

**Cost of Sending Money** In all cases where the or-der for seed amounts to one dollar or more, the cost of postoffice or express money order, or cost of registering the letters from places that are not money order offices, may be deducted from the amount of the order.

**Stamps** On orders of seeds where the amount is less than good condition (one-cent and two-cent stamps preferred) the same as cash, but we would ask those remitting stamps to wrap them in oiled paper, if possible, to prevent their sticking together or to the order.

We Pay the Postage On all seeds in this catalog ounce, quarter pound, pound and five-pound quantities, we pay the postage and gnarantee safe delivery by mail. On all seed, plant and bulb collections we pay the postage. We pay the postage on plants and bulbs except in larger quantities where a "not prepaid" price is named.

You Pay the Postage When you order ten pounds or more of any kind of seeds at "Not Prepaid" prices stated in the catalog, you pay the post-age, express or freight. The same applies to quantity lots of bulbs and plants listed at "Not Prepaid" prices.

When you order seeds in 10 or 100 pound lots or over at "Not Prepaid" prices you can have the seeds sent to you by parcel prepaid" prices you can have the seeds sent to you by parcel post, express or freight but you must pay the transportation charges. Where the freight or express office nearest you is not convenient and you had rather have your seeds delivered to your post office or mail box it is best to have them come by parcel post.

Take the number of pounds you are ordering in the first column and read straight across to your zone column and the amount shown is the postage to send us in addition to the cost of the seed, so we can prepay the postage. As an example we will suppose that you want to order 14 postal zones from Atlanta the amount to be sent us in addition to the price of the corn would be 20 cents; for the 3rd zoue 34 cents; for the 4th zone 60 cents and so on. It's very easy to figure it exactly, ouce you know what your zoue number ls.

If at all iu doubt as to your zone be sure and send enough to cover necessary postage. If you send too much, the surplus will be returned to you.

Seventy pounds is the weight limit. If larger quautities are wanted it will have to be split into two or more shipmeuts. 50 pounds is the weight limit for the 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th senes.

MISSISSIPPI-About evenly divided, the eastern half being in the 3rd and the western half in the 4th zone.

LOUISIANA AND ARKANSAS-Both entirely in the 4th zoue.

TEXAS-Mostly in the 5th zone, a small part including the most eastern counties in the 4th and extreme western portion in 6th.

TENNESSEE—Divided in three zones. Southern part of East Tennessee is in 2nd zone; most of the rest in 3rd zone except the extreme western part which is in the 4th.

KENTUCKY-Western and extreme northern part is in the 4th zone but the rest is in the 3rd zone.



**CABBAGE CULTURE** For home gar-dens the seed for early cabbage can be sown in boxes very early, kept in sheltered spots and covered when there is danger of freezes. Later plantings may be made in open ground as early as ground can be worked. Work soil in seed beds as fine as possible. Beds should be slightly raised for drainage. Do not fertilize soil in seed beds to make it any richer than the open ground in which the crop is to be grown.

Sow seed in drills 6 inches apart across the bed, dropping the seed 5 or 6 to the inch. Thicker sow-ings than this mean spindling, unbealthy plants. Cover seed about  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch in heavy soils,  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch in light sandy soils; firm the soil after covering and then water the bed thoroughly. Keep beds moist but not soaking wet. Seed germinates in 3 to 8 days, accord-ing to weather. Keep young plants growing steadily from the start. When plants have made the fourth or fifth pair of leaves transplant to open ground. One ounce of seed usually makes at least 1,000 good strong plants. Sow  $\frac{1}{2}$  to  $\frac{3}{4}$  Lb. of seed for plants to set one acre. For Success, Plant Dependable Seed.







# **Best Cucumber Seed**

**Culture** Cucumbets are very tender and sbould not be planted until ground be-comes warm. If planted earlier than this they should he protected. Plant in bills 4 feet apart each way. Where well-rotted manure is obtainable work a large shovelful of it into each hill. Plant 8 to 10 seeds in each hill and when plants are well up and bave rough leaves formed, thin out to 4 in each hill. Cover seed 3 inch in clay and heavy soils and 1 inch in light or sandy soils. Soil which covers seed should be worked down fine. Keep plants well cultivated up to the time they hegin to run; after that confine cultivation to pulling out any large weeds that appear. Pick the cucumbers as soon as large enough for use, for if left to ripen the plants soon cease bearing. Seed required: One ounce to 60 hills; about 2 to 3 pounds per acre.

