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NEW BILL WOULD SAVE CITY \$10,000

Measure providing for permanent registration to be introduced. A saving of \$10,000 a year by the city could be effected by passage of a bill providing for permanent registration of citizens of cities of the first class, according to F. D. Ash, city clerk.

The bill, which was framed by County Auditor Walter Borgen, has been introduced in the state legislature in the last three sessions. It will probably be introduced at the next session.

Election costs good sign. If the bill was passed it would provide for a card index of all voters and would do away with paying election clerks and judges on registration days. The city will pay the judges and clerks \$6,000.45 on Friday morning for work done on registration days and at the general election. Four registration days were held this year and by passage of this act it would eliminate an expense of about \$10,000 annually.

Another benefit derived from the bill would be simplification of the election laws. The present laws are confusing to the people, Mr. Ash said.

Many people do not register because they do not want to take the trouble and then again they do not know when they should register. This bill would eliminate that trouble.

ASKS STATE TO CONDUCT PROBE

Water Supply Controversy to Be Settled; Council Takes Action.

The state board of health was requested by the council yesterday to act as a tribunal to investigate the charges of Hugh Steele, Duluth contractor, that the intake pipe at the Lakewood pumping station is crushed for 348 feet and that the city water is coming from a point near the shore.

The council, upon the resolution of Commissioner W. G. Phillips, made the request. The resolution asked that the board of health employ a firm at the expense of the water and light department to investigate the charges.

Five-Year Controversy.

The controversy goes back two years, when Mr. Steele, who installed the intake pipe, said that in his estimation the pipe was broken and the water was coming from a trench in the bottom of the lake about fifteen feet from the surface. At that time Capt. Horace Thompson was employed by the city to inspect the pipe. His report declared that the pipe was bent but not broken.

Mr. Steele's charges brought an inspection of the city's water and sewerage system, at the request of the council, by the state board of health. That inspection has been completed and has reported that the water supply is satisfactory from a public health standpoint. It made several recommendations as to the water and light department.

Reverses His Charges.

Mr. Steele, during the last month, has made charges again that the pipe is broken.

If the pipe is broken it will be necessary to install a new pipe, members of the council declare.

An attempt was made to get Mr. Steele and Hugh Thompson together with the city council in an attempt to reach the matter out. At the last minute Capt. Thompson left the city, so that he could not attend the meeting.

City officials were advised that the water supply is good by the report of the state health department, but which says it is not satisfactory to the council.

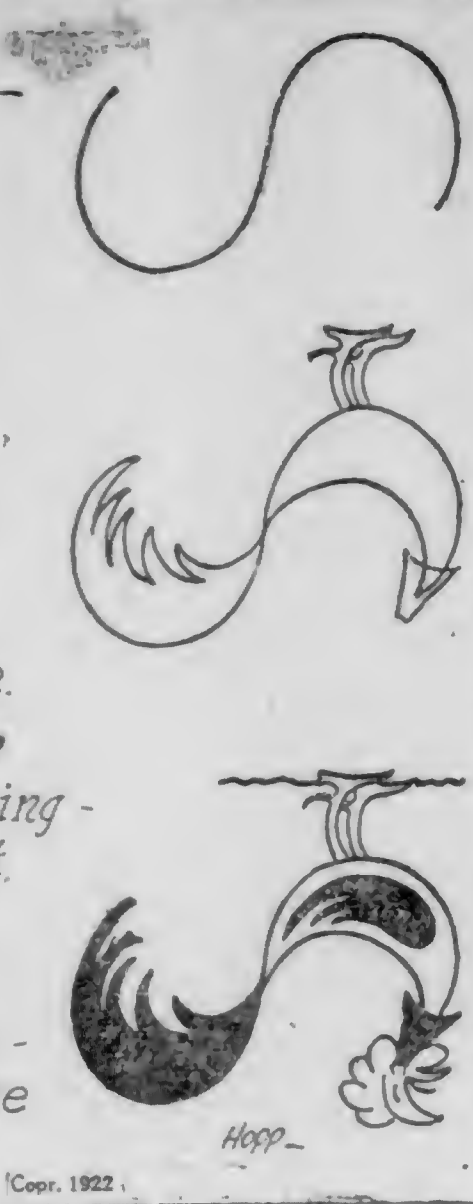

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PROTEST MADE BY NEGRO MUSICIAN

