CHICAGO, April 10.—Senator Hiram Johnson's national headquarters here will not be open tomorrow, although Harold Ickes, manager, said he had heard nothing of any intention on Johnson's part to quit the race for the Republican nomination for the presidency or of any conference in Washington to discuss that possibility. It was said closing of the local headquarters was not due to the results in Tuesday's primaries but had been planned in any event with a view to re-establishing them in some eastern city, perhaps Cleveland. The offices here have been regarded as the principal ones of the Johnson campaign.