PUMP Culture Usually grown in cornfields, hut if grown as a separate crop, seed should be planted in hills 8 to 10 feet apart each way after weather and soil get warm. Plant ahout 10 seeds to a well fertilized hill, thinning to 3 plants per hill after well started. Don't plant near squash or the squash will be crossed and ruined. Hoe often till vines hegin to run. 

# PLANT A FEW SPRING TURNIPS

**Culture** Spring plantings of turnips are important although the general crop for winter is usually sown late in the summer or fall. The spring sown seed germinate rapidly and turnips are ready for use very early. Being grown under more favorable conditions of temperature than in the fall, they are more tender, sweet and more juicy than those grown in the summer and fall. Sow thinly in drills from January to March, according to locality, covering seed lightly. They make best on new ground

or ground that has not been cultivated for several years. If stable manure is used it should be applied several months before the crop is planted as fresh manure makes spotted turnlps, interior in quality and with a rank flavor. For fall or winter use sow rutabagas July 15th to September 1st; turnlps August 1st to October 15th in this latitude; farther South they can be planted later, and in Florida plantings can be continued all through the winter. Sow 1 ounce of seed to 200 feet of row; 2 to 3 pounds per acre.

Before ordering flower seeds or plants it is best always to make a plan for final or lasting results. You don't have to be a landscape gardener to make a beautiful home place. You can make a log cable home beautiful as well as the grounds around a costly man-sion. Unsightly places, as back yards, fences and house founda-tions should be screened from view-all other views left unob-structed except by low-growing plants. Plan to show off the home as a pleasing sight. Don't jump in and patch up your place for Im-mediate results. Plan to add to the beauty of your home each year. **HOW TO SOW FLOWER SEEDS** 

With few exceptions flower seeds are very small, and sowing them by the inexperienced often results in failure, either partial or complete, because a few simple rules are not followed. There is nothing mysterious about success with flowers. They require care and a little common sense. With these failure is almost im-possible. It is work that can not be left to a farm hand or la-horer. It must receive your careful personal attention. By observ-ing closely the following rules for sowing flower seed you will have little cause for complaint or failure.

**The Soil** A mellow loam, which is a medium earth between the extremes of clay and sand, enriched by a com-post of rotten manure and leaf mold, is adapted to the generality of flowering plants. Previous to planting flower beds or borders care must be taken that they are so arranged that the ground is listed elemented in the middle allowing the water to run off this a little elevated in the middle, allowing the water to run off, this also showing off the plants to better advantage.


also showing off the plants to better advantage. **Planting the Seed** Make the surface as fine and smooth as possible. Cover each sort of seed to a depth proportionate to its size; very small seeds, like pctunias, should be merely sprinkled on the surface of the ground, and barely covered with finely-sifted, light mellow soil; press the soil down firmly over the seeds with a brick or a short piece of board. For larger seeds the depth should be regulated according to the size of the seeds, those the size of a pinhead,  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch deep, and those the size of a pea,  $\frac{3}{4}$  of an inch or more. Get a piece of lath (it would be better if planed smooth) about two fect long, press the edge down into the soil evenly, so as to make a groove as deep as the seed is to be planted, scatter the seed along this, allowing one plant is to occupy when grown. Cover the seeds by pressing; turn your lath flatwise and press the soil down firmly. On light, snady soils flower seeds should be covered twice the depth that they should be in stiff or heavy clay soils. **Sowing in Boxes** Almost all flowers will stand trans-planting. Many of them grow better for having been transplanted. This is always advisable with the expensive seeds and those of a tropical nature, such as coleus, salvia, etc. These need a warm soil to start the seeds. Sow the same as in open ground, and keep the soil moist, but not soaking wet. If sur-face of soil shows tendency to cake or crust scratch it lightly to break the crust. Small seeds cannot force their way through a crusted surface. As soon as plants reach a height of 2 to 3 inches they may be transplanted tabling as much carth as noscible with they may be transplanted, taking as much earth as possible with each plant, so as not to disturb the roots more than necessary.