H. T. Burleigh Assails Misuse of Spirituals in Dance Tunes.

New York, Nov. 14.—H. T. Burleigh, the eminent negro musician and composer, has written a letter to the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People in which he urges the co-operation of colored and white people in preserving from debasement in jazz the musical treasure of the negro spiritual.

Mr. Burleigh's letter, as made public by the advancement association, says in part:

"The growing tendency of some of our musicians to utilize the melodies of our spirituals for fox trots, dance numbers and semi-sentimental songs is, I feel, a serious menace to the artistic standing and development of the race.

"These melodies are our prized possession. They were created for a definite purpose and are designed to demonstrate and perpetuate the deepest aesthetic endowment of the race. They are the only legacy of slavery days that we can be proud of, our one priceless contribution to the vast musical product of the United States.

"In them we have a mine of musical wealth that is everlasting. Into their making was poured the application of a race in bondage, whose religion—intensely felt—was their whole hope and comfort, and the only vehicle through which their inner spirits soared free.

"They rank with the great folk music of the world and are among the loveliest of chanted prayers.

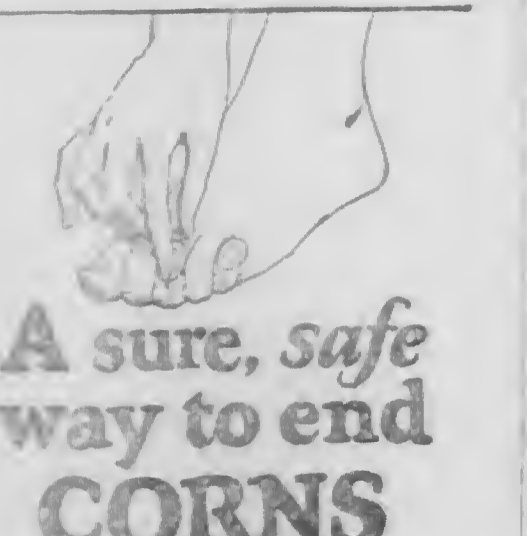

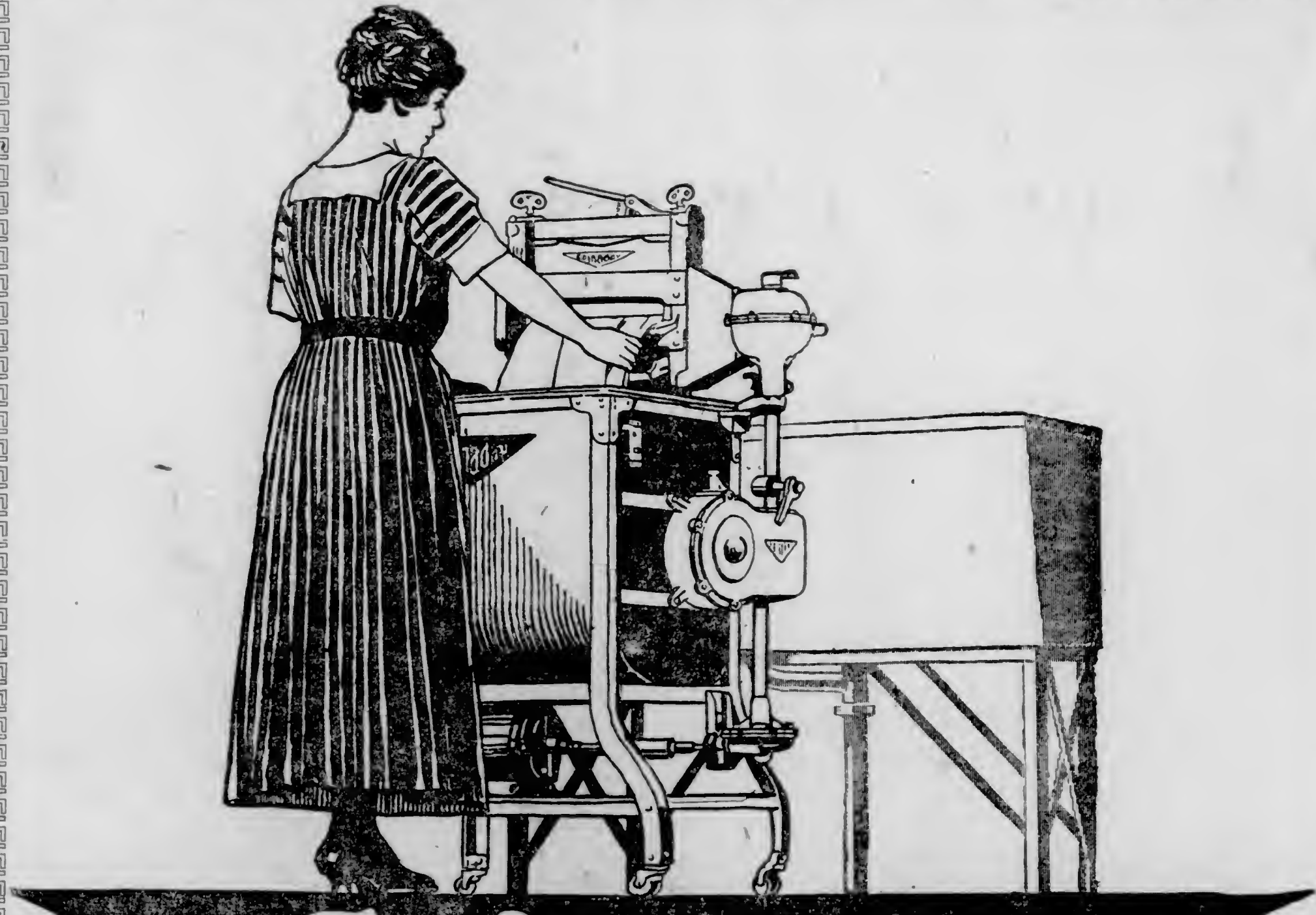

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ROLLER BEARINGS FOR CANAL BRIDGE

Among Routine Matters Contracted for by City Council.

Chief among routine matters for the consideration of the city council yesterday was passage of an ordinance appropriating \$11,000 for installation of roller bearings on the aerial bridge, which will insure permanent service, adoption of a pay roll for election judges amounting to \$5,000.45, the report of Dr. E. W. P. Kelly, health director, on his attendance at the American Public Health association meeting, and appropriation of \$21,250 to pay for Edgemoor park improvements.

