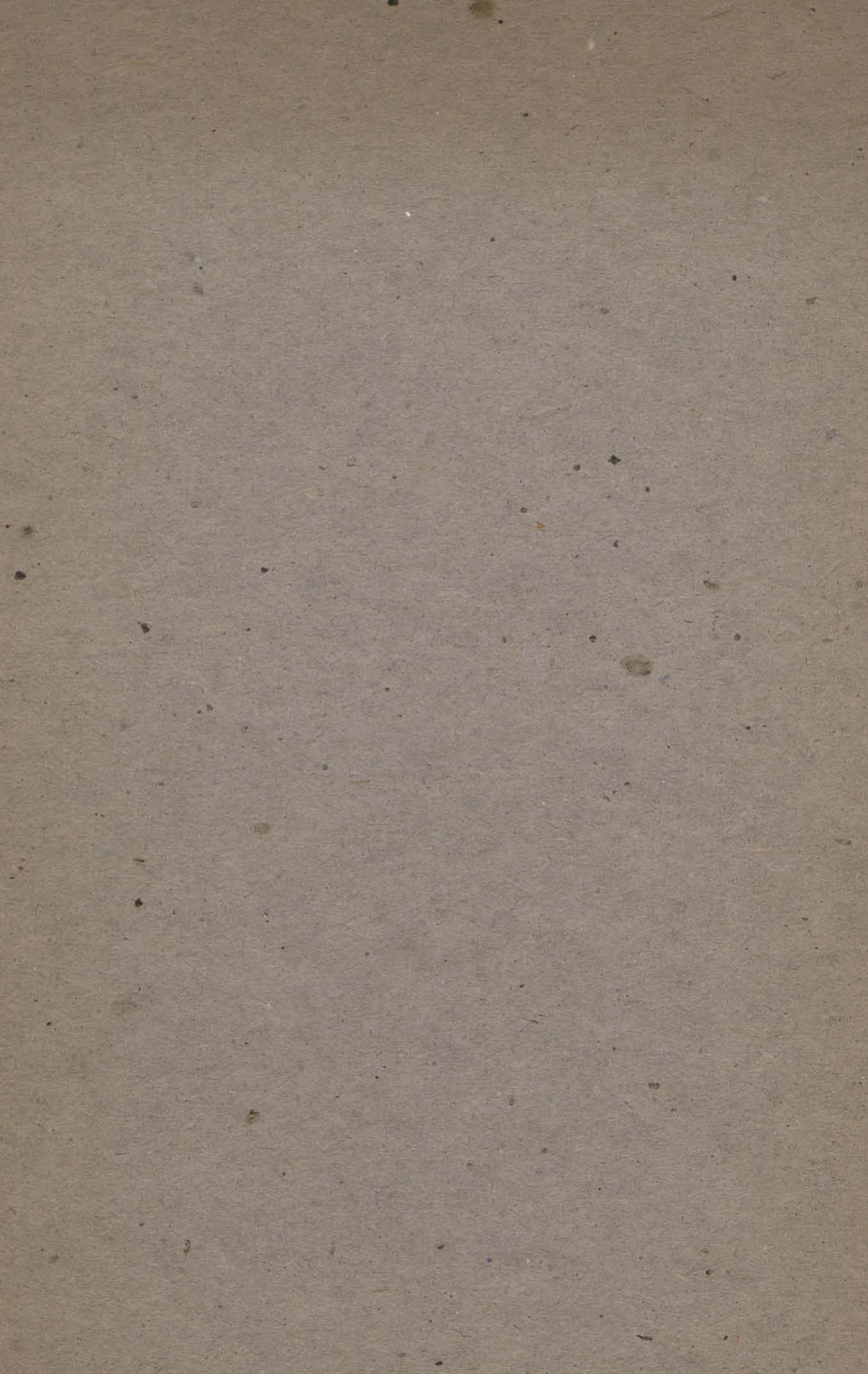

Sir John Fowler, Bart., K.C.M.G.,

President of the Egypt Exploration Fund, died on November 20th, ten days after the Annual General Meeting. The following Resolution was adopted at the next ensuing meeting of the Committee:

“The Committee of the Egypt Exploration Fund, at its first meeting after the death of Sir John Fowler, President of the Fund, deems it a duty to put on record its appreciation of the valuable services which he rendered to the Fund and to the Committee.

“Sir John Fowler was elected President in 1887, in succession to our first President, Sir Erasmus Wilson. He has therefore been identified with the work of the Society for eleven years. During that long period of time, until incapacitated by his final illness, he was regular in attendance at the meetings of the Committee and the General Meetings of the members. It is owing to his capacity for business and his power of dealing with men that the Society has proved so successful in the large operations it has undertaken. Sir John Fowler’s name alone, as associated with the greatest engineering works in modern Egypt, was a tower of strength to us. His personal interest in all our projects, his practical knowledge, and his force of character were of still greater use.

“The members of the Committee will ever remember the uniform courtesy that he showed to them all, and the many occasions on which he assisted their deliberations to a right conclusion.

“The Hon. Secretary is hereby instructed to transmit to Lady Fowler a copy of this extract from the minutes of the Committee, together with a cordial expression of the sympathy of the members with her in the loss she has sustained.”

Report of the Twelfth Ordinary General Meeting.

(SIXTEENTH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.)

THE TWELFTH ORDINARY GENERAL MEETING of the EGYPT EXPLORATION FUND since its incorporation as a Society (the sixteenth since the foundation of the Fund in 1882) was held on Thursday afternoon, November 10th, 1898, in the large room of the Zoological Society, 3 Hanover Square; Sir Edward Maunde-Thompson, K.C.B., D.C.L., LL.D. (Vice-President), in the Chair.

There were present: Mr. H. A. Grueber, Hon. Treasurer; Mr. James S. Cotton, Hon. Secretary; Mr. F. W. Percival; Prof. W. M. Flinders Petrie; Mr. A. S. Murray; Dr. E. W. Berridge; the Rev. F. C. Norton; Mr. A. J. Woodhouse; Major-Gen. Sir Chas. Wilson, K.C.M.G., &c.; Mrs. McClure; Mrs. Tirard; Rev. James Marshall; Mrs. F. Ll. Griffith; Miss Emily Paterson, Secretary; &c., &c.

The proceedings were opened by the CHAIRMAN, who expressed regret at the absence of the President, Sir John Fowler, through illness. After the minutes of the last meeting had been read and approved, the following names of Members of Committee retiring by rotation were announced:

The Rev. FRANCIS C. NORTON moved and Mr. ALFRED J. WOODHOUSE seconded the re-election of the retiring Members of Committee, with the exception of the Bishop of Truro; and the re-election of the Hon. Auditors, Mr. James Hilton and the Rev. R. Milburn Blakiston.

The CHAIRMAN explained that two vacancies had been left on the Committee in order to make room for the representatives of the affiliated branches at Philadelphia and New York. He then called upon the Hon. Treasurer (Mr. H. A. Grueber) to read his Report.

FINANCIAL REPORT OF THE HONORARY TREASURER FOR 1897-8.

In submitting to you my annual statement of the finances of the Egypt Exploration Fund and its several branches for 1897-8, I am glad to say that I do so with a much clearer conscience than on some previous occasions. It may be within the recollection of those who have attended our Annual Meetings that on more than one occasion I have had to admit that our expenditure exceeded our receipts, and in consequence that we had to draw somewhat on our Reserve Fund. I think after you have heard the various items of the Accounts, which I shall lay before you to-day, you will find that the present Report is very favourable, and that each branch of the Fund is in a prosperous condition.

Before going into details, I must tell you that a new branch of the Fund has been started for the State of New York. At present it is in its infancy, but it bids fair of great extension and improvement financially. I shall also have to submit a separate Account connected with the Graeco-Roman Branch, which is now firmly established and enjoys a considerable income independent of the Egypt Exploration Fund proper and the Archaeological Survey.

As in previous years, I will take the different Accounts in their usual order. First will come that of the Exploration Fund, next that of the Archaeological Survey, then that of the Graeco-Roman Branch, and, lastly, the General Balance Sheet.

As to the Exploration Fund. From this Account it will be seen that our total expenditure during the past year has amounted to £2,944 19s. 7¼d., which sum is made up as follows: (1) By the Expeditions Account, £2,072 18s. 9¾d. This is again the largest sum under this item that we have hitherto incurred; but, as in the previous year, we have had to equip and provide for two separate expeditions—the one at Deir el Bahari; the other, under Prof. Petrie, at Dendereh. At Deir el Bahari we spent the large sum of £418 2s. 1¼d. on the repairs of the Temple, the greater portion of this work consisting in the rebuilding of what is known as the retaining wall on the northern side of the site. It was incumbent that this reconstruction should be done without delay, as the old wall threatened to fall at any time, and if it had done so it would have wrecked a large portion of the Temple as it now stands. I am glad to announce to you that this portion of the Fund's work, the repair of the Temple, is practically completed. The salaries, travelling and other expenses, of the two artists, Mr. Carter and Mr. Sillem, of the architect, Mr. Peers, and of M. Naville, who went out to check the drawings, amounted to £704 13s. 4d., thus bringing up the total expended on Deir el Bahari to £1,122 15s. 5¾d.

In connection with this work at Deir el Bahari, I told you last year that probably in two more seasons the copying of the mural scenes and the inscriptions would be finished. I am glad to find that I was correct in my estimate, as we learn from a letter received last week from Mr. Carter, who, with Mr. Sillem, started some weeks ago for Egypt, that he "trusts to complete all the plates this season." It will be a great relief to the funds of the Society when this work is completed. The other expedition was, as in the previous year, under the direction of Prof. Petrie, whose line of action

was located in the district between Denderah and How. The total expenses connected with that expedition, including Prof. Petrie's salary, amounted to £950 3s. 4d. For the actual excavation and transport of antiquities there was an outlay of £537 7s. 10d. Prof. Petrie's expenses over his salary were only £67 15s. 0d.: this includes his fare out and back to Egypt. The item of £45 against the name of Mr. Mace, Prof. Petrie's assistant, consists of £25 towards his expenses in seeing the antiquities passed at Cairo and their shipment to this country, and a gratuity of £20 for services rendered at the exhibition which took place in the summer at University College. I venture to say that those who saw this exhibition will agree with me that the results of Prof. Petrie's work were most satisfactory.

(2) By publications we have spent £519 3s. 2d., which includes the printing and illustrating of Prof. Petrie's volume on *Deshashkeh*, giving an account of his work in 1895-6, the issuing of the Archaeological Report, the Annual Report, and the usual charges for packing, labelling, carriage, etc.

(3) On photographs and negatives we spent £7 19s. 7d., it having been decided by the Committee that objects and sites excavated by the Fund should be photographed for future reference and use. The sale of these, outside the Fund, nearly covers the cost of production.

(4) Lastly, there is the usual outlay connected with rent of office, salary of the Secretary, the honorarium to the Hon. Secretary, and the printing of circulars, stationery, postage, etc. This made a sum of £344 17s. 11½d.

The total receipts over the same period have been £3,379 19s. 11d., viz.:—

(1) By subscriptions from English subscribers, £1,053 os. 4d.; from the Boston Office in America, £435 16s. 8d.; and from the affiliated Branches of the Fund in the United States—Philadelphia, £150; Chicago, £169 3s. 8d.; and New York State, £128; thus making a total of £1,936 os. 8d.

(2) By sale of publications in England and America we have received £359 5s. 3d.;

(3) From the *Atlas of Ancient Egypt*, £16 2s. 3d.;

(4) From a legacy bequeathed by our former supporter, Mr. Edward Cooper, £1,000; and

(5) From dividends on Consols, India 3 per cent. Stock, Deposit Account, etc., £62 16s. 7d.

As compared with last year, our accounts show a slightly increased expenditure; but this increase is entirely due to the carrying out of the repairs at Deir el Bahari, which, under an agreement with the authorities in Egypt, we were compelled to do. It was a work which the Committee had practically deferred till the Temple was cleared, and it is somewhat of a relief that it has been faced and, we hope, done, unless anything unforeseen should happen. Prof. Petrie's expedition cost about the same as last year, if we include the work at Behnesa; but on the publications there has been a saving of nearly £100, and also a slight saving in the office expenses.

Turning to the receipts, we find a marked improvement all round. In the English and American subscriptions there is a considerable advance, to be divided equally between the two countries. Naturally, now that branches are being established in various centres in America, there is a falling off in the receipts from Boston; and besides that, we must take into some consideration the effects of the Hispano-American War. In spite of this the subscriptions of 1897-8, as compared with those of 1896-7, were as £1,936 os. 8d. to £1,589 10s. 9d. It is, however, in the item of publications that the improvement stands out most prominently. The sales of last year have nearly trebled those of the previous one; and, curiously, as in the case of the subscriptions, the increase is equally divided between England and America. The Committee are much pleased with the advance in this direction, as it shows a wider and more universal interest in the work of the Fund. The legacy from Mr. Cooper, too, tended to place the Fund in a better financial state. To sum up, instead of showing a deficit, we carry over a balance of £435 os. 4³/₄d.

I will take next in order the statement of accounts of the Archaeological Survey. The total disbursements of the

Survey during 1897-8 have been £139 1s. 4d., of which £107 13s. 6d. was for publications, and £31 7s. 10d. for general expenses, stationery, postage, printing circulars, etc. The outlay on *Hieroglyphs* is for the volume by Mr. Griffith, now in the press, and shortly to be issued. The receipts, on the other hand, have been £515 2s. 7d.; viz., by subscriptions, English and American, £401 2s. 7d., and by sale of publications, £114 os. od. Comparing this account with that of last year, there has been a falling off in the subscriptions; but this has been partly made up by an increase in the sale of publications. The expenditure, however, being much less than usual, we are able to carry over the substantial balance of £376 1s. 3d. In my report of last year, I mentioned the fact that hitherto previous expeditions had furnished sufficient material for an annual publication. This material is now practically exhausted, and fresh fields must be explored if the work of the Survey is to be continued, and there certainly is no reason for doing otherwise.

Our next account is that of the Graeco-Roman Branch. The payments on this account have amounted to £615 10s. 10½d., of which £515 1s. 9d. was expended on producing the first part of the *Oxyrhynchus Papyri*. The printing and illustrating of this volume cost £315 1s. 9d., and £200 was paid to the authors, Mr. B. P. Grenfell and Mr. A. S. Hunt. These gentlemen also received £50 for producing the *Logia* pamphlet, which forms the next item in the account. A small proportionate charge was made in respect to the Annual Report, and there is also a small item for packing, printing, postage, advertising, etc., making up an additional £41 8s. 7½d. The receipts, on the other hand, have amounted to £1,112 9s. 9d., being £815 2s. 2d. by subscriptions, English and American, and £297 7s. 7d. by sale of publications. The greater portion of this last item is credited to the *Logia*, which produced £293 6s. 4d., after deducting all expenses of printing and advertising. It was a very profitable venture, and this amount has formed a good basis on which to build up our new Branch. The smallness of the item against the sale of the *Oxyrhynchus Papyri* volume is due

to the fact that it only appeared shortly before the end of our financial year. I may say, however, that this work is selling extremely well, and bids fair to bring in a considerable sum during the present year. From those figures it will be seen that we carry over to this year a balance of £496 18s. 10½d.

Lastly, from the Balance Sheet it will be seen that the actual assets of the Fund, the Archaeological Survey, and the Graeco-Roman Branch together, amounted on the first August last to £3,969 8s. 5¼d., which consisted of £1,000 Consols (at cash, £944 8s. od.); £1,000 India 3 per cents. (at cash, £1,082 13s. 6d.); Deposit at the Bank, £1,189 11s. 9d.; current account, £735 os. od.; and petty cash, etc., £17 15s. 2¼d. This sum of £3,969 8s. 5¼d. is to be divided up as follows:—To the Egypt Exploration Fund, £2,727 14s. 10¼d.; to the Deir el Bahari Restoration Fund, £54 7s. 4½d., being the surplus of the £200 received in 1897 from the Society for the Preservation of Ancient Monuments in Egypt; to the Archaeological Survey, £475 3s. 10d.; and to the Graeco-Roman Branch, £712 2s. 4½d. If these figures are compared with the accounts of last year, I think you will agree with me that we have done well financially.

All that remains for me to do is again to thank you for the support which you still so generously give to the Fund and its Branches, and to ask you to be so good as to continue that support during the present year. And we shall need it, seeing that we are organising four separate expeditions,—one to Deir el Bahari; another to Denderah, where Prof. Petrie hopes to complete his excavations; a third on behalf of the Archaeological Survey; and a fourth for the Graeco-Roman Branch. Our hands will be full of work, and our expenditure will be proportionately great.

Dr. E. W. BERRIDGE moved and the Rev. JAMES MARSHALL seconded the adoption of the Financial Report.

The CHAIRMAN, after putting to the Meeting this resolution, which was carried unanimously, called upon the Hon. Secretary (Mr. J. S. Cotton) to read his Report.

