was wryed
 et y^e bargayne was made. Than Cy
 thero was meoued & denyed all that
 he had receyued & sayd that he wolde
 bye none hous / and yf I bye an hous
 sayd he. I shall knowleche the soth of
 that ye put to me / & afterward whan
 he had bought the hous / it was putte
 apenst hym. Ye be vn wysic sayd he / yf
 ye knowe not that byers forsake yf
 they wolde ought bye / & make it as
 though they wolde no thyng therof /

to haue the better chepe / & so what he
 myght not denye / he toined it to boue
 de & to laughynge / & not to blame &
 to trespasse. He had alwaye y^e maner
 doynge / that as ofte as ony foule dede
 was put apenst hym y^e he myght not
 denye. he wolde put it of with a mercy
 answer. Jeronimus ad nepot. He
 sayd somtyme of one to Tullius in
 this maner. Demostenes benam the
 that y^e were not fyrst pleder. and thou
 hast benom him y^e he is not pleder al
 lone. This Tullius made many bo
 kes as he seyth libro scdo de diuina
 Liber hortelibus .iiii. Archademicis .v.
 Tulculanis .vi. Annuciande de diui
 nacoe. de Senectute. de Amicicia. de re
 thorica. de Officiis. de Re Publica.
 Tytus. Six hondred yere and .xlv.
 after the buyldynge of Rome was a
 batayll bytwene Sertorius and Pom
 peius. In that bataylle were slayne
 six hondred knyghtes on that one sy
 de / and six hondred on the other sy
 de / the fyrste bataylle endured vnto
 nyght. On the morowe a knyght of
 Pompeius came amonge the deed bo
 dyes that sholde be buryed / and per
 ceuyed that he had slayne his owne
 brother / and despyled the bataylle /
 and slough hym selfe for sorowe of
 that dede / & fylle downe deed vpon
 his brothers bodye. Petrus capto
 tercio. Johan Hyrcanus dyed after
 thre and thyrty yere of his ducherye /
 and left after hym his wyf that was
 a noble speker / and fyue sones to ru
 le the Jurpe. The eldeste was cal
 led Aristobolus that myght not suf
 fre his moder to regne ouer hym / ther
 fore he pylsoned his moder and his

thre yong brethern / and slough hem
with hunger / therfore he lyued after
warde but one yere kyng & byshop &
made his broder Antygonus. But he
lete slee hym whan he come in armes
out of the Jurye and that made his
lyster / for he wolde not lye by hys.
And so the kyngdome of Juda was
restored ayene that had be withdrawe
fro Sedechias tyme vnto the Arysto
bolus. .iiii. L. lxxv. yere. ¶ Petrus ca.
quinto. Whan this Arystobolus was
deed / his wyfe that had no childe by
hym / toke his elder broder Allyandre
Gammeus out of bondes and made
hym kyng. This was a full euill
may / & slough his owne seconde bro
ther / & kepte the thyrde brother to ly
ue pryuelly the space of fyue yere. He
slough fyfty thousande olde men / toz
they withslayd his wyces & euill doyn
ge. He axed on a tyme how he sholde
please the Jewes / and was answerde
that he sholde please hem yf he were
deed. Than he henge four score wed
ded men and her wyues & childeren.
Josephus seyth that he dyed atte last
the .xxvii. yere of his kyngdom / and
lette twey sones a lyue. Hyrcanus and
Arystobolus / & wyfte that they were
odpous to the Jewes / & made his wyf
Alexandria lady of the Jewes. She
had oft before wonne loue of the peo
ple / for she abated oft the malyce and
the tyrannye of hys husbonde whyle
he was a lyue. Marius duke of Rome
& six tymes Confull after that he had
ouercome Jugurta in Numydia / he
slough two hondred thousand of Cun
bries that come ayenst the Romayns /
& he toke four score thousande prylo

ners and est with one Catulus were Anno A
deed four score thousand. Tholome⁹ A
Alexander regned in Egypte ten ye⁹ Transmi.
re. for Tholomeus Sother was put Ab Vrbe.
outh by his moder Cleopatra & cha
led in to Cyprys. Lucrecius the poete
is borne that dranke afterwarde loue
drynkes & werth wode. Nachelelle he
wrote some bookes bytwene the reles
of his wodensse / and slough hym sel
fe with his owne honde / the yere of
his lye four and fourty / and Cythero
amended his bookes. ¶ Eutropius li.
quinto. The kyngdom of Syria say
led and fyll to the lordshyp of the Ro
mayns. The batayll that was called
Sociale bellum. began in Italye for
the pyteus marles pelygnes warred
strongly four yere ayenst the Romay
nes / in that were deed twey Consuls
and porcius Lato. But they were o
uercome at last of Sylla & of Mari⁹
Pompeius.

Tholomeus Sother that was
put out by his owne moder / 161 401
recouered the kyngdome of
Egypte. Whan his moder was slayn
by Tholomeus Alexander & regned
in Egypte eyght yere. for Cytezepus
had put out Tholomeus Alexander
for þ slaughter of his moder. Salusti
us Crispus wryter of stoyses is borne
in Sabyn / of hym is yet moche thyn
ge wryte. That tyme were seen ma
ny grete wondres harde & dredfull.
for vnder the arsyngge of the sonne
was seen a dredfull clustre of fyre.
And in a felle amonge the Aretynes
blood ranne oute of the loues / as it

Anno A were out of newe woundes. And the
 Tranſmi. erthe was bete. vii. dayes togyd with
 grece hayll ſtones meddled with ſher
 Ab Vrbe. des. Amonge the Sampnytes & Ve
 neuentanes the erthe opened & leyhe
 of fyre was ſeen breke out & ſtrecche
 vp in to heuen. Alſo beekes that were
 wont to lyue among men forſoke ſta
 bles and leſow & fledde to hylles and
 montaynes lowyng and bletyng. Alſo
 hondes forſoke companye of man/
 kynde. ¶ Orosius li. v. In a playne
 of Campania were ſeen as it were
 ſhiltrons and hooſtes of fyghtyng
 men manye dayes togyder. and noyle
 and huelyng togyder of armour was
 herde/and there were ſeen afterwar/
 de forowes and ſteppes of men and of
 hozles. And not longe after/the batay
 le called Bellum Sociale / began the
 batayll called Bellum Ciuile / twey
 brethery Germayns began that ba/
 tayll / eyther of them was named
 Graccus. The batayll was begonne
 for the lawe called Algaria. In that
 lawe it was of olde tyme that the Se
 natours ſholde entremete of noo dede
 mennes feldeſ that he had whyle he
 was lyuyng / but the feldeſ withoute
 ony plec ſholde falle to the next of the
 blood/but the gentylmen dyde other
 wyſe and helde & occupied feldeſ of
 many men. Therfor one Graccus on
 a dape of prayers whan alle thynge
 ſholde be axed that ſholde be reſtored/
 axed openly that the feldeſ that were
 ſo holden. ſholde be deluyered & reſto/
 red ayene to the people. Therfore the
 gentylmen were meoued & wroth and
 ſlough two hondred of þ people. with
 fete & gobettes of chayres of fourmes

and of ſtoles/ & threwe hem in to Ty
 ber / & Graccus was ſlayne & vnbu/
 ryed longe tyme. Alſo Sylla the Lon
 ſull wente in to Campania for to de/
 ſtrope all the releef of the batayll cal
 led Bellum Sociale. Than Marius
 that had be conſull ſix tymes deſyred
 now to be Conſull the ſeuenth tyme/
 & profered to vnder take the bataylle
 ayenſt Metridas. Whan Sylla wyſte
 therof / he tourned ayene to the Lyte
 with four legyons & entred in to þ Ly
 te. & ſlough Marius meſſager. & axed
 brondeſ for to lette the Lyte a fyre. &
 beſyged Marius within þ Cappytoll
 Atte laſte Marius ymagyned to fyn/
 de a meane to meoue the comonte of
 hoſtmen to helpe hym at that tyme.
 And atte laſt he egged bonde men to
 dedes of armes for hope of pray & of
 freedom/ but they durſt not wiſtand/
 de. Than Marius wente vp in to the
 Cappytoll / & had many of his men
 ſlayne. & vnnethe elcaped hym ſelfe.
 Than Marius fled & tourne to mar
 reys & watry places. there herodes fon
 de hē among moꝝ ſlagges & ſprayes
 & ſente hym to Sylla / & Sylla ſente
 hym to the Lumbres þ were the worſt
 enemyes that he had & they empyſo
 ned him. There it ſemed that goddeſ
 come to hym/ & were with hym there
 and lyght ſhone in the pryſon whan
 that the tormentour was ſente in to
 ſlee hym/ the tormentours hande fay
 led and ſhoke for drede / and a boys
 was herde in the eyer / wherwith the
 Lumbres were aſtonyed for drede/ and
 felle to the grounde. and lettey Mari
 us go his way. ¶ R. Lucanus ſpeketh
 of this happe libro ſecundo. Marius

was fledde & hydde in the bushes of the fennye more. ¶ Tytus This Marius was so despuered by helpe of the goddesse Marica that was worshyped there / he had put hym selfe to hyr by his auowe. He toke with hym his fellowe Scynna & greued the Romayns in many maner wyle. & gate thoffyce of consull / & occupied it the seuenthe tyme / but he occupied that offyce but xiii. dayes at that tyme / from the fyrste daye of Januar whan consuls receyuen þ araye fyrst of consull to the xiii. daye of the same moneth. Marius after that he come oute of pryson passed in to Affryca / & gadred helpe oneuery syde. & cam ayene to destrope the comonte of Rome / and made his hooft in four partes. One parte þ was thre Legyons he toke hym selfe. Carbo had þ seconde parte. Sertorius the thyrde / & Scynna the fourth. Sertorius fought strongly with Pompey. Marius & Scynna entred the Lyte / & slough many of þ consuls & of the Senatours. ¶ Augustinus de ci. dei. Also Marius made Octavius the consuls hede be synpte of / & lette lette the hede in Protoris / that is the comune place of Rome / there kynges be sette vp in syght for men to loke & wondre on / there the bourgeys were wonte to stand & loke about / & telle there mery tales. ¶ R. Lucanus sayth þ in the felde called Marci atte grete felt he made lette the hedes of gentylmen þ were slayne in stede of messes vpon the mete bordes. ¶ Tytus. Marius was soo cruell / that many men had leuer flee hym selfe than come in Marius honde. Therfore Catulus the consull

dranke venym / & Merula Jupiters owne bysshop kytted his deynes & bled to deth. Also Marius had þ noo man sholde be spared though he axed mercy in his owne pience / but yf he hym selfe put forth þ right honde in token of mercy. Therfore the Senatours þ lette / and gentylmen of Rome passed in to Grece & prayed Sylla the consull to helpe the comynthe of Rome þ was nyghe lost. ¶ Eutropius. That tyme Sylla at Athene had ouercome one Archelaus Metridas duke and slayne an hondred thousande men / so that Archelaus hydde hym selfe naked thre dayes in depe watry mores, whan this was knowen. Metridas prayde for peas. & Sylla assented and graüted for to haue the lesse peryll be hynde hym & for to goo the more sauely and surer to the ciuile batayll agens Marius. Than Sylla cam ayene to Rome. and slough and exiled so many thousandes of men. that Quintus Catulus sayde to hem openly. with whome shall we lyue. Yf we slee armed men in bataylle / and vnarmed men in peas. ¶ Augustinus libro tercio capitulo. xxiii. for Sylla than gafe leue in that stryfe to his men to slee whome that they wolde / the waye was opened to take wreche of all olde wrathe. Therfore Syllas right was wers to the comonte of Rome / than Marius wychednesse though they were vnpunysshed. for by bothe were moo men slayne than by that one. ¶ Eutropius. This Ciuile batayll dured ten yere and destroyed moo than an .L. thousand men and fyfty thousande without Senatores

Anno A consuls pretoripes & edylpces men of
 Transmi. dygnite. ¶ R. Therefore here take he
 Ab Urbe. de of six batayls that were amonge
 the Romayns / & euery batayll was
 called Bellum ciuile. In the fyrst ba
 tayll Marius faught apenst the Lyte
 In the seconde batayll Sylla fought
 apenst Marius & apenst his factours.
 In þ thyrde batayll Sertori⁹ fought
 apenst Pompeius. In the fourth ba
 tayll Catellna fought apenst the coz
 mente. In the fyfth batayll Lepidus
 faught apenst Catulus. The sixth a
 batayll was bytwene Julius & Pom
 peus. ¶ Eutropius. After this Sylla
 tourned ayene & had worlhyppfully the
 maystry of Metridas. ¶ Trogus li⁹
 xxxvii. Metridas. Metridas lone kyn
 ge of Pontus was rebell apenst þ Ro
 maynes .xlvi. yere. Soo that yf it se
 med somtyme that he was ouercome
 he wolde aryle ayene with more my
 ghte & strengthe. This was delpuerd
 by his kynnelmen out of the awaytes
 of his owne moder / that had slayne
 her owne fyue sones / & this ponglyng
 was taken to wardens to kepe / that
 sette hym vpon a wylde hors & com
 pelled hym to playe and to ryde. And
 whyle he ruled the horse ouer myght
 to his elde / his wardens arayed ve
 nynt for to peue hym to drynke. The
 wyle childe dradde therof / & dranke
 ofte medycynes of treacle / by the whi
 che remedies he put of þ peryll of ve
 nynt in his yough / so that he myght
 not dye by venym whan he wolde ha
 ue dyed by venym in his elde. Than
 after venym he drad Ire / and feyned
 that he wolde goo an huntynge / soo
 that in seuey yere he came neuer in

Lyte ne in small towne / soo that all
 that tyme he hadde neuer hous o
 uer hede / but walked & laye by nyght
 in hylles & in montaynes / & there he
 trauaylled ofte wylde beestes / & toke
 hem with swyfte rennyng & fought
 with hem somtyme / for to make his
 bodey stedfaste by vse in trauayll for
 tendure. Also whan he come to rulg
 of kyngdom / he chastyled the Shytes
 that myght not be ouercome before /
 by slepyght of wytte. He occupped Pon
 tus & Macedonia. Also he wente pry
 uely out of his kyngdom. & toke with
 hym some of his frendes / & passed in
 to Alpa / and wente aboute in Alpa &
 elpyed the places & countrees of that
 londe / and came ayene than in to his
 owne kyngdome and founde a lityll
 lone / that Laodyce that was both his
 wyf & his owne syster hadde brought
 forth by a Copenner. whyle he was ab
 sente in other londes. Therefore the
 wyfe ordeyned venym for Metrydas
 whan he come home / but he was war
 ned by a wenche that serued his wyf.
 and toke wreche of the doers of that
 falle dede. Than whan wynter was
 comen he wolde not be in festes / but
 in the felde stryynge on his horse in
 rennyng or in grete dedes of strength
 & made his hooft to vse luche trauay
 le & dedes for to make hem connyng
 by vse stalworth and stedfast estones
 whan they sholde fyght. Than he
 warded in Galacia and despyled the
 manase of the Romayns. Metrydas
 seconde wyf Shaar hyr hede for loue
 of hyr hulbonde / and vied her for to
 ryde for to helpe what she myght / yf
 hyr hulbonde felle in ony peryll / and

for to be with hym alwaye. Hys hul-
bonde was ouercome of Pompeius &
fledde/and he lured hym alwaye a-
monge full cruell nacions. ¶ **Sylla**
dus. As oft as the hyghest Consuls
Sylla & Pompeius ouercome Metri-
das/so oft he lemed the more myghty
& stronge/for he occupped Babylony
and Alya & pealed the Shytes/& ma-
de subget Capadocia and Armenia/
& made his owne kyngdome stretche
streyght vnto Indee/& come to Ephe-
sus & slough all the Romayns in one
daye that were in Alya. Than he sente
Archelaus that was the duke befo-
re hym in to Grece with an hondred
thoulande fyghtyng men & gate him
all Grece. Atte last he was holden of
his owne sone fernaces & dranke ve-
nyem by his good wyll / for he wolde
haue dyed / but it greued hym not.
Therfore a knyght of the Galles &
he had greued was prayed for to slee
him and slough him anone. After his
deth Pompeius made Tygranes kyn-
ge of Syria/and brient with fyre the
Temple of Jerusalem.

¶ **Solomeus Denys** reigned. xxx
yere in Egypte. In his tyme
was Plantus Latinus the gre-
te Pompeius endytour & rethorychen
Libertus the doctour was in prosper-
te in Rome. Sylla the Consull dyed
at Rome after that he had the vcto-
rye of Metridas. Nychomedes kynge
of Bythynia made people of Rome
his hepres whan he dyed. Whan he
was deed Metridas brake the peas-

and warred in Bythynia & in Ilyrll Anno A
Alya. Twey Consuls of Rome were
sente apenst hym / he ouercome that Transmi.
one of hem. & was ouercomen of that Ab Vrbe.
other that come behynde / & folowed
after hym/and slough of his an hon-
dred thoulande fyghtyng men. In
Italye began a newe batayl of. lxxiii
comune fyghters & hockers that rob-
bed brente and slough & brake spous-
lage & dyde lecherpe/& ouercome the
Consuls of Rome / and gadred hem
lx. M. men of armes. But after thre
yere Marcus the Consull ouercome
hem in Apulea Naples. Alexandra o-
therwyle called Sabyna Alexandres
wyf reigned .ix. yere amonge the Je-
wes / and slough & outlawed manye
Jewes by counseyll of the Pharasees.
The secte of them began at that ty-
me. ¶ **Eutropius** li. vi. Virgyll Mar-
ro is born nyghe to Mantua. Sco-
mers & see theues reigned and robbed
all the see/so that the Romayns that
were vctors of all the worlde aboute
had noo sure saylyng without other
locour. But Pompeius the Consull
chastyled these theues atte last. Than
Pompeius toke a batayll apenst Me-
tridas & apenst Tygranes kynge of
Armeny/for he had locourd & fauou-
red Metridas that was apenst the Ro-
mayns and receyued hym and laued
hym whan he fledde the Romayns.
Therfor Pompeius ouercome Metri-
das in bataylle by nyght & destroyed
his castels & his tentes / & slough .xl.
thoulande of his men/and made Ty-
granes to yelde hym selfe / and toke
from hym both Armenye & Alya / &
made hē bere trybute of six thousand

Anno A talentes of syluer/for he had meoued
 Transmi. warre without cause ayenste the Ro/
 mayns. Than Metridas fledde with
 Ab Vrbe. his wyf/ & not longe afterwarde / he
 was cruell to his owne men/ & slough
 his twey sones. Than farnaces his
 thyrde sone toke ensample of his bre/
 thery. and was sore aferd. & made the
 hooft tourne to hym that was sent to
 pursue hym/ & besyged his owne fa/
 der in Goffory. The fader cryed mer/
 cy/ but the sone wold not here. Than
 this Metridas prayed his goddes þ
 his sone farnaces myght somtyme
 here the same voyes of his owne sones
 Than he yaued his wyf & his dough/
 ters denyng to drynke & slough hem
 in that maner. for he myght not dye
 by denyng: he prayed a knyght of
 Galles to slee hym/ & he slough hym
 anone/ and so Metridas dyed the yere
 of his age .lxx. & the yere of his kynge
 dome .lx. euen. After that Pompeius
 ouercome the Albans / & the men of
 Hyberia of Syrya and of Arabia.
 ¶ Merc. li. i. The yere of Tholome⁹
 xvi. Diacius the poete. Satiricus &
 Liricus were born at Venalia a Lyte
 of Italye. ¶ Trevisa. Here take he/
 de that a poete is called Liricus/ and
 some poete is called Satiric⁹ / & hath
 that name of Satis/ that is ynough.
 For the mater that he speketh of / he
 toucheth atte full: And thre poetes be
 specyally called Satirici. Diac⁹. Per
 sius. & Iuuenales. ¶ Petrus. Whan
 that Alyxandre was deed/ that ordey
 ned his eldest sone Hyrcan⁹ to be kyn
 ge & bysshop. Afterwarde the twey so
 nes that were a lyue. Hyrcanus and
 Arystobolus stryuen for thempyre / &

yaued the Romayns occasion to warre
 in Judea/ that is the Jurye. Therfo
 re Pompeius came & toke Jerusalem
 vnnethe the thyrde moneth/ & slough
 xiii. thousande Jewes / & toke the o/
 ther vpon theyr othes/ & threwe dow/
 ne þ walles of Jerusalem euen with
 the grounde/ and yaued Hyrcanus the
 preesthode/ & ladde Arystobolus bou/
 de & his twey sones with hym in to
 Rome/ and left Staurus lord of Sy
 rya. Pompeius had be bifore strengest
 in bataylles/ but for that he stabuled
 his horsles in the porches & other pla/
 ces of the Temple. he had neuer gra
 ce afterwarde well to speede / and soo
 he fought neuer after but he was ouer
 come. ¶ Eutropius libro .vi. Whan
 all this was done/ after that Pompei
 us hadde foughten ryally with two &
 twenty kynnges/ he wente in to Alpa
 and made an ende of the olde batayll
 of the east londes. Metridas sones
 wente before his chare/ and Tygras
 nes sones also. Diac⁹ flaccus is born
 ne at Venulye. Sergius Catelina a
 noble man of blood. but euyl & shrew
 de of wytte & of wyll conspyred with
 some grete men / right stronge to de/
 stroye the countree. And though Jus
 lius Cypus pleted for hym & defen/
 ded his partye. Natheles in Tullius
 Cypthero the Consuls tyme. Marcus
 Cato pleted ayenst hym/ and soo he
 was put oute of the Lyte & soone af/
 terwarde slayne in bataylle. Also his
 felawes were taken of one Anthoni⁹
 a nother Consull & pyloned to theyr
 lyues ende. Salustius made a booke
 of hem/ the booke is names the boke
 of Catelinus conspyracy. Cypus Lis

uius the wyrtter of storyes is born and
 Virgill lerned at Tremona. Gaius
 Julius Cezar is made Consul/and
 Gallia was Juged to hym & Iliric⁹

 fought .x. yere ayenst the Germapns
 and Galles in many harde batayles
 ¶ Treuisa. Here Galles ben called
 men of Gallia. Gallia is closed with
 thre noble watres/with þ Rhyne & the
 Rhone & the see of Ocean. Though
 Gallia & fraunce be oft aconypted al
 one londe & contree. Natheles as we
 speke comonly of fraunce/& now here
 of Gallia. Gallia conteyned all the
 Reame of fraunce/& many other con-
 trees & londes vnto the Rhyne north-
 warde/to the Rhone eastwarde & to the
 see of Brytany & of Englonde west-
 warde. Than it foloweth in the sto-
 ry. Julius ix. yere made harde batay-
 les ayenst the Germapns & the Gal-
 les/& destroyed .iiii. L. M. and .xl. M.
 of Germapns that passed the Rhyne
 for to wyinne Gallia. Than he made
 a brygge & passed the Rhyne & wayn
 Suenia / than he wayn all Gallia/&
 toke pledges of the Brytons & made
 hem tributarye. Amonge all his gre-
 te dedes he fought euyll but thryes &
 no moo. Bede accounteth this yere .lx.
 before the Incarnacion. This yere ca-
 me Julius Cezar to wyinne Brytan-
 ne in this maner. Whyle Julius the
 Consul warred ayenst the Germap-
 nes & Galles/that be to deled oonly
 by the Rhyer of Rhyne. He come to the
 Morians / & ordeyned hym an hon-
 dred thypes & thyrty with sayles &
 with nores/& sayled in to Brytanye.
 there he was fyrst sette with right har-

de fyghtynge/& after warde in a gre- Anno A
 te tempest that fylle ayenst hym. He Transmi.
 lost many thypes & hoilmey & tour- Ab Vrbe.
 ned in te Gallia. And sente certayne
 legyons of knyghtes in to Erlonde/
 & araped eft his thypes/and had .xl.
 thypes broken in grete tempest. why
 le he wente ayenst the Brytons & was
 ouercome atte fyrst bataylle/& Labie-
 nus the Consul was wounded and
 dyed right there. Vnneth atte seconde
 bataylle Julius chaced the Brytons
 for the Brytons had pyght shawe
 stakes in the Rhyer of Tamyle there
 Julius hadde landed/the stakes were
 grete shapen as a mannes thygh/and
 sette about with lede as it is yet seey
 Whan the Romaynes were ware of
 this gyle / for to escape that peryll /
 they toke the Lyte of Trynouantum
 by sleight of one Andragius & recey-
 ued fourty plegges & wente thens / &
 occupied the Lyte Cassybala a stron-
 ge Lyte & a riche sette amonge wa-
 tres. Than Cezar went in to Gallia
 and was sette with harde batayls on
 euery syde. Lud kyng of Brytons is
 deed/he called Trynouantum Laer-
 lud by his owne name/& buylde there
 the west pate and called it after his
 owne name Ludgate. His broder Cal-
 sylbelanus regned after hym. for Lud
 left after hym twey lones a lyue An-
 dragius and Tennanci⁹ and were to
 yonge to gouerne the Royame. But
 whan they come to age. Cassybelan⁹
 paue to Andragius the Lyte Tryno-
 uantum with the ducherye of Bente
 And he paue Tennanci⁹ the duche-
 rye of Cornewayle. That tyme Ju-
 lius Cezar sayled in to Brytanye/&

Anno A was twyes put of / but the whyle the
 Transmi. kyng and Andragius were at grete
 Ab Vrbe. stryfe . for Andragius newe we flowe
 the kynges neuewe in wrastelpnge.
 Andragius sente for Julius Cezar /
 and he came and wanne the londe /
 made kyng Cassybelanus trybutarpe
 and Cassybelanus lpued seuen yere af
 ter that Julius was a goo . Crassus
 Pompeius felawe and Consull after
 Gabinus dech was sente to be ruler
 of Syrpa for to chaste the Parches
 that were waxyen rebell . for to spede
 that Journepye. Crassus toke two thou
 sande talentes out of the Temple of
 Iherusalem / the whiche Pompeius
 spared. Therfore Crassus fyghtynge
 apenste the Parches was ouercome &
 taken. The Parches melte golde and
 powred in his throie / & despyled hym
 and sayd / thou Romayne art a thyr
 ste after golde / nowe drynke golde
 atte full.

O Leopatra s^d daughter of Tho
 lome⁹ Denys kyng of Egypt
 was Empies of Egypt. xxi.
 yere / two yere before Julius Cezar /
 fyue yere vnder Julius / and .xv. ye
 re after Octavianus Augustus. A ba
 tayll Ipyule began bytwene Julius
 & his wyues fader Pompeius in this
 maner. ¶ Girald. for Julius whay
 that he hadde trauepylled ten yere and
 wonne Gallia Germania and Bry
 tayne. He axed the worshyp that was
 dewe for so grete vyctoryes and noble
 dedes. But Pompeius Lato & Mar
 cellus the Consuls withseyden hym /

and bad him leue the hoost. and come
 agayne to the Lyte. ¶ Eutropius li.
 sexto. And by Auctoryte of Marcellus
 the Consull. the grete Pompeius was
 sente with comaūdement to the legys
 ons that were at Luceria / & for that
 of puttyng. Julius Cezar with his
 hoost come apenst the contree. ¶ Sue
 tonius. Ther were many maner dyg
 nytees in Rome / some therof dured
 one yere / the chyeft dygnyte of all was
 the dyctatours dygnyte that dured fy
 ue yere. But fyrst was but one dycta
 tour / but afterwarde the comonte en
 created / & were made thre dyctatours
 in Rome . for yf there fylle ony dyl
 corde bytwene the tweyne / the thyrde
 sholde redresse it. It happed that the
 se thre were dyctatours togyder Pom
 peius Julius and Marcus Crassus /
 of the whiche Pompeius / for he was
 an olde man and of the chylualrpe
 Emeryta left at home for to gouerne
 the comonte ¶ Treuisa. In the. xxv.
 chapitre of the fyrst boke it is wryten
 that somtyme the knyghtes of Rome
 after that they were sixty yere olde /
 shold not be compelled to dedes of ar
 mes / but they sholde be at home and
 haue certayne lpuelode. and than they
 were called knyghtis of the chylualrpe
 Emeryta / that is put out of dedes of
 armes. Than it foloweth in the stor
 yre. Crassus was sente to warre apen
 ste the Parches / and was taken and
 lost by gyle and by trayson . Julius
 was sente in to west londes and dwel
 led fyue yere to make the Galles / &
 the Allobrognes men of Burgoyne
 subgette. Than he helde the dygnyte
 otheer fyue yere by his owne auctoryte

In the whiche fyue yere / he warred
 apenst the Brytons/and est apenst the
 Galles. Than in his compng to Ro
 mewarde whan he came to Alpes/he
 sente to Pompei⁹/whos doughter he
 had wedded/that he sholde arape for
 hym Triumphum / that is the wor
 shyp that a vycor of Rome sholde ha
 ue in his compnge to Rome after the
 vycorpe. But for Julius had holden
 the dignyte by his owne auctoryte len
 ger than he sholde. Pompei⁹ warned
 hym the worshyp called Triumphus
 by assente of the Senatours . Than
 Julius was wroth and wente to the
 Lyte apenst Pompeius. ¶ Eutropius
 li. vi. Than Pompeius dradde with
 the Senatours & Consuls/and fledde
 in to Grece / and araped there a ba
 taylle apenst Julius Cezar . Julius
 entred in to the Lyte of Rome / as it
 were in to a Lyte beyng vopde and
 brake the comon tresorpe. ¶ Diacius
 li. vi. Julius toke four thousand pou
 de of golde/and six score & ten of syl
 uer . He toke four thousande and ten
 thousand poude & deled to his knygh
 tes. ¶ Eutropius. And in lykenesse of
 peas/he occupied the dygnytes eueri
 chone/and wente than in to Spayne
 & there he destroyed Pompeius stren
 gest hooftes & thre Capitayns. Than
 he come in to Grece and faught with
 Pompeius. In the fyrst batayll Ju
 lius was ouercomen and chased/and
 whan nyght come : Pompeius wolde
 not folowe & pursue the chace. Ther
 fore Julius sayd þ Pompeius couth
 not take the vycorpe and that oonly
 that daye he myght haue be ouerco
 men. After that they faught in Hel

salia / there Pompeius sheltron had
 fourty thousande fote men / and six
 hondred horsmen in the lyfte wyng.
 and fyue hondred in the right wyng
 & al the helpe of the cest syde with no
 bley of the Senatours Pretoryes and
 Consuls . Cezar had in his sheltron
 not fully .xxx. thousande horsmen/&
 atte last in the batayll Pompei⁹ hooft
 fledde/and his tentes were destroyed
 and he hym selfe fledde to the yonge
 Tholomeus kyng of Egypte/& axed
 helpe of hym/for he was assygned by
 the Senatours to be his tutor & war
 deyn. Nacheles the kyng folowed mo
 re hap and fortune than frenshyp / &
 lette slee Pompeius/and sente to Ju
 lius his hede & his ryng. Whan Ju
 lius sawe the hede and the ryng / he
 wepte well bytter teeres / and wente
 forthwith to Alexandria/and Tho
 lomeus araped bullhementes. Than
 Cezar was ouerlette with strength of
 his enemyes/and wente in to a boote
 that was soo heuy laden with men þ
 foloweth hym that it sanke downe &
 was dreynt. Than Cezar swam thre
 hondred paas with one honde / and
 helde chartres with that other honde
 aboue the water/and come to a shyp.
 There he was comforted anone and
 drenched eþther toke alle the kynges
 Nauey in bataylle on the see easely
 ynough. But the Alexandrynes pray
 de for her kynges lyf/& Julius graū
 ted and charged hym that he sholde
 rather assaye the frenshyp of the Res
 mayns than dedes of armes. Nache
 lesse anone as he was free / he gaue
 Cezar a batayll/but he and his hooft
 were soone destroyed . Cezar becoke
 Anno A
 Transmi.
 Ab Vrbe.

Anno A that kyngdome to a woman called
 Transmi. Cleopatra / & dwelleth with hyr two
 Ab Vrbe. yere in lecherye. ¶ Hug capto. Janus
 That tyme Julius amended the ka
 lender / and founde the cause of the le
 pe yere. ¶ R. The Romayns as the
 Hebrewes began her yere in Marche
 vnto Numa Pompilius tyme. And
 this Numa put Januar & Februar
 to the yere in an vncertayne maner /
 but the yere was not fully amended
 before Julius tyme. ¶ Quintilis the
 fyfth moneth after Marche / was af
 terwarde called Julius in worlhypp
 of Julius Cezar / for he was born in
 that moneth / or in þ moneth he dyde
 some grete dede & vyctorye. for luche
 a maner skylle / sextilis the sixth mo
 neth after Marche is called August^s
 in worlhip of Augustus Cezar. ¶ E
 utropius. Cezar remeoued from Egyp
 te. & ouercome Farnaces Metridas so
 ne in bataylle / & leete flee hym for he
 had mayntened Pompei^s ayenst Ju
 lius. Thens he wente to Rome & ma
 de him Consull þ thyrde tyme. Than
 he wente in to Affryca & ouercome in
 bataylle the noble dukes Scipio and
 Porcius Cato / & Juba the kyng of
 Mauritanian / & they slough hem selfe
 afterwarde. ¶ Seneca epla. xxvi. and
 pol. li. vii. c. vi. speken of this Cato
 and saye that he dranke venym / and
 smote hym selfe in to the brest with a
 swerde / and so he yelde vp the goost /
 for he wolde not see Cezar regne why
 le he were a lyue. Also Seneca scdo li.
 ad Seuerū. Cato lyued not after fre
 dome / neyther fredome after Cato.
 Also a nother storpe of Rome sayth /
 that Cato was not in þ bataylle that

was bytwene Julius and Pompeius
 But he herde of Pompeius dech / and
 redde Platoos bokes de Immortalis
 tate anime / and sawe in that booke
 that the soule maye not dye. and so he
 wounded hym selfe / but his frendes
 counseilled hym to lyue / and a leche
 dyde his cure to his woūdes but whan
 they were a goo / he opened his woū
 de & so he dyed. This doynge is not
 excusable in Cato / were he neuer soo
 well lettred and so glorpyous. fyrst for
 his frendes counseilled hym the cons
 trarye that were wyle men & kynde:
 Also for that he counseilled his sone
 not for to do soo / but he counseilled
 hym rather to lyue vnder Julius Ce
 zar the vyctor. The thyrde skylle for
 he slough hym selfe for enuye / for he
 wolde not suffre & see Julius welthe
 and his Joye. And soo it semeth that
 Cato slough hym selfe by vnstedfast
 nesse & folye / for he wolde not suffre
 anguyssh & displeas. and not by hone
 ste to boyde & escape foule maner of
 doynge. Here take hede of many Cas
 tons that were in Rome among the
 Romayns / one was Cato questor / he
 brought Ennius the poete out of Ta
 rente in to Rome. A nother was Men
 nius Cato that fought wonderly ay
 yenst the Grekes in Paull Emilius
 tyme. A nother was Marcus Porcius
 Cato that was called Uticensis / for
 he slough hym selfe at a Lyte called
 Utica in Affryque. Of hym we speke
 now at this tyme. & in caas this was
 tensorius Cato. Of hym spekech Je
 rom in Epla ad Nepocianū & sayth.
 that hym shamed not whan he was
 an olde may to lerne lettres of grue /

neither was put out of hope & truste
for to speede. This was a philosopher
of the secte that hete secta Stoycorum
¶ Trevisa. Stoici had that name of
a porche of Athene called Stoa/ther
were peynted dedes & doynges of wy
se men and of stronge. The fyrst phy
losopher of þe secte was named Zenon
¶ Than it foloweth in the storpe / this
Lato made a grete science of vertues
& of maners that is called Ethica La
tonis / therof was that lypyll boke of
metre drawen Latoyn that childeren
lerne in scole. ¶ Eutropius. After an
yere Lezar wente eft to Rome / & ma
de hym Consul the fourth tyme / and
soone after wente in to Spayne. whe
re Pompeius lones had arayed right
strong batayls / in þe last batayll there
Lezar was so nye ouercome / that his
men fledde / & he was in poynt to see
hym self / lest in his elde he shold falle
in to childres honde after grete wo
rthyp & Joye & grete dedes of chyual
rye. Lezar was than .lvi. yere of age
Atte last his men tourned apene and
ouercome his enemyes / & eft he went
to Rome & made men calle hym Em
perour. He was called Emperour for
a passyng lordshyp of one pryncypate
& was called Lezar / for he was kytte
out of his moders wombe whan his
moder was dede. Celsus in latyn is
cutte in Englyshe. ¶ Eutrop. Whan
Julius by his owne wylle sholde doo
worshyp to the people as the people
doyde hym before / he wolde neyther a
ryse apenst the Senatours whan they
come to hym / & doyde many other ty
rannyes & doynges apenst the custo
mes of Rome. ¶ Than .lx. horsmen &

Senatours of Rome / and specyally Anno A
tweyne / eyther was called Brutus /
conspyred apenst hym / soo that on a
dave whan the Senatours sholde co
me togyder. Julius come to the Ca
pyptoyll / & was styched through / & had
xxiii. woundes and dyed.

Julius wente towarde the Ca
pyptoyll / and receyued lettres
that were Judges of his dech /
the messager that brought the lettres
sawd þe he sholde be deed yf he come þe
dave among the gaderyng of the peo
ple. I shall now sawd Julius speke
with an Astronomer / & afterwarde I
shall see the gaderyng and the lettres.
¶ Than he called to hym an Astrono
mer. that sawd þe Julius sholde dye in
the kalendes / this dave sawd Julius
be the kalendes / & yet I am on lyue.
To dave be the kalendes sawd þe Astro
nomer / but they be not passed / & I wol
de þe I were foude a lyer. ¶ Than Ju
lius wente to the Cappytoyle / & was
slayne with alles of comune con
tecke: s or brawlers the fyrste dave of
Marche / but there slymed no woundes
in his bodye. but the lettres were fou
de in his honde after his dech. ¶ Pe
trus. An hondred daves before Juli
dech / fyllle a lyghtnyng vpon Julius
ymage in the chepyng place / & toke
awaye the letter C of this name Le
zar. Also the nyght before his dech /
his chambie wyndowes were so gryle
ly & soo sternely opened / that Julius
reled out of his bed. & wende that the
hous hadde falle vpon hym. Also the
l iiii

Anno A daye after his deth / there lemed thre
 Transmi. sonnes in the east / that wente lytyll &
 Ab Vrbe. lytyll togydres all in one sonne / that
 betokened þ the lordshyp of the thre
 partes of the worlde / holde come all
 in to one prynces lordshyp. Eyther mo
 re verily / it betokened þ all the worl
 de holde knowe þ Trynyte thre per
 sones & one god. Also an oxe spake to
 a plowe man in the subarbes of Ro
 me / & sayd that he was pryched and
 dryuen in ydel / for in short tyme sayd
 he / men shall fayle more than oren /
 eyther whete. Also in Julius pyler þ
 now pylgrymes calle Sapnte Peters
 nyld / there the alshes were of Juli
 bodye that was brient. It was wyrtien
 in metre in this maner . Thou were
 grete Cesar as all the world is at eue
 And art now sette there cloled in a ly
 tyll stone. ¶ R. Also many men wro
 te many thng in praylynge of Juli
 lius / for Eutropius li. vi. sayth that
 no man was punysshed this daye that
 he entred in to the Lyte. Also he ma
 de his knyghtes haue costlew armour
 for they sholde defende hē more man
 ly for drede of soo grete losse . There
 was neuer man more noble than he
 in bataylle by his ledyng / there were
 slayn enleuey hondred thousand four
 score & twelue thousande of his ene
 myes without the bataylles that we
 re called Bella ciuilia / for he wolde
 not wypte the nombre of hem þ were
 slayne in cyuple batayles. ¶ Treuila
 Bellum ciuile is a bataylle amorge
 the Romayns hem selfe. Than it fo
 loweth in the storpe. Julius fought
 fyfty tymes with baner dysplayed.
 Also no man wrote swyfter than he

no man redde swyfter than he . Also
 he vled to endyte four maner pytles
 & lettres at ones. And whom he made
 subget by armes / he ouercome hem
 more by myldenesse . Also there was
 no daye in all his harde warres & ba
 taylles that he nolde wypte / rede ne
 ther endyte. ¶ Plini⁹. Julius Cezars
 honde was as able to þ pen as to the
 swerde / but no man gouerned the co
 monte better than he in all his grete
 lordshyp / he bad neuer slee man / but
 one Domicius / to whom he had yeu
 uen his lyfe before. He toke hym ones
 in a cyuple bataylle & yaued hym his
 lyfe / & bad hym forswere armes / and
 sawe hym afterwarde fyghte apenste
 hym in a bataylle . Than he sayd to
 his knyghtes . It is ynough to me to
 yeue an vnkynde man ones his lyfe /
 he was neuer soo wrote with man þ
 he nolde foryeue yf he sawe skylfull
 occasion . Also Julius was of grete
 suffraunce / for in his worshyp in his
 compng to Rome after a grete vycto
 ry / knyghtes of Rome sayde in his
 owne heryng / and he was neuer the
 wrother. Lo Cesar taketh worshyp as
 a vyctor / for he hath ouercomen the
 Galles. why hath he Nychomedes kyn
 ge of Bythinia none worshyppe as a
 vyctor / for he ouercome Cesar / for me
 sayd that he had to grete frendshyp
 with hym . Thorfore me sayde that
 Tullius sayd to Julius. Hayle kynge
 & quene / and estt hayle quene of By
 thinia / thou were somtyme woman
 of all men / & now þ art made man
 of al women. ¶ Pol. li. iii. Julius Ce
 zar was sore agreued of his ballionel
 se / & heer fayled on his molde / & ou

his fortop / he wolde bende his heer /
 from the polle towarde the forhede.
 And a knyght of Rome that was re-
 proued of cowardysle before Julius /
 Julius sayd he, it were lygher to ma-
 ke the not balled / than it were to the
 to make me do any thyng cowardly
 in the hoost of Rome. Also there we-
 re famous bokes & mury gestes ma-
 de & knowen openly in despyte of him
 & he suffred it paciently ynough. Als
 to one despyled hym and his moders
 kynne / & called hym baker / and he
 rougth nothyng therof. Therfor Cy-
 thero in praylyng of hym sayth, Ju-
 lius couth not forpete. but oonly Inius
 rye & wronge. ¶ Plinius. Cezar cam
 on a tyme in to Julius scole / & Tul-
 lius arole apenst hym / and Julius
 forbade hym & sayd / aryle not apenst
 me / for wytte and wysledom is better
 than myght & strength. Shall I not
 aryle sayd Tullius apenst the vyctor
 of the worlde. Thou haste wonne a
 more worshypfull crowne and pryse /
 than it were to streche out of the boi-
 des of the Emppre of Rome / and by
 cause of that worde. Julius ordeyned
 a lawe / that he that redde eyther hel-
 de a boke / holde not aryle apenst no
 man. ¶ Valerius. Acius the poete aro-
 se not apenst Julius Cezar / whan
 Julius cam in to the college of poe-
 tes / & me axed him why he late styll
 in the comyng of so grete a lorde / the
 lasse sayde he shall aryle apenst the
 greter / and pere shall come to his pere
 but wytte & wysledome passech all / &
 Julius alowed his sayenge. ¶ R. A
 may childe and a mayde childe were
 brought before Julius / were moost

lyke hym of ony childery a lyue / and Anno A
 Julius behelde hem on a tyme & pas-
 ue them grete pestes & sente hem aye Transmi.
 ne with suche verses. Shewed all one Ab Vrbe.
 chere / lyke & peres god in fere. Lat no
 myskyllyng / haue pryse of your both
 luyng. None yuy sprayes / none noyle
 of doues layes. Ye lyke of chere / be in
 fere / without ony gyle. ¶ Apule⁹ The
 conspyracpe of Catlyn come oute by
 Cythero the best Consul's tyme / and
 was dampned. There neyther for
 nobley of the persone that had gylt /
 neyther royall spekyng of Julius Ce-
 zar that was his patrone and his a-
 uowry / and pletede for hym by myl-
 densse and pyte at that tyme yf he
 myght hem helpe. for Marcus Lato
 pletede apenst hym / and proued hym
 gylty. ¶ Salustius. There were twey
 noble men. Marcus Lato / & Cypus
 Julius well nygh of one worthynes
 of blood of age & of noble and royall
 speche and lyke grete of herte / but
 they were of dyuerse Joye and wor-
 shyp. Lato was grete in clenness of lyf
 in largeness of pestes & in myldenes
 that one had worshyp by cruelnesse. &
 that other by fredom of pestes. Cezar
 by pestes. Lato by yeuyng of none
 pestes is prayled. In Cezar locour
 and refute of wretches and of nedye
 men. In Lato's punysshynge of e-
 uyll doers. In Cezar wakyng and
 trauaylle for gendryng of his owne /
 no thyng werne that he myght doo
 araye newe bataylles desprouis trium-
 phous & worshyp as a vyctor of Ro-
 me / all this was lykyng to Cezar.
 Lato loued besynesse of sobrenesse of
 stedfastnesse of sternesse. He stroue not

Anno A With richelle ayenst the riche. not with
 Transmi. trayson ayenst the traytoure/ but with
 strength ayenst the stronge/ with ho-
 Ab Vrbe. nest ayenst the lobie man/ he desyred
 more to be good/ than to seme good/
 so that þ lesse he desyred worlhypp/ the
 more worlhypp he had. ¶ Sanfr. and
 Afr. Whan Cassybelanus was deerd
 in Brytayne/ & burped at Yorke/ his
 neuewe Tenancius was kynge after
 hym. Tenancius was duke of Corne
 wayle & kynge Luddes sone & Andra-
 gius brother. Andragius wente with
 Julius Cezar to Rome.

401 444 **W**han Julius Cezar was slay-
 ne. Octavian^o of Rome xviii.
 yere of age / was sente with
 two Consuls for to purlue Marcus
 Anthonius/ that was than demed o-
 peny enemye to the comente/ for he ma-
 de insurreccion ayenst the Senatours
 & ayenst hem that slough Julius Ce-
 zar. These Octavianus was a Ro-
 mayn Octavius the Senatours sone
 And come of Eneas on his moder sy-
 de by the kynrede called Julia fami-
 lia/ & was Julius Cezars neuewe of
 his syster born & his owne sone Adop-
 tius. Julius made him his heyre in
 his testament. Marcus was ouerco-
 me at Mutina. & þ two Consuls dyed
 by the waye. Than had Octavianus
 þ grete hooltes at his comaundement
 Octavian^o made peas with Marcus
 Anthoni^o acte desyre of one Lepidus
 that was mayster of the horsmen to
 hym. Marcus Anthonius was fledde
 Than Octavianus cam to Rome in

his .xx. yere of age. & toke the dygnyte
 & made him self Consul by strength
 & afterwarde regned Emperour .lvi.
 yere .vi. monethes and somwhat of
 dayes/ that was from the moneth of
 Marche to the fyrst dape of October.
 In the whiche tyme he regned .xii. ye-
 re with Anthoni^o/ and .xlvi. yere all
 one/ & so he brought all the worlde in
 to one pryncypate & lordshyp. And as
 the kyniges of Rome hadden the na-
 me of Julius Cezar / & were called
 Cezares/ so they þ cam after this Oc-
 tauianus Augustus/ had the name of
 hym Augustus. ¶ Hug. caplo. Augeo
 This had not that name Augustus
 oonly of Augere/ that is for encrease.
 or make more/ for he made more and
 eched the comune proufyte/ but for he
 was born in that moneth Augustus/
 eyther for he had the vyctorye in that
 moneth of Anthonius & of Cleopa-
 tra. This Augustus was the sone of
 one Actia Julius syster doughter.
 ¶ Eutropius li. vii. Than Augustus
 the fyrst of his Emppre in wreche of
 Julius dethe exiled the Senatours /
 and chaced Brutus & Cassius. And
 toke Cythero to Anthonius paleys in
 hope of acorde. Cythero was than in
 his .lxxii. yere. ¶ Augustinus de ciui-
 tate dei libro tercio caplo tercio. Tul-
 lius had fauerd & tenderly kept Octa-
 uianus in his yongth ayenst the ma-
 lyce of Anthonius/ in hope þ he shol-
 de helpe moche themppre and the co-
 mune proufyte of Rome. Nathelesse
 Octavianus lete Anthoni^o flee Tul-
 lius Cythero as it were by a maner co-
 uenaüt of acorde Than whan Antho-
 ni^o wolde haue bytte of Tulli^o tonge

for he had wryten moche apenst hym
 Anthoni⁹ in blame of him/than Tul
 lius answerd in metre & sayd. Nough
 te dost thou Anthoni/wrptynge shall
 nedes abyde. ¶ Eutropius. Than Oc
 tauianus with Anthoni⁹ slough hem
 that slough Julius Cesar both Bru
 tus & Cassius and grete multytude
 of other. And afterwarde they deled
 themppre bytwene hem. So that Au
 gustus helde Spayne Gallia & Ita
 lye/and Anthonius helde the east lon
 des. ¶ Valerius li.iiii. Porcia the gre
 te Latons doughter/whan she herde
 that hyr hulbonde Brutus was slay
 ne/for she had none egge toole/she to
 ke brennyng coles in her mouth. So
 me say þ Duid Nalo þ poete was born
 at Pelgius. Salustius the aduocate &
 wryter of hystories dyed atte Rome.
 This had euer enuie to Lythero/he
 wedded Terencia to wyf that Lythe
 ro had by dpuorse put from hym and
 forsaken. Therfore Lythero made
 gesses in reiproue of Salustius. ¶ Ply
 dorius li.i. This Salustius was may
 ster of playes/& put fyrst this letter k
 to the latyn lettres/for to haue some
 dpuersyte of sowne bytwene c and q.
 Only latyn men vlen this letter k.
 ¶ Petrus. xvii. The pryncypate of Je
 wes fayled /and Herodes Alcalonita
 regned in the Jurpe. xxxvi. yere / his
 fader was Antipater of Idumea / &
 his moder was of Arabia. Whan Hyr
 canus Arystobolus brother/and Anti
 pater this Herodes fader/had be fren
 des and hadden grace of Julius Ce
 sar/as they hadden befor of Pompei⁹
 Hyrcan⁹ was confermed in the kyng
 dome of Jewes/but so that he sholde

not be called kyng. And Antipater of Anno A
 Idumea was acculed to Julius of
 grete fallhede/than he shewed openly
 the wommes of the four woundes/
 that he hadde in Egypt/therfore Ju
 lius made hym procurator of the Ju
 rpe. Afterwarde his seconde sone He
 rodes that was afterwarde called Al
 calonita/for that he repayred the Cy
 te Alcalon he was made procuratour
 of Galylee. Whan Antipater was
 slayne by malyce of venym this Hero
 des had so grete grace of Anthonius
 that of procuratours he made hym &
 his brether four prynces. ¶ Petrus.
 xxiii. Atte last this Herodes folowed
 Anthonius to Rome/and by helpe of
 hym/he was declared kyng of the Ju
 rpe/and crowned in the Capptoylle/
 in presence of theemperour Augustus.
 Than this Herodes was sente with
 twey dukes of Rome that sholde put
 hym in his kyngdome. But Anty
 gonus that occupped the kyngdome
 of the Jurpe in the meane tyme by
 helpe of the Parches / he wounded lo
 one of the dukes of Rome / that He
 rodes myghte not regne before the
 fourth yere. But atte last by helpe of
 Anthonius that was than at Athe
 nes/whan Jerusalem was belyeged
 fyue monethes/and vnneth taken. He
 rodes was brought in his kyngdome
 the fourth yere of his crownynge.
 and therfore it is that somtyme moo
 yeres be redde of Herodes. ¶ Petrus.
 This more Herodes had .ix. wyues
 and put hem aware/and wedded one
 Maryannes that was Hyrcan⁹ Nere
 and cyrcūcyded hym selfe for hyr lo
 ue/& tourned to the sect of the Jewes/
 Transmi.
 Ab Urbe.

Anno A and begate on hyr Alylander & Arystobol⁹ / & on Dolydes he begate Antipater. on Metheta he begate archela⁹
 Transmi. On Cleopatra he begate Philyp and
 Ab Vrbe. Herodes Antypas that was afterwarde called Tetrarcha one of the four prynces. But this Arystobolus h was Herodes lone begoten on Veronica h doughter of his owne aunt called Saloma / he begate the grete Agryppa. Arystobolus & Herodes that was lmyten of the Angell as it is redde in actibus Apostolor⁹. Also on the forsayde Veronica he gate two doughters Maryamnes & Herodyas that was afterwarde Phylppes wyf h was Arystobolus eame & vncle. Natheles luyng this Philip. Herodyas became this Herodes wyf h was Phylppes brother. Atte last ther fylle stryfe bytwene hyr Maryamnes the more Herodes wyf & Saloma Herodes syster. And Herodes by couleill of his syster / slough fyrste Hyrcanus the bysshop / & afterwarde he slough Jonathas the broder of Maryamnes that he had made bysshop ayenst goddes lawe in his .xvii. yere of age. And thay he slough his wyf Maryamnes / & the husbunde of his syster Saloma / & bare them on honde that they had layne by his syster Saloma. But afterward Herodes for the deth of Maryamnes felle in to wode nesse as a man that was oft lunatyke that is madde in certayne tymes of h mone / & toke agayne his wyf Dolydes & hyr lone Antypater. And sende Alyandre & Arystobolus the sones of Maryamnes to Rome for to lerne / but he slough hem afterwarde. Also Herodes left after hym many of his wylle

werkes, for he honoured the Temple & reparayed Samaria & called it Sebaste in worshyp of Cesar. he buylde a Temple about the welle of Jordan he fulfyllde the buyldyng of Cesaria in Palestina in worshyp of Cesar / he sette an egle of golde that was grete & heuy vpon the yate of the Temple / h was called Speciosa in worshyp of the Romayns / but h Jewes bare that full heuy / & toke it in euyll.

