FOREIGN CROP AND LIVE STOCK REPORTS.

To Field Agents:

The accompanying notes on foreign agriculture are for your information and for such other use as you find advisable. Some of these notes might be included in the printed reports which some agents are issuing in cooperation with State authorities.

It is planned to issue these foreign crop and live stock reports regularly, probably twice a month.

STOCKS OF FARM PRODUCTS ON HAND IN NEW ZEALAND FOR 1919.-According to the best information obtainable, the stocks of farm products in New Zealand are not more than sufficient to supply the demands save in the case of dairy products, meat, and wool. In fact the Government will probably have to purchase anywhere from 2,000,000 to 3,000,000 bushels of wheat to supply the demands for the year 1919, and the outlook is not promising for the immediate future. Report from the Consul General at Auckland, New Zealand, December 27, 1918.

PRODUCTION OF PEANUTS IN JAPAN AND FORMOSA.-According to a report from Consul General George H. Scidmore at Yokohama, the estimated production of peanuts in Japan and Formosa in 1918 is 3,486,000 bushels against 3,738,000 bushels in 1917, and 3,634,000 bushels in 1916. Commerce Reports.

CROPS AND LIVE STOCK IN THE STATE OF JALISCO, MEXICO, IN 1918.-Consul John R. Silliman, Guadalajara, Mexico, under date of December 12, 1918, reports the production of the main crops and the number of live stock in the State of Jalisco, Mexico, in 1918 as follows: Wheat 70,988,824 bushels, corn 17,026,900 bushels, beans 1,418,909 bushels, chick peas 567,654 bushels, sugar 28,660,100 pounds, and live stock 1,000,000 head. Commerce Reports, February 21, 1919.

The SOUTH AUSTRALIA WHEAT crop for 1918-19 is estimated at 21,302,459 bushels, as compared with 28,692,594 bushels in 1917-18.

NEW SOUTH WALES reports a WHEAT area of 3,215,030 acres, and a production of 18,048,000 bushels for 1918-19. Last year (1917-18) 37,843,930 bushels were harvested from 3,821,500 acres.