THE HON. SECRETARY'S REPORT, 1897-98.

Ladies and Gentlemen,—It is the duty of the Honorary Secretary to furnish to this General Meeting of Members a record of the history of the Fund during the past year and a forecast for the coming year, omitting what is strictly financial, and reserving for the Chairman the most telling points.

Last year was one of considerable activity in exploration, which will be increased in the coming season. We shall then have no less than four expeditions at work in Egypt. Prof. Petrie starts in a few days to resume his excavations at Denderah, which were so fruitful last winter. Mr. Howard Carter and Mr. C. Sillem are already settled at Deir el Bahari, where they hope to be able to finish this year the long task of copying the sculptures of the Great Temple, for the future volumes of M. Naville's monumental work. Mr. N. de G. Davies has already left England to collect fresh materials for the Archaeological Survey. And Messrs. Grenfell and Hunt also left last night to conduct another search for Greek papyri in the promising region of the Fayoum.

Our activity in publication will likewise be augmented. Last year we issued Prof. Petrie's work on *Deshasheh*, and the first volume of the *Oxyrhynchus Papyri*. There now lie on the table before you early copies of Part III. of M. Naville's *Deir el Bahari*, to be issued immediately to subscribers to the Fund for 1896-97, and also of Mr. Griffith's *Collection of Hieroglyphs* for the Archaeological Survey. We may also expect during the year the first part of Prof. Petrie's work on *Denderah*, of which the illustrations at least are well advanced, and a second volume of the *Oxyrhynchus Papyri*, scarcely less interesting than the first.

We have good reason to anticipate larger support from America. From the foundation of the Fund, and especially since the tour of the late Miss Amelia B. Edwards in the United States, we have been fundamentally an Anglo-American Society. Though the governing body has neces-

sarily had its seat in this country, it has happened in some years that America has provided at least one half of the income. In accordance with a resolution of the Committee, which was reported to you last year, independent organisations in America are now entitled to nominate representatives of their own on the Committee. The number of such organisations has increased from three to four, by the establishment of a New York State Branch, with a very influential Council; and I have heard of at least one more branch that we may shortly hope to welcome. These new organisations not only increase our income; they also extend our sphere of influence, and promote good fellowship in a common cause. One of my most pleasant duties as Hon. Secretary is to correspond with the officials of these bodies, whose acquaintance I was privileged to make during my visit to the United States last year.

The Fund now consists of three departments, about each of which I ought to say something. The Fund Proper, the mother of the other two, not only conducts annual excavations by the agency of Prof. Petrie, but is also still engaged in completing the heavy work at Deir el Bahari, which M. Naville first commenced six years ago. Prof. Petrie is here to speak for himself about what he did last year at Denderah and what he hopes to do this winter on the same site. The expensive task of reparation at Deir el Bahari is now substantially finished, though one season's copying by the artists yet remains to be done. Their drawings, some of which are in an advanced stage, will supply M. Naville with material for at least two more volumes. The volume on the table, to which I have already referred, deals with Queen Hatshepsu's expedition to the Land of Punt, a subject of great importance to geographers, and not without interest to zoologists. The beautiful plates reproduce with fidelity the touch of Mr. Carter's accurate and delicate pencil.

The second department of the Fund is the Archaeological Survey, which, as you know, is under the special charge of Mr. F. Ll. Griffith. A copy of the new volume that he has written lies on the table, and will be immediately distributed

to subscribers. It is entitled *A Collection of Hieroglyphs*, and its object is to throw light on the origin and history of Egyptian writing, mainly from the collections of hieroglyphic characters formed during the early operations of the Survey. It is illustrated with nine coloured plates, mostly copied from tombs at El Bersheh of the XIIth Dynasty. As I have had the advantage of reading Mr. Griffith's proofs, I can promise that his work will be found interesting even by those who are not professed Egyptologists.

The considerable balance to the credit of the Survey (£475) has encouraged Mr. Griffith to arrange for a new expedition to Egypt, in order to obtain further materials which it is hoped will supply the basis for two more volumes. The task has been entrusted to Mr. N. de G. Davies, who is not only a skilled draughtsman, but has also had some training in Egyptology under Mr. Griffith, and was one of Prof. Petrie's party at Denderah last year. He will first go to Saqqâreh, to complete the work that has been begun by others on the celebrated tomb of Ptahhetep (Vth Dynasty). Some of these sculptures have already been published on a small scale in a volume of the Egyptian Research Account; and by the kindness of Prof. Erman, of Berlin, a nearly complete set of squeezes of the sculptures has been placed at Mr. Griffith's disposal. I venture to ask this meeting to authorise me to convey its thanks to the authorities of the Berlin Museum for their courtesy. Mr. Davies will undertake slight clearances round the *mastaba*, to ascertain its plan and discover whether more sculptures exist. From the squeezes a collection of 300 typical hieroglyphs, mostly of very fine style, have already been copied, of full size and with minute accuracy. The publication of these will add immensely to our knowledge of the early forms of hieroglyphic writing, and furnish an important continuation of the work begun in the third Memoir of the Beni Hasan tombs and carried further in the new volume to which I have already referred.

From Saqqâreh Mr. Davies will proceed up the Nile to the neighbourhood of Beni Hasan and El Bersheh; where

are the VIth Dynasty tombs familiar to subscribers to the Survey. Here, not far from Tel el Amarna, is another group of VIth Dynasty tombs named after a certain holy man, Sheikh Saïd, portions of which were published long ago by Lepsius. Another group of tombs of about the same age is at Deir el Gebrawi, in a bay of the hills nearly opposite Siut. Two of these tombs are very interesting for their painted scenes. Tracings of parts of them were made by Mr. Percy Newberry in 1892, and copies of some of the inscriptions have recently been published by Prof. Sayce. From these tombs alone we shall be able to obtain abundant material for a volume of great value.

The extent of the season's work here outlined for the Survey is considerable, and its execution will be attended by practical difficulties and even by hardships. Want of funds prevents its being entrusted to a party, such as was organised in former years. Its success depends on one person, Mr. Davies, who has undertaken to carry out this large programme single-handed. He is prepared not only to copy the inscriptions, but to do what few Egyptologists can do—draw, trace, photograph, and plan. Fortunately, much of the necessary planning has already been done by Mr. J. E. Newberry. In the exceptionally difficult and dangerous neighbourhood of Deir el Gebrawi, far from the river and even from a village market, you will all sympathise with your agent on his long and toilsome mission, the loneliness of which will be intensified by the very minimum of the conveniences of life. Another year, if in the meantime Mr. Davies has not sickened of the work, we hope to be able to afford him an assistant; this year it is impracticable.

The third department of the Fund is the Graeco-Roman Branch, which was established only last year. Twelve months ago, in this room, I made bold to ask for a first subscription list of £1,200. As you have heard from the Hon. Treasurer, the total received up to July 31st was no less than £1,327. Since that date about £210 has been paid in. Of course the whole of this does not represent annual subscriptions. The net profits of the *Logia*, of which 25,800 copies

have now been sold, amount to about £293. We have twelve life members, including one from America, whose total contributions of £300 have been placed to a deposit account, and should be treated as capital. The first year also brought us a number of donations which cannot be expected to recur. But I trust that we may rely upon a regular income of at least £650, which will enable us to provide subscribers with an annual volume, and also to send out an expedition to find fresh papyri every alternate year. Mr. B. P. Grenfell, again accompanied by Mr. A. S. Hunt, has already started for Egypt, so that they are unable to be present here to-day as we had hoped. But their absence gives me the opportunity to praise them as they deserve. Their success in discovery has been equalled by their ingenuity in decipherment, their industry in editing, and their speed in publication, which enabled us to issue the first volume of the *Oxyrhynchus Papyri* within twelve months after the documents arrived in this country. About the character of that volume you will hear something from our Chairman, who speaks with authority. I will content myself with recording the fact that nearly 900 copies have already been disposed of, of which 130 have been sold to the outside public. Considerable progress was made with the second volume before Messrs. Grenfell and Hunt left England; but here again I must not anticipate the interesting details which will more properly come from the Chairman.

It would be unjust if I were to sit down without publicly stating that the actual business of the Society continues to be conducted, as it has been for the last six years, by your efficient Secretary, Miss Paterson. When I consider how much she does day by day, and how little I do myself, I am tempted to compare an Hon. Secretary with a fifth wheel in a coach. My consolation is that the history of the past year shows that the progress of the coach has not been impeded by the interference of the fifth wheel.

THE CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS.

I first congratulate you upon the satisfactory condition of the Fund. When we consider that the Egypt Exploration Fund has grown in its different branches to an extent that our Treasurer has during the past year had to deal with an aggregate sum of no less than £5,000, I think that those who first founded this Society would not in their most sanguine expectations have imagined that in the course of so few years it would have arrived at such a pleasing state of prosperity. It is to be borne in mind that, besides the Exploration Fund itself, we have the Survey Fund, which has been in existence some years, and that we also have the Graeco-Roman Branch, which was started only last year. I think that nothing could better testify to the vitality of the Society, and to its popularity, than the fact that the Survey Branch, which a few years ago was considerably in arrears and owed a large sum to the parent Fund, has, chiefly owing to the hard work and judicious management of Mr. Griffith, entirely freed itself from debt, and is now contemplating a further course of exploration, with a view to obtaining fresh material for its ensuing publications.

The Graeco-Roman Branch has met with the greatest success—a success, however, which does not surprise us. The interest in Greek and Roman classical literature has still so strong a hold upon the educated classes of this country, that an appeal to aid in the exploration of districts in Egypt, where the lost treasures of Greek and Roman writers might be recovered, was bound to be heartily responded to. In America, too, it was only to be expected that such a centre as Boston, with its literary tradition, should send a substantial contribution. The sum of money on account of this Branch, for which the Treasurer is answerable, already exceeds £1,300.

Turning to the Exploration Fund itself, the figures which he has placed before you show dealings which are covered by no less a sum than £3,379, largely the result of

subscriptions in this country and in America. But out of this sum must be noticed one item, which proves the continuance of that widespread interest in our work, which has already brought in so many gifts and bequests to the coffers of the Fund. The item to which I refer is a legacy of £1,000 from the late Mr. Edward Cooper.

The Egypt Exploration Fund is beyond a doubt the most successful literary Society in existence which depends entirely upon voluntary contributions; and I think that the reason for this is not far to seek. In the first place, the history of Egypt and the exploration of the country now attract almost universal attention. It is more frequented by travellers; it is a land of wonders; we never know when the unexpected may turn up. But, more than all, there is the intense human interest which appeals to us. The fact that when we open a tomb and find in it the objects of every-day life, the ornaments, the personal possessions, which were in use thousands of years ago, and which come to our hands again, after the lapse of that long time, in almost the same condition as when they left those of their owners—this it is that gives us that intense human interest in these discoveries, and touches us with the human sympathy that makes the whole world kin. As I have just said, one never knows when the unexpected may come to light; indeed, in recent years, the unexpected has come to light many times more than even the most sanguine of us might have hoped for. The discovery of the lost Greek classics—Aristotle, Herodas, Bacchylides—has been of vast satisfaction, and is also an earnest of more that is to come. But it is not only in the recovery of the classical writers that we place our hopes. The last year has brought to light the single leaf—true it is only a single leaf, but of what immense interest!—a single leaf of a manuscript of the Sayings of our Lord; and again, we have a single leaf of a copy of the Gospel of Saint Matthew; both these fragments are as early as the third century. It is not then too much to hope, I may even say, to be certain, that sooner or later we shall have in our hands substantial fragments, if not entire copies, of books of the

New Testament, dating back at least to the second century of our era. Hope springs eternal in the human breast, and with such a vast field before us, there seems to be, and there need be, no limit to hope.

We may now turn to the work that has been done during the past year and the prospect that is before us. Perhaps I may at once say that, dealing as they do with so large a sum as is now at the disposal of the Fund, the Committee are deeply sensible of their responsibilities. During the past years I think their policy of energy has been justified. The yearly expenditure is large; but every step is carefully considered before it is taken. I regret much that the issue of the *Archaeological Report* for the past year has been delayed. I can assure you that this is not the fault of the editor; in the present instance the printer must be the real scapegoat. However, by this time I hope many of you will have received copies. As you will remember, the site for Professor Flinders Petrie's work last winter was at Denderah—a site which was particularly eligible, as it was a large cemetery almost untouched in modern times. Although the finds were not perhaps sensational, a solid contribution to the history of the early Dynasties, beginning as far back as the IIIrd Dynasty, was the result of the excavations. Prof. Petrie himself will presently tell us something about his proceedings. I need only here say that the antiquities which were discovered have supplied sufficient selections to be sent to twelve museums in this country, to five in America, and to one in Australia; but I should add that, although the number of museums in America receiving such selections are fewer than those in this country, the quantity of objects sent to our fellow-subscribers across the water was not less than that which remained in England. We still have the Temple of Deir el Bahari on our hands. The work carried on there by the Fund this last year has consisted for the most part in repairing the walls and replacing the sculptured stones, whenever their positions could be ascertained. This work has been superintended by Mr. Howard Carter, for whose unceasing energy we must always be grateful; but I have

also to remind the meeting that it is to Mr. Somers Clarke that we are particularly indebted for the advice which he gives us, and which he is so well qualified by his great architectural knowledge to give us, in the restoration of this most important Egyptian temple. Our special thanks are due to him.

The repairs of Deir el Bahari will be completed during the present financial year. It has been a great work to clear this vast temple; the work has been carried on at great expense to the Fund, and it will, of course, be a relief to our finances when we can write off the repairing account, and hand over the temple to the Egyptian Government. But the labour and the expense have not been grudged. The clearing of the temple of Deir el Bahari will ever be regarded as a work reflecting conspicuous honour upon the Egypt Exploration Fund.

But when we hand over the temple, we shall not even then have completed our work. The drawing of the sculptures, which Mr. Howard Carter and Mr. Sillem have during the year continued to prepare, must be carried to a conclusion for the completion of the great publication which the Society has undertaken to issue under the able editorship of Monsieur Naville. The first and second Parts of this publication are already in the hands of subscribers; the third Part is almost ready for issue; and it is to be hoped that the succeeding Parts will follow in rapid succession.

Turning to the Graeco-Roman Branch, subscribers have already received the first volume of the *Oxyrhynchus Papyri*, ably edited by Mr. Grenfell and Mr. Hunt; and they will be glad to know that preparations for a second volume are making good progress. In this latter volume the editors promise us some third century fragments of St. John's Gospel, curiously written in parallel columns with another work, as well as fragments of the first Epistle to the Corinthians and of an Apocryphal Gospel; fragments also of classical writers—Menander, Euripides, Plato, Thucydides, Demosthenes, and Xenophon; and also a roll containing a large portion of the fifth book of the *Iliad*, written, alas! on the

back of an important official document concerning the rights of married women. With regard to this last document, the editors tell us that it presents many difficulties of decipherment. If it should turn out to be a marriage settlement, I think such difficulties are only to be anticipated, for in such documents history is apt to repeat itself. Even though fragments may not add very greatly to our actual knowledge of classical writings, yet, as Mr. Kenyon observes in the paper which he contributes to the *Archaeological Report*, it must be remembered that it is a real gain to science to get this constantly increasing cumulative evidence in favour of the substantial authenticity of our extant texts. Further, the literary papyri which are constantly coming to light prove that many works, now lost, were still extant in Egypt in the early centuries of our era, and consequently it is always possible, we may even say probable, that some of them will be recovered in a more complete form.

Our programme for the ensuing season is rather an extensive one. It will also require a large outlay. But the Committee feel that they are working well within their resources, and that, without committing themselves to a spirited policy, they are quite justified in following an industrious one.

As you have just heard from our Hon. Secretary, we shall have four expeditions on hand; viz., the continuation of the work at Deir el Bahari; a further exploration at Denderah by Prof. Petrie; another visit by Mr. Grenfell and Mr. Hunt to the Fayoum, where they propose testing a section of the desert on the southern shore of the Birket el Qurun, with the site of Kasr el Benât as their centre; and lastly, Mr. Davies for the Survey will turn his steps towards Saqqâreh and the old tombs at Sheikh Saïd and Deir el Gebrawî, in order to complete the material which was gathered in 1892-3. This will give us plenty of work, and, as I have said, will require a large outlay; but the opportunity is a favourable one, and we shall not miss it. Whilst always careful to keep within bounds, we are not a Society for hoarding our funds, and we feel gratified that with the

means at our disposal we are entering upon a wider field than usual.

In conclusion, I have to remind members that our thanks are due to several gentlemen who have again contributed to the *Archaeological Report*, a work of recognized value to students of Egypt and Egyptology.

I will now call upon Prof. Petrie to address you.

PROF. PETRIE'S ADDRESS.

I hope you will not think me a laggard for being here when our friends have left for Egypt. Mr. Grenfell, Mr. Davies, and Mr. Hunt have all gone, and I hope to be away in less than four days; but you will see that I am, at all events, filling up the time as closely as I can.