Anthonius put from hym his wyf Cleopatra Cesars syster and wedded the quene of Egypte and yaued hyr Arabia. By couetysle that women haue / she despyred to regne in Rome / and by hyr counseyll and comferte. Anthonius meoued a Cypule bataylle ayenst Octavianus / and was ouercome at actia in Grece. Petrus vicesimo octauo. Herodes was not at that bataylle / for that tyme Anthonius hadde sente hym agayne to the kyng of Arabye atte praper of Cleopatra / so that he sholde haue his kyngdome that were ouercome / whether it euer were Eutropius libro septimo. Anthonius whay he was ouercome at Actium / he fledde in to Egypte / there he slough hym selfe / for he had none hope of helpe ne of locour. Cleopatra made hyr gay and mette with Augulus entendyng to meoue hym to lecherye / but she myght not spede / and was putte in warde and escaped away / and leyde hyr selfe in the graue by hyr husbunde Anthonius and dyed

by the venyn of an addre that he to
 ke with hys. Afterwarde Egypt felle
 to thempyre. ¶ Petrus. lxxviii. After
 this Augustus enlarged Herodes kyng
 dome/for he had wytly prouped for
 hym what hym neded whyle he was
 towarde Egypte. ¶ R. Some acomp
 te þ fyrst yere of Augustus hole kyng
 dome from this place for afterwarde
 he reigned all one. ¶ Beda sup Danie
 ley leyth so as it semeth. That tyme
 Marcus Terenci⁹ Varro dyed þ was
 lxxx. yere olde & .x. Virgilius Varro
 the poete of Mantua dyed at Brun/
 duliū. Whan he was about fyfty wynter
 olde/& was buryed in Naples with
 suche a wyptyng vpon his Tombe þ
 he made whan he dyed/eyther Quidi
 us afterward as some men say. Man
 tua brought me forth. Calabres ravel
 shed me. Holdeth now percynope/ma
 de lese felde & leders ¶ R. This was
 wyle & connyng of Phylolophie/and
 vled oft Nygromancy. Therfor Alex
 ander de naturis rerū telleth wonder/
 ly of hym & sayth / that Naples was
 greued with a pestylence by blood sou
 kers/& Virgyl threwe a golden blo
 de souker in to the bottom of a pytte.
 And many yere after this golden blo
 de souker was take vp out of þ pytte
 & anone the Lyte was full of blood
 soukers without remedye/tyll the gol
 den blood souker was putte in to the
 pytte agayne. It is also sayd there/
 that one Marcellus of Naples myght
 not kepe flesshe longe without appa
 ryng/but Virgyl by his wytte ordey
 ned remedye auenke that myschyfe &
 closed flesshe sauered. I not by what
 vertue of herbes so that fyue hondred

yere the flesshe was founde freshe & Anno A
 of good sauour. Also there it is sayd
 that Virgyl closed his orcharde all a^r Transmi,
 bout with ayer in stede of a walle And Ab Orbe,
 he made a bydge of aper. & vled to go
 ouer þ bydge whan & whyder him ly
 hed. There it is sayd also þ he buylde
 that noble palays at Rome/in þ whi
 che were sette all the ymages of pro
 uynces & of londes. ¶ Hug. sayth the
 same & putteth more therto of Collo
 sens þ ymage of the sonne eyther of
 Rome/loke more herof in the fyrst bo
 ke in þ chapytre of Rome. ¶ Pol. li. i.
 He sayth the Poete of Mantua þ is
 Virgyl axed of Marcellus of Naples
 the neuewe of Augustus / whefore he
 slough many byrdes/& whether hym
 were leuer be shapen to a byrde to tas
 ke byrdes/eyther to a flye to take and
 slee flyes. He tolde this to his graūtly
 re Augustus/& by coulepyll of hym he
 chose to be made a flye / þ he myght
 dryue all þ flyes out of Naples. Herby
 it semeth þ the comune profyte shol
 de be put before euery werke. Varrus
 and Tucta Virgyls felawes by com
 maundement of Augustus amended
 Virgyls booke Eneydos / nacheleste
 vpon suche a condicōn that they shol
 de put no thyng more therto. This
 yere Saynt Marce Crystus moder is
 born/hys fader was Joachym of the
 lynnage of Juda/& hys moder was
 Anna Isachars doughter of the lynn
 nage of Leuy. ¶ R. Here take hede as
 Jerom sayth that Anna and Eme
 rea were two systres. Of Emerea cas
 me Elizabeth Johan baptyst moder
 Also Anna was fyrst wedded to Joa
 chym & had by hym Marce Crystus

Anno A moder. And she was afterwarde wed
 Transmi. ded to Cleophas/ & had by hym Ma-
 Ab Vrbe. rye Cleophe þ was wedded to Alphe
 us/ and of hem come Jacobus minor
 the lasse James called Alpheus/ and
 Symon Cananeus. Judas Thade
 and Joseph othewyle called Barla
 bas/ but in hystoria Ecclesiastica Eu
 sebius li. ii. ca. ii. sayth that Jacobus
 minor þ lasse James was called our
 lordes broder / for he was the sone of
 Joseph the spoule of Marye. but that
 is not comynly holden. Also Anna
 was wedded to Salome & had by hē
 Marye Salome that was wedded to
 Zebedeus. & had by him the more Ja
 mes & Johan Euangelist. The fyrst
 Marye that was Cryste moder was
 wedded to Joseph the forsayd Cleo

 Marcus. Porcius Cato Latinus that

 neca the philosophres felawe sloughe
 hym self for noy & sorow of a double
 quarteyne. ¶ Marianus li. ii. In the
 xli. yere of Augustus in the .vii. mo
 neth that is September in the .xi. day
 of the mone the .xiiii. dave of Sep
 tember on a thursdaye Johan Bap
 tyt was conceived / & ther after two
 hondred dayes .lxxv. on a frydaye he
 was born. And so he went befor Crist
 in his concepyng in his byrth in his
 baptyllyng in his prechynge & in his
 dyeng/ for he muste wane and Cryste

 But Johan had twey dayes lasse in
 his moders wombe. Also Johan was
 born whan the dave began to shorten

 nyng of his .xlii. yere
 in the yere of Herodes
 xxxi. in the thyrde yere
 of the Olympias nyne score & ten
 after the buyldyng of the Lyte of Ro
 me seuen hondred yere and fyue after
 the concepcion of Johan Baptyste
 the sixth moneth the fyue and twenty
 dave of Marche in a frydaye the .x.
 dave of the mone the twelue Indiccis
 on at Nazareth in Galilee Cryste was
 conceived of the virgynne Marye Jos
 sephs spoule. ¶ Trevisa The grekes
 vled sōtyme tomentē dedes of mys
 ghte & of strenght atte fote of þ hylle

mons Olympus ones in fyue yere & named Iuche dedes & playes Olympias. And also the fyrst fyue yere of Iuche playes they named þ fyrst Olympias. And the seconde fyue yere of Iuche dedes & playes þ seconde Olympias. And the thyrde fyue yere þ thyrde Olympias/ & so forth of all other. And for Cryste was conceived in the .xii. Indiccion that is the menyng in .xii. yere of the Indiccion/therfore take heed that the Indiccion is the tyme of .xv. yere/for whan the Romayns had wonne many pynnes & londes they had of eueryche londe that they had wonne thre maner trybute in .xv. yere & called the .xv. yere Indiccion/ & the fyrst fyue yere of the Indiccion þ Romayns had bras to trybute for to make armour/ & þ seconde fyue yere they had syluer for to pay knyghtes/ & the thyrde and the laste fyue yere of Indiccion they had golde to the tresory of Rome. ¶ Petrus Cryst was conceived full man in soule & in flesshe/so that þ shappe of his lymmes & of his bodye myght not be seen with manes eye/ & so endeth the fyfth age of þ worlde/as it were the age oft greued with care & with wo from the Transmygracion of Jewes vnto Cryst/that is from Marche before biennyng of the Temple þ was done in heruelst vnto Marche the .liii. yere of Augustus vnto .xiiii. generacions/ & contepneth .v. C. yere & xli. so sayth Bede. Plyn sayth .v. C. yere & xlv. Elporici sayth .v. C. lxxxix. But the veryest acountes of al seyth .v. C. yere. lxxx. & xi. for Plyn in cronycle of his fyfthe boke hath ouerleped Tholomeus Philometor by

twene Tholomeus Epyphanes & Tholomeus Euergetes the leconde. And oft he ouerlepeþ Tholomeus Sother in þ leconde order of his regnyng þ regned after þ his moder was slayne .viii. yere. And the sixth age of the worlde begyneth from Cryst/the age is not certayne of generacions neyther of yeres but it shalbe endeth as it were by the the last age of all the worlde. Some wyll meane that the sixth age of the worlde began at the Incarnacion of Cryst/by the whiche Incarnacion Cryst vlypced vs & cam downe from heuen. Some acounten the sixth age of the worlde from the byrth of Cryst And for that auctorite of the Apostle whan plente of tyme come/god sende his lone born of a woman. Some acounte from the crystenyng of Cryst/for the vertue þ was yeuen vnto the water to byng forth childern ghostly whan the cyrcucision began to cease. Some acounte from Crystes passion for than was opened the pate of paradys. Than the yeres from the begynnyng of the worlde that was the .xiiii. daye of Apryl/in the whiche daye the worlde began vnto the Incarnacion of Cryst were fyue thousand and two hondred yere so sayth Drosius. But the comyn calculyng sayth fyue thousande & .L. yere .lxxx. and .xvi. Marcus sayth fyue thousande an .L. and nyne. The fyrst Adam synned in a frydaye/and dyed in the same frydaye after nyne hondred yere and thyrty. And in Iuche a frydaye the seconde Adam þ is Cryst toke flesshe & blood and ended his fastyng and suffred deeth for mankynde. And in the same

houre of the frydaye that Adam was put out of paradyle. right in luche an houre the thref was brought in paradyle. ¶ Marianus li. ii. It is nought apenst this that holy chirche holdeth that the fyrst Adam was made of erthe in the .ix. daye before Apryll. And Cryst conceived the .vii. daye to fore Apryll. For the nyght of the .ix. daye before the fyrst daye of Apryll/that come after the daye þ Adam was made in / is now made by Crystes passyon the nyght of the .viii. daye of Apryll þ goth before the daye. For the .viii. day before Apryll of his fyrst parte / is made the .ix. daye before Apryll. And of his last parte þ is the nyght / in þ whiche Cryst was holden & buffed & scornd / is made the .vii. daye afore Apryll than it foloweth þ Cryste suffred the .ix. daye the .viii. daye & the .vii. daye afore Apryll. That maye be shewed by a nother reason. For euery yere the lettre of the daye chaūgeth in the halender / for there is one lettre more than lii. wekes. It is no wonder though the frydaye that was in the begynnyng of the worlde the .ix. daye afore Apryll. Whan Adam was made fylle after so many yeres the .vii. daye afore Apryll whan Cryst suffred deeth that holdeth and approueth loore of grete men. Auctorite of holy chirche / and certayne assaye of calculers. But as saynt Austyn sayth aboue. Apenst reason no sobre man demeth / no Crysten man demeth apenst holy wrytten / no possyble man demeth apenst holy chirche. Also here take hede that saynte Austyn sayth that Cryste laye in the herte of the erthe thre dayes & thre

nyghtes / but not all full & hole thre dayes & thre nyghtes. For Cryst laye in his graue but fourty houres. Soo that he laye in his graue in the laste ende of the fyrst daye for to acounte the fyrste daye of .xxiii. houres with the nyght þ was to the frydaye that Cryste dyed ynn. And Cryste laye in his graue holy all the seconde daye / & the fyrst parte of the thyrde day. And so Saynt Austyn sayth that eche. of these thre dayes had his nyght / loo þ the nyght passed a fore the daye / ther by it semeth that the maystre of the storyes sholde not be foloweth / there he sayth that the nyght that was bytwene the laterdaye & the londaye. of the resurreccion was come both to the laterdaye & also to the londaye. ¶ Lucas and Bera. Thanne Marie arose after that she had conceived & come in to Zacharias Cyte four myle out of Jerusalem / & was there thre monethes & serued her colyn Elyzabeth tyll that she had a childe. And than Marie wente apene in to her owne hous in to Nazareth. ¶ Lucas. Than wolde not her spoule Joseph take her sekerly to his wif for she was foude with childe / tyll the Angell charged hym in his slepe that he sholde take her without drede. ¶ Lucas. That ty me come out a maūdemēt from Cesar Augustus for to descryue all the worlde. ¶ Petrus. Cesar wolde wete the nombre of londes of the worlde þ were subgette to Rome. And also the Cytees of euery londe & the nombre of pollys of euery Cyte / and bad that out of subarbes of Cytees of small townes & grete / & out of euery contree

and afterwarde euery man holde de parte home ii. his owne Lyte that he come of/ & had of his byrthe. And euery man holde take a penny of syluer of the valowe of the ten pens that were tho vled/ to the steward of the propynce/ & knowleche hym selfe subget to the Emperour of Rome. ¶ Lucas. Therfore Ioseph wente out of Nazareth in to Bethlehem that was his Lyte with his wyfe Marye that was with childe for to knowleche there. And there Marye was delyuered and had a childe. ¶ Petrus. Than in the ende of .xlii. yere of Augustus the lasterdaye at nyght that than folowed the dape the .xliii. yere of age of Marye the seuenth dape afore Janyuere Cryst was born at Bethlehem. And than the .viii. dape after he was circūcyded in a sondape. The .xii. dape after the byrth was the Epyphany. & felle in a frydape the .vi. dape of Janyuere/ than come the kynges & worshypped Cryst. And after that forty dapes after y natypte in a thursday the seconde dape of feuerere Cryst was presented in y Temple/ in mynde therof is Landelmasse dape. After that by warnynge of the Angell that warned Ioseph in his sleep/ he fledde in to Egypte with his moder. And Ioseph was there .vi. yere vnto Herodes deth. Herodes cast for to sle all the childern by cause of Cryst/ for he wolde be sekter of hym among other. Whan Cryst entred in to Egypt the mawmettes ouerthrewe & fylle downe. ¶ R. Than to the .vii. dape afore Apryll y was the frydape in the whiche Cryst was conceived to the nyght

of the sondape in whiche Cryst was born/ were to hondred dapes thre score & .xvi. the whiche nombre of dapes maketh nyne monethes of the mone and six dapes. So that euery moneth be of .xxx. dapes as men accounted in olde tyme. These nyne monethes and six dapes be assygned to women that gooth with childe/ as it were ten monethes/ though not all women go with childe to this sixte dape. As yet was loth of Sapnt Johan Baptyst & of Sapnt Marye that had one day lasse than Cryst in the moder wombe ¶ R. And for of the comynge to gyders of yeres of Cryst and of kynges the begynnynge & the endes be vncerteyne and full oft falle grete doubttes in acountynge of yeres. And also of the yeres of our loide/ what yere he was baptyled/ what yere Cryst suffred deth. Auctors speken dyuersely. Therfore for to put away all maner doute/ take hede by Bedas libro de temporibus/ that the Romayns before Numa Pompilius tyme began the yere in Marche as the Hebrewes don But from Numaes tyme that putte two monethes to the yere Janyuere and feuerere/ the Romayns begynne the yere in the begynnynge of Janyuere. Holy chirche in the west londes foloweth them in y comyn kalender/ & in the yere that is moost vled. But the Grekes y brought vp Olympias begynnen the yere from the shorteste dape of the wynter/ but the Hebrewes begynnen the yere in Marche whan the dape & the nyght be lyke long/ for that tyme the worlde was first made But the Egyptians begynnen the ye

des / as Arabes & Taldces begynnen
the yere after the gaderynge of wyne
& corn & of fruyte / whan þ tethynge
ben brought in to the Temple in the
begynnynge of October whan þ daye
& the nyght be lyke longe in heru:ste
tyme. As yet semeth Ezechielis bys-
on there he speketh of the fourth mo-
neth & the fyfthe daye of the moneth
Amonge them October was the fyrst
moneth & Ianuere the fourth ¶ R.
It is sayd þ dyuerse men haue dyuer-
te begynnynge of yeres. & yet ouer þ co-
meth dyuerse yeres by some happe þ
there falleth & begynneth in dyuerse
tymes of the yere þ we moost vñ/as
yet is of yeres of kynges that begyn-
nen to regne in dyuerse tymes of the
yere þ we moost vñ. yet we acoüte the
yeres of our lord in two maner wyle
other by his byrthe or by his age. And
also whyle Cryst was born in the en-
de of þ yere þ we vñ by the sonne / he
had of the fyrst yere of his byrth but
seuen dayes from the natyure to yeres
day. But the fyrst yere of his age
of .xii. monethes by his cours from the
xxv. daye of December to the same
daye .xii. monethes is fulfilled the se-
conde yere of his byrth. And so in the
fyrst yere of his age / he fulfilled all
moost two yere of his byrth. And the
seconde yere of his byrth is the fyrste
yere of his age / therfore yet is þ the ye-
res of the byrth of our lord by þ cours
of the sonne be nyghe .xxiiii. yere &
an halfe. And the yeres of his age ny-
ghe .xxiiii. yere & an halfe / & he was
baptysed in his .xxx. yere of age and
the .xxxi. yere of his byrth. for to acoü-

te that yere with the laste parte that
all mooste an halfe yere. It is loth
that Cryst preched four yere. & specya-
ly thre yere & an halfe by the Gospell
of Saynt Johan. And so Cryst suff-
red deeth in the .xxiiii. yere of his age
and in the .xxiiii. yere of his byrth.
¶ R. Than in the .xlii. yere of Octa-
uianus / in the whiche yere Cryst was
born began in Marche and endeth in
Marche. Therfor that yere began in
the thyrde yere of Olympias nyne sco-
re and .xiiii. and endeth in the fourth
yere of the same Olympias in þ mo-
neth of Marche. And for the wyle do-
me of oure lord ordeyned his byrth
there the Grekes begynnen the yere
with the Olympias / therfore the ye-
res of oure lord begynne and ende
with the Olympias. But the yeres of
kynges & of Emperours begynne &
ende certaynly but right selde / therfo-
re it is hard to acoüte them with Olym-
pias eyther with yeres of our lord
de / for they begynne oft in one yere of
the Olympias and ende in a nother.
Than the kyngdom of Augustus is
acounted in Marche. And Cryst be-
gynneth his fyrst yere of his byrth in
the ende of Augustus .xlii. yere / than
the .xlii. yere of Augustus begynneth
in the fyrst yere of the age of Cryste /
and the .xliii. yere of Augustus in the
seconde of the age of Cryst. & is .xliiii
yere in the thyrde & so forth.

welle of oyle sprang beyonde
Cyber out of the tauerne Es

meritoria/and ranne all a dape/and a cerle was seey aboute the sonne. ¶ Treuila. knyghtes of Rome after sixty yere lefte dedes of armes & were called knyghtes of the chyualrye emeritoria/& spende what they had in a tauerne beyonde Tyber. And therfor that tauerne was called taberna Emeritoria. ¶ Marcus The ymage of golde felle downe þ Romulus had sette in his palays & layd/hit shall not falle tyll a mayde bere a childe. Also the Temple of peas fylle downe in Rome. And Jerom vpon that worde /lyght is aryle to the rightfull sayth þ all the Sodomytes in all the worlde were destroyed. ¶ Petrus. Whyle Herodes arayed for the childerns dech/ he was sompned by a maüdemment of Cezar for to come to Rome for to answer to the poyntes that his owne sonnes put vpon hym Alysandre & Arystobolus. for there were thre Herodes of grete name for her euill dedes/ take hede that þ fyrst was Herodos Alcalonita/& had that name of the Lyte Alcalon/for he full buylde that Lyte. And in this Herodes tyme Cryste was born & the childern were slayne. The seconde hete Herodes Antypas/ and was the fyrst Herodes sone. In his tyme Johan baptist was beheded & Cryst suffred dech. The thyrde hete Herodes Agrippa Arystobolus sone. Arystobolus was the fyrst Herodes sone. This Herodes Agrippa slowe James & pyloned peter/therfor ben verles made. Alcalonita sleeth childern/and Antypas Johan baptist. Agrippa slowe James/and pyloned Peter. The fyrst Herodes whan

he sawe that his sonnes Alysandre & Arystobolus stroof the bolder with her fader for the herytage of þ kyng/ dome by cause of theyr lettrure / he had Indygnacion therof and fonded to put his eldest sone Antypater afore them both / whyle they treated of theyr faders dech/they were put away & wente to Cezar for to playne of the wronge þ theyr fader had doo them. The meane tyme the thre kynges come to Jerlm & come not agayne to Herodes by the same waye. Herodes trowed þ they had begyled hym & tored agayn ashamed, therfor he withdrowe his wyll/& slough not the childern for to do hem to dech. But for þ cytacion of Cezar. he wente to Rome & come by Charles & brient theyr shippes/for the kynges come ouer see ther Inne. Than after a yere & sonewhat more of dapes after þ byrth of Cryst he com from Rome and was acorded with his sonnes/& therfore he was the bolder.& helde the more sure þ kyng/ dome and slough all the childern of Bethlem about the age of Cryst that he wyll was thenne .xii. moneth olde vnto two yere olde & with Inne. that is to meanyng from the childeren of two yere olde to the childeren of one nyght olde. Amonge the whiche one of his owne childern was slayne that was perauecture take to nouysshynge But Methodius sayth / that þ was done by goddes owne dome & his ordenaüce / for he that had be recte soo many men theyr childern / sholde be by recte of his owne childern also. for his sonnes Arystobol⁹ & Alysandre were est suspect/for they had behote mes

Augustus. dylcepuable coueytose of lordshyp & player at the dyces. and though he were a grete eter & drynker of wyne / yet he absteyned hym from slepe / & vled lecherpe / so that name and fame was couēted therof among the comyn people. ¶ For he was wonte to lye by twene twelue luche that wold lyghte ly assente to synne / and bytweyne .xii. maydens / & he dyde awaye his wyf Scribonia. and wedded one Linia. as it were by graunt & assent of her husband. His sones were Tyberius & Drusus / & though he were a grete lecher / yet he toke grete wreche of lecherpe. ¶ Seneca. The Romayns lawe that this was so fayre / & wolde haue made hym a god / but he forsoke it & wolde not assente / & axed therof counseyll of Sybylla Tyburtina / & after the fastyng of thre dayes she answered hym in this maner. Token of domeerthe shall waxe wete by swote / oute of heuen shall come the kyng that last shall euer. And so forth of many verses that be not here wryten. ¶ Augustinus li. xviii. ca.° xliiii. The hede letres of the verses spebeth this menyng. Iesus Cryst goddes sone sauour ¶ Marcus. Anone heuen opened. and Cesar lawe a fayre mayde stonde vpon an aulter & hold a childe in her armes / & he herde this voys / this is the aulter of goddes sone. And anone Cesar fylle downe to the erthe vpon the floore of his chambie / there was afterwarde buylde a chyrche of our lady & is called in Ara celi / that is in the aulter of heuen. ¶ Gal. iii. Tyberius tolde to Augustus that me spake moche euill by hym all daye. And he answered

and sayd. We take none Indygnacōn though men speke euill by vs. It is ynough to vs that they may do vs none harme. ¶ Pol. li. iii. c.° xliii. Anthonius despyled Augustus kynne in the moder syde / and called hym baker by kynde. And Augustus lough and lete the same Anthonius be wedded to his syster. Also ones for the shortenselle of his bodye / one called hym dwarf. I must quoth he vled wyde holes & shoon. ¶ Marc. in Satur. Augustus passed by the waye / & one called hym a Tyraunt / and I were a Tyraunt sayd he / thou woldest not calle me so. It was sayd in Rome / that noo man sholde be doo to dethe / neyther to payne as oft as Augustus entred in to the Lyte. Also somtyme one come in Rome that was moost lyke Augustus in all maner poyntes and was brought before Augustus / & Augustus asked hym and sayd / save me yonge man / was thy moder euer in Rome / naye quoth he / but my fader was full oft. The Emperour was not wroth therfore / but made hym ryche and sente hym home agayne. ¶ Seneca de clemēcia. Whan Tynnas treason was knowe. Cesar washed all that nyght / than his wyf Linia spake to hym in this maner. Take counseyll of a woman / and do by womans counseyll / and do as physycyens vble to do / there comyn medycynes that me vled maye not helpe / they assaye oft medycynes that be contrarye. Tynnas treason is knowe now / he maye not greue the / forpeue hym the trespass / he maye profyte to thy lōse & to thy fame. Cesar was glad of

the counseyll and of this rede/and bad
 bynge Cynna afore hym at morowe
 & spake to hym in this maner. Cyn-
 na I fonde the myne enemye in pa-
 uylons and tentes and saued thy lyfe
 I graunted to the rentes & rycheesses/
 and made the homely with me. Now
 est I gyue thy lyfe/ fyrst to myne ene-
 mye/and now to me traytour & man-
 sleer. from this dape forthwarde vs
 frendshype shal begynue. Now stryue
 we whether. I haue gyue the thy lyfe
 by a better sayth than thou owest me
 eyther y owest me better sayth than
 thy lyfe is saued by. Afterwarde he
 made hym Consul & helde hym his
 trusty frende/and atte last Cesar was
 made his heyr. ¶ Marc. iij. Satur. An
 olde man that was in peryll of dome
 came to Augustus & prayed hym of
 helpe for to stande by hem and Augu-
 stus ordeyned hym anone a noble ad-
 uocate/than y olde man cryed & sayd
 O Cesar whan thou were in peryl in
 the batayll of Actia. I sought noman
 to put in my stede. but I my self fough-
 te for the & shewed hym the woundes
 that were seen in his bodye/than Ce-
 sar was ashamed & come anone and
 pleted for hym. not oonly that he wol-
 de not beholden proude / but also for
 he wolde not be holden vnkynde. Al-
 so Cesar cam from y vycroie of Actia
 and one met hym with a popenyape
 on his honde that he taught to sape/
 heyll Cesar vycroie & Emperour / the
 Emperour wondred & bought that
 myrr byrde for twenty thousande of
 pens. Also a pye grette him in the sa-
 me maner. and he wondred & bought
 hym also/and so dyde a stare/& won-

dred & bought the stare/than a poore Anno grē
 loutoz fode to teche a chough to speke Augustus.
 and sayd the same salutacion & whan
 he had spente what he had & y chough
 answerde not/he vled for to say allas
 all is lost trauayl & cost. But arte last
 the chough began to speke & sayd the
 same salutacion/& Cesar passed by &
 herde it & sayd/we haue at home su-
 che salutacions ynough. Allas sayd y
 chough as it fylle in the mynde / all
 is lost trauayll and colt / than Cesar
 lough and bought the chough derrer
 than ony of all the other. Also a Gre-
 ke that was a grete maker / vled to
 make noble dytees in praylyng of Ce-
 sar/and wrote & gaue hem to Cesar
 and whan he had oft done so without
 ony mede. Cesar made suche endyryn-
 ge of praylyng & gaue to the Greke
 that hadde prayled hym / the Greke
 radde the dyte with semblaunt & with
 boys and profered to gyue Cesar mo-
 neye/than all man lough & had good
 game/& Cesar bad his spenser gyue
 y Greke a grete dele of moneye. ¶ Eu-
 tropius li. vii. Atte last Cesar dyed at
 Nola in Campania/& all men cryed
 and sayd/wolde god that he had ne-
 uer be born. other that he neuer sholde
 dye. The man was lyke god. in ba-
 tayll was noman more gracypous ney-
 ther more skylfull in peas. ¶ Pot. li.
 sexto. Augustus wolde sape the same
 counseyll is ayenst the enemye / that
 is ayenst sekenesse/for they ben more
 ouercome with honger than with pren
 Also he made his sones vle them to
 renne to lepe and to vle of castynge.
 And he made his doughters vle them
 to wulle craft to spyne on a dystaf /

16 1 Tyberius. **T**yberius was Augustus step-
 lone/and wedded his doughter and began to regne in the moneth of September/in the whiche moneth Augustus was deed and Tyberius reigned .xxiii. yere & somwhat of dayes. **E**utropius. This fyrste governed the Emppre with grete lo-
 biensse/so that whan some men cou-
 seypled hym to take grete trybute of prouynces and londes. He answerde & sayd / it falleth for a good shepherde to shere his sheep. & not for to swolow them/this was fyrst wyle and redye ynough / and gracypous in armes. A man of grete conyng of lecture & of castyng/euer awaytynng and aspepe-
 yng & what he nolde/he made it as though he wolde. To them that he loued he made it as though he were wrothe/and to them that he hated he ses-
 med goodly/he wolde reue better an-
 swer & counseyll sodenly and with-
 out auylemente/than with grete auy-
 semente. He sente for some kynges & made them com to hym by flaterynng and sente them neuer agayne. This was called Tyberius nero/but myn-
 strals called hym a fayre name Ty-
 beri^o mero/for he was oft wyne dron-
 ke. Also this by cause of some lettres that pylate sente hym wolde haue be-
 worshipped as god almyghty but the
 Senatours sayd naye/and therfor he
 exiled many of the elder men & chole
 hym counseyllours and lette vnnethe

tweyn of them in good bele. Et he we-
 re Emperour he was wyle and redye
 in armes / but afterwarde he warded
 by messagers. **P**ol. li. iii. ca. iiii. He
 was gretely to blame in many of his
 dedes / but ayenst chydyng he was
 stedfast & sayd / that mennes tonges
 and hertes holde be free in the Cyte:
Josephus. This was stedfast in
 all his dedes/so that vnnethe he wol-
 de chaunge procuratours that he had
 made ones in prouynces & in londes.
 He axed why that he dyd soo/he ans-
 werde and sayd / that in that doynge
 he spared the people/for euer the lasse
 tyme sayd he procuratours haue lord-
 shyp ouer the people they ben the mo-
 re greuous. And preued y by ensam-
 ple of one that was wounded & lette
 in the sonne/and wolde not do away
 the flies that late on his woundes/
 than come one of his frendes & dros-
 ue awaye the flies/for he wende that
 the seke may myght not suffre for fee-
 ble. Thou hast done euyll sayd the se-
 ke may / for the flies that thou halte
 dryue awaye were full / and therfore
 they ete well the lasse / but now com-
 men hongry flies and wyll byte full
 soze. Soo newe offycers greuey worse
 the people that is vnder them. **P**ly-
 dorus li. vi. ca. xv. He sayth that in
 Tyberius tyme a craftes man hadde
 fonde vp a craft of tempryng of glas
 to make the glas towe ynough to ben-
 de and wynde and to retche out with
 strokes of hamers. The Emperour
 brake some of his glas/and he amen-
 ded it agayne/and bende it & bowed
 it as it were tyn. Than theemperour
 lerned of this craftes man/that there

was none other man a lyue that soo coude temple glas/and had smyte of the craftes mannes hede / for yf that craft were knowen/golde and other precyous metall sholde be of no pryce. Duidius Also the poete dyed in the Flonde Pontus belydes the Sarmates & the Gothes the fourth yere of his exylng. This made fyrst a booke of the craft of loue/and made the Romayns wrothe with hym / for he made ponglynges to loue wyues to moche. Therfore he sayd in his booke de Ponto. Also not wyle ynough/tescheth slepyght of loue crafte/ylle pryce of looze/therfore than had the mayster. He sayth that atte laste Duidius laye by the Emperesse/and therfore he was exiled. That yere Pylatus was made Juge in the Jurye/of his byrth and of his lyupng me redeth many wondres. For a kyng that hete Tyrrus gate a sone on one Pyla a mylwardes doughter that hete Atus / & the sone had a name made of the name of his moder Pyla/and the name of his grauntfyr Atus/and so he was called Pylatus. This Pylatus was sente to his fader in his fourth yere of age. His fader had a sone by her that was his rightfull wyf.the whiche sone & Pylate were of one age.but this lawfull sone had maystrye of Pylatus in euery place and stryfe/therfore Pylatus was wroth & slew his owne brod therfore þ kyng þ was his fader sente Pylatus to Rome to lye there to plegge for trybute that he sholde euery yere paye to the Romayns. Also the same tyme þ hpynges sone of fraunce laye in plegge at Rome/& Pylatus

slewe hym.foz he had oft maystrye in playes and in stryf. Therfore the Romayns demed that Pylatus was profitable to the empyre to chastyle fro warder men and sterne/and sente him in to the Flonde of Pontus to be Juge to chastyle men that were there/that wolde with good wyll ouer them no Juge relcepye neyther suffre amonge them. But that shrewe Pylatus chastyled them with punysshynge / with manaces / and with sayre byhestes / therfore he had a name of that Flonde and was called Poncius Pylatus. Herodes Antypas hadde Joye of his wychednesse and sente messagers and gyftes and drowe hym to hym / and made hym prynce vnder hym in the Jurye. But Pylatus atte last gadred moche moneye and wente to Rome vnwetyng Herodes for to recepye the offyce of Tyberius that he held of Herodes / and by cause therof they were encmyes Herodes and Pylatus to the tyme of Cristus passyon/whan Pylatus sente Ihesus clothed in whyte to Herodes. That tyme Tyberius Cesar that was the emperour had an harde sekenesse / & herde telle þ at Jerusalem was a leche that heled seke men oonly with a worde. Therfore Tyberius sente one Volucianus to Herodes þ he sholde sende hym þ leche. Pylatus had .xiii. dayes auyement to gyue his answer/foz Ihesus was aforehonde nayled to the crosse. The forsayd Volucianus toke a queyntaunce & knowleche of a noble woman that hete Veronica/so þ he brought her to Rome to theperour w^{ch} her lynney cloth in þ whiche clothe he had the prynte

Anno grē & the lyhenes of our lordes face. The
 Tyberius. Emperour behelde this clothe & was
 hole anone. Whan theemperour wylte
 that Pylatus had dampned Cryst. Pylatus was take by a maūdement of
 theemperour & brought to Rome befo
 re theemperour. & had on hym Cristes
 owne kyrtell þ was without lemes &
 was called tunica inconsutilis/ & Pylatus was brought in this araye afore
 theemperour ones eft & the thyrde tyme/ but no worde myght be sayd þ he
 sholde greue whyle he had on þ clothe
 but atte last by goddes wyl & coulepyll
 of some Crysten men þ kyrtell was ta
 ke of hym/ & than he was put in pry
 son/ & there he sloughe hym self with
 his owne honde. Of Pylatus dech lo
 he within in Caius last yere. ¶ Petr⁹
 That tyme were thre sectes of Jewes
 in þ Jurpe scuered & departed from þ
 comyn lpyung of other men. The sec
 tes were Pharysees Saducees & Al
 layes þ hete Alldeyes also. The Pha
 rysees wered & vled harde clothyng
 & scarlypte of mete & of drynke / they
 determyned moyles lawe by her orde
 nauice & statutes/ they bare scrowes in
 her forhede & in her lyft armes/ & cal
 led the scrowes Philaterna. In þ scro
 wes were þ .x. cōmaūdementes wryte
 in mynde of the lawe. Also they had
 large hemmes boude with thornes þ
 pryched them as they wente in theyr
 waye/ they withsayd neuer theyr loue
 reyns. Also they hoped in a rylung of
 bodyes from dech to lpye. The Sadu
 cees denyed the arylunge of bodyes
 from dech to lpye & sayd þ they none
 Angels were/ they trowed þ the soules
 dyed with the bodyes/ they helde only

Moyles fyue bookes/ and for they we
 re to cruell & not compenable among
 them selfe/ they called them selfe Sa
 ducees þ is rightfull. The Alldeyes
 lpyed well nyghe in alle poyntes as
 men of relygion & forloke wedlocke/
 but it were fullelde / for they trowed
 that none woman was trewe to her
 husbonde / her clothes were clene al
 waye/ they had no certayne Lyte. afo
 re the sonne ryluge they spake noo
 thyng that was vnlauffull/ they wor
 shipped the sonne whan he dyde aryl
 se/ they spake not at theyr mete/ they
 hated othes as it were for swerynge/
 they toke noman to theyr secte but by
 þ assaye of one yere/ yf they toke ony
 of her Lyte with synne/ they put hym
 awaye for to ete gras as beestes done
 in penaūce to his lpyes ende / though
 ten of them late cogys none of them
 wolde speke a worde without leue of
 the nyne / they wolde not spete in the
 myddell of the companye neyther in
 the ryght syde. They helde the later
 daye soo holy that they wolde that
 daye dresse no mete/ neyther tende fy
 re neyther sette a vessell oute of one
 place in to a nother / and also they
 wolde not shyte in þ laterdaye. ¶ Jo
 sephus li. ii. Other dayes they wolde
 drygge the erthe without thwyttell &
 make hem a pytte and let fall her clo
 thes aboute them and hele all aboute
 whan they wolde shyte / for me shol
 de wene that they dyde wronge to the
 sonne beme/ & whan they had shyted
 they wolde fylle þ pytte agayne with
 the same erthe that they had drygged
 vp of the same pytte/ these lpyed lon
 gest of all men/ for they lpyed scarles

ly and dede none surfete of mete and of drynke. They crowed that all the soules were made atte begynnynge & put in bodyes whan it were tyme And some of them wolde telle what was to come / for they forloke fleshely lyf / lyngge as it were an euyll doynge / & despyled rycheffe. Here londe & what they hadde was comyn among them all / they bargayned not amonge hem / but euery hadde frely of other what hym neded / they rougt not of none opymentes. They chaunged neuer hosen & shoon nother clothyngge / but whan they were I fore other spente / they helde hospytalyte / they had one maner mete / they prayed afore mete & after. In her hous was neuer herde crye nother noyle / none of them thold not gyue without ordenaunce of the comyn spencis. They helde al theyr lawes strengier than ony other he þ sholde be recepued to abyde among them after his yere of assaye he sholde swe re to kepe fapth to god / right wysnesse to men & obedyence to pynces / & yf it happed hym somtyme to be aboute & ouer other / he sholde not myfule his power & his might in damage & wronge of subgettes / but he sholde chastyle lyers with all his myght. To here dome sholde come no lasse than an .C. persones / the dome of hem sholde stonde stedfast & not be chaunged.

From the .xv. yere of Tyberius to the fyrst yere of Adam / for to acounte backwarde were fyue thousande yeres so sayth Euse-

bi⁹ / and so many yeres make .lx. yere Anno grē of grace / & so by his tale the .xvi. yere of Tyberius was the begynnynge Tyberius. of the yere of grace sixty & one. But the seuenty saye that from Adam to the .xv. yere of Tyberius were fyue thousande two hondred & .xxv. But the Hebrewes tellen fyue thousande / therfore some men wyl mene þ that yere began the .vi. thousand / for than the circūcision ceaced & crystendom began. Other begynne from thyncarnation of Cryst. Also that yere Johan began to preche & baptyse / and bapty sed Cryst the .vi. daye of Janyuere the daye of the shewyng of our lord And that daye twelue moneth he forned water in to wyne. ¶ Petr⁹. Therfore in olde bokes / that daye is called the daye of shewynges in the plurell nombre / for that daye fyile many dyuerse shewynges and had dyuerse names / for in the same daye in dyuerse yeres were do thre grete shewynges. The fyrst hete Epyphania & is a name made of epy þ is aboute & phanos þ is shewyng / as it were a shewyngge made from aboute as it were a sterre / þ seconde hete Theophania & þ name is made of Theos þ is god & phanos that is shewyng / as it were shewyngge made of god in baptylyng of Cryst by a douue. The thyrde hete bethphania / & that is made of bethe that is an hous. & of phanos that is shewyngge / as it were a shewyngge made in an hous by tournyng of water in to wyne. ¶ R. And some men meane that that daye two yere was the myracle do of the fyue loues and two fysshes / and hete sagephania / that name is

Anno grē made of fagyn that is ete/ē phanos
 that is lhwpyng / for þ myracle was
 Tyberius. doo in feynyng of men. Also that se/
 conde yere as Luke and Jerom sayth
 30 14 Cryst began the .xxx. yere of age loo
 sayth the Gospell. Ihesus was be/
 gynnyng as it were .xxx. yere. ¶ Cryst
 lostomus Marianus. And comyn me
 nyng of holy churche/ē Eusebius in
 hystoria ecclesiastica. meneth þ than
 Cryst began his .xxxi. yere hole/and
 as moche as was from the natpuyte
 to the passyon tyme / than Cryste the
 mondaye next after his baptyrn was
 ladde in to wylthernelle by the spryft.
 and began his fastyng and fasted
 forty dayes/and ended his fastyng
 in a frydaye the .xv. daye of feuerere
 that daye he ouercam the deuyll that
 tempted hym/in the whiche daye the
 deuyll had ouercome and supplanted
 Adam the fyrst man. Than the next
 Ester after as trewe looze telleth / he
 drofe ē chaced sellers and byers oute
 of the Temple. In the same yere af
 ter he called ē chele his dyscyples An/
 drew. Peter. Philip. Nathanael. The
 next yere after. he tourned water in to
 wyne in a .xii. daye. And after that
 Beda telleth Cryst and his dyscyples
 baptyled in the Jorde. And the next
 Ester after Johan was enpyloned.
 Also in an holy feste Cryst heled in a
 32 14 xxxviii. yere. And after that in the sa
 me yere he wente vp in the hylle there
 he chele the twelue apostles and sente
 them for to preche. And loo it semeth
 that thre gospelers þ telle the doynge
 of Cryst after the pylonyng of Jo/
 han Baptyst. leueth vnfolde almost

the doynge of one yere afore the pyllo
 nyng/but Johan the euangelyst spe
 keth lasse of other thynges ē telleth þ
 doynge ē dedes how Ihesus tornd
 water in to wyne/how Nychodemus
 come to Iesus by nyght/ē how Je
 sus drofe out the sellers of the Tem
 ple. After þ atte thyrde ester Johan
 was byheded whan he had be pyllo
 ned all a yere. Atte fourth ester Cryst
 suffred deth. ¶ Petrus. L. xi. The .xi.
 boke Ecclesiastice hystorie telleth that
 Johan was byheded at Macheronta
 a castell of Arabia/his bodye was bu
 ryed at Sebasten þ is Samaria / his
 hede was burped at Jerlm belydes
 Herodes hous for drede lest he wolde
 aryse from deth to lyue yf the hede we
 re burped with þ bodye. Mysbyleuyd
 men deuyded his boones and threwe
 them a brode in Julianus apostates
 tyme/for they hadde enuye to the my
 racles that he wrought. And they ga
 dred agayn the bones togyder ē bren
 te them and wynewed the askes a/
 waye with the wynde / that doynge
 some men now acounteth as it were
 the seconde martyrdome of the deed
 man/they wylte not what they dyde.
 In þ fest of his natpuyte whyle they
 gadred his bones togedres and bren
 te them as ferforth as they myght. And
 whyle that mysbyleuyd men gadred
 Johannes bones / men of Jerusa/
 lem were medled among them and to
 ke with them a grete dele of the bo
 nes / amonge the whiche dele of the
 bones was the fynge that Johan
 nes shewed Cryste with. Afterwarde
 Saynt Tecla brought þ fynge vnto
 alpes. Alpes ben hpe hylles in lombard

dy syde. That fynger is now in mo-
ris mynster as it is sayd / but the bo-
nes were sent to Athanasius byshop
of Alplaudre. In Marciā⁹ the pry-
ces tyme. Johan warned two mon-
kes of his heede & tolde were it laye.
The monkes were of the east londes
and were come to Jerusalem for to
bydde & praye. Neuerthelesse the hede
was longe lost by vnconnyng / & was
leyde in a den in fenicia / tyll h̄ Jo-
han este tolde where his heede laye to
Marcellus the abbot that dwelled in
the same den. And than afterwarde
the feest of the byhedynge began to be
holden in the same Lyte h̄ same daye
that the hede was fouūden & take vp of
the erthe. Oher telleth that it is not
the feest of the Decollacō of behedyn-
ge / but of the colleccion of the gade-
ryng of the bones that was rather do
& of the brennyng. Than Theodoli-
us the Emperour brought the hede to
Konstantynople. And thens it was
brought in to fraūce & is oft shewed
to pylgrymes at amycns.

ORyft suffred dech. vii. day afo-
re Apryll. Cassiodor⁹ sayth. h̄
daye was a grete Eclips of
the sonne / soo that none luche was a-
fore honde neyther after / soo that the
sterres were seen in heuen / and erthe
shakyng in Bythinia were throwen
downe many Lytees. ¶ Also the
stones were cloue / therfore it semeth
that veynes & clyftes that nowe ben
seen in quareys & in roches & in roc-
kes come of h̄ erthe shakyng / for befo-

re that tyme stones were hole without Anno grē
clyftes. ¶ Joseph⁹. That yere in the Tyberius.
whytelondaye prestes in the Temple
hadde strynges and noyle of places.
Thanne they herde a voys breke out
sodeynly faste by the Temple h̄ sayd
passe we out of these leges. Also h̄ ye-
re about Pentecost h̄ is whytelonetyde
the apostles ordeyned the lasse James
Alpheus sone byshop of Jerusalem
he longe fyrst masse amonge them / &
ruled the byshopryche at Jerusalem
xxx. yere. There were ordeyned seuen
dekens. Steuen. Philip. Procouis. Ny-
chamoz. Timoz. Permenas. & Nycho-
las. Nycholas stode not as he sholde /
but he made his wyfe comyn to all h̄
wolde haue h̄r. ¶ Eusebius in hysto-
ria ecclesiastica li. iii. This Nycholas
had a fayr wyf & was blamed of the
apostles / as though he were Jelous &
he brought forth his wyf / and yf ony
man wolde lye by her he wolde suffre
it. In symple and Innocent doyng
though some folowed dyuerse lecher-
rye / yet Nycholas dyde yet in despyl-
ynge of the dyce of Jelousye. and not by
wyll to teche men to desyre fleshely
lykynge / and namely for his sones &
doughters lyued chaste to her lyues
ende / and also he hym selfe toke no-
ne other wyfe after his fyrste wyfe.
¶ R. Of this James take hede that
he had four surnames and so he is na-
med Jacob⁹ Alphey / for he was Al-
pheus sone our lordes brother / for he
was moost lyke to our lorde in holy-
nesse and in face / soo that many men
were begyled in the lykynesse of
them two. And therefore Judas gafe
the Jewes a sygne of a cusse lest they

Anno grē were deceyued in takynge of Cryste.
 Tyberius. Alfo he is called the lasse James. for
 the other was Sebedeus lone/though
 he were yonger than he for he was ra
 ther called of Cryst/ & is called þ mo
 re James. & that maner is vled in the
 churche of Rome & in many relygy
 gions/so that he þ cometh fyrst is cal
 led the more / & he is called rightfull
 for the worthynesse of passynge holy
 nesse. This was alwaye holy & clene
 mayde from the tyme þ he was fyrst
 born / he dranke neuer wyne neyther
 syder neyther tasted flesshe. yren come
 neuer on his hede/he vled neuer oyle
 neyther bathes. for grete knelyng his
 knees were as the soles of his fete/he
 allone had leue to entre in to the ho
 lyest place of the Temple/fyrst of al
 he longe a masse. In þ good frydaye
 whan Cryst dyed he made his auowe
 that he wolde neuer ete er Cryst were
 aryle. The people fonded well fast to
 touche þ hemme of his clothes. That
 yere bytwene the Assencion that is ho
 ly thurldaye & whytelondaye Mathi
 as was cholen & made Apostle in ste
 de of Judas the traytour. Of hem it
 is wyrtyn in a storie/though the auc
 tor therof is vnknowen. A man was
 in Jerusalem that hete Ruben as Je
 rom seyth of the lygnage of Blachar
 his wyf hete Lyborea. In a nyghte
 whan they had payed dette of wedlo
 ke eyther to other/þ woman dremed
 that she had bore an ylle lone þ shold
 be traytour of his owne people. The
 childe was born & called Judas / &
 the fader & the moder were a gryled
 for to flee the childe other for to nou
 rysh the hym vp that shold destroye his

owne people/therfore they put hym in
 a tytyll cryb shape as a boote & dyde
 hym in to the see/ & soo he come in to
 an Flonde that hete Scarioth / there
 the quene of the Flonde had noo chil
 dern & fonde the cryb & the childe &
 feyned her selfe with childe/and laye
 & feyned that she had childe. But not
 longe after the quene conceived & ye
 de with childe by the kyng. Whan the
 childe was born & come to age. Judas
 greued hym full ofte & made him we
 pe full ofte / but all for nought/for it
 was not worth the whyle. Atte last it
 come oute that Judas was not the
 kynges lone . And thanne he slough
 pryuely the kynges lone and dradde
 the payne and fledde to Jerusalem
 with men that were trybutarpe/and
 put them to Pylatus courte that was
 than Justyce . And for thynges that
 be lyke a corde to geders . Judas had
 soone grete fauour of Pylatus . In
 a daye Pylatus looked out of his pa
 lays in to Rubens Orcharde that so
 chely was Judas fader. And Pylatus
 hadde. lvyng to the apples/therfore
 he sente Judas to gader hym of the
 apples/than Ruben come and mette
 hym/and after the stryfe and strokes
 Judas vp with a stone and smote
 Ruben on the hede & slough his ow
 ne fader. But Judas fledde pryuely
 awaye after that euyl dede. And ther
 for men trowed that Ruben was so
 deynly deed. Than Pylatus gaue to
 Judas all Rubens catell/and he ga
 ue Lyborea to be Judas wyf. Than
 in a daye Lyborea made grete mone
 before Judas of her wreched & sorow
 full lyf/how she had put her yong so

ne in to the see Aremes. how she losse
 her bulbond sodeynly & how she was
 marped ayenst her wylle. And soo it
 was knowen þ̄ Judas had slayn his
 owne fader / & wedded his owne mod
 Therfor by counseyll of Epbozea Ju
 das folowed Cryste. þ̄ his trespas were
 forgeue. And soo Judas was Cryste
 procurator and his discyple. Also that
 yere after the election of Mathyas /
 and after the sendynge of the holy
 goost er the Apostles wolde goo a
 bout in to dyuerse londes / they come
 to Jerlm toggyders & made the Crede
 & Steuen was stoned to derth six dayes
 a fore Janyuere. That yere Peter þ̄
 apottle Jones sone of the pynnce of
 Galylee of the strete Bethsayda An
 drewes broder began to holde the byl
 shopes see in the east londes. & was bil
 shop there .iiii. yere & longe masses &
 sayd the pater noster. ¶ Jeronimus
 de uiris illustribz. Whan Peter come
 to Antiochia & was byshop there. vii
 yere. Than he come to Rome & was
 there .xxv. yere and .vii. monethes.
 Paull was conuerted / & was with the
 discyples at Damalke vnto after þ̄
 he had recepued crystendō of Ananias
 & thens he wente to Arabia / & thens
 ayene in to Damashe & made thre ye
 res þ̄ holy wryte called many dayes /
 there he was lete downe ouer the wal
 le in a cupe & come in to Jerlm for
 to see Peter. & was with h̄ .xxv. dayes
 & called with hym of the gospell. Af
 terward he come in to the contrees of
 Syrya & of Scilicia & of Alpa & was
 there .xiiii. yere / & whan the .xiiii. ye
 re was done / he come to the apostles
 in to Jerlm. than whan he had appe

led. he come to the emperour in to Ro Anno grē
 me / there without the Lyte he hurd Tyberius.
 & conyn bern & taught therein þ̄ wor
 des of lyf. Among the whiche Seneca
 þ̄ was Neroes mayster vylted Paull
 not oonly mouth with mouth / but al
 so with lettres & pylles. Perlius the
 poete was born. Tyberius Cesar dyed
 poplened w^t venym þ̄ yere of his age
 lxxviii. as it were the fyrste daye of
 October. ¶ Petrus ca. vi. Tyberius
 knewe þ̄ he sholde dye & called to him
 his neuemes afore other noble men
 Gayus his owne broders sone & Ty
 berius þ̄ he loued moost. þ̄ sone of his
 owne sone Drulus / & ordeyned þ̄ he
 wolde to morowe ordeyne hym a suc
 cessour / & prayed fyrst to her goddes.
 And he ordeyned by hym selfe to put
 afore his owne neuemes / he þ̄ come
 fyrst to him a morow / & warned Ty
 berius pryucly þ̄ he sholde come fyrst
 in all maner wyle. But he was reche
 les at morowe & wolde not come tyll
 he had ete. And Gayus come fyrst &
 had þ̄ empyre. Rymbelinus kyng of
 Brytons dyed & left after hym twey
 sones. Guyderius & Atuyragus / but
 Guyderius had the kyngdom & war
 ned trybute / & so he made þ̄ Romay
 nes arple ayenst hym.

and reigned as it were four yere & nyne monethes & was an ylle dyspoled man. And dented al the same of Tyberius / & made men calle hym god of heuen & of erthe . Therfore he made his ymage sette in þ Temple of Jerusalem. he laye by his owne systres & gate a doughter on that one / & laye by that doughter afterwarde. And at the laste he exiled his systres that he hadde laye by . This the fyrst yere of his Emppre / delyuerd Herodes Agrippa out of pylson & made hym kyng of the Jurpe. Tyberius had pylsoned Herodes Agrippa . The seconde yere of his kyngdome he exiled Herodes Antypa / & Herodias that had lpyed in spoule breche with Herodes Antypa / & Herodes Agrippa accused them The erthe swolowed the wenche that tumbled. But Gayus the thyrde yere of his emppre exiled Pylatus Justyce of the Jurpe / & sente hym in to Wyen. that is in the royaume of fraunce in despyte of his kyng / for he was born there. The Jewes accused Pylatus þ he slough men gyltes / & that he had sette ymages of men of straunge nations in the Temple apenst the wyll of Jewes. Also that he had take mo/ neye of the holy tresorpe / and made a water condyte to his owne hous. Also that he had take the stole of presthodes in to his owne hous & wolde not delyuere hit but for hyre to the prynce of prestes in the holy dayes. Than he was put in pylson / and borowed a knyfe for to pare an appel & slew him selfe therwith / & with his owne honde / & was boude to a grete stone and throwen in to Tyber / than ylle spy/

rytes made Joye with hym that ylle was also / & made pestylence & grete rylng of water / & grete thondryng about that place . Therfore the Romaynes drowe hym out of Tyber & threwe him in to Rone at Wyen / that place was tho graunted the place of corlyng. And also hit hete Vigenia / as it were via that is a waye / and of Jehenne that is the valey of childery of depnesse. But there fylle a pestylence also / & the men of the place burped hym at Lolane / & there also men of the countree were a fraped. & dyde that bodey in a pytte that is bedclypped all about with hylles. Ther is yet harde gryselly bere & noyle. In hylstoria Eccllesiastica it is redde / that the Jewes accused Pylatus to Tyberius. & that Pylatus was bore to Lugdunes in frauce . ¶ R. And that eyther stoye maye be saued without with sayenge for to vnderstande that he was born in to Lugdunes after the accusacōn of the Jewes / & that after Volulianus was come agayne from Jerusalem / he called hym out of the exilyng for to haue harder dampnacion. ¶ Eusebius & Beda withnesseth þ Pylatus slewe him self with his owne honde.

OLaudius the eame of Gayus & of Drulus / whan Gayus was slayne was made Emperour by sleight & helpe of Herodes Agrippa. and began to regne in Lamelle moneth. & reigned as it were. xv yere . The dedes of this be selde in mynde / but that he made þ Brytons

subgette / for he gaue hym alwaye to mete and drynke & lecherye out of measure. And cast hym to make a lawe to excuse all þe behynde let go a blast / for somtyme he spared it to moche & fell in grete peryll. ¶ Josephus li. xx. This Claudius had thre wyues / the fyrste hete Petyna & he gate on her a doughter that hete Antompde. Petyna dyed / and he wedded Messalina / and gate on her a sone that hete Brytannicus & a doughter that hete Octavia. His thyrde wyf hete Agryppa Germanicus doughter / & she had a sone that hete Nero. Claudius wedded his doughter Octavia to this Nero and for loue that Claudius had to this Agryppina / he slewe his wyfe Messalina / and whan she was slayne Claudius in Tridinio lycyng at mete vled for to speke as though he were out of mynde / and axed why his lady Messalina wolde not come. Agryppina dradde lest Brytannicus the sone of Messalina sholde regne after his fader / & therfore she poplened Claudius / for her sone Nero sholde be Emperour. And Nero quyte his moder þe tyracle whan he was Emperour. For he poplened Brytannicus & slewe his moder and his owne wyfe Octavia. ¶ R. Of the forsayd Messalina spekeheth Iuuenalis Satiricus and sayth that she was so lecherous / that fyrste she dyde her pryuelly to the pryue harlottes place / & afterwarde she put her forth openly & wente thens not fulfilled of the maner doynge / but wery of trauaylle / and also she exited noble wyues to the same maner of doynge ¶ Beda li. p. c. iiii. That yere was

the grete honger in Syrya that Agabus the prophete had pphced in actibus apostolor. ¶ Petrus. lxxi. Why le this honger was stronge in euery place of Syrya / & in the Jure moost Helene the quene of Adyabenes come to Jerusalem and bought corn all about for to susteyne nedy crysten men at Jherusalem / & atte last she made two burpels & hete burye therin her bodye & her sones bodye / the burpels ben yet seen. Therfore many ben dysceyued and troweth that there is the burpels of Helene Constantyns moost. for men rede of her þe she come to Jerusalem and hyght the Lyte in many thynges. Also that yere poule come to Jerusalem to talke with Peter of the gospell. Also that yere the .xv. daye of Iuyll the Apostles were departed in to all the worlde about. Than Peter come to Rome / & sente Marcyall to Limonira / & Appollinaris to Raues / & Marcus in to Egypte. This Marcus of Leuyes kynde was Peters sone by baptyng & his dyscypple and come to Rome with Peter. There atte prayer of Crysten men he wrote the gospell that Peter allowed & approued and toke it to be radde in churches. Than Marcus was sente in to Aquileya / there he conuerted moche folke. Atte last he was sente in Alexandria in Egypte / & there he was do to dech than about the yere of our lorde four hondred thre score & .vii. he was translated & brought from Alexandria in to Venys. This hytte of his thombe somtyme lest he sholde be made preest other byllhop / but goddes ordenaunce had the mapstrye & auctoryte of Peter

 dria ¶ Beda li. i. ca. 6. Kyng Cupde
 Claudius. rius regned amonge the Brytons / &
 warned the Romayns tpybute therfo
 re Claudius Lezar come & conquered
 Brytayne as it were without batayll
 and grete noyse of grutchyng was a
 rered in Brytayn as it semeth/for her
 men that fledde were not restored as
 gayne. he come in to an flonde there
 Julius Lezar durst neuer come/ no/
 ther other man after hym. Also the
 flondes Orchades that ben beyonde
 Brytayn in the see of Ocean/ he ma
 de subget to the Emppre of Rome / &
 tourned agayne to Rome the .vi. mo
 neth after that he wente out / & gaue
 his sone that name Brytannicus. Le/
 lius Hamo a leder of Claudius slewe
 kyng Cupderius at Porchestre/ and
 this Hamo deyed afore Hamoes ha
 uen that was soo called by his name
 that is now Hampton. Than Clau
 dius after dyuerse happes of batayll.
 toke Arupragus Cupderius brod to
 his grace & brought his doughter Ge
 nuilla from Rome & maryed hyr to
 kyng Arupragus. And for he wolde
 make the place of y maryage solemp
 ne/ he called it Claudiocestria by his
 owne name. ¶ R. Claudiocestria hete
 Caerleon in Brytyllhe speche that
 is Claudius Lyte. But after that it
 was called Glowcestre & Glouernia
 also/ and had that name of the duke
 of Demecia y hete Gloza. He sayth
 that Claudius Lezar gate hym there
 at Glowcestre. Than Claudius sente
 Legrons of knyghtes in to Yrlon
 de. But he tourned agayne to Rome
 and Arupragus withdrewt him and

wolde not be vnder the Romayns.
 Therefore Vespasianus a duke of Ro
 me was sente & made the kyng of the
 kyngdom & the Ile of wyght that is
 next to Brytayne in the southe syde
 subget to thempyre of Rome. Herodes
 Agryppa whan he hadde greued
 some of the holy chirche / he come in
 to Lezarea for to make pleyes in wor
 shyp of Lezar. & there to lete him self
 be called god. Therefore an Angell
 smote hym & his bodey swail/ and he
 sayd to his frendes. Lo I that was cal
 led god/ now I am rightfully bouden
 with boundes of deth and so he dyed.
 ¶ Petr. ca. 16. This Herodes Agrip
 pa was Aristobolus sone. Aristobol
 us was the sone of the grete Herodes
 Alcalonita/ & his syster was Herodias
 her oldest eame Herodes Antypas the
 forsayd Aristobolus broder. This He
 rodes Agryppa was a man of grete
 herte/ a grete warrpoure & free of gyf
 tes but he was pooer. He come to Ro
 me whyle Tyberius Lezar lyued for
 to gete a nother Tetrarchia/ that is
 a nother fourth dele of the kyngdom
 of Jewes/ & hadde grete frendshyp of
 Drulus Tyberius Lezars sone & ob
 leged hym selfe for moche dette for to
 wynne the wyll of y Romayns. But
 Drulus was hastily deed / & therfore
 Tyberius Lezar was loy y he dyde
 all Drulus seruautes out of his pre
 sence lest Drulus dethe come to his
 mynde by syght of his seruautes/ ther
 fore hit happed y Herodes Agryppa
 wente agayne to the Jurye. as it were
 a man without comfort / & for shame
 & for nede & for myschpyet he closed hē
 selfe in a toure that he myght dye for

hongre/but at prayer of his syster Herodias he was releued by Herodes Antypa. But Herodes Antypa repieued hym in a tyme for the good that he had do hym. And Herodes Agryppa had Indygnacion therof & wente to Tyberius Cesar & gate grace of him atte last & left with Gayus Germanicus sone. In a tyme he late with Gayus in his chare & wysched that Tyberius the olde man & vnealy were deed that Gayus myghte be Emperour. The charpoter herde that & warned the Emperour / & therfore Agryppa was pyloned six monethes vnto the dech of Tyberius Cesar. Whyle this Agryppa was in pylon / one of his pyloners that was connyng in drypnyng warned hym that he sholde be soone delyuered out of pylon & be a kyng/so that his frendes sholde haue enuye to his welthe/this drypnyng drypned so whyle he sawe an owle sytte vpon the tree that Agryppa lened to. And sayd that as soone as he sawe effluce a maner byrde sytte aboue hym he sholde dye the fyfthe daye after. Whan Tyberius was deed. Gayus delyuered Agryppa & gaue hym two Tetrarchyes of Phylp & of Lysania & crowned & called hym kyng. Therfor his syster Herodias was wrothe & had grete Indygnacion / for her husbonde Herodes Antypas that was Tetrarcha had not gete hym the name of kyng / & she excited her husbonde Herodes Antypa that he sholde go to Gayus & bye þ name of a kyng/but Gayus was warned afore honde by lettres of Agryppa/& put Herodes to Lugdunes in frauce. And for Herodias

as was Agryppas syster. she had choise whether she wolde go agayn other folowe her husbonde, and she chole to be criled with her husbonde & sayde/that she wolde not leue her husbonde in his mylchref that she had folowed in his bonechere / & so the thyrde Tetrarcha was take from Herodes Antypa & geue to Herodes Agryppa. At the last Gayus was slayne whan there was stryfe bytwene the Senatours & knyghtes & the people of Rome. for the Senatours drad the cruelte of the Emperour & the dylauantage of the comynthe / & the people drad the couetyse of the Consuls. Than by sleight of Agryppa Claudius was made Emperour / & anone he gaue Herodes Agryppa the fourth Tetrarchia that is Judea. And so Herodes Agryppa was made grete & wente agayne in to the Jurpe / & afterwarde there he slough James and pyloned peter. Than he made playes at Cesaria as it is layd afore honde. & swall & was ete with wormes & dyed. And left after hym two other lynes & an halfe beyonde flome Jordan/his sone Herodes Agryppa was not called Herodes/but only Agryppa. To hym crylten men fledde afterwarde out of the Jurpe whan the Cyte sholde be take & destroyed. Saynt Marye our lordes moder deyed the yere of her age thre score & thre/for in the byrth of her sone she was .xiiii. yere olde/and lyued with her sone .xxiii. yere. Afterward .xvi. yere as some men wyll meane & soo she was take hens whan she was lx. wynter olde & more/for men saue that the Apostles preched after Cryst

 Claudius. full .xii. yere. Phyllyp the apostle was
 nayled to the crosse in the Lyte Jheru-
 rapolis the yere of his age thre score
 and .xviii. Lazarus the fyrst bysshop
 of Cypres deped his seconde deeth and
 hadde .xxiiii. yere bytwene his two
 dethes. Felix procurator of the Jurye
 was sente by Claudius afore this fe-
 lix. Poull was accused & appeled for
 his offence to the Emperour. That
 tyme were many false prophetes.
 ¶ Egelyppus li. scdo. Also that tyme
 were many shrewed swordmen in Je-
 rusalem & were medled amonge the
 people & slewe many men so subtyly
 & so pryuelly that no man coude them
 aspye/so the drede of them that lyued
 was moire greuous than the mylchpfe
 of them that were deed. Therfore ma-
 ny men went in to wyldernesse for to
 haue refute & locour. Claudius dyed
 at Rome in his owne palays the yere
 of his age thre score & four as it were
 in the moneth of Marche. for his wyf
 Agryppina slewe hym with venym
 for to put of his sone Brytannicus &
 to make her owne sone Nero Empe-
 rour.