The contract for nineteen roller bearings for the aerial bridge was let to the Erie Clearing Machine company of Philadelphia.

Dr. Kelly reported that he was elected a fellow in the American Public Health association and further recommended the following course for the health department: Adoption of new milk ordinance; purification of city milk supply; use of toxins anti-toxin for prevention of diphtheria; sanitary treatment of sewage; building of contagious hospital as soon as possible; establish modern health center with training school in West end and West Duluth, medical school instruction to be placed under jurisdiction of health department; arrangement for more thorough inspection of tenement houses, rooming houses and other housing projects.

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HALTS SASKATCHEWAN LIQUOR EXPORTATION

Ottawa, Nov. 14.—The Keeping of intoxicating liquor in the province of Saskatchewan for export and the exportation of intoxicating liquor from Saskatchewan by persons other than licensed brewers and distillers were forbidden by the Dominion government. The order becomes effective Dec. 15.

In closing export liquor houses, the Dominion government acted on the request expressed in an order in council passed by the Saskatchewan government Oct. 15. Authorization for the order was granted by the Dominion government in an amendment to the Canada temperance act, passed at the 1919 session.

Under Department Charges, New York, Nov. 14.—Hearing of the play of Carl Carlton, theatrical producer, for distribution as an amuseur, was held at the Metropolitan Opera house, New York, Monday.