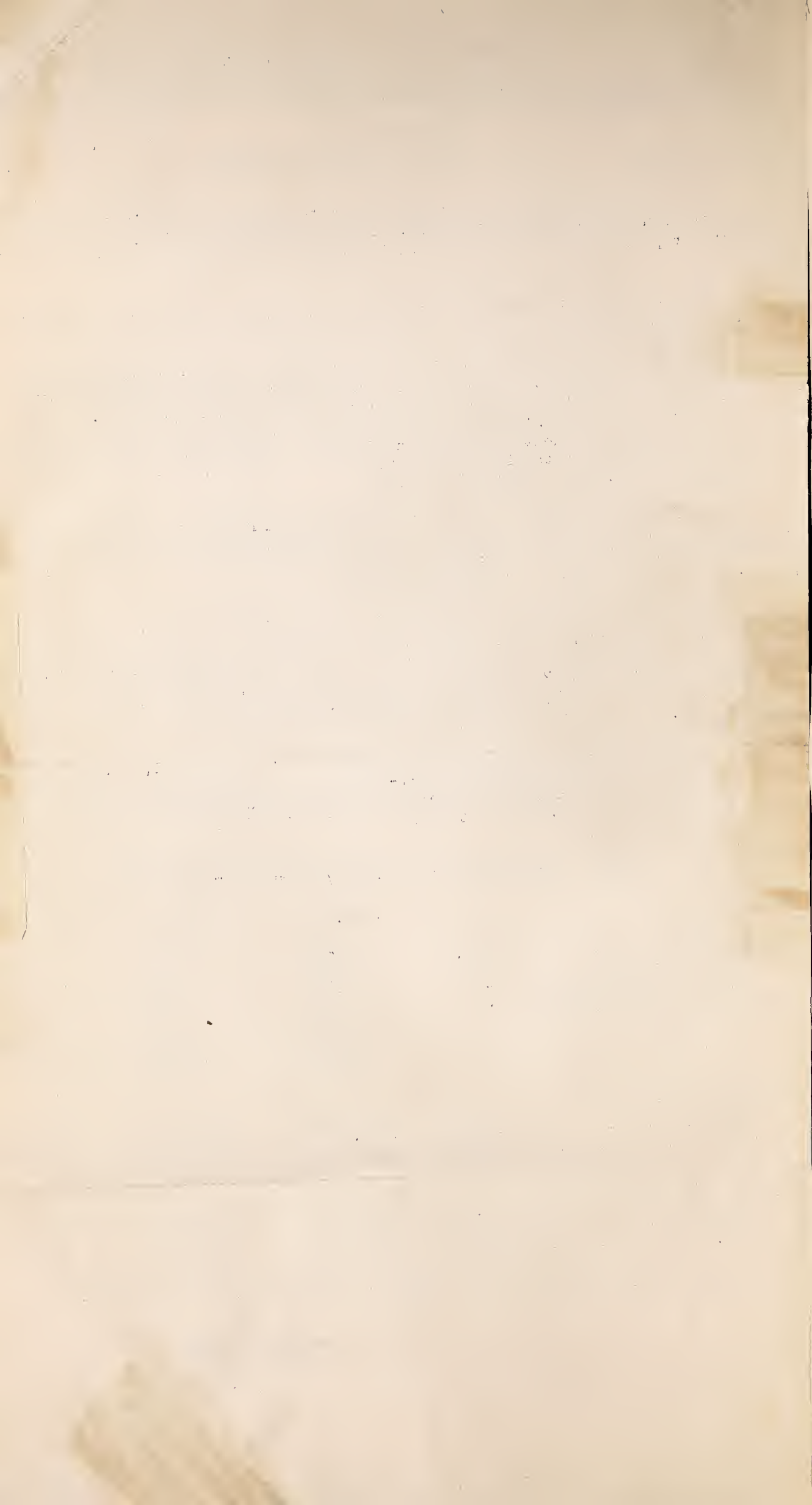

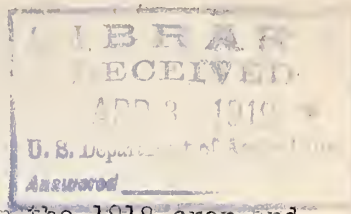

ARGENTINA

(Consul General W. Henry Robertson,
Buenos Aires, December 12, 1918.)

About 132,000 short tons of SUGAR will be produced from the 1918 crop and about an equal amount imported by April 30, 1919.

As the normal domestic consumption of sugar in Argentina is about 220,000 tons per annum, between now and the end of next April there should be about 264,000 tons of sugar on hand or about 44,000 tons in excess of domestic needs. -
Commerce Reports.

DENMARK

(Consul Agerton, Copenhagen, February 7, 1919.)

Production of ROOT CROPS in 1918. The figures in parentheses are for 1917: Potatoes 40,605,000 bushels (31,882,000); Carrots 145,000 short tons (115,000); Beets 5,805,000 tons (4,645,000); Kohl-rabi 5,025,000 tons (6,043,000); Turnips 2,573,000 tons (3,032,000); Sugar beets 1,041,000 tons (973,000).

ENGLAND AND WALES

(Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, February 1, 1919.)

The steady demobilization of agricultural laborers from the Army is relieving the scarcity of farm hands, and in several parts of the country the supply has been nearly, if not quite, sufficient for the requirements of a wet month. Skilled labor is, however, still scarce. Owing to the lateness of the season and the deficiency of labor, proper cultivation in the autumn was frequently neglected, and it is expected that the preparation of the land for the spring crops will require more labor than usual.

Besides there are 5,714 short tons of coffee in the ports of Havre and Nantes and 8,429 tons of coffee bought in Brazil but not yet shipped to France.

GREECE

(Vice Consul C. H. Corafa, Athens, December 19, 1918.)

Good weather and the consequent ripening of the olives have brought about nearly 4,000,000 gallons in excess of predictions. The harvest of olive fruit totals 140,000,000 gallons and the production of OLIVE OIL amounts to 35,248,500 gallons. - Commerce Reports.

ITALY

(Report from the U. S. Military Attache at Rome, received through the courtesy of Colonel John M. Dunn, General Staff, Acting Director of Military Intelligence.)

Professor Nazareno Strampelli, who has been experimenting on WHEAT at Rieti since 1903, has produced a hybrid which he has named in honor of his wife Carlotta Strampelli, and which has proved to have excellent qualities of resistance to rust and to yield good harvests. About 247,000 acres of land are now under cultivation for seed of this variety. Professor Strampelli estimates that by sowing this wheat on 4,942,000 acres of land after 1920, at which time sufficient seed will be available, the annual wheat harvest of Italy can be increased by 40,000,000 bushels and Italy will be freed almost entirely from the necessity of importing wheat.