Nero sone of Domici⁹ & of a-
 gryppina Gayus syster had
 wedded Claudius doughter &
 began to regne and regned almost
 xiiii. yere. This was moost curyous
 & crafty to werke with Instrumentes
 of mulyke/so that he had Joye & ly-
 kyngge to be openly called prynce of
 harpers. Also he had grete lykyng in

the swetnesse of his boys/that abstep-
 ned hym & spared all maner mete &
 drynke þ was not good for the boys/
 & not oonly he dyde that/ but also he
 vled oft clysterpes & domptes / whan
 Nero began to synge. no man was so
 hardy to goo out of the Teatre er he
 had made an ende of his songe/ & he
 was all ruled & lad by ledyng & cou-
 seyll of mynstrayls. And for he was
 moost couetous of all Emperours/ he
 vled for to save / he that is aboute all
 hath nede of all/ but yet it greued hē
 not to gyue mynstrals al that he had
 and he gaue them all the worthypes
 of the Lyte of Rome. ¶ Suetonius.
 He wered noo clothe twyes / he vled
 shololes of syluer/ he fylshed with net-
 tes of golde / the nettes were drawe
 with ropes of rede sylke. Also for this
 he wolde see the lykenesse of Trope
 whan it was sette a fyre / he sette a
 grete dele of Rome a fyre that brente
 leuen nyghtes & leuen dayes / and he
 began to crye and synge the gestes of
 Trope. ¶ Dracius. Also he was soo
 lecherous that he wolde be wellthe
 with hote oynementes & colde. Also
 he wedded a man for to be his wyfe/
 and he became a nother mannes wyf
 Also he lete herue his owne moders
 wombe / for he wolde see the place
 that he was conceived June. ¶ Mar-
 tinus. Phyllypens blamed him for he
 had defouled his owne moder / and
 he ans werde & sayd / but ye make me
 goo with childe ye shall be deed eue-
 ry chone/ than they made hym swelle
 with drynkes/ and made hym vnwy-
 tynge drynke a frogge. And atte last
 after moche wo & sorowe/ he delpuerd

hym & cast vp a frogge. But the phy
sycpens sayd that the childe was born
afoze his tyme/and therfore it was so
vntyrupnly and so euyl shape. But
Nero made this frogge be kepte in a
coure to his owne lyues ende. Ther
foze some men wenen that Lateran
hath that name of he frogge that lo
ted there/for latere a latyn is lotye &
be hydde other vnknow in Englyshe
& rana in latyn a frogge in Englysh
the. Also Nero made hym an heuen
of an hondred fote hie & bozed & thyr
tyd with many smale hooles / and it
was born vp with four score pylers &
ten of marbell stone. he leete falle wa
ter therupon that droped downe as it
were rayne that falleth from heuen.
He made also a lampe biennynge be
drawen in to that heuen by dape that
pede a downe westwarde as it were
þ sonne. And he made a myrour sette
with precyous stones that shone by
nyght as it were the mone. But all
these were by goddes ordenaunce soo
sodeynly destroyed so to rusched & to
brooke that therof was neuer gobet
foude nother cromme. Also he made
a carre with foure whelys be drawe
vpon that heuen. so that þ noyle was
herde as it were the noyle of a grete
thondre/ but god almyghty sent a gre
te wynde that threwe the carre in to
the Rpuer. ¶ Eutropius. Nero slewe
many noble men & Linia Octauians
wyfe his owne moder Agryppina &
his fader sylster & his wyfe. And Se
neca the philolopher of Corduben Lu
canus eame was Neroes mayster / &
axed couenable rewarde / for that he
had be Neroes mayster / & he had cho

se in whiche bowe of a tree he wolde
be an hanged. Seneca axed why he
had deserued þ maner deeth Than Ne
ro made one to scarmuche about Se
necaes hede with a bygght swerde / &
lawe that he was wonder sore aferde
& sayd / as sore as thou art aferde of
this swerde / as sore I am a ferde of
the / & yet I am as sore aferde of the
as I was some tyme whyle I was a
childe. And therfore whyle thou art
a lyue. I maye not be without drede/
but euer in grete drede. Therfore Se
neca chele what maner deeth he wolde
take / and chele to be late blood in a
bath & to dye in than maner / & as it
were by a forbedyng he had that na
me Seneca / for Seneca in latyn is he
that sleeth hym selfe in Englyshe.
This Seneca had two brethern / one
of them hete Julius Gallo & was þ
best declamator of all / he slough him
selfe with his owne honde / the other
broder hete Mela Lucanns the poetes
fader. Also this Lucanus whan he
had made his boke of the harme and
damage of stryfe & dyscorde bytwene
Lytezepns / & therby he brought Nero
to acorde & myldenesse / yet by heest of
Nero he was slayn in bledg by kyttg
ge of his deynes as it is sayd. ¶ Pol. li
viii. Some be bold & hardy to despyse
this Seneca / & for to groude hym vp
on the auctoryte of Quintilianus / but
me semeth þ they doubte / for he was
worthy to be homely with Poull and
Jerom rekeneth hym amonge holy
sayntes. This Seneca had noble wyt
to lerne & to teche & had grete study
ynge & grete knowleche of thynges &
well nye all mater of studye of wytte

 of science/he had & wrote reasons
 of poetrye/& nye all maner phylolo-
 phye/& in euery doyng he was good
 & trewe keper of vertues & enemye of
 vycies & of synnes / so þ it semed that
 he made worldes of gold & goddes a-
 corde with mankynde. Also he made
 bohes de beneficiis de clemēcia decla-
 macōes tragedias de naturalibz quel-
 tionibz et de tusculanis. de calibz for-
 tunis. ¶ Jeronim⁹ de viris illustribz
 Poull appeled to chemperour & was
 sente bouēden to Rome & there he was
 two yere in free warde & dylputed a-
 penynt the Jewes/& was afterward let
 go fre. Peter that yere ordeyned at Ro-
 mo two bissshops that were helpers to
 teche the fayth of holy chirche. Linus
 was one & Cletus þ other for to ful-
 fyll the offyce of preesthode to the peo-
 ple that come & not the offyce of bys-
 shops. Peter hym selfe was occupied
 in bedes & in prechyng. ¶ Martinus.
 Of this Cletus is wryten that he wro-
 te fyrst in his lettres Salutē et apol-
 tolicā bñdictionē / that is gretyng &
 the apostles blesyng/this prayled mo-
 che pylgrymages do to holy sayntes/
 & speccally to the apostles Peter and
 Poull/& sayd that ones dyspytynge of
 apostles was more helply to a mans
 soule than two yere fastyng. Also
 that yere Lucas was with Poull in the
 Cytte of Rome & wrote the boke that
 hete Actus aplox. but he hadde wryte
 the gospel afore. About that yere dyed
 Longius the knyght that opened Cryste
 with a spere / & toke his syght by
 the blood that ranne vpon the spere
 out of Crystus syde. And so he trowed
 in Cryste & was taught of the Apol-

tes & wente in to Sezarea in Capa-
 doria & lyued an holy lyue .xxdiii. ye-
 re & tourned many men to the fayth
 of holy chirche and dyed martyr atte
 last. Percius Satiricus and poete dyed
 ¶ R. There were mo poetes than Sa-
 tiricus. Poeta hath þ name of feynyn-
 ge/& luche one was Durgyll speccally
 in his Eneydes & Duldri⁹ Satiricus
 is layd of saturitas þ is fulnes of the
 mater other of the repreynges þ they
 spake apenst yll men & euyll lyuyng/
 for they spake therof atte full/& ther
 were thre luche. Perli⁹. Diaci⁹. & Ju-
 uenalis. ¶ P. l. li. viii. ca. vii. The
 offyce of a poete is for to telle thyngis
 þ ben loth in dede by other lyknes &
 chaūgyng with flozyschyng and fayr
 maner of spechyng. Therfor it is þas
 poetes see that Temples were fayrer
 than other houles/& mawmetti heyer
 than other bodres so they trowed that
 goddes sholde be worshypped with the
 fayr & noble spechyng / therfor some
 poetes ben called diuines/for they ma-
 de theyr dytes of goddes. ¶ R. Ther
 by it semeth þ Lucanus was no poete
 whan he made thre stoyes of þ stryfe
 of Cytseynes/but yf it were by þ ma-
 ner of medlyng of poples. The lasse
 James byshop of Serlin was slayn
 vii. dayes afore Apryll in þ ester tyme
 xxx. yere after þ passyon of our lorde/
 fyrst þ Jewes they stoned James for
 anger þ they myght not slee Poull &
 afterward they smyte out his brayne
 with a walkers staf. ¶ R. Eusebi⁹ in
 hystoria eccliaistica li. ii. ca. ii. sayth þ
 James was the sone of Joseph⁹ our
 lady spouse gete on his other wyf / &
 therfore he was called our lordes broð

But Jerom meoueth more lothely that he was the sone of the ocher Marye our ladyes syster & his fader hete Alpheus. Marke the gospeler Paulcs dysciple & his meuer dyed at Alexandria in Egypte. His gospell was wryten at Rome & Peter apprued it & allowed & toke it for to be rad in chirches. Linus the bisskop suffred deeth at Rome. vii. dayes afore December. After him Cletus was his successour. xii. yere. That yere Peter wente to Rome to withstonde & put of Symon Magus that come of the Samaritanes. Peter had ouercome hym afore at Cezarra & chased hym out of the Turpe. Symon Magus gadred the people to gyder at Rome & layd/that Peter & Poull men of Sagilee had greued hym sore/& therfore he wolde forsake Rome that he had defended longe tyme. And than he set a dape whan he wolde stepe vp in to heuen/and whan that dape was come/he tourned to & shewed all the myght of his wptche/ craste. Than they that were in his syde layd/that Cryste dyd neuer luche a dede. But atte prayer of Peter he fylle downe of his flyght & was all to broke & brused. Nero was loy that he had lost luche an helper/& put Peter in ward. And Peter knewe that his ende dape was nye & made Clement bysshop in his stede. Also at Instaure of brethern he wolde fynde to escape Neros tyrannye. & met Cryste in the gate of the Lyte & layd /lorde wher ther goste thou. I goo layd Cryste to Rome to be nayled to the crosse agayne. Than Peter vnderstode that it was layd of his owne passyng & tour

ned agayne in to the Lyte & was taken of the wardayns & honged on the crosse & his hede donewarde. His dysciple Marcellus abode no manes sentence nother leue /but toke Peter downe of y crosse with his owne hondes & buryed him in a place y hete Vaticanus. after the. xxv. yere of his bysshopryche of Rome. In Neros last yere Nero dyd Peter in the crosse & made Poull to be slayne with a swerde all in one dape & sent y duke Vespasian in to y Turpe to make the Jewes subget y wolde not suffre the couetyse of florus y was Justyce. **E**utr. Whan he herde y Galba in Spayne was made Emperour than he lost all comfourt & for harmes that he hade done & bez thought y compnte/the Senatours demed him for an enemye & fled. iiii. myle from y Lyte & slow hym selfe in a subarbe of his bonde man y he hadde made free y yere of his own age. xxxii That yere all the meyne of Augustus Cesar were consunpte whan Peter had suffred deeth. than Clement come after him. Clement had gouerned holy chirche. ix. yere vnd Peter whyle he was alque/he was bysshop. xxii. yere xii. yere with Linus & Cletus & after y. ix. yere by hym self allone for tho he was exiled. This Clement as a wylse man & war for to beware of mylchpof y myght falle afterwarde pf euery o/ther wolde make hym a successour by that ensample of Peter/& so holy dygnyte myght falle in possession as it were by herytage/therfor he resygned his dygnyte to Lynus & afterward to Cletus. Also this Clement wrote many bokes of crysten lawe & made Ly

nus & Cletus byshoppes afore hym.
And this Clement was the fyrste by
election after Peter & the thyrde in de
gre of ordre/for Lynus & Cletus we
re bytwene Peter and hym his bodye
was throwen in to the see Terlon / &
after many yeres one Tryllus apol
tle of the Slaues fonde it & brought
it to Rome in the fyrst Nicholas tyme.
¶ Gaufr. About that tyme Ma
rius the lone of Arufragus regned in
Byrtayne. In his tyme one Rodicus
kyng of Pytes come out of Sicilia &
occupied the north parte of Byrtayn
that parte hete Albania & nowe hete
Scotlonde. But atte laste Marius
slough Rodicus / & in mynde of that
victorye/kyng Marius rered a stone
in that place / the whiche countree is
called by his name Westmaria / that
is Westmerlonde. Yet it is wryten in
a stone. Marii victory. ¶ R. Here Wil
helmus of Malmesburpe was decey
ued that troweth that this stone was
rered in mynde of Marius the Con
sull of Rome / but it is no wonder he
had not rad the Byrtayn boke there
it is wryten of Marius the kyng. Af
terwarde Marius the kyng graūted
to Rodicus men that were ouercome
the londe of Latenely that is in the
last endes of Scotlonde for to dwelle
therin/as it is sayd in the last chapp
tre of the fyrst boke.

¶ Alba Seru⁹ regned after Ne
ro .vii. monethes I cholen of
Spaynerdes & Galles the ye

re of his age thre score & .xiii. & had
be a Senatour of olde nobley/his pry
up lyf was full noble/and hadde oft
be Confull & oft proconsull and ofte
duke & leder of grete bataylles & har
de. He made one Pylon a noble yong
man his lone adoptiuus & his heyr/
but by a wayte of one Otho they we
re both deed in the myddell of the che
pyng place. Otho Lucius regned thre
monethes. Whan he herde that there
was an Emperour made in Gallia
by relpnyons of Germania/he areyed
batayls that ben called Bella ciuilia
and had the victorye in thre the fyrst
batayls. And the fourth batayl whan
he sawe his men ouersetete & falle to
grounde / he sayd that he was not so
worthy that Tryple batayll sholde
for hym aryle/& so he slewe hym selfe
Vptellus regned after Otho as it we
re seuen monethes & was strong and
noble / but he was soo grete a gloton
that he ete some day thryes some day
four tymes & some dape fyue tymes.
Atte one looper were sette a fore hym
two thousande spylles & seuen thous
sand foules so it is wryte. This drad
that Vespasian⁹ sholde regne & slewe
his brother Sabynus / and than for
dredde he hydde hym & closed hym in
a celle. And dukes that were with Vesp
asianus drowe him out & so he was
openly and naked drawe thrugh the
Lyte & helde vp his hede on hys and
a sharpe swerde was sette vnder his
chynne. And all men threwe on hym
dyrte & duste and soo he was throwe
in to Tyber. Vespasianus regned as
it were .viii. yere and was coueptous
of moneye/but he toke it not wronge

fully. He wolde forgete wronges and lightly take chydnynges of men of lawe & of philolophres. This was som tyme sent by Nero in to the Jurpe for to chaste þ̄ Jewes/ & herde of Neroes dech & lette there his lone Tytus & wente agayne to Rome. He foughte xxxii. tymes manly apenst his enemyes in Germania & ellys where ¶ Pol li. iii. ca. xiiii. One Buculus an olde man cryed in despyre of Vespasianus and sayd/ the fore maye chaunge his skynne but not his wyll. for Vespasianus couetyse was neuer the lasse for the passyng of his age. He sayth that he answerde in this maner / to suche men we owe laughynge / to our selfe coreccion/ & payne to euyl doers. Also this more for the playne chastylyngge of the people & nacions of londes that he had wonne. He made prouynces of this kyngdomes Archaya Lycya Rhodus Samus Tracia & Sicilia/ & ordeyned stywardes to gouerne these londes that were rather vnder kynges/ that were frendes & subgettis to the Romayns. ¶ R. Here lacketh ten yere by the comyn Cronycles bytwene the passyon of our lorde & Vespasianus tyme as it is layde afore in the prologue. Jerusalem was take by Tytus. The Temple was brente & throwe a downe euen with þ̄ grounde. ¶ Josephus li. vii. The same moneth & daye that it was fyrste brente by the kalenders that was the .xviii. day of September the yere after that Salomon buylde it fyrst .xi. hondred and .xxx. After the seconde buyldyng that was in Aggeus tyme seuen hondred yere and .xxxix. But Martinia

nus and other telley that it was taken in the estery tyme. ¶ Egelyppus In this brennyngge and destruccyon enleuen tymes an hondred thousande Jewes wer slayne with swerde and with hongre. An hondred thousande were take pyloners and solde alway thyrty for a peny/ and nyne hondred thousande fledde and were to shyfte and departed. ¶ Jeronimus. That tyme was so moche folke at Jerusalem/ for in the estery tyme they come to the Temple out of all the Jurpe. ¶ Josephus li. vii. It is no wonder that so grete people of Jewes were dede & take / for Nero somtyme wolde were the tale & nombre of Jewes that were at Jerusalem / for he despyled that Temple with al his myght. And Lestius the styward as he had lerned of bysshopes wrote to Nero that ther were foude at Jerusalem in one hoily daye .xx. hondred thousande & .vii. hondred thousande withoute them that were pollute and perlones with wcmnes that had no leue for to offre. The bysshopes accounted this nombre by the nombre of hooftes that were offred/ the whiche nombre was two hondred thousande and six and fyfety thousande and fyue hondred. And euery ten perlones offred one hooft. In this fyghtyng the Romaynes had connyge and strength. The Jewes hadde wodenelle and folye. For the tyme was drye and Vespasianus wente to the Lyte Jotapaten and stopped all the water conduytes. But Josephus was with Inne and founde by a connyng crafte and henge wete clothes vpon þ̄ towne walles

 vespasian⁹ and for the clothes dropped/they that were withoute wende & trowed that they that were within had noo lacke of water for to drynke while they had plente of water to wasche theyr clothes. Than Vespasianus dystourbed the walle with a stroke of an engyne but Josephus henge sakes fulle of strawe apenst the strokes of the engyne/and so the strokes were lette & the walles sauēd. For harde thynge is better withstonde with nelsche thynge than with harde. But the Romayns bounde hokes to longe poles/ & kytte the ropes of the sakes. But Josephus threwe out brennyng oyle vpon them & smote of all theyr engynes/and Vespasianus wolde amende hem & was sore wounded in the hele. After that there fylle so grete strengthe of castynge & of shotte of Tytus syde/that the nolle of one Josephus felawes was smyte of with a stone & flewe ouer the thyrde furlonge. Also a woman that was with childe was smyte/soo that the childe was smyte out of her wombe & flewe ouer halfe a furlonge. Whan Tytus had broke the seconde walle Josephus was founden amonge osers & had hydde hym thre dayes. Than they that founde hym despyled him in this maner. where to wylt thou lyue whyle it is not couenable nother leefull nether semely/ thy lyfe shall be mede of peryllhyng & of lost/other it shall be payne of seruage & of bondage / haue mynde of Moyses/hym was leuer to be scraped out of y boke of lye than lyue lenger than y people. Also Dauid was leuer take in se ipso wreche than lyue & see

the people peryllhe/who despyred noughte sayd Josephus. Yf it were lawfull to be delyuered & vnboude of loo grete wo & sorowe/but he that bonde hath leue to vnbynde & none other. & ony other vnbynde he doth the lord wronge than as our lordes trewe seruantes/kepe we what he hath betaken vs whyle it is his wyll. Than he is vnbynde that wyll rather be a go ocher lenger abyde than he wyll to whome he is bounde. So it was loth of Abraham/of Jacob/of Moyses/of Dauid that prayed to be delyuered of pylson of this lyfe. But none floue hym selfe of all holy sayntes. Than yf it is good to lyue/it is sacrylege to forsake it vnrpyghtfully. Yf it is gloruous to dye in batayll. I withsaye it not And yf it be good to fpyghte for the countree for the people and for the Cytezeyns and dye in batayll I put forth my hede to be smyte of / Yf the enemye axeth by lawe of the bataylle. Neyther I flater with my selfe / yf it is to sparynge / be he my borowe. I hadde leuer dye by here thefte than by myne owne. Yf ye saye that it is sweete to dye for fredome. I withsaye it not/but it is sweete to dye for fredome. He is feerfull that wyll not dye whan it nedeth. It is a womans stalworthnesse for ony to flee hym selfe. Beestes conne not doo soo / for they defende them selfe apenste other beestes with tethe and with clawes/but amonge them selfe they vse cusses and lpyng and strokyng. God hath take vs oure lyfe to kepe / but whether we doo we bey to blame / yf we throuwe hit awaye

without his aryng that gaue it vs/
 other yf we warne for to take it as his
 aryng/whan these wordes were sayd
 Josephus saue one of them that sto
 de by & stode faster than other/than
 Josephus sayd cast we lotte who shall
 dye fyrst & last & so forth of vs all/to
 he that shall dye fyrst shall be slayne
 of hym that shall dye next/& so euery
 one after other/the condycion pleaded
 them all & hit happed that they were
 dede all saue Josephus and a nother
 Than Josephus coulepled his fela
 we to forlake his lotte/and therby he
 escaped peryll at home/& soo he was
 brought to Vespasian⁹. ¶ Josephus
 li. v. Atte last Vespasianus was called
 to be Emperour/and his sone Tytus
 was left at the spege of Jerusalem.
 And wente in a day with iij hundred
 horsmen without harberpons aboute
 for to see the Lyte/& the Jewes come
 out & closed them in behynde. And he
 whette his hert & wyll with hardynes
 & rode manly thurgh the companye
 of Jewes & come to his owne men/&
 for grete drede aledged oft grete wre
 che/they that were in wanhope in the
 Lyte comforted togydres in the mea
 ne tyme/& many of the Jewes prayed
 peas of Tytus / & Tytus drad gyle
 and trelon & sayd to his men/as they
 that ben benethe vseth waytyng and
 aspyng / soo it nedeth hem that be
 stronger to be ware of suche waytyng
 & espyng lestre strengthe be betrayed
 by fraude & by gyle. Than the fyrste
 walle was broke with an engyne / &
 Tytus counsepled his men to fyght
 warly / for yf they lacked counsepll /
 strengthe sholde be but folye. Also in

the vyctorie is moost drede. for yf the Anno gré
 stronger dyeth with the febler that
 is a vyctorie to hym that is ouercome
 Vespasian⁹
 Thanne the seconde walle that was
 quashed/and Tytus profered peas.
 But in the Jewes syde Symon and
 Johan withsayd it. Thanne fylle
 lo grete cruelnelle and hongre in the
 Lyte / that byenge and sellynge cea
 sed / and soo dyde restynge and les
 thynge and dressynge of mete. Men
 ete skynnes of sheldes and out cast of
 herbes that cleued on the walles/and
 fylthe that men had spued and caste
 vp / and men sough olde dyrt of
 skynnes of addres and careyn of hor
 ses for to haue to mete. It was lygh
 ter for to gete mercy amonge her ene
 myes/than among her owne men/ga
 lowes and gybettes were sette vpon
 the walles for no man sholde flee/ta
 kynge deth and pylsonynge without
 and hongre withinne / and drede in
 euery syde. Tytus made a newe wal
 le that closed forty furlonges about
 the Lyte and the tentes / & pauplons
 closed ten furlonges and wardes and
 watches were sette that no man shol
 de escape. Atte last the hongre encrea
 sed soo that oft he that bare the deed
 man to his buryng was buryed ra
 ther than he/there was so grete stenz
 che of deed men / for the grounde of
 the Lyte suffyled not to beryels that
 the careyns were throwe by the sou
 des of the walles. Whan Tytus see
 that and he sayde ofte that he profes
 red mercy/but many fled to the Ro
 mayns & whan men gaue them mete
 there was no strength for to ete other
 for to desyre theyr mete that they etc.

Anno grē vespasian⁹ Some of them that fled whan they clenched theyr wombe/delyuered them of Juels of golde that they had swolwed afore that they fled / for the enemyes sholde not openly suche Juels fynde . Dre of the Assyres alpyed that dopnge by one that hadde cacked golde and trowed that all the Jewes hadde golde within them . Than the Jewes that fled to the Romayns were opened apenst Tytus heest . and the wombes & bowles were slytte & coruē to seche golde within . Tytus made Josephus to wete yf he myght make the Jewes to yelde them without more harme / yf he myght with wrytynge with enlamples with fayre byhelles other with teeres / but all was for nought . ¶ Josephus libro sexto . But Symon and Johan with her fautours stopped the wayes all about soo that the Jewes had no waye outwarde . nocher the Romayns Inwarde / houses were beleyly serched yf oughte myght be founde / and yf ony man warned ought he was anone slayne . Atte last wyues caught mete of theyr hylbondes mouth / and fader and moder of theyr owne childerns mouthe . Yf ony doze were shyttē / anone metrowed that some may ete therinne / therfore anone the hous was broken . The poore men were robbed . and the ryche were accused for her moneye / as though they wolde flee other betraye the Cyte and were slayne . ¶ Egelyppus libro sexto and Josephus li . vii . Thanne befelle that gryseley deeth A straunge woman that hete mary was ouercomen with hunger and spake to her owne lpyll sone in this maner .

My sone thou art besette about with all thyng that is gryseley and dredefull with bataylle with hongre with fyre brennyng and with theues / quyte ones thy moder and paye her that thou haste of her / and tourne agayne in to thy pryuey place that thou come of somtyme I dede as myldenesse wolde / doo we now as hunger constraineth / thus she sayd & rosted her owne sone and ete some and kepte some / but men that made stryf cometheder by the smell of the brente fleshe / but the woman styllled them and spake to them in this maner . Be styll I was coueytous and vnkynde . I haue kepte you your parte . And she spake to the parte that was leste in this maner . myne owne sone thou art kynde to me / thou lengeste my lyfe / thou celest them that wolde me smyte . they that come to slee me ben made nowe my frendes and ghestes / than tasteth what ye knowe that the childes moder hath tasted . other ellys ye shall ete all I fere . Shame you not to folowe a woman that ye haue made in this maner . Anone the Cyte was full of the clamour of this gryseley dede . And Tytus was so meoued therwith that he gaf vp his hondes in to heuenwarde and sayd / we come to a batayll of men / but now I see that we fyght apenst bestes / yet bestes ranpaunt spare theyr owne kynde be they neuer soo neddy and helpeth her owne childern but these men deuour theyr owne childern . Than destroye we them / for all her dedes styngen . ¶ Joseph⁹ li . vii . Amonge the Romayns was one of Syrpa that hete Sabynus an

dyed man & stalworth of honde & of herte & worthy for to be prayled with out ende / this was black of hewe & lytll of stature / but a noble soule shone by vertues in that lytll bodye. This with .xi. felawes went vpon the walle fyrst & drofe awaye the Jewes / but at the last he was afelled with a stone & he despyled & vought not of arrowes & of stones / but he defended hym with his shelde & faught vpon his kneces / & wounded many men alwaye for he was full of arrowes and of shott / and thorough shote in euery syde & dyed in the place. ¶ Egelyppus. Atte last the engynes were remeoued towarde the Temple / but it halpe but lytll. But atte last they brente the walles of the Temple that were heled with golde. ¶ R. Here Iosephus telleth that this mylchypes & destroyng of the Lyte & of the people besyll for the dethe and sleynge of James the rightfull. But moie verily it syll for the sleynge of Cryst as the gospell sayth / they shall not leue one stone vpon a stone / for y knowest not the tyme of bylptacion / but oure lorde wyll not the dech of a synfull man / but he wyll that the synfull man amende hym & tourne to a good lyfe. And for the Jewes sholde haue none excusacion neyther chalenge nother cause for to saye that god almyghty toke wretche of them vnwarned. Therefore god almyghty as bode fourty yere yf they wolde them amende / & warned oft by prechyng of the Apostles / by dredfull sygnes & to hens. ¶ Egelyppus and Iosephus li. vii. for about a yere before y destruc tion of the Lyte / the lphenelle of a fy

re swerde was seen honged in the ayr Anno gre about the Temple. In that Estern vespasian^s tyme a heffire that sholde be offred in the Temple ewed a lombe. Also the est gate of that Temple was so heuy of soude bras. that .xx. men were bely ynough to lyfte it / & yet many nygh tes the yren barres were broken / and the yate opened by hit selfe as it were wylfully / soo that vnneth hit myght be closed afterwarde. Also hooftes of armed men were seen in the cloudes / and charpottes fledde by the ayer / ac withlontyde preestes wente in to the Temple by nyght and herde a boys that sayd / goo we hens passe we oute of these seges. Also Ihelus Ananias sone an vplondelhe man four yere afore the destruc tion of the Lyte / come to the sacrefyce of the dedycacion of the Temple / & began to crye in the langage of the countree and sayd. A boys out of the east a boys out of the west a boys out of four wyndes / wo wo wo is to Jerusalem & the Temple / he cryed so daye and nyght & ceased not for betyngge nor for sayr prayenge / and yet he was brought afore Albinus the Justyce of Rome & harde cruelly beladde. But he vought not of his wronge nor of his owne mylchypes / but he cryed that the countree sholde be destroyed / and ceased not er the laste daye of the destruc tion / and that daye he wente vpon the walle and reherced the same crye / and putte moie therto and sayde / wo is me also / and he was anone smyte with a stone of a slynge and dyed. ¶ R. Marianus libro primo sayth / that whan y Temple was brente the

Anno grē floore therof was ered with plowes
 for wretche and despyte of the Jewes
 vespasian⁹ ¶ Jeronimus in plogo sup Iosephū
 Whan the Lyte was destroyed Tytus
 went to Rome & ladde with hym Iosephus
 the Jewe that wrote anone in
 Greue leucy bokes of the takynge of
 Jewes / & Tytus dyde these bokes in
 to comyn lybrarye / & Iosephus after
 his dech had an ymage at Rome ma
 de of his noble wytte. Also this Iose
 phus wrote of doynge & dedes from y
 begynnynge of the woilde to Domiz
 cianus .xx. bokes that ben called libri
 Antiquitatū / the bokes of olde. In
 the .xviii. boke therof / he graūtech &
 knowlegeth that Johan baptyst was
 a very prophete / & that Jerlm was
 destroyed by cause of the sclaūder of
 James the rightfull. Also there he
 sayth that Cryste was a wyle man &
 dyde many wonderfull werkes & de
 des / & that he was doctour & techer of
 the Jewes & of other men and slayne
 atte last for enuye / & shewed hym to
 his dyscyples the thyrde daye after.
 And that crystendom & the name of
 crysten men fayled neuer to that tyme.
 Vespasian⁹ dyed in the flux about
 te his owne towne about the Sabyns
 the yere of his age thre score and ten.
 He sayth that he stode vp whan he
 sholde dye and sayd. It falleth for an
 Emperour to passe standynge out of
 erthe. ¶ Giral. in top. Appolynaris
 Peters dyscyppe y was somtyme sente
 to Rauenna suffred dech Euery yere
 in his fest daye rauenes crows & cho
 wes comen thyder togyders out of eue
 ry syde as it were by couenaūt made.
 And that daye as it were by custome

is gyuen them a careyn of a deed hor
 se. Therfore some men wyll meane
 that by cause therof that the Lyte is
 called in duche speche Ranenelburgh
 ¶ Eutropius.

¶ Tytus regned after his fader
 as it were .iii. yere. This was
 moost noble speker of Greue
 & of Latyn / & wrote caules in Latyn
 & poesyas and gelltes in Greue. They
 that were conuycte of conspyracōn as
 yentst hym were as homely afterwar
 de with hym as a fore. ¶ Pol. li. iii.
 ca. xiiii. This was soo free of herte
 that he purged and clenched the couety
 se of his fader / so that he was called
 the loue and the lphynge of man
 kynde. Also he had alwaye that ma
 ner that noo man that come to hym
 yete from hym withoute spede or hos
 pe of spede. Therfore men of his hou
 se axed hym why he wolde behote mo
 re than he myght perfourme. There
 shold noman sayd he go celynge and
 loy from y answer of a prynce. Ones
 at a soper he bethought hym of that
 sawe / & bethought hym also that he
 that daye gaue noo gyfte in helpe of
 ony man and was loy and sayd. Al
 las my frendes / this daye I haue lost
 In the tyme of his dech he was bor
 ne in a lyter and loked vp in to he
 uen and sayde / that he neded not to
 thynke of none of all his dedes but
 oonly one / but what dede it was noo
 man wyll. About that tyme dyed Ju
 lyanus byshop of Lenomannes. He
 sayth y he was Symon leprolus the

me fell that Cryste heled / & he receyued Cryste in his hous and lodged hym. After þ assencion of our lord he was byshop of Senomannes ordeyned by the Apostles or by her dyscyples / & he was a noble man of vertues / and redrethre men from deeth to lyue. Som men wolde mene that this is he that men þ trauallych by the waye prayed to for good lodgyng / for Cryste was herberged in his hous. But it semeth more lothly that it is the other Julianus that vnwyttyng slewe bothe his owne fader & moder. Of him it is certayne wyrtten in this maner. Julianus was a yonge man & wente an hunting & chaced an herte / and the herte tourned his face to hym & sayd / thou chaced me / and thou shalt slee bothe thyne owne fader & moder . Than Julyan dradde sore / & for to beware that þ myschyfe sholde not falle. Julyan forsoke & lette all that he had / & put hym selfe to a grete prynce in ferlonde / and bare hym well & nobly vnder that prynce / bothe in batayll & at home in his palays. And bare hym so that he was made a knyght / & wedded one Castellana a wedowe that his lord gaue hym to wyue . Than his fader & his moder sought Julyan in euery londe / and it happed atte last that they came to Julius owne castell & whan Julius wyf had talked with them / she knewe well that they were her husbandes fader & moder / and receyued them goodly & leyde them for to reste in her husbandes bed / & wente her selfe to chirche at morewe erly / & left them bothe a bed . Julyan came erly home and fonde them slepe both

togydres in his owne bed. and trowed that a nother man had laye there by his wyf / & stycked them both through out / and wente out & mette with his wyf. And than he knewe that he had slayne bothe his owne fader & moder as the herte had sayd that he sholde. fare well my leue syster sayd he / for I shall neuer reste er I wete yf god wyll take my penaunce & forgyue my synne . God forbede sayd she that I sholde forsake the in this maner in wo and in sorowe / and haue be pertyner with the in Joye and in welthe. Than they wente forth togydres and made an holpytayll by a ryuer where they passed ofte and were in grete peryll there / they halpe men that passed and socoured poor men . Longe after in frost tyme. Julyan was wery and reste hym about mydnyght / and herd a voys cryenge and praynge of helpe ouer the passage. Julyan arose and sette ouer the poor man that was ney deed for colde / and brought hym in to his hous / and made fyre & sette hym therby / but for all the fyre / the man was neuer the hotter / than Julyan dyde hym in his owne bedde / and hylled hym with clothes . And within a lityll whyle / this man that semed so colde and a vyle mesell was whyte and fayre / and steyd vp in to the aper and spake to his hooft Julyan and sayd. Julyan Julyan / our lord Ihesu Cryste sente the worde by me that he hath receyued thy penaunce. And soone after bothe Julyan and his wyf wente all to our lord to endeles reste.

Domicianus Hespasianus so-
ne regned .xv. yere & fyue mo-
nethes/his wyf hete fyrst Au-
gusta/& fyrst he hpyete calle hym selfe
god and lorde. This forbade geldyng
of men and plantyng of vynes in the
Cyte of Rome / that exiled many of
the Senatours/& put Mathematicos
& philosophres out of the Cyte of Ro-
me and buylde a Temple of Rome
without ony tymbre.that Temple he
te Pantheon & was bylde in worshyp
of all goddes. There is now the chir-
che of our lady that hete sancta Ma-
ria rotunda/that is saynt Maria the
rounde. Somtyme this had the vycto-
rye of Germainys & of Danes / and
was so proude therfore that he wolde
suffre none ymage sette in worshyp
of hym / but it were of clene golde.
¶ **T**ricula Mathematicus is he that
hath the scyence that treateth as it we-
re of length & of brede and telle tho-
rough suche lengthe and brede be none
bodey that men maye grope and fele.
and so it fareth ofte of Arismetryke &
Geometrye. ¶ **P**ol. This man was
vnprofyttable in euery dede & dyde no
thyng manly as a man sholde / but
that he bare only the name of them-
pyre. But for he wolde hyde the lew-
denesse of his wyfte and of his bodey
vnder the name of a prynce/he ordey-
ned hym euery daye a pryup ydlenesse
& vled hym to catche flies & styched
them with a sharpe poyntell. So that
in a tyme one axed yf ony man were
there Inne with the Emperour / nay
sayd his chamberlyng Metellus/there

is not a flye left with the Emperour
This pauue two monethes of the yere
newe names/& called Septeber Ger-
manicus & October Domician^o. Ana-
cletus of the nacyon of Athene was
pope. ix. yere in Clemētes tede whan
Clement was exiled. Eusebius called
hym Cletus/but he ouerlepe hym in
his Cronycle. Damasus y pope wy-
teth to Jerom the Cronycle of byl-
shopes of Rome/& withlayd y sawe
& layd that Cletus was a Romayn &
Anacletus a Greke. Also in many o-
ther thynges Eusebius Cronycle vary-
eth from Cronycles of other men.
This Anacletus ordeyned y preestes
sholde be worshyped afore other men
& not trauaylled ne greued. ¶ **E**utr.
Cornelia y chyef mayde of the Tem-
ple of the goddesse Vesta was conuyc-
te in lecherye & burped quycke a lyue.
Anaristus after Cletus was pope ten
yere. This ordeyned .vii. dekens that
sholde kepe the bysshop whyle he pre-
ched/lest enemyes of trouthe wolde be-
re hym wronge on hande & saye y he
erred/& also for they sholde not lyght-
ly be herde nor be despised. Whan Do-
mician^o was slayne of his owne men
& dyspytously born forth among the
ues. Narua the mylde prynce regned
after hym one yere/& vndyde the des-
des of Domician^o. And all they that
were exiled were reconlyled and come
home agayne. And so Johan y euan-
gelyste come home agayne to Ephe-
slyn out of y Ile of Pachimos. Corll^o
Marius lone was nourysshed at Ro-
me from his childehode / & regned in
Bytayne & payed trybute to the Ro-
mayns & ladde his lyf in peas. ¶ **R.**

Some men suppose that he bylde the
Lyte of Colchestre / whiche is chyef
Lyte of ekklaon.

Trajanus Crinitus Trajanus
was born in Spayne & was
Emperour .xix. yere. Among
his tundes he was free of herte & bely
in dedes of armes / & esy in governyn
ge of Lytezens. And myghty in res
uelynge of Lytees & towne. He chasty
sed the Danes. Sphytes. Sarmates.
Hyberes. Colches. & Arabes. He ordey
ned a nauye in the rede see for to war
re in Inde. He made hym selfe euery
mannes felawe & dyslyted oft his fren
des / for he wolde be saled of hem
& wete how they ferde / he greued noo
man / he dyde noo thyng wronfully
for to haue the more eschetes / but he
made his seruauntes ryche that them
neded to greue no man. His fren
des blamed hym for he was so comyn to
all maner men. He answerde & sayd.
I wyl be luche an Emperour to other
men as I wolde they were to me yf
they were Emperours. **R.** Helymā
dus sayth that in a tyme Trajanus
was lepte to horle for to go to batayll
for the compnte. And ther come a wy
dowe wepyng & toke hym by the fore
& prayed hym that he wolde doo hyr
right & Justyce of hem that had slay
ne her sone. I shall do the right sayde
the Emperour whan I come agayne
what sayd she yf thou neuer comeste
agayne. Than sayd the Emperour / my
succellours shall doo the right / what
profyte sayd she shall be to the yf an

other man do me good / thou art det
tour to me / & yf shalt relceyue as thou
deseruest by thyne owne dedes. And
so it is fraude for to yelde not that is
due whan it maye be yolden. Thy suc
cessour shall fare well yf he bere hym
well & do as he sholde. Trajan^o was
meoued by these wordes & light doun
of his horle & dyde the wydowe right
& Justyce. And therefore he was wor
thy to haue an ymage in Rome. Also
on a tyme Trajanus sone rode on a
wylde horle & slough a wydowes sone
And therefore Trajanus yaued his ow
ne sone to the wydowe for her sone.
And by cause of this grete rightwyl
nesse it semeth that saynte Gregoie
wanne his soule out of helle. **Tre**
uila. So myght a man wene that we
re worse than wode or out of right by
leue. Whan Euariscus was martred.
Alexandre come after hym & was po
pe ten yere / he ordeyned holy water to
be blessyd with salt & to be spryngt in
crysten mēes houses / he put in to the
masse. *Dui pridie quam pateretur.* &
so forth vnto these wordes. *Hoc est x.*
Also he ordeyned that water sholde
be medled with the wyne in yf chalpyce
for to bytokene the onyng of Cryst &
of holy chirche. And he ordeyned that
the oost sholde be of therf brede & of
lytyll quantyte & sayd the scarlet this
oost be the better it is. Symon that
hete Symeon also Cleophas sone / the
lasse James succellour was naryled to
the crosse in yf chirche of Yrlm. And
all men wondred that so olde a man
of six score yere myght suffre yf passy
on. Ignaci^o byshop of Antiochia
Johans dyscyppe was brought to Ro

Anno grē me & throwen to wylde bestes/ & why
 Crapan⁹. le he was tormented he cryed alwaye
 besely Iesus. Then after his dech his
 herte was hewen iy to small gobettes
 And in euery gobet was fouden Ies

111 12 seconde Plinius Nonocomensis a ple
 ter & a wryter of storpes was in his
 floures/ he was mayster to Crapanus
 themperour/ & refreyned hym in ma
 ny thynges/ & iy especyal that he shol
 de not persecute ne greue crysten men
 Also this not wichstondyng y knyght
 hode & chpualrye that he vled alwaye
 yet he wrote .xxxvii. bohes of the stor
 rye of kynde/ in the whiche he descri
 ueth clerely the worlde and all that is
 therin. Atte last he wente for to serche
 & enquere the cause of the grauell y
 is in the see stronde/ whiche is alayed
 with heepes of grauell as it is sayd.

118 19 After the passyon of Alysandre the
 pope Sixtus was pope almost enle
 uen yere/ he ordeyned that Trilagiū
 that is sanctus sanctus sanctus sholde
 be longe atte masse. And that the coz
 poras sholde not be of sylke neyther
 sendell but clene lynyen cloth not dyed
 & that no woman sholde handle noo
 towelles of the aulter. And though
 men rede that Alysandre suffred dech
 in Adryan's tyme/ yet thenne was not
 Adryan Emperour/ but perauenture
 Confull or prefecte. In this Crapa
 nus tyme Placidia mayster of knyght
 tes wente on huntynge & mette with
 an herte haupnge by wch. his hornes
 the crucyfixe whiche sayd to hym that
 he his wyf & his childern sholde suf
 fre moche wo and sorowe. And after
 this he was crystened & his wyf & his

childern/ & he had a newe name and
 was named Eustace. ¶ Cassiodorus
 This Crapanus deyed in the flux iy
 Selencia the yere of his age .lxiij.
 His bones were in a golden vne oz
 potte & buryed in the market place
 vnder a pyler that he hadde made of
 an hondred and .xliiij. foote hyghe.
 Loos & mynde of hym is so spronge/
 that yet iy our tyme men praye iy ple
 syng of prynces. More gracypous mo
 te thou be than euer was Augustus/ &
 better than Crapanus.

¶ Adrianus helius Crapanus
 colyn was Emperour .xxi. ye
 re and ten monethes. he was
 connyng iy the langage of Greue &
 of Latyn & made in Athenes a lybra
 ry of wonder maner werke. he was
 connyng of mulyke of Phylpke of
 payntyng of grauyng of meltynge
 & of castynge of brasle & of other me
 tal. Whan bohes of oure byleue were
 wryten by one Quadrat⁹ discyppe of
 thapostles & by one Arystydes of A
 thenes. Adrianus bad & comaunded
 by his lettres that crysten men sholde
 not be dampned without trespas put
 agaynst hem & proued/ he made ma
 ny lawes/ but he hadde grete enuye to
 the noble loos & renomme of Crapa
 nus/ so that he forloke the prouynces
 that Crapanus had wonne/ as Sp
 rya. Helopotania. & Armenia/ & pur
 posed to haue lefte Dacia / but his
 frendes caused hym to chaunge his
 thought. Also this Adrianus ouerco
 me the Jewes that were estlones yet

rebell & chased hem out of Iherusalem / & put therein men of other nations. And syth that tyme þ place where Cryst suffred his passyon is within the north walles of the Cyte of Iherusalem / whiche was to fore þ tyme without the walles. In this Adrian⁹ tyme the philosopher Secundus was flouryng / whiche put hym selfe to scyence / & wolde not speke to his lyues ende. And þ cause of his scyence was this / he had ben & studyed atte scole of Athenes & herde of the vntedfastnesse of women. And therfore in a tyme whan he come home & was vnknewen of his frēdes / he thought tassaye & proue the vntedfastnes of his owne moder / & gaue to a wenche her seruante yestes / & she brought hym pryuelly by nyght vnto his moders bedde. Thenne his moder began to excypte hym & comforte hym for to haue to do with her / nay moder sayd he it is not lycyng to me to defoule that place from whiche I came of / why sayd she / who art thou. I am sayd he Secundus thy lone. And whan his moder herde that she deyed forthwith for shame & sorowe. Thenne he sawe & vnderstode that his moder was deed by his defaulte in spekyng and tellyng what he was vnto her / he made grete dole & sorowe / & auowed neuer to speke after / & so he neuer spake after / but lyued as a dombe man to his lyues ende / & helde his auowe vnto his lyues ende / soo that he wolde not speke for manace ne for fayre byhestes & yet he was brought to for Adryan the Emperour / but speke wolde he neuer as it is wryten in the questyons þ he wro-

te in his scyence tyme. Thelestorius the pope was a Greke after Sixtus passyon / he was pope .xi. yere / he ordeyned the Lente to be fasted to fore eester. And that noman sholde syng masse to fore the hour of vnder / and þ men sholde syng thre masses with Gloria in excellis on Crystmas dave. That yere Eustace that to fore was called Placidus was martred & his wyfe & childern. That tyme the thre maydens fides Spes & Caritas and her moder Sapiencia were martred at Rome. Adryan theperour deyed in Campania in the dropelye. That tyme Aquyla of the plonde Pontus was flouryng / he was the seconde after seuenty that tored holy wryte out of Hebrew in to Greue. After the passyon of Thelestorius Iginus a Greke philosopher of Athenes was pope four yere / he ordeyned the clergye to be reweled in ordre & in degre. Also he ordeyned that no archebysshop sholde condempne his suffryng but in syghte & in heryng of other suffryngans & byshops of the same prouynce.

Anthonius Pius with his sonnes Aurelius & Lucius was Emperour .xxii. yere / he had suche a name that in all his kyngdom / he withhelde the caucions of his dettour & forpaued his dettis. And therfor he was called the fader of the coul tree. And me sayd that he wolde saye ofte in this maner. He is leuer by the ensample of Scipion saue one Cyteseyn than ouercome a thousande enes

 Anthoni⁹. myes. His doughter faustina sawe
 swerde meny fyght & cast so grete loue
 to one of them/that she was seke for
 loue. And she tolde it to her owne hul
 bonde Marcus Anthonius. Thenne
 by coulepyll of philiciens of Caldea þ
 swerde man was slayne/& faustinas
 bodye enoynted wih his blood. And
 so the sorowe cealed. Also many men
 of straūge nacion dyde of her armu
 re/& putte the causes of her stryfe vp
 on Anthonius & were redy for to ston
 de to his ordenaūce & dome. ¶ Jero
 nimus de uirib. In his tyme Policar
 pus bissshop of Ephesym that was dis
 ciple to Johan theuangelyst come to
 Rome & conuerted many meny out of
 theyr herelye. And was afterwarde
 brent in his owne churche. After Igi
 nus Pius was pope .xv. yere. At his
 143 4 prayer Hermes wrote that boke that
 is called Pastor. Therin it is wryten
 that esterdaye sholde not be holde but
 on a sondaye by byddyng of the An
 gell that shewed hym in the clothyng
 of a fyssher. About this tyme Trog⁹
 Pompeius of the nacion of Spayne
 was in his floures. He wrote the sto
 ryas of all the worlde from Nynus ty
 me kyng of Assyrya vnto the tyme of
 the hoole lordshyp of Emperours in
 xliiii. bokes. His dyscyppe Iustinus
 abredged thole bokes. This Iustin⁹
 was a pleder & a wryter of hystories.
 Also this Iustinus wrote the booke
 de Cristiana religione to Anthonius
 Pius/& therby he made hym the mos
 re goodly. After Pius Anticetus was
 pope as it were ten yere / he had that
 clerkes sholde be shauen roude about
 & hane no longe lockes. Galyp the

philicien that was born at Pergam⁹
 was in his floures atte Rome/he ex
 powned Vpocras bokes/& not oonly
 them/but he made many volumes of
 his owne. He sayth that for resonas
 ble abstynence that he dled he luyed
 hondred & fourty yere/he ete neuer ne
 dranke his fylle nether ete rawe fruy
 te / he had alwaye a swete smellynge
 breth / he deyed for age and for none
 other euyl. That tyme Hirtmeus epil
 copus Lugdium was flouryng/he ex
 powned many bookes of holy wryte.
 And Tholomeus a connyng man of
 the scyence of Mathematyke was in
 his floures/he made more of Astrono
 mye than was made to fore his tyme
 This man was of straunge watche/
 and of lytyll mete & had a swete breth
 he made many bookes that ben naz
 med Almagestus. Perspectiua : & in
 Judiciis. Quatripartitum. & Cen
 tilogium. Among his prouerbis twey
 ne ben famous & noble/he is hyghest
 among meny that retcheth neuer who
 hath the worlde in honde / and other
 meny ben not amended by hym / that
 is not amended by other meny.