Carlton, who charges that besides being imitated by the Metropolitan Opera house, he has been charged with forgery in England. The hearing was behind closed doors.

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GREAT BRITAIN WILL PAY U. S. \$50,000,000

Washington, Nov. 14.—Great Britain has advised the United States that \$50,000,000 of interest on her war debt to this country will be paid Nov. 15. It was announced at the treasury Great Britain made a payment of \$50,000,000 of interest on Oct. 15.

In addition to the interest payment on the war debt proper, Great Britain is expected to pay \$610,000 on Nov. 15 as interest on the debt incurred for the sale of silver during the war, which is already partially liquidated, there being about \$61,000,000 yet to be paid on that account.

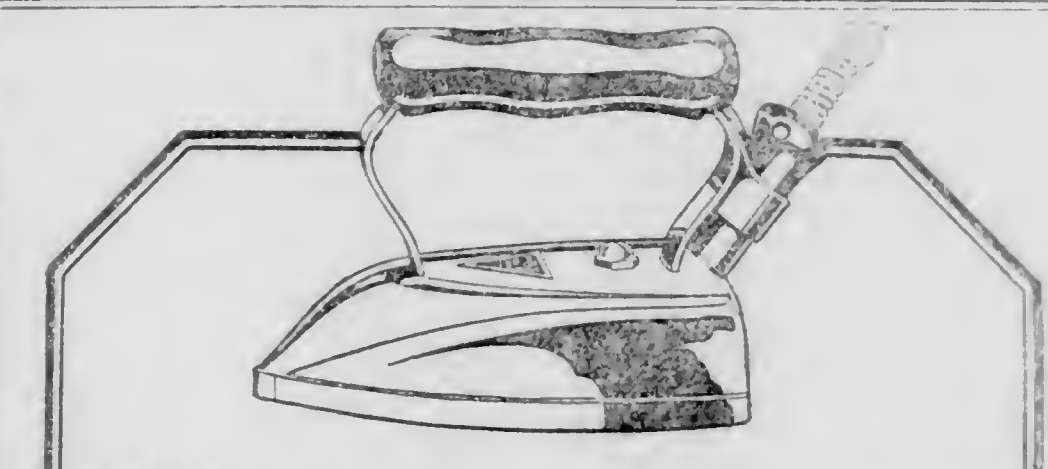

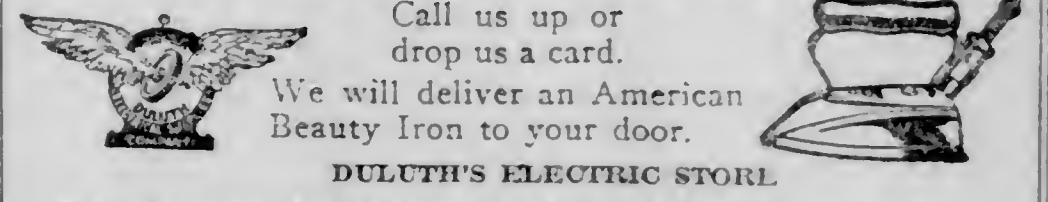

What to Do Before the Doctor Arrives

Nothing that requires a poison label should ever be kept in the family medicine or first-aid chest, if indeed there is any justification for having poison in the house at all. Here is a list of contents of the family medicine cupboard and emergency kit:

1. One ounce of tincture of iodine.
2. Two ounces of aromatic spirits of ammonia.
3. One ounce of syrup of ipecac.
4. One ounce of turpentine.
5. One ounce of sweet spirits of nitre.
6. Four ounces of glycerin.
7. Four ounces of aromatic syrup of rhubarb.
8. One ounce of flexible collodion.
9. Two ounces of borax and glycerin.
10. One ounce of powdered alum.
11. One ounce of powdered camphor.
12. Four ounces of olive oil or sweet almond oil.
13. Two ounces of sodium mustard.
14. Two ounces of sodium citrate.
15. Four ounces of milk of magnesia.
16. Four ounces of alkaline antiseptic solution.
17. One or two one-ounce collapsible tubes of sterile petroleum (vaseline).
18. One four-ounce carton of absorbent cotton.
19. Half dozen one-yard folds of sterile gauze in sealed envelopes.
20. Half dozen bandages, one, two and three inches.
21. Spool of zinc oxide adhesive plaster, five yards, one inch.
22. A tin of Souditz powder.
23. One hundred one-grain phenolphthalein tablets.
24. Solution of two grains of copper sulphate in one ounce of water. Emergency emetic, dose tablespoonful.
25. Collapsible tube of solidified liniment.