# ASTERS

**Culture** The China Asters are unsurpassed for bedding and one of the most satisfactory for the home garden. The many delicate sbades and beautiful colors, the size, form and long blooming season, all make for the great popularity of these charming flowers. Asters are very hardy and may be planted outdoors as soon as the soil is warm and dry. You can start them indoors or in a cold-frame in January or February and transplant outdoors after killing frosts. Cover seed with ¼ inch fine soil firmly pressed down and when plants are 2 inches high, thin to 15 inches apart in row. Seeds may be planted in beds outdoors and transplanted when 2 or 3 inches high. Keep plants well watered in warm and dry weather, watering 2 or 3 times a week. For late flowering, sow in May or June. WHEN TO PLANT—Nov. 1st to Mar. 15th is the time to plant Roses. We can supply these fine plantuil leaf growth starts in the spring, about March 15th, but better success is had with earlier planting in the South and fall planting farther North. We sell many more Roses in the spring than in the fall because people generally think of planting everything at spring seed planting time. We supply this demand with about 350,000 tender, greenhouse grown Rose plants as listed on pages 99-101, but we had rather not sell any Roses after March 15th. Fall or winter planting is by far more satisfactory.

HOW TO PLANT—Upon receipt of plants, open the bundle and water thoroughly in a pail or tub of water for a few hours. Don't expose to sun or wind. After removing from the water, trim off broken or damaged roots and prune plants to about 18 inches. We do this pruning for you before shipment. Soll should be well prepared before plants arrive. A good garden soil is fine and should be spaded or plowed 18 inches deep and Sheep Manure (see

Page 122) or well rotted stable manure thoroughly mixed with the rage 122 of whet rotted static manufer throtoging infrate whet the soil. Plant in late afternoon on a calm day or on a cloudy or rainy day if possible. Set plants of Bush Roses 15 to 24 inches apart except Hybrid Perpetuals, which need about 3 feet of space. Climbers need about 6 feet of space between plants.

URSERY ROSES

In planting, dig a hole large enough to spread the roots with-ont crowding and deep enough to cover a little deeper than plants were in the nursery. Budded or Grafted Roses must be planted so the scar or swelling left by bud or graft is beneath the surface. In filling with soil, shake plant lightly, so soil gets all around the roots, then fill hole completely and firm soil so plant is set solid. Soak well with water. Further pruning back may be done before new heaf crowth starts in spring. new leaf growth starts in spring.

**CULTIVATION**—With Roses, the soil cannot be too tight around the roots or too loose at the surface. Cultivate fre-quently, about 2 inches deep, without disturbing the roots. This protects roots from sun, gives them air and conserves soil mois-ture. When watering, soak the ground as deep as the roots penetrate, about 18 inches, and don't water again until surface is quite dry. Don't sprinkle.

CUTTING ROSES—To get full value in the cut flowers, Roses are cut when the bud is half opened, using sharp prnning shears, scissors or knife. Take as long a stem as possible without hurting the bush or removing young buds which will later develop. Cut in early morning or in cool of the evening, plunging stems deeply in water for at least one honr in a cool, dark place. All Tea (T) and Hybrid Tea (HT) Roses are so-called Everbloom-ing Roses. Hybrid Perpetuals (HP) are often classed with them though blooming is more seasonal



No man or woman ever needed salvation in the religious sense any more than the average cotton growing soils of the South need salvation in the physical or land building sense. We say this in all reverence to the Creator of all things.

A piece of virgin land, deep and rich with vegetable matter and plant food, is just as much a part of God's work as you are and should be treated as such instead of robbed and squandered as we and our ancestors have been doing.

The washed out hill lands of the upper Cotton Belt and the sandy lands of the lower belt all need, and need badly, soil salvation. One seed will stool out and produce three to five stalks, usually growing from 10 to 12 feet tall, and under favorable conditions this variety will usually produce from 30 to 50 bushels of seed per acre and 125 to 200 gallons of syrup per acre, which is usually of a fine flavor and always sells well. It is best to cut for making syrup just before the seeds ripen as the plants have more saccharine at that state of development, but if you desire to say seed, let the plant mature and cut when it is fully ripe. The seed heads should be cut and cured in the field. This variety of sorghum produces an abundance of splendid fodder. Some of the larger syrup makers do not pull the fodder, but run the stalk and fodder through a cane crusher, thereby saving labor. This method of crushing the cane may cause the syrup to be a little darker in color than if the fodder is pulled. 



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
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