¶ Marcus Anthoni⁹ Verus/& Lu
 cius Comodus the sones of
 Anthoni⁹ Pius regnedey af
 ter theyr fader. xviii. yere. These two
 were both Joyned by kynrede & affy
 nyte/though they were not both born
 of one wombe. for Marcus Anthoni
 us hadde wedded Anthonius Pius
 doughter. And Lucius Comodus had
 wedded Marcus Anthonius doughter

And so by this twayne the Romayns begonne to haue tway Emperours. This Marcus was neuer proude for none happe that myght befall to hē. He was so stedfast and so sadde/that from his childehode he chaunged neuer his semblaunt for sorowe ne for Joye. Also after the bataylle that he dyde ayenst the Germainys Slaues and Sarmates he hadde spente all that was in the tresorpe / and hadde nought for to yeue vnto his knyghtes. Yet hym was leuer leye to wedde his vessels of syluer and of golde and the araye of his wyf/than greue prouynces Londes and the Senatours. Therfor whan the vycorpe was wonne he recouered all that & moche more/and payed the pryse of the valewe to hem that wolde yelde ayene that they hadde bought other receyued to wedde/and was not wrothe to hem ꝑ wolde not yelde agayn that they had bought or receyued to wedde/he relested many trybutes to prouynces and londes. The tables of the dettes that men owed hym he brente in the myddell of the Lyce. Cruell lawes he attempted with newe ordenaūces and constitucions. In his tyme Egelyppus floured the wyfter of Royses and of destroyenge of Ierusalem/his booke was wyrtyn in Grue/and Ambrose tourned it in to Latyn. Tho was the mayde Praxedis flouryng/after that she had buryed many martres/she prayed our lord that she myghte passe after hem / and her boone was herde. In this Emperours tyme was so grete pestilence and deth / that the hoost of Rome was nygh destroyed/

So in a tyme the Emperour fought Anno grē ayenst the Quades/and his men fayleden well nygh for drynke/ & god almyghty sente hem rayne fro heuen. But the contrarye befelle whan Iygh tenynge fered the Germainys & Sarmates. ¶ Gaufr. About the fyrst yere of this Marcus Lucius. Coelus Ione began to regne in Brytany. ¶ Gau. and Alfr. He sente lettres to Elentherius the pope for to receyue crystendo me/ & his bone was graunted/ & Brytons helde & kepte hooly that fayth & byleue vnto Dyoclesyan theemperours tyme. After Anicetus Sother was pope .ix. yere/ he ordeyned ꝑ a menchoy or Nonne sholde not handle the towels of the aulter neyther doo ensence in the sencer/ but she shall bere a veyle on her hede. Also he ordeyned that no wyf sholde be holden lawfull/ but she were blessyd of a prest. After Sother Elentherius was pope .xv. yere / he ordeyned that crysten men sholde not forsake ne forbere no mete ꝑ is skylfull & resonable for mankynde / and that noo man sholde be degraded ne putte out of his state of his degre but he were lawfully accused to fore honoure. And he sayd that our sauour wylte well that Judas was a theef and his traytour/ but for he was not accused he was not putte downe / but all that he dyde in ꝑ meane tyme amonge thapostles for the state of his dygnyte/ it was allowed & stode ferme and stable. Also this pope atte praynge of Lucius kyng of Brytons sent forganus & Damians that crystened the kyng & the people & made bysshopes and archebysshopes in stede of flami

After Marcus Lucius Como-
 dus was Emperour .xiii. yere
 This Comodus was vnpro-
 fyttable to all thynges & yaued hym all
 to lecherie & harlottrye / he made to
 slee many Seratours & crysten men
 & called the moneth of Septembre af-
 ter his owne name. Also he was defa-
 med by the shrewdenes of his wyfe &
 fought in Amphyteatre with shorte
 swerde men in the hous of the goddes
 Belca / he was strangeled atte laste &
 deyed with soo grete wrath & despyte
 that he was demed enemye of mans
 kynde ¶ Treuisa. Amphyteatrum is
 an hygh rounde place for to see about
 There it foloweth in the storye that
 he sente Phylpp the noble burgeys of
 Rome in to Egypte. This Philippes
 doughter Eugenia with twey lones
 Prothus & Jacinctus wente awaye
 in a mannes wede vnwetyng her fa-
 der that was not in the byleue / & she
 was crystened & was called Eugeni⁹
 and made a monke. And whan the
 abbot was deed. Eugeni⁹ was ma-
 de abbot in his stede. Atte last a wo-
 man that hete Melencia cast a leche-
 rous eye vpon Eugeni⁹ & wolde ha-
 ue had Eugeni⁹ to lye by her. And
 by cause Eugeni⁹ wolde not assente /
 Melencia defamed Eugeni⁹ & sayd

that Eugeni⁹ wolde haue lye by
 her by strength apenst her wyll / wher
 fore Eugeni⁹ was take & brought
 to her owne fader Phylpp. Thenne
 she kytte & slytte her clothes and she-
 wed that she was his owne doughter
 Eugenia / and shewed that there wes
 re Prothus and Jacinctus J gelded.
 Whan her fader sawe that / he was
 crystened with al his meyne. And Me-
 lencia that had her defamed was so-
 depnly biente with a stroke of lycht-
 nyng. After Elencherius Dvctor was
 pope ten yere. Anone he sente lettres
 to Theophilus of Alexandria and to
 all the brethery that were there that
 they sholde gadre a coulepll for to or-
 deyne the very holdynge of esterdaye
 ¶ Marianus li. i. ca. ii. for after that
 the apostles were deed vnto that tyme
 as crystmas daye is holde the .vii.
 daye to fore Ianuer vpon that day
 euer it felle. So all the men of Gal-
 lia helde her esterdaye the .vii. daye to
 fore Apryll vpon what day of the we-
 ke someuer it befelle as it was fyrste
 begonne & take for to be holde. ¶ Eu-
 sebius in his storye telleth that men
 of the east londes helde yesterdaye the
 xiiii. daye of y^e mone vpon what day
 it euer fylle in the moneth of Marche
 In this coulepll & synode was pope
 Victor & Narcilus patriarke of Jerlm
 & Hirenus bysshop of Lugdiū. Ther
 it was ordeyned y^e esterdaye sholde be
 holden y^e fyrst sondaye after the .xiiii.
 daye of the mone of y^e fyrst moneth y^e
 is Marche / & the esterweke sholde du-
 re vnto the .xxi. daye of the same mo-
 ne / so y^e tylke daye be acompted in the
 esterweke. Theophilus of Cezarea

halpe moche in this ordenaūce. The
odocius of Ephelym was þ̄ tyme hol

man of the lawe. & so he toke thempyre
by strength / but he was slayn of o
ne Seuer^o anone after the vii. moneth

After Julianus Seuerus of
Astryca of the countree that
hepyght Trypolis was Em
perour. xvi. yere This was made Em
perour. & no mo of Astryca / fyrst this
was an elchetour & steygh vp by dy
uerle offpces & dygnytces vnto he was
Emperour. He was right scars & ster
ne of kynde / he ouercome the Parthes
& the Arabes / and therfore he was cal
led Parthicus & Arabicus / he made
a walle in Bryptayne that stretcheth
six score myle & tweyne vnto the see /
& he deyed at Porke . ¶ Beda li. pⁿo
This Seuerus gouerned the compn
te myghcely and with grete trauayll.
And atte last he went in to Bryptayn
& made a walle of turues & not of sto
nes as some men wene and departed
Bryptayne by that walle / he dalfe vp
turues by the grounde & made vp an
hygh walle / so that to fore the walle
is the dyche that the turues were dol
uen out / therupon ben pyght stronge
poles & stakes of tree / he strengthed
offt that walle with many toures and
deyed afterwarde at Porke / & left af
ter hym twey lones Valianus & Ge

ta / but Geta was Juge^d for a comyn Anno grē
enempe & put to deth. Valianus was
called Anthonius & had þ̄ kyngdom Seuerus.

¶ Gaufr. Lucius kyng of Bryptons
deyed without childery & was buryed
at Glowcetre. Thenne fylle stryf a
monge Bryptons & the power of the
Romayns. Therfore Seuerus the Se
natour with two Legyons was sente
in to Bryptayne / he made a walle atte
cost of the compnte bytwene Depra &
Albania þ̄ bey the north syde of En
glonde and Scotlonde. He made the
walle ayenst fulgenci^o kyng of Pyc
tes & fought afterwarde atte Porke &
was slayne & buryed there / & left af
ter him two lones / one hete Geta his
moder was of Rome / that other hete
Ballianus & his moder was of Byp
tayne. Therfore was grete fyghtyng
bytwene þ̄ two brethern & Geta was
slayn & Ballianus had þ̄ kyngdom.

¶ Gau. The Bryptons chole Ballia
nus for his mod was Brypton / but the
Romaynes chele Geta by cause his
mod was a Romayn. & so they fought
& Geta was slayn. ¶ R. But Eutr.
sayth in the stoye of Rome þ̄ Geta
was slayn atte Lyte Edalla whan he
fought ayenst þ̄ Parthes. But Gau.
in þ̄ stoye of Bryptons sayth þ̄ Geta
was slayn of one Caranci^o a tyraūt
þ̄ frayed with hym. Symachus was
cho in his floures / he was þ̄ fourth þ̄
translated holy wryt out of Hebrew
in to grue / he was of þ̄ Samarytes &
torned vnto þ̄ Jewes lawe & was ma
de prolelitus þ̄ is whan he is tourned
fro a nother lawe to the Jewes la we.
¶ Eusebi^o li. vi. That tyme was Mar
cilus flouryng byshop of Jerlm. Je
r iiii

Anno grē is wryten that he was a right trewe
 Seuerus. Juge & stedfast/and wolde not bende
 but alwaye holde the trouthe & yeu
 true sentence. Therfor thre men that
 were culpable in hem selfe feyned a
 blame & accused the byshop & brough
 te forth hem selfe for wytenesse. The
 fyrst prayd that the fyre of helle must
 brenne hym but it were sothe that he
 sayd. The seconde prayed þ the kyn
 ges euyl must destroye hē but yf it we
 re soth þ he sayd. The thyrde prayed
 that he must lose both his eyen but it
 were soth that he sayd. But the grete
 eye of goddes ordenaunce brence the
 fyrst wytenesse as he had prayed & all
 his hous therto. And destroyed the se
 conde wytenesse by the kynges euyl.
 The thyrde sawe howe his felawes
 sped & drad full loze and knowleched
 his trespas to fore all the people/and
 wepte so many teeres & so oft for that
 synne & trespas that he lost bothe his
 eyen. After the passyon of Hyctor Ze
 phirinus was pope .ix. yere/he ordey
 ned that euery crysten man of .xii. ye
 re olde & aboute sholde euery yere ones
 receyue the sacramente & be houseled
 on esterdaye. He made many Dmely
 es & Epytles/and so of his makynge
 is the Legende on childermasse daye.
 & begynneth Zelus quo tendat/& soo
 forth. And also of the decollacion of
 saynt Johan. ¶ Eusebi⁹ li. vi. Sayn
 te Leonydes Drygenes sad was mar
 tred at Alexandria the fyrste daye of
 Marche/his sone Drygenes a childe
 of .xviii. yere that hyght Adamanci
 us also/caste for to folowe then sam
 ple of his fader/but by the ordenaūce
 of god & besynesse of his moder the

childe was kepte to full grete prouff
 te of many men/for she hydde the chil
 des clothes that nyght that he wolde
 haue gone out on the morow. Therfor
 the childe wrote a lettre to his fader
 how he was holden at home by slepht
 of his moder/& prayed his fader that
 he wolde be stedfaste and holde forth
 þ he had begon/while this was a litl
 childe he axed ofte questyons of his
 fader/& axed how holy wryte was ye
 ue to vs by thynspracion of the holy
 goost/& what of goddes counseyll is
 hydde in holy wrytte in symplenesse
 of spekyng & of wordes. Hit is sayd
 that ofte whan the childe was a slepe
 the fader wolde vnhete the childes bre
 ste & worshypped it as it were goddes
 Temple & kyss it full swetely & saye
 that well was hym that gate euer sus
 che a childe. Thenne whan the fader
 was martred/the childe was of .xviii.
 yere age as a fore is sayd. Whan his
 faders catel was taken be thelcheters
 he & his moder that was wydowe &
 his .viii. brethern were lefte in grete
 pouerte & myschye. Thenne at Alex
 andria he helde a gramer scole for to
 haue lyuelode for hym and his. But
 euer amonge he tourned men to crys
 ten fayth & halpe and locoured hem
 that were pursued & brought in mys
 chye & confortted hem that were lad
 to deth for the fayth of holy chirche/
 he vled moche wakynge & fastynge/he
 folowed the sayeng of the gospel that
 counselled that me sholde not haue
 two hirtels ne care for the daye that
 cometh to morowe so that yf he knes
 we ony that kepte of her owne catell
 to lyue by he refused hem & wolde not

haue hem in his loze/he wente many yere without hosen & shoen. Alwaye he spared wyne but yf it were for helpyng of the stomake. In his youghth he dyde one dede that semed of vnparfyght wytte/but it was a token of a full byleue & of parfyght chastyte as the gospell sayth / some ben ghelided that ghelde hem self for the kyngdome of god. Therfor not oonly by cause of chastyte / but also for he sholde preche to men and to women pryuely **M**amea Alysandre themperours moder desyred to here **D**irygenes speke / & sente after him that he sholde come to her out of Alexandria vnto Antiochia. This **D**irygenes without other hadde seuen yong men & seuen maydens that wrote dyuerse bookes and maters as he gaue hem to wyrite by his owne mouth/he wrote soo moche that **J**erom knowleched that hadde redde of **D**irygenes bookes four thousande volumes without epytles that he had wyrtten/his was a prouerbe of hym / such was his loze / such was his lyf/he slept vpon no bedde/he tasted nether flesche ne wyne. **G**irald⁹ **D**irygenes was nyghe the grettest of holy wyrtters yf he not erred in so moche speche. And as all the Latyn poetes folowen **E**nnius / soo all expositours folowen **D**irygenes. Also in his maner he translated the Byble in to greue. Also he fonded to amende the translacion of other doctours of **A**quila/of **S**ymacus/& **T**heodorion. And there they had more than was in Hebrewes/he made a sygne þ hyght obelus/& is shapen endlong lyke a rodde. And there they hadde lasse than was

in Hebrew or spake derkely/he made **A**mo gre a sygne that is called **A**steriskus and is shapen lyke a sterre. **J**eromus **S**euerus. **E**pistola .xli. There **D**irygenes sayd well/noman sayd better/and there he sayd euill/no man sayd werse. And whan he passed well nyghe all other doctours in his other bookes/he passed hym selfe super **L**antica canticorum. He spake a thousande treatises in chirche & made expositiōs without nombre & called hem themos/yf ony that folowe hym putt error ayenst vs / he maye take hede that the grete **H**omerus slepte somtyme/for in a long werke it is lawfull to slepe somtyme/we shall not folowe his vyces / yf we maye not folowe his vertues. Therfore yf one of his bookes be defowled/whiche booke hyght **P**eriarchor/wher in he vnderstondech euill of the father/and worse of the sone/and worse of the holy goost. And ther he sayde that **C**ryste wyll somtyme thurgh his grete mercy saue the angels that fylle downe fro heuen. And he leyth for hym that verse of the sauter / god shall not be wroth for euermore / neither manace without ende. Shall all his bookes for this be destroyed / he hym selfe **D**irygenes in a pytyle that he wrote to **F**abian þ pope of Rome maketh sorowe for he hadde wyrtten such thynges / and putte the cause of that folpe vpon one **A**mbrose that putt forth his bookes that he had wyrtten pryuely/and made hem comyn er he had corrected and amended them. My frendes sayd he hane done me this.yf I holde my peas. I shal be holden gylty / and yf I answer I shall

Anno grē be holden an enemy/eyther condicōn
 Seuerus. is harde/but of the tweyne I shall che
 se the lighter. About this tyme þ fyfth
 Translacōn was fōūden in a towne
 at Jericho. That Translacōn is cal
 led Vulgata/the auctor therof is vn
 knowen. It semeth that the compyn
 saulter þ we vse is taken out of that
 Translacōn/though we folowe Je
 roms Translacōn in other bokes of
 holy wrytte. But Damalus the pope
 made þ chirche of Rome folowe Je
 rom also in the saulter.

212 **B**assianus Anthonius Seuer⁹
 lone regned after his fader se
 uen yere. This was called
 Marcus Aurelius & Caracalla also
 for a maner clothyng that he gaue at
 Rome. And therfore bathes that he
 made at Rome ben called Caracalla
 ne. This was a right euyl man and
 sharper of maners than his fader / &
 he was vn�uffrable of lecherye. ¶ R.
 Soo that he toke his owne stepdame
 Juliana & wedded her to wyfe. Of
 the place & maner of his dyeng auc
 tours dyscorden as it is layd to fore
 honde. ¶ Gaufr. & A. r. Whyle this
 Bassianus regned / one Carancius
 þ cometh of the lowest blood of Bry
 tons was a noble man of coulepyll &
 of honde / he gate of the Senatours
 the hepyng of the costes of Brytany.
 for that tyme frenshemen & Saxons
 warred therupon. But whan he had
 gotten his arpyng/he dyde more har
 me & damage than proffyte to the co
 mynte. for he behete to the Brytons

that he wolde destroye & chace the Ro
 mayns out of the Flonde yf they wol
 de make him kyng. Thene he slough
 Bassianus & had the kyngdom .vii.
 yere. for the Prytes that fulgencius
 the duke Bassianus moders broder
 had brought out of Scicia and out of
 other londes forloke bassianus in the
 batayll/for Caranci⁹ had hyred hem
 And so Carancius had the vyctorye.
 & gaue to the Prytes a dwellyng pla
 ce in Albania þ is Scotlonde. There
 they were medled with Brytons and
 dwelled there afterwarde longe tyme
 The Senatours of Rome herde here
 of & sente one Allectus with thre Le
 gions in to Brytayne for to slec the
 tyraunt Carancius & he was slayne.
 Allectus regned thre yere & he restored
 Brytany agayne to the power of Ro
 me. ¶ Sir. And for this Allectus gre
 ued and pourlued the Brytons that
 hadde holde with Carancius/one Al
 clepiodotus duke of Cornewayle was
 made kyng. And after thre yere he
 slough Allectus atte London and ma
 ny thousandes of Romayns. ¶ Gau
 fredus. After that London was longe
 besyged. Venedotes men of northwa
 les fylle vpon Gallus Allectus sela
 we and slough hym within London
 atte a broke that hath the name of
 hym & is called Gallebroke or Wal
 broke. And Alclepiodotus regned
 somwhat of yeres in the Flonde vnto
 Dyoclesianus tyme. Thene Coelus
 duke of Colchestre slough Alclepiodo
 tus. ¶ Giraldus and Gaufredus
 calle this Alclepiodotus duke of Cor
 newayle. But Beda li. p. ca. vi. fo
 loweth Eutropius in the storpe of Ro

me & called this Alclepiodotus Prefect of the pretorpe. ¶ Eutropius. Dpius Macrinus prefecte of the pretorpe was Emperour after Bassianus as it were one yere/and thenne atte Archelapdes he was slayne and his sone allo. After Zephirinus Calixtus was pope fyue yere/he ordeyned the fastynge of the foure tyme of the yere for plente of corn & of fruyte/and made a chirche yerde at Rome in a place þ is called Via apia/for to burye in the bodyes of holy martres. Nowe that place is called Cimiterium Calixti. Marcus Aurelius Anthonius þ was holden the sone of Carcalla was Emperour two yere/he forbare no maner of lecherpe. Atte last he was slayne in a stryupnge of knyghtes.

Aurelius Alexander was Emperour .xiii. yere. This was so cruell in correccions of the lawe of chyualtpe/that he vndyd hole Legyons that made grutchynge & stryfe. His assellour was one Dlpian a connyng may of lawe/he was slayne at Magounce in Almayn in stryupnge of knyghtes. In his tyme the sixthe Translacion was founden of holy wrytte in Nicapolis in Palestina ¶ Marcus. Calixtus the pope was martred in Alexanders tyme. And the fyrst Urban was pope after hym. viii. yere/he ordeyned that the offrynge of crysten men sholde none otherwyle be spent than in vte of holy chirche / & in helpe of nedy crysten men. for they ben the bowes of crysten men and the

pyrle of synne. In his tyme the chirche of Rome began fyyste to haue londes & rentes & with the prouffye ther of he fonde notaryes & clerkes to wryte the lypng & dedes of holy sayntes To fore this tyme holy chirche lpyed as the apostles/& receyued oonly moneye to the vte of nedy crysten men. This is that Urban þ crystened Valerianus the spouse of saynt Leclype. & was atte last martred with hym in Aurelius tyme. After hym Poncian was pope fyue yere/& atte last he was brought and martred atte Sardinia. And afterwarde fabyan brought his bodye to Rome & buryed it there. He sayth that one Siriacus was pope after this Poncianus one yere. But by cause he reslygned the papacye apenst the wyll of the clergye. And one Antherus was made pope. And for he wente to Agryppina / whiche now is called Coleyn with enleuen thousand xi. milia de maydens whome he had crystened virginū. well nyghe all / he is not setee in the boke of rekenyng of popes. The Cardynales crowed that he had lefte the poperyche not for deuocion but for lpyng of maydens. Nathelesse he was a cleue mayde martred with the sayd maydens. After that Aurelius was slayne at Magounce. Maximinus Maximin⁹ Julius was made Emperour by the hooft without Audoxyte of the Sena 236 i cours/and was Emperour thre yere/he pourfued holy chirche/and speccally for Dygenes. And he was slayne atte laste in Aquyla. Gordian⁹ was Gordian⁹ Emperour six yere and was slayne of one Phylpp prefecte of the pretorpe not fet from Romme after þ Gordi

anus had ouercome the parthes. fabi
us was pope after Antherus .xv. yere
Whan the pope was deed/this passed
by the waye & talked with his fren/

sate on his hede & sayd/thou shalt be
crowned byllhop of Rome/ and so he
was choleyn by goddes ordenaunce/ &
ordeyned seuen notaryes to wryte the
dedes of holy martres. And he ordey/
ned that euery yere crysme & oyle shol
de be halowed in holy chirche. And
he was martred atte laste in Decius
tyme. In this popes tyme one Nana
cius a preest of Rome desyred to be po
pe/and became an heretyke & denyed
that a synfull man myght be saued.
Therfor was made a coulepyll of thre
score byllhops. That tyme was Af/
fricanus the wryter flouryng. Heracly
des the byllhop sayth that he wrote
the lyues of holy fadres in a boke þ
is called Paradylus. Afrycanus was
prayed & wente to Alexandria & occu
pyed the mayster chayr after Dyrge
nes. Also that tyme Coelus the duke
of Colchestre slough Alcdepiodotus &
regned in Brytayne .xxx. yere vnto
the compng of Constancius.

Philippus.
h 1
Philipp⁹ with his sone Philip
was Emperour seuen yere:
This was the fyrste Crysten
man of all themperours/ & was crys/
tened of saynt Poncius þ marter. He
was soo stedfast in the fayth of holy
chirche that he knowleched frely his
lynne & was houseled to fore alle the

people on esterdaye / his sone was a
crysten man/ but he was soo sterne of
herte that no man myght meoue him
to laughe. Dnes he toke hede how his
fader made a moue & tourned away
his face. Alwaye he withstode dyces
& fonded to stye vp to the partyghte/
nelle of vertues ¶ Eutropius. In the
fourthe yere of this Emperour were
ended a thoulande yere after þ Rome
was bylded. And for solempnyte ther
of. Philip slough bestes without nom
bre in a rounde place þ is called þ gre
te Cirtus. And made playes of þ thea
tre in Marles felde thre dayes & thre
nyghtes to the people þ woke belesy:
fabyan the ~~pope~~ was martred in De
cius the consuls tyme. After hym Co
nelius was ~~pope~~ thre yere / he ordey/
ned that none othe sholde be chalens/
gcd of the ~~pope~~ but it were for the
right fayth of holy chirche. And that
no preest sholde comyette his cause to
an other mannes dome / but it were
appeled to the courte of Rome. Also
atte prayer of saynt Lucina he made
the bodyes of the Apostles to be take
out of the place þ hyght Catacumbes
as it were a charnell & brought Pou
les bodey in the place that is called
Dia hostiensis. And Peters bodey in
the place that is called Vaticanus fal
te by the place where he was putte on
the crosse. In this popes tyme þ Gre
kes had stoley the bodyes of the apo
stles for to brynge hem in to Grece /
but fendes that were closed and dwel
led in mawmettes were compelled
by the vertue of god and cryed. Hel
pe ye men of Rome / for our goddes
bey take awaye from you. Thenne

crysten men vnderstode that this was sayd of thapostles. And mylbyleued men vnderstode that is was sayde of theyr goddes. And so mylbyleuid men & crysten men gadred hem to gydres all in owne rowte by one assente and pourlyewed after the Grekes. Then the Grekes were aferde & threwe the bodpes of thapostles in a pytte atte a place that hyght Catacumba. And whan þ bodpes were take out of that place hit was doubte whether bones were Peters / & whether were Pauls. Thenne crysten men began to praye & to faste & had a reuelacion & a lye wyng of god that the gretter bones were the fyllher bones. þ fyllher was Peter. Philip the older was slayne at Verona. And Philip the yonger was slayne at Rome by gyle & by fraude of Decius. ¶ It is redde in Legenda sanctor that Philip the older had sente his noble knyght Decius for to chastyle Gallia. Decius spedde well & came agayne / & theemperour came ayenst hym out of Rome & was slayn at Verona by his fraude & gyle. Thenne the yonger Philip herde therof & fleyght & toke his faders tresour to Sixtus the pope & to Laurence the dekene for to dele it to poore men. Thenne Decius was made Emperour for men sholde wene that he had slayne his lorde for loue of marymetrye and not trayterly. This Decius pursued crysten men & was Emperour thre yere. He wolde haue crowned his sone Decius Emperour / but his sone wolde not & sayd. I drede that I shall for yete to be a sone yf I be made Emperours. He is leuer sayde he to be not

Emperour & be a meke sone than be Anno grē
Emperour & be a stoute sone & vnbyn
de. My fader shall be Emperour. My Philippus
Emppre shall be to be subgette and
buxom to the Emperour.

ORolius sayth that Decius was Emperour thre yere & Decius. thre monethes. But Eusebius Beda and Cassiodorus telley / that he began to regne the yere after the buyldyng of Rome a thousande yere and four. And by Eusebius Cronycle it semeth that this Decius regned eyght yere and by the Martyloge it semeth that he regned sixteen yere. It semeth þ elles it myght not stonde þ so many popes as Fabyan Cornelius Lucius Stephen & Sixtus were martred in Decius tyme as it is wrytten & radde. Therfore some men wolde suppose that these sixteen yere & two yere of Galerius shal restore the eyghten yere that lacken in the Cronycles of Eusebius & of Beda fro the xv. yere of Tyberius Cesar vnto our tyme. Here among take hede that the elder Decius that slough Philip and was Emperour after hym / he was Emperour as it is here sayd. But the other Decius the yonger was Cesar and not Emperour. And so bytwene these two Decius were bothe Emperours & popes / as Gallus and Volusianus. After hem regned Valerius with his sone Galpenus. xv. yere. In her tyme were martred fyue popes & Laurencius the dekene and Ppoltus

Anno grē Decius. with all his hous. It semeth by this that Galpenus had two names/for he was called Deci^o also. Other men suppose that it was all one Decius that was made Cezar by Phyllyp/ & thylke Decius vnder whome Laurence was martred. And therfor it is no/ ther I redde in Laurence legende Decius Emperour but Deci^o Cezar. It happeth oftyme that some were Cezars & not Augustes ne Emperours. for some were fyrst Cezars and then Augustus and thenne Emperours. 243 2 Thenne in the fyrste yere of Decius theemperour the leuen sleepers begon/ ne to slepe in the mounte Celius and slepe so two hondred yere. And they rose about the last tyme of Theodo/ cius. About that tyme Anthonius the famous monke was born in Egypte Cornelius the pope was martred / & after hym Lucius that was pope thre yere. and Abdon & Sennen were mar/ tred also/ and Saynt Agatha at Ca/ thyna. Also that yere Decius and his sone were slayne of Gothes in Tra/ cia. But it is red in Ypolitus passyon that Decius & Valerian^o were trauay/ led with a fende after Laurences pas/ syon and dyed in that mylchycf. Gal/ lus with his sone Volusianus regned two yere. They wente out of Rome and Emilianus slough hym & toke thempyre with wronge and was slay/ ne the moneth after. In his tyme fyl/ le a pestylence as it were in to all the worlde. And Drygenes deyed & was burped in Tyrus the yere of his age thre score and ten.

Valerianus with his sone Ga/ lperus regned .xv. yere. fyrst he worshyped so holy sayntes that me trowed that his hous had be/ goddes owne chirche. But afterward he was apeyred by one þ was a wyt/ che & began to hate þ fayth of crys/ ten men. Thenne he began to pursue cry/ ten men/ & goddes helpe was so beno/ me hym that he was taken of Sapor/ kyng of Perse/ & his eyen were putte/ out. And he was holden in a dyspyt^o bondage to his lynes ende/ so that he sholde stoupe to grounde/ & the kyng sholde sette his fote on his back whan he sholde lepe to hoise. About þ yere Decius þ byght Galien^o wax cruell & sterne. And Poull the fyrst Hermy/ te wente in to wyldernes & lyued ther vnknowen .lx. yere togyder as Je/ rom wryteth in vitas patrum. After Lucius Stephen was pope thre yere/ he ordeyned that mynystres of holy chirche sholde not were holy velymē/ tes in the comyn vble of euery dape. This Stephen was slayne whyle he sayd his masse. The seconde Cypria/ nus was fyrst a man of lawe & a ple/ ter & afterwarde a preest/ and atte last he was byllhop of Cartage and was martred the same dape that Cornelio/ us the pope was martred/ but not the same yere. After þ Stephen was mar/ tred Sixtus was pope two yere/ he or/ deyned that men sholde syng masse vpon an aulter/ and was afterwar/ de martred with felicissimus and Agapitus in Decius tyme soo sayth the Martploge that is better to byle/ ue than Cronycles of Auctours that ben not knowen. for Galpenus the

Emperour hete Decius also . This Sixtus went in to Spayne in a tyme & fonde there two ponglynges Dyncence & Laurence þ were his owne colyns & were well chered & manerde. He toke hede of hem & brought hem with him to Rome / & Laurercc abode with hym at Rome & Dyncent went agayne in to Spayne / & was martred afterwarde in Dacian⁹ the Juges tyme. After that Sixtus was martred / Denys a monke was pope six yere / he departed parylshes & chirche yerdes & assygned to eueryche parylshe a preste. After Denys felix was pope four yere. Eugenia Prothus & Jacindus were theñe martred at Rome. That tyme Gregorius Nazauenus was in his floures . He was byshop in Constantinople in Grece. Two brethern Germayns strofe for a ponde that had plente of fyllhe / & by his prayers the ponde wexed drye & bere corne & fruyte. Also a chirche sholde be bylded in a place / but the place was so scarce & so narwe / for in the east syde was a grete Roche and a grete Ryuer in the west syde. And Gregorz prayde in a nyght / & on the morn it was founden þ þ Roche was withdrawen as fer as it neded / & so there was a place large ynough for to make & buylde a chirche. Also in a nother tyme in wynter he passed the Alpes / & he must wende by Appolyns Temple / but whan he was goon fro the Temple / the preest of the Temple that was wonte to gete moche good by answers that the mawmette gaf gate no more / for the mawmette gaf none answer. And the preest offred sacrefyce besyly / & it was

sayde hym in his slepe that Appollo Delphycus was putte oute by the comyng of Gregorpe / & he myght not come agayne without leue of Gregorz. Whan the preest herde that / anone he wente to Gregorz & purchaced a letter of hym in these wordes. Gregorz sende gretyng to Appolyn. I suffre the to tourne agayne in to thy place & do as thou were wonte to do / this lettre was sette vp in Appolyns Temple. And Appolyn gaue answer as he was wonte . Whan the preest sawe þ he wente to Gregorpe & prayed hym that he wolde make hym a Crysten man. And atte laste whan Gregorpe was deed he was byshop after hym. Claudius the seconde regned one yere & somwhat of monethes. Dnes he ouercome the Gothes and dyed. After hym his broder Quintilianus regned by assente of knyghtes & was slayn the xv. dawe in Aquila . After that felix þ pope was martred. Eutician⁹ was pope six yere / he ordeyned þ the fyrste fruytes sholde be blessyd vpon the aulter. Also he buryed thre hondred & six ty martres with his owne honde.

Aurelian⁹ of Denmark born was Emperour fyue yere & Aurelian⁹. somwhat of monethes . He was lyke to grete Alysaundre or to Julius . for as Alysaundre in .xii. yere wente in to Inde and Julius in ten yere ouercome the Galles & the Germayns / and fought four yere apensst the Cytzeyns / so in this four yere he

Anno grē restored the lordshyp of Rome. In his
 Aurelian? fyrst tyme the state of holy chirche be
 gan tenceace/ so that a solempne cō
 seyl of bysshops was made at Antyo
 chia. In that cōseyll Paull the here
 tyke was condempned/ but afterwar
 de he was apepred by shrewes & are
 red displeas and stryfe in holy chirche.
 This Aurelianus ouercome the Go
 thes tyue tymes/ this was the fyrst a
 mong Romayns that vled clothes of
 golde/ he dyde on his hede a dyademe
 araped with precyous stones/ he resto
 red to the people vble of swynes fleshe
 Atte last he came in to Gallia & mar
 tred many holy men/ & called the Cy
 te Senalium by his owne name Au
 relian/ & was afterwarde slayne fast
 by Constantynople. After hym Tac
 tus regned six monethes/ after y whi
 che he was slayne in Pontus. Than
 after that flozianus regned thre mo
 nethes & was slayne in Charlis. Af
 ter the passyon of Euticianus Gayus
 was pope .xix. yere / he ordeyned de
 grees of ordres in holy chirche/ hostia
 rius/ lector/ exorcista/ & acolit⁹ & other
 mo. And that norman tholde accule s
 mpyntres of holy chirche to fore a se
 culer Juge. Anatolius bysshop of Aly
 laundre in Laodicia made a boke of
 the verrey ester daye / & ten bokes of
 arismetryke. The herelye of the Ma
 nychies began to spryng. Manycheus
 was of Perse a man of sharpe wytte
 & of straunge maners. fyrste he was
 named Manes/ the Manyches haue
 that name of hym. They saye that
 there ben tweyne fyrst werchers & ma
 hers of thynge. One of good & a no
 ther of euyll/ one of lyght & a nother

of derkenes. Giraldus and Alfr.
 About that tyme the Romayns sente
 one Constancius for to make Coelus
 kyng of Brytayne subget/ and for to
 receyue trybute that was denyed. But
 Coelus was decd after the moneth of
 his comynge & Constancius had the
 kyngdom/ & wedded this Coelus dou
 ghter & gate on her the grete Constan
 tyne. Probus was Emperour six yere
 & somewhat of monethes / he wanne
 Gallia that was out of theyr hondes
 & restored it agayne/ he lete the Gal
 les & Pannonyes haue vble of vyne.
 & whan he had well nygh sette all in
 peas/ he sayd that in shorte tyme me
 tholde haue no nede to knyghtes/ and
 atte last he was slayne in a stryung
 of knyghtes. Carus with his sones
 Carinus & Numerianus was Empe
 rour two yere & he was drowned in
 the Ryuer Tygrys. Also Numerian⁹
 was lad in a lytter for his lore eyen/ &
 his owne wyues fader Aprus satte in
 a wayte for him/ & slough him. Than
 after many dayes he was vnneth fou
 de but by stenche of his carayne. Ca
 rinus was ouercome and slayne at
 Margus.

Diodetianus the sone of Dal
 mata the wyfter was fyrste
 Conlull/ & theñe he was ma
 de Emperour & he was Emperour
 xx. yere. Anone this smote Aprus in
 a gadryng of knyghtes & swore that
 without his trealou & gyle Numeri
 anus hadde not be slayne. This man
 was full ofte hely & subtyll of wyfte/

so that he couth fulfyll his cruelnesse by the enuue of other. This badde & comaunded that me sholde worshype as it were god almyghty/he dled clothes & shoen ryally arayed with precious stones/though Emperours that were to fore hym were saled as Judges & had a rede mantell more than other men/and none other dpuerlyte fro the comyn clothyng of other men but suche a rede mantell. Also for warre and bataylles that were towarde/this toke one Herculi^{us} Maximian^{us} & made hym his felawe in the kyngdome. This Herculi^{us} was openly grym & sterne/and wolde not be vnder the lawe / his sternes were soone knowen by his grysely countenaunce and semblaunt. But Dyocelesian^{us} made hym fyrst Cesar & afterwarde Augustus/he bare downe a grete multitude of chorles & yelde peas to the Galles. In that Journey was the Legyon at Alpes that hete Legyo Thebea/saynt Mauryce was one of that Legyon. Atte last Dyocelesian^{us} made Constanti^{us} & Galeri^{us} Cesars. And soo thempyre was gouerned by two Augustus Dyocelesian^{us} & Maximian^{us} and by two Cesars Constanti^{us} and Galeri^{us}. He that is Augustus is gretter than he that is Cesar. And for he wolde haue the gretter afynyte. Dyocelesian^{us} made Constanti^{us} forsake his wyf & wedde Throdora the stepdoughter of Herculi^{us} Maximian^{us}/and Constanti^{us} gaue on her six childerey. And he made Galeri^{us} wedde his doughter & forsake his wyf. And atte last Dyocelesian^{us} and Maximian^{us} left of them

pyre by theyr free wyll & begonne to be philolophres. Thenne Constanti^{us} and Galeri^{us} deled thempyre bytwene them tweyne. And soo Illiricum & the east londes fylle to Galeri^{us}/and the west londes fylle to Constanti^{us} / but he helde hym contente with fraunce and Spayne & graunted the other londes to Galeri^{us}. Therrfore Galeri^{us} ordeyned two Cesars. Maximian^{us} in the east / and Seuerus in Italpe / and helde hym contente with Iliricum allone that is Grece. In the meane tyme Dyocelesian^{us} fonded to see Constanti^{us} that was y^e lone of Helene. But Constanti^{us} was ware of y^e gyle & fledde to his fader. That yere saynt George of Capadocia y^e was trybun^{us} in Perse at a Lyte that hete Dyopolis y^e is belydes Joppen. And he was martred vnder Dacianus the Juge. By dome of the coulepyll of Nyrene his legende is acompted for wrytynge y^e is called Apocryfa. ¶ Treuisa Apocryfa is a wrytynge of none auctoryte by cause thautori therof is vnknowen. Than it foloweth in the storpe. After that Caius was martred Marcellin^{us} was pope .viii. yere Dyocelesian^{us} compelled hym somtyme & he assented to do sacrifice to mawmettis/but afterwarde in coulepyll y^e was made in Campania he knowleched his trespas to forenyne scoie bysshops & clothed himself in heer & threwe powder & dust on his owne hede & submytted hym to stonde to the dome & Jugement of the bysshops. Thenne the bysshops sayde y^e hast forsake / & Peter forloke & was demed of none other may but wente

 Dyoclesian⁹ out and wepte bytterly & soire/therfor
 deme thou thy selfe. And I sayde he
 deme that I be deposed & sette downe
 and I accorde all them that burpe my
 bodye in holy burpels. Afterwarde he
 knowleched before Dyoclesian⁹ that
 he was a crysten may & so he was be
 heded & his bodye laye .xxx. dayes in
 the strete vnburped. And saynt Peter
 appered in a nyght to Marcellus the
 preeft that was pope after Marcelli
 nus and sayd to hym in this maner.
 Marcelle why burpeste thou not my
 bodye/by whiche he vnderstode Mar
 cellinus bodye/haste y not redde that
 euery man that loweth & meketh him
 shall be made hve. Therne burpe thou
 hym fast by me/that burpels departe
 vs not / for one grace hath made vs
 301 14 rightfull Helspe L yngons Constan
 cius Augustus slough thre score thou
 lande Almaynez / for he was closed
 within the Lyte & leet out by a rope
 ouer the walle vnwetynge the hook.
 302 16 Galerius was ouercome of Marsus
 & flye to Dyoclesianus and me sayth
 that he was rescepued of hym in the
 waye with soo grete booste & tryum
 phe/that Dyoclesianus ranne by Ga
 lerius chare many long myle clothed
 303 18 as an Emperour. ¶ Marc. After the
 passyon of Marcellinus the pope/the
 see was voyde many dayes. And then
 Marcellus was pope fyue yere/he or
 deyned in the Lyte .xv. Cardynals
 for the scruple of crystnyng and burp
 enge. Maximianus themperour ma
 de this pope kepe beestes/for he wol
 de not doo sacrefyce to ma wmettes.
 Therne in a nyght his clerkes ladde
 hym out of the stable/and in the bro

de waye he halowed an hous & made
 therof a chirche. And Maximianus
 made of the chirche a stable & closed
 Marcellus in the comyn warde for he
 sholde este kepe beestes/& there Mar
 cellus deyed clothed in heer. After hē
 Eusebi⁹ the philician was pope. vii.
 monethes. ¶ R. By the Cronyke of
 Eusebius and of Beda this .xviii. ye
 re of Dyoclesianus was the fyrst yere
 of the grete persecucion that was vnder
 dyoclesianus in the east/& Maxi
 mianus in the west. That persecucion
 was grettest and lengest duryng/
 for it dured ten yere contynuelly. for
 though Dyoclesianus and Maximia
 nus lette & yelde vp thempyre in the
 thyrde yere of this persecucion as it
 is layd to fore honde/yet the persecu
 cion that was begonne ceaced not to
 fore the seuenth yere of the grete Con
 stantyn. He sayth that this persecu
 cion was so greuous & soo grete that
 churches & bokes of goddes lawe wes
 re brente. And within one moneth in
 dyuerse places of y worlde were .xvii.
 thousande holy men & women crow
 ned with martyrdom. No man shol
 de bye & selle ne take vp water of o
 ny place but yf he dyde sacrefyce to
 ma wmette. That tyme were mar
 tred many noble martres. Pantraci⁹
 the fyrst. felicianus. Sebastianus. fe
 lix & Andactus / seuen brethery & her
 moder Bedon. Grilogon⁹ & the four
 that bey called quatuor coronati. Also
 vncente. George & Panthaleon. Vi
 tus. Modestus. Ciprianus & Justina
 Colmas & Damianus & that childe
 Barala. fidis and Eufemia. Lucia.
 Anastalia. Agnes & Gorgonius and

all in one Lyte in frigia. ¶ Beda li. ca. vi. That tyme saynt Albon was martyred in Byrtayne/of hym fortu natus the preest in libro que de laude virginum intitulauit/speketh in this maner. The plenteuous Byrtayne byngeth forth þ noble Albon/whan this Albon was a paynym he lodged a crystey man and was conuerted by his loze & toke vpon hym the habyte of the clerke & came to fore the Juge & was dampned to the deeth / & conuerted moche folke fast by the broke that was dryed by his prayers. And afterwarde on the toppe of the hylle where as he deyed he made by his prayers a welle sprynge out of the erthe/& tour ned the tormentours that holde slee hym to the feyth of holy chirche. He was martyred fast by the Lyte Verolanium that hete in englyshe Verlam chestre or watlyngchestre. ¶ Beda. That tyme come vp Arrians herelype that enfected not oonly the grete londes of the worlde / but also the Flondes of the worlde that bey alwaye redy to here newe thynges & holde noo thyng certayne. Dyoctelianus and Maximianus forsoke thempyre and ladde a pryuate lyfe that one at Ny chomedia and that other at Melane. Melchiades was pope four yere / he forbade fastyng on the sondaye & on the thursdaye/for paynems worshyppen thylke dayes. Galcrius was Emperour one yere and ordeyned tweyne Lezars Maximius & Seuerus. ¶ Beda libro pri. That tyme Constantius deyed at Porke in Byrtayne the yere of his pryncypate. xiii. and leftte after hym his oldest sone goten on Helene

that was Constantyn hyng of Byrtayne Anno gre tayne and of fraunce.

¶ W hyle Constantyn dyde nobly & bare hym myghtly & stron Costatin. gely/the knyghtes of the pre torpe at Rome toke Maxencius Her culius sone & called hym Augustus. Thenne Galeri⁹ Augustus sente Se uerus þ he had made Lezar with all his hooft ayenst hym to Rome. Seue rus besyged the Lyte & was bytraped by falsehede of his owne knyghtes & fled to Rauenna & there was slayne Herculus Maxenci⁹ fader herde ther of & brake out of his hudels & wolde be Emperour/& dyd his best for to pry ue Maxencius of myght & of power. Therefore he & Galerius comforted Dyoctelianus for to take the dygnys tees that he had leftte / & he lected not therby /but answerde & sayd / wolde god that ye myght see wortes in my honde in Salou/syberly thenne wolde ye not deme that I holde take this agayne. Thenne Herculus for stryfe of knyghtes was openly loy & afer de and wente in to fraunce for to reue byneme & take thempyre with trelon from Constantyne that had wedded his doughter /but he was betweped by the same doughter faulsta Constanti nus wof & fled to Marlelle and was there slayne. Thenne Galerius made Licinius Emperour at Tarent the worst of all men in couetyse/sharpest in lecherye / & moost enuye to lectred men/he called lettres comyn pestylen ce. And the meyne of the palays he

Anno grē called Spadones that is to saye ghelded men/ & also he called hem mowhtes and rattes of the palays. Whan Galerius had persued & greued men ten yere/ thenne his brest roted within & by cause philiciens myght not endure þ' stenche of him/ he slough of hem full oft. In a tyme a philician sayd to hym that this myschpye was goddes wratthe & wreche. Thenne he sente out maundementes & reconseyled crysten men that were exiled/ & theñe he deyed. After Melchiadis Siluester was pope. xxiiii. yere/ he crystened the grete Constantyn & denled hym of his melespye in his crystenynge. Also he delpyered the Cyte of Rome of the pestylence of þ' dragon/ by his prayer he reyled a deed hole to lyfe/ he ouercome the Jewes in dysputacion/ he made the fyrste grete counseyll at Nyces there were thre hondred bysshops and xviii. He had the names of poor men of wydowes of faderlesse & moderles childern wryten in a boke and fonde hem what them neded / he ordeyned to faste the wednesday frydaye & lasterdaye. Also he ordeyned þ' the thursdaye sholde be worshypped as the sondaye/ for that daye cryst ordeyned the sacramente of his bodye/ & on a thursdaye he ascended vp in to heuen/ and holy crysme & oyle is halowed on a thursdaye. ¶ **Ci. p.** Thenne Constantyn in his seuenth yere wente toward a bataylle apenst Maxencius and lawe in his slepe the sygne of the crosse shynynge in heuen as it were biennynge layte in fyre / and Angels stode besyde and sayd Constantyn. **Thoycanata** / that is to saye by this

token thou shalt haue the vycroye: Thenne he awoke and made pepnte the sygne & token that he had seen in the baners and penons of his knyghtes. Atte last Maxencius was ouercome atte brydge pount Milinum. And Constantyn wente to Rome & made pepnte the sygne and token of the crosse in the right hondes of the ymages that the Senatours had areyled in the worshyp of his tryumphis and of his vycroye. And he made wryte vnderne the/ this is the sygne & token of that god of lpf that maye not be ouercome. **Gaufr. and Alfr.** Constantyn wente out of Brytayne to the mypyre of Rome. Thenne Octavius duke of the Jewelles warred in Brytayne & toke the kyngdom. Constantyn herde therof & sente on Trahern the eame of his moder Helene with thre Legvons of knyghtes apenst Octavius/ but hem byfell dyuerse happes/ so that in dyuerse tymes one hadde the maystrye/ and este that other/ and so Trahern was slayne by fraude and gyle. And soo Octavius regned vnto the tyme of Gracianus and Valentinianus themperours. ¶ **Ci. de p.** After that Maxencius was ouercome. Constantyn was smeton with a stronge lepre or melespye. ¶ **R.** As it is wryten in Legenda sanctor in Siluestres lyfe. Some suppole that Constantyn was smeton with melespye for wreche of persecucion and tyrauntye that he vled persued and greued crysten men durynge that persecucion Siluester amonge other fledde out of the Cyte but without ony doubtte for what cause it euer were that he was smeton

with meselype. It is sothe that Siluester heled hym of it. ¶ **Sir. vbi s.** By counseyll of the Senatours and of the bysshopes of myshpleuyd men were broughe thre thousande smale childery that sholde haue be slayne/ and Constantyn sholde haue ben walshen in the warme blood of the childery for to hele hē of his lepre/ whan the kyng sawe the moders of the childery wepe and make grete sorowe. Thenne he sayd the dygnpte of them pyre cometh of the welle of mylidenes for it is demed ꝑ he sholde dye that sleeth a childe in batayll. *De legenda sancti Siluestri.* Thenne it were a cruell dede for to do to our owne/ that we be forboden for to do the straungers/ what proupyte is it to ouercome straunge men & be our selfe ouercome with cruelnesse. Hit is the vertue of strengthe for to ouercome straunge men/ but it is the verne of thewes for to ouercome vyces and synne. In that batayll we be stronger than they/ but in this batayll we ben stronger than we our selfe. Thenne late mylidenesse haue the maystrye in this doyng / that we mowe the better haue ꝑ maystrye of our enemyes. for it is better to vs for to deye and saue the childrens lyf than to gete a grete cruell lyf by the deyh of Innocent childery. And yet it is not certayne that we shall saue our lyf/ but it is certayne ꝑ yf it were so saued/ it were a cruel lyf. Thenne the next nyght after Peter and Poull appyred to hym and sayd. for thou were agrysed and agast & sparedest to sheude the childrens blood/ take to the coueyll of heele and of Sauacyon. Sen

te after Siluestre that bydeeth hym in Anno grē the mount Sarapt and make hym come to the. And whan he was broughe to the. And whan he was broughe he shewed the kyng the ymages of the Appostles Peter and Poull that had appyered to hym in his slepe. Thenne he fasted. viii. dayes and made hym Cathecuminus/ & was crystened atte last and knowleched that he had seen Cryste. ¶ **Trenisa.** Cathecuminus is he that lerneth the sayth of holy chirche and is in wyll to be crystened. ¶ **R.** But Ambrose & Jerom in a Cronyke tellen that Constantyn abode with his bapteme to his laste dayes that he myght be crystened in Jordan. Thenne whan Constantyn was crystened/ he made prysons to be opened and lete the prysoners go out. and Temples and maynettes were destroyed/ and chirche doores opened/ olde chirches amended and newe chirches buylded. And he graunted to chirches freedom and pryueleges/ and ordeyned that the bysshop of Rome sholde be hyst of all bysshops/ and yaued the tenth deile of all his posseloyon to churches/ but atte last the reparaylyng of Saynt Peters chirche he wente with a mattoke and opened the fyrst erthe and bare clepe to the werke on his sholdres. ¶ **Giraldus vbi supra:** from that tyme forwarde by cause of the grete Rycheue that the chirche of Rome hadde/ it was made the more seculer/ and hadde more seculer besynes than spyrtyuell deuocion. And more pompe and boost outward than holynesse within forth as it is supposed. Therefore it is wryten that whan Constantyn hadde made that yeste

Anno grē to the chirches. The olde enemye cry
 ed openly in thayer / this dape denyng
 Cōstātin⁹. is heled and shedde in holy chirche.

Therfore Jerome in *Vitas patrum*
 sayth. Syth that holy chirche increas/
 ed in possessyons / it is decreaced in
 Nota bene de possessio nibz ecclie et de virtuti
 bertues. Also theemperour in the pa/
 lays Laterane byldeed a chirche in the
 worshyp of saynt Johan / and made
 therin a fountone of a maner stone
 that hete porphiriticus and araped
 it within with syluer / and in the myd
 dell therof was a pyler that bare a
 byoll of golde with barwe brennyng
 alwaye (*In legenda Siluestri*) Sil/
 uester halowed this chirche the .ix. day
 of Nouembre. That dape was the
 ymage of our sauour pepnted on the
 walle by goddes owne werke and by
 no mānes dede / that ymage was seyn
 of all men / and is there yet vnto this
 tyme. Siluester ordeyned to areve in
 all churches aulcers of stone / but in
 that chirche he stablyshed an aulter
 of tree that was therin afore. Men say
 that Peter and his successours longe
 masses vpon that aulter. for holy chir
 che was so strongly pursued to that
 tyme / that the bysshop had no certay/
 ne abydyng in the Cyte of Rome / but
 they longe masses in holowe caues &
 dennes where they myght beste vpon
 holowe aulter of tree whiche was bor

Helena scā ne about. Helene was in Brytayne &
 herde how her sone spedde and sente
 hym lettres and prayled hym moche
 by cause he had forsake mawmetrye.
 but she prayled hym not in that þ he
 worshypped & byleued in a man that
 was naped to þ crosse. Theemperour
 wrote agayne to his moder that she

holde byng maystres of Jewes that
 the soth myght be knowen by dyspus
 tacion. Thenne Helene brought forth
 seuen score wyle men of Jewes & Sil
 uester come ayenst hem / and two wyl
 se men that were no Jewes ne crysten
 men were ordeyned by comyo assent
 for to deme the louth. Thenne the Je
 wes were ouercome / and after that
 they hadde longe dysputed one of the
 Jewes spake certayn wordes in a wyl
 de booles eere / and the boole deyed as
 none. Thenne anone men repleued
 Siluester. And he sayd it is not god/
 des name that he had nemped. for
 god sleeth and veuech lyf as it is wry
 ten. I shall slee and I shall make
 thynge lyue and be a lyue. But this
 hath named the deuels name that
 maye not but slee / and yet not thay
 by suffraunce of god. for Lyons and
 wylde bestes maye slee / but they may
 not make thynge that they slee to ly
 ue agayne. Thenne yf he wyll that I
 byleue on hym late hym areple the bo
 le fro deth to lyf that he hath slayne.
 And by cause he myght not areple the
 boole that he hadde slayne / the Jewes
 promysed that they wolde byleue in
 Cryste yf Siluester myght areple the
 boole from deth to lyfe. Thenne by
 the prayers of Siluester the bole was
 arepled from deth to lyf. And Helene
 the quene and the Jewes and the Jus
 ges byleueden all in Cryste. Thenne
 Constantyn sente his moder Helene
 to Jerusalem for to bynge thens the
 holy crosse. Ambrose sayth that this
 Helene was an hosteler at Treuerent
 in fraunce / and Constantinus Ces
 zar wedded her for her beaute. But

the storie of Brytons telleth that she was Coelus doughter kyng of Brytayne as it is sayd tofore honde. This Helene came to Jerusalem and founde there the holy crosse and departed it & left one parte in Jerusalem/and brought to her sone that other dele & the four nayles/and she dyde do putte tweyne of them in her sonnes bydell. And the thyrde in an ymage of the rode/and she threwe the fourth nayle in to the see Adriaticus/that was tofore honde a swolow full perylous to seple by. And soo syth that tyme the fest of the Inuencion of the holy crosse hath ben holden. Thene the emperour wente from Rome to Bysanci⁹/and called it after his owne name Constantynople/and made fayr that Lyte & fayr houses and churches & with dygnyte of Patryrke / and brought cheder the noblesse of Rome. ¶ *Vir. ubi supra.* In the begynnyng of holy chirche were but thre Patryrkes as it were in stede of Abraham, Ysaac & Jacob. One was atte Antyocheia in Alya. A nother was in Alexandria in Affryca. And the thyrde was atte Rome in Europa. These thre Peter halowed by his owne syttynge. In tweyne therof he was bysshop hym selfe / but his dysciple Marcus helde the thyrde atte Alexandria in Peters name. After that the Synodus Nycena hadde yeven that pryuelege to the bysshop of Rome that he sholde be as boue all other bysshopes/as thempour is aboue all other kynges. And that he sholde be called pope as the chref fader. And the ryght of the Patryrke was tourned to Constantyno

ple as it were to the seconde Rome. Anno gr^o Costantin⁹. The other sees of Patryrkes were chaunged. The see of Antyocheia to Jerusalem. And y^e see of Alexandria to Aquilia. And it is suppoled that the cause therof was for wyched crysten men sholde be take in to the londe of mysbyleued men/and so it sholde folowe that they sholde lese the holy places. ¶ Eusebius in hystoria ecclesiastica li. x. Constantinus dyde to god almyghtyes preestes grete reuerce and worthyp. Therfore whan the bysshops were assembled in the Synode of Nycena by comaundement of Constantyn and by counseyll of Siluester for to declare the fayth of holy chirche. Many of hem playned eche vpon other and putte vp bylles to the Emperour for he sholde do hem righte. The Emperour sawe that holy chirche for the whiche the bysshoppes were comen myght lyghtely be lette by luche playntes and stryf. Therfor he lette hem a certayne daye after the Synode and counseyll for to make an ende of all thylke causes & playntes / but he brente pryuely alle thylke bylles of hem that made playntes & sayd. God hath ordeyned you as it were goddes to be your owne Judges. Therfore I holde that it were vnlytynge that we that sholde be demed of you sholde deme you that ben goddes. But in holy chirche among your selfe treate ye of your errours and defawtes. So that noo thyng be knowen outwarde that is vnsemy to your holynesse. And yf ye wyll nedes stryue / abyde ye the dome of god almyghty as the psalme sayth. God sto

de to the Synagoge of goddes. Certaynly yf I sawe ony of your ordre lynne with a woman. I wolde couere hym with my mantell / by cause that for none euill men sholde haue occasyon to speke euill of your relygyon. Therfore bretheren treate ye more of the fayth of holy chirche / for therfore ye ben comen. And whan this was sayd / he threwe the bylles in to the fyre and brente hem. That yere Saynt Martyn was born. And thenne the twelvfthe yere he was made Catherin⁹ cuminus that is he that lerneth the feyth of holy chirche. In the sixtenth yere he was made knyght / and in his eyghententh yere he was crystened / and was knyght after that two yere vnder Julianus. In the Synode of Nycena were thre hondred and eygheten bysshopes. That Synode was made sixteen dayes to fore the moneth of Iupll in the Cyte of Nycena in Bythinia / and it was made apenste the Arrians Fotinos and the Sabellians Saynt Nycholas was at that Synode / tho it was ordeyned that the fastynge of the lente that tho forhonde dured fro the sixth dawe of Ianpuer to the sixtenth dawe of feuerer sholde begyne and dure as it is now vled And that for thre caules. The fyrste cause for our fastynge sholde be coupled to the tyme of Crystus passyon. The seconde cause for we sholde in thende of our fastynge receyue Crystus bodye in clene lyfe. The thyrde cause for oure lord sholde fynde vs fastyng. Hyder to Eusebius and pamphilius wrpten the stoire ecclesiastica whiche is called bystoria Tripertita.