The past season's work has opened out to us a good deal about one of the dark places of Egyptian history. The time between the close of the VIth Dynasty and the rise of the XIth Dynasty at Thebes has left very few traces, and we knew very little of the condition of the country at that time. In the cemetery of Denderah, however, we have disclosed a large series of tombs which seem to bridge over this break in the history, and to show a continuity of the civilisation in spite of poverty and rudeness.

We searched all parts of the great cemetery, which stretches back about half a mile behind the temple of Denderah, and about a mile along the edge of the desert. In no part did we find any prehistoric remains; the oldest tombs being a small group of about the close of the IIIrd Dynasty, from which came the fine early false-door of Abu-suten. But the continuous series does not begin till the VIth Dynasty. Of that time we opened the great *mastabas* of the Princes Mena, Adu I, and Adu II, which supplied many fine slabs of sculpture, and which show a ready use of the arch in brickwork, the oldest example known of such (about 3,500 B.C.).

Other great *mastabas* of Adu III, Merra, and Beb, follow the foregoing, and must belong to the VIIth Dynasty. The sculpture becomes ruder, and the last of these princes had no figure sculptures, but only a long quantity of religious texts engraved very rudely inside his stone sarcophagus. It took us the best part of three weeks to copy this enormous inscription.

Following on these tombs of the VIIth Dynasty, we found a great number of tombs of two or three different styles of rudeness. The most elaborate sculptures are in bad proportion and ignorantly engraved. When the greatest men of the time were reduced to boasting of twenty or thirty serfs and a hundred oxen, we see how much the condition of the country had gone down since the wealthy days of the IVth and Vth Dynasties.

At last some of the very rudest of these tablets bear the names Antef, Antefaqer, etc.; the pottery, instead of being the mere debasement of the Old Kingdom styles, begins to improve, as we approach the rise of the XIIth Dynasty. Yet, strange to say, there is scarcely anything of this long and prosperous Dynasty in the cemetery. Though two stones with the cartouch of a Mentuhotep were found, not a single king's name nor a single private name of the XIIth Dynasty occurs on any of the sculpture. In only one tomb was an amulet of the XIIth Dynasty found, and the other objects in the tomb were different from any others in the cemetery. Thus we must regard the place as having entirely decayed on the rise of Thebes in the XIth and XIIth Dynasties. At last we have before us apparently a continuous series of tombs extending over the dark age of the VIIth, VIIIth, IXth and Xth Dynasties.

Nothing important of later times was found until we come to the flourishing Ptolemaic age, in which the existing temple was built. Many dozens of tombs of this age were found, usually each containing about a dozen mummies.

So large a cemetery naturally contained a great quantity of sculpture, though of a very diverse quality. All of these stones have been photographed, and will be published, so as to serve for the study of the transition from the Old to the

Middle Kingdom. Plans have been made, and are already printed, of every tomb which could be traced out. The main change is in the forms of the tomb-well, which was square in the IVth Dynasty, lengthened north to south in the VIth; and turned with length east to west in the XIth Dynasty; so the mere position and shape of the tomb-well is sufficient to show us the period.

Beside the sculptures, some fine bronze vessels were found of the XVIIIth—XXth Dynasties, apparently stolen from the temple and hidden in two deposits in the cemetery.

The catacombs for the sacred animals were apparently begun in the XVIIIth Dynasty, and continually added to until the Roman age. In these catacombs we found buried three deposits of glass-work, which had been thrown away from the temple furniture. A splendid group of glass mosaic-work was thus obtained, which probably belonged to a great collar of Hathor.

Thus this past year has given us some much-needed light on Egyptian history, and has provided a considerable quantity of sculpture, bronzes, amulets, glass-work, and other small objects that are very welcome in the museums of England and America. This is, of course, after the Egyptian Government have taken a very full half of all that we found.

In the past season I was greatly helped in the excavations by Mr. Mace and Mr. Davies, while most of my own time towards the end was filled with photographing, copying, and surveying, my wife drawing nearly all the tomb plans. We had the pleasure, for about half the time, of Mr. David MacIver's help in measuring fully all the skulls and skeletons, thus avoiding the need of bringing away the greater part of them, saving us at least £60 or £70 in carriage and packing.

For the coming season we hope to continue working within the ground allotted to us last year. About fifteen miles from Denderh is a great stretch of cemeteries beginning in the prehistoric and early historic times, and coming down to the XVIIIth Dynasty. The greater part of these graves have been plundered in recent years by the natives. We shall, of course, have to work strictly under

Government regulations, and give up half of what we find in our work on what the native plunderers have left behind.

Our workers give me good hopes of results. Mr. Mace, who did excellently last year when he accompanied me, has this year been accepted by the Committee to continue excavating. Mr. MacIver has again generously volunteered to help us, both in excavating as well as measuring. The advantage of having capable men of University training and zealous for results is of the first importance. Two ladies have also volunteered to go, Miss Orme and Miss Lawes, whose abilities promise to be of much use in managing the antiquities, drawing and photographing; while my wife will join in the surveying, and do the plan-drawing as before. Thus out of a party of six, only two are chargeable to the Fund.

Lastly, a few words as to publication. The plates of Denderh are all in hand and mostly done; but I shall not be able to complete the work till next spring. The great quantity of material has forced us to adopt a new departure. To publish every inscription by photograph or drawing would have entailed far more expense for the edition of 2,000 copies than seemed justifiable. All subjects of any historical or artistic interest will, however, duly be placed in the hands of each subscriber; but for a great mass of inscriptions that are not of much interest, it was thought best—rather than let them lie unissued—to print a small edition, which will cost but little, and let any person who wants them have them on just paying a few shillings of cost price. Thus the subscribers' interests in expenditure will be duly considered, while the standard will be fully maintained of making available for study every fragment of inscription that is discovered, and photographic plates will be much more freely used than in past years. The great increase of sales shows what a good policy it is for the publications to keep up a good standard, without at all involving needless cost. An economic liberality is far the best policy in such matters, and will certainly produce not only credit but cash as well.

Mr. F. W. PERCIVAL having proposed a vote of thanks to the Chairman, the proceedings terminated.

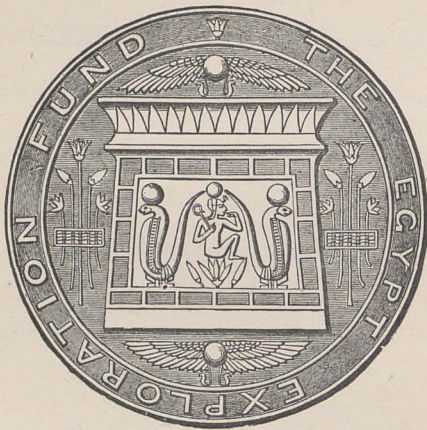

Report of the Thirteenth Ordinary General Meeting.

(SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.)

THE THIRTEENTH ORDINARY GENERAL MEETING of the EGYPT EXPLORATION FUND since its incorporation as a Society (the seventeenth since the foundation of the Fund in 1882) was held on Friday afternoon, November 10th, 1899, in the large room of the Zoological Society, 3 Hanover Square; Sir John Evans, K.C.B., D.C.L., LL.D., F.R.S., V.P.S.A. (President), in the Chair.

The following three new Members of Committee were also recommended for election to fill up vacancies caused by death during the past year: Mr. Emanuel M. Underdown, Q.C., Mr. E. Towry Whyte, and Mr. F. G. Kenyon.

Dr. BERRIDGE moved and the Rev. FRANCIS C. NORTON seconded the re-election of the retiring Members, the election of three new Members of the Committee, and the re-election of the Hon. Auditors, Mr. James Hilton and the Very Rev. Dean R. Milburn Blakiston.

The CHAIRMAN then called upon the Hon. Treasurer (Mr. H. A. Grueber) to read his Report.

FINANCIAL REPORT OF THE HON. TREASURER FOR 1898-9.

The Report which I have the honour to lay before you this day on the finances of the Egypt Exploration Fund and its Branches, the Archaeological Survey and the Graeco-Roman Branch, will be found, I venture to hope, on the whole satisfactory. We have not received, as in the two previous years, an addition to income in the form of legacies; but in each section the general receipts by subscriptions and by publications have been well maintained. These denote stability, and they form a sure basis on which the Committee can found its future operations.

Before entering on the details of this Report I must mention that, as the Archaeological Survey has quite recovered from its late financial difficulties, and as the Graeco-Roman Branch is now in full working order, with a considerable independent income, the Committee have

decided that these two Branches should be debited with the Establishment charges *pro rata* according to their receipts. Hitherto, the Egypt Exploration Fund has borne all the Establishment expenses, the chief items of which are rent and salaries of officials.

The Accounts now submitted will be taken in their usual order. First will come that of the parent society, the Exploration Fund; next that of the Archaeological Survey; then that of the Graeco-Roman Branch; and lastly the General Balance Sheet.

First, as to the Exploration Fund. The total disbursements on this Account have been £2,724 os. 8d., which sum is made up as follows:—

(1) By the Expedition Account, £1,823 14s. 8½d. This sum may again appear to be a large one; but, as in the two previous seasons, we have had to provide for two separate expeditions—the one at Deir el Bahari; the other, under Prof. Petrie, at Denderah. The outlay on Deir el Bahari has mainly consisted of the salaries and travelling expenses of the two artists, Mr. Howard Carter and Mr. Charles Sillem, and of M. Naville, who went, as on previous occasions, to check their work before publication. Besides these, there has been a small expenditure of £25 10s. 1½d. on labour. I am pleased to inform you that, as I anticipated in my last Report, this long task of copying the mural scenes and inscriptions has now come to an end, and nothing remains but to make a final check of the remaining unpublished portion of this work. This M. Naville will do during the coming season. The Committee hoped that last season would see the closing scene of the operations at Deir el Bahari, unless anything unforeseen should happen. I regret to say the unforeseen did happen, and it came from a most unexpected quarter. It was in the form of a very heavy thunderstorm. Since the walls had been freed of the *débris* and the sculptures and mural paintings had been revealed, they have been carefully watched to ascertain whether the air, the light, or a moderate amount of rain would affect them, and from these observations no serious

consequences were anticipated. However, early last year there was a heavy downpour of rain, which was immediately followed by exceptional heat. The effect was that some damage was done to the painted scenes, and the Committee at once felt it their duty to prevent any further disaster by protecting such portions of the Temple as are much exposed to rain and sun. This work therefore remains for us to do, and Mr. Carter, who left early last month, is already in the midst of it, and will complete it in the course of a few months. To help us in this unforeseen task the Society for the Protection of Ancient Monuments in Egypt have once more generously come to our aid with a grant of £175, to which I shall have again to refer when dealing with the Balance Sheet.

The other Expedition was, as in previous years, under the direction of Prof. Petrie, who completed his exploration of the district between Denderah and Hu, and will therefore be free to turn his attention to some other site, which he will no doubt tell you has been already selected.

The total expenses connected with Prof. Petrie's expedition amounted to £1,186 16s. 8d. For the actual excavation and transport of antiquities there was an outlay of £666 9s. 5d.; whilst the salaries and personal expenses of Prof. Petrie and his assistant, Mr. Mace, amounted to £520 7s. 3d. The results of this expedition were, as usual, shown last year at University College, and an account will be published in a forthcoming volume.

(2) By publications we have spent £664 os. 9d., which has been for *Deir el Bahari*, Part II.; a proportionate charge for the Archaeological and Annual Reports, and the usual expenses for packing, carriage, etc. For photographs there has been a small expenditure of £3 16s. 5d.

(3) Lastly, there is the usual outlay connected with rent of office, the salary of the Secretary, the honorarium of the Hon. Secretary, and the printing of circulars, stationery, postage, etc. These make together a sum of £232 8s. 9½d., which, on account of the decision of the Committee to debit the various Branches with the Establishment charges *pro rata*,

is considerably under the sums expended under this heading in past years.

The total receipts over the same period have been £2,358 18s. 10d., viz. :—

(1) By subscriptions from English subscribers, £1,016 13s. 7d.; from the Boston Office in America, £599 1s.; and from the affiliated Branches of the Fund in the United States—Philadelphia, £150; New York, £76; and Chicago, £143 8s. 10d.; these making a total of £1,985 3s. 5d.

(2) By sale of publications in England and America we have received £304 2s. 1d., and from the Atlas of Ancient Egypt £7 2s. 4d.

(3) From dividends on Consols, India 3 per Cent. Stock, and interest on Deposit Account, £62 11s.

From these items it will be seen that the Fund's expenditure has exceeded its receipts by the sum of £365 1s. 10d. Last year we were able to carry over, thanks to a large legacy, a considerable balance; this year, I regret, our balance is on the wrong side. Each year since we have had a double expedition to fit out the Committee have done their best to keep the expenditure within the receipts; but, unfortunately, on more than one occasion they have failed in their efforts. We shall have again this coming season a big outlay. When Deir el Bahari is finally off our hands the Committee hope again to increase the Reserve Fund.

In the receipts the general subscriptions vary little from those of last year. There has been a slight falling off in the English ones, and also in two of the affiliated branches in America; but these losses have been more than counter-balanced by the receipts from Boston, for which, as in many previous years, we are indebted to our most energetic and hard-working Hon. Secretary and Vice-President, Dr. Winslow. The sudden bound which took place in 1897-8 in the sale of our publications has been fully maintained during the past year, and I think we may look for a continuance of this success during the coming one.

Next in order comes the statement of accounts of the Archaeological Survey. These, as formerly, are of a more

simple nature than those of the Exploration Fund. The total disbursements of the Survey during 1898-9 have been £489 4s. 5d., of which sum £190 was for the salary and expenses of Mr. N. de G. Davies, who, as you will recollect, was to visit Saqqâreh, Sheik Saïd, and Dêr el Gebrawi; £222 19s. 3d. for publications, which includes the completion of the volume, entitled *Hieroglyphs*, by Mr. Griffith, and a proportionate expenditure on the Archaeological and Annual Reports; also a sum for packing, &c. The *pro rata* Office expenses and salaries, and those of printing, stationery, postage, &c., have amounted to £76 5s. The receipts, on the other hand, have been from all sources £669 14s. 1d.; viz., by subscriptions, English and American, £513 7s. 10d., and by sale of publications, £156 6s. 3d.

Comparing this account with that of last year, there has been an increase in the subscriptions and also in the sale of publications, and we are thus able to carry over the substantial balance of £150 9s. 8d. The Archaeological Survey is again indebted to the gratuitous and valuable labours of Mr. Griffith; and he has promised the Committee a succession of volumes, the material for which Mr. Davies collected last year, and hopes still further to add to during the coming season.

Our next account is that of the Graeco-Roman Branch. The payments on this Account have amounted to £627 2s. 8½d., of which £353 3s. 6d. was expended on the Expedition Account, which comprised the excavations in the Fayum, the personal expenses of Mr. Grenfell and Mr. Hunt, the cost of the Museum Guard (who was instructed to keep a watch on the excavators, in case they should fraudulently conceal any papyri which might be unearthed) and a small outlay on the exhibition which was held at Burlington House by the kind permission of the Council of the Society of Antiquaries. The expenditure of £170 3s. 6d. included a small charge for Vol. I. of the *Oxyrhynchus Papyri*; a payment on account of £100 to Mr. Grenfell and Mr. Hunt for editing Vol. II. of that series; and a proportionate outlay on the Archaeological and Annual Reports, packing, &c. As

Vol. II. of the *Oxyrhynchus Papyri* was not completed by August 1st, the whole cost of that volume, as well as the remaining sum of £100 due to the editors, will have to be provided out of the present year's funds. The office and other *pro rata* expenses, including salaries, printing, stationery, advertising, postage, &c., amounted to £123 16s. 2½d.

The receipts over the same period have amounted to £918 1s. 10d., being £683 18s. 2d. by subscriptions, English and American, and £234 3s. 8d. by sale of publications. The Fund is certainly to be congratulated on the success of this Branch. It promised well last year, but the Committee could scarcely anticipate such a successful continuance. The sale of the first volume of the *Oxyrhynchus Papyri* has also surpassed our expectation. The result is that we carry over a net balance of £290 19s. 1½d.

Lastly, from the Balance Sheet it will be seen that the total assets of the Exploration Fund, the Archaeological Survey, and the Graeco-Roman Branch together amounted on the 1st August last to £4,235 7s. 8d., which consisted of £1,000 Consols (at cost £944 8s.), £1,000 India 5 per cent. (at cost £1,082 13s. 6d.); deposit at the Bank, £1,531 7s. 8d.; current account, £671 7s. 2d.; and petty cash, £2 11s. 4d. This sum of £4,235 7s. 8d. is to be apportioned as follows:— To the Egypt Exploration Fund, £2362 13s. 0½d.; to the Archaeological Survey, £655 13s. 6d.; to the Graeco-Roman Branch, £1,003 1s. 6d.; and to the Deir el Bahari Restoration Fund, which has been generously contributed by the Society for the Preservation of Ancient Monuments in Egypt, £213 19s. 7¼d. I ought to add that on the last account there was a small expenditure of £15 7s. 8¾d. for repairs. If the above figures are compared with those given in last year's Report, I think you will agree with me that the Fund and its Branches are in a good sound condition.