SPAIN

(Consul Robert Harnden, Seville, January 3, 1919.)

The following is a private estimate of the OLIVE OIL exportable surplus for 1919. Production 1917-18, including holdovers, 507,000 short tons; production 1918-19 254,000 tons; production 1918-19 plus stock on hand 482,000 tons; annual consumption 254,000 tons; exportable surplus for 1919 228,000 short tons. - Commerce Reports.

RESUMPTION OF BANANA EXPORTS

(Consul George K. Stiles, Teneriffe, December 3, 1918.)

The first allied steamer to load bananas for two years left the port of Teneriffe for Liverpool on December 3, 1918 with approximately 12,000 crates of bananas. - Commerce Reports.

SWEDEN

(Vice Consul Martin Leaf, Norrkoping, Sweden, January 14, 1919.)

CEREALS look promising in south Sweden but conditions in central Sweden are not so promising as it is feared that the alternative frosts and mild weather are damaging the grain.

It is evident that the CEREAL ACREAGE will be less in 1919, as a greater acreage will probably be devoted to sugar beets due to the fact that the Government increased the price of sugar beets to farmers from \$1.42 to \$2.24 per metric quintal (\$12.88 and \$20.32 per short ton, respectively.)

CHINA

(Consul General George E. Anderson, Hongkong, January 10, 1919.)

There is a very serious RICE SHORTAGE in South China and the Far East generally, and so far as the South China field is concerned, nothing short of a rice famine is in sight. The crop prospects in Indo-China are so doubtful and the new crop so short of normal that supplies from this source are not forthcoming. Neither are supplies available in Siam where the markets have already been drawn upon by Japanese and other foreign interests, nor in Burma whence further export of rice has been prohibited by the Government in order to relieve the situation in India.

The situation in Japan is such that already riceless days have been instituted. - Commerce Reports.

CHINA: TIENSIN CONSULAR DISTRICT.

(Consul General P. S. Hintzeman, Tientsin, China.)

Large quantities of PEANUTS are grown in Chihli Province. The annual commercial production is about 14,000 tons. - Commerce Reports.

BRITISH INDIA

According to the final official estimates last year was marked by a considerable decrease in the area and production of JUTE and a still more serious reduction in the area and yield of INDIGO and SESAMUM. The figures compared with those of the preceding year, which are given in parentheses, are as follows:

JUTE area 1918 2,497,214 acres (2,735,999 acres) production 1918 7,009,060 bales of 400 pounds (8,929,067 bales): INDIGO area 1918-19 500,700 acres (710,600 acres) production 1918-19 4,939,200 pounds (9,889,600 pounds): SESAMUM area 1918-19 3,251,000 acres (4,023,000 acres) production 1918-19 210,560 tons of 2000 pounds (372,960 tons).

FOREIGN CROP AND LIVE STOCK REPORTS. - CONTINUED.

JAPAN

(Consul General George H. Scidmore, Yokohama.)

The actual RICE crop in 1918 did not come up to estimates published by the Department of Agriculture and Commerce early in November, which stated that the yield would amount to 285,553,177 bushels. The authorities believe that there will be a SHORTAGE of 15,357,000 bushels in the rice supply in Japan in 1919. Merchants in this line are of the opinion that about 25,595,000 bushels of FOREIGN RICE will have to be imported to cover the deficit. - Commerce Reports.

MANCHURIA

The Manchuria Daily News gives the EXPORTS of BEANS from Manchuria for 1917 as 205,853 tons; bean cakes, 821,941 tons; and bean oil, 104,213 tons. During 1918 it is estimated that the bean oil exports from Manchuria netted 200,000 tons. - Commerce Reports.

AUSTRALIA

(Excerpts from Monthly Report on Commerce and Industry, of Australia.)

It is difficult to obtain the exact figures concerning amounts of commodities AVAILABLE FOR EXPORT. It is estimated that at the present time there are 186,667,000 bushels of WHEAT in the COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA awaiting shipment.

The drought that was anticipated in VICTORIA early in the season has not turned out to be at all so serious. Reports received from the various districts in VICTORIA show that WHEAT is turning out better than was expected and it is estimated that the crop will be 25,000,000 bushels. Other grain is also good.

GERMANY

The following statistics were taken from recent issues of an official German newspaper, Deutscher Reichsanzeiger and Preussischer Staatsanzeiger, which have just become accessible to the Bureau of Crop Estimates. Alsace-Lorraine is not included in the estimates.