Thenne Jerome wrpteth forth that stoire vnto the yonge Theodosius tyme. And Theodorus the bysshop wrpteth that stoire all out. Arnobius Rethoricus was flourynge this tyme in Affryca / he was dryuen to the fayth of holy chirche as it were by lueuenes and the bysshop of the place wolde not receyue hym er he had made clere boke of the fayth and delyuere them as for plegge of his trewe fayth. Iuuenus the preest wrote the gospels to the chirche of Rome in verses of six fete. After Siluester Marcus was pope eyght monethes / he ordeyned the bysshop hostiensis sholde vse a palle and also sacre the pope. To this Marcus Athanasius bysshop of Alexandria and other bysshopes of Egypte wrpten for seuenty chapptres that were publyshed in the Synode of Nycena. In that Epyllle Athanasius knowleched that his boke sholde be brent of the heretikes Arrians. After Marcus Julius was pope sixteen yere / he was exiled in the seconde Constantinus tyme. The bones of saynt Andrew the Apostle and of saynt Luke the Euangelyste were translated into Constantinople. The grete Constantyn deyed at Nychomedia. And Jerom was born. Jerom in bystoria Tripertita sayth that Constantyn in his laste dayes was crystened agayne of one Eusebius bysshop of Nychomedia that was of the Arrians. And so Constantyn fylle in to the euill loie of the Arrians / but that is vnderstanden of the seconde Constantyn / this Constantinus sone namely for saynt Gregoie in his Res

gyster wyrteth to Maurice the Emperour and called Constantyn the Emperour of good mynde. And in the storye Tripertita his ende is approued. And Ambrose vpon the .xiii. psalme sayth that he was a man of grete mercyte and mede/and allowed afore god. And Pysdre in his cronycle sayth that he made a gracpous ende. And also the Grekes maketh a fest of him the enleuenth daye of Maye.

Constantinus the grete Constantinus sone regned after his faders dech with his brethren Constantyn and Constant six and twenty yere / he was bespronge with Arrius heresyte and despyled churches and chaced crysten men and exiled Julius the pope fourteen yere and chaced Athanasius bysshop of Alexandria as it were in to all the worlde. That yere Arrius the heresyte by helpe of the Emperour wente to Constantinople to churche for to stryue agaynst crysten men / and tourned by Constantyn place for to clense his belly/and he voyded out his bowels and so he deped there mylcheuously. That yere Julius the pope began to come agayne out of the countree of Terlon/there he hadde ben for to destrope Arrius heresyte. Thenne he was warned by an Angell that he sholde translate Clementes bodye. And whyle he dyde as the Angell hadde/the see withdrew htm as he was wonte on saynte Clementes daye. And his bodye was sette vpon the bynke of the see/

and there is buylded a churche. And Anno gre anone the buryels that was left in the see with the erthe about arose vp and became an Flonde/and syth men come to that Flonde by shyppes and bottes/ & there is buylded a churche. That yere Paule the fyrst hermyte deped in Egypte the yere of his age an hondred and .xiii. Eusebius in hystoria ecclesiastica li. xxi. That yere was a stronge persecucion ayenst Athanasius for he had a scoler that hete Arsenius he had trespaced and drad the chastylynge of his mayster/and fledde and hydde hym in hydynge places. Athanasius his enemyes tolde that Athanasius bare with hym this scoler his arme for to vlc witchecrafte therwith. Atte last these tydynge came to Arsenius there he was hyd / the daye tofore that his mayster sholde come to his answer. Arsenius come to his mayster/ but he hydde hym est as his mayster bad. And the strength of the vnwylfull corrupcion was relceyned therby. Thenne Athanasius made a lygne to his preest Tymotheus that he sholde answer. Thenne the preest axed beley yf he were the same man that the woman spake of/and she answered stedfastely that it was soo. Thenne it was soone knowen that thacculacōn was fals & not trewe. After this Athanasius was exiled as it were in to all the worlde about / so that he had no seker place for to dwelle Inne. Therfore two yere togydres he dwelled in a ponde that was withoute water/so that vnnethe he sawe the sonne all that while/ but there he was bewreyed by a yonge woman. And

Anno grē thenne coude he fynde no lyker place
 in all Constantius kyngdom. Theñe
 Constantius. he went to Constant Cezars londes/
 & ther he was locoured a whyle with
 one Maximus byshop of Treuerent
 And in þ̄ whyle he made the symbolū
 Quicūq; vult salu⁹ esse. Atte last Con
 stant Cezar sente letters to his broder
 Constantius/ & Athanasius was resto
 red agayne to his byshopryche. But
 Constant Cezar deyed & theñe Atha
 nadius fylt agayne in grete hate and
 wrath in so moche that grete rewar
 des were promysed to hem that wol
 de bynge hym or slee hym & bynge
 forth his hede. Thenne in Julianus
 the apostates tyme Athanasius fledde
 este and rowed by the Ryuer Nylus.
 Thenne one that was sette for to ta
 ke hym pursued hym. And Athanasius
 was ware therof & tourned his bo
 te towarde the clif agayne as it were
 for to mete with his enemye / but his
 enemye coude not blyue/that he that
 fledde fro hym wolde soo mete with
 hym. And therfore he axed of Atha
 nadius that late in his bote/ yf he had
 seen Athanasius/ he passeth not fer to
 fore sayd Athanasius/ and so his ene
 mye was begyled & passed forth day
 348 10 les. Sapor kyng of Perse besyged
 the Cyte Nysibyn two monethes / &
 by the prayer of Saynt Jame that
 was byshop of that Cyte/ the snow
 tes of Dlyfautes & his hors eeres we
 re soo full of gnattes & of grete flies
 that they threwe a downe all þ̄ was
 vpon hem and dysparcled all thooft.
 341 13 Saynt Nycholas deyed/ at his Tom
 be sprang out a well of oyle atte his
 hede/ & a well of water atte his fete.

Atte last his boones were translated
 to Barrus the yere of our lord a thou
 sande four score & leuen. After Juli
 us Liberius was pope. xix. yere. He
 was outlawed thre yere/ for he wolde
 not fauoure the Arrians. In the mes
 ne tyme by his coulepyll the clergye of
 Rome ordeyned felix pope. This fe
 lix made a counsepyll with .xlviii. bys
 hops/ there he condemned and putte
 of two prestes Arrians Hrlacius and
 Valent. Constantius the Emperour
 herde therof & reconcyld Liberius/ for
 hym semed that he was easyer to the
 Arrians. Thenne Liberius as he that
 was ouercome with the gref of exi
 lyng & I gladed for he was pope as
 gayne/ assented to herelye/ & put dow
 ne felix & helde the churches of Peter
 and Paule & of Laurence vpolently
 and with strengthe / soo that clerkes
 and prestes that fauoured felix we
 re slayne in the churche/ and Liberius
 forbade it not. felix was martred.
 Hytorinus the Rethour and Donas
 tus the Gramarye were holde grete
 meny in Rome. Anthonius the monke
 deyed in Egypte the yere of his age
 an hondred and syue. Saynt Hyl
 larye byshop of poytiers by conspyracy
 of the byshop Arelatensis an Arrian
 was exiled thre yere in frigia / there
 he wrote noble bokes of our relygyon
 Atte Selencia in Gaurlia was ma
 de a counsepyll. There was put vp a
 bylle to the Emperour that Hyllyarye
 had made / and Hyllyarye had leue to
 come agayne home in to peytowe.
 Marc. He vled for to save of this
 Hyllyarye that Leon the pope þ̄ was an
 heretyke sayd to hē in the coulepyll of

bysshops thou art Gallus & not Gal
lina. ¶ Trevisa. Gallus is a cock &
Gallus is a frensheman. Thenne
he mente that hyllyarpe was a frensh
sheman. Thenne it foloweth in the
storpe hyllyarpe sholde saye thou art a
lyon but not of the lygnage of Juda
Also in the counseyll of bysshops noo
man arose apenst hyllyarpe / & hyllyar
pe sayd the erthe is our lordes. They
the erthe aroose in a maner of a tote
for to resceyue hyllyarpe. But this is
founden in no Troycle that is auten
tyke / by cause no pope was called Leo
in hyllyarius tyme / but yf Liberi⁹
the pope that fauoured heretykes or
some false pope was called Leo.

Whan Constantinus was decd
Julian⁹ Apostata that was
Lezar was made Emperour
and was Emperour as it were two
pere. In his tyme were martred pyg
meus the preest that had bey to fore
Julianus mayster. Johan and Paul
le & Quiriacus that hete Judas bys
shop of Jerusalem for he had fonde
the crosse. ¶ R. Of this Julianus it
is redde (Vndeci⁹ li⁹ hystorie triprite)
that Constancius the grete Constan
tinus brother had two sones one Gal
lus and this Julianus. But whan the
grete Constantyn was decd his sone
Constancius was Emperour / & ma
de his eame Gallus Lezar. But af
terwarde for suspeccion of his grete
wytte he made him be slayne at hyl
tria. And therfore this Julian⁹ Gal
lus broder drad lest he sholde be slayn

& became a monke & made hym full Anno gre
pope holy vnd monkes habyte. Ther
fore a woman brought hym to kepe
thre stones full of golde couered abo
ue with asshes / but Julian⁹ toke the
golde & delyuered to the woman y⁹ sto
nes full of asshes. And whan the gol
de was taken away Julianus coude
not not be conuycte / for the wytnelles
that were present atte resceyurige of
them sawe no thyng but asshes. And
so Julianus toke y⁹ golde & wente to
Rome / & dyd so moche y⁹ he was Con
sull / & atte last he gate hym thempy
re & was Emperour. This Julian⁹
in his childhode lerned Nygromancy
and wytchecraft / & on a tyme as his
mayster was out he rad in his bokes
of that craft / and there came before
him a grete multytude of fendes / and
he drad him sore & made the sygne of
the crosse / and anone all the fendes
vanysshed away. And so he tolde his
mayster whan he came home / and
his mayster sayd that the fendes ha
ted mooste the sygne of the crosse.
Julianus came to Rome and a fens
de shewed hym to hym by the doyn
ge of a wytche / and promysed hym
thempyre yf he wolde forsake crysten
fayth / and soo it was done. Thenne
Constancius made him Lezar & sent
hym in to fraunce / there he dyde mas
ny vyctories / & gate a crowne of Lau
reall that henge bytwene twe pylers &
brake the rope that the crowne henge
by & was ryally crowned with that
crowne. They that sawe that tolde
that it was a tokey that he sholde be
Emperour. Whan Constanci⁹ was de
cd Julianus was made Emperour / &

Anno grē
Julianus. he fonded to please all men. Therfor
 in the begynnynge of his Emppre he
 graūted that euery man sholde holde
 what seyth he wolde / but he destroyed
 the sygne of the crosse with alle that
 he myght / and suppoled therby for to
 gete to hym moost grace of fendes.
 Thenne he opened Temples / & dyde
 sacrefyce to ma wmettes. Ones whyle
 he dyde so / dew fylle vpon his clothes
 & vpon all other mannes clothes that
 there were in the lyknes of the crosse
 In a nother tyme in the bowels of a
 beest that was slayne to sacrefyce was
 foude the shap of the crosse bedppped
 about with a crowne. The mynystres
 sawe þ & sayd þ the vxtorpe of crys-
 tus crosse lasteth wichouten ende / but
 Julianus sykeled with hem & sayd /
 that that was a token of constraynyn-
 ge of crystus looze / & that it sholde ne-
 uer passe the wydenes of the cerde. Al-
 so he dyde somtyme sacrefyce at Con-
 stantynople and Calcedonius the bys-
 shop was blynde for age & reprinted
 Julian⁹ sharply. Thy man of Ga-
 lyle sayd Julianus myght not saue
 the fro blyndenesse / therof I thanke
 hym sayd the byshop that he hath be-
 noma my syght that I sholde not see
 the pryued of all mplydenesse. Also at
 Antyochia he gadred togydres the ho-
 ly vessels and towapls of the aulter
 and defowled hem with the fylche of
 his ars. And anone wormes sprange
 out therof & frate so Julian⁹ nether
 ende that he myght neuer be delpuerd
 therof while he was alpyue. Also his wy-
 warder pssed vpon vessels of the chir-
 che & sayd. Lo in what vessels Maries
 sone is serued. And anone his mouth

became his ars & serued afterwarde
 in stede of his nether ende. Also Jus-
 lianus for hate of crysten men began
 to buylde the Temple of Iherusalem
 vpon his owne coste. But alle
 that was buylde a daye / erthe shak-
 kyng thre we it downe a nyght. Al-
 so fyre come out of the Temple and
 destroyed moche folke. And in the
 nyght after the sygne of the crosse
 was seen vpon all mennes clothes.
 Also Julianus put out of his court
 Ennuches that is ghelded men. Bar-
 bours and Cookes. Ennuches for
 his wyfe was deed and he hadde wed-
 ded none other after her. He dyde as
 waye Cookes for he vsed symple me-
 tes. And Barbours for one myght
 serue many men. He made many bo-
 kes and blamed therein his predeces-
 sours. In that he dyde awaye Coor-
 kes and Barbours / he dyde as a phi-
 losophre & not as a prynce. In that
 he blamed prynces he dyde not as a
 philosophre ner as a prynce. Then-
 ne Julianus wente downe in to Per-
 se as it is redde in Vitas patrum / and
 sente a fende in to the west londres for
 he sholde bynge hym worde thennes
 but the fende was ten dayes lette of
 his Journepe by one Publius a mon-
 ke þ was alwaye in his bedes so that
 the fende brought his loide none ans-
 were agayne. Whan fendes hadde
 promysed hym vxtorpe of the perles
 his sophistres axed in this maner of
 a crysten man / what suppoest thou
 doth your god now that Carpenters
 sone. The crysten man answerd and
 sayd / he maketh a burpels for thy
 mayster Julianus. Julian⁹ went in

to perse & come vnto Chepysont & besyged there the kyng of the coultre & forloke some of the kyngdom that was profered to hym/for he trowed þ the grete Alysandres soule was putte in his bodye by the moeyng of pythagoras & of plato that sayd / that the soules of mankynde passed from bodies to bodies. But a darre came suddenly & styched in his syde / & therwith he ended his lyf. ¶ R. Eutropi⁹ & Drosius li. vi. telley that Julianus wente in to perse & was ladde in wylde places by gyle and fraude of one þ was ouclawed. And ther he was overcome with trauaylle of þ grauell with thyrst & with hete of the sonne & so an horsman of his enemyes smote hym with a spere & he deyed. Also it is redde in Balsilius lyf that whan Julianus wente in to persewarde. Balsyle⁹ was at Cezarea in Capadocia / & sente hym a present of barley loues. Julianus behelde the loues & sente hym heye agayne / hit is sayd that Balsyleus sayd thenne. We sende to the suche as we ete / but thou sendest to vs suche as bestes eten. Thenne Julian⁹ sayd whan I come agayne vntour out of perse. I shall so destroye this Lyte þ it shall bere more heye than cory thē. Balsyleus prayed for the lauacion of the Lyte / & sawe by nyght in the myddell of the chirche a grete multitude of Angels / and in the myddell of hem a woman sittyng on a Trone þ sayd / calle to me Mercuri⁹ the knyght that shal take wreche for me & my sonne of this Julianus þ despyleth god. Mercuri⁹ was a crysten knyght / that Julianus had slayne for the feyth of

holly chirch / & was late burped in that Anno gre chirche were as the syght was seyn. And anone Mercuri⁹ toke his wepen Julianus. that yet henge in that chirche & went forth ayenst Julianus & styched him in the myddell of his bodye & danyshed awaye anone. Julianus drewe out the blood of his sydes & threwe it abroad & sayd. Thou Balsyle man / þ hast overcome / & now I shall forsake the / fulfyll thy selfe after this. Balsyleus awoke & fonde Mercurius spere all bloody in the same chirche. & his armure sette in the same place it was tofore. After Julian⁹ Ioninian⁹ was Emperour .diii. monethes a stronge & a noble crysten man. Julianus had comaūded that crysten knyghtes sholde do sacrefyce to mawmettes. or forsake her knyghthode / but anone this fordyde þ bonde. for whan the knyghtes drough hym for to be Emperour with strength. he cryed & sayd that he a crysten man wolde be Emperour of paynymys. Whan that was herde all the knyghter were made crysten men. Also this was dryuen to by grete nede & gaue a grete dele of Melopotania to Sapor kyng of perse. Thenne he deyed / whether it were for euill smell of his chambze þ was made of newe lyme & heuy to reste therin / or of to many coles that he made sette a fyre for the grete colde.

Valentinianus with his broder Valent regned .xi. yere. Valentini⁹ This was gentyll & curtop⁹ anus. for whan the hooft laboured to gyue hē a felowe of themppre. he answered 368

Anno grē and sayd. D knyghtes it was poures
 Valentini/ hane recepued it/hit is myn to thynke
 anus. on the comyn prouffyte/and made his
 broder felawe of thempyre. he ouerco
 me the Saxons and the Sarmates/
 his fader Gracianus was called fu
 narius that is roper. for he bare a ro
 pe that was for to selle/ & fyne knygh
 tes myghte not wreste the roope
 out of his honde. And therfor he was
 worthy to be take to knyghthode. In
 a tyme Valentinianus wof prayed
 the fayrenelle of Justina. And ther
 fore Valentinianus wedded Justina
 and gaue a lawe that euery man that
 wolde sholde wedde two wyues. In
 this Emperours tyme the erthe quo
 he in all the worlde/and the see aro
 se and passed the clyues and destroy
 de many Cytees. After Liberius Da
 malus was pope nyne ten yere. This
 was a fayre maker of metre / and
 wrote verses vpon Tombes that he
 fonde of holy sayntes. And ordeyned
 also that by daye and by nyght psal
 mes sholde be sayd in quore/and that
 one verse sholde be sayd on one syde
 and the other verse on that other syde
 And that Gloria patri sholde be say
 de in eche psalmes ende. And by com
 forte of this pope Jerom translated
 the Byble out of Hebrew in to Latyn
 and amended also the plauter of the
 lxx. Interpretes that thenne was vled
 for the moost parte in alle churches.
 And that plauter was este apepyred &
 he translated newe agayne. And Da
 malus the pope ordeyned that to be
 longe in the Cyte of Rome & in the
 churches of fraunce. And therfore the

lauter is called the frenshe lauter/
 psalteriū gallicanū. Yet he made the
 chynde translacōn of the lauter worde
 for worde. That yere deyed saynt hy
 larye bysshop of peytow/ vnto y lon
 ge that the Angell longe Gloria in
 excellis. He put to Laudamus te. Bes
 nedicimus te. Adoramus te. & so forth
 Saynt Dydim^o of Alexandria y lost
 both his eycu after the fyfthe yere of
 his age & herde ones redde in the chir
 che y worde of the gospels. What man
 maye not do/god maye not do. The
 ne he was soo bely about the light of
 his loule y he had partpyght knowles
 che of .vii. artes & was made doctor.
 and made & expowned many bokes
 by notaryes & wryters. Saynt Mar
 tyn was made bysshop of Turone y
 yere of his age .lxi. and was bysshop
 there .xxvi. yere. The grete Basyle
 bysshop of Lezarea in Capadocia is
 deed. Among his other grete dedes of
 vertue he reconcyled a ponglynge to
 god almyghty y had oblyged him self
 to the deuyll for the loue of a wenche
 & gate agayne the chartre of his obli
 gacion. Also Joseph a Jewe was con
 nyngeest of all philicians / & Basyle
 lengthed this Josephs lyf one daye
 and tourned him to the feyth of holy
 churche. And he made and Instytuted
 the rule of monkes and many other
 holy treatys. Saynt Ambrose a man
 of the dygnyte of Consuls whyle he
 spake to the people/he was made bys
 shop of Melane / for the voys of a
 childe that cryed that he sholde so be.
 Saynt Patryk in this tyme was born
 his fader hete Calprun whiche was a
 preeft & a dekens sone that hete for

dun. Patrykes moder hete Conches
 Martyns syster of Gallia þis frañ
 ce. In his crysterynge he was called
 Sucas. And Saynt German called
 hym Magonius. And Celestinus the
 pope called hym Patryke þis to save
 fader of Cytezeyns. Valentinianus
 August⁹ was strongly meued apenst
 the messagers of the Sarmates/and
 deyed in a maner outbrekyng of his
 deynes/ & is an euyll that Grekes cal
 le Apoplexia. That tyme in Egypte
 were noble faders in her floures. Pal
 tor. Pambo/ & tweyne eyther hete Ma
 charius. Arsenius. Paphinius. Aga
 tho. Moyses. Joseph. Enagrius/and
 Theodorius. Pambo wolde lerne noo
 more of þis lauter than one verse that
 he had herde er he had fulfyllid that
 verse. This was the verse. Dixi custo
 diam vias meas. vt non delinquam
 in lingua mea. That is to saye. I ha
 ue sayd I shall kepe my wayes that I
 trespas not in my tonge. Pambo sayd
 de that vnnethe he fulfyllid this ver
 se in .xlj. yere. The two Macharies
 one of Egypt & that other of Alexan
 dria were bothe noble men in abstyn
 nence & in loore. A woman that was
 with childe defamed falllely one of
 them & sayd that he had brought her
 with childe / but she myght neuer be
 delpyerd of childe er she had tolde the
 trouthe. Arsenius was a Senatour of
 Rome & parfyght in the langage of
 Latyn and of Greue/and made hym
 selfe a monke. In a tyme he herde a
 boys that sayd to hym. Arsenius flee
 fro men and kepe scyence and thou
 shalt be saued. Also he bare alwaye a
 Iudarye in his bosome for te wyppen a

waye the teeris that ranne oft fro his Anno gre
 eyen. Therefore the heer of his eyen
 lyddes fylle all of for grete wepyng. Valentini^s
 In þis ester euen whay the sonne wen
 anus.
 re to rest/he tourned his face towarde
 the weste and woke alle that nyghte
 in his prayers vnto the tyme that he
 sawe the sonne aryle erly by the mo
 rowe. And thenne he was wery of
 wakynge and called to hym slepe and
 sayd/come forth euyll scruaunt. And
 soo he rested a lpyll lpytynge / for he
 wolde saye that it were ynough for a
 monke that fyghteth apenst tempta
 cions for to slepe one hour in þis nyght
 and daye. In a tyme his faders tes
 tamente was brought to hym / in the
 whiche testamente he was made his
 faders heyer. Thenne he answerde
 and sayd that he was deed to fore his
 fader/how myght he there that shol
 de dye make me his heyr that was de
 de afore. Also he wolde not lyghtely
 mete ne speke gladly with ony man/
 ne sende lettres/and comynly he fled
 theyr companye / and sayd that he
 myght not be at ones with god and
 with men. Neyther he meoued lyght
 ly questyons of holy wrytte/but of the
 rynges of the soule and temptacions
 He wolde gladly speke / & yet he was
 a noble clerke and conynge in ques
 tyons of holy wrytte: Therefore in a
 tyme he went down for to speke with
 an olde man of Egypte for to appose
 hym of thoughtes. There some men
 sayden to hym/how mayste thou Ar
 senius that art soo conynge of loore
 are for to lerne of this olde chorle.
 I haue sayde he lerned bothe Latyn
 and Greue/but yet coude I neuer the

Anno grē A.b.c. of this chorse. And whyle Arsenius dwelled in in the palays of Rome / no man vled better clothes than he / so whyle he was a mōke was none fowler couerd than he / he had a long berde that henge to his myddell / and he lyued in the older Theodocins palays .xl. yere after / & in wpldernes. lv. yere. Paphinicius thabbot toke secular clothyng & habyte & conuerted a comyn woman that hete Charlis / he prayed thryes our lorde that he wolde shewe hym to whom he was lyke to in erthe. The abbot pastor wolde not see his moder in erthe / for hym was leuet to see her in heuen. The abbot Agotho bare a stone thre yere in his mouth for he wolde lerne to be stille & kepe scyence / he wolde noo nyght slepe yf he had ony quarel eyenst ony man or ony man ayenst hym. Thabbot Moyses was ones prayed for to come and deme a broder that had trespaced. And he toke and bare a panyer full of grauell on his backe and sayd these be my synnes that renne after me / and I goo deme other mennes synnes and take none heede of myn owne. The fader Julius wente for to vlyte a broder that was seke / and made by his prayets the sonne stonde stille vnto the tyme he had done all his offyce atte full. Also oft he blessyd grauell that was brought hym the whiche was lowe in feldes and the feldes bare the more corn and fruyte. The abbelle Sara was .xiii. yere to gyder Inpugned & tempted of a fennde / but she wolde not assente. Sara prayed not that the tempracion sholde passe from her / but that god wolde

yeue her grace to withstonde it. Thene the spyryte of fornycacion shewed hym to her syght & sayd. Sara thou haste ouercome me. Nay sayd she I haue not ouercome the / but my lorde Ihesus that saueth hem that truste on hym / he hath ouercome the. Enemys brought forth an arme / and it was axed of Athanasius for what vse he hadde cutte of that arme / and he brought forth Arsenius that had bothe his armes and shewed hem boche hole and sounde / and axed of the other meny / where they had that other arme that they shewed there. Also his enemyes hyred a woman that sholde saye that she hadde ofte lodged Athanasius. ¶ R. Thabbot Euarius Macharius dysciple wrote Vitas patrū in Egypte as Genadius sayth in his booke de viris illustribus. ¶ Valens with his brother Iones Gracianus and Valentinianus was Emperour four yere / his broder hete Valentinianus. Also this Valens was crystened agayne of the Arrians and pursued crysten meny / and paue a lawe that monkes sholde doo dedes of armes or be beten with staues. And thene were the monkes martyred at Nitria in Egypte. In a tyme the Gothes sente to this Valens for to haue crysten byshops to teche hem yf rightfull byleue / and he sente hem byshoppes of the Arrians. And therfore all the Gothes were Infede and gleymed. And therfore by goddes rightfull dome / the knyghtes of Rome were ouercome by the Gothes. And this Valens was chaced oute of Antyochia / & was wounded with an arowe

and fledde in to an house and there was biente he and alle his hous and hadde no burpels;

Gracianus whan he had regned with his fader Valentinianus the older and with his eame Valens theñe after the deth of his eame he regned with his broder Valentinianus the yonger & with Theodosius of Spayne six yere. ¶ Beda libro primo capitulo decimo nono. This Gracianus whan he sawe that the state of the Emppre was almost fallen he made Theodosius of Spayne governour of the emppre in the east. And anone Theodosius over sette the Shtes/the Alanes/the Hunes / and the Gothes with grete batayls & stronge/and made peas with Achanarius kyng of the Gothes. That tyme one Pristillianus of galles made an herelye of the lore of mannyches and of the Gnostyces / and that herelye hath the name of hym. Tho was Theophilus bysshop of Alexãdria in his floures. And in Damalus tyme the pope was made a counsellor at Constantynople of seven score bysshops and ten ayenst Macedonius þ heretyke/he sayd the holy goost is no god. There was made the Creed that is longe on sondayes in the chirche. After Damalus Siricius was pope fyften yere/he made a counsellor at Constantynople of thre hundred and fyfty bysshops for to declare the sayth of holy chirche ayenst heretykes. ¶ Gautredus and Aluredus

Octavius kyng of Brytons were orde and prayed one Maximus the newewe of Heiene and Senatour for to come from Rome and take the kyngdome of Brytayne and his doughter for he hadde no mo childern. Conanus the kynges newewe cast for to be kyng and was wroth therfore & was ofte atte debate and at stryfe with this maximus/but atte last they were full acorded and ladde with hem alle the armed knyghtes for to warre in the prouynce Armorica that is ltyll Brytayne. There Maximus fought with Conanus and overcame hym/ for he was putte out of the thyrde deyle of the emppre. ¶ Eutropius and Beda libro primo. Maximus was a noble man and a stalworth laue that he dyde ayenst his othe. By treason of knyghtes he was made Emperour in Brytayne & wente anone in to fraunce and made fraunce and Germania subget by cruell batayls / and slough Gracianus Augustus that was sorely depnly aferde & fledde in to Lugduin and chaced Gracianus broder Valentinian out of Italye. Anone Valentinian fled to Theodosius in the east & was myldely restored agayne to his kyngdom / for soone after by slepyght of Theodosius Maximus was belvedged in Aquilia & there putte to deth. ¶ Gaufr. & Alfr. In the meane tyme Conanus duke of ltyll Brytayne had no wyll to wedde frenshmes doughters/& sente to Dynotus kyng of Cornewayle for to haue wyues to his people. And anone he sente his fayrest doughter Ursula with .xi. M. virgyns/some of them were drowned

in the see by tempest & stormes / and some of them were caste in to Straunge londes. And the cursed dukes Guanius and Melga slowe many of them for they wolde not consente to theyr lecherye. Guanius was kyng of Hunnes and Melga kyng of Pytes. Gracianns and Valentinianus had sente them to þe see costes for to see the fauours of Maximus the tyraūt. Ther after these two cursed dukes Guanius and Melga aspyed that Maxim⁹ hadde ladde all the chyualtrye out of Brytayne / and that Brytayne was voyde & helpeles and without strengthe of chyualtrye / thenne they gadred with hem the lyde Flondes and occupped Albania that is Scotland. Maximus the tyraunt herde therof and sente anone two Legyons of knyghtes with Gracianus a knyght that longed to Rome that wente forth & chaced the forsayd cursed duked in to Yrlonde. But this Gracian⁹ herde that Maximus was slayne / he made hym selfe kyng of Brytayne / and by cause he vled to grete tyrantrye he was slayne of his owne peple. In his tede one Constantin⁹ of the lowest chyualtrye was cholen / not for worthynes of his vertue / but for hope of his name oonly / he wente anone in to fraunce and dyde grete harme to themppre Therfore by commaundemente of Honorius Augustus Constancius the Erle was sente in to fraunce & slouge Constantin⁹ atte Arelate with his sone Constancius that therle Geroncis had of a monke made Cesar.

Theodosius Gracianus sone
 whan his fader was slayne
 regned with his eame Valentinianus .xi. yere. His fader & moder were warned in her slepe þ they sholde yue hym that name Theodosius for Theodosius is yuen of god almyghty / he made neuer bataylle by his good wyll / but in cuery batayll þ he paued he had the vycorpe. ¶ In his coria tripercita. This Theodosi⁹ vled dedes of armes by daye / & rightfull domes & causes of his subgettes / and was occupped well nyghe all nyght in his bokes. Therfore it is radde that he had a candellstykke made by crafte of honde so that the oyle sholde renne in to the cryllet without trauayle of Theodosius / for trauayle sholde not lette hym. And soo he withstode slepe & made kynde trauayle by strengthe. Also he was lyke Trajanus in alle poyntes meke & mylde & softe to men & subget to god / but he wolde lyghtly be wroth / therfor he was taught of a philosopher þ he shold whan he began to were wroth saye softe and by ordre four and twenty lettres of grue er he sholde ordeyne ought that sholde greue / for so his thought sholde be occupped in somwhat elles & his wrathe sholde seace in passyge of tyme. In a tyme he wolde haue entred in þ queor of clerkes at Melay for to here masse And Ambrose forbade hym vnto the tyme that he hadde done his penaunce for the deth of thyrty knyghtes that he hadde slayne in wrach in Constantinople. Therfor the Emperour dyde penaunce & ordeyned a lawe that the dome of prynces vpon chauplemente

of deth sholde abyde thyrtytȝ dapes
 withoute execucion for to abyde yf it
 myght be founde / or yf it nede were
 that the dome sholde be repelled or
 chaunged . Victor the sone of Maxi-
 mus the tyraunt was slayne of one
 Arbogastes . About that tyme was a
 childe born in the Castell of Emaus
 that hadd twey bodyes fro the nauell
 vppwarde / two brestes / two hedes / and
 ten wyttes in eyther bodye spue / soo
 that yf one myght ote or slepe though
 that other dyde neyther ete ne slepe.
 And whan they hadde lyued two yere
 so gyder that one deyed thre dapes
 to fore that other. Valentinianus Au-
 gustus was sorry of his lyf for the cru-
 elnesse of Arbogastes the mayster of
 knyghtes / and henge hym selfe with
 a snare in Dyane in fraunce. Ther-
 fore Arbogastes made one Eugeni-
 us Emperour in Gallia . Therfore
 Theodosius axed counseylle of Zo-
 han the heremyte at Egypte / & axed
 what ende the batayll sholde take a-
 ayenst Eugenius / and he sayde that
 he shold haue the vycory. ¶ R. That
 yere deyed saynt Martyn the bysshop
 One Seuerus Sulpicius a preest of
 Gven wrote saynt Martyns lyf that
 was full of vertues and of goodnes.
 ¶ Genadius de viris illustribz. sayth
 that Seuerus in his elde was begy-
 led of the heretykes Pelagys / and
 was sorry therfore . And for he hadde
 synned with his speche / he toke scylen-
 ce vpon hym to his lyues ende for to
 punyssh the that synne with sparynge
 of speche . ¶ Archadius Theodosius
 sone whan his fader was deed / he reg-
 ned fourtey yere and helde the eeste

londes. And his brother Honorius hel
 de the west londes. Claudius the poe-
 te was that tyme flouryng. Conatus
 bysshop of Epyrus spatte in a dra-
 gons mouth and slough hym / sixteen
 oren myght vnnethe drawe that dra-
 gon to the place where he sholde be
 biente / for he sholde not enfecte the
 ayer in the countree aboute . A grete
 Conseyll was made thenne in Car-
 tage. ¶ Marc. After Siricius Anasta-
 sius was pope fyue yere / he ordeyned
 that a man that were wemmed in
 his bodye sholde velleue none
 ordres / and he ordeyned that euery
 man sholde stande whyle the gospell
 is a redyng. ¶ Beda libro primo ca-
 pitulo decimo . Aboute that yere Pe-
 lagius a Bryton hadde helpe of Ju-
 lianus bysshop of Campania / whi-
 che was to four honde putte downe
 of his bysshopyche . And pelagius
 brought vp his herelype / that sayde
 that a mannes wyll and fredome of
 chole without goddes grace is ynowe
 for to deserue mede and the blysse of
 heuen . Also he sayde Adams synne
 wemmed Adam allone and none o-
 ther man. Also he sayd that childeren
 ben born as cleene withoute synne as
 Adam was to fore er he hadde synned
 And sayde that it nedeth not to crys-
 ten childeren for to clense hem of syn-
 ne / but for to worshyp hem with the
 sacramente of Adopcion. ¶ Trevisa
 Adopcion is mahyng of childeren in
 this maner . Yf a man take a childe
 that is not his / and maketh hym as
 it were his childe and nourysshed and
 bryngeth hym vp and amyttech hym
 as is owne childe. Thenne pelagius

wote not what he sayth. for the child that is cleue out of synne is verely goddes childe. Thenne it foloweth in the storie. Saynte Austyn and othre holy faders trauaylled manly aynst suche heretyks/ but they myghte not amende hem/ so sayth prosper the Rethour in his verses of six fete.

¶ R. Some men wolde suppose that this Pelagius was abbot of that famous abbaye of Bangor that was ten myle oute of Legecestre / that is Caerleon. Men saye that in that abbaye were somtyme two thousande monkes er the kyng of northumberlonde Ethelstredre hadde slayne thylke monkes atte Caerleon. After Anastalius Junocencius ablimentis was pope fourteen yere / he ordyned for to faste Saterdaye and for to kyss the pax at masse / and for to enoynte leske men with holy oyle. Also he condemned Pelagius the heretyke and his fautours. Also he acursed Archadius the Emperour for he was assentynge to the puttyng out of one Johan Crystostomus for the Emperesse Endoxia hadde procured the puttyng out of Johan. For he had preched aynst the wymmen that playde aboute the ymage of Endoxia. Aboute that yere saynt Alexis the confessor deped at Rome. ¶ Genadius in his boke de viris illustribz sayth / that aboute that tyme Tyconius of Affryca wrote rules for to seche and fynde out the vnderstandynge of holy wrytte / the whiche rules ben yet famous amonge holy doctours.

Honorius whan his broder Archadi⁹ was deed regned with his broders sone Theodolius xv. yere / this was so mylde that whan me repleued hym by cause he slowe not hem that were rebell to hym / he answered and sayd. Wolde god that I myght replee deed men to lyue ¶ Eutropius libro .x. The hooft of the Gothes was slayne in Tuscia / and herleder Ragadalius was take / he came with two hondred thousande of Gothes / and had made his auowe that he wolde offre the blood of the Rosmapns in sacrifice to his goddes. He sayth that in that fyghtynge were so many men take that flockes of hem were solde at a lypyll pryce as it were flockes of beestes. In the meane tyme one of the Gothes that hete Alaricus out of Affryca wente in to Italye and axed a place of Honorius for hym and his men to dwelle Inne / and he graunted hem Gallia. And as he went thiderward he was besette with some of the Emperours dukes in a harde batayll that fylle vpon hym vntwate on the eesterdaye / but he toke herte and strength and ouercome his enemyes that soo pursued hem. And there he left his waye that he had begonne and tourned agayne to Rome & destroyed all that he come by with pray and with fyre / and toke the Spite of Rome & sette it a fyre. Nacheles he lete crye that men sholde spare all men that fledde to holy places & that his men shold take prayes and spare shedynge of blood. ¶ Paulus libro .xi. And soo Rome was broke and taken of the Gothes the yere after the buyl

dyng therof a thousande an hondred
 thre score & four. After that tyme the
 Consulat of Rome lefte in the eeste.
 And the Romayns seaceden to regne
 in Brytayne that had regned therin
 from Julius Cezars tyme aboute a
 four hondred & lxx. yere. ¶ Eutropius
 The thyrde day after þ Rome was
 take. Alaricus lefte the Lyte and de/
 stroyed the prouynce aboute/and wen
 te in to Sicilia and losse many shyp/
 pes and was lodeynly deed. There
 the Gothes by trauayll of prysoners
 tourned the Ryuer Valentus oute of
 the chanell / & buryed her kyng with
 grete ryches in the myddell of the cha
 nell / and tourned the Ryuer agayne
 in to his owne chanell. Thenne the
 Gothes toke one Athulfus kyng Ala
 rias alpe and made hem her kyng/ &
 wente agayne to Rome and destroy
 de all that there was lefte. Also that
 tyme lyghtenyng destroyed the noble
 places of Rome that enemyes myght
 not brenne / god was despyled in all
 the Lyte. And men cryed to Cryste &
 that suche myshappes fyll to the Ly
 te by cause the holy places of goddes
 forgendred and altered. But the Go
 thes toke one Galla Placida Theo/
 dolius doughter and Honorius syster
 and maryed her to her owne kyng/
 she was so prouffitable to the compn
 te that the Gothes made peas with
 the Romayns / and lefte Rome and
 went to Gallia. About that tyme we
 re founden the bodyes of saynt Ste/
 phen and of Gamalpell and of her
 felawes by one Lucianus a preeste of
 Jerusalem. That tyme saynt Anstyn
 sent his dyscepple Drolius in to Beth

leem to saynt Jerom for to lerne the Anno grē
 realoy of the soule. for thenne he ma
 de the booke of the compnge forth of Honorius.
 the soule. And Drolius wente aboute
 the holy places and was the fyrst that
 brought the relyques of saynt Steuen
 in to the west londes. Also thenne Ho
 norius made Constancius Cezar / &
 maryed his syster Gallia Placida to
 Constancius / and she was maryed
 to fore to Athulfus. On her Constan
 cius gate Valentinianus that after/
 warde helde the Emppre longe tyme
 After Innocencius Zozinius was po 418 8
 pe two yere and six monethes / he or/
 deyned that a bonde man sholde not
 be a clerke ner a ghelded man/ & that
 the holy taper sholde be halowed on
 ester eue. After Zozinius Bonifacius 420 10
 was pope four yere/ he ordeyned that
 no woman sholde washe ne handle
 the towayls of the aulter ne do encen
 se in the center. Gaufr. and Alfrédus
 Thenne the deth of Maximus the ty
 raunt the knyght that longed to Ro
 me was knowen/ and also the deth of
 Constancius was knowen. And the
 forsayd enemyes Guanius & Melga
 come agayne oute of Yrlonde with
 Scottes and Norweys & brente and
 slowe in the kyngdome of Brytayne
 fro see to see. Therfore the Brytons
 sent to the Romayns & prompled to
 be subgette alway for to haue helpe.
 Anone Honorius sente hem a legyon
 that destroyed theyr enemyes & taugh
 te the Brytons to make a walle
 thwerte ouer the Flonde to holde out
 theyr enemyes. The legyon wente a/
 gayne and the men of the Flonde we
 re vnconnyng of so grete crafte/ and

Anno grē Honorius. made a walle of turues and of stone that was no thyng proufytable / whiche dured fro Penultoy vnto the Lyte Alclpud / soo that where the socour of the water fayled men sholde defende hem by the helpe of the walle / but enemyes came by water and destroyede and toke prayes fro yere to yere as they dyde to fore. Thenne the Romaynes sente a Legyon armed and slough and chased the enemyes and made vp a walle of stone to the Bytons of eght fote thycke and twelue fote hye from see to see bytwene Lytees / there Seuerus hadde somtyme made a dyche and a walle of turues. And the Romayns hadde and charged the Bytons to leue theyr cowardyse and nyctete / and to take armure and courage as men sholde. for they were soo occupied in other lydes that they myght nomore come fro so ferre to be with hem in soo grete trauaple and Journeyes. Thenne they made a walle of stone on the comyn coste / and also on prey cost that men paye therto / and had with hem the strengthe of Bytons and toke to hem armure and buylded toures on the chyues of the Ocean in dyuerse places where as men dredde the arryuyng & londyng of straunge men & enemyes. Thenne the Romayns had the Bytons fare well as they wolde neuer come agayne. ¶ Gildas. Whan the Romayns were gone thenne the Scottes and Pyctes began to breke out of her hooles. The Scottes and Pyctes dyscorden in maners / but they accorden in clothyng and fayth and in couetyse of shedyng of blood / they couere

theyr prey members more with heere than with clothe. Whan they knewe that the Legyons of Rome were retourned / they destroyed the endes of Bytany more boldly than they had done to fore. ¶ Beda. They slough the wardyens of the walles and other men of the londe. And the men of the londe were dryuen out of her houses and her home / and paye hem to theft and robbery / and robbed eche other for socour of the payl of hunger that they sawe that sholde befall to them. And soo fylle deeth vpon deeth sorowe vpon sorowe / for all the kyngdome was bare and without sustenaunce of mete. After Bonifacius Celestinus was pope ten yere / he ordeyned that the psalme (Judica me deus et discerne causam meam) sholde be sayde to fore the entryng of the masse / and atte thentre of the masse shold be sayd the verse (Et introibo ad altare) of the same psalme. And the Crapell & the Dffretorye sholde be sayd to fore the sacryng. This is he that fyrste sente saynt Patryke to conuerte Irlonde / and Paladius a deken of Rome to conuerte the Scottes in the ix. yere of his papacye. In his fourth yere by helpe of Theodosius the Emperour and of Cyrillus byshop of Alexandria the thrydde grete Synode of thre hondred byshops was made att Ephesus ayenst Nestorius the heretyke. There it was demed that in Cryst is one persone and two kyndes / the godhede and the manhede. And oure lady shold be called Theotochos that is to saye oure lordes moder. Aboute that tyme Jerom the prest deyed at

Bethleem four score and sixten yere olde. That tyme was sente an hooft out of Rome in to Spayne ayenste the Wandales. But for the Emperour hadde out of his companye that myghty Bonifacius, the Emperour dyde noo thynge manly, but Bonifacius went in to Affryca and dyde moche harme in thempyre.

The pong Theodosius Archadius lone regned with his doughter hulbonde Valentinianus, .xxvi. yere. The kyngdome of frenshemen began in his tyme vnder ferramundus the lone of Martomirus as it is layde to fore honde of Prouncies in the fyrste boke capitulo Gallia. Thenne Theodosius knewe that his eame Honorius was ded and toke Valentinianus the lone of his aunt Galla placida and made hym Cesar and sente hym with his moder Galla placida for to gouerne the east londes. These two ouercome Johan that warred in the Empyre. And they were mercyfull to Aecius the noble knyght, for by his wytte & veyght the Hunes were toured that hadde purposed to warre in thempyre of the west londes. Thenne Bonifacius the noble knyght that we spake of to fore hond toke hede that he myght not surely holde Affryca ayenste Valentinianus & his noble knyght Aecius, therfore he prayed the Wandales and the Alanes that hadde occupied Spayne to fore honde for to come in to Affryca, with her kyng Gilericus

And he came anone and destroyed Affryca and defowled the fayth of holy chirche. In that tyme of tempeste deyed Saynte Austyn the yere of his age four score and six. He made soo many bookes that the metre is sothe that sayth, he lpech that sayd that he hadde rad all his bokes. **CR.** This Gilericus kyng of wandales though he in the meane tyme ouercome the Spaynardes Galles and Romayns yet he regned in Affryca seuen and thyrty yere so sayth Eusebius Cronycle right in thende. After Gilericus lone, his doughter hulbonde Homericus regned, .viii. yere. And he also closed chirches & outlawed thre hondred bysshops. Therfore by goddes rightfull doome he wambled full of wormes & deyed soone. After hym Gilericus broders lone Guttamundus regned there, .xii. yere. In the, .xii. yere of his regne he opened chirches & reconcyled them that were outlawed. After hym the forsayde Homericus broder Tralamundus regned eyght & twenty yere. After hym his lone Hyldericus goten on Valentinianus doughter regned eyght yere. One Glomarus the tyraunt that hadde warred in Yrlonde and in Brytayne putte hem out of his kyngdome and regned after hym in Affryca thre yere. And soo fro the begynnynge of the persecucion of Wandales he began in Gilericus tyme vnto the goynge out of the Wandales out of Affryca passed as it were an hondred yere. After **Le-** 434 10
lestinus Sixtus was pope nyne yere. **CR.** In his tyme Saynt Maximus bysshop Taruernesis was in his flou

secundus.

res and made noble Omelyes. And as Genadius sayth he made that famous Omelye of martres that begyneth in this maner (Qui religiola caritate sanctorū merita miratur) and so forth. And Cassiodorus the Senator is in his floures / he expounded the sauter / and made a Cronycle of the Emperours and of bysshoppes. Also that tyme Drosius of Spayne was in his floures / he came to Rome after Saynt Austyns deth and made seuen bookes ayenst mysbyleued men de ormenta that is of the wretchednes of this worlde. That tyme Eudoxia the Emperesse that was Theodolius doughter and Valentinianus wyf come oute of Jerusalem and broughte with her the cheynes that saynt Peter was bounden with in pryson. Of hem is the fest of lammasse dape. The solempnyte of Lezars byctoipe was holden vpon that dape fro Octavianus tyme vnto that tyme. About that tyme the deuyl appered to the Jewes in the lyknesse of Moyses in the flonde of Creta / and promysed hem that he wolde lede hem drye fote in to the londe of byhelle. Thenne many of hem were drowned / and the other tourned to the fayth of Cryste. After Sixtus Leo was pope one and twenty yere / he was holpest of all men / and sayd his masse fyue tymes and some tyme ofter in one dape. On an eesterdape a woman kyssed his honde / and the pope felte soo grete temptacion that for wreche therof he cutte of his owne right honde. Thenne the people grutchted ayenst hym / for he longe not his masse as he was wonte to do. And he

made his prayers and put hym all to our lady & besought her of helpe and grace. Thenne our blessed lady restored to hym his honde agayne / and he sayd his masse as he had done to fore and tolde out that myracle to fore all the people. In this popes tyme vnder Marcianus the prynce was made the fourth generall counseyll in Calcedonia of six hondred bysshops and thyrty ayenst one Entyces abbot of Constantinople and ayenst one Dyolcor⁹ bysshop of Alexandria. They denyed that in Cryste was very fleshe / & denyed also the resurreccion atte dape of dome. Pope Leo made a letter of the right seyth for to sende to this counseyll and leyde the lettre vpon saynte Peters aulter & fasted forty dayes / & prayed saynt Peter that yf ony thyn go sholde be amended therein that he wolde amende it and so it was done. Another tyme he fasted forty dayes and prayed Peter to gete hym foryeuenesse of his synnes. And Peter appered to hym & sayd all thy synnes ben ferreyen / but vnwyle handelynge is chalenged of the. In this popes tyme that was in Theodolius last tyme at Ephelus in the mount Celius the seuen sleepers awoke and arose / and the fayth of our resurreccion was moche confermed and stabled by that a rplyng. In Deci⁹ Lezars tyme these men fledde and hydde them in a cane for tescapen the wodenesse of the persecucion that was done vpon crysten men. And so they slepte two hondred yere / & awoke atte last by the vertue of god & sente a seruaunt with money in to the Cryste for to bye mete / and

for to espye how it stode of the persecucion. And by olde moneye that was shewed that tho was not vled, it was knowen and founden that they had slepte about a two hondred yere. And soo the fapth of the resurreccion was confemed that Entyres denyed. And they begonne to slepe agayne in presence of Theodosius the Emperour. ¶ Eutropius. Aboute that tyme one Athila kynge of Hunes gouerned Denemarke and Pannonia / and ladde an hoost of two hondred thousande / and hadde helpe ayenste the Romaynes of nacyns that he made subget / and passed forthe well nyghe alle the west londe vnto Aluerne. This may was born to shame and shendshyp of nacyns / he loued warres and was stronge of counseyll. Valentinianus that thenne gouerned the west londes sholde fyght ayenste this Athila and sente a lettre to the Gothes in these wordes. It befalleth to your redynes and wpledome to conspyre ayenst the tyraunt that despreth alle the scruple of the worlde / and he retcheth of noo rightfull cause of batayll / but what hym lyketh / he holdeth it lawfull / oonly byleue heleth and couereth his pryde / he is worthy to be byhated of alle men that is enemye to alle men. But they wrote a lettre in this maner / ye haue made Athila your enemye / ye haue your desyre. Therie they come to gydres in the felde. Cathalyntes that conteynen an hondred legges in lengthe and .lxx. in brede / there was a stronge batayll / none olde storpe speketh of no batayll so stronge / for there were slayne in boch nyne

score thousande men / so that the deed bodyes were born forth with the streame of blood. In the Romaynes syde were slayne the kynge of Burgoyne & the kynge of Gothes. ¶ Eutr. li. ix. Kynge Athila as though he were ouer come wente agayne in to Panonia to gadre hym a gretter hoost. ¶ Cr. It is redde in saynt Germayns lyf that while kynge Athila warred in Gallia he belpeged in a tyme the Lyte Treascama / ther saynt Lupus was bysshop that tyme. Thenne saynt Lupus wente vppon the pates of this Lyte that was belpeged / and cryed & axed who they where that so greued hem. And kynge Athila answerde and sayde. I am Athila goddes scourge / and I sayd the bysshop am the wolfe that destroyed our lordes flocke / and haue neede to goddes scourge. Lupus is a wolf. Thenne anone the pates were opened / and the enemyes were blente thurgh goddes myght & wente from pate to pate and sawe ne hurted noo man. Athila kynge of Hunes was chaced out of Gallia by a noble knyght that hete Aecius. And in his sleynge towarde Pannonia he destroyed Italye / and belpeged Aquilia thre yere and gate it. Tho Leo the pope fasted and prayed thre dayes and thre nyghtes in saynt Peters churche and sayde to his men. Who that wylle come after me come in goddes name. And whan he approched the kynge Athila. the kynge lyghted downe of his hors and fyll downe to the popes fete and prayed hym to axe what he wolde / & anone he prayed and hadde it graunted that the kynge sholde goo oute of

Italye and deliuer all the pyloners
Afterwarde whay the kyng was re-
prieved and reasoned why the lord of
the worlde was soo lyghtely ouerco-
me of a prest. So that sayde the
kyng I dyde prouttpe to you and to
me. for I sawe in his righte syde a
stronge knyght with a swerde dra-
wey that manaced me / but I dyde
as he wolde I sholde be deed and all
my. Thenne the kyng lefte Ita-
lye and wente in to Pannonia and
deyed there soone after. ¶ Eutro-
pius libro nono. et Beda libro pri-
mo capitulo decimo tercio. Aboute
that tyme the poore releef that was
leste of the Brytons sente the chyrd
tyme a letter to that noble knyghte
Aecius and to Patricius in this ma-
ner. To Aecius thyrce Consull we
shewe the greues of Brytons/straun-
ge nacions chacey vs to the see / and
the see dryueth vs to straunge naci-
ons agayne / and therof cometh two
maner of carepns / for we ben slayne
with wepen or ellys we be drowned.
But it was for nought that they wro-
te soo. for Aecius that tyme was oc-
cupped in Gallia with harde warre
ayenst kyng Athilia. ¶ Goufredus
and Beda. In the meane tyme the
forlayde hunger encreaced strongely
amonge the Brytons and compels-
led many of hem to yelde hem to the
theues theyr enemyes. And some of
hem come out of hylles and londes
there mannes helpe fayled / and trust-
ed in god almyghty and chaced out
the Pytes as well as they myghte.
Thenne for a tyme the enemyes we-
re putte out vnto the vtterst parte of

the Flonde and made hem a place to
dwelle Inne beyonde Depra that is
the southsyde of Northumberlonde/
and slough and toke prayes eche of
other. Also that tyme fylle a grete
honger atte Constantynople with a
grete pestylence and ayer infete and
englymed that the walles of the Cy-
te fylle downe with leuen and fyfty
towres and were dedd many thous-
landes of men and of bestes. ¶ Gau-
fredus and Alfredus. Thenne the
Brytons toke auplemente and coun-
seyll. And Gupdelinus the Archebys-
shop sayled in to Armonca that is ly-
tell Brytayne to one Aldroenus that
was the fourth that regned there af-
ter Conanus / and the Archebysshop
declared to him the myschyfe and the
sorowe of the Brytons / and brought
with hym one Constantinus that
was the kynges brother with many
thoulandes of men of armes / and at
Surcetre he made hym kyng. Also
this Constantinus hadde thre sones/
the oldeste heete Constant / he made
hym a monke to be shory atte Wyn-
chestre atte Saynt Amphibalus chir-
che. And the other tweyne Aurelius
and Hter / he betoke to Gupdelinus
the byshop to nouryshe and to teche.
Constantinus atte laste after ten ye-
re of his kyngdome was slayne by
treason of one of the Pytes that he
hadde in his scruple. And Hortigerus
a Consull of the Jewelles despyred the
kyngdome / and toke Constant out
of Wynchestre and made hym a kyn-
ge for he was dulle and slowe of wy-
te. Anone Hortigerus hadde an hon-
dred Pytes oute of Albania that is

Scotlonde and made hem wardens
of the kynges bodye . And Dortygerus
made hem ryche ynoughe . And
they vnderstode that Dortygerus de-
sired for to be kyng and slough Con-
stant the kyng and brought his hede
to Dortygerus. And by cause Dortyge-
rus wolde be holde gylteles and not
culpable of that dede / he feyned gre-
te sorowe / and made byhede all the
hondred pyces to fore the lordes of
the londe and soo he was crowned
kyng. Whan this was knowen / then-
ne the wardens that kepte two bres-
theren Aurelius and Dter dredde him
and fledde with the childeren to the
kyng of Armorica that is Ircyll Bry-
tayne .

 ad his oost: and lholde fighte agaynt
 te a grete nombre of Almayns: he o:
 hed in to heuen/ And sayd lorde Jhe
 su cryst whom my wyfe worshippith
 yf thou gyue me this daye the vycto:
 ry I shall be crystened in thy name
 The Almayns fled : and he and his
 two systers and thre thoulade of his
 men were crystened on an Ester day
 of saynt Remigius bysshop of Ray:
 nes/ And for they had noo crysma: lo
 a douue broughte hem in his bylle a
 vyole wyth crysma : and the bysshop
 enoynted the kyng therwith/ That
 vyole is kepte in the churche of Ray:
 nes: and wyth that crysma þ kynges
 ben enoynted Sone after this while
 the kyng went to a batayle apenst o
 ne Aldaricus that waired in Guyan
 Remigius toke hym a flaket full of
 holy wyne: and prompled hym vycto
 ry and layd/ Goo fourth as longe as
 this wyne durpeth/ Thenne the kyng
 dranke and his lemauntes: and þ wi
 ne fayled in noo place/ Thenne he oc
 cupped Guyan and passed the ryuer
 of Leyer and Turone/ And in saynt
 Martyns churche : he herde that verse
 of the lawter. Precinristi me domine
 virtute ad bellum/ That is lord thou
 haast beclpypped me wyth vertue and

strengthe to bataylle / Therefore the
 kynge was gladde wyth alle: and ar-
 rased hym for to passe the forde of þ
 riuer Dicenna / But the water begay
 hugely to arpe / And an hynde appe-
 red lodeynly and passed the water to
 fore the kynge: and shewde hym the
 forde / Thenne the kynge made the
 kyngdom of fraunce stretch vnto þ
 hyghe hylles of Aragon that ben cal-
 led montes piveni / Therefore the em-
 perour Anastalius heide of his name
 and lente hym a crowne of golde ry-
 chely beset wyth precious stones with
 a krytill and a gyrdle / And fro that
 tyme he was assygned to be consull
 and Augustus for the comyn profyte

 a consuls gowne / And from that ty-
 me the empyre of Rome that was so

 sericus kynge of Wandels was dede

 ly / ¶ After hym his lone was kynge

 faders kyngdom: and passed nowhe-
 re his faders boundes / ¶ Eutropius
 libro quarto / Also in this Zeno them-
 perous tyme / Aurelius Ambrose v-
 sed the purple in brytayne / After the

 alyue: and noo moo of the Romayns
 And ouercame the saxons that were
 dyctours / And fro that tyme forthe

 and waie all the plonde / ¶ About þ
 tyme saynt Manmeritus byllhopp of
 Dycen ordeyned solemne letanyes þ

 peple that tyme / And it is called the
 lasse letanye for dyfference of the mo-
 re letanye that saynt Gregory orde-

 wolde wyte what it were: and tomed
 the spere that he bare in his honde to
 ward the chylderne / And one of hem

 of hym / Therefore he tomed agayne
 to Rome & was put of by the roma-
 ins: and went to Rauen: and there he
 was byleged thre yere: & slayne right
 there / Thenne Theodericus came to
 Rome & was gladly receyued: & wed-
 ded Andelfede the doughter of Clo-
 neus kyng of frauce / And maryed
 his doughters & his systers to kynges
 that dwelled there abowt / Soo that
 wel nyghe all Ytalye was Joyned to
 hym by luche affynyte /