In conclusion, I have to thank you, on behalf of the Committee, for your generous support, and to express a hope that you will continue to aid us in carrying out our work in Egypt in the future. This support on behalf of the Fund we

shall specially need as, besides completing the reparation of the temple at Deir el Bahari, we shall have an expensive task at Abydos, about which our President and Prof. Petrie will no doubt have something to say. For the Archaeological Survey Mr. Davies will again proceed to Egypt; but in the case of the Graeco-Roman Branch it is proposed not to fit out an expedition but to reserve our resources for a more extensive campaign in 1900-1, that Branch being still provided with sufficient material for several future publications.

Mr. DAVID G. HOGARTH moved and the Rev. WILLIAM MACGREGOR seconded the adoption of the Financial Report.

The CHAIRMAN, after putting to the Meeting this resolution, which was carried unanimously, called upon the Hon. Secretary (Mr. J. S. Cotton) to read his Report.

THE HON. SECRETARY'S REPORT, 1898-9.

Ladies and Gentlemen,—This General Meeting is the one occasion in the year when we are able to submit to our Members an account of the work done by the Fund in its several departments. You will therefore pardon me if, in a statement which is intended to reach in print all our scattered subscribers, I should weary my actual hearers with a dry record of details.

In the first place, I must state that the arrangements made with our American supporters continue to work well. The affiliated organisations in New York, Chicago, and Philadelphia have stimulated rather than weakened the activity of the Central Office at Boston. Smaller Branches have been started at Pittsburgh and Detroit, which at present subscribe through the Boston Office; but we have recognised their existence by grants of antiquities to their local museums. The general result is that the American share of contributions has increased in each department of the Fund, and is in no case less than 43 per cent. of the total. In particular,

I ought to mention that a special Fund for the Archaeological Survey, started by Mrs. Buckman, our energetic Secretary at Boston, has succeeded in bringing in the additional sum of \$600 (£120).

As regards exploration, which is the primary work of the Fund, we sent out last season no less than four parties to Egypt, being more than ever before. Prof. Petrie continued his work of minute survey and excavation on the area formerly granted to him between Dendereh and Hu, the latter of which is the site of the ancient Diospolis Parva. Some of the results were exhibited at University College during July, but they will not be published until next year. Prof. Petrie has presented a summary of them in an address to be read at this meeting, which (you will all regret to hear) illness prevents him from delivering in person. But we hope that he will be able to start shortly for Abydos, the concession of which has been granted to him, and where enough of supreme importance remains to occupy him probably for several years. At Deir el Bahari, our artists (Mr. Howard Carter and Mr. C. Sillem) finally completed their work on the sculptures of the Great Temple. At the same time, Mr. Carter, under the supervision of Mr. Somers Clarke, commenced the necessary task of protecting from damage the buildings and sculptures which M. Naville's excavations have laid bare. Towards this we have received a further grant of money from the Society for the Preservation of the Monuments of Ancient Egypt; and we have every reason to believe that the work will be entirely finished this season. Unfortunately Mr. Carter will soon leave us, having been offered the appointment of Inspector of Antiquities under the Egyptian Government. While congratulating him on this distinction, we would also put on record our gratitude for the services he has rendered during many years, not only as artist, but as representative of the Fund at Deir el Bahari.

In my Report on the operations of the Archaeological Survey I adopt the language of its Superintendent, Mr. F. Ll. Griffith.

Last season the Survey resumed active work in Egypt, being represented by Mr. N. de G. Davies. The first part of the tentative programme was, as you may remember, to complete the collection of hieroglyphic signs in the *mastaba* of Ptah-hetep at Saqqâreh (of which the squeezes lent by the authorities of the Berlin Museum had provided the greater number), to re-examine the tomb, to ascertain its plan and note such portions of the beautiful work as had been inadequately rendered in previous publications, as well as to copy any further sculptures that might exist in the tomb. To do all this single-handed proved a very heavy task. Much excavation was necessary; and it revealed not only a complicated plan but also two new chambers covered with sculpture, much of which is of equal beauty with the celebrated work in the previously known chamber. The careful copying of this newly-discovered sculpture—some 650 square feet in all—occupied many weeks.

It was a surprise to find that the owner of these two chambers was not Ptah-hetep himself, but one Akhet-hetep, probably his father or his son. The sculptures were not all finished; some of the subjects were, in fact, only sketched in. In the Akhet-hetep sculptures, as in those of Ptah-hetep, the hieroglyphs were specially studied by our Surveyor. Upwards of 400 examples, mostly of distinct signs, will appear in the forthcoming memoir: proofs of many of the plates lie on the table before you. It is doubtless unnecessary to remind you that these hieroglyphs are fine early work of the Vth Dynasty, and are therefore of particular value in ascertaining the origins of the signs.

The excavation and planning of the *mastaba*, its re-interment at the conclusion of the work, and the unexpectedly heavy task of copying the new sculptures occupied Mr. Davies till the end of the season, so that the second part of the programme, which was to have been carried out in Middle Egypt, could not be undertaken. A short tour of inspection up the river was all for which there was time. But from the tomb at Saqqâreh Mr. Davies has obtained material enough to form two fine volumes, to be entitled *The*

Mastaba of Ptah-hetep and Akhet-hetep, Parts I. and II. The first of these will contain thirty plates in collotype and lithograph, and will shortly be in the hands of subscribers. It will probably be acknowledged that, with the exception of Prof. Petrie's *Medum*, Mr. Davies' copies are by far the most careful and successful renderings of Old Kingdom work that have ever been made. The coming season will be a short one in Egypt, as we wish to push on with arrears of publication. The Survey of the Old Kingdom tombs of Middle Egypt will be completed; including those of Sheikh Saïd and Dêr el Gebrawi.

The fine collection of coloured drawings which the Survey possesses from previous years of work has been laid under contribution for a new volume of details from the tombs of Beni Hasan, to be entitled *Beni Hasan IV*. These plates are already in hand.

The expenses of the Survey last season were increased, not only by the unexpected amount of excavation, but also by the wages of a museum surveillant during the time of its continuance, and by the cost of re-burying the *mastaba*, in order to leave it as it was found.

To carry out our large programme of publication and of further accumulation of material, funds are badly needed.

For the Graeco-Roman Branch, Mr. B. P. Grenfell and Mr. A. S. Hunt went out to the Fayûm, and spent some three months excavating on the edge of the desert. Their chief result was to identify Greek sites of great importance for ancient geography. They also brought back with them a fair number of Greek papyri, largely of Ptolemaic date, and a quantity of interesting objects of domestic use, which many of you no doubt saw at the exhibition in the rooms of the Society of Antiquaries early in last July. They have again gone off to Egypt, though this time not on account of the Graeco-Roman Branch, which possesses such a large store of papyri from Oxyrhynchus that it does not need an expedition every year. Their second volume has been distributed to subscribers this very week. It exceeds the first volume in bulk by no less than seventy-four pages, indicating

that the editors have not given short measure. As I have been privileged to read the whole of it in proof, I can testify to the high value of its contents, if not from the point of view of literature, at least for the reconstruction of ancient history. The volume for next year, to be entitled *Fayûm Towns and their Papyri*, is already in preparation. Mr. D. G. Hogarth's name will appear as one of the joint authors; for it will include the account of a tour in the Fayûm made by Messrs. Hogarth and Grenfell on behalf of the Fund in 1895-6. The number of facsimiles of papyri will probably be fewer, but it will be abundantly illustrated with the photographs of the objects found, and with maps. Before leaving this subject, I may mention that just one thousand copies of the first volume of the *Oxyrhynchus Papyri* have now been disposed of.

About publications, something has already been said. For the Fund proper, we have in hand Prof. Petrie's volume on *Denderah*, the issue of which has unfortunately been delayed, and also Part IV. of M. Naville's *Deir el Bahari*, of which the plates are printed off. Both of these could appear, if otherwise desirable, during the coming year. In addition, we shall have to arrange for Prof. Petrie's volume on *Diospolis Parva*, and for at least two more parts of M. Naville's monumental work on *Deir el Bahari*. So you will see that our activity in publishing is limited only by the amount of money we can devote to that object. But we are so confident that the money wanted will always be forthcoming that we have undertaken two new books. One of these is a revised issue of M. Naville's *Pithom*, the first volume published by the Fund, which (despite three editions) has been out of print for several years. As numerous demands for it reach us, especially from America, we trust that this venture will prove remunerative. The other book is an edition of the Coptic ostraca in possession of the Fund, for which Mr. W. E. Crum, one of the members of our Committee, has volunteered his services as editor. This will consist, not of facsimiles, but of hand transcripts reproduced by lithography; and it will include the Coptic ostraca at the Ghizeh Museum,

which Mr. Crum has already catalogued, as well as some belonging to Prof. Petrie and others. We cannot afford to distribute this extra volume gratuitously among our subscribers; but we hope that many will support this enterprise, undertaken in the cause of a special department of Egyptology, by purchasing it.

THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—Before offering any remarks on the general work of the Egypt Exploration Fund and its Branches during the past year, I feel it to be incumbent on me to refer to the loss which we have sustained since our last general meeting in the death of our late President, Sir John Fowler, who for a period of eleven years directed the management of our Society. To the world at large, Sir John Fowler is best known as one of the most eminent engineers of modern times. He began his career as an engineer some sixty-five years ago, at the time when this country was in the midst of what may be called the railway mania. The works in connection with which his name will be best known to posterity are the construction of the Metropolitan Railway and the building of the Forth Bridge, on the opening of which by the Prince of Wales in 1890 a baronetcy was conferred upon him by the Queen. His connection, too, with Egypt in an engineering capacity was, perhaps, scarcely less remarkable. He constructed there many irrigation works, and the history of that country might have been widely different if his projected railway to Khartum had been completed. It was, however, not in the course of his profession as a civil engineer that Sir John Fowler appeared before you at your annual meetings. He came here as one deeply interested in the ancient history of Egypt, and as one who felt that many lessons were to be learnt from the wonderful remains in which that country abounds. It was this deep interest which caused him to enter so earnestly

into the work of the Fund, and on every possible occasion to give you the benefit of his sound and practical judgment. During the period of his presidency the Society has done much excellent work, and has extended its usefulness by the formation of two cognate branches—the Archaeological Survey and the Graeco-Roman Branch,—thus placing it in touch with fields of study other than those of pure Egyptology. I do not profess to have so intimate an acquaintance with Egyptology as my predecessor, yet my pursuits in archaeology are not limited to one special section only, and I hope that I may prove myself a not altogether unworthy successor to our late President, and that I may be able to further the work in which we all take so much interest.

The Hon. Treasurer has given you a detailed account of our financial position, which, on the whole, we may consider satisfactory, although in one instance—viz., that of the Egypt Exploration Fund—he has shown that our expenditure has been somewhat in excess of our receipts. On the Branches—the Archaeological Survey and the Graeco-Roman Branch,—we are able to carry over an increased balance, which will be most serviceable for future operations. These Branches are working within fairly defined limits, and their spheres of action do not interfere with each other. This subdivision enables those who are specially interested in one of the several lines on which Egyptian Exploration is now carried out to support the object towards which they are most attracted.

The results of last year's explorations are set forth in the Archaeological Report, edited by Mr. F. Ll. Griffith. In it will be found an account of the work at Abadiyeh and Hu by Professor Flinders Petrie, who was assisted by Mr. David McIver and others. Much has been done towards elucidating the sequence of objects belonging to the prehistoric period, though I venture to think that there is still room for confirmation of certain details, and that the history of the Libyan invasions may eventually require revision. Mr. Somers Clarke holds out hopes of the necessary works for

the protection of the remains at Deir el Bahari being carried out during the course of the coming winter. Mr. N. de Garis Davies records his work at Saqqâreh, especially in the mortuary chapel at Akhet-hetep; while Messrs. Grenfell and Hunt give an account of their excavations for papyri in the Fayûm and their views as to the position of Lake Moeris. Unfortunately, though a fair harvest of papyri has been gathered, many of them are in but poor condition. They appear to belong to late Ptolemaic or early Roman times, and out of 1,000 some 300 are complete. We may look forward to a more detailed account of their purport.

The objects of antiquity obtained during the last twelve months from the excavations at Diospolis, together with a loan collection of prehistoric vases and other articles belonging for the most part to Mr. Randolph Berens, were exhibited at University College, Gower Street, in July last. They have now been distributed among numerous institutions in Great Britain, the Colonies, the United States of America, and Brussels.

The British Museum, the Ashmolean and Pitt Rivers Museums at Oxford, the Ethnological and Fitzwilliam Museums at Cambridge, the Museums at Bolton, Bristol, Canterbury, Edinburgh, Eton, Liverpool, and Manchester, have all been enriched; while those of Melbourne and Sydney, on the other side of the globe, have not been forgotten. In the United States, Boston, Chicago, Connecticut, New York, and Philadelphia have all received their share of the spoil.

With regard to the work of the season now beginning, I have already mentioned the protection of some portions of the great temple at Deir el Bahari, which it is hoped will now be completed. Some injury has already befallen a few of the paintings, so that the necessity of the outlay for the work of protection is painfully apparent.

The main sphere of our action will this year be in the neighbourhood of Abydos, where a considerable area has been kindly allotted to us by the Egyptian Government. It is hoped that not only will our knowledge of the pre-dynastic

occupants of Egypt be largely increased, but that remains dating from the Early and Middle Empires may also be discovered.

The energies of the Survey will be devoted in the main to bringing its publications up to date. The materials for a publication on the Old Kingdom tombs in Middle Egypt, between the Fayûm and Asyut, will also be sought for so as to complete observations already made. Possibly a site at Dêr el Gebrawi, Saqqârah, or Tel el Amarna may be selected, but this will depend on the results of Mr. Davies's tour of inspection. Some fine coloured drawings from Beni Hasan are also being selected for publication.

There will, I understand, be no expedition this year on behalf of the Graeco-Roman Branch.

The publications of the Fund for the past year comprise Part III. of the *Report on Deir el Bahari* and Part II. of the *Oxyrhynchus Papyri*. These latter are nearly all of the first century A.D., and among them are fragments of St. John's Gospel and of St. Paul's Epistle to the Romans. Among the new fragments are some of Menander, Aristophanes, remarkable scholia on the Iliad, a list of Olympian victors, and portions of unrecognised epic and lyric poems. There are also considerable fragments from the Iliad, a small portion of the Phoenissae of Euripides, and extracts of greater or less importance of Thucydides, Xenophon, and Demosthenes. But perhaps the most important of all the documents is the Petition of Dionysia to the Prefect in A.D. 186, which, on account of its remarkable character, has been brought in somewhat out of its chronological position. A multitude of other records are now published for the first time; but this brief reference to the contents of the volume will in some degree indicate its value and interest. We cannot but hope that future discoveries may result from our researches which will equal, if not excel, in importance those already made.

In conclusion, I must briefly mention two subjects—the one a matter of deep regret, the other of entire satisfaction. From whatever cause it may have arisen, the fall of nine columns of the Great Hall at Karnak cannot but produce a

feeling of distress in our minds, and this feeling is rather intensified at this disaster having so rapidly supervened on the skilful and successful restoration of one of the leaning columns by M. Legrain. For the safety of the rest of the building, the reconstruction of the fallen portion may be found imperative, but if so, whence are the necessary funds for the purpose to be obtained? I will not, however, dwell on this subject, but will turn to the other that I mentioned, and offer our sincere congratulations to all Egyptologists and to M. Maspero himself on his return to a post which he has occupied with such success in the past as to justify us in brilliant anticipations for the future.

There is yet another point on which this meeting may be congratulated. It is that Mr. Howard Carter, who for so long and to such good purpose has worked for the Fund at Deir el Bahari, has been selected by Sir William Garstin for the post of an Inspector of Antiquities in Egypt.

I will now ask Mr. Cotton to read Prof. Petrie's Address, in the unavoidable absence of the Professor from ill-health.

PROF. PETRIE'S ADDRESS.

