CHRISTIAN SCIENCE MONITOR COMPLIMENTS EDWARD H WESTON, CAMERA ARTIST. Н.

In the little city of Tropico, adjacent to Los Angeles, is the portrait studio of Edward Henry Weston, whose sudden rise to prominence in the world of artistic photography has attracted much attention among those who follow such work closely, says the Christian Science Monitor.

From comparative obscurity, Mr. Weston has, in the course of a year or a little more, reached a point where he may be considered one of the leading pictorialists in his line in America, and his work across the ocean, at the London salon, has been especially noticed.

The London Salon of Photography, held in the galleries of the Royal So-ciety of Painters in Water Colors, is the leading yearly exhibit of pictorial photography. No awards are given, it being considered sufficient honor to have a picture hung. The honor ary secretary of the salon, Bertram artist photographer, when asked by a London magazine his opinion as to which was the best work in the entire exhibition of pices, by 150 photographers, most them noted artists, answered as follows

Which is the best picture in the salon? That is a truly difficult question to answer, but I can tell you which I think is the best group of pictures by the same artist. They are Nos. 98, 107, 153, 169 and 172 by Edward H. Weston of Tropico, California.

'Mr. Weston is evidently a man of fined artistic perception and sense for decoration. I cannot remember having ever seen any of his work before, and it is a very great pleasure to welcome a newcomer whose picures show such a distinctive person-lity. No. 107, 'Toxophilus, a Dectlity. No. 107, 'Toxophilus, a Dec-orative Study,' is truly decorative, an extremely interesting study of a nude archer. There is very little modeling in the tones, which gives one almost the impression of silhouette. No. 98, 'Summer Sunshine,' is a more elabo-rate arrangement, with full modeling. but nevertheless a very narrow range tones-an admirably posed fulllength figure of a laughing girl in a rather dim light of suffused sunshine. No. 153 is an essay of quite a differcharacter-'Child Study in Gray.'