 Gaudredus sayth that hym wōdret

Justinianus the emperours tyme be telle that Gregorius in libro dyalogorū tellyth of the bysshops that spa ke at beste whan her tonges were hit in Affrica for the faythe of holy churche/ But one of them was pryued of that myracle for lechery that he felle inne some tyme/ ¶ About that tyme in a cytee of Sicilia was an archedekey that hyghte Theofilus/ And bare hym soo nobly vnder the bysshopp that whan the bysshopp was dede al men cryeden that he was worthy to be bysshopp/ And he helde hym payed wyth his archedekeyny/ And had leue: that a nother were bysshop than he/ But afterwarde he that was made bysshopp put hym wrongfully oute of his archedekeyny/ Thenne he felle in soo grete mylchepf: that he hired an hebrewe wytche: and forloke cryste and his moder vppon that condempcion that he sholde comme to the worthyp that he had loste/ ¶ And also he dyde the deuyll homage: And wrote hym a charter wyth his owne blood/ And soo he had his archedekeyny on morowe/ ¶ But he bethought hym att laste: and was sorowfull for that dede/ And prayed our lady of helpe and locoure/ And soo by helpe of our lady he had his charter agayne and foryeuenesse of his synnes/ Thenne he knowleged his trespace and al the manere of that dooyng openly tofore the bysshopp and all the peple ¶ Thenne all the peple wondred & worshypped: and thanked cryste and our lady/ And theophyle deyed after thre dayes in the same place: where as our lady brought to hym his char-

ter agayn/ ¶ After Digilius the fyrst Anno grē Pelagius was pope xi. yere/ That yere Totila kunge of gothes wered in ytalpe/ Thenne he passed bi campania and bi saynt benettis abbey: and byleged Rome strongly: and toke it att laste by nyghte: and entred at yate hyghte Porta hostiensis/ And for þ romayns shold somdele voyde cruellesse: he made trompes to be blowen/ ¶ Also totila wold assaye yf saincte Benet had a spiryte of prophecye: and clothed one of his knightes as a kyng: and sent hym to saynt Benet as though the kyng hymself were come to the holy may/ ¶ Thenne saynt benet sayd to hym/ Some doo of that thou berest for it is not thyv/ Afterwarde totila hymselfe felle downe to the grounde tofore the holy may: & wolde not aryse tyll the holy may toke hym vp wyth his owne hōde: and sayd/ Hoche harme thou haast done now reste: thou shalt entre in to rome & passe the see: and thou shalt regned ix. yere/ And after that day he was þ lasse cruell/ And at last narles patricius was sent of augustus and ouerca- me hym in batayle/ Tho was callio dorus in his floures that was somty- me kyng theodorus chaūceler/ And after that consul: and thenne senator and monke at rome at laste/ ¶ Among his other grete traueyles he expowned cleerly the sawter/ ¶ Henricus kyng of westsaxons deyde/ And his lone ceaulin⁹ was kyng after hē xxxiii. yere/ He droue þ bitons out of þ cytees of gloucetre: surceter: & bathe in to hilles montaynes & wilōnes of vales/ Wpl. de regib⁹ li. i. But at last

Anno grē he was hated of augles & of brytons
 and his oost was bete adowne / And
 Justianus he hymself chaced & exyled:and dep-
 ed exyled/ ¶ Allo in the fyrst yere Zi-
 le yffus lone the twelwe after woden
 began to reygne:and reygned nyghe
 thyrty yere in the prouynce of depra/
 Regnū dei ¶ In his tyme saynt gregory sawe
 rorum englyshe chyldern to selle at Rome/
 And accorded & sayd Alla must be
 longe there fro whens thise chyldern
 come/R: But the grace of byleue ca-
 me not to kynge elle: but to his lone
 kynge Edwynus/ ¶ In the meane
 tyme Idas eldest lone Adda regned
 vii.yere in brencia/And claspa fyue
 yere/ Theodwolfus one yere:and fre-
 odulphus seuen yere:yet elle was al-
 ue/ And his lone Edwinus a chyldre
 of thre yere olde was chaced/And e-
 thelricus ydas lone regned fyue yere
 in bothe prouynces of depra & of bre-
 nicia/ Paulus libro primo in fine
 Aboute that tyme whyle kynge au-
 doenus regned vpon the logobardes
 that dwelled in pañonia was a stro-
 ge batayle bytwene þ gelypides & the
 longobardes/ ¶ In that batayle Al-
 buinus audoen^o lone slough the kyn-
 ges lone of the gelypides/ And soo þ
 gelypides were sparpled & departed/
 Therefore the logobardes prayed the
 yr kynge audoenus to make a solēp-
 ne grete feest to his sonne Albuinus
 The kynge answerde & sayd that it
 was not the maner amōge hem that
 the kynges lone shold sitt at feest e-
 upn wyth his fader the kynge but yf
 he had tofore hōde take armour of a
 kynge of a strange nacōn/ ¶ Albu-
 nus herde this and toke wyth hym fl

ponglynges cholen:and went boldly
 to the kynge of gelypides whole lone
 he had slayn in batayle:and axed ar-
 mour of hym/ There he was goodly
 receyued & sette to mete by the kinge
 in þ kynges lones place that he had
 slayne/ The kynge behelde the man
 & the place:and syghed full sore & sa-
 yd/ The place is lef to me:but þ per-
 lone that sittyth therein is greuo^o for
 see/ Thenne the kynges other lone þ
 was yet alque began to teire & angre
 the longobardes wyth dyspitous wor-
 des & sayd:that they were like to ma-
 res wyth whyte legges up to the thyr-
 es/ for that tyme the longobardes v-
 led straples wyth brode laces downe
 to the sparlme/ Thenne one of the lo-
 gobardes sayd to hym that soo scor-
 ned hem/ Soo in to the felde where
 thy broder was slayne/ And there þ
 myghte assaye how strongly thise ma-
 res conlyke/ ¶ Thenne the gelypides
 araided hem to wepen/ And the longo-
 bardes sette honde on þ hyltes of her
 owne swerdes:but the kynge lepe ouer
 the borde:and seald the stryf:and sa-
 yde / It is not an honest vitory to
 flee a ghest in his hostelrye / And he
 paaf his lones armour that was slai-
 ne to hym that had slayne hym:and
 sent him wyth pees to his fader aga-
 yn / Wil de re:li:primo/ Ethelbertus
 was emerikus lone/ The whiche e-
 merikus was neuewe of egystus lone
 ¶ This ethelbertus regned ouer ken-
 tillhe men fyue & fyfty yere:soo sayth
 beda/ ¶ But a nother cronycle saith
 thre & fyfty yeres/ In his yongth he
 was scorn & bylmer to kynges that
 dwelled nygh hym/ for he was ouer

come in dowble bataylle : and saued
 vneith his owne boundes/But whan
 he was elder he broughte all the kyn
 ges that were nyghe hym vnder hys
 pocke:out/take the kyniges of North
 humberlonde/Thenne he wedded a
 frenche woman that hight Berta: &
 by ensample of one Letardus a byll
 hop that came wyth Berta : he was
 moche excited for to leue & forsake his
 wylde maners/At laste he herde sayn
 te Austyn preche the loore of holy fa
 ders : and forloke his cursed lawes: &
 made good lawes in the langage of
 the londe / In the whiche lawes he
 promysed mede to good men: and pa
 ynnes to euill men & wyched/And dei
 ed the yere after that he had receyued
 the fayth of holy chirche xxi. ¶ Mar
 tinus/After Pelagius the thyrde Jo
 han was pope xiii. yeres/That tyme
 Priscianus the gramaryen of Cesa
 ria was in his flowres at Constanty
 nople: he made noble bokes not only
 of grammer:but also he descryued all þ
 worlde in a boke that he called Col
 magraphia/Of hym it is sayd as hu
 gacio caplo : edo edes tellyth þ he be
 came apostata and forloke his fayth
 for loue of his dysciple Julianus
 ¶ Also that tyme one Arator a sub
 dene of Rome : and a wonder Poete
 made the boke Actus apostolorum al
 in verses of vi. fete / And saynt Eue
 dan abbot of Irlond was in his flou
 res that tyme/¶ Of hym ben many
 wonders radde :and speccally of hys
 purgatorye that is in the west syde of
 Irlond/¶ Also that tyme saynt Ste
 uens bones were broughte to Rome/
 and laied by saynt Laurence in þ. sa

me place Therof speken cronycles of Anno grē
 Rome & legendes of holy sayntes : &
 tell that whan saynt Steuens bones
 were broughte thyder: saynt Lawren
 ce bones torned on his syde: and had
 layen vpryght alwaye tofore honde/
 but thenne he torned hym soo for to
 peue place & stede to his felowe saynt
 Stephen /

 to: Diesq; nostros in tua pace dispō:
 nas:and loo forth / Also he was the
 fyrste of all popes that called hym sel
 fe and wrote in bulles: Seruus seruo
 rum dei/ That is seruaunt of the ser
 uauntes of god/ Also he ordeyned in
 the Synode & counseyle att Rome:þ
 the mynysters of the awter sholde ta
 ke hede to prechpyng:and not to syn
 gyng/And sayd that whyle me arith
 a swete doys in holy seruile/ Couena
 ble lyfe is lett a parte:and the synger
 wyth his maners pryckyth the peple
 though he pleise hem wyth his woys
 And thouz saynt Gregory were mo
 ost holy:yet he had bacbpyters & enny
 es that wold haue brent his bokes af
 ter his dech/But his deken pers had
 swome vpon the boke & by peryll of
 his soule:and wytnelle of his own de
 the þ his bokes were endited bi inspy
 racō of the holy ghoost/¶ That yere

Teaulinus kynge of Westsaxon: and
 Drida were slayn / After hym Calfri-
 tus the sone of his broð Luthulphus
 regned strögly v. pere / After hym his
 broð Colwulfus regned xiiii. pere /
 ¶ Beda li. i. caplo v. Ethelric⁹ was
 Ethelricus sone / And Ethelric⁹ was
 Pdas sone / This Ethelricus begay
 to reyne ouer the Northübers: and rey-
 ned nobly xiiii. pere / This was righ-
 te stronge: and delyred grete woilhypp
 and destroped the byrtons more than
 all the Angles prynces: and made hē-
 trybutaries / He had by his wyfe Acta
 kynge Elles doughter vii. lones & o-
 ne doughter that hight Ebba / Two
 of his lones Oswaldus & Oswynus
 ¶ Beda li. iii. caplo iii. Columba dei-
 ed this tyme that was abbot and beri-
 ed in his abbaye in the plonde shii
 Beda libro quinto: caplo ix. he hadd
 a name of Acella & Columba & was
 called Colunhillus / ¶ Beda libro i:
 caplo xiiii. Also that yere þ grete gre-
 gory sent Austyn þ monke to preche
 the worde of god to Englyshe men
 And Austyn was aferde and drad in
 the wape: and torned agayn to saynt
 Gregory / And Gregorye comforted
 hym: and sent hym wyth lettres to þ
 byshop Arelatensis that he shold hel-
 pe Austyn in what that hym neded
 The tenour of thilke letters and of o-
 ther letters that were sent to the kyn-
 ge of kent: and also answeres that sa-
 ynt Gregory gaaf to Austyns questy-
 ons ben wryten in registro gregori: &
 in Beda / ¶ Paulo libro quinto / Also
 that yere the Longobades by nyghte
 assapyled saynt Venets abbaye: in þ
 mount Callinus / But the monkes

fledde to Rome: and toke wyth them Anno grē
 þ boke of the holy rule: & a weyghte
 of brede for the Journey: and a mesu-
 re of wyne that hyghte Quinia / Of
 this myscheyf Venet warned hem bi
 fore honde / and prayed god and had
 it graunted vneith that meny of þ plas-
 ce shold be sauf / In the ryuer Nylus
 at ylonde Delta: choost of Rome sas-
 ew mermyns in lyknesse of meny and
 wyfmen that were so scen from þ mo-
 rowe vnto the euentpde / ¶ That yere 496 14
 Austyn came a londe in the cest sy-
 de of Kent in thylonde Thanet / So
 me meny calle that ylonde Dent: ther
 he came a londe wyth xl. felawes: &
 some meny Interpretours to be wyth
 hem out of the londe of frauce by co-
 unseylle of Gregory / Saynt Austyn
 sent thise Interpretours to kinge E-
 thelbertus the yere of his kyngdome
 xxxvi. And layd they were come oute
 of Rome for hele & sauacōn of þ kyn-
 ge and of his reame / The kynge her-
 de this and had herde tofore honde of
 the same of cristen fayth / for he had
 to his wyfe a cristen quene that was
 a frenshe woman / And had receiued
 her of her fader & moder vppon that
 condycyon that she sholde vlc & kepe
 cristen fayth / Thenne after lowhat
 of dayes the kynge came in to that y-
 londe / But he spake wyth hem wyth

 tyn & his succellours and also the kyn
 ges of Kent were wonte to be berped
 there/ Beda li. xxvi. caplo ii. In þ
 meane tyme Austyn went to the arch
 bysshop Arelateus: and was sacred
 archebisschop of hym/ Saynt Grego
 ry was certifyed therof: & sent to Aul
 tyn moo helpers / Mellitus Justus &
 Paulin⁹ and bokes & relyques of ho
 ly sayntes and answers to saynt Aul
 tyns questyons/ Suche were thanlue

 dedes of mercy/ To the seconde that

 ben there soo many dyuers blages in
 chyrches : herto it is answerde in this
 maner/ What thou knowest is moost
 pleysynge to god almyghty : gader þ
 togids & make that to-be vled in chyr
 ches of Englonde/ Thynge ben not
 loued for the place: but the places ben
 loued for good thynge/ Colwulf⁹
 the sonc of Lutha Leaulynus broder
 reyned in westsaxon xiiii. yere/ That
 tyme in the subarbis of Constantino
 ple came fourth grete merueyles and
 wonders / for one chylde was borne
 wyth iiii. fete/ And a nother wyth ii.
 nolles & moldes/ That yere saynt Ju
 ue the bysshop that was born in Per
 ce deyed in Englonde/ Beda libro
 primo/ That yere Austyn by cōmaū
 dement of gregory made ii. archebyl

 of Ethelbertus gadred bysshops & do

 604 2 Saminianus was pope ii. yere he or
 deyed that thoures of the dape shol
 de be rögen to at chürches/ And he spa
 ke euyl of Gregory: for he had ma
 de to grete colt on poore men/ Ther
 fore saynt Gregorye apered to hym
 thryes: & blamed him/ And at fourth
 tyme by cause he wolde not amende/

late al one in a grete thouzt: & one came to him þ he knewe not: & axed hē why he late allon sorowful: and lai- de / I wote who thou arte and why þ art lory: and what is thy drede / The- ne yf ony may llewe thyn ennyes: & brought the to thy kingdom / Also yf he shewed to the the belt counseyle of sauacōn: and better than ony of thy forsaðs euer herde: woldeste thou not assent & doo by his reed and his counseyle / Yes truely sayd he & that I promyle the / But the other layd his honde on edwyn⁹ hede and sayd / Whan this token comith to the haue in minde of this tyme: and of this speche: & do as thou promyled / Whā thys was sayd he vanysshed a waye / After this his forlaid frende came to hym and warned hym þ the kynges wyll was torned to hym that gadered his hoost at last: and mett wth ethelfridus in the countreys of Mercia by Est the water Yde and slewe hym ryght there / And he made edwynus kyng of bothe kyngdomes: of Northumberlōde / of Deyra and of Brenicia / And Edwynus reigned after that seuentene yeres / ¶ Whanne this was done Ethelfrydus lones.  was a broder that hete Ledmon/ that
 was taughte by inspiracioy of God
 to make longes and dytce in the cou/
 trey langage. that shold meane men
 to deuocioy/ In that maner of doyn
 ge nomay myght be his pere. And he
 him self couch nothyng doo in other
 mater. but only in mater of deuocioy/

There there was a grete flye and he fouded to haue slayne this flye and cutte of the flyes foote wyth a knyf. ¶ In the meane tyme Aldo not knowynge of the kynges entente: cam towarde þ kynges court & mette with an halteþg man that went wyth a staf and layd to Aldo in this maner: Beware the aldo. for yf thou comest to þ kynges courte. thou shalt be slayne by the kynges honde: Whan Aldo herde that he fledde to saynt Romaynes chirche & the kyng aryd hym why he dyde soo And he alweid & layd by cause an halteþg man had warned him of his deth Anone the kyng vnderstonde that he that halted soo was a wyched spyrite and that he had cutte of his foote in lykenes of a flye: and that he had soo wraped his counseyll & preuyte. And hadde also expted him to Aldoes deth And so the Kyng reseyued Aldo to his grace After leo. the seconde Venet was pope fyue yere / Otricus vnder kyng of mercia buylded an Abbaye at Gloucetre and made his luster kyneburgh Abbelle there. That yere kyng kentwinus chaced þ welle Brytons vnto þ see. And Venet Billhop buylded an abbaye of seynt poule at girinum on the brynke of the Ryuer wyre and had to fore hond buyld another abbaye of seynt peter in þ other brynke of the same Ryuer: by helpe of kyng Egfridus and made colfridus abbot there. Justinianus sent his hooft for to take Philipicus that he had left at Pontus in Ceslona/ But the hooft turned to Philipicus syde: and slewe Justinianus/ ¶ The seconde Philipicus þ hyght Dardanicus also was emperour one yere & vi. monethes/ He fledde in to Sicilia for the oost of Rome/ & by cause he was an heretyke: he comaunded to scrape of the paynting of churches/ Therefore the Romayns threw away almaner moncie that his ymage was graue in/ ¶ The seconde Anastalius was emperour thre yere after that he had slayn Philipicus/ In his tyme Dagobertus was kynge of fraunce after his fader Childebert⁹ And regned xi. yeres by suffraunce of Pipinus Metalus. that yet ruled þ kinges hous/ ¶ After Constantinus þ seconde Gregory was pope xvi. yere/ That yere laynt Luthlacus the Anker deyed in Crowlond/ And Jue kēge of Westsaxons and Colredus kynge of Mercia foughten att Wodenelbrugh soo sharply: and eyther of hem bare hymself soo vnglacously: that it was not knowen whether of them had worse spedde/ ¶ The thyrde Theodosius was emperoure one yere: and was goodly and benygne. and ouercame his predecestour Anastalius. & made hym a preest/ But after one yere this Theodosius was put down and made a clerke by his successour þ thyrde Leo the strōge/ ¶ In his tyme came many Sarzalyns. & biledged Constantinople thre yere/ ¶ It semyth þ John Damascen⁹ was that tyme in his flowres. and was broughie in to Perce / There were letters wyrtien of

It is not to suppoile that this John is John the heremite that is sett in the boke of faders: loone after Hyllarion: and warned Theodosius thempersur of many other victories/ It is a nother John that was in the thyrde Theodosius tyme in Grece. and afterwarde in Perce. and made many noble boke boche in philosophie / That John the heremyte was longe tyme tofore the grete Gregori And this John Damascenus was longe time after the grete Gregory/ that is knowen by that: that this John damascenus in his boke of diuynite alledgeth the grete Gregorius noble myracle of the delyueraunce of Traianus. þ maye not be sayd Gregory Nazauzenus/ for he was aboute Constantinople. and aboute Pontus. and vnto came euer at rome/ but in mynde of that myracle of the delyueraunce of Traianus at sepulchre of thapostles in the cytee of Rome by the grete Gregory is holden euery yere as holy chyrche makyth mynde/ In tretinge of dedes that helpen hem that ben dede. Also this charles for belynes of warres and bataylles that fyll vpon hym bytoke þ goodes of holy churche to lewdmen / therefore Eucherius billhop of Orleans whille he laye in his bedes lawe this charles in body & in soule / tormēted in helle. The Angel that shewyd that syght to the billhop sayd that it was bycause he toke the goodes of holy churche and of pouer men. Thenne by warnynge of the billhop the abbot of saynt denysle & pipinus preest wente to charles graue and tornd the stone / and sawe a grete dragon flee oute of the graue / but there was noo body y founde ¶ Paulus libro septimo That yere at Rome the Ryuer Tiber were so grete and so huge that the waties that fyll mette and ioyned to gyders fro porte saynt peter to porte

Juilinum / and dured soo leuen dayes Anno grē
 tpe the cytelyns made a letany. That
 yere deyde kyng etheldredus after þ Leo
 he had be kyng of mercia thyrty yere
 and monke of bardony thyrty yere.

 he dwellyd in saynt mychels chappel

 ley þ is four & twety mile oute of yorke
 estwarde. & þ place is called beuerley

 There saynt Johan bulde a churche
 of saynt nicholas and another of say-
 nt Johan baptist in the hille for re-
 freshing and fedinge of bretheren.

 nes.but afterward by help of dunstan
 vnder kynge edmond and kynge ed-
 gar/ that abbay was nobly amended
 and atayed to þ compynge of normas
 But after that tyme I not by what
 mysshappes.it is alweye sette wyth
 wyched traauylles. Also the abbottes
 of that place for grete Rycheles ben
 proude & bycome tyrauntes and swel-
 len in pryde outward and be not wro-
 the/and ben cruel inward & not prouf-
 fytable. And that was specially kno-
 wen in abbot thurstinus tyme. **¶** R.
 Thider were trāslated the boones of
 saynt hilda thabbelle/ of colfrydus
 thabbotte of gyrwe/and somme bo-
 nes of Bisskop aydan/ the whyche
 bones kynge Edmond brought wyth
 hym whan he was in þ iorney ayenst
 the Scottes. There resteth the second
 patriarke of Irland .abbot and con-

¶ Willelmus de Regib⁹ libro primo Kyngue Jue bytoke his kyngdom of westsaxons to his Tosyn ethelardus & wente to Rome/hit is sayd that he was the fyrst of kynges that graunted to saint peter of euery hows of his kyngedom a peny.that longe time of englyshemen was callyd Rome skott but in latyn it is called petres peny/
 The kynges wyfe ethelburga yaued hym occasyon to take that pylgrymage/and that in this maner /she hade ofte counceyled her husbond to forsake the ryches of this world/ and specially in the last yeres of his lyfe / but she sped not/therfore att laste she fon

ded to ouercome hym with gyle. And in a tyme whanne they had ley to gyder in the Ryal cyte/ & departed thens then after thre dayes þ gouernour of þ cyte defowled the palays wyth all the fylthe that he myght fynde wyth dunge & fylth of beestes and of mukhilles And. where the kyng hadde ley and slepte. he leyd a sorwe wyth her pigges that late had farwed. All this he dyde by assente and commaūdemēt of the queene /thenne the queene prayd her husbond with flaterynge and desyred hym to come to þ place / there he had be The kyng graunted & cam thyder and sawe that place þ somtyme was lyke to Sardanapalus plesure & lust/ thenne soo dysarayd and defowled / whan she saw this occasōn/she spake to the Kyng and sayd. I praye you my lord/where ben nowe the curteyns and al the ryche arraye of halles and chambres. Where is. nowe the pleasaūt seruple of theym that were wonte to flatre you/ where is the lþkyng and pleasaunt seruple of glotonye and lecherye. Be they not alle passyd. Soo my lord shall oure flesshe passe & fall aweye. that is now norþshed in gold and in ryche araye/here wyth her husbonde was ouercome and after his noble bataylles and victories. and grete prayes that he had taken / he bytoke his kyngdom to his newewe/and wente to Rome. He cam not openly thyder in syghte as a kyng/ but he shaued his heed. and clothed hym as a poure man and ware olde amonge beggars. But the queene Ethelburga wente to the abbaye of berkynge there her suster hadde be abbesse/

Anno gr̄e And she was afterward made abbel;
 Leo se of the same maydens and made a
 blessed ende/and passed to reste.

¶ Beda li. v. ca. xxix. Oricus kynge
 of northumberland deyde after the. ix
 yere of his kynngdom. After hym Col
 wulphus reigned nyne yere. To hym
 beda wrote the stoye callyd historia
 Anglycana. Beda vbi supra/ That
 yere were seen two grisely sterres with
 blasynge cresses aboute the sonne. that
 dured two wekes. That one of hem
 passed euyl to fore the sonne/and the
 other cam after the sonne at eue. And
 these sterres blased and caste as it
 were brennyng bronches towarde the
 northsyde & boded grete deth and mā
 slaughter. for thenne cam a greuous
 melchyet of Saralyns/and bete dow
 ne gallia that is fraunce. ¶ Beda li.
 v. ca. xxx. That yere deyde byrghtwol
 dus archebisschop of dorobernia / that
 is caunterbury/ After hym Tadwyn
 n^o was archebisschop and was sacred
 of the bisschops of london/ of wyndhel
 stre/and of Rochestre. That yere the
 south prouinces vnto the marche of þ
 Ryuer of humber were subget to ethel
 baldus kynge of mercia. The ppyetes
 and the Scottes hadden pees wpyth þ
 Angels/ Somme brytons were at her
 owne lawe/ and somme seruyd the
 Angels After the seconde gregory/ þ
 thyrdd gregory was pope enleuen ye
 re/ he confirmed the worshyppynge of
 holy ymages in a councyll that was
 made at Rome of a thowſath bisschops
 And cursed dredefully alle them that
 done ayenst that statute of worshyppn
 ge of holy ymages. Also that yere one
 petronax byrcianus wete to the hylle

mount castyl & restored the place co
 uenably of godes of catel & of mōkes
 by comfort & cōmaundement of pope
 gregory/ Tadwynus tharchebisschop
 of caunterbury deyde. And nothelin^o
 bisschop of london was archebisschopp
 after hym. Also that yere deyde Alwy
 nus wor. bisschoppe of lychetpold. And
 witta was bisschop of lychetpold whan
 he was dede/and Totta was bisschop
 of legercestria. þ is chestre. And Eata
 dured yet a dorchestre. ¶ R. That ye
 re deyde that worthy man Beda the
 preest. ¶ W. de. Re. libro. v. The se
 uenty yere of his age he was bytake
 to nourschypng & to loore to benet bil
 shop of girwye. And after his deth to
 Coltrydus abbott of the same place.
 In his nyntenth yere he was made
 deken of Johan Bisschop of yorke/ &
 preest in his thyrty yere/ that yere he
 bygan to wryte/ and so he spete al his
 lpf tyme in the same abbaye. and ma
 de hym bely to studeye and expowne
 holy wrytte/ & amonge the belynes þ
 he had euery daye in the scruple of Re
 lygyon and in lpyngynge in chirche/
 he had grete swetenes and lpyng to
 lerne. to teche and to wryte/ he wrote.
 lxxviii. bookes/ he acompteth the boo
 kes in historia Anglycana. here lac
 keth & fapleth connynge & speche to
 wondre at ful/ that a man þ was soo
 wpythout vse of scole made soo many
 noble volumes in soo sobre wordes in
 so lptel space of his lpf tyme. Of alle
 thys I conclude that he come neuer at
 Rome. though som mey wold wene þ
 he wente to rome to be there presente
 & to shewe þ his bookes were acordin
 ge to the loore of holy chirche. And yf

that they were not accordynge/for to
 amēde hem att þ̄ popes comāūdemēt
 But that he wente blynde aboute for
 to preche/that he was ladde by fraude
 of his mā for to preche to stones/ that
 aulwerd & sayt Amen/ that he wente
 thypes to Rome.that he fonde thre. R.
 and thre. f. wryten & expowned what
 is spgnetped/ I fynde not thele thyn
 ges wreton in bookes of Auctoryte/
 Summe mey telle that luche a wrytin
 ge was fouiden. R. R. R. f. f. f. And
 luche an expolicion. Regna ruent Ro
 me. ferro flamma. fame que. that is
 to saye. Rynngdoms of Rome shal fal
 le by Iron. fyre and honger: ¶ W. de.
 Regibus libro primo. But by Pope
 Serigyns pyttle that was sente to ab
 bot colfridus it is knowen that beda
 was sente after & prayd for to come
 to Rome/ for talloyle questions that
 there were meuyd: Here take heede:
 how worthy the courte of Rome held
 hym/ that so noble a courte had nede
 to haue hym for to delcare & alloyle
 the questions that there were meuyd/
 And also howe worthy we shal holde
 hym by the maner of his luyng & of
 his techynge. he myght not be vycio⁹
 that spente so his wytte & thought in
 expowynge of holy wrytte. But his
 clenelle was seey moche at his laste
 ende. for leuey wekes cōtynuelly his
 stomake had Indignacion of mete &
 of drynke. So that vnnethe he might
 reteyne ony mete. and was strayte &
 short brethed/ But for al that he spa
 red not þ̄ trauaylle of lettire & of bo
 okes. But every daye amonge the det
 ty trauayll of seruple & of psalmes/ he
 taught his disciples in lessons and in

questions. And he touned saynt Joha Anno grē
 nes Gospels in to Englishhe. and say
 de Lerne ye my smal Childery whyle Leo
 I am a lyue & with you. I wote not
 howe longe I shall wyth you abyde/
 And euer amonge he sayde þ̄ he lawe
 of Ambrose. I haue not so lyued a
 monge you/ that me shameth to lyue
 nether me dredeth to deye. for we ha
 ue a good lorde. By nyght whan he
 had noman to teche/ he trauaylled be
 sely in bedes byddynge & thankyng
 god of all/ The tuesday to fore that
 renlion his deeth neyhed/ & his feet by
 gonne to swelle/ he was houseled and
 enoynted & kysled his bretheren and
 prayd hem all to haue of h̄ mynde/
 And he paue to many of his seruau
 tes thyngeþ̄ he had kepte in pryuyte
 In the ascencion daye the clothe of
 heer was sprede and he leyd him dou
 ne & prayde the grace of holy ghoſt &
 sayd O kyng of blyſſe lord of vertues
 that hast the prys and arte this daye
 styed vp aboue alle heuenes. leue thou
 vs not faderles/ but send þ̄ in to vs þ̄
 byheest of the fader the Gooſt of soch
 nes / whan that was ended he yelded
 vp the laste breth wyth a welle grete
 swetnes of smel/ and theñe he was bu
 ried there. But the comyn fame tel
 lyth þ̄ he is now at durham wyth say
 nt Luthbert/ & with him was buryed
 wel nygh al the knowleche vnto the
 conquest of dedes of englond & neygh
 all the conynge of lettres. for after
 that tyme after lewde came more lew
 de. As the shamely verses that were
 wreton on his tombe bere grete wyl
 nes of vnconynge/ tho verses be vn
 worthy to be wryten on soo worthy a

Anno grē mannes tumber / these ben the verses /
 Beda the preest resteth here y burped
 Leo in the flesshe. Criste graunte his soule
 to be glad in heuen for euer. Graunte
 him to drynke the welle of wyledom
 that he hath now Despyred belesely al
 21 134 wape ryght wyth loue grete. Aboute
 that tyme rycoldus duch of Frylons
 was tourned by the prechpng of saint
 wulfrianus the billhoppe and wold be
 crystned. And put his one foote in the
 fontelstone and wythdrewe that ocher
 and aryd of hem that stooode aboute
 whether there were moo of his prede
 cellours in paradise or in helle. & was
 answerd moo in helle he herde that &
 drough is foote oute of the water and
 sayd It is elyer that I folow y moo
 than the lesse. and soo he was begyled
 of the fende/and deyde the thirddē da
 ye after. ¶ Willelmus. de. po. libro/iiii
 Aboute that tyme deyde saynt fydels
 wyde/ the mayde borne at Drenford
 the doughter of duck dydamus. kyng
 algarus a lecherous man folowed her
 to the Lyte of Drenford/ And whan
 the mayde was entryd in to the Lyte
 the pates closedey and shyttē by hem
 self. And the kyng werde blynde that
 pouzlued her. But by the prayer of y
 mayde the kyng had his light ageyn
 Syth that tyme after kynges of En
 glond drede for to come wythynne y
 Lyte for drede of myshappes that
 24 138 myght hem by falle. Colwylpus kyn
 ge of northumberlonde after eyghtē
 yere of kyngdome lefte his kyngdom
 to his colyn Egbert⁹ the sone of his
 faders broder. and becam a monke at
 bedas abbaye. And egbertus regned
 nyntey yere. ¶ R/ But Willelmus

de regibus sayth that he was shore at
 lynchfar chyrche. and at laste burped
 belyde saynt cuthbert. nothelunus ar
 chebillhop of caunterbury/deyde. And
 cuthbert billhoppe of herford was Ar
 chebillhopp after hym.

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The fyfth constantinus after
 his fader Leo was emperour
 thre and thyrtyt yere. This
 as his fader vled toke ymages out of
 chirche in euery place and sette hem a
 fyre. Etheldred⁹ kyng of westsaxons
 deyde the fourtenth yere of is kynges
 dome : His colyn cuthbert was kyng
 after hym. and wrechyd oftymes a
 penste ethelwaldus kyng of mercia/
 and regned syxty yere. His colyn
 Spgebertus regned after hym two
 yere/ he was proude of the happes of
 his predecellour and gouerned his sub
 gettis hard and euyll. And torned the
 lawes at his owne wylle/ And slough
 the noble Erle cumbranus euyll and
 wyckedly. for he had spoke to hym of
 his euyll berpunge and dedes. But att
 laste for he wold not be amended. he
 was put oute of his kyngdome. theñe
 he wente in to a wode. and hidde him
 self / And alwyneherd of therles that
 was slayne fonde hym and slough
 hym. Aboute that tyme deyde Char
 les marcellus. After hym his two so
 nes the second Pipinus and Charle
 mayne come to the pryncipate of the
 kynges hows. But charlemaine after
 the fourth yere of hys pryncipate lefte
 of the pryncypate by counceyll of hys
 broder. and toke the wape to Rome/

and was thore a monke in pope Zacharyas tyme. And made an Abbaye in the hyle of Mount Sarapte: and lyued there somdele longe tyme/ But at laste bycause frenshemen come thider to ofte to hym as to theyr lord as they dyde somtyme/ he wente thennes to mount Cassyn. And they prayd hē that he wold sende lettres to the kyng of fraunce for to restore ageyne saynt benets body to mount Cassyn. The pope dyde as he was prayd. And the kyng of fraunce had the monkes of floracio to the lyuer saynt Benettes body. Thenne the monkes began to wepe and to faste/ and prayd god besely that the body must abyde with hem god herd theyr prayers and smote the messagers that were sente/ and made hem starke blynd/ And so they faylled of theyr purpoos & went in to ytaly ageyne/ thenne the second pipinus prefecte of the palayle gouerned the kynges hows of fraunce. Under hilderic^{us} the loue of theodericus. for he was an vniuersitable man & to ely and receyued nothyng of the kyngdome/ but hys name of the kyngdome & his lyuelod Pipinus aryd of the pope Zacharyas yf he shold be kyng that helde hym apayd oonly wyth the name of kyng and yaued hym to slouthe and dyde none other gode. The pope wrote ageyn and sayd that he sholde haue hys name and be kyng hys rewleth well the comēte / the frenshemen were glad of thys answer. & closed hilderic^{us} in an abbay and made pipinus kyng. And after the eyghtenth yere he was made Emperour by decre of Zacharyas the pope. theñe he compellyd astulphus kyn

ge of ytaly that impugned the ryght Anno grē of Rome for to restore that he had taken & mad hym delyure and yeuue pleg Leo ges: After Gregory Zacharyas was pope twelue yere/ this wente on a tyme toward rauenna ryght in the middel of Juny and was couerd al a day wyth a clowde that god had sente/ for he sholde not be brente wyth the grete hethe of the sonne. And alle nyght hys clowde abode beside his tente and arose ageyne at morowe. Also fyr ostes wente to fore that holy man in hys clowdes. The ordre of the Ester was dys- 144 11
toubled. The yonger wylfrydus byshoppe of yorke deyde/ and after hym Egbertus kyng egbertus broder was byshop. xxxvi. yere ¶ Willelmus de regibus libro primo. And the pontificibus libro quarto. By his wytte and sleghthe and his broder the kyng monney. he reparayled the see/ and amended hit in two states. for he was a man of grete herte and of a grete wytte/ & tooke strongly heede that as it is grete pryde to conceyte and desyre oughte that is not ryghtfull/ so it is grete lewdnes and wretchednes to forgendre what is detty & ryghful therfore thar chibishops pal hys the fyrste paulinus that was put oute by strengthe of enemyes hadde lefte at Rouchestre/ and many of his predecessours hadde forgendryd it there he gate it ageyne by grete Instauce & money hys he made at courte of Rome / Also he ordeyned at yorke a noble lyberarye / The noble doctour of Englyshemen Alcuinus that was sente to kyng Charles for peas of Englyshemen/ in his pistle that he sente to holy chirche in to En
E iiii

glond of that lybrarye makech noble
 mynde. Also he writeth to kyng char
 les in this maner. Veue me bookes of
 loore suche as I had in my couñtre of
 englond by the wyfte of my mayster
 egbertus/and I thal sende to you so/
 me of our chyldren that shal take the
 rof what is nedefull/ And bynge in
 to fraūce the floures of brytapne for
 alone an orchard y closed shal be atte
 porke. And at tuorn the spryngyng
 of paradyle. That yere deyde laynt
 danyel billhoppe of wynchestre/After
 hym cam humfrydus/After Zachari/
 as steuen was pope fyue yere. This
 enopnted pipinus two lones and mas
 de hem emperours Charlemau and þ
 grete Charles. Syth that tyme them
 pyre of Rome passyd fro the grekes to
 frenshemen and thenne to germans/
 Renulphus of cerdyrcus kynde in the
 fyfth degre Pendas neuw Goteu of
 knewalcus was a grete man his ver/
 tues passyd his fame. By helpe of the
 westsaxons he putte Sygebertus oute
 of that kyngdom fore the gretenes of
 his euyll dedes/and regned in his ste/
 de thyrtyt yere/ but he graunted hym
 the prouynce of hampton tyl he hadde
 slayne duck cumbranus/thenne he was
 put awaye & hyde in a wode and was
 slayne of the duckes swynherd. Ethel
 woldus kyng of Mercia was slayne
 at Spgelwolde of beouuedes the ty/
 raunt & was buryed at rypindon/ but
 not long afterwarde Offa Ethelwal
 dus neuwe slough Beouuedus and
 regned in his stede. xxxix. yere in mer/
 cia: this ouercome in abataylle the nor/
 thumbres the westsaxons/and kentyl
 shemen/Soo that he tourned tharche

billhopps see oute of Caunterbury in
 to lychefeld in the prouince of mercia
 Also he translated laynt Albons bo/
 nes to the more abbaye that he hadde
 bylded/he yaf to the pope Peters wy/
 cary a rente by yere of euery hous of
 his kyngedome. he made also a grete
 dyche that is cuer seen to departe by/
 twene wales & the kyngdom of Mer/
 cia. the whyche dyche is yet named of
 fedyche Thou shalt fynde more herof
 in the fyrste booke capitulo de plateis
 regalibus. ¶ W. de re. li. i. This Offa
 founded to gete fryndelhippe of kyn
 ges/and marped his doughter Ethel/
 burga to Bryghtrycus kyng of west
 saxons/ he sente Alcuinus doctour of
 Englyshemen to Charles kyng of
 fraūce for to procure pees. for there
 was so grete dilcorde and stryf bytwe
 ne the kyngdomes. þ passage of mar
 chautes was forbode on eyther syde
 Organs come fyrst in to fraunce len
 te fro Constātyu the Emperour kyn/
 ge of grece to pipin⁹ kyng of fraūce
 Egbertus. kyng of northumberlond
 was shorn monke. and his lone olwol
 phus regned after hym and was slay
 ne in thende of his fyrst yere of þ nor/
 thumbres / After hym moll that was
 called Ethelwolde also regned scuen
 yere in Mercia. After stephen paulle
 was pope ten yere a mylde man in al
 thynges. In his tyme gengulphus
 was in his floures in Burgoyne. In
 a tyme he bought a well in fraunce &
 prayd god and had graūted þ thylke
 welle myght spryng oute in burgoyne
 This man lefte his wyfe for she had
 broken spoused and was slayne of the
 clerke that had laye by his wyf/whan

he was dede god shewe many myracles for hym. but his wyf spake euylle of the myracles & sayd whan gengulphus myn hulbonde dooth myracies myn arie shall synge & sont was doo / for as ofte as she pake after ward her arle wold synge wyth a fowle nople / Hull kyng of northumberlonde left the kyngdom. And Aluredus regned after hym nyne yere. This Aluredus had two sones. ofredus that was the thyrde that regned after hym in his stede / and saynt Alcumud that was slayn afterwarde whan he halpe the men of mercia apenst the westsaxons Paul the pope deyde and Constantyn a lewd man was made pope by maystrye & by strengthe and was pope one yere & dyde sklander to al hooly chyrche & his eyen were put oute / That yere deyde pipinus kyng of fraunce in an euyl p was bytwene felle and flesshe after that he had regned eyght and twenty yere /

Whan pipinus was dede p fræl Chemen departed the kyngdome bytwene his two sonnes Charles & charleman / but charleman deyde after two yere and theñe Charles had al the kyngedome and gouerned it nobly after that tyme syr and forty yere. Theñe charlemans wyfe and chyldren fledde to desiderius kyng of longobardes and prayd him of helpe & locoure wythout ony nede for nomay compelled hem therto. But Charles fyrst ouercome duk hunald and wangyen & made it subget / and atte prayer of pope adryan he belyged desiderius kyng of ytalie in the cy

te of pappe / for he was rebell apenst Anno grē the chyrche of Rome as his broder atulphus had ben. Charles tooke hym Karolus in the Lyte of pappe & exyled hym & made his owne sone pipinus kyng of ytalie in his stede / In that batayl deyde amicus and anelius crystes knyghtes. and his herty fendes. Of hem de amico et ben rede wonderfull dedes. Atte lastie amelio Charles chastyled the saxons and the sclauens and toke many of hem & sent hem in to dyuerse places of traunce So that the saxons forloke their maynmetrye & were made oke peple Saxons & trenshemen. There after Charles wente in to spayn & wanne the dales londes and countreys aboute the hilles montes pireni. But he was alsoylled in the weye wyth bulshemētis of Gascoyns / so that they slough the vtterdeele of his hooft. there Dlyuer chyet sewer of the kynges lorde .and Rouland Erle of p palays were slayn Rolandus ne and many other percs of fraunce et oliuetus De libro turpini. In a day whan moriun sutrewes were graunted on eyther syde / Aigolandus a stronge prynce of spayne cam to Charles for to be crystned / And sawe all that were at borde rialy clothed and deliciously fedde. And sawe a fer thyrteen poure mey lytte on the grounde and haue broken mette and symple wythoute ony borde. And he axyd what they were / and it was answered hym that these thyrteen ben goddes messagers and praye for vs & brynge to mynde the nombre of crystes disciples. As I see sayd Aigolandus your lawe is nought ryghful that suffred goddes messagers be thus euylle seruyd.

Anno grē he scrupth euyl his lord that so relcey-
ued his seruauces/And so he was le-
woly offended and delpyled crysten/
Kazolus dom and wente home ageyne/ But
charles worshipped afterward poore
men the more. Treuisa Aigolandus
was alewd gost & lewdely meuyd as þ
deuyl hym taught and blynded hym
that he coude not knowe þ men shold
be seruyd as her state aryd. ¶ Sir. de
po. ca. xvii. Here after charles wanne
gallia narbonensis and made subget
capnanes. and beneuentanes the da-
nes & þ sweues that were confedered
to heu And he dyde that al at onc por-
urney/kynges of brytons of angles of
perce & of scottes of grece worshipede
hym wyth yestes. And as Turpyn
ra kazoli tharchebishoppe telleth Charles was
viii. peduz fayr and welfaryng of body and ster-
ne of face. His body was eyght foote
on lengthe / his face a span & an half
and his berde was a foote longe / he
cleef a two with his swerde a knyght
armed atte one stroke / he wolde esply
wyth his hondes folde & bende foure
horle shone at ones / he wolde haue a
stondyng knyght armed from þ grou-
de with his one honde / he wold ete an
hare all hole or twey hennes. or a go-
os at one mele / and he wold drynke a
lytell wyu watred / he was so scarce of
drynke þ seelde he wolde drynke but
thries at his soper. This charles was
gracious to poore men & to churches
Quer the Ryn at magounce he made
a brydge of fyue hondred paas. as frēl
shemen don / as soone as he myght for
youth he taught his sones to ryde &
hunte. to doo dedes of armes & to ler-
ne scyences of scole / He ordeyned his

doughters to werche wol werke wyth
sppndle & wyth dystaf & ordeyned hē
to vlc suche werkes for they shold not
were slowe by ydlenes / he helde hym
not a payd with his cōutrey speche. he
coude better vnderstāde þ langage of
grue thā speke it in loore of gramer pe-
ter of pyle was his maister / & in other
sciences of clergie alcuin^o albinus an
englysheman was his mayster / Char-
les fonded to wyte lettres / therfore he
bare a payr tables for to wyte ynne /
but it proffyteth ryght lytell. for þ tra-
uaylle was bygonne to late: he wolde
be at chyrche early & late & at houres þ
were layd by nyght / he ordeyned and
allygned grete almes to poore men þ
were in fer londes in egypt & in Affri-
ca. he had alweye a redez at mete / and
had grete delyte in saynt Austyns bo-
okes & specially in his bookes de ciui-
tate dei. In somer tyme after mete in
þ vndertryde he wolde take somewhat
of apples & drynke ones therto & doo
of his clothes & goo to bedde as it we-
re by nyght & slepe two howres. By
nyght he wolde four sythes or fyue a
wake & arysle & lye down & slepe. thry-
es he cam to Rome & alyzt of his hois
a myle athis half þ cyte & yete ofte in
to al þ cyte & kyssed al þ pylers of chir-
ches. he delpyerd þ hooly lōde & come
ageyne to Cōstātinople & forloke al þ
precious & grete yestes þ Constantyn
thēperour proffered relceued relyques
of hooly sayntes / he relcepued a grete
party of our lords crosse and a partye
of the crowne of thornes that there in
his syght that byganne to blolme /
and bere floures.
And one of crystes nayles oure lady

smoke and saynt symeons Arme/and brought theselyques wyth hym to saynt marpe chirche at Aquilgranti that he had founded and lyeth buryed there/ he founded as many abbayes as begg letters in the. A. B. C. In euery of thylke abbayes by the ordre of þe fondacyon. thei of. he sette and pyghte a letter of golde of the weyghte of an hondred pond tournors. Of this mā Charles it is wonder that he wolde vnnethe marpe ony of his doughters whylle he was a lyue. oute take his oldest doughter the whyche he married to the kynge of grece that heete constantyn/ Charles sayd that he myght not be wythout company of his doughters/ Therefore though he were gracious in other dedes. In that poynthe apenst fortune he was to blame: and though there were grete speche therof amonge the peple. he made it as though he knewe it not. And as none sulpeccion were of that foly dede / therefore somme men wene that/that was the synne that he wolde neuer shryue him of wyth his mouth/ but vnnethe at last by wryttinge to saynt gyles/ Also this charles er he deyde deled his catell in thre partyes. one partye he assigned to poure men: Another to chirche/ And yet the thyrde he departed in foure partyes. one therof he kepte for to holde his myndeday. that othe to euery dayes vble / the thyrde to his sone and newwes and the fourth to his seruañtes that were of his howsholde he late ones at meete. and his mayster alcum⁹ sat to fore hym. theñe he axyd his mayster how grete difference and space was bytwene a scot and a lot/

but the brede of a meteborde sayd his Anno grē mayster. **C R** for to bynge storpes to acorde that semeth oure of acorde **Barolus.** spekyng of thempyre and of the kyngedome of charles: Take heede that this Charles whiche he was ponge was enopnted kynge of the second pope steuen the yere of oure lorde seuen hondred/ Liiii. whiche his fader pipinus. was a lyue and regned wyth his fader. and vnder hym .xv. yere vnto his faders deth/ theñe after his faders deth that deyde the yere of oure lorde seuen hondred and heyght and lxxv. yere. he regned wyth his broder charlemayn two yere/ his broder deyde the yere of oure lorde seuen hondred and lxx. Charles helde the kyngedome all hooll fourten yere. to þe yere of our lord seuen hondred foure core and fouz That yere he wente fyrst to Rome to be crowned emperour of Adryan the pope And there after he was Emperour lxxv. yere to the yere of oure lord epyght hondred. Whan the fourth pope leo confermed Charles ageyne Emperour there after he was emperour fourten yere And deyde the yere of his age. ii. c. xvii. þe was the yere of oure lorde. viii. c. xiiii. Theñe after some men telle in storpes þe he regned in al six c. l. yere/ that shal be vnderstanden from his faders deth to his owne deth. But who that wylle see more of charles lpf must loke þe bookes of his mayster Alcuinus or turpyn tharchebishhops bookes. That daye that charles deyde at byan in frañce Turpyn was in his bedes and sawe a company of blac knyghtes wente towarde Akon for to take Charles

Anno grē soule/and he coniuered the last of hem
 that he sholde come ageyne whay he
 had don & telle hem what they dyde
 and how they spedde. Thenē the sen-
 de wēte & come ageyne. And Turpyn
 arpd of hym what they had do. we ha
 ue quod the fēde weped charles lowle
 but thylke James of spayne þ was
 byheded/seyde so many stones & tezes
 in the weyght & balaunce that char-
 les good dedes had the maystrye and
 weped more than his euyl dedes. And
 we haue ryght nought brought wpyth
 vs ageyne/Charles layd the fende v-
 sed to bilde many churches in worlship
 of saynt Jame: After that Cōstantyn
 that had assolpled the poperyche and
 take wpyth strengthe was putte oute.
 Pope Stephen was pope foure yere. A-
 none he gadred a synode & reuoked al
 that was doo by his predecessour oute
 take crystenynge and crylme & what
 þ was ordeyned to lauacyon þ depey/

After Steuen the fyrste Adry-
 an was pope four and twēty
 yere. fyrst this gadryd the se-
 cond counceyll at Constantinople of
 thre honderd faders. & fyfth he made
 another counceyll in the cyte of Ro-
 me wpyth thre hondryd & fyfth faders
 kyng charles was presēte there/ The
 ne him was graunted ryght in þ elec-
 cyon of the pope & of the ordeynynge
 of the popes see / The northumbries
 putte oute theyr kyng Aluredus and
 toke ethelbertus that heete Etheldre-
 dus also the sonne of mollus: & made
 hym theyr kyng he regned ouer hem

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fyue yere. The fourth leo the sonne
 of the fyfth Constantyne regned in
 grece foure yere/ He brente in thurs-
 te for grete couetyse. he toke of a chy-
 che crowne that was ryally sette with
 carbuncle stones / and sette it on his
 heede and was take wpyth a lodayne
 feuer and deyde/ That yere Ossa
 kyng of mercia spoylled lamberd/
 Archebillschoppe of caunterbury of his
 dygnyte of prymate/ and brought þ
 dygnyte to lychefeld and helde it there
 whyle he was a lyue by assente of the
 pope adryan. The sixth Constantyn
 the sonne of the fourthe Leo regned in
 grece wpyth hys moder Jren ten yere
 In his laste yere fylle dyode and
 stryffe bitwene the sonne and moder.
 And the moder toke the sonne & putte
 hym in pryson and soo she regned
 all one fyue yere. Atte laste the sonne
 hadde helpe and counseyll of the
 Armeneyes and cam oute of prissonne
 and pourlued cruelly his moder and
 her helpers. Thenne afterwarde the
 sonne for his grete cruelnesse was ta-
 ke by commaundement and strength
 of the moder/and his eyen were putte
 oute in soo euyll maner that he deyde
 soone afterwarde and soo Jren
 regned ageyne fyue yere
 Butte Nychoforus patrycpus tha
 hadde grete worshippe of Jren Ro-
 os ageynste her and tooke the crow-
 ne ayenste the peples wyll /
 and tooke of her the tresour of them-
 pyre wpyth an oth made to be harme-
 les/ and exyled her and soo exyled she
 deyde/the fyrste yere of thys Con-
 tantyn in a uede mannes graue atte
 Constantinople was founde a

plate of gold. in whiche plate was wrytton in this maner. Cryst shall be borne of mayde marye. In hery I by leue. Vnder Constatyn & Jren. i. one este me. thou shalt see. ¶ Mary libro. secundo. That yere. kenulphus kyng of westsaxons. & offa kyng of mercia fought strongly for the cyte of belyngton/ but offa had þe vycory & the cyte That yere the northumbres put oute her kyng ethelbertus þe heete etheldredus also/ & made Alwolf kyng & regned enleuen yere. That yere þe second synode was made atte nicene of thre hondred & fyfty billhops in adrians tyme/ In that synode apenst thoppinion of grekes it is sayd þe holy ghost cometh of the fader & of the sonne ¶ W. de. po. li. iiii. Kenulphus kyng of westsaxons caste for to pute kyng hard out of his kyngedom the broder of his predecellour. Sygeberd & cam by nyght to a womans hows at mercton þe was his lemman/ there Clyto cam with four score felawes & bisette the kyng al aboute. But whanne the kyng was awaked he defended manly hym self/ but he was slepne at late Erly a morowe it was knowen þe the kyng was dede/ & Dryucus þe kynges capitayne cam with his felawes to the place & slough clyto & his felawes euerychone/ and toke the kynges body and buryed it at wyntchestre. After kenulphus brightricus of Cerdicus blood was kyng of westsaxons fyften yere. Anone by helpe of kyng Offa whos douzter he hadd wedded he put out Egbertus the sonne of Almundus the vnder kyng & was the sone of offa & cam of the blood of gen

gullus & of Jue. Anone as he was Anno grē to put downe he went in to fraunce. & vled the scole of chivalie: And whan Karolus. bryghtricus was dede. he cam ageyne & regned & taught þe scole of cyruasly/as he had lerned in fraunce/ lull archebillhop of caunterbury deyde. and Rychulphus was archebillhopp after hym eyght & twety yere he bygan to buylde saynt albōs grete chirche from the fundament of a wonder werke of brente tyll & brought it nobly to an ende. ¶ W. de. po. libro. iiii. This yere kēg Offa married his dought Ethelburga to. Bryghtricus kyng of westsaxons/ Of her it is sayd þe she laboured besely by myght or by venyn for to slee al the houlhold men of her husbonde/ thenne on a tyme she paue besynme to a yonglyng & was homly with the kyng & slough both the kyng & the yonglyng/ thenne she wente to the kyng of fraunce & had wyth her grete tresour and ryches. And in a tyme the kyng & his sone stode in a chambre/ and the kyng paue her choys/ whether she wold haue to husbond of the fader or þe sone. And she chees þe sone haddest þe chose me quod þe kyng thou sholdest haue had my sone/ But for þe hast forsake me / thou shalt not haue me nor my sone/ thou muste leue the pryde of the world / and goo in to an abbaye/ there a lewed man laye by her / and she was put oute and deyde in pouerte: After that tyme therof it cam to be vled amonge the Aunhels that the kynges wyf sholde not be callyd quene/ nor lytte by the kyng in the kynges sete:

¶ Henricus libro quarto.