Our work of the past winter has lain in the same district as before, a short way further down the river from Denderah, but the sites were rather scattered, over about ten or twelve miles. Hence we settled first at Abadiyeh, near the great cemetery of Semaineh, and afterwards removed to Hu, the ancient Diospolis. As our quarters consisted of mud-brick huts, which were run up in a day or two, we could afford to desert them and move on as the work demanded. Our party consisted of six or seven persons. Mr. MacIver generously came to help us again, and was closely occupied all the season with excavating and bone measurements—and it needs some energy, after a long day's field work, to turn

out after dinner and sit in a high, cold wind marking piles of bones by lantern light in the open desert. Mr. Mace also helped us, as before, in every stage of the work, both in Egypt and England, with the greatest care and zeal. For the field work I took the cemeteries nearest to our quarters, as I had to see to general affairs as well; while Mr. MacIver took sites on one side and Mr. Mace on the other. Our men were mainly the good staff which I recruited at Koptos six years before, and which have worked with me at each site since then—trusty hands, who know how to preserve all they find. The business of marking things and copying the hundreds of signs found on pottery fell to Miss Orme and my wife; and Miss Lawes made drawings of the large number of new forms of pottery, as well as other objects. For a month Mr. Iles was with us studying Arabic, and gave me some assistance. Thus we had altogether an active working party, and succeeded in clearing several large cemeteries, scattered at intervals along the edge of the desert. Altogether, about 1,250 graves of the prehistoric age and about as many historic graves—mainly about the XIIth Dynasty—were opened and recorded.

Now, how far does all this work change our point of view, and put us in a different position towards historical subjects? That is the main test of success in excavations. We started with the advantage of having an extensive *corpus* of the forms of prehistoric pottery ready for reference, the produce of my work at Nagada four years before. This gave a notation for 750 forms, and we added 150 more to that *corpus* during our work. By this means every jar in each grave, and generally even fragments of pottery, were exactly recorded. And having thus such a mass of observations, as well as those made less completely on some 2,500 graves at Nagada, it was possible to deal with the best and most complete graves in a systematic manner, which had never yet been attempted for any country.

Thus the method of "sequence dates" has been developed. To take an illustration: If in some old country mansion one room after another had been locked up untouched at the

death of each successive owner, then on comparing all the contents it would easily be seen which rooms were of consecutive dates; and no one could suppose a Regency room to belong between Mary and Anne, or an Elizabethan room to come between others of George III. The order of the rooms could be settled to a certainty on comparing all the furniture and objects. Each would have some links of style in common with those next to it, and much less connection with others which were farther from its period. And we should soon frame the rule that the order of the rooms was that in which each variety or article should have as short a range of date as it could. Any error in arranging the rooms would certainly extend the periods of things over a longer number of generations.

This principle applies to graves as well as to rooms, to pottery as well as to furniture. Having all our material so exactly denoted, according to so many minute varieties, we are able to frame extensive statistical tests for classifying it, and to deal with it by the arithmetical as well as the artistic arrangement.

The final outcome of all this work is that a card catalogue of over 900 graves, on as many card slips, has been reduced to a near approximation to the original order of the graves. Such a catalogue is, however, very cumbrous for reference, when we want to settle the relative position of any fresh tombs. A portable notation for it becomes needful. The whole series is therefore divided in, say, fifty equal parts, each part representing an equal amount of burials. These, for convenience, I numbered from 30 to 80. Thus we have a system just as convenient as a scale of years, and every kind of object can be relatively dated in it.

From the order of the graves, as found by the pottery, I have obtained the history of the development of stone vases, ivories, and the working of flint and metal, for even the earliest of these tombs contain copper. And having done that, a new piece of history becomes apparent in the great change that passed over every kind of work at one point of the scale, about a quarter through the prehistoric

age that we are studying. A new tribe seems to have come in with very different notions.

One of the most curious differences is that the older people largely used signs which are the forerunners of the Mediterranean alphabets, while the later people ignored such signs. The earlier people used no amulets; the later used amulets, several of which came down to the historic times. The use of a forehead pendant and face veil seems also to belong only to the later people. The characteristic pottery of the earlier people is closely like the Kabyle pottery at present; the later people had some pottery almost identical with that of South Palestine in historic times. All these indications point to the earlier being a Libyan population, overlaid later by an eastern migration. These results we have only reached in the last few weeks.

I hope that now it is clear what a great step we have made historically in the mode of reducing the prehistoric chaos into orderly sequence, and in tracing changes in the civilisation of such ages. All this is due to the full registration of everything found in the hundreds of graves opened this year.

In other lines we have also reaped a good harvest. The cemeteries of the VIth—XIIth Dynasties have given us the history of alabaster vases and of beads. The cemeteries of the XIIIth—XVIIth Dynasties have shown the development of pottery, as yet unknown, and splendid dated examples of XIVth Dynasty copper work, which fix the forms of daggers and axes. An entirely fresh invasion of Egypt by Libyans at the close of the XIIth Dynasty has been traced; several kinds of objects known before, but without dates, have taken their historical position, and we have a sample of the civilisation of the Libyan tribes at about 2000 B.C. And coming down to Roman times, we have found the continuance of a longer and fuller alphabet of Asia Minor in an inscription scratched by a Roman legionary at the camp of Diospolis. If every five hundred pounds spent in excavating cleared up as much history as this, we should soon cry out for more ages to unveil.

The material results were also satisfactory. The Cairo Museum is richer by a splendid dagger with silver rosettes, bearing the very rare name of SUAZENRA, a king of the XIVth Dynasty, and some other fine objects were also claimed there. In England we have exhibited a long series of objects which are now mainly divided between America and the Colonies, while the finest portrait-head known of Roman times is now in the British Museum.

To the future we now turn. We have already received from the Egyptian Government Committee the promise of a permission to work at Abydos, a site which, despite all that has been ravished from it, is yet the most important for history. There we may hope to connect together firmly the prehistoric sequence that we have now established on to the beginning of the historic times. Within our ground are a dozen different enterprises awaiting careful work. And we may hope, by means of the vigorous attention and registration to which our party are all now accustomed, that the orderly development of Egyptian civilisation will be fully traced. I anticipate that some years will not exhaust all the store of information that has to be recovered on that ground.

And most welcome news has lately arrived. Prof. Maspero returns to Egypt to resume the direction of the Department of Antiquities. When I look back more than ten years to the days of his former direction, and remember the perfect confidence with which I could trust his impartial feeling and his wish to help forward research, when I recall our uninterrupted friendship in the years since then, I feel that no change could have been more happy than that which again places at the helm so great a scholar and so true a man.

Judge BAYLIS proposed and Mr. F. W. PERCIVAL seconded a vote of thanks to the Chairman, which was carried by acclamation. The proceedings then terminated.

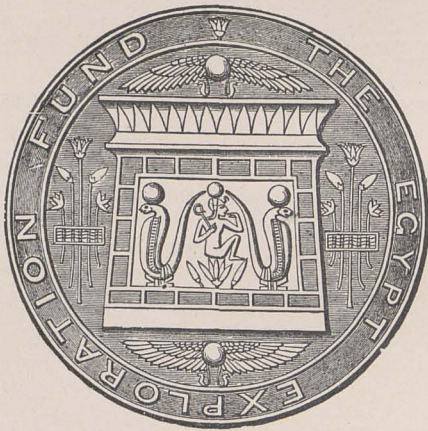

Report of the Fourteenth Ordinary General Meeting.

(EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.)

THE FOURTEENTH ORDINARY GENERAL MEETING of the EGYPT EXPLORATION FUND since its incorporation as a Society (the eighteenth since the foundation of the Fund in 1882) was held on Wednesday afternoon, November 7th, 1900, in the Theatre of the Geological Museum, Jermyn Street; Sir John Evans, K.C.B., D.C.L., LL.D., F.R.S., F.S.A. (President), in the Chair.

There were present: Mr. H. A. Grueber, Hon. Treasurer; Mr. James S. Cotton, Hon. Secretary; Mr. A. S. Murray; Prof. W. M. Flinders Petrie; Lord Halsbury; Sir Charles Lyall; Sir W. T. Charley, Q.C.; Dr. R. N. Cust; Dr. Gladstone; Dr. E. W. Berridge; the Rev. F. C. Norton; the Rev. T. C. Cree; Mr. John Ward; Lady Evans; Mrs. Tirard; Miss Emily Paterson, Secretary; &c., &c.

The proceedings were opened by the CHAIRMAN, who called upon the Secretary to read the minutes of the last meeting. After the minutes had been read and approved, the following names of Members of Committee retiring by rotation, who offered themselves for re-election, were announced:

Retiring Members of Committee.—Gen. Sir Charles Wilson, Mr. W. E. Crum, Mr. Arthur John Evans, Mr. F. G. Hilton-Price, Mr. Somers Clarke, Rev. W. MacGregor, Miss Brodrick (Boston), Mr. J. G. Kenyon, and Mr. E. M. Underdown, Q.C.

Mr. Arthur Cates was elected in place of Mr. John Horniman, who retired.

Dr. ROBERT CUST moved and the Rev. FRANCIS C. NORTON seconded the re-election of the retiring Members, and the election of Mr. Cates, also the re-election of Mr. James Hilton and the election of Mr. Hellier Gosselin as Hon. Auditors.

The CHAIRMAN then called upon the Hon. Treasurer (Mr. H. A. Grueber) to read his Report.

FINANCIAL REPORT OF THE HON. TREASURER FOR 1899—1900.

In submitting to you my annual statement of the finances of the Egypt Exploration Fund and its Branches, my feelings are of a somewhat qualified character, as in one branch (that of the Exploration Fund) I have again to admit of an excess of expenditure over income; but, as you will learn, this excess could not well have been foreseen when last year I submitted my Budget to the Committee of the Fund.

Taking the Accounts in their usual order, I will first submit to you the chief items of that of the Exploration Fund.

On this Account the total disbursements for 1899—1900 have been £2,733 4s. 10d., as follows:—

(1) By Expeditions' Account, £1,658 14s. 5d., which sum is divided between the work at Deir el Bahari and Prof. Petrie's expedition, which was last year at Abydos; viz., £501 5s. 9d. for the former and £1,157 8s. 8d. for the latter. The outlay on Deir el Bahari, besides Mr. Howard Carter's

salary and expenses for the short time that he was in the Fund's service during last season, and other small items for guards, telegrams, &c., has been £357 11s. 1d. for wages and £45 3s. 4d. for building materials. These building materials were used for the reparation of the Temple, and the wages were those of the men who were employed on the work. I am glad to say that this reparation is completed; and I think the Fund owes Mr. Howard Carter a deep debt of gratitude for gratuitously supervising the work to the end, even after his receiving the appointment of Inspector of Antiquities. I have had so frequently to bring before you this question of reparation, that I assure you it is a relief to me to feel that we have at last seen it through.

Our work at Deir el Bahari is, however, not quite finished, as M. Naville will have to go out during the coming winter to check the last of the drawings, and he will take this opportunity for emptying a well on the north side of the Temple, which he could not do on previous occasions. The Committee estimate that the cost will not exceed in all £200.

The items of the expenditure on Prof. Petrie's expedition to Abydos are precisely similar to those of last year; viz., £507 3s. 9d. for excavations; £364 os. 6d. for his salary, and travelling, &c., expenses; £100 for his assistant, Mr. Mace; £95 os. 9d. for transport and packing; £18 9s. 4d. for Museum and other expenses; and £72 14s. 4d., being balance due for 1898-9 for packing antiquities, &c., which, though incurred before our accounts were closed on the 31st July, could not be paid as the bills had not been sent in.

(2) By Publications we have spent £806 os. 11d. This is an unusually large amount; but besides the proportional charges in the Archaeological and Annual Reports, two volumes have been issued by Prof. Petrie, *Denderveh* and the *Royal Tombs*. The latter, which relates to last season's work at Abydos and which has not been entirely paid for, was pushed forward so as to appear during the exhibition at University College in July last.

(3) Lastly, besides a small expenditure on photographs and slides of £21 10s. 3d., there has been the usual outlay connected with rent of office, salaries of officers, printing, postage, &c., which makes together £246 19s. 3d.

All the above items are so evenly balanced with those of the expeditions of previous years that they need no special comment.

The total receipts over the same period have been £2,551 9s. 7d., viz.—

(1) By subscriptions from English subscribers, £984 6s. 8d.; from the Boston office in America, £751 17s.; and from the affiliated Branches of the Fund in the United States—Philadelphia, £250, which includes a special donation of £100 for Abydos; New York, £101 19s. 6d., also a special donation for Abydos from Mrs. Thompson; and Chicago, £1 1s.; these making a total of £2,089 4s. 2d.

(2) By sale of publications in England and America we have received £191 7s. 11d., and from the Atlas of Ancient Egypt and photographs, £1 10s. 11d.

(3) From dividends on Consols and India 3 per cent. Stock, £55 6s. 11d.

(4) And lastly, we carried over from last year the sum of £213 19s. 8d., being the balance of the grant of the Society for the Protection of Ancient Monuments in Egypt for the reparation of the Temple at Deir el Bahari.

From these items it will be seen that the Fund's expenditure has exceeded its receipts by the sum of £181 15s. 3d.; but against this deficit we may place the contribution which is due from the affiliated Branch at Chicago, and which should be, as promised, £150. I have very good reasons for stating that we may soon expect to receive this delayed payment. The money has been promised and it only needs asking for, but not on this side of the Atlantic. Our receipts also on the sale of publications are over £100 less than they were last year. This source of income is the most unstable of any. It is, however, to be noted that, thanks to our active Hon. Secretary and Vice-President in America, Dr. Winslow,

and to our good friends at home, the subscriptions show no falling off, but a slight increase. I regret to have to add that the affiliated Branch at New York, which was so recently established, is no longer existing. As most of our subscribers living in New York had for years sent their subscriptions through Dr. Winslow, they desired to make no change, and it was therefore thought better to discontinue the Branch of the Fund in that city. I need scarcely say that New York still receives its quota of objects distributed.

Next in order comes the statement of accounts of the Archaeological Survey. The total disbursements of the Survey during 1899—1900 have been £538 9s., of which sum £170 7s. 8d. was for the salary and expenses of Mr. N. de G. Davies connected with his survey of Sheikh Saïd and Dêr el Gebrawi; £302 11s. for publications, which, besides a proportional expenditure on the Archaeological and Annual Reports, includes the cost of plates for the two volumes, *Beni Hasan IV.*, and *Ptahhetep I.*; and £65 10s. 4d. for *pro rata* Office expenses, salaries, postage, &c. The receipts, on the other hand, have been: (1) from subscriptions, English and American, £437 6s. 4d.; from publications, £52 16s. 11d.; from advertisements, £1 0s. 2d.; and from interest on deposit, £12 16s., making a total of £503 19s. 11d. We have in consequence an excess of expenditure of £34 9s. 1d. over receipts.

Comparing this account with that of last year, I regret to say there has been a falling off on the two principal items of receipts, the subscriptions and publications. On the former there is a deficiency of about £80, and the amount realised by the sale of publications is only one-third of what it was in the previous year. This is a very serious position, as it is particularly desirable that this Branch of the Fund should not fail, especially as Mr. Griffith, who so ably superintends it, gratuitously devotes so much energy and time to its publications.

Our next account is that of the Graeco-Roman Branch. Here, as no expedition was organised, our expenditure comes

under two items only; viz., publications £645 11s. 3d., and proportionate rent of office, salaries, postage, &c., £94 11s. 1d., making a total of £740 2s. 4d. In the publications, besides a part payment for the Archaeological and Annual Reports, we have paid for the second volume of the *Oxyrhynchus Papyri*, and made a part payment on that on the *Fayûm Towns*, which will be in the subscribers' hands in a few days.

The receipts, on the other hand, have amounted to £741 3s. 11d., being £542 8s. 6d. by subscriptions, English and American; £177 13s. 3d. by sale of publications; and £21 2s. 2d. for advertisements and interest on deposit; making a total of £741 3s. 11d. This enables us to carry over the small balance of £1 1s. 7d., which is very small as compared with the amount carried over last year; viz., over £290.

Again I have to draw your attention to a considerable falling off in the subscriptions and in the sale of publications; and I must therefore appeal for your support on behalf of the Branch as well as for the Survey, especially as we have organised another expedition for the coming season, which will cost quite £500.

Lastly, from the General Balance Sheet it will be seen that the total assets of the Exploration Fund, the Archaeological Survey, and the Graeco-Roman Branch together amounted, on the 31st July last, to £3,806 5s. 3d., which consisted of £1,000 Consols (at cost £944 8s.); £1,000 India 3 per Cent. Stock (at cost £1,082 13s. 6d.); deposit at the Bank, £700; current account, £1,041 2s. 9d.; petty cash, £11 2s. 8d.; and at Messrs. Cook and Sons, £26 18s. 4d. This sum of £3,806 5s. 3d. is to be appropriated as follows:— To the Exploration Fund, £2,150 17s. 9d.; to the Archaeological Survey, £621 4s. 5d.; and to the Graeco-Roman Branch, £1,004 3s. 1d.

In conclusion, I have again to thank you, on behalf of the Committee, for your generous support, which from the facts I have mentioned you will quite see that we shall need this year as much as ever before. I have already mentioned that Mr. Grenfell and Mr. Hunt are about to proceed, on behalf

of the Graeco-Roman Branch, to the Fayûm in search of Papyri; and Prof. Petrie will continue his work at Abydos. On behalf of the Survey there will be no Expedition.