The list contains no specific for colds or influenza and none for headache, for the reason that such medicines are not without danger. 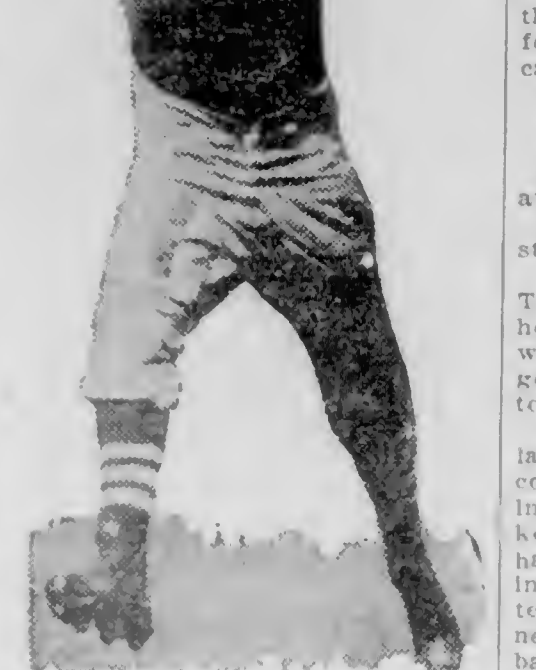

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Science Beckons To Man

DISCOVERIES MADE IN THE LIGHT OF LAW.

Groping after laws, students lose their way and end in confusion amid a maze of seemingly antagonistic facts. But as soon as the law governing the facts is discovered, harmony is found to prevail.

BOYER'S LAW—Johann Boyer, who began studying astronomy with a hand-made telescope placed in a garret window, discovered that the distances of the planets from the central sun increase in a regular ratio, beginning with Mercury, the youngest planet. Prior to that time all the planets were supposed to have been created simultaneously with the earth and sun.

Boyer was derided, with good reason it seemed, for a time, because no planet appeared between Mars and Jupiter, where, according to the law, a planet should exist. In the light of the law, however, the great telescopes

of the world were turned upon that vacant orbit, and over 400 little planets, one being 600 miles in diameter, were discovered and named. A planet had exploded in the making, leaving the fragments in its place.

THE PERIODIC LAW—discovered in 1869 by Mendeleef, by Meyer and by Newlands, working separately. This law holds that if the elements of the earth be arranged in the order of their atomic weight elements will be found at regular intervals having similar properties and relations. When all the known elements were arranged in the order called for by the law, however, several gaps were disclosed where elements should be found, yet no such elements had ever been discovered. Within a few years thereafter, the elements potassium, scandium and germanium were found, closing the gaps and vindicating the law.

BOYER'S LAW—In order to account for the evolution of many-celled animals from single-celled ancestors, Ernest Haeckel had to assume the former existence of a gas-tube-shaped stem form, which had never been observed. This hypothetical creature was subsequently discovered by Monticelli.

THINGS FOR BOYS TO MAKE

A Screenshot from Camera Film. A few days ago we showed a screenshot made of cardboard. Here is one that will outlast the other many times.

Take some discarded, snapshot film and remove all of the emulsion coating by soaking it in hot water, and scrubbing it until the film is perfectly clear. Cut a piece three inches square, then cut away two corners as shown by diagram "A". The tongue must be narrower than the middle section. Dotted lines show where to fold the film. Fold the tongue in and then fold the sides over it. Blow in at the end where the tongue was folded, leave the tongue long at first, and shorten by cutting as you make tests. "A" shows the screenshot finished.