Anno grē That yere was scene a wonder signe
of the Crosse on englyshemens clo-
thes/and blood fylle downe fro heuen
to the erthe. It is not knowen/ why-
ther this betyll in token of the mocōn
of Iherusalem/that fyll thre honderd
yere afterward in wiliam the Reddes
tyme/or els for tamende englyshmen
that they shold drede the wreche that
was to come vpon hem by the danes
but as god wyll so mote it be/ that ye
re the danes cam fyrst in to Englonde
The kynges styward of westsaxons
wente apenst hem vnwysely wyth fe-
we men and was slayne of hem/
Saynte Oswold kyng of northum-
berlonde was slayne of his owne men
his newe Olfredus the sonne of Alu-
redus/and broder of Alcmundus reg-
ned after hym and was lone put oute
after and slayne /. After hym Ethel-
dredus that was somtyme put oute of
his kyngedome regned ageyne and
was lone afterward slayne/ therefore
Colwulphus billhop of lydeffar for-
soke bothe and lefte the see & the kyn-
gedom. Here after Oswaldus regned
after fewe dayes. After him Adulph⁹
regned one yere. There after. lxxvi.
yere kynges regned there / the laste
of hem were Osbryght and Elle the
danes slough hem at þe Lyte of porke
and all the floure of theyr men the ye-
re of oure lord epyght hondred. lxxvii.
After that tyme the danes regned in
northumberlonde two and fyfty yere
vnto Ethelstans tyme. pipinus the
sonne of charles conspired apenst his
fader/ but his counsel was wyped/
And he was shore monke/ and closed
in an abbay/ & his felawes were lom-

me byheded & somme ay hanged by
the trothe. Saynt Ethelbertus kyng
of cestagles was pryued bothe of his
kyngdom and of his lyfe by heeste of
kyng Offa & by exptyng & counceyl
of his owne wyf knolwyda:

Offa depde kyng of mercia/
his sonne Eglercus regned af-
ter hym one yere. And after
hym a mylde man kenulphus cutber-
tus sonne was kyng/he gate on his
wyf quene Alstrycha quendrynda. bur-
genilda. and saynt kenelme. ¶ W. de.
Regibus libro primo in fine. This
Kenulphus was pendaes neuwe in
the fifthe degre. and was a giete man
his vertues passyd his fame. At home
he was deuoute and mylde. In batayl
he wss stronge and had ofte the vyc-
torpe after Offa he took wrath apēste
kentylshmen & wreted strongly in her
londe/ And toke their kyng Egbert þ
hete pren by his surname/ & lad hym
with him y boude in to mercia. But
lone after he was milded by mercy of
manheede in þe buyldyng of þe churche
of wynchecōbe þe he buylded. Atte au-
ter he yauē the kyng fredom þe was
his prisoner. There were prelate thyr-
ten billhops & ten dukes/ for þe dede
al þe churche lownded for Jope/ & þe stre-
te cyde grutched & made noyle star-
tyng aboute. Also he restored ageyne
þe dygnyte of prymate to athelardus
billhop of caūterbury & deyde at laste
after þe yere of his fyrste regne four &
twenty/ and was buryed at wynche-
combe. & lefte Kenelme after hym to
be his heyr. That tyme at Costātino

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ple the sonne wythdrew his lyght se-
 uenten dayes/and was not seen / so þ
 many men suppoled that it was by
 falle for þ blyndyng & puttyng out
 of kyng Constantyns eyen. Aluredus
 Also that yere that was the tenth ye-
 re of bryghtrycus were fyr dragons
 seen in englonde fleynge be the ayer/
 After that lygne cam two pestilences
 stronge hunger and the warre of the
 danes that assayled fyrste northum-
 berland /and thenne lynchelye. But at
 that tyme the danes were ouercome &
 fled to her shippes. After adrianus þ
 fourth leo was pope twenty yere. In
 a tyme thys wente to saynt peters on
 saynt Marcus daye wyth the letany
 and was take and his eyen put out &
 his tonge hnt of. But god by a myra-
 cle restored him his lyght and his spe-
 che/soo that he spake wythoute tonge
 Afterward he wente to Charles in to
 fraunce/and come ageyn wyth hym
 to Rome. Thenne wieche was take of
 the popes enemyes/and the pope pur-
 gid him of that meyn bare hym on hō
 de/And thenne este he crowned charles
 & cōfermet hē þ was to fore crowned
 Nychoforus patricius cyled Irene
 thempresse of grece/& assayled & toke
 thēpyre wyth wyles & with strengthe
 and regned eyght yere. In his tyme
 the ecclie empyre fayled al oute. The
 body of saynt wythburgh the made
 was founden hool and founde in the
 toune of durham/there as it was bu-
 ried after. lxx. yere /wythburgh was þ
 doughter of kyng anna/and the sul-
 ter of sexburga/that yere charles was
 crowned emperour of leo the pope/
 Syth that tyme thempyre passyd fro

the Grekes to the frenshemen/ and Anno grē.
 to the germans that ben Almapns.

Sir..de.p.ca.septymo. For this pal-
 linge of thēpyre/þ grekes though they
 sayle in hem self/& stryue more wyth
 denyng than wyth vertue more wyth
 cratte than wyth strengthe of batayll
 and of mars that is callyd god of va-
 tayll/yet they haue soo grete enuye to
 the latyns.that they haue withdraue
 hem oute of the subiectōn and obedyē-
 ce of the churche of Rome. And ther-
 fore whan þ popes of Rome charged
 hem ofte to be obedyent and to come
 ageyne to the vnyte of hooly churche/
 They vled to wyte ageyne in this
 maner. Ye haue wythdrawen you
 from vs/ and we wythdraue vs fro
 you. ¶ Willelmus de.re.ti.primo. Et
 de pontificib⁹ libro tercio. Bryghtry-
 cus kyng of wellaxons deyde y pop-
 soned by the denyng of his wyf. After
 hym Egbertus the sonne of almun-
 dus the vnder kyng that was the so-
 ne of offa of Juces blood and kynde
 regned seuen and thyrty yere. Som-
 tyme thys was chached of bryghtry-
 cus and fled in to fraunce/ and cam
 ageyne and taught what he hadde
 lerned of chpyualy to his subgettis to
 alle the people boude and fre/he or-
 depned knyghtes delyuere men and
 stronge and swyper. And made
 wepen to be born in tyme of pees.
 In a tyme bernulphus kyng of mer-
 cia scorned his doynge. And he that
 was yde and ful of rekte meued hym
 to bataylle that was vld in dedes of
 arnes. And bad hym sterly þ he
 shold do hē homage. thenne there was
 bytwene hem a bataill in somer tyme

 Carolus at elydon in the prouince of hampton
 there was vnylike nombre and araye
 of knyghtes/for apenst ay hondred of
 Egbertus knyghtes that were paal/
 and lene cam a thousand that were
 rody & fatte/ and were loner stuffed
 wyth swote than wyth bloode / But
 whan the batayle was done/Egbert⁹
 oned the kyngdoms of mercia.of ken
 te and of northumberlond to his kyn
 gedom and toke chestre vpon the bry
 tons. for the Brytons helde chestre

Prim⁹ mo
 narchia an
 glie vnto that tyme/thenne he called þ loz
 des to gyder at wynechestre and was
 crowned kyng of all brytapne/ there
 he ordeyned and comaundered that all
 the saxons and Jutes shold be callyd
 Angles fro that dape forward /and þ
 brytapne shold be callyd anglia Bry
 tapne cōteyneth englond walles and
 Scotland. ¶ R. That yere that kyn
 ge bryghtrycus deyde / as maryanus
 sayth/Ethelmundus kyng of mercia
 wente oute of his owne londe vnto þ
 forde of chymexforde / and fought a
 penyte weofstan duc of wylton In that
 bataylle the dukes were slayne in ey
 ther syde/and the wylton men had þ
 vyctorye. But saynt alcmundus the
 martir the sonne of kyng Aluredus
 of northumberlode come in Ethelmū
 dus syde and was slayne there/his bo
 dy was fyrst buryed att whyte abbay
 and afterward at derby/ in the north
 chirche that is buylde in his name/
 there god sheweth for hym tokens &
 myracles:and the northumbres comē
 to him ofte a pylgremage. ¶ W.de.v.
 li.i. That yere albinus englilshmen
 that heete alcuinus also a conynge
 may of Clergye passyd ouer the see

in to fraunce/and enlumyned that lo
 de wyth lyght of his techynge/and or
 deyned there orylons & offyce of mal
 le for feryal dayes. And he brought
 to parys studey that the grekes hadde
 somtyme chaunged to Rome. After
 beda and adeln thys was the wyllest
 may of al englilshemen that I haue
 redde of/ and he was take and lette
 specially wyth kyng charles whether
 it were for clenness of the londe/ or for
 manhede of the kyng/and taught hē
 logyke and sophystrye/rethoryke and
 astronomye. And the kyng bytoke
 hym saynt martyns abbay at tuone
 to gouerne by thabbots ryght/for the
 monkes there were fallen in to grete
 outrage. Therfore a moke lawe two
 aūgels come in to her dortour & slewe
 all the monkes of that place/out take
 hym that sawe that lyght/ at last al
 cuinus restyd at saynt poule of corma
 rike/ there is euey dape almes deled
 for his soule.four monkes mete/abo
 ut this tyme saynt gyls thabbote of
 the nacyon of grekes was in his flou
 res he come in to the ouer fraunce by
 warnynge of god/and lyued fyrst an
 ankers lyfe by the Riuer of roone. Al
 so that tyme paule the deken of rome
 was in is floures/ that discriued the
 longobardes/he come out of thabbay
 of mount callyn in to fraunce for lo
 ue of kyng charles.Amonge þ Gre
 kes mychel a mylde man was made
 emperour.In his thyrd yere the soñe
 fayled in the soñe rylsynge.And loone
 there after thēperour was shorne mon
 ke.And a grete pestylence of rutheren
 destroyed well nygh all Europa/ and
 namely brytapne. The grete charles

was leke foure yere of the feuers and
 depde the fourth daye to fore feuerer
 at Alcon & is buryed there/ ¶ Maria/
 nus libro secundo. In his laste yere þ
 treen brydge of fyue hondred paas þ
 he hadde made with cost and traually
 le in tery yere ouer the Ryn at magun
 cia. was too brent in thre houres that
 there was notte a spoon therof y seen
 flete vpon the water. Many man sup
 pose that thys hadde fylle atte prayer
 of yculphus the bisschopp for mansla
 ughter and roberye / that was ofte by
 nyght doon vpon that brydge/ But
 oother men suppose that it fyll by som
 me auenture and none other wyse.

Atte last this Lowys yafe his sone Charles the balled. that he had gotten on Judytha almayne and Rethyca/ therfore the other thre bretheren had Indignacōn and were wroth and forloke Lowys by helpe of the galles/ and made tholdest sone Lotharius kyng/ he priloned his fader lowys by assente of þ four/ the/pope gregory & exyled his faders wyf Judytha/ and put her sone Charles the balled in the castel of pryngge/ but loone afterward þ prynces of fraunce deliuerden the kyng and accorded hym and his sone/ But by counseylle of pipinus fals men accused falsely þ quene Judytha and made her a mencion/ but the same yere the kyng had the quene a geyne by helpe of the pope for bernarde purgyd hym lawfully of the spoulebriche þ hym was born on honde/ So that none of hem that

accused hym/ was hardy ayenste hym for to stryue/ After Leo the fourth he uen was pope thre yere. After hym paschal was pope seuen yere/ he crowned lotharius/ and made a gaderyng of monkes of grece at Rome in the chyrche of praxede/ ¶ Willelmus de Regibus libro primo. Et de pontificibus libro quarto/ Kenulphus kyng of mercia deyð and his sone kenelme a child of seuen yere old regned after hym After fewe monethes by entylge of his suster quendreda kenelme was slayne of one helhebertus in a thycke wode. And he was founden by a pyler of lyght that stooð vpon frōn his body in to heuen/ But by a crowe that was wretton in Englyshe wyth golden lctres that a Tuluer brought and leyd vpon saynt peters Altar. with was rede of an Englysheman that was there present. Kenelms deth and the place of his deth was knowen at Rome. ¶ R.  ruled it/ for the cours of his lyfe was

And sente his sone Edward before for to stable the pees. Therafter abowte Lente tyme. the kynge came wyth grete speede. And droof Canutus out of Lynde laxe. Thenne Canutus toke hym to rede for to flee at Sandwyche in Kent. he made hysse of hondes and nooles of alle the Englyshmen pledges that were deluyerd to his fader some tyme. And saylled aye in to Denmarke. & came agayne the nexte yere after. This yere Canutus saylled abowte

east Englonde. And took propes in the South countree. The noble knyghte Edmonde Prensyde came manly agaynst hym. But Edmonde wythdrew him whan he was waar of Edrycus treplyon. Edrycus gaue hym & his to Canutus. The westsaxons sawe that. and deluyerd hym pledges and dyde the same. Kyng Egelredus deyed at London eyghte dayes before May. And was buryed in Poules chyche. After his dethe byshops. abbottes and lordes of the lond forloke his yssue & progenye. & knowleged at Southatou. Canutus shold be her kynge. & he swore that he wolde be to theyn a true lorde. bothe to godward and to the worlde. But the Londoners and many of the lordes made her kynge Edmonde Prensyde. And anone he made the westsaxons subget. some for drede. and some bi her owne good wyll. In the meane tyme Canutus byleged London. But he was put of there. And he foughte wyth Edmonde in Dorsette bysides Gyllyngham. and was ouercomen there. Therafter the myddyll of Somer. Edmond wyth a grete hooft foughte more sharply wyth Canutus in the prouynce of Wycces. That is the prouynce of Wycceter. There they fought so strongly that eyther hooft wythdrew hem fro other for pure werynesse. Alfreddus & Marianus. But the morowe Edmonde had ouercome the Danes. ne had yf falle Edrycus shewed a knyghtes heede that was mooste lyke to kynge Edmonde. Edrycus shewed that heed and sayde. flee Englyshmen. Loo here is the hede of kynge

But some storyes layen. & specyally Marian⁹. that Edmond deped not in that manere/ But after that the acorde was made. & stablyshed bytwene the kynges. and the kyngdom deled bitweue theim tweyne. Edmonde deped at London abowt saynt Andrewes tyde. and was buryed at Glastebury wyth his grauntlyre Edgar

 god shall ordeyne and purueye/ ¶ The
 ricus libro vi^o / Aboute this tyme an
 hooly man warned Englyshmen/ þ
 a lorde that they thought not on. shol
 de come oute of fraunce. and brynge
 hem right lowe/ And tolde other thin
 ges as it is layd in the ende of the fyr
 ste boke/ ¶ Willelmus de regibus li
 ii^o / This yere Egelnotus archebys
 chop of Saunterbury pleled king Ca
 nutus in goodnes by auctoryte of ho
 lynesle/ And feryd hym in excelle. and
 brought saynt Elphegus body out of
 London to his owne chyche/ ¶ The
 re after as he come from Rome. atte
 paype he boughte saynt Austyns the
 doctours arme for an hundred pound
 of siluer. and a talent of golde/ he sen
 te that arme to Couentree for loue of
 Leofrycus/ ¶ This yere deyed the fyr
 ste Henry emperour of Almayne/ Af
 ter him the fyrst Conradus regned xv
 yere/ he ordeyned that who soo euer
 brake the lawe of the londe sholde les
 se his hede/ Thenne the fyrst that tre
 spaced ayenst the ordenaunce. was er
 le Lupoldus/ Thenne he dradde full
 sore. and fledde in to wyldernesse. he &

 now is born newly. shal wedde thy do

 re/ Soone after it happed that one du

 aege/ Conradus the kynge bihelde h^e

 thoughte hym full ofte. how he mygh

Also this yere deyed the secon
de Rycharde. the fourth duke
of Normandye. After hym
his sone the thyrde Rycharde was du
ke of Normandye. After one yere of þ
duchery. his yonger broð Robert slew
hym wyth venym. And was duke af
ter him. But after the seventh yere of
his duchery. he was sory for his bro
thers dethe. and went on pylgremage
bare fote to Iherusalem. and deyed in
Bithynia. Of hym it is sayd. that
he was myghty. and poltprque in ba
tyle. Large and free of yettes. and of
mete and drinke. On a tyme it hap
ped at a grete feeste that knyghtes of
fied at masse. But one of hem offred
not. The duke trowed therefore that
he had not that he myghte offre. And
bad yeue hym an hundred ponde. he
layed hem hooly vpon the awter.
He axyd hym why he dyde soo. for it
was yeuen me for to offer sayd þ kni
yght. The duke herde that. and paue
hym a nother hundred ponde to hys
owne vlc. On a nother time the sa
me duke played att Chesse. and hym
was yeuen a golden Just wöderly fa
yr arayed wyth perles & wyth precio
us stones. And he paue it anone to þ
clerke that played wyth hym at Ches
se. and the clerke deyed anone. Philici
ens told the cause. and sayd. that rist
as the herte clopyth for grete sorowe /
and is cause of dethe but the herte be
the sooner opened. Also for grete Joy
the herte openith. and is cause of dethe
but it be the sooner closed. Also on
a tyme one broughte to duke Roberte
two well fayre knyues. and anone he
badde yeue hym an hundred ponde.

And whyle he tolde the money. were
two gentyll horses yeuen to the duke.
The duke paue hem anone to hym. þ
paue hym the knyues. Whan he had
receyued all this. he spedde hym faste
his waye. lest some lette myght haue
fallen. In the meane time the Duke
was yeuen a cuppe of siluer. that was
a vessel to bere in fruyte. Thenne he
was soughte that broughte the kny
ues. and might not be founden. The
ne the duke made grete mone and sa
yd. that he had receyued a symple re
warde that broughte hym the knyues.
He sayd of this Robert. that alle þ
me paaf hym. but it were like a yef
te that sholde be eten. he wolde yeue it
to hym. that paaf hym the fyrst wor
shyppfull yefte that daye. W. de re. li
ii. This Robert on a tyme passed bi
Phalelya a cytee of Normandye. and
sawe a mayde called Arlett by her na
me a skynnners doughter daunce amo
ge other. and had her to his bed a ny
ght. and heeld her somdeele longe ty
me in steede of his wyfe. & bygate on
her William the conquerour. A swe
uen that his mod mett signefied how
grete he shold be. for the met that her
bowels were spradde in to all Englo
de & Normandy. Also whan the chy
lde was born it happed that he touched
the ground. and toke bothe his hōdes
full of the powder of the pament. and
constreyned his hondes. & heeld fast þ
powder. Therefore the mydwyf tolde
that the chyld sholde be a knyght.
The fyrst nyght that this mayde Ar
lett was broughte to the dukes bedde
she to rente her owne smocke fro the
chyne to the fete. The duke axed whi

the dyde soo/ It is neyther skylful ne
 curtelpe sayd the that the hēme of my
 smocke that hath byclipped my fete/
 shold be torned toward my lordes mo
 uth/ ¶ Thenne duke Robert went to
 Jhrlm/ & had togider all the lordes of
 his londe at fystanum/ And made hē
 swere fewty to his sone William that
 was tho vii. yere olde/ And ordened er
 le Gilbert the childes tutor. & ordened
 the tutor to be maynted by the kynge
 of fraunce/ They helde her obeyssaū
 ce to the chylde tyll duke Robert was
 dede/ But whā they herde of duke Ro
 berts dethe. euery of hem toke hede to
 hymself. & roughte not of the chylde
 At last this Gybert was slayne of o
 ne Kauf that was the chyldes vnclē.
 There was fyghtynge & manslaugh
 ter. the couētree was foule faren wity.
 wyth stryfe that men had amonge hē
 self/ But Wplliam was ponge in ar
 mes. & one Guye of Burgoyne was
 cause & maker of all that stryfe & trei

 hynnelman of the seconde Richardes
 doughter/ But Wplliam toke hym. &
 dyde hym to dethe/ And Odo the kyn
 ges broder of fraunce came agynste
 Wplliam/ But Wplliam had the ma
 ystry. and chaced Odo. and made hē
 flee/ Henry the kinge of fraunce her
 de herof. and came wyth a grete mul
 titude. and was dyspytously & fowly
 chaled/ But medyatours went bytwe
 ne and made pees/ And þ kingesmen
 of fraunce were deliuerde / that were
 taken pylsoners / here take grete hede
 that Wplliam foughte oft wity þ hē
 ge of fraūce. but neuer sodenly as ou
 re men done now a dayes/ But þ day

of bataylle sholde be sette. and he had
 euer the vyctory / Thenne whan the
 kynge of fraunce was dede. he tooke
 manly the londes of Normandye tho
 ugh the londes were lōge tyme absolu
 te. þ by the countee of Canouye & lital
 Britain/ þ kynge Charles had yeuen
 to Rollo wyth his doughter Gylla
 this William wañe it manly/ Harold
 an Englyshe man was in that batay
 le. as it shal be sayd wythyn/ ¶ Duke
 Robert went to Jhrlm. & palled bi bo
 urgoyne There as he went out of þ pa
 te the porter smote hym wyth a staff
 Anone he thanked god. & forbode his
 men. & charged þ none of hem sholde
 take wreche of þ dede/ for I am sayd
 he wel worthy to haue more harme/ I
 loue sayde he this stroke more thanne
 all Rothomage. Thenne he came for
 to take the crosse of the pope. and dide
 his noble pall abowte thymage of the
 grete Constantyn. & scorned the wyth
 the Romayns. þ wold namely ones a
 yere yeue theyr lorde a clothe / Also he
 made to shooe his mule wyth golde þ
 he rode on/ & forbad al his men þ they
 shold not take vp the shooes whā thei
 were fallen/ Also he came by thempe
 rour of Cōstantynople/ And whyle he
 spake wyth themperour. he sawe noo
 benche in all the hous. & sate hym do
 wn vpon his owne palle in the maner
 of his owne countree. & his knyghtes
 dyde the same/ And as the duke badd
 they left their palles there whan they
 arose/ & sayd that they shold not take
 away her bēches/ The duke was prai
 ed of thēperour to take money for his
 coltes by the waye. & he answerd & sa
 yd þ he wolde in pylgrymage lyeue by

his owne/But whan he came againe he wolde doo themperours wyl/Thē ne the kinge forbad þ̄ noo man shold selle hym)ewel to seeth his mete ther wyth/Thēne the duke bought nottes & seethed his mete therwyth/The kē ge wondred of the dukes manhede / & made benches in his court afterward in stede of the forlaid palles/Hereafter the duke cueled so in the waye that he myght nother goo ne ryde/ Therefore he hyred poor saralyns that shold bere hym by day in a lytture on her sholders/And charged a Norman þ̄ went again in to Normandy.that to þ̄ nor mans that wolde axe tydynge of the duke. He sholde telle that he had seen fendes bere the duke to heuen ward/ He called the Saralins fendes.& the holy londe heuen/Thēne it was vled that no crysten man shold come wyth in the holy cytee wythoute grete hyre/Thenne many men herde of this dukes comynge.and came to hym & prayed hym of helpe.and he sware by the hert of his wombe.that whyle he had one peny he wold be the last that sholde entree/ That noble Saralyn the lord of the cyte herde therof.and hadd also herde of this dukes othe manly dedes.and forbad anone þ̄ noo thyng shold be take of hē.nother of oni mā that came in his company/And charged & cōmaunded also to yeue the duke all the offryng of a daye/He receyuyd the offring. & paue it anon to poor men/and deped soone after in Bythinya.as it is byfore sayd/

After Venet the twenty John was pope ix.yere/Also this tyme Marianus þ̄ Scotte was borne/By his labour this cronycle is moche enhaūced/¶ Marianus The Morganes.that is to say men of Norwage forloke eft their holy kyng Dlanus for his lymplenelle. & toke Canutus in his stede.and he was curlyd ly slayne the fourth yere after/¶ Robert kyng of fraunce is deed.his lone Hugh was kyng after hym/ Also that yere Canutus went out of Denmarke to Rome. & paaf large gyftes to saynt Peter/ And made there þ̄ scole of Saxons free of all maner tybute. & paaf large almes & grete in his comynge apen towarde Englonde. & payed grete rauilon for passage of pylgrymes in many places/And purchaced that the wayes were opened that were closed. & procured the pope to recee the price & the payment that pry mates of his kyngdom were wont to yeue and paye for to haue the palle/ Of alle thyle dedes they sente a letter to þ̄ lordes of Englonde.and charged hem that they sholde bifore his comēge amende all trespaces & defawtes / ¶ After John the nynth Venet was pope viii.yeres/But this Venet was put out of the poperyche & a nother þ̄ was called Splyester was put in his stede/But this Splyester was put oute/& Venet was restored again/ But yet this Venet was eft put out again And John Archepretour of saynt Johas place. that is called ante portam latinam was made pope/Innermore this John is called the sixt Grego ry/This Venet for he was boystous

of lettur/Whan he had the poperiche
 he ordeyned a nother pope for thoffy-
 ce of holy chirche/That maner of do-
 ynge dupleyled many men/Therfor
 the thyrde was broughte in.that shol-
 de doo the offyce for theym bothe/
 And soo one stroouc apenst tweyne. &

 Thenne Henry theemperour that had
 wedded Conradus doughter. & was
 his succellour put out thile popes. and

 deyed. one Suanus kynge of the Nor-
 ganes / This Suanus was holden þ
 sone of Canutus & of Elgina of Hamp-

 anus whan he was new born of a pre-
 estis wyfe. and layd herself dowre. as

Ryng Canutus deyed at Septon: þ Anno grē

 des that he dyde/ The fyrst þ he mari-
 ed his doughter to the emperour Con-
 radus/ The seconde that he went no-

 lordes crosse/ The thyrde that he sette
 his seete on the see stronde while þ see
 was flowynge. And comaunded and
 charged that the see sholde not come
 vpon his londe. and that the see shold

 Thenne the kynge sterte awaye & sa-
 yd/ Alle men shall wyte and knowe/ þ
 the power & myghte of kynges. is va-
 yn & vanytee/ And that none is wor-
 thy to haue the name of kynge but he
 that hath all thynge subget to his la-
 wes/ And this kynge Canut^e neuer ba-
 re crowne vpon his hede after that ty-
 me/ But he sette the crowne vpon the
 crucifix heede at Wynchester/ Whanne
 Canutus was deed. thenne was ma-
 de grete stryfe at Drenford who shol-
 de be kinge and his succellour/ for Le-
 ofryens Consul of Chester & other lo-
 rdes of the northside of Temse. & the
 Londoners also toke Harolde harefo-
 te that was holden the sone of Canu-
 tus & Elgyna of Hampton. and ma-
 de hym kynge. though Goodwyn ma-
 de hym bely for Canutus/ Maria-
 nus / Some men layen that this har-
 rolde was a Souters sone/ And fallv
 anone as he was borne. brought to þ
 bedde of this Elgina. and leyed by her.



 sayled to Malcolyn kynge of Scotlō
 de/ ¶ R. But some men woll meane
 that this Edgar saw that the thinges

And toke al the moneye in to his owne tresour. ¶ W. de ponti. li. i.º / Some therafter in the Vtas of Ester was made a counseple at Wynchester by assent of the secōde pope alysaūder there were two Cardynales present / In that counseple Stygandus tharchbishop was degraded for thre skilles fyrste by cause he had holden wrongfully the bysshopyrche of Wynchester & tharchbishoprche of Launterbury whyle Robert tharchbishop was a lyue / And vled the pall þ was there left without leue of the court of Rome / for he had receyued the pall of pope Benet. that was acursed of the chyrche of Rome / And though Stygand⁹ soughte belily frendshyp of the kyng the kyng excused himself sweetly. as he well cowde by the popes cōmaudemēt And cast Stygandus in to bondes at Wynchester to his lyues ende / And paye hym euery dape a lityll what of entheses to lyue by / Stygand⁹ was kyn dely soo harde that he wolde take rizt nought of his owne. and swore by all halowen that he had not a peny but that othe was preued vntreue by a litill kepe that henge abowte his necke whan he was dede / for by that kepe was founde grete ryches in many places vnder erthe / Also in that counseple were sett downe many bysshops & abbots. namely by procurynge of kyng Wyllyam. for he wold brynge in Normans in their stede / Some men trow that he dyde soo for he wolde be þ more spker of the kyngdom / Also in that counseple saynt Wulstan bysshopp of Worcester axed belily some possessions

of his bysshopyrche þ were wythholde by Aldredus archebysshop of porke. & fallen in to the kynges hondes after Aldredus dethe / But for the chyrche of porke was dombe that tyme. for þ see was voyde. It was demed that þ cause sholde be itill and not ptouched at that tyme / Hereafter at Windlor in a Wytsondape kyng Wyllyam paye the arche bysshopyrche of Porke vnto Thomas chanon of Baiocens ¶ W. de pon. li. i.º / Hereafter the kyng had Lanfrank abbot of Cadomenence oute of Normady / This Lanfrank was of the nacyon of ytalpe. & was moost cunningg of holy wrytte: & of synguler lecture. and moost redy in gouernyng of thynge / In our lady dape the Alsumpcyon the kinge made hym arche bysshop of Launterbury ¶ R. Of his thewes & of his noble dedes. it is wryten Inncemore. aboute his dethe tyme ¶ W. de pon li. i.º / Thomas that was cholen archebysshop of porke. came to this Lanfrank for to be sacred as the blage wolde / Lanfrank axed of hym an othe & his profession wrytte of his obedyence / Thomas answerde & sayde. that he wold neuer doo that. but if he herde therfore auctoryte wryten. oþther skylfull reasons & byddynge. by the whiche it were knowe that he sholde soo doo wythoute ony preiudye of his chyrche / He sayd soo more for lewdenes of wytte than of rebelnes & pryde of herte. As he that was a new mā and begyled by flaterynge wordes. & knewe not the custome and blages of Englonde / And Lanfrank declared & preued resonably. that his axeng was resonable & rightfull: but yet thomas

 aroos worshypfully apenst hym whā
 he came to Rome. And sayd that he
 dyde not to the archebysshop that wor
 shyp. but to his clergye / Therefore the
 pope axed that. lpyth that he hadd doo.
 What was worshypfull Lanfrank
 sholde doo: what was rightfull that
 is that he sholde falle downe to the fe
 te of saynt Peters vyker / ¶ Whan he
 had doo soo. the pope by cause of hym
 restored his felowes bysshops that ca
 me wyth hym to theyr state croyles &
 rynges that were bifore pryued. as it
 is layd bifore / ¶ Also this Lanfrank
 created and byladde kynge Wyllyam
 conquerour bi an holy craft. not with
 geymchidyng. but somtyme an eruel
 te and somtyme in good myrthe / Kyng
 ge Wyllyam was sterne . and dradde
 noo man. & ruled both temporalte &
 spryctualte at his owne wyll / He to
 ke noo man fro the pope in his londe.
 but he came and pleyed hym. He suf
 fred noo counseyle made in his owne

Lanfrank was soo mylde & soo fayr of speche in herynge of shryfte: that whan the shryfte were doo. he wold kysse their hodes that were shryuey to hym/ And saye thise. haue made me holy this daye/ Also in his tyme the monkes of Caunterbury. as well nyghe all other monkes in Englonde were not vnylike to seculer men. saue that they lefte not theyr chastyte/ But they vled hawkyng and hūtyng. & playenge at dyle. and grete drynkers also/ Soo that thou woldest wene that they were consuls rather than monkes/ for thei had soo many seruantes of soo grete araye / Lanfrank suffred theyr outrage a space of tyme/ But he fered it awaye wyth the staff of couenable sternesse/ The wyle mayster of soules knewe .and wyste well the custome is the seconde from kyn/ de/ And he knewe also that soden chaungynge of manere and thewes greuen thoughtes and wyttes/ Therefore other wyles amonge he put a waye so

me what of suche maner doynge wyth fair speche & softe/ And whette the rude soules to good wyth the whelstone of vertues/ Soo that they forloke the braunches of shrewednelle .and euyll maners of lyuyng. and delyred þ hē de cours of vertues & of thewes by the yr owne good wyll/ Therefore yet thei haue the holy man in mynde & grete deuocyon to god. & fayr speche to ghesstes. and charyte amonge theymselfe/ This Lanfranke lete neuer man go fro hym elenge or: sory/ Vt he sawe o ny man discomforted. he wolde besily axe and wyte the cause. and geue comforte & medycyn/ he wolde freely profer penyes to ponge chyldery/ he orde ned to monkes what theym neded in euery syde / Soo that they sholde not lacke of what that theym neded/ And out of rule they sholde not blenche/ That tyme sprange enuye amonge bysshops that wolde put out monkes of theyr places. and bryng in seculer clerkes/ Auctour of that dooyng was Walkelynus bysshop of Wynchester/ a gode man in other dedes. though he were badde in that doynge/ and broughte therto by counseile of bachiters/ Also he had conuerted kynge Wyllyam to the same entent/ but Lanfrank herde therof. & destroyed the castles of þ myghty men. as who distroyeth attercops nestes. soo they þ comen afterwarde sholde not be hardy to begyn þ doynge. ne none other lyke/ He made þ pope Alyland forbode it by his wrytyng/ He restored thabbaye of Rochester fro the number of four clerkes to þ nōber of l. mōkes þ had ynough to lyue bi/ his wyt is knowē þ he trāllated

 was made in the cite Turoy

 warned of god that he sholde assente
 to the eleccyon / In his consecracyon
 were two Legates of the court of Ro
 me/ And though he made professyon
 to Stygandus the archebysshop. he to
 ke his consecracyon & his sacrynge of
 Aldredus the archebysshop of Porke
 But for to auopde chalenges that ni
 yghte falle afterwarde/ Aldredus ma
 de protestacyon that he chalenged no
 right of lubeccyon in Wulstan after
 that tyme. though he had be his mon
 ke bifore that tyme/ Thenne Wulstan

was made byshop. and spared bothe mete and drynke in his halle all thours after mete. as thylage was of Englyshe men/ He wolde lytte by hem & frote his palmes. and feyne to drynke as his tyme came. and comforted him that wolde drynke/ But he dyde that more for vslage of the countrepe. than for ony lphynge that he had therein/ And he lefte not of the boost of þe Normans. but he had knyghtes aboute hē where he wolde goo/ He sayd his masse euery day. and the lawter also. and memoryes & mynde of famous sayntes departed a seuen by the seuen houres of the dape/ As ofte as he was at Wyrceter he wolde synge the hye masse. And sayd that he wolde not leue þe offyce for to resygne the byshopryche he wolde be at Collacion of monkes & made the generall confellyon wyth ocher. and yauē the benelou. & goo in to his chamber/ Whan he rode on his horse he wolde saye his lawter. & benelou that Englyshe men maken on þe cuppe. he spared it not at hynge's bourde/ Vp nede droof hym to plede in ony maner tyme. he wold bydde cristes curse to al euyll arbytcours & moyens. but to all the good he wolde bydde cristes blessing/ He vled fuzres of symple price. and rought bul lyppl of what manner skynnes/ But he vled more skynnes of labe than of other bestes. And yf one had counseyled hym somtyme that he sholde vsl skynnes of Cattes/ he answered in his game and sayd. ned alwaye. and bpleued lyghtly tale
tellers. And also Robert spent in his
knyghtes souldyours thre thousande
pounde that was byqueth Henry in his
faders testament. Thene Henry was
made kynge moost by the helpe of hen
ry erle of Warwick. that was bifor his
meyneall. He made holy chirche free
But he helde the forestes in his owne
honde. He helde Edwardes lawe with
the attendynge therof he gaue the gre

uous pencyons. He put out of his cour
te the meny that vled wymmens ma
ner. and restore d agayne in his courte
candyll lyght. by nyghte that was les
te of in his faders tyme. And closed
Ranulph byshop of Durham in the
tour of London. And reconcyled An
celm archebyshop of Caunterbury þ̄
was so exyled. He chastid the fals me
sures of marchauntes. and brought fo
urth the length of his owne arme. He
wolde fyghte more gladly wyth coun
seyle than wyth swerde. He wolde ete
to stauche his hunger and not for glo
tenye. He wolde neuer drynke but he
were a thurst. In hymself and in his
meyny alway he hated outrage of me
te and of drynke. After grete stryfe þ̄
was bytwene hym and Ancelm thar
chebyshop. he relygned to god and to
saint Peter the Inuestytur. of prela
tes that was done by leculer honde.
At laste was made a counseyle of bil
shops at London. And trompets were
put awaye. and remeued. And he wed
ded Holde the doughter of Malcolig
kynge of Scotlonde. Ancelm crowned
her quene vpon a saint Martyns day
¶ *Willelmus de pon. li iii.* This ye
re deyed Thomas archebyshoppe of
Porke. & Gyralde was archebyshop
after him a lecherous man. a wyche
and an euill dooer as the fame tellith
for vnder his pyle whan he deyed in
the Liber was founde a boke of cury
ous craftes. The boke highte Julius
frumeus. In þ̄ boke he rad priuely in
the vnder tydes. Therefore vneth the
Clerkes of his chirche wolde suffer
hym be burped vnder heuen wythout

After the seconde Innocencius the seconde Celestynus was pope fyue monthes/ After hē Lucius xi. monthes/ The thyrde Eugenius was pope viii. yere and v. mōthes/ This was fyrste saynt Bernar des dylciple. and afterwarde abbot of saynt Anastaly belydes Rome. & came vnrwaare to saynt Lezaryes chyche. and was chosen by the Cardynales/ But for drede of the senatours he was sacred wythout þ cyte/ This signed Lowys kynge of fraunce wyth cros. and made a counseple att Remen in fraunce/ Also to hym saynt bernarde the abbot wrote the bookes de considere Henricus libro nono/ Ranulph Cōfull of Chester came to Walyngforde wyth many knyghtes. and was acorded wyth the kynge/ But lone therafter he was gylfully taken in the parleament at Northampton. and myghte not be delyuerde er he had yolden vp the castell of Lyncoln/ That tyme the Walsymen destroyed þ prouynce of Chester/ But at Wicumalbā they were kylde/ Soone therafter kynge Stephen was crowned at Lyncoln. and loo happed noo kynge byfore/ Also that yere Conradus themperour. Lowys kynge of fraunce. thele of flaunders and many other that had take the Crosse to the holy londe cheled the londe way and not the water waye/ And passed by Hungary/ & were bytrayed by frawde of the emperour of Constantinople/ for many of hem taasted meeles medled wyth lyme and deyed/ And many other were dede by swerde and hunger/ for robbynge & reuyng. and lecherie/ ¶ Giral

dygnities & lordshypps that longed to
the kynge. as though he thoughte ne
uer for to come again/ In a tyme his
frendes that were homely wyth hym
blamed hē therfore/ & he answerd and
sayd. I woll selle London and I myg
hte finde a chapman that myght wel
pape/ Many men bought with the bet
ter wyll/ for they trowed that the kin
ge wolde neuer come ayen/ He had ta
ke power of the pope that he myghte
wythholde the Crosse whom that he
wold/ And therby he gate many thou
sande pounde/ Thenē the kynge as it
semed bytoke rechelesly the gouernyn
ge of the kyngdom to his Chaunceler
bysshop of Ely. and saylled in to Nor
mandy bifore mydwyntertide/ That
tyme atte Dunstaple the sygne of the
Crosse was seyn in heuen/ And soone
therafter the shape of the Crosse was
seyn forsake the baner. and passe som
what of space therfrom/ Telle who
that wol what it myghte meane/ for
I haue lerned to tell this wonder. and
not to descryue what it sholde meane

Thenne the kinges of Englonde and
of fraunce after that they had made
surete bitwene hem tweyne/ they dwel
led at Turoy in fraunce for to abyde
Somert to passe in the waye to the ho
ly londe. not oñly for holy entent. and
for cause of the fayth/ But for desyre
of her owne welthe. and hope of grete
happe & fortune/ But the rightwyl
nelle of god allowyth not suche ma
nere dooynges/ But semely god ordey
neth that outrageous pryde of myshy
leuyd men sholde be allayed in that
manere/ Also wythoute the myscheyf
that Jewes suffred in her body and
catayle at Lyncoln and at Lynne/ pet
at Porke after a long syege and grete
myscheyf and woo. Raby mayster of
Jewes forkytte the veynes of four hū
dred Jewes. and of his owne veynes
also. and his veynes throte/ Also atte
Staunforde Jewes were beten. slay
ne and pylled/ And one Johā mooste
hardy of Crysten men came to North
hampton wyth many grete propes/
There the hostler slewe hym pryuelly
by nyghte for couetyse of money that
he had broughte/ And threwe the bo
dy by nyght wythout the cyte. and fle
dde awaye as a theyf sholde / Thenē
olde wyues mette. and there were seyn
wonder falle syghtes of falle tokens
And the melchaunt men bare on hou
de. that it was for the holinesse of that
man/ That they heelde a very mater
And also worshypped the Sepulcre
of the dede man wyth solempne wat
ches. and grete gyftes/ But wyle men
lough therein to scorne/ But clerkes of
the places were ryghte well apayed
therwyth / for they hadde prouffyte

therby/ This was tolde the bysshopp.
 And anone he forbode the doopnge
 of symple men vpon payn of curlyng
 & the grete host of couetoⁿ men & her
 fals marter/ In the meane tyme whi
 le kynge Rycharde was absent. Willi
 am bysshop of Ely the kynges Launce
 procuratour of the reame. the popes le
 gate in Englund made for money. he
 heelde lowe the clergye/ And spake by
 the kynges power. and bare doune the
 comyn people. and shewed auctoryte of
 the pope of Rome: and roode wyth a
 thousande horses/ he greuyd abbayes
 with payments and with gyftes. and
 made his allyes the grettest of the lon
 de/ Epyther prymates see he helde low
 ynough at his owne wyll/ for Bald
 wyg the archebysshop of Caunterburi
 deryd att Troys byfore the comynge
 of the kinge fro the holy londe. and y
 kynges broder Gessroy electe of Por
 ke/ he had lett x. yere that he was not
 sacred/ And also Gessroy landed att
 Douer. and he toke from hym his ca
 table & drewe hym out of saynt Mar
 tyns abbaye. and put hym in the kyn
 ges towre/ And made a counseylle att
 Westmester. as the kynges procurato
 ur & the popes legate/ There his facto
 ur Hugh Nouaunt bysshop of Chester
 put forth a playnt that the mokes of
 Couentre had shed his blood right by
 fore the hye awter/ Therefore Wylly
 am bysshop of Ely demed that mon
 kes sholde be put awaye from Couen
 tre. & that clerkesholde be broughte
 thyder that lyue by prouendes/ By oc
 casion herof this Hugh y was gylfull
 of wytte. shamles & hardy in euill de
 des. cunnyng in lecture. & fayr speche

And had alway made debate & stryfe Anno grē
 bytwene y pryour & the couent of Co
 uentre. Now wyth strength of men of Richardi
 armes he put out y monkes. as passyn primi
 ge euill doers. and gyltpe of Hughes
 trespaas/ And sent anone to the cour
 of Rome mē of answer ful enformed
 wyth letters of bysshops. wytnessynge
 y the monkes had forsake Cristes chi
 ualrye. and were falle to worldly likē
 ge/ Therefore he prayed y pope of free
 ordenaunce of that abbay/ The pope
 abode vi. monthes wyth the sentence/
 for to abyde yf ony man wolde come
 and speke for the monkes/ But defa
 wte of spences lette the monkes. & ma
 de that the bysshop had all hys wyll
 The mokes came vneith at last whan
 they hadd longe wepte the wronge of
 her vyolent out puttyng. But the bys
 shops myght & power had y maystry
 by money & slepyght/ And many yeres
 the mokes were disperpled/ And what
 they had was ordeyned to prouendes
 of clerkes. and they lyued poorly. and
 gate theyr lyuelode as they myghte/
 Therefore whan y bysshop Hugh was
 seke at Becco in Normandy on a go
 od frydaye. and myght noo man fyn
 de that wolde sette hym penaunce: as

thens to Douer. There this William
dradde leest he sholde not freely passe

was theñe in Scicilia / Also þ bysshop
of Bath was choce archebysshop. but
he was lone deed. & yet Wyllyam bys-
shop of Ely purchaced a well stronge
maūdement of Celestynus þ pope. &
had the same auctoryte & power that
he had rather / As it were for amende-
mente of the kyngdome of Englonde
And for to wythstonde Johan that

wolde take fro his broder the kyngdome whyle he was absent/But in alle this he was bigyled. for he conspyred and was assentynge to John. other for pestes: other for fayre byhestes/And yett all for nought. for though he shewed att Douer the grete warraunt of his Legacpe/yet the quene Elyanor & the archebills of Rothomage and of Porke. and many other compellyd hym for to saylle agayn/Thenne after that they had abyde spryngyng tyme at Turon. the kynges of fraunce and of Englonde went. the one by water and the other by londe. and came to Scycilya/There the kyng of fraunce lete passe þ trelpaas of his men unpunysshed. and was named a lambe / But the kyng of Englonde lete noo trelpaas unpunysshed/Therefore he was named a lyon/Also kyng Rycharde fought wyth Gryffons in Calabrya. and in Scycilya. and had the maystrye/He made a castell of tree to be ladde abowte. and he rered that castell agaynst the cytee of Messay. and called that castell Mategryffons. with that castell afterwarde he toke the cytee of Acres/ Also there his moder brought hym a fayre mayde of speche & of shape. Berengaria that was þ hēges doughter of Nauern/ And kyng Rycharde wedded her to wyf/Thenne the kyng of fraunce went fourth in to Syria. and the kyng of Englonde abode somewhat after that he was gone/But in that abydyng he was not pole/But he sent forth vytayles. and made engynes/ Thenne he went out of Scycilya & came in to Cypres. and bythoughte hym þ two of the kynges

I haue done þ I shold doo hereafter. I shall doo that me neddyth myn owne lorde takyth me not. but for of myne/ Therefore I shall goo to hym that is more redy to yeue than to take/ Thenne he came to king Richarde & was riche ynough/ Also kyng Richarde fauoured Guy kyng of Iherusalem agaynst Conradus Marthys hēge of tirus þ the hēge of fraunce fauored on þ other side. but they cam to þ syege

re in the losse see/ But he sayled wyth a stronge wynde toward the countree of hystorya wyth fewe men. and was dryuen tyll that he came bytwene Aquila & Venise/ And there he houed & blent hyder and thyder/ And hydde hym somwhat ofte time. and meyn made grete purueaunce of vitayle for hym And soo he was aspyed . and take of the dukes men of Austriche/ Whanne that was knowe the kynge of fraunce made John kynge Rycharde's brother to come lyghtly apenst kynge Rycharde/ And exyted also the emperour of Almayn apenst kynge Rycharde Thenne the emperour made couenaunt with the duke of Austryche for to haue the thyrd part of the profite and wyynyng that came of kynge Rycharde. Seculer Chanons in stede of men of more perfyte lyfe/ for somtyme holp prynces and byllhops in Englonde wolde not haue to many of luche maner clerkes/ And yeuue hem choys whether they wold leue theyr benefyce other change theyr lyfe. and goo in to religyon ¶ Treuila/ It semyth that Baldwyn was well auyfled that Cryste was heede of hooly chyrche. and his apostles highe byllhops/ And none of hem al was neuer monke nother frere / And soo it myghte seme þ he knewe wel that other clerkes were more perfyte than euer was monke othet frere / But for it is layd that the clerkes had choys whether thei wolde leue theyr benefyce or goo in to religyon/ Of that choys it myghte seme grete wonder / for it semyth theby that they shold leue theyr benefyce. how it euer were/ for if they yede in to religyon they shold leue theyr benefyce. and yf they yede not in to Relygion they muste leue the benefyce by rule of religyon/ Othet they speke othetwyle of religyon than all men in comyn speche woll meanc/ And so it semyth more wonder of that wonder than of his meanyng/ But men wolde wonder that Baldwyn þ was a monke wold not flater wyth monkes. but helde othet clerkes more holy than monkes/ lyth he knewe the degree of eche othet ¶ Thenne it folowith in the story after the woo & tene þ kyng Richard had in prision in Almaig a yere & thre mo

uen Procuratour of Angeo þ
had wisely born him in the se

come agayn / Other yf he came agayn
it shold be vnech / Therefore he began
rabyllhly to passe his warrault in ab
sence of the kynge / Thenne one that

was homely wyth hym counseiled hē
to axe of an Nygramancer : whether
kynge Rycharde sholde come agayne
or noo / The Nygramancer ladd Ste
uen in to a pryue place. & shewed him
a brasly heede . In the whiche was a
sppryte closed / Axe of this what þ wol
te layd the Nygramancer . but fewe &
shortly / for he answered not to grete
Janglyng / Shall I cuer see kynge Ry
chard layd Steuen. Nape layd the spi
ryte. how longe shall myn offyce du
re layd Steuen / To thi luyes ende la
yd the sppryte / Where shall I deye la
yd Steuen. In Pluma layd the spiry
te / Theñe myght he axe nomore . but
he wente from his prophete. and for/
bad his men. and badde theym þ they
sholde bryng noo fetters nyghe hym
in noo maner wyle / And that by cau
se þ a fether is pluma in latyn / Ther
after he began to werke the more bol
dly. and greuyd his subgettes full lere
And namly a noble man that fled so
me tyme in to his owne castell. by cau
se that Steuen pursued hym / This
man aspied whan Steuen was reche
les in the spege. and toke hym & alle
to hacked hym / That castell was cal
led Pluma / And soo the cautell of the
gylefull sppryte was knowen / And so
it fell of Gerebertus the fals pope as
it is layde before Ranulphus / And
soo it befell of one Albericus Eile of
Northumberlonde. that was a mygh
ty man wyth all : and helde hym not
apayed wyth his owne state / But he
counseiled with a fende. that tolde hē
that he sholde haue Grece. That is
Grece / Therefore he went afterwarde
& came in to Grece / Whan the Grece

kes herde telle that he sholde regne o-
uer theym. they tooke of hym all that
he had/ and put hym out of theyr lon-
de / But afterwarde somwhat of ye-
res this was weyr of trauepille and of
woo: and came to kynge Henry in to
Normandy/ And had of hym a noble
wydowe to wyfe/ And whan the pre-
est sholde wedde theym/ He axed of þ
woman & sayd/ Dame Grecia halte
thou wyll to this may/ Thenne Albe-
rycus knewe the gyle & the frawde of
the falle spyrite that auered his owne
couetous herte in to veyne hope /

¶ Whan kynge Rycharde had made
redy to paye the duke of Austryche xx
thoulande pounde. that was behynde
of raunson/ The pledges that kynge
Rycharde hadd lefte wyth hym came
sodenly. & tolde that the tyraunt was
ouerturned by wreche of goddis dome
And his londe byfore his dethe was
greuyd wyth many grete myscheues/
For cytees were sodenly brent/ And þ
ryuer Danubius passed the byrnykes /
and dyde grete harme ferre abowte/
Sedes that were lowen fordryed in þ
erthe / Also this duke was acursed of
the pope for takynge of kynge Rychar-
de. and scorned the curlynge/ Also on
a saynt Steuens dape he roode to the
feldes. and hurte soo his foote that it
muste be kytted of/ And he wythout ho-
pe of lyfe sawe that he muste dey. and
in presence of the lordes of his londe.
he prayed to be assolped of the senten-
ce that he was in bounde/ The clergie
answerde and sayd that it myght not
be. but he wolde swere to stonde to ho-

wronge that he had done to kynge Ry-

charde/ The duke sworc. and delyuer
de kynge Rychardes pledges anone af-

For a man of Lenomannia wente to
saynt James for grete deuocōn. and
came home agayne sauf and sounde/

waye. vpon caas alone: He sawe one
wyth a dredfull face. and was aferde
full sore. and blessed hymself well fast
wyth the sygne of the Crosse in euery
syde/ Thenne the other as it were dil-
spilynge the sygne of the Crosse sayd
Thou mayst not defende the in that
manere. but thou shalt be myne/ And
yf thou wolt falle downe to the grou-
de and worshyp me. I shall make the
ryche/ Now answerde the man. It les-
myth that thou art contrary. and of þ
other syde. take thou thyne owne. cryl-
tes owne pest is ynouz for me. I wor-
shyp hym alone/ Woll thou or not an-
swerde he: thou must haue somwhat
of myne/ And threwe anone vpon the
mañes heede as it were a thynne man-
tell. that brente the herte of his heede. &
made the skynne of his al blacke/ the
man was sore aferde. and cryed to sa-
ynt James/ Saynt James came an-
one. & arouted the fede. and axed what
he was. and wherof he serued/ I am
a fende sayd he. and greue mankynde
I letted the crysten kynges in the Jo-
urneye in the east londes/ I toke kyn-
ge Rycharde prysoner by my seruant
the duke of Austryche/ After that kē-
ge Rycharde was delyuerd. I bifet hē

Abowte that tyme were two/ that founded as it were to do the kynges profite all by one entent. but by dyuers causes of doynge for the abbot Cadonencis warned þ kyng of the frawde of his offpcers/ Therefore he wolde that theyr outrage shold be chastid. that men of the countrees myght lyue in peen/ But Wyllyam wyth the longe berde warned þ kyng of the outrage of ryche men þ spared their owne rychelle. and pylled poore mey/ Thenne this abbot had a warraunt. & came to London in þ moneth of februar. and made some to come byfere hym/ the offpcers of the countrees and of prouinces to yelde full accounts/ But deche him lette soo that he sawe not Ester daye/ Men layen that this Wyllyam was born at London/ and had his surname of his lon-

ge berd that he vled/ and was named Wyllyam wyth the longe berde. he vled that longe berde. by cause that he wolde seme the more worthy. and lesmely in speche. & gaderynge of many men/ he was sharpe of wytte & somwhat lettred. and ouer melure a grete speker. and by a manere kyndly rab/bilshnes of wytte & of thewes/ he wolde gete him a grete name. and cast hē to doo newe dedes. and began to here grete doynge & dedes/ Also his wretched & shamefully dedes agaynst hys owne broder was lpgne and token of his wodnesse in his other dedes/ for he aculed his owne broder. of treyson to the kynge/ for he paat him noo more large spence of solace and colte than he was wont/ His broder was a burgeys of London. and had founde him to scole/ he was scorned of þ prēce for that dede/ And yet bi fauour of some men he had place amonge þ grete of London/ Also amonge the peple he blamed venymously the prpue dedes & outrage of ryche men. that mylferde wyth poore mey. and soo he excpcted hugeli the meene men to loue and desyre freedom out of melure/ Soo þ he drewe many to hē as though they were biwptched right with witchcraft/ for there he had tendaūt to his heltes v. C. M. and two thousand men of London. as it were to þ comyn purpor of all/ Whan he had so many fauours. as he that wolde stonde for þ poore peple. and for the kynges profite/ he wolde in euery gaderynge and counseple withstonde gentylmen. and saye that by her frawde the kynge losse many grete enchetes/ They grut

ched against hym therefore. and he say
led to the kynge/ And tolde hym that
ryche men dyde hym grete wronge by
caule he was true to him/ Thenne he
came a peny and began to werke wyth
frawde as he was wonte more belily
and more trustly. And comforted hys
fautours. as it were bi fauour of þ hē

cy sprange out/ And Hubert archebyl:
shop of Caunterbury. that had the ru
le of the reame herde therof and sent
for the peple. and reherced how it was

that is false & prowde/ I shall depar Richardi
te good men from euyl men. as lyght primi
from derkenesse/ Thenne by counlepl
le of lordes this Hubert sent for Wyl
lyam. for he sholde stonde and answere
that men sholde put agaynst hym/
he came at that tyme as he was som
ned/ But he had somoche peple abou
te hym. that he that had sent for hym
was aferde. and the lofter in his doin
ge. and put of the dome for that tyme
Afterward oportunyte was aspied by
two burgeis of London. whan he mig
hte be founde alone wythout peple a
bowte hym/ And men of armes were
sent for to take hym/ But Wyllyam
wyth his axe slew one of þ burgeys þ
hadde aspyed hym/ Anone Wyllyam
wyth fewe of his men. and wyth hys
concubyne. that wolde neuer from hē
wente in to a chyrche that was there
faste by/ That is saynt Mary chyrche
at Bowe / There he wolde not defē

hoped in dayn that his peple wold co
me and delyuer him/ The peple was
sory for the peryll that he was in. and
is noo wōder/ But by caule of þ pled
ges that they had geuen hym. and for
drede of the knyghtes that they sawe
armed. they came not to his delyuera
unce/ Thenne Wyllyam was boden
come oute. but he wolde not/ Thenne
he was compelled by fyre & smoke to
come oute maugre his teeth/ Whanne
he came out. the burgeys sone that he
had slayne forkytte his wombe wyth
a knyfe / But by dome of the courte

wen wyth horses. and thenne he was
hanged wyth ix. felowes that wolde
neuer leue hym / But fautours defa-
med the archebysshop as a manleer /

cy / And for to preue that they that dā-
pned Wyllyam were wicked men and
euill doers / By craft and by frawde
and gyle they founded to make Wyl-
lyam to haue the name & worshyp of
a martyr / Also men sayen that a pre-
est of Wyllyams kynne layed the chey-
ne that Wyllyam was wyth bounde
vnto a mañes hedde that was leke of
the feuers and preched openly that the
man was hole anone / Right this sprā-
ge out amonge the peple. And the pe-
ple came pryuely by nyghte. and toke
awaye his gybet. and pared awaye ly-
tyll & lypyll the cith that was be bled
wyth his blood / And made a grete dy-
che. and kepte the erthe as it were holi-
relykes to hele wyth leke wen / Name
and tydynges herof sprange well wy-
de. and grete company bothe of slye
men and of fooles came to the place /
and woke there by nyghte / Allwaye ca-
me thyder grete multytude of lewde
men and of fooles / And almoche wor-

all this. and layde that it was falsely
feyned / Also the vanytee of this tale
fell downe loone. and dured but awhi-
le. and alayd the stryfe / for lothnelle
is stedfaste and is stronger in longe ti-
me / But fallnelle fayned vanysshed
away in shorte tyme / Thenne Hubert
the archebysshop ruler of the treame
curled that preest. and lette men of ar-
mes to kepe that place . by cause men
sholde not come thyder a pilgrymage
And soo the sleighte that was soo fey-
ned fell awaye in shorte tyme. & thopi-
nyon of the peple began for to rekte /

preest in Gallia came to kyn-

unterbury. of Deuelin. and of Ragne & xiii. byllhops. & two kynges. of Englonde & of Scotlonde þ was soo comen theyd for to swere fewte vpon the Crolle of Hubert archebillhop. and for to doo homage to kynge Johñ/ That dape a woman had her lyghte þ had be vii. yere blynde/ And a purse keuer in kitting of purses was lame in his hōndes. tyll that he was deliuered by prayenge of the cleigye of the peple/ This Hugh was of the nacōn of bypōnde the see/ he was made Priour of the chartrous at Wychem belyde Salisbury. and thenne he was made byllshop of Lyncoln/ Whan he was stalled att Lyncoln by the Archedeaken. men axed an horse other a cowe for his stallynge/ And he sayd he were leuer forsake the byllshopryche than yeue ony manere thynges for suche a doynge/ Wilde foules wolde fetche mete at his hōnde/ This yere Eustace abbot of flaye came in to Englonde for to preche goddis worde. and dyde many myracles/ Amonge the other myracles he blessed the well of Wybilydes Caunterbury/ And seke men that drāke therof hadd theyr heele/ for a woman þ had a fēde wythyn her dranke therof & caste vp two blacke toodes. þ torned anone in to hōūdes. & thenne in to grete asses. and flewe vp in to thapere. and lette fowle fooures after theym/ This Eustace by his prechyng made many men leue vsey & cheyng & fayres on þ sonday he made þ light shold breñe alway in chyrches befor goddis body & þ lordes at bord shold haue almes disthes. At last some prelates had enuy to Eustace. & sayd þ hast no leue to let thy