In addition to these, we shall have a heavy expenditure on publications, as there remain several volumes to come on the Temple at Deir el Bahari, and it is very desirable that Prof. Petrie's account of his work should not be delayed.

The Rev. T. G. CREE moved and Dr. BERRIDGE seconded the adoption of the Financial Report.

The CHAIRMAN put to the meeting this resolution, which was carried unanimously.

THE HON. SECRETARY'S REPORT, 1899—1900.

Ladies and Gentlemen,—Though we are an English society, and our General Meetings are necessarily held in England, my first duty on these occasions is to acknowledge how largely we are indebted to American support. From the Hon. Treasurer's statement, you will have learned that nearly half our aggregate income for the past year comes from the United States. On this I may remark that the American subscriptions, as entered in our accounts, represent net income after deducting the cost of collection, so that the gross amount of these subscriptions is really larger than appears. I would also add that, since the close of the financial year, one of our subscribers in Philadelphia has given a donation of 250 dollars to each branch of the Fund, making a total of £150.

During the past year the only affiliated branch in America that has paid the stipulated contribution of £150 is that of Philadelphia, which is represented on our Committee by Mrs. Stevenson. From her, indeed, we have received nearly double what was promised. From Chicago nothing has come; but this omission may be regarded as accidental, being due entirely to the continued absence of Prof. Breasted

on work in the Egyptian museums in Europe. I have received more than one assurance, from sources upon which I can rely, that the requisite funds are in existence and that the deficiency will soon be made good. So confident are the Committee of this that, when distributing the antiquities from Abydos, they did not hesitate to award a full share to Chicago. The New York State Branch, I am sorry to say, has ceased to exist, after a life of little more than one year. This disappearance of a local organisation is, of course, a subject for regret, especially to myself who had some hand in its foundation. But we have reason to believe that most of our New York subscribers will continue their support through our Boston office. Against this loss may be set off the formation of a new branch at Newhaven, Conn., the home of Yale University, and the continued activity of minor branches at Pittsburg, Detroit, and Milwaukee. These, I should explain, are not fully developed branches affiliated to us in London, but local centres in connection with our Boston office. The increased work thus thrown upon our Secretary at Boston has caused our representatives there to suggest an augmentation of her salary, to which the Committee readily assented. It is to the efficiency of the Boston office, not only for collecting money, but also for distributing publications and for maintaining friendly relations with widely scattered subscribers, that we owe, to a large degree, our success in America.

Before quitting this part of the subject, I must be allowed to supplement what the President has said by recording my personal sorrow for the death of Mr. Charles Dudley Warner, our Vice-President in America *honoris causâ*. During my visit to the United States in 1897 he entertained me in his hospitable house at Hartford, and I found his influence of much use to me, not only in New York, but as far west as Chicago.

Instead of going through the year's history of each of the three branches of the Fund, I propose on the present occasion to call attention to certain departments of our work generally. We are, of course, primarily an exploring Society, and in

this capacity we are accustomed to send out three parties to Egypt every winter. But it may not always be sufficiently recognised that we are also a great publishing Society. During the last year we spent altogether on publication no less than £1,754. Besides the Annual Report and the Archaeological Report, which we send free to every subscriber to each branch, we have issued in the past twelve months five large volumes. Two of these represent the work of Prof. Petrie—*Denderah* and *The Royal Tombs of the First Dynasty*; two show the energy of Mr. Griffith in overtaking the arrears of the Archaeological Survey; the fifth is the annual volume of the Graeco-Roman Branch. In the next twelve months we propose to publish almost as much. For the Fund proper we shall have either another part of M. Naville's *Deir el Bahari* or Prof. Petrie's *Diöspolis Parva*; while Prof. Petrie hopes to describe the results of this winter's work at Abydos in another volume, to appear contemporaneously with his exhibition at University College next July. So, again, with the Archaeological Survey, Mr. Griffith has another volume far advanced and the materials collected for two more. The Graeco-Roman Branch can always depend upon the punctuality of Messrs. Grenfell and Hunt, though, from the quantity of papyri which they have accumulated, it has not yet been settled what their forthcoming volume shall consist of. And as I have mentioned their names, I cannot refrain from congratulating them on being the first recipients of the new "research" degree of Doctor of Letters from the University of Oxford. In addition to all this, we have in hand a fourth and revised edition of M. Naville's *Pithom*, which opened our long series of publications in such a memorable way; and also Mr. Crum's *Coptic Ostraca*. I think we may further claim credit for the promptitude of our publications. Last summer Prof. Petrie brought out a volume with sixty-seven plates within three months after he had returned from excavating at Abydos. And I venture to say that no collection of Greek papyri has ever been made known to the learned world so quickly after its discovery as that from Oxyrhynchus. To each subscriber

of £1 (or five dollars) we present a handsome illustrated volume. I doubt whether any other purely publishing Society gives more for the money. It is only what remains over from each £1, after defraying the cost of publication, that we are able to devote to our primary duty of exploration.

The other department of our work of which I wish to speak is the distribution of antiquities. This is a duty which the Committee performs with a full sense of responsibility, especially towards the subscribers in America, with whom we have entered into a formal undertaking that antiquities shall be distributed in strict proportion to subscriptions received. It seems right, therefore, that I should take this opportunity of making public the complete list of institutions among which our share of the spoils of Abydos has been divided:—In the United Kingdom—the British Museum, the Natural History Museum, the South Kensington Museum, the Ashmolean and Pitt-Rivers Museums at Oxford, the Fitzwilliam Museum at Cambridge, Owens College at Manchester, the Science and Art Museum at Edinburgh, and local museums at Belfast, Bolton, Bootle, Bristol, Dewsbury, Dundee, Glasgow, Greenock, Liverpool, St. Helens, and Warrington. In America—the Metropolitan Museum at New York, the Museum of Fine Arts at Boston, the University Museums of Philadelphia, Chicago, Yale, and Leland Stanford in California, and local museums at Detroit, Milwaukee, and Pittsburg. On this occasion, too, we thought it proper to send specimens of Prof. Petrie's important finds to some of the principal Egyptological museums on the continent—at Paris, Berlin, Strasburg, Munich, Vienna, Brussels, and Berne. The number of *ushabtis* brought home was so large that we are enabled for the first time to make presents of them to individual subscribers.

During this very week the Committee has carried out its first distribution of some of the Greek papyri from Oxyrhynchus, dealing only with those for which the editors have no further use. In this case we have taken into consideration

the desirability of finding a home for the papyri in libraries where they are likely to be consulted by scholars. The British share has been divided between the British Museum, the Bodleian, and the University libraries at Cambridge, Dublin, Edinburgh, Glasgow, and St. Andrews; while samples have been allotted to Owens College, the Royal Holloway College, and the following public schools:—Eton, Harrow, Winchester, Rugby, Clifton, Bradfield, Repton, and Haileybury. For the Colonies, we have selected the Universities of Melbourne and Toronto. In the United States—the Universities of Pennsylvania, Harvard, Yale, Columbia (New York), Johns Hopkins (Baltimore), Chicago, Princeton, Hamilton, and Vassar (a ladies' college).

I conclude with a brief report on the Archaeological Survey, quoted, as on former occasions, in the words of the Superintendent, Mr. Griffith:—

“The work of the Archaeological Survey last year covered a wide area in Egypt; and, in spite of the fact of the Surveyor, Mr. N. de G. Davies, being single-handed, it was very successful. The Sheikh Saïd group of tombs—where a good deal of work had been done by the expedition of 1893, under Mr. Percy E. Newberry—was thoroughly investigated, additional clearances were made, and the inscriptions re-copied. The plans had already been made by Mr. J. E. Newberry. This group will provide the material for one volume. The Dêr el Gebrawi group, examined and partly copied by the members of Mr. Newberry's expedition, has been thoroughly re-examined, and the whole traced afresh. New material was found in the Western tomb. Another and very interesting volume will be the result of this work. The tombs at Kôm el Ahmar, otherwise Zauyet el Maiyitîn, in which Lepsius copied many scenes of the greatest interest, are now almost entirely destroyed, and afford nothing worth mentioning. On the other hand, Mr. Davies copied a good deal at Tehneh, but the publication of this group is already undertaken independently of us by Mr. G. W. Fraser. A discovery worth notice, though belonging to a period outside the limits of the season's

programme, was that of a new boundary stela of Akhenaten's city—the most northerly yet discovered on the eastern side. Like most of the others, it is much shattered.

“Not less successful have been our efforts in publication. *Beni Hasan*, Part IV., was issued in July, and at almost the same time appeared the first part of Mr. Davies' memoir on *The Mastaba of Ptahhetep and Akhethetep*. We have reason to believe that both of these volumes have given pleasure to the subscribers, and we anticipate a good sale for them. A third volume, containing the tomb sculpture of Akhethetep, is practically finished, and should be in the hands of the subscribers early next year. We have thus gone far towards clearing off the arrears of publication which had accumulated owing to lack both of funds and workers. We look forward to discharging all our obligations in the next eighteen months with the issue of two more memoirs on Sheikh Said and Dêr el Gebrâwi respectively; but we must beg the public to support our endeavour by providing more funds, the drain on account of publication being very heavy. This year Mr. Davies will devote himself entirely to the preparation of the materials for the new volumes. In November, 1901, I hope he will start upon a new expedition, and it is very desirable that enough money should then be forthcoming to provide him with help in the work which he has hitherto done with such admirable results, during two years of dogged and solitary labour.”

The Chairman then called upon Prof. Petrie for his Address.

PROF. PETRIE'S ADDRESS.

Step by step the past is won back to us, and the mysterious ages, which no man ever hoped to know again, are laid bare before us. The Homeric age, which was to our childhood the shadowy realm of heroes, stands

now revealed as being but the decadence of a greater glory which dazzles us at Tiryns, at Mykenae, and still more at Knossos. The Kings of Rome, who fascinated us in school books with a misty past, no one would care now to discredit, in sight of the inscription of their age and the remains of a far older Rome before them.

And how great and hopeless a mystery clung to the beginnings of old Egypt! How many controversies have waged over Manetho! And now from the Royal Tombs of Abydos we have seen and handled this summer the drinking bowls and furniture of the kings of the Ist Dynasty, even the property of Mena himself, the first king of united Egypt. The early kings, whom we had scarcely believed in—even Mena, who had been proclaimed a mythical version of the Cretan Ninos and the Indian Manu—come now before us as real and as familiarly as the kings of the XXXth Dynasty, or of Saxon England. Never before has nearly the whole of a dynasty been opened to us at once to examine and to verify; never has so much of Egyptian history been proved monumentally in a few months; never has so remote a period been brought so completely before us as it has been in our work this year at Abydos.

And how do Manetho and the state history of Seti bear the test? Five kings we can already identify out of the eight recorded for the Ist Dynasty. Those five are proved to have been recorded in their correct order, although the time of the Ist Dynasty was so remote from even that of Seti that all the names had become slightly altered by transmission. When we remember that the Ist Dynasty was older to Seti than the Exodus is to us, we may pardon such trivial corruptions, and can only wonder that the historical value of the lists has been so unflinchingly confirmed. If all that we can check proves this correct, we are bound to accept the whole history as honest and genuine.

Now that we are no longer afraid of our own rashness in assigning anything to a date before the IVth Dynasty—now that we can deal with the earliest periods, back to the first entry of agricultural man into Egypt,—we can see more

of the perspective of history. We see Palæolithic man scattering his massive flint weapons, until the age of Nile mud (beginning about 7,000 B.C.) made agriculture possible, and a Caucasian race ousted the Palæolithic folks, whose portraits were left us in the figures found in the earliest graves. We see this oldest race of man to have been of the Hottentot type, but even more hairy than the Hottentot, with the traces of his original northern habitation not yet wiped off by tropical suns. Then we see a rapidly rising civilisation already knowing metals linked with the modern Kabyle, both by bodily formation and by existing products. Next, after some dozen generations, we can trace strong Eastern or Semitic influence, which carried on this civilisation to a higher point in many respects; and then decay set in, and the first cycle that we can trace was completed. The next cycle began with the entry of the Dynastic race from the Red Sea, possessing the elements of hieroglyphic writing, and far more artistic sense and power than the earlier people. In some three or four centuries they had gradually conquered and invaded all the races scattered through Egypt—long-haired, short-haired, bearded and unbearded, clothed and unclothed,—and the first king of all Egypt, who founded his new capital at the mouth of the valley, was Mena. The era of consolidation which preceded him is stated by Manetho as the Dynasty of ten kings of Abydos, who reigned for 300 years; it was a time of rapidly increasing civilisation, during which most of the main features of Egyptian language, life, and art were stamped for 5,000 years to come. From the Royal Tombs of Abydos, we can see now how this art rose to its finest age in the middle of the first Dynasty, and was decaying and becoming cheaper and more common by the end of that time. Probably we shall see that this cycle was fading, when some new impetus gave birth to the colossal ages of the pyramid builders. That grand period we now see to have been the third cycle of civilisation and art, which was renewed again and again until we may see in the brilliance of the Fatimite Dynasty the seventh of the great eras of Egypt.

Seven cycles of civilisation, a thousand years or more apart, take us back to the beginnings, with strides for which our two cycles in Europe, the classical and the mediæval, scarcely prepare us.

Such is the wider aspect of human history which the work solely of English exploration in Egypt now puts before you. It may be safely said that there has never been a greater extension of knowledge of man's past in any decade than the discoveries of the last five years have unfolded. The task of laying out in order the rise and progress of one of the great civilisations of the past is now nearly accomplished. In Egypt, details yet await us; but the main lines are all marked out, and our work of the future is to complete the picture of which we now have the full extent before us.

What now will occupy the coming winter is the exploration of the remaining Royal Tombs. There are yet as many of these tombs to be studied as those which I examined last winter. Unhappily, the turning over which this site has suffered at other hands during the previous four years is nothing but a detriment and loss to our historical knowledge. The removal of many of the finest objects, mostly sold to dealers, has been a terrible loss which can never be retrieved; and this unhappy place needs all the care and insight that can possibly be given to it, in order to recover the history of the beginnings of the Egyptian kingdom. Happily our relations with the great scholar who now directs the Department of Antiquities are as frank and cordial as possible, and we enjoy whatever facilities in our arrangements are permitted by the terms of the laws under which our work must be carried on.

To turn to the publications. You have all received the volume on the *Royal Tombs*, containing some sixty plates, with full text, which was published in less than seven months from the beginning of the excavations. Since issuing that work I have prepared the volumes on the previous year's work, *Diospolis Parva*, which gives the full working out of the long pre-historic age of Egypt, and much of the historic times. It will contain forty-eight plates, with full text, showing the

relative age of every variety of the pottery, stone, ivory, flint, metal, &c., of the pre-historic time. This will, I hope, be in your hands by next spring. And the work in Egypt will be so arranged that I may promise you that the volumes on the coming winter's results will be ready next summer at the Exhibition. Meanwhile much first-class material of historic age is accumulating on our hands, mainly from Mr. Mace's and Mr. McIver's work at Abydos; and, in despair at their own generosity, the Committee cannot, I believe, resolve to give you all that as well as those other fat volumes, but will have to issue an extra volume, which must pay for itself. The extra plates issued for *Denderah* have proved a full success, and the edition is already quite exhausted; so the overflowing surplus of our work will have again to appear as an extra volume. Compared with the cost of the publications issued by other nationalities, we may safely say that each subscriber gets already an annual volume at half-price.

One word more. The whole of this year's great results are a proof on the largest scale of the shameful futility of excavating by merely driving a gang of workmen. Everything that I have brought to light, all the history that has been unfolded, has already been cast aside as worthless in the course of recent years' work on the bad old system. All that has been recovered after that wreck is entirely due to the trained eyes and the minute attention of men and boys who were individually looked after, and who were rewarded piece by piece for everything they found. It is nothing but the *bakhshish* system of reward for results, which has recovered the Ist Dynasty before our eyes after the old style of mere compulsion had utterly failed to rescue a single historic evidence. And I have little doubt that in other sites which have been worked on the old defective ways there remains the greater part of the historic harvest yet to be reaped. Certainly there could not be a more complete demonstration of the failure of the bad system and the success of the true co-operation with the workers than is before you in the rescued history of the Royal Tombs of Abydos.

THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Before proceeding to discuss some of the work that has been effected by the Fund and some of the progress that has been made in Egyptology in general during the past twelve months, I must say a few words with respect to a few of the better known subscribers to the Fund, whom death has removed from among us.

In Professor John Ruskin we have lost a man of world-wide reputation, a poet and an artist, whose influence on contemporary thought and art it would be difficult to estimate. His sympathies were wide and his knowledge extensive, but perhaps Egyptology came in rather as an accessory with him to other studies than as an absorbing subject. With but feeble health, but with a most active mind, he attained to the age of eighty, having published his work on *Modern Painters* so long ago as 1843.