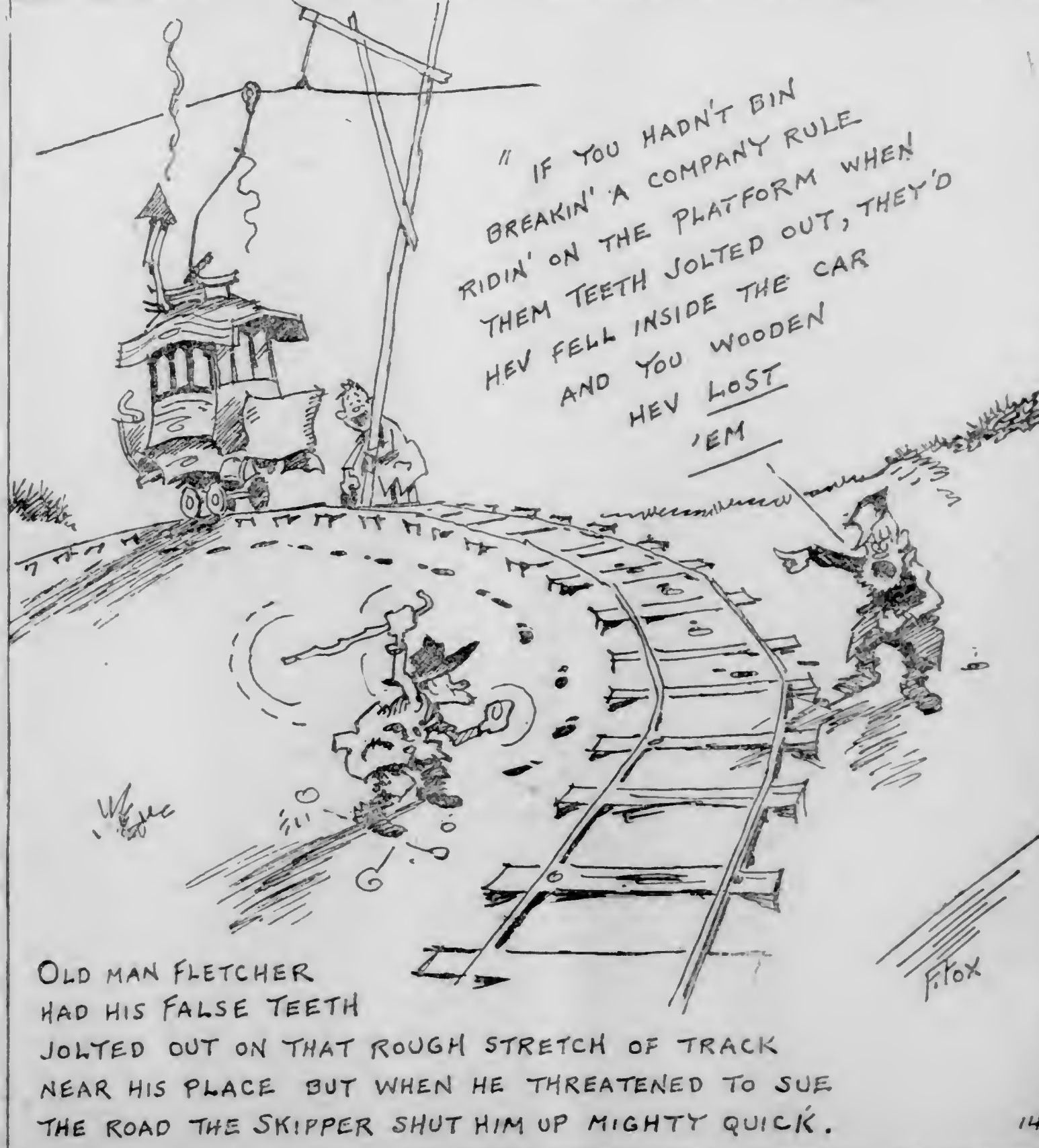