Lauēdres and occupped a grete part of Spayne / Therefore Innocencius the pope sente messagers to dyuers nacyns for helpe and locoure of the holy londēs / for the Sarralyns had buylded strēgthes in the hylle mōūt Tabor for to were agaynst Acres / Also this yere saynt fraūceps began thorder of frere Henous bysides Ayle / The kyng of fraunce wyth a grete hooft occupied þe Clyues of Normandy agaynst kynge Johā / The popes legate Pandulphus came in to Englonde. and spake to kynge Johan. And charged hyghly that he sholde be buron and obedient to the chyche of Rome / The kyng sawe peryll in euery syde by the kyng of fraunce : and also by lordes of his owne londes. that had by wrytyng to urned hemself to the kyng of fraunce. Thēne the kyng oblegid al his hēgedom of Englonde & Jylond also for hym & his heyres to pope Innocencius & his lawfull successours for euer : soo þ after that tyme he & his heyres shold be feodaryes to þe chyche of Rome. & pay euery yere vii. hundred marke for Englonde : & ii. hūndred for Jylōde / So þ pf he or ony of his heyres fa

yled of this condycōn. other of þe payment. he sholde fall of the ryght of þe kyngdom / Herafter Pandulphus wente forth. & compellid the kyng of fraunce to goo out of Normandy / Steuē tharchebysshop : and they that were exyled wyth hym came in to Englonde and assoppled the kyng & his fautoures in the chyche of Wynchester / But he made hem swere that they shold restore all that was wrongfully taken / Aboute þe tyme kynge Johā caused to hange & drawe an holy man þe hyght Piers of Pontfret. for he had warned hym of many mylhappes þe hym sholde fall for his cruelnelle & for his fornycacōn / Also for he had warned hē that he shold regne but xiiii. yere. and he regned almost xviii. yeres / But he knewe not in þe doynge that he regned freely but xiiii. yere / But he regned iii. not freely for the whiche thre yere he was trybutary to the pope / Crist aperyd twyes to this Piers at Porke & ones at Pontfret / & taughte hē many thynges þe he tolde afterwarde to byshops. and peple that were of euill lyf / Also in a tyme he lay thre dayes and thre nyghtes as he were in swownynge. and was rauyslyd : and sawe the Joyes and paynes of good men and of euill / On saynt Andrewes euen kynge Johā toke the castel of Rochelster. There many gentylmen were conspired agaynst hym / Also Lowys þe was þe kynges broder of fraūce came in to Englonde at prayer of the lordes and had homage and fewte of frenshe men and Englyshe men. and of the kyng of Scotlonde att London / But the Popes Legate Gnalo

was thenne in Englonde. and cursyd
 Lowys and his fautours / Nethelle
 Lowys toke Wynchester. and byleged
 Douer & Wyndelore / Pope Inno-
 cencius deyd. and the thyrde honou-
 us was pope after him x. yere and viii
 monthes / By his fyrste yere he confer-
 med the order of frere Prechers / for
 thyrde Innocencius was lothe to con-
 ferme that order / Kinge Johñ deyd
 att Newerke of the fluxe on saynt
 Calyxtes day the pope. the seuententh
 yere of his kynngdom in the syxt mon-
 the / But he was bowelde in thabbay
 of white Chanons at Croghton and
 buryed at Wyrceter in the myddyll of
 the quere of monkes R. But the co-

The same yere at the Natiuyte of our lady the hēge of Englonde eldest lone Edward sayled in to Galcoyn wyth many mē of armers and Archers to recouer and wynne the londes of the ducherpe of Guyan that the kyng of fraunce had longe tyme wrongfully wythholde. There Edwarde dwelled alle a yere wythout ony rees of enmyes/ But in the meane tyme he toke and bete downe and spoylled and brente myghty ciities that were rebell agaynst hym. as Narboy. Carcalon and ocher/ But in the ende of the yere of his comynge/ ¶ xxi. day of the moneth of Septembre whyle the duke of Lancastre byleged y cyte Breuens in Brytany/ Edwarde passed by the brynkes of the ruer Layer. that is of the ducherpe of Guyan/ There came the kyng of fraunce wyth a grete hooft & foughte wyth hym/ But the kynges men of fraunce were slayne and chaced/ And y kyng of fraunce was take and brought to Burdeux in Galcoyne/ And there he was tyll Wytsonyde/ This yere a bowte Wytsonyde. the forsayd Edwarde saylled oute of Galcoyn in to Englonde wyth Johū kyng of frenchemen/ And anone y pope sent two cardynales in to Englonde for to treate of pees bytwene the two kynges/ The cardynales dwelled in Englonde

This yere abowte saynt Dunstons feest Edwarde kynge of Englonde toke trewes wyth the kyng of fraunce. in hope of pees / And came wyth his hooft agayne in to Englonde / But he losse many menes horses and charpottes belydes Parys. the eygh tenth dape after Ester by a storme of weder that fell there that tyme / **A**bowte Lammasse nexte thereafter. Armacan and the ordie of beggers of the strife that was bytwene theym ceased by heestes of the pope / **A**lso the same tyme the prynce of Wales. the duke of Lancastre. and many other lordes of Englonde. and the kynge of fraunce wente to Calapes to refourme the pees bytwene Englonde & fraunce / There the pees was refourmed and assured wyth suretee of othe on eyther side / And the kinges of Englonde and of fraunce wente home agayne to theyr owne kyngdoms abowte Myghelmasse / **A**nd soone thereafter were messagers sente to Avinion to the pope to conferme the pees & the couenauntes on eyther syde /

In the yere a thoulaude thre hundred foure score and fourtene were trewes take bytwene the kynge of fraunce and the kynge of Englonde for foure yere. ¶ Also the same yere abowte Crystemasse kynge Rycharde wente fyrste in to Jrlonde. ¶ After Wenzelaus. Rupertus alias Robertus was emperour nyne yere. ¶ This Robertus duke of Bapier and counte Palatyn on the Ryn a Juste and true man and a chatholpk he was crowned of the nynthe Boniface the pope. ¶ He entred in to Italye wyth a grete armye agaynste duke Salpax / But he returned wyth grete losse. ¶ Abowte this tyme was that curled herelye of Johñ Wyclif. in Englonde. and Johñ Hus in Bohemye. and Jherom of Praghe / whyche herelye infected moche people. ¶ And vnder the habyte of a Lambe hydynge wolupthe crueltee had purposed to subuerte alle the state of the chyryche. And the sklauderous Scylme whyche was in this euill tyme was a grete helpe & locour to theym. ¶ Also this tyme the herelye Adami tarum beganne to growe in Bohemye. 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to the duke of Brytayne/Wherof beganne moche trouble and sorowe/ whyche dured vnto his dethe/ ¶ In the twentysst yere kyng Rycharde did holde a grete feest att Westmestre Att whyche feest argued the Souldyours that hadd kepte Breste/ And late att dyner in the halle/ And after dyner the duke of Glocestre sayd to the kyng/ ¶ Syre haue ye not seen those felowes that late att dyner in your halle/ And the kyng demaunded who they were/ And he sayde . Thysle ben your folke that haue serued you . and ben come from Breste. prayed fore nyghte & dape / For euer
whan they of Syon reste They of the
Chartrous done their seruyce / And in
lyke wyse whan they of the Chartro-
us reste. the other goon too / And by
ryngyng of the belles of epyther place
eche knowyth whan they ende there
seruyce. whyche ben nobly endowed. &
done daply there grete almelle dedes /
As in the Chartrous certayne chyl-
ben founde to scole. and at Syon cer-

regned Harry his sone a chyl-
de. and not fully one yere olde
Whoos regne began the fyrst dape of
Septembre. the yere of our lord a tho-
usande foure hūdred and two & twen-
ty / This kyng beyng in his cradyl
was moche doubted and drad. by cau-
se of the grete conqueste of his fader /
and also the wysdom & gudyng of
his vnclis. the duke of Bedforde and

in Perche bytwene the duke of Bed-
 forde Regente of fraunce. and the du-

 lylbury Mountague. the lord Talbot
 and al the power that they cowde ma-
 ke in Normandy. the ganylons kept
 And also many capytayns wpth mo-

Pycardes/ & Burgoynyons. whyche were of our party. bifo- re the towne of Compyne. the thre & twentyest daye of Maye. the sayd Pucell was take in the felde armyd lyke a man. & many other capytayns with her/ And al brought to Roan. and there she was putte in pryson/ And there she was Juge by the lawe to be brente/ And thenne she sayde that she was wyth chyld. wherby she was respited a whyle/ But in conclusyon it was founde that she was not wyth chyld. Where was take bi thadups of bothe partpes an abstynence of warre for certayn tyme in the name of the duchesse and not of the duke / By cause he hadd goon from hys othe and lyegaunce that he had made to kynge Harry / Therefore the kynge neuer wolde wyte ne appoynte ne haue to doo wpyth hym after / but alle in the Duchesse name / ¶ Also this yere quene Jane deyed. the seconde day of Juny. whiche hadd ben kynge Harry the fourthis wyffe / And was carryed from Bermondeley vnto Caunterbury. where she lieth buryed bi kynge Harry the fourth her hulbond / This yere deyed al the Lyons in the toure of London / The whyche had not be seen many yeres byfore out of mynde /

¶ This yere one Dwayn a squire of Wales. a man of lowe byrthe / whych had many a daye tofore secretly wedded quene Katheryne / And hadd by her thre sones and a daughter / Whych the Dwayn was take and commaunded to Newgate to pryson . by my lorde of Gloucestre protectour of the Reame / And this yere he brake pryson by the meane of a preest : that was his Chapelayne . And after he was take agayn by the lorde Bermonde. and brought agayne to Newgate /

fowle hurte ¶ In the xviii. yere syre
Rycharde Beauchamp the good eile

In this yere Dame Elyanore Cobham duchesse of Gloucestre was arested for certain poyntes of treyson layd apenst her. wher vpon she was examyned in saynt Steuens chapel at Westmestre byfore the archebysshop of Caüterbury / And there she was enioyned to open penaunce. for to goo thorugh Chepe. berynge a tapre in her honde / And after to perpetuell pryson in the yle of Man. vnd the kepyng of lyre Thomas Standleye / Also that same tyme was arested mayster Thomas Southwell. a Chanon of Westmestre. Mayster John Hun a chapelain of the sayd ladies. mayster Rogier Bolynbroke a clerke vlyngye Nygromancye. & one Margery Jurdemayn callyd the whytche / of the Eye helyde Westmestre / Theyse were arested as for beyng of counseyle wyth the sayd duchesse of Gloucestre / And as for mayster Thomas Southwell he deyed in the towre. the nyght byfore he shold haue be reynd on the morn / for soo he layd hymself that he sholde deye in his bedde & not by Justyce / And in the yere twenty mayster John Hun and mayster Rogier Bolynbroke were broughte to the Gynodhall in London / And there byfore the Mayre. the lordes & cheyff Justyce of Englonde were reynd & dampned to be drawe hanged & quartered. But mayster John Hun had his chartre & was pardoned by þe kēg. but mayster roger was drawe to Tibury

where he confessed þe he yede gyltelles Anno grē & neuer had trespassed in that he deyed fore / Not wythstandyng he was hā Henry ged heeded & quartered / On whoos sexti loule god haue mercy / And Margerye Jurdemayn was brente in Smythfelde / Also this yere the lorde Talbot had laped spege to Dyepe. but þe Dolphyn rescowed it. and wan the bastile that Englyshe meny had made / Also this yere was a grete fraye in flestretre by nightes tyme bitwene meny of court & meny of London. And dyuerse meny slayne & some hurte / And one Herbotell was chye cause of the mylgobernauuce & effraye / Also this yere at the chelyng of the Mayre of London. the compyns namid Robert Clopton and Rawlyn Holonde Tayler. & the Aldermen. toke Robert Clopton / and brought hym at the ryght honde of the Mayre. as the custome is / And theñe certayne Taylours & hond crafty meny cried naye. naye. not this man but Rawlyn Holond / Wherefor þe mayre that was Padyssley sent tho that so cried to Newgate where they abode a grete while & were punysshed / In this yere were diuers ambassatours sent in to Gypay for a maryage for the kynge. for therles doughter of Armpnak. whiche was cōcluded. but by þe meane of therle of Suffolke it was let & put a part / And after this þe sayd erle of Suffolke went ouer see in to frauce. & ther trected þe mariage bitwene þe kynge of Englonde & Margarete þe kynges doughter of Secyle & Jherlm. & the next yere it was cōcluded fully þe maryage By whiche maryage the kynge shold delpyuer to her fad þe duchye of Angeo

And the erldome of Mayne/ Whyche was the heye of Normandy/ Thenne departed therle of Suffolke wyth his wyfe and dyuers lordes and knyghtes in the moost ryall astate that myght be out of Englonde. wyth newe chaires and palfreyes. whyche went thurh Chepe / And soo went ouer the see. & receyued her / And syth broughte her in the Lente after to Hampton/ Where she lounded. and was ryalli receyued ¶ And on Candelmasse euen byfore by a grete tempeste of thondre and lyghtnyngge att after none: Poules steple was sett on fire on the myddes of the shafte in the tymbre. whyche was quenched by force of labour/ And speccally by labour of the morowe masse prest of the Bowe in Chepe. whyche was thoughte impossyble. sauf oonly the grace of god/ ¶ This yere was the erle of Stafforde made and create duke of Bokingham/ The erle of Warwyck duke of Warwyck. The erle of Dorsete marquys of Dorsete. and the erle of Suffolke was made marquys of Suffolke /

In this yere kynge Harry maryed atte Southweke quene Margarete/ And she came to London the eyghtene daye of Maye / And by the waye all the lordes of Englonde receyued her worshyppfully in dyuersle places/ And in especyal the duke of Gloucetre/ And on Blackhech the Mayre. Aldermen. and all the craftes in blew gownes. browdred wyth the deuple of his crafte. that they my

ight be knowe / Mette wyth her wyth Reed hodes/ And broughte her to London / Where were dyuersle pagentes and countenaunces of dyuersle hystryes shewed in dyuersle places of the cytee ryally and costlewe/ ¶ And the thyrtyest daye of Maye. the layd queene was crowned att Westmestre. And there were Justes thre dayes durynge. wythig the Sayntuarpe tofore the abbaye/ ¶ This yere the Pryour of Exylmayne appellyd therle of Drmonde of treyson/ Whyche hadd a daye assigned to them for to fyghte in Smithfelde. And the listes were made and the felde dreslyd ¶ But whanne it came to popnt. the kynge commaunded that they sholde not fyghte/ But toke the querelles in to his owne honde / ¶ And this was done atte the Instauce and labour of certayne Prechours and doctoris of London/ As mayster Gylberte Worthington perlon of saynt Andrewes in Holborn. and othez ¶ Allo this yere came a grete Ambalate in to Englonde oute of fraunce for to haue concluded a perpetuel pees/ But in conclusyoun it tourned into a trewes of a yere/ ¶ Abowte this tyme deyed saynt Bernardyn . a grape frere / Whiche began the newe reformation of that ordre in many places In soo moche that they that were reformyd ben callyd Obseruauntes / Whiche Obseruauntes ben encreaced gretly in Ytalye & in Almayn. Thys Bernardyn was canonysed by pope Nicholas the fyfthe. In the yere of oure lord a thousande. CCC. l. Johanes de Capelstrano was his dyscyppe / whyche profyted moche to the refor

mayson of that ordre. Of whom shewed many myracles also.

Here is to be noted that from this tyme forward kyng Henry neuer professed, ne wente forward. But fortune beganne too forne from hym on all sydes. As well in Fraunce, Normandy, Guyan, as in Engelande. Some men holde opynyon that kyng Henry gaue commissyon pruely too syre Edwarde Hull, syre Roberte roos the done of saynte Seueyns, and othier to conclude a maryage for him with the erle of Armysake's syster. Whiche was promysed as it was sayde and concluded, but afterwarde it was broke, by meane of the Marquis of Suffolke. And he wedded quene Margarete as afore is sayde. Whiche was a dere maryage for the reame of Englonde. For it is knowe verely that for to haue her, was deliuerde the duchye of Anjou and y^e erle dome of Mayne, whiche was y^e key of Normandy for the Frenchmen to entree. And about this the sayde Marquis of Suffolke used in playne parliament a fyfteenth and an half for to sethe her out of Fraunce. ¶ Also what a maryage was this as to the comparyson of that othier maryage of Armysake. For there sholde haue be deliuerde so many castles and townes in Guyan, and someche good sholde haue be gyue with her, that all Englonde sholde haue be thereby enryched. But contrary wise fel, wherfore every grete prynee oughte to kepe his promysse. For by cause of brekyng of his promysse, & for maryage of quene Margarete, what losse hath had the reame of Englonde by saynge of Nor-

mandye and Guyan. By dysunyon Anno gre^e in the reame. The rebellynge of the comyns agaynst her prynee and lordes. What dysunyon amonge the lordes. What murthre and sleynge of them. What seeldes soughte and orde. In conclusyon that many a man hath loste his lyfe. The kyng deposed the quene with her some sayme to flee in to scotlande. And from thens in to Fraunce. And so to Loreyne, the place that she came fyrste fro.

¶ Many men deeme that the brekyng of the kynges fyrste promysse to the syster of the erle of Armysake was cause of this grete losse and aduersite.

In the fyue and twenty yere of kyng Henry was a parliament at Bury, callid saynt Edmundes Bury. Aboute whiche was commaunded all the comyns of the countree too be there in theyr moost defensable araye, for to wayte upon the kyng. To whiche parliament came the duke of Gloucestre Hunfreye the kynges uncle. Whiche had be protectour of Englonde all the none aeye of the kyng. ¶ And anon after he was in his lodgyng he was arested by the Viscounte Beaumonde Constable of Englonde whom accompanyed y^e Duke of Bohynghum, and many othier lordes. And forth with all his seruantes were comanded for to departe from hym. And two and thyrty of y^e cheif of them were also arested, and sente to dyuers prysons. ¶ And fyue or syxe dayes after this forsayde areste

Anno grē Henrici sexti the sayd duke was deed. ¶ On whos soule god haue mercy. But howe he deyed, and in what maner, the certayne to me is not knowen. Some sayde he deyed for sorowe. Some sayde he was murdered bytwene .ij. kethers beddes. Other sayde that an hote spytte was put in his foundement. But how he deyed god knoweth, to whom no flayinge is hidde. And thenne when he was so deed, he was layed upon y. all men myghte see hym. And soo both the lordes and knyghtes of the shires with brigaynes came & sawe hym lye deed. But wounde ne token coude they not perceyue how he deyed. ¶ Here may men marke what this worlde is.

This duke was a noble man and a grete clerke, and had worshippfully ruled this reame to y. kynges behouf. And neuer coude be founde fauour with hym. But enuye of them that were gouernours, and hadde promysed to deliuer the duchye of Guyne and the erldome of Meyne, caused the destruction of this noble man. For they braddled hym that he woulde haue enpossiyded that deliuerance. After that they sente his body to saynte Albans with certayne lightes for to be carryed. And soo Syze Geruays of elynton hadde thonney charge to conuey the corps. And soo it was buryed at saynt Albans in y. abbaye. And fyue persons of his howe hote were sente to London. And there were requed and Iuged to be drawe hanged and quartered. of whom the names were Syze Rogger Chamberlayne knyghte. And Myddelton & Squyer, Herbarde a Squyer, Feltham a Squyer, and Wycheard Medham. Whiche fyue persons

were drawen from the Towre of London thorough to hiepe into Tyburne and there hanged, and lete doone quyse, and thenne stypte for to haue been hieced and quartered. And then the Marquis of Suffelke shewed there for them the kynges pardon vnder his grete seale. And soo they were pardoned of the remembrance of the execution and had theye lyues. And so they were broughte agayne to London, and after speclij deliuered. ¶ Thus began the trouble in Englonde for the death of this noble duke. All thea myns of the reame began for too murmur, and were not content.

¶ After that pope Eugeny was deed. Nicholus y. yste was electe pope. This Nicholus was electe for Eugeny yet hauinge the seysme. Not withstandinge he gate the obedyence of all crysten reames. For after he was electe and sacred pope. Certayne lordes of Fraunce of Englonde were sent into Sauoy to pope Felix for to entreate hym to cease of the papacye. And by the spequall laboure of the bishop of Norwiche and the lorde of saynt Johns he ceased the seconde yere after that Nicholus was sacred. And the sayd Felix was made legate of Fraunce and Cardynall of Sauoye. And renoued the holy papacye to Nicholus, and after lyued an holy tyte. And deyed an holy man. ¶ And as it is sayde god shewed myracles for him. ¶ This was the thre and twentieth seysme, bytwene Eugeny and Felix. And duryd sytten yeres. The cause was this. The general counseyle of Basyle depowred lunge which was onely pope, and

Indubitate, for as moche as he obserued not and kepte the decree and statutes of the counseyll of Bourstaunce as it is sayd. Wherfor he oughte not too gyue obedyence to that generall counseyll. Wherof rose a grete alteracyon amonge wyrters of this mater pro & contra whiche cannot acorde vnto this daye. One partye sayth that the counseyll is above y. pope, that other partye sayth naye. But the pope is above the counseyll. God be blessyd above all thynges gyue and sende his pees in holy church spouse of Cryste. ¶ This Nicholas was of Jene come of lowe byrthe, a doctour of dyuynite, an able man. He rededged many places that were broke and ruynous. And dyde do a grete wall about y. palays. And made the wall newe aboute Rome, for drede of the Turkes. And the people wonderd of the resyng and resygned of Felix to hym considered that he was a man of lowe byrth. And that other was of assyntyte to all the most prynces. Wherof there was a vers published in Rome in this manner. ¶ Lux fulsit mundo cauit felix nicolao.

XXV.

In y. yere of kyngge Henry xx & vij beyngre betwix Fraunce & Englonde, a knyghte of the Englyshe partye named syr Françoys Trauagnoyr toke a towne of Normandy named Fogyers, agaynst

the trewes. Of whiche takynge beganne moche sorowe and losse. For this was the occasyon, by whiche the Frenchmen gate all Normandy. ¶ This yere a squyer of Englonde namyd Chalons dyde armes with a knyghte of Fraunce, named syr Lo wys de Bayel tofore y. frenshe kyngge. And ranne the frenshe knyghte thorough with a spere. And slewe him in the felde. ¶ In the eyghte & twenty yere was a parlemēt holdē at westminster. And from thence diourned to the blacke Treces in London. And after Crystmasse to westminster agayne. ¶ And this same yere Robert of Care a man of the west countree w. a fewe shippes toke an hole flete of shippes comynge out of the Roye lorde with salte. whiche shippes were of Bruys. Flaunders. Holonde & Zelende, & vroughte them to Hampton. Wherfore the marchauntes of Englonde beyngre in Flaunders were arrested in Bruys, Inre, & other places. And myghte not be delyuedre theyr dettes discharged tyll they had made a payment for to paye for the amendes and huctes of those shippes, whiche was payed by marchauntes of the staple every peny. And in lyke wyse the marchauntes and goodes beyngre in Danshe were also arrested, & made grete amendes. ¶ This same yere y. frenshe men in a mornynge toke by a brygge y. towne of Tount all arche, and therein y. lorde Faconbrydge was take prisoner. And after that in Decembre Roan was take and loste beyngre therein y. duke of Somerset. Edmundē erle of Shrewsbury, which by apoyntment leste pledges, and lost all Normandy, & came home. And durynge

Sexti.* Annoque the sayde parlement y^e. Duke of Suffolke was arrested and sent in to the towre, and there was a moneth. And after the kyng dyd setle hym oute. For whiche cause all y^e. comyns of Ingelonde were in a grete Mourz. What for the deliqueraunce of Inge and Mayn, and after for losynge of al Normandy. And in especiall for the dethe of the good duke of Gloucestre. In somoch that in some places mengaded togeders, and made them capytaynes as blowe berde and other, whiche were resysted and take, and hadde Justyce & deyed. And then the sayde parlement was adicournd to Loyectie. And thyder y^e. kyng broughte with hym the duke of Suffolke. And when the comynthe understode that he was oute of the towre and come thyder. They desired to haue execution on them that were cause of the deliqueraunce of Normandy, and hadde be cause of the dethe of the Duke of Gloucestre. And had sold Gascoyne and Guyen of whiche they named to be gylty y^e. duke of Suffolke as chyef, the lorde Saye, the bishopp of Salisbury, Daryell, and many mo. And so to please the comyns y^e. duke of Suffolke was exyled out of Englonde fyue yere. And soo durynge the parlement he wente in to Norfolke, and there to ke shippynge for to goo oute of the reame into Fraunce. And this yere as he sayled on the see a shyppe of warre called the Nicholas of towre met with his shyppe, & fortoke hym thereon, whom they toke oute and broughte hym into theyr shyppe before the mayster and capytaynes. And there he was examyned, and at last Jaged to the dethe. And so they putte

hym in a cabon, and his chape layne for to stryue hym. & that done they brought hym in to Praver gode and there sette hym in to the bothe, & ther smote of his heed, and broughte the body a longe upon the sondes & sette the heed therby. And this was done the fyrste daye of Maye. And what awayleth hym now y^e. deliqueraunce of Normandy. And here ye maye se how he was rewarded for y^e. dethe of the duke of Gloucestre. Thus began sorowe vpon sorowe, & dethe vpon dethe.

This yere of our lorde castowan cle fou hūdred & ffthty was the grete grace of y^e. Jubyle at Rome, where was grete pardon. In so moche that from all places of Cristendomme grete multitude of people resorted togeders. ¶ This yere syr Thomas cyfel was overhirowe at Femyngny and many Englyshe men slayne & take prysors. This same yere was a grete assemblynge & gadryng togeders of y^e. comyns of Kent in grete nombre. And made an Insurreccyon & rebelled against y^e. kyng & his lewes. And ordeyned them a capytaynie called John Gade an Irishie mā which named hymself Morhymez conyn to y^e. duke of Yorke. & this capytayn heide there men togeders, & made ordeuantes amenge them. And broughte the to Blackesheth where he made a booke of petycyons too the kyng and his counseyle. And shewed what Injuries & oppressyons the poore comyns

suffred. And all vnder colour for to come to his aboue. And he hadde a grete multitude of people. And the seuenteth daye of Juny the kynge with many lordes, capitaynes, and men of warre wente towarde hym to the blackheeth. And whan the capitayn of Kent understode the comynge of the kynge with so grete a puyssance. He withdrewe hym with his people to Seuenok a litle village. And the XXVij daye of Juny beyng withdrawe and gone, the kynge came with his armye sethem ordre and embataylled to the Blackheeth. And by advys of his counseill sent syr Wylfrem Stafforde knyght, and Wylfrem Stafferde squyre, two valyant captaynes with certayn people, to fighte with the capitayn and to take hym and bringe hym and his accessaries to the kynge. whiche went to Seuenok. And there the capitayn with his felowshipp mette with them and fought agaynst them. And in conclusyon slew them bolthe and as many as abode, and wode not yelde them nor flee. Duringe these scarmuches fell grete varyaunce amonge the lordes men and comyn people beyng on Blackheeth agaynst their lordes and capitaynes, sayeing plainly that they wold goe to the capitayne of Kent to assyste and helpe hym. But yf they myghte have executyon on the traitours beyng aboute the kynge. wherto the kynge coulde naye. And they conspawntly that the lorde say Treasorer of Englonde, the bishopp of Salysbury, the abbot of Ely, and many moore were traitours and worthy to be deed. Wherefore, for to pleyse y. lor-

des meyne, and also some of the kynge. Amonge how. The lorde saye was arrested and sente to the Towre of San-Henrici clou, and thence the kynge herynge sexti. byclunges of the death and overthrowing of y. Staffordes withdrewe hym to London, and from thence to kylling worth. For the kynge nelle lordes durst not truste their owne household meyne. Thence after that the captayne had hadde this victorye vpon the Staffordes. Thence he toke syr Wylfremes Salade and his briggentynes smythen full of gyfte nayles, and also his gyfte spores. And arayed hym lyke a lorde and a capitayne, and resorted with all his meyne and also mo than he had before to the Blackheeth agayn. To whom came the archebysshoppe of Gaunterbery and the duke of Bedyngham to the Blackheeth, and spake with hym. And as it is sayde they fonde hym wythe in his talkyng and his requestes. And so they departed. And the thyrde daye of Julye he came and entred in to London with all his people. And there dyde make cryes in the kynges name and his that no man shoulde robbe ne take no mannes good but yf he payed for it. And came rydying through the cite in grete pryde. And smote his swerde vpon London stene in Canaryshe strate. And he beyng in the cite sente to y. Towre for to haue the lorde saye. And so they sette hym, and brought hym to the quylsthal byfore the Mayre and aldermen where he was examined and he sayde he wold and ought to be Jued by his peeres. And the comyns of Kent toke hym by force for the Mayre and officers that kepte hym, and took hym to a

myght be halfe shryue, they brought
hym to the standard in Chere. And
Henrici
sexth. there smote of his hede. ¶ On
whos soule god haue mercy. Amen.
And thus deyed the lord Saye Tre-
soror of Engelande. After this they
set his hede on a spear, and bare it
about in the cyte. And the same
daye at Myle ende Crommer was
byheded. And the same daye before
at after none, the capytayne with a
cortayne of hys meyne went to Phi-
lippe Malpas hous, and robbid hym
and toke away moche good. And
fro thens he wente too Saynt Mar-
garete Fatyns to one Ghestis hous
and robbid hym also. At whiche ro-
bbynge a quere men of London of
theyr neighbours were at it & toke
parte with them. For this robbing
the peoples hertes fell from hym.
And euery thyrsty man was aserde
for to be serued in lyke wyse. For
there was many a man in London
that awaityed, and woulde sayne ha-
ue seen a comyn robbery whiche god
forbede. For it is to suppose yf he had
not robbid, he myghte haue gone
ferre er he had be withstondē. For
the kynge and all the lordes of the
reame were departed, excepte the
lordes Seales that kepte the Towre.
And the vijth daye of June he dyde
doo smyte of a markes hede in
Southwarke. And the nyghte af-
ter the Mayre of London the Al-
dermen and the Comyns of the cyte
concluded to deyeue awaie the capy-
tayne and his host. And sente to
lord Seales to the Towre, and to
Mathewe Gogh a capytayne of Nor-
mandy, that they woulde that nyghte
as wyll the capytayne with them

hente. And so they dyde, and came
to London bydge in Southwerke
er the capytayne had any knowlege
therof. And they foughte with them
that kepte the bydge. And the Hen-
ly. the men wente to harnoy, and
came to the bydge, and shotte and
foughte with them. And gate the
bydge and made them of London
to flee, and slewe many of them.
And this endured all the nyghte
to and fro, tyll IX of the clocke on
the morne. And at laste they brente
the drawes bydge. Where many of
them of London were drowned. In
whiche nyghte Sutton an alderma
was slayne. Roger Hesaunt, and
Mathawe Gogh, and many other.
And after this the Chawnceler of
Engelonde sente to the capytayne
a pardon generall fro hym, and a
nother for all his meyne. And then
they departed from Southwerke
euery man home too his hous. And
whan they were all departed and
goone. There were proclamacyons
made in Kent, Southsex and in other
places that what man cowde take
the capytayne guycke or dede shoulde
haue a thousande marke. And after
this one Aysaunders Idon a squire
of Kent, toke hym in a gardyne in
Southsex. And in the takynge the
capytayne Iohan Gade was slayne
and after byheded, and his hede set
on London Bydge. And anon
after thenne the kynge came in too
Kent and dyde his justyces sytte
at Gaunterbury. And enquire who
were accessaryes and cheyfe cause
of this Insurreccyon. And there
were viij men Iuged to destynone
daye and in other places mo. And fro
thens q. kynge wente into Southsex

and in to the west countree. were a listell before was slayne the bysshop of Salisburie. And this same yere were so many judged to dethe, y^e three and twenty heades stode on London brudge at ones.

XXVII

In the yere xxx. the duke of yorke came out of the marche of Wales with y^e erle of Deuonshyre & the lord Cobham with grete iudgement for reformation of certayne Inuaises and wronges. And also to fraue iustice on certayn lordys beinge about y^e kynge. And toke a felde on Bzenethie besyde Delfolde in Kent, whiche was a stronge felde. For whiche cause the kyng with cill the lordes of the londe went vnto y^e Blackheth with a grete multytude of people armed and ordeyned for the warre in the best wyse. And whan they had mustered on the Blackheth, certayn lordes were sente too hym for too heate and make apoyntment with hym. whiche were the bysshop of Ely and the Dyllion of Baynethestre & the erles of Salisburie and of Warwiche. And they concluded that y^e duke of Somerset should be had to warde, and to answer to such artycles as the duke of yorke sholde put too hym. And thenne the duke of yorke sholde breke his felde, and come too the kynge whiche was cill promysed by the kynge. And so the kynge commaunded that the duke of Somerset

te sholde be hadde in warde. And when Anno 1398 the duke of yorke brake up his felde & came to the kynge, & whan he was come, contrary to the promyse afore made, y^e Duke of Somerset was present in the felde avoasyng & chynge about the kynge. And made the duke of yorke ryde to fore as a prissoner thorough London. And they wold haue put hym in holde. But a mayor a-roo that Erle of Marche his sone, was comyng with x thousand me to London warde. Wherof the kyng and his counsaile serged, and thenne concluded that the duke of yorke sholde departe at his wyl. ¶ About this tyme beganne grete dyuysion in France betwene the grete ^{mayor} and y^e knyghtes of the duke ordre whiche were lordes of that countree. For the comyns and barons rebelled agaynst the lordes. And made secrete warre that at laste they called the kyng of Fole to be theyr lorde. whiche came & was receyued, and layed syege to the castell of Maryenburgh whiche was the cheff castell and strengthe of all the londe, and warne it. And drove oute the mayster of Dewshie and all other pierees of that londe, and so they that ben lordes many yeres, loste al theyr seignoury & possessions in those londes. ¶ In the yere of our lorde a thousande foure hundred and thre and fyfty the cyte of Constantinople, y^e emperour all cyte of Grece was take by the Turke the emperour slayne, and Innumerable crysten people destroyed and put in captiuytee. By whiche pryse crysten sagth perysshed in Grece, and the Turke grethly enhaunced in pryde. ¶ And the yere of our lord a thousande foure hundred and

thre and fifty, on Saint Edwardes daye the queene Margarete was deliuered of a fayre pryncesse. To whiche was named Edwarde. ¶ That same daye Johan Norman was chosen for to be mayre of London. And the daye that he shoulde take his othe at Westmynster he went thyder by water with all the craftes. Where aforhyme, the mayre, iudges, and all the craftes rode on horsbacke, whiche was neuer used after. For yssthat tyme, they haue euer goon by water in barges. ¶ We haue well vnderstande tofore howe that contrary to the promyse of the kynge, and also the conclusyons taken bytwene y^e kynge and the duke of Yorke at Brighthelmsh. The duke of Somerset went not towarde, but abode aboute the kynge, and had grete rule, and was made captayne of Galays. And ruled the kynge and the Reame, as he wolde. Toherfore the grete lordes of the reame, and also the comyns were not pleased. For whiche cause the duke of Yorke, the eyles of Salisbury and of Warwycke, with many knyghtes and squyres and moche people came for to remeue the sayde duke of Somerset and other fro the kynge. And the kynge hering of theyr comynge thoughte by his counseyle for to haue goon westwarde, and not for to meet with them. And herd with hym the duke of Somerset, the duke of Bokingham y^e erle of Stafford, y^e erle of Northumberland, the lord Clifford and many other. And what tyme the duke of Yorke and his felowshyp vnderstode that the kynge was departed with those sayde lordes from London. ¶ None he chaunged his

way, and costed the countre and came too Saint Albons the thre and twentiest daye of Maye, and there mette with the kynge. To whom the kynge sente certayne lordes, and desired them to kepe the pees, and departe. But in conclusyon whyle they treated on that one syde, the erle of Warwycke with the Marche men and other entred the towne on that other syde. And foughte agaynst the kynge and his partee. And so began the batayle and fighthinge, whiche enduryed a good whyle. But in conclusyon the duke of Yorke obtayned and hadde the victory of that journey. In whiche was slayne the duke of Somerset, the erle of Northumberland, the lord Clifford, and many knyghtes and squyres. And many moore hurt. And on the morne after they broughte the kynge in grete estate to London whiche was lodged in the bysshops palays of London. And anon after was a grete parlement. In whiche parlement y^e duke of Yorke was made protector of Englonde. And the erle of Warwycke captayne of Galays, and the erle of Salisbury chaunceler of Englonde. And all such persones as hadde the rule tofore aboute the kynge were sette a parte and myghte not rule as they dyde tofore. ¶ In this yere deyed pope Nicholus the sixth. And after hym was balipt the thyrde. This balipt was a catalane and an elde man whan he was chose, and contynuelly seke. Wherfore he myghte not perforce his zeale and desyre that he had agaynst the Turkes conceyued. And the cause of lethynge therof was his age and synnesse. This balipt Institued &

ordained the feſt of the Tranſfiguration of our lord to be hallowed on ſaynt Sixtus daye in Auguſt by cauſe of the grete victory that they of Hungary had agaynſt the Turkes that ſame daye. He was choſen pope the yere of our lord a thouſande four hundred and ſyue and fifty.

And reigned the yere a thouſande ſoue hundred and eight and fifty, that ſame daye that he ordained the feſt of the Tranſfiguration to be hallowed.

In this yere fell a grete affraye in London in agaynſt the Lombardes. The cauſe began by cauſe a yonge man toke a dagger from a Lombarde and brake it. Wherefore the yonge man on the morn was ſent for to come tofore the Mayre and aldermen. And for the offence he was committed too warde. And thierne the mayre departed from the Guild hall for to goe home to his dyner. But in Chiefe the yonge men greceuſe for the moost party pretended helde the mayre and ſherewes ſtylle in Chiefe, and woulde not ſuffee hym to departe vnto the tyme, that theyſe felowe, whiche was committed to warde were deliuerde. And ſo by force they reſcowed theyſe felowe from pryſon. And that doone the mayre and ſherewes departed, whiche if he had be put to pryſon hadde be in jeopardye of his liſe. And thus began a tumultour in the cite agaynſt y^e Lombardes. And the ſame euenyng y^e hard crafty people of y^e towne aroſe, and ranne to the Lombardes houſes, & deſpoiled and robbed diuerſe of them. Wherfor the mayre and aldermen came with the honeſt people of the towne, and droue them thens. And ſente ſome of them that hadde

ſtolen to Newgate. And the yonge man that was reſcowed by his felowes ſawe this grete tumultour, affraye, ſherewes and robberye enuowed of his fyſte meynyng to the Lombardes, departed, and went too Weſtmenſtre too ſayntuary, or elſe it hadde coſt hym his liſe. For anon after came cloone one Oyer determyne, for to do Juſtice on all them that ſorebelied in the cite agaynſt the Lombardes. On which ſale with the mayre that tyme Wylliam Marſowe, the duke of Bokinghame, and many other lordes for to ſee the execution done. But the comyns of the cite ſecretly made them redy, and dyde arme them redy in theyſe houſes. And were in purpoſe for to haue rung the camyn bell, whiche is namyd Bowe bell. But they were lette by ſadde men, whiche came to y^e knowledge of the Duke of Bokinghame and other lordes. And ſoon tyme they aroſe, for they durſt no longer abyde. For they doubted that the hole cite woulde haue ryſen agaynſt them. But yet neuertheleſſe two or three of y^e cytes were juged too deſſe for this robbery, and were hanged at Tyburn. And anon after the kynge the queene and other lordes rode to Couentree. And withdrew them froo London for theſe cauſes. And a lytell tyme the duke of Yorke was ſent fore too Greenewich, and there was diſcharged of his Protectorſhip. And the cite of Saleyſbury of his Chawcelorſhip. And after this they were ſente fore by pryue ſhall, for to come too Couentree, where they were almoſt deceyued, and the cite of Warwyck alſo and ſholde haue be-

This yere were taken four
grete fishes bwtwene
Desshe & London that
one was calyd mors
marque, the seconde a
Swerde fishe, the other two were
whales. In this yere for certayne
affrayes done in the northe countree
bwtwene the lorde Egremont & the
erle of Salysburyes sones the sayde
lorde Egremont whom they hadde
take was cōdempned in a grete som
me of money to the sayd erle of Sa-
lesburi, and therefore comyced to pry-
son in Newgate in London. Where
whan he hadde to a certayne space
brake pryson and thre prisoners w.
hym and escaped & went his waye.
Also this yere the erle of Warwyce
ke a his wyffe went to Calays with
a sayr jehashipp and toke possession
of his offyce. Abode this tyme
was a grete reformaeyon of many
Monasteries of religyion in dyuers
partyes of the worlde. to whiche were
reformed after y. fyfete Instytucyon
and continued in many places.
Also about this tyme the craft of
Enpryntynge was fyrst founde in
Wargounee in Ffrayne whiche craft
is multiplied thorough the worlde
in many places. And toke be hadde
grete chepe, and in grete nombre by
cause of the same craft. This yere
was a grete batayle in the Marches
bwtwene Hungarye & Turkye, at a
place callyd Sepiegrade, where In
numerable turkes were slayne more
by myracle than by mannes hande.

For onely y. honde of god smote then
saynt Johan of wapestreane was
there present. And prouchyd the lori-
ston people beyng theenne a ferte to
purswee the Turkes. Where an In-
fynyte multytude were slayne & de-
stroyed. The Turkes sayd that a gre-
te multytude of armed men folowd
them, that they were a ferte to torne
agayn. They were holy angels.

This yere the prisoners of New-
gate in London brake thre pryson,
and wente upon the seedes & foughte
agaynst them of the cyte, and kept
the gate a longe whyle. But at last
the towne gate the pryson on them,
and thenne they were put in fetter-
is and yrons and were sore puny-
shyd in ensample of othier. In this
yere also was a grete erth quake in
Waples, in so muche that there peris-
hed XLIII. people that sank therein
to y. erthe. Also in the yere XXXVI.
saynt Rsmonde somtyme byshop of
Salisbury was canonized at Ro-
me by pope Calixt and the XVI day
of juyll he was translated at Sa-
lesbury by the Archebyschop of Baw-
terbury and many other byshoppes.
And in August after yere Thersde,
de Prassy Seneschall of Normandy
with the capytayne of Dyse & ma-
ny other capytaynes & men of war-
re wente to the see with a grete ma-
nye, and came in to the Downes by
nyghte, and on the morn erly byfore
daye, they londe & came to Sand-
wich bothe by londe & water, & to-
ke the towne and ryfled and despoyled
it. And take many prisoners & lefte
y. towne all bare, whiche was a ry-
che place and moche good shew & had
with the many ryche prisoners. In
this yere in many places of Fraunce, al-

mayne, Flaunders, Holonde, and
Zelonde children gathered them by
grote companies for to goo on pyl-
gre mage to saynt Mygheis mount
in Normandy whiche came fro fer-
re countrees, wherof the people mer-
ueyled. And many supposyd that
some wiche spirit mouded them to do
soo. But it endured not longe by cause
of the longe waye, and also for lacke
of wynter as they wente.

¶ In this yere Reynolde Peccoke
bysshop of Chester was founde anie
religye, and the thirde daye of Decē-
ber was aduised at Lambeth in y.
presence of the archebysshop of Can-
terbury & many bysshops and doctours
and lordes temporel; and his booke
brente at Foulis crosse. ¶ He haue
herde before how certayne lordes we-
re slayne at saynt Albons, wherfore
was alwaye a grutchie & wrathie had
by the heyres of them that were soo
slayne agaynst the duke of Yorkes
erles of Warwyck & of Salysbury.
Wherfore the kynge by the aduys of
his counseyle sent for them to Lon-
don. To whiche place y. duke of York
came the xxvi. daye of January with
four hundred men. And lodged at
Baynards castell in his owne place.
And the xv. daye of January came
the erle of Salysbury with fyue hun-
dred men. And was lodged in Ther-
ber in his owne place. And thence
came the dukes of Exetere and Somers-
sete with viii. hundred men, and lay
without Temple barre. And the erle
of Northumber lorde, the lorde
Igremonde and the lorde Blifforde
with xv. hundred men, and lodged
without y. towne. And the mayrey.
hyme Gesspauye Boloyne kepte grote
watche with the cornys of the cytie

And rode about the cyte by Holborn Anno grē
and Fleetestrete with a. v. thousand. Henrici
men well armed and arrayed for he-
re the peas. And the xiiii. daye of fe-
ruer the erle of Warwyck came fro
London fro Calays well bypennand
worshippfully with vi. hundred men
in redde jakettes browded with a
ragged staffe behynde and a fore.
And he was lodged at Graye pcees.
And the seuentent daye of Marchey
kynge came to London & the quene.
And there was a concorde and a pces
made among these lordes and they
were sette in pces. And onoure Lady
daye, the xxv. daye of Marchie, a thou-
sande four hundred and eght and
fifty the kynge, quene and aly. lor-
des wente on processyon at Foulis
in London. And anon after y. kyn-
ge and lordes departed. ¶ In this
yere was a grote affraye in fleeste-
te bytwene men of court & men of y.
same shete. In whiche affraye the
quenes Attorne was slayn.

As this same yere
as the erle of War-
wycke was at con-
seyle at Westmon-
ster all the kynges
houshold meyne ga-
dred them togyder
for to haue slayne the sayd erle. But
by helpe of god and his frendes here
couerde his barge and escaped thye
euyl enterpryse. How wel y. coques
came connyng out with spythes &
pestels agaynst hym. And the same
day he roode towarde Warwycke. And
soone after he gale hym a Comysso
And went ouer see to Calays. Soone

after this the erle of Salysbury came to London was encountered at Chorchefolth with the lorde Audelcy and moche other people ordered for to haue distressyd hym. But he hauyng knowlege that he sholde be mette with, was accompanied with his two sones syre Thomas and syre Iohan theyll, and a grete felishipp of good men, and so they mette and foughte togyder, where the erle of Salysbury wanne the felde, & the lord Audelcy was slayne, & many gentylmen of Chesshyre and moche people hurte. And the erle's two sones were hurte, and getyng home ward after they were take, and had to cheshe by the quenes meyne.

¶ After Calixt, Pius was pope, & was choren this yere a thousande four hundred & fiftty & eyght. And he was called to fore Enecus, and eloquente man, and a poete laureate. He was ambassadour of the emperours afore tyme. And he wrote in the counseyle of Basyle a noble treatise for the auctorite of the same. Also he canonysed saynt Katheryne of Senys. This pope ordeyned grete Indulgence and pardon to them that wold go warre agaynst the Turke. And wrote an epystle too the grete Turke exortyng hym to become crysten. And in the ende he ordeyned a passage agaynst the Turke at Ankone. To which moche people drew oute of al parties of crystendom, of which people he sent many home agayne, by cause they sufferyd not. And amonge after he deyed at the same place of Ankone, the yere of our lorde a thousande four hundred fiftty and foure, the fourtenth daye of Auguste.

¶ In the yere eyght and thurty of kynge Henry the duke of Yorke, the erles of Warwyche and of Salysbury sawe the gouernance of the reume stode most by the quene and her counseyle. And how the grete prynces of the lorde were not called to counseyle but sette a part. And not onely so. But that it was sayde throughe the reume that the said lordes sholde be destroyed utterly, as it openly was showed at Blocheth by them: wold haue slayned the erle of Salysbury. Therfore they for sauacyon of theyr lyues, and also for the comyn wele of the reume thoughte for to remedy thysse thynges, assembled them togyder with moche people, and toke a felde in y. Westcountrie. To which y. erle of Warwyche came from Calais with many of y. old souldiours, as Andrew Proleson and other. In whose wysdomes as for the warre he moche trusted. And whā they were thus assembled and made theyr felde, the kynge sent out his comysyons and pryue seales vnto all the lordes of his reume to come and auayle on hym in theyre most defensible wyse. And so every man came in such wyse that y. kynge was stronger, and had more people than the duke of Yorke & the erles of Warwyche & Salysbury. For it is here to be noted that every lorde in Englonde at this tyme durste not dysobey the quene. For she ruled peasyble all that was doo about the kynge, which was a good symple and innocēt man. And then when the kynge was come to the place where as they were, the duke of Yorke & his felishipp hadde made theyr felde in y. strongest wyse, and had purposed

veryly to haue byaen, and too haue soughte. ¶ But in the nyght Andrewe Trollop and all the olde souldyours of Calays with a gret felishipp redelyrly departed out of the dukes hoost, and wente strait vnto y^e kynnes felde. Where they were receyued Joyously. For they knewe the entente of the other lordes, also the maner of theyr felde. And thenne y^e Duke of Yorke with the other lordes seeinge them so dyscreued, take a counsyle shortly in that nyghte. And departed fro the felde. Leuyng behynne them the most parte of theyr people too kepe the felde tyll on the morne. ¶ Thenne the duke of Yorke with his seconde sone departed thorough wales towarde Irland. Leuyng his eldeste sone the erle of Marche with the erles of Warwyche and of Salysbury, whiche together with thre or foure persons rode strait into Deuenshyre. And there by helpe and ayde of one Quensham a squire, which gate for them a good shyppe, whiche coste enleuen score nobles. And with the same shyppe saylled from thensin to harnesex. And there refreshed thē, and from thennes saylled too Calays. Where they were receyued in to the castell by the posterne er they of the towne knewe of it. And the duke of Yorke take shyppyng in wales. And saylled ouer in to Irland, where he was yghte well receyued.

Thenne kyng Henry be. Anno greunge with his hoost in the felde, not knowynge of this sodaine departure. On the morne founde none in the felde of the sayde lordes. Sente out men in all haste men to folowe and porsewe after to take them. But they mette not with them as god wolde. And thenne the kyng wente Loddow. And dyspoylled the castell and the towne. And sente the ducesse of Yorke wyth her chylderne to the duchesse of Bedenburgham her syster, where she was kepte longe after. And forth with the kyng ordeyned the duke of Somersete capytayne of Calays. ¶ And these other lordes so departed as afore is sayd were proclamyd rebelles and gret traytors. Thenne the duke of Somersete take to hym all those souldyours that departed fro the felde. And made hym redy in all haste to goo to Calays, and take possession of this offyce. And when he came he founde the erle of Warwyche therin as capytayne. And y^e erles of Marche and Salysbury also. And thenne he loded by Seales and wente too Guynes. And there he was receyued. And it fortuneth that some of those shippes that came ouer with hym came in too Calays hauen by theyr free wyll. For the shypmen ought more than fauour to the erle of Warwyche than to the duke of Somersete. In which shippes were take dyuerse men as Jemin Fynklyffe. Johan felowe. Hayles and Purser, whiche were beheded soone after in Calays. and after this daies came mē ouer see to these lodes to Calays & began to were stronger &

stronger, And they borrowed moche good of the Staple. And on that o- ther syde the duke of Somerset be- yunge in Guyens gate people to hym. whiche came oute and scarmuched with them of Calais, and they of Calais with them, whiche endured many dayes. Durynge thus this day- ly scarmuchynge moche people day- ly came ouer vnto these lordes.

Then on a tyme by y^e. aduyse of coun- seyl the lordes at Calais sente ouer mayster Denham with a grette fely- shipp to Sandwyche, whiche toke y^e. towne, and therein the lorde Byuers curd y^e. lord Seales his sone, and to- ke many shippes in the hauen, and broughte them all to Calais of whiche shippes many mariners of theyr free wyll came to Calais to serue y^e. erle of Warwyche. And after this y^e. erle of Warwyche by y^e. aduyse of the lordes toke all his shippes and man- ned them wel, and sayled hymselfe in to Irelande for to speke with the duke of Yorke. And to take his aduy- se how they shoulde entie in too En- gland agayn. And when he hadde be- there, and done his errandes, he re- turned agayn towarde Calais, and broughte with hym his moder the countesse of Salysbury. And comyn- ge in the Westcountree vpon the see the duke of Exetie Admirall of En- glonde beyng in the grace of Dyeu accompanied with many shippes of warre, mette with the erle of War- wyche and his floste, but they fought not. For the substance of the people beyng with the duke of Exetie ought better wyll and more fauour to the erle of Warwyche than to hym. And so they departe and came to Ca- lais in saaftee, blessyd be God. Then

the kynges counseyl seeynge that tho- se lordes had gotte these shippes fro Sandwyche, & take y^e. lorde Byuers. And his sone ordeyned a garnyson at Sandwyche to abyde there y^e. tow- ne. And made one Mountforde capy- tayne of the towne. And that no ma- ne vntowle, ne marchaunte that shoul- de goo in to Fraunces shold not goo to Calais. Thenne they of Calais seeynge this, made out mayster Den- ham & many other to goo to Sand- wyche. And soo they clyde & assailed the towne by water & by lorde & grette it. And broughte Mountforde theyr capytayn ouer see to Rysebank, and there smote of his heede. And yet day- ly men came ouer to them out of alle parties of Englonde.

Ranulph Higden was a Benedictine monk of St. Werburg's Abbey in Chester. The place and date of his birth are unknown; probably he was born in the West of England about 1280. His death, according to a manuscript note found in a copy of his *Universal History*, occurred "in his good old age," in 1363.

In the prologue Higden tells us that he had composed his work at the request of his fellow-monks. Like all the other medieval chronicles, the *Polychronicon* is a history of the world from the Creation to the author's own day. The arrangement, too, is conventional — yet the *Polychronicon* is the work of an Englishman and was written with special regard for the interests of English readers.

The work is divided into seven books. The first book is geographical, comprising a brief description of all the countries of the known world, and a lengthier account of Great Britain. The second relates the history of the world from the beginning to the destruction of the Jewish Temple by Nabuchadnezzar. The third carries on the history to the birth of Jesus; the fourth, to the arrival of the Saxons in England; the fifth, to the invasion of England by the Danes; the sixth, to the Norman conquest; and finally the seventh, to the reign of Edward III. The author thought that by dividing the vast current of history into seven streams, he was laying open a path by which his readers "may go over dryshod."

At the beginning of his work Higden enumerates the authorities — about forty in number — from whom he derived his information. He drew indeed much from unreliable sources; all his chapters are full of absurdities. There is, however, a value in the fact — as the editors of the great, nine-volume edition of the *Polychronicon* (1865-86) point out — that Higden's work enables us to form a fair estimate of the knowledge of history and geo-

What Everybody Wants to Know about Money [9332.A.95] is the work of nine economists from Oxford, planned and edited by G. H. D. Cole. "The world's difficulty today," Mr. Cole writes, "is that it can safely put its trust neither in the traditional methods of banking policy nor in such experiments in monetary manipulation as have actually been made." He gives considerable space to an appraisal of President Roosevelt's attempt to produce a balance by simultaneous action on both the monetary and industrial systems. "The real problem of reflection," Mr. Cole thinks, "is not the making available of additional supplies of money, but the stimulation of consumer's demand; and this can be brought about

Professor Money was introduced to him by his counsel; he, in turn, introduced his colleagues Professor Tugwell and Berle; and, as expert advice was sought in new fields, more and more people were sent for. This is how "the brain trust" emerged, months before Mr. Roosevelt took office. In subsequent chapters Mr. Lindley gives a rapid yet comprehensive sketch of the banking crisis, the abandonment of the gold standard, the investigation of the great banking firms, the London Economic Conference, the working of the N.R.A. and the A.A.A. Another sympathetic study of the President, entitled *Roosevelt and his America* [4227.367], is by Bernard Fay.