Mr. James John Garth Wilkinson was born in 1812, and was, like Ruskin, a voluminous writer, especially occupying himself in making the works of Swedenborg accessible to the British public. His first publication was, I believe, a translation of Swedenborg's *Animal Kingdom*, which appeared in 1843; and his last *The Book of Edda, called Voluspá*, which bears date 1897.

General Augustus Henry Lane Fox Pitt-Rivers was born in 1827, and served with distinction in the Crimean War. He is, however, much better known as an antiquary and anthropologist than as a soldier. The magnificent Pitt-Rivers collection presented by him to the University of Oxford will be a lasting monument of his skill in tracing the evolution of form and ornament, of his faculty of judicious collecting, and at the same time of his liberality. In 1880 he inherited the large Wiltshire estates of his great-uncle, Lord Rivers, which are replete with Romano-British and earlier remains, and these he proceeded to investigate in the most thorough manner, embodying the results of his

excavations in four profusely illustrated quarto volumes. The objects found, together with models of various earthworks and with other collections, are deposited in an admirable Museum founded by General Pitt-Rivers at Farnham, Dorset. Of course, his collection comprised no small number of choice Egyptian relics. He had himself visited Egypt in 1881, and a discovery he then made (to which I shall shortly have occasion to refer) formed the subject of a paper communicated to the Anthropological Institute, and was again described by General Pitt-Rivers in his address to the Royal Archaeological Institute in 1897. His health had long been failing, but his decease leaves a gap in the archaeological world which it will be impossible to fill.

Mr. Charles Dudley Warner, our Vice-President *honoris causâ*, died suddenly at Hartford, Connecticut, on October 20th, in his 72nd year. He was one of the earliest promoters of the Egypt Exploration Fund, having probably taken a special interest in Egypt in consequence of passing a winter on the Nile about the year 1876, a record of which he embodied in a book entitled *Mummies and Moslems*. It was, I believe, at his instigation that Miss Edwards undertook her lecturing tour in America some years ago that led to the awakening of the study of Egyptology in the United States—a study which has there made such remarkable progress. Mr. Warner was a lively and voluminous writer, and though never actively engaged in the work of the Fund, was always deeply interested in its undertakings, and was ever ready in any difficult question of administration to give us the benefit of his advice, which we were always safe in following.

Turning now to the more immediate subject on which I have to address you, I may observe that research in Egypt seems never to have been prosecuted with a greater degree of activity than it has been during the past season.

The return of Prof. Maspero to his post as Director of the Department of Antiquities in Egypt has been welcomed by all, and new energy has been infused into the Ghizeh Museum about to be transferred to its new quarters at Khasr en Nil, close to Cairo. An Egyptological Reference

Library formerly belonging to the late Prof. Ebers has been acquired; active inspectors have been appointed, and, according to Mr. Quibell, some 600 objects have been added to the collection in the Museum.

Explorations have been carried on for the Berlin Museum, for the University of California on several spots, by the Marquis of Northampton, by Messrs. Gayet, Steindorff, Chassinat, and others; our own excavations, as well as those of the Egyptian Research Account, having been made under the care of Prof. Flinders Petrie. These last were at and near Abydos, to some extent in ground already partially examined by M. Amélineau, and an account of the results obtained, so far as the Royal Tombs are concerned, is already in the hands of the subscribers to the Fund.

This important volume, illustrated by nearly seventy plates, has been brought out with wonderful promptitude, everything having been put in the printer's hands within eighteen weeks from the beginning of the excavations. This promptitude almost rivals that of Thomas Heywoode, who, in 1624, at the end of his *Gunaikeion*, a folio of 466 pages, inscribed, "Opus Excogitatum, Inchoatum, Explicitum, Et à Typographo excusum, inter septemdecem septimanas."

The importance of the volume rests on the amount of light which the excavations have thrown on the obscure history of the kings of the Ist Dynasty; and considering the fact that Abydos had been already explored by Mariette and had for the last four years been in the hands of the *Mission Amélineau*, Prof. Flinders Petrie is much to be congratulated on what he has been able to effect. Inscriptions relating to nearly all the kings of the Ist Dynasty have been secured, and the order of their succession on the throne has, at least so far as half of them are concerned, been firmly established, and it is satisfactory to find that so far as three of the kings whose identity is certain, the order of Manetho is confirmed.

It would be superfluous to attempt to give any abstract of the contents of the volume, but the sealings of the different kings, their steles, the forms of the pottery of the Ist Dynasty

and the marks upon it are all amply illustrated. A tabular comparative view of Egyptian prehistoric 1st, XIIth, and XVIIIth Dynasty symbols and those of Crete and Spain shows how much remains to be learnt as to their value, and suggests the possibility of these Egyptian symbols coming some day to the aid of interpreting the mysterious characters on the Cretan clay tablets discovered by my son.

In addition to work on the tombs of the kings, excavations have been carried on under the direction of Prof. Flinders Petrie among monuments dating from the XIIth to the XXXth Dynasty, as well as on prehistoric sites. The details of the results have still to be published. Among the objects brought to England are some flint implements of Palæolithic forms, such as have not infrequently been found on high land adjoining the Valley of the Nile, but as to the age of which some question has arisen. I have already mentioned a discovery made by the late General Pitt-Rivers in 1881. During a stay at Luxor in that year he devoted special attention to the sands and gravels at the mouth of the Bab el Molook in which the tombs of the kings are situated, and in beds about half a mile to the north-east of the Palace and Temple of Rameses II. at El Koorneh, in which numerous tombs had been excavated, he found unquestionable chert flakes and cores and one rough tool embedded in the matrix, which of course must have been deposited long previously to the hardening of the gravel, the erosion of the Waddi and the cutting of the tombs, some of the flakes being actually "chiselled out of the sides of the tombs."

The discovery in Somaliland a few years ago, by Mr. Seton-Karr, of numerous rudely chipped flint and chert implements of distinctly Palæolithic types strengthened the probability of those of analogous form found in Egypt being of Palæolithic age, inasmuch as in Somaliland there seemed to be no association of Neolithic forms with those of apparently far earlier date.¹ Recent discoveries made by M. Louis Gentil at Lac Karâr,² about sixty miles south-west

of Oran in Algeria, increase this probability to the verge of certainty, inasmuch as at that place implements of the same distinctly Palæolithic character have been found associated with the remains of a North African pleistocene fauna, including an elephant which is not the African elephant.

Mr. de Garis Davies has been at work for the Archaeological Survey in the neighbourhood of Sheikh Said and of Minyeh, and some interesting frescoes from tombs in the necropolis of Dêr el Gebrâwi have been traced, and ample material has been gathered for two memoirs of the Survey.

The Graeco-Roman Branch has a volume in the press which will shortly be published, *Fayûm Towns and their Papyri*, which will be found to contain much interesting matter. Among the papyri are some fragments of the *Iliad* and *Odyssey*; of the romance of *Chaereas* and *Callirrhoe*; of a commentary on *Aristotle*; of the *3rd Philippic of Demosthenes*, and of the *1st Book of Euclid*.

The greater part of the papyri, however, consists of what may be termed official documents, some of which date from the second century B.C. It speaks well for Egyptian civilisation to find bankers' receipts dated B.C. 121 and 73, and to learn that tax-collectors sent in their notices even for sums of 4 drachmae in B.C. 124. The fragment of a letter of the Emperor Hadrian may be either a genuine letter or a school-exercise; but it excites great regret that it has not been preserved in a more complete form. The same is the case with the recital of the curious provisions of the Ptolemaic marriage laws. The tax-collectors' reports, their receipts, the subjects of taxation, such as beer, oil, the sale of a cow, the carrying on the trade of a mason or weaver, the leases, even for the half of a perfumery business, the receipts for rent, the cheque on a banker, petitions to the Government, the contract for labour at an oil-press, the notices of births and deaths, the returns of unwatered lands, and the warrant for an arrest, all throw a vivid light upon Egyptian everyday life during the first three centuries of our era. The series of letters from Gemellus to his son Sabinus and other members of his family are equally instructive: "Send to the city

12 drachmas' worth of fish for the little one's four-hundredth day festival;" "Send the fish for Gemella's birthday feast;" "Buy us some presents for the Isis festival;" "Send ten cocks from the market for the Saturnalia, and for Gemella's birthday feast send some delicacies;" "Ask the hunch-backed tanner for the hide of the calf that we sacrificed;" "Make Sisois the carpenter pay up," have that within them that makes the whole world kin.

Eudaemon's request to Longinus to come quickly and bring the *ῥαλον* with him, so that he may clip the coins, is noteworthy; but Agathus in writing to his father to pay him his debt, "that I may not have to send soldiers after you, and you be put in prison till you pay," somewhat belies his name.

Altogether, the volume will be found of passing interest, and Messrs. Grenfell and Hunt may be congratulated, not only on the skill and learning with which they have fulfilled their task, but on the materials with which they have had to deal. The portion relating to the cemeteries of Kôm Ushîm and Ûmm-el-Âtl is by Mr. D. G. Hogarth, while a chapter on the coins previously brought from Karanis and Bacchias is from the pen of Mr. J. Grafton Milne. The first hoard consisted of tetradrachms from Claudius to Lucius Verus; and the latter of 4,421 coins of the same character and period, including no less than 2,757 of Nero. A smaller hoard of 62 tetradrachms, coming down to the time of Hadrian only, was discovered; a fuller account of it is promised for the *Numismatic Chronicle*. The coins found during the past year were not so numerous; but two new varieties are among them. Several leaden pieces have also turned up, and Mr. Milne has called special attention to this curious series that has hardly as yet received the amount of study that it deserves.

I must not dwell longer upon this volume; but it will have been seen from what I have already said that all three branches of the Fund have been in active work during the past year, and are leaving enduring records of their labours. As our Treasurer has told us, the financial condition of the

Survey and the Graeco-Roman Branches is quite satisfactory, while that of the Exploration Fund shows a continuous deficiency, which has in some degree been accounted for. The field of Abydos, which is now open to us, has proved, as was expected, one prolific in results, and it will be sad indeed if our operations are hindered for want of means. A tangible proof of the existence of the Exploration Fund is about to be distributed among all the subscribers, and I venture to hope that the presence of a few Ushabti in their rooms may call the attention of friends to the existence of our Association, and encourage new subscribers to join us in the useful work that we have undertaken.

The collection of interesting objects that during the summer were on view at University College has now been distributed; and the Museums, both national and provincial, of this country have been enriched, as well as many in the United States of America, and on a smaller scale those of Austria, Bavaria, Belgium, Germany, and Switzerland.

Considerable interest was evinced at the *Conversazione* of the Royal Society in a collection, exhibited on behalf of the Fund, of drawings of various mammals and birds, domesticated and otherwise, which illustrated the permanence of certain types among breeds of dogs, horned cattle, and other animals. There are points in Egyptian archaeology which have the closest connection with not only researches in other countries, but with the study of the whole history of civilisation, and there are some of the pictorial monuments which have a direct bearing on more than one branch of Natural History. All recruits to our body, whatever the nature of their studies, will find in our publications and collections something which will open up in them new interests.

Among Egyptological publications of the year, I may call attention to the *Amherst Papyri at Diddington Hall*, by Messrs. P. E. Newberry and W. Crum, which brings into public notice a series of valuable papyri, some 200 in number, that during the last forty years have been collected by Lord Amherst of Hackney. All antiquaries will be

grateful to him for his thus rendering them accessible to study.

A new handbook by Erman and Krebs describes the principal papyri in the Berlin Museum, and Pleyte and Boeser have illustrated the great papyrus of proverbs preserved in the Leyden Museum. Mr. Griffith, in his *Stories of the High Priests of Memphis*, has for the first time published a translation of one of the demotic tales of Sethon, or Setne Khamuast, son of Rameses II.

A third volume of the *Petrie Papyri*, containing documents of the third century B.C., is about to be issued by the Royal Irish Academy, under the editorship of Professor Mahaffy and Mr. Gilbert Smyly. The number of papyri indeed that have of late been rescued from destruction, and the diligence with which they have been studied, have resulted in a special periodical being started exclusively devoted to recording recent discoveries.

The *Archiv für Papyrusforschung* has already reached Part II. of its first volume, and embraces the work, not only of German and other continental students, but of Englishmen labouring in the same field. Various matters connected with the progress of Egyptian studies are well set out in the *Archaeological Report for 1899—1900*, some of which I have already passed under review. It is gratifying to find that steps are being taken to prevent, so far as possible, any further catastrophe among the ruins of the Great Temple of Karnak, and we must all wish M. Legrain success in the important work that he has in hand.

I will not detain you longer, but in conclusion will call attention to a short chapter in the *Report*, "The Palace of Knossos in its Egyptian Relations," written by my son. The intercourse between Egypt and the Ægean in pre-Mycenaean times forms a subject of the highest interest, and the discovery, in the ruins of the early palace in Crete, of a statuette in diorite, belonging probably to the XIIth or XIIIth Dynasty, seems to be of the highest significance.

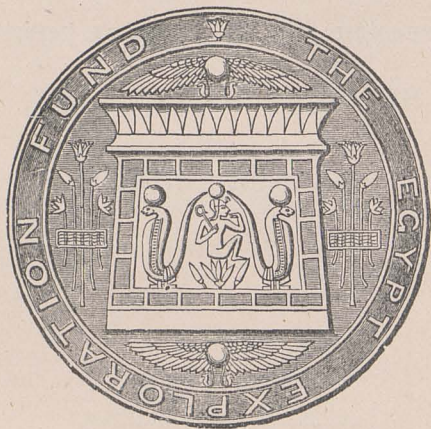

Report of the Fifteenth Ordinary General Meeting.

(NINETEENTH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.)

THE FIFTEENTH ORDINARY GENERAL MEETING of the EGYPT EXPLORATION FUND since its incorporation as a Society (the nineteenth since the foundation of the Fund in 1882) was held on Thursday afternoon, November 7th, 1901, in the room of the Society of Antiquaries, Sir John Evans, K.C.B., D.C.L., LL.D., F.R.S., F.S.A. (President), in the Chair.

There were present: Mr. H. A. Grueber, Hon. Treasurer; Mr. James S. Cotton, Hon. Secretary; Mr. A. S. Murray; Prof. W. M. Flinders Petrie; Sir W. T. Charley, K.C.; Dr. Gladstone; Dr. E. W. Berridge; the Rev. R. A. Bullen; the Rev. J. Marshall; the Rev. F. C. Norton; Mr. D. G. Hogarth; Mr. Robert Sewell; Lady Evans; Mrs. McClure; Mrs. Tirard; Miss Emily Paterson, Secretary, &c., &c.

The proceedings were opened by the CHAIRMAN, who called upon the Secretary to read the minutes of the last meeting. After the minutes had been read and approved, the following names of Members of Committee retiring

by rotation, who offered themselves for re-election, were announced:—

Retiring Members of Committee.—Mr. J. S. Cotton, Lieut.-General Sir Francis Grenfell, Mrs. Griffith, Mr. F. Ll. Griffith, Mr. T. Farmer Hall, Mrs. McClure, Rev. Prof. Sayce, Sir Edward Maunde-Thompson, and Mrs. Tirard.

Mr. Herbert Thompson was nominated in place of Sir Hermann Weber, M.D., who retired.

The Rev. R. A. BULLEN moved and Mr. ROBERT SEWELL seconded the re-election of the retiring Members, and the election of Mr. Herbert Thompson, also the re-election of the Hon. Auditors, Mr. James Hilton and Mr. Hellier Gosselin. The motion was carried unanimously.

The CHAIRMAN then called upon the Hon. Treasurer (Mr. H. A. Grueber) to read his Report.

FINANCIAL REPORT OF THE HON. TREASURER FOR 1900—1901.

The statement of the accounts of the Egypt Exploration Fund and its branches, the Archaeological Survey and the Graeco-Roman Branch, which it is my duty to lay before you to-day, differs in one respect from those of the last two years. On those occasions I had to meet you with an excess of expenditure over income in the case of the Fund proper; but this year, thanks to the generosity of our supporters both at home and on the other side of the Atlantic, I am able to show a much more favourable state of affairs, and to inform you that we shall carry forward to the coming year a very substantial balance. When at our monthly Committee meetings I have had for some time to show an overdraft on the current account of the Fund, it has not been a pleasant task to me. Personally, therefore, I have to thank you for having rescued me, at all events for a while, from this unpleasant position.

It will be within your recollection that last year I informed you that the affiliated branch at New York had ceased to exist;

but this loss is more than compensated by a new branch which has been established at Pittsburg, and from which we have received large contributions. Unfortunately, as the subscriptions came through the Boston Office, I am unable from want of information to give you their precise amount; but these details, with others also not received by me relating to the drafts from Boston, will be supplied shortly, and will appear with the lists of subscriptions at the end of the Report. So far as I can judge, the amount subscribed by Pittsburg to the Fund proper has exceeded £300, and that to the Graeco-Roman Branch over £100.

I will not detain you any longer, but will now submit to you the various accounts in their usual order:—First, that of the Exploration Fund; secondly, that of the Archaeological Survey; thirdly, that of the Graeco-Roman Branch; and lastly, the Balance Sheet.

As to the Exploration Fund. The total disbursements on this account have been £2,351 1s. 8d., which sum is made up as follows:—

(1) By the Expedition Account, £1,443 2s. 10d. This amount was incurred on the work alone at Abydos under Prof. Petrie, as M. Naville was unable to carry out his proposed task at Deir el Bahri. For wages of workmen at Abydos we paid £658 3s. 9d.; Prof. Petrie's salary for the year and personal expenses amounted to £372 3s.; and those of his assistant, Mr. Mace, to £142: for the transport and packing of objects we paid £186 14s. 6d.; for materials of various kinds, £21 9s. 6d.; and for the exhibition held at University College in 1900, £32 12s. 11d., and in the present year £29 19s. 2d. The expenses for the exhibition in 1900 should have been included in my Report of last year; but unfortunately they were not supplied till after the 31st July, when the account was closed.

Of M. Naville I should mention that he was detained in Switzerland, partly through ill-health and partly through official business connected with the city of Geneva; so he could not arrive at Deir el Bahri in time to carry out his contemplated work. He went, however, to Egypt at his own expense, and

checked some of the drawings of the temple of Deir el Bahri. This winter he hopes to finish up his work so far as the Temple of Hatshepsu is concerned.

(2) By Publications we have spent £566 15s. 11d., which includes, besides the proportionate charges for the Archaeological and Annual Reports, the remaining outlay on *Denderah* and the *Royal Tombs*, Vol. I.; and on the extra volume, *Diospolis Parva*, by Prof. Petrie, and an initiatory expenditure on the work of the *Coptic Ostraca*, which is being written by Mr. Crum. There is also a charge of £93 19s. 10d. for packing, carriage, and insurance of stock at the printers.

(3) Lastly, besides an outlay of £9 13s. 10d. connected with the packing and postage of the Ushabti, which were presented last year to the subscribers, and of £30 4s. 1d. for photographs and slides, there have been the usual proportionate expenses of rent of office, salaries of officers, printing, postage, etc., which make together £301 5s.

I do not think that any of the above items call for special remark, except that our Publications bill is less than last year; but this may be ascribed to the fact that we were unable to pay any of the charges on *Royal Tombs*, Vol. II., as accounts were not furnished in time to be settled before the end of the financial year. These will, therefore, have to be carried over to the coming year's account.

The total receipts over the same period have been £3,788 11s. 8d., viz.:—

(1) By subscriptions from English subscribers, £1,733 5s. 5d., which includes a donation from Mr. Waldorf Astor of £500; from the Boston Office in America, £1,192 os. 8d., which, as I have said, includes the Pittsburg contribution; and from the affiliated branches of the Fund in the United States—Philadelphia £250 and Chicago £163 15s. 9d.; and from the Berlin Museum a special donation of £50; making a total of £3,389 1s. 10d.

(2) By sale of publications in England and America we have received £334 11s. 3d.; and from refunded postage of the Ushabti, and the sale of the *Atlas of Ancient Egypt* and photographs, £10 8s. 4d.

(3) Lastly, there are the usual dividends on Consols and India 3 per cent. Stock, £54 10s. 3d.

Our receipts show that we are able this year to carry over to our credit a balance of no less than £1,437 10s., even after providing for the deficiency of £181 15s. 3d. of last year. During the many years that I have acted as your Treasurer I do not think I have ever been able to lay before you a more satisfactory balance of the Exploration Fund; for though we are deeply indebted to Mr. Waldorf Astor for his handsome donation and to our new branch at Pittsburg for its liberal contributions, the general receipts from subscriptions and publications, which after all are the true basis of our income, show a considerable increase as compared with past years. I only hope this may be continued for future years.

Next in order comes the statement of accounts of the Archaeological Survey. The total disbursements of the Survey during 1900—1901 have been £523 8s. 5d., of which sum £121 11s. 5d. is for the salary and expenses of Mr. N. de G. Davies; £336 6s. 2d. for publications, which, besides a proportionate expenditure on the Archaeological and Annual Reports, represents the completion of *Beni Hasan IV.* and *Ptahhetep I.* and the entire cost of *Ptahhetep II.*; and £65 10s. 10d. for *pro rata* office expenses, salaries, postage, etc. The receipts, on the other hand, have been £723 0s. 4d.: (1) from English and American subscriptions, £585 6s.; from sale of publications, £129 14s. 7d.; and from interest on deposit, £7 19s. 9d.; making a total of £723 0s. 4d. We have in consequence a surplus of £199 11s. 11d. to carry over to the coming year's account, instead of a slight deficit as last year.

Comparing this account with the preceding one of last year, there has been a saving on the Expedition Account, as Mr. Davies did not go to Egypt; but a slight increase on publications, as two volumes, *Beni Hasan IV.* and *Ptahhetep I.*, were completed, and a third one, *Ptahhetep II.*, wholly paid for; and in the receipts from subscriptions an increase of a little over £145, and from publications of about £76. Last year I expressed regret at a falling off on these two last items; but since that

time we have returned to our normal condition, and so are able to show a fair excess of receipts over expenditure.

The next account is that of the Graeco-Roman Branch. The payments on this account have amounted to £1,016 16s. 8d., of which £459 19s. 4d. was devoted to the Expedition Account, which includes the excavations conducted by Mr. Grenfell and Mr. Hunt at Rubàyyat, and their personal outlay; and also the charges of transport of papyri and antiquities. The cost of publication was £474 14s. 9d., which was chiefly incurred in the issue of the volume entitled *Fayûm Towns and their Papyri*; and the usual outlay on rent, salaries, stationery, advertising, postage, etc., was £82 2s. 7d.

The receipts of this branch over the same period have amounted to £1,170 15s. 10d., being £1,040 12s. 9d. from subscriptions (English and American), £117 4s. 6d. from publications, and £12 18s. 7d. from interest on deposit. This enables us to carry over a balance of £153 19s. 2d.

Last year I had to note a considerable falling off under the heading of subscriptions; but this year I am glad to say we have recovered our position, for those in England show a considerable advance, whilst those from America are more than doubled. The latter are due partly, no doubt, to the fact that we were able to distribute a portion of the *Oxyrhynchus Papyri*, which excited much interest in the States. This distribution was so long deferred, that I fancy our friends in America began to think the papyri never would reach them. I should much like to see an increase from sale of publications, as we are still behind the amount received in 1899—1900, and that in spite of so many fresh subscribers. Perhaps when we get a third volume of the *Oxyrhynchus Papyri* our sales in this respect may recover themselves.

Lastly, from the General Balance Sheet it will be seen that the total assets of the Exploration Fund, the Archaeological Survey, and the Graeco-Roman Branch together amounted on the 31st July last to £5,597 6s. 4d., which consisted of £1,000 Consols (at cost, £944 8s.); £1,000 India 3 per cent. Stock (at cost, £1,082 13s. 6d.); deposit at the Bank, £2,279 10s. 2d.; current account, £1,063 6s. 10d.; petty cash, £5 15s. 1d.;

Messrs. Trübner and Co. for publications, £141 8s. 4d.; Messrs. Cook and Sons, £69 2s. 8d.; and Prof. Petrie, being the balance on his account, £11 1s. 9d. We have thus an increased balance on last year's account of £1,791 1s. 1d., the relative figures being £5,597 6s. 4d. against £3,806 5s. 3d. This sum of £5,597 6s. 4d. is to be apportioned as follows:— To the Exploration Fund, £3,618 7s. 9d.; to the Archaeological Survey, £820 16s. 4d.; and to the Graeco-Roman Branch, £1,158 2s. 3d.

This, Ladies and Gentlemen, is my report of our finances in general, which I hope you will consider to be in a satisfactory condition. I need scarcely say that the Committee are very grateful to you for so liberally backing their efforts to make the Fund and its branches a continued success. I will not refer to the proposed work of the present season, as I know our President has something to say on that point. But I will mention that there will be expeditions to Egypt in connection with each section; and in the case of the Exploration Fund there will be two—one under Prof. Petrie, the other under M. Naville; and, in view of the increased funds, the Committee have given Prof. Petrie a grant for excavations of £1,000, which is for wages only, so that he may extend the area of his operations and by this means shorten the period of our labours at Abydos.

The Rev. F. C. NORTON moved and the Rev. J. MARSHALL seconded the adoption of the Financial Report.

The CHAIRMAN put to the meeting this resolution, which was carried unanimously.

THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

At Anniversary Meetings, such as that at which we are now assembled, one of the first and at the same time most painful duties that the Chairman has to perform is to commemorate in a few words some of those members of the body

corporate who during the previous twelve months have been removed from among us by death.

Our losses in this manner have, I am pleased to say, not been numerous, but among the deceased supporters of the Fund there are three or four to whom notice may specially be called. Sir John Henry Greville Smyth, of Ashton Court, near Bristol, contributed most liberally to the Fowler Fund for excavations at Tanis, and was for many years a subscriber to the Exploration Fund. Mr. Arthur Cates, the well-known architect and architectural adviser to the Woods and Forests, was also one of our body. He earned a well-merited high position in his profession, and moreover took a warm interest in matters outside it, and especially in the study of antiquity. He was for some years honorary secretary and subsequently vice-president of another society, also much concerned with Egyptian history and literature, that of Biblical Archaeology.

Mr. Joseph John Tylor, who died suddenly at his villa at Cap d'Ail, near Monaco, on April 5th last, was the eldest son of the late Mr. Alfred Tylor, F.G.S., who forty years ago was busily occupied with the discovery of flint implements fashioned by the hand of man in the gravels of the river Somme, near Amiens. He was likewise a nephew of Dr. E. B. Tylor, the distinguished anthropologist and ethnologist. His first acquaintance with Egypt originated in a visit to that country in pursuit of health, but he soon became absorbed in the deep interest of carrying on excavations. One of his principal aims was to obtain and preserve absolutely accurate reproductions of wall-paintings and hieroglyphic inscriptions on Egyptian monuments, and as a means towards this end he combined the use of photography with careful finishing by the hand and brush. It has been said of his series of the "Wall Drawings and Monuments of El Kab," published from 1895 to 1900, that they present as near an approach to absolute reproduction, even to the texture of the material represented, as has ever been attained. Some further particulars as to his career are given by Mr. F. Ll. Griffith in the Archaeological Report for the year.

The financial position of all three branches of the Fund is, as you have heard from the Report of the Treasurer, most

satisfactory. At one time there were fears that, owing to the heavy expenses of exploration, there would be a considerable deficit in that department; but thanks mainly to the liberality of Mr. William Waldorf Astor and others, as also to remittances received from America and the Continent, the balance on closing the accounts on July 31st exceeded that of the corresponding date of last year by not less than £1,600. The balances of the Archaeological Survey and the Graeco-Roman Branch also increased by £229 and £143 respectively. Since the close of the financial year, we have received a generous donation from Mr. John E. Ellis.

The scene of our operations has during the past season been in the main the same as last year, near Abydos, on the site of the Royal Tombs. There, notwithstanding the previous researches of M. Amélineau and other explorers, Prof. Flinders Petrie has been able to reap an abundant and valuable harvest. An account of the work, illustrated by numerous plates, is already in the hands of our subscribers, under the title of "The Royal Tombs of the Earliest Dynasties. 1901. Part II."

By the presence of re-used vases and by the style of the sealings Prof. Petrie has succeeded in placing the tombs of the kings in a fairly trustworthy chronological sequence, and has been able to identify two more kings of the Ist Dynasty, whose names he reads Zer and Zet, with those on Sety's list. The list of Thinite kings before Mena has also been provisionally reconstructed, as well as that of the kings of the IIInd Dynasty. For the details of these lists and the reasons for the proposed arrangements Prof. Flinders Petrie's memoir must be consulted.

It should be added that two Royal Tombs of the IIIrd Dynasty have also been explored, and that Mr. Mc Iver has found much of pre-dynastic and Ist Dynasty remains at El-Amrah, while Mr. A. C. Mace has continued his work among XVIIIth Dynasty tombs at Abydos.

Mr. J. Garstang, working for the Egyptian Research Account, has found in a cemetery of the VIth—VIIth Dynasties some fine alabaster vases, a gold chain, and other interesting objects.

The share of the spoil which was allowed to come to England was, in accordance with former precedents, exhibited during the month of July at University College, to the authorities of which we are much indebted; and I think that we have also reason to be thankful to the Museum authorities at Cairo for the equitable, if not indeed liberal, manner in which the produce of our excavations has been divided between them and us.

Among the objects retained at Cairo are the four remarkable and artistic bracelets of which coloured representations are given in the frontispiece to our volume. Their history is romantic. It would seem as if at a time when the tomb was anciently plundered, the mummy of the Queen of Zer or Teta, the second King of the Ist Dynasty, was broken in pieces and a fragment of the forearm placed by one of the plunderers in a hole in the wall. For more than a thousand years offerings were made at the Osiris shrine into which the tomb had been converted in the days of Amen-hetep III., and thousands of visitors must have passed within a few feet of the fragment, but without disturbing it. The Copts destroyed the shrine and the Mission Amélineau cleared the tomb, but still the arm lay untouched; at last, however, it came under the notice of Prof. Petrie's workmen and was carried to him, the bandage carefully removed and the bracelets brought to light. They are probably the earliest examples of female jewellery known; dating back, as they seem to do, to about 4,700 years before Christ. I had the good fortune to be among the first to examine them when I was at Abydos in February last. Among the objects exhibited in London may be mentioned the sceptre and the gold-capped marble vases of Khasekhemui, the 7th and last King of the IIInd Dynasty, dating from about 4200 B.C. The sceptre is built up of pierced cylinders of sard placed upon a central core of copper, and had originally been at least 28 inches in length. The longer of the fragments into which it had been broken is 23 inches long, and is now deposited in the Museum at Boston. A large stela of Per-*ab-sen* has gone to the British Museum, and a curved bar of gold with the name of *Āḥa* to Chicago.

It is needless here to enumerate all the different objects in

various materials that went to form the collection, but I shall be pardoned for mentioning some beautifully chipped arrow-heads, among which occurred a variety new to me,—a chisel-ended head being as it were grafted on one acutely pointed, in such a manner that if the end were broken off, the remaining portion could be readily fashioned into a pointed arrow-head of the ordinary character.

The whole collection has now been divided mainly between the United Kingdom, including her Colonies, and the United States of America; but portions have also been assigned to some European states, the principle of division adopted being that each country should, so far as possible, share *pro ratâ* in accordance with the amount that each had contributed to the Fund.

Such a distribution of objects of great archaeological value and interest no doubt attracts subscriptions to the Fund, especially from our cousins on the other side of the Atlantic. No one, however, is entitled to complain if in this or any other year the money value of the objects received appears to be less than the amount of the subscription. It is impossible to foresee what may be the harvest of antiquities that will be reaped in any one year; and it must never be forgotten that the annual volumes alone are as a rule full equivalents to the subscriptions, and that the object of our existence is the scientific exploration of the monuments of Egypt, and not merely the enrichment of museums whether in or out of Egypt.

In addition to Part II. of the *Royal Tombs*, a special extra publication of the Fund has been produced by Prof. Flinders Petrie with some little assistance from Mr. A. C. Mace. It is entitled "Diospolis Parva, the Cemeteries of Abadiyeh and Hû," and gives an account of their examination in 1898-9, illustrated by nearly fifty plates, among which there are several of the highest importance.

In the frontispiece is shown every one of the principal varieties of pottery found in the tombs of the pre-Dynastic period, thus exhibiting the chief types of the black-topped, polished-red, fancy forms, cross-lined, incised black, wavy-handled, decorated, rough-faced and late classes. In Plate II.

an attempt is made to arrange these classes in chronological order and to assign to each a position in sequence, though not in any scale of years. The whole period is divided by Prof. Petrie into ten decades, and the first three of these are left unoccupied to provide room for further discoveries of early date, while the last two decades are left free for the reception of any objects coming nearer to Dynastic times.

The same method of arrangement is adopted in Plate III. for stone vases, slate palettes, and ivories; and in Plate IV. for flint and copper implements, materials of beads, standards of ships, and amulets. Such a chronological sequence, even if liable to possible errors, is of the highest value, and being founded on so large a series of interments, something like 900 in number, has much claim for being regarded as absolutely trustworthy.

I have one point on which to quarrel with the author, and that perhaps is more a question of terminology than anything else. He describes the period of which he treats as the Prehistoric Period. I, on the other hand, would term it the pre-Dynastic, and thus limit it to Egypt and connect it with Dynastic times. To regard a single cemetery in Egypt as representing half the Prehistoric Period, and to devote only three-tenths of the whole period to the days when metal was not known—for copper implements come in at the beginning of the series,—seems to me to be absolutely in disaccordance with what we know of the Neolithic Period in other parts of the world, and to be entirely out of proportion even when regarded from the Egyptian point of view. The term 'pre-Dynastic' gets rid of all these difficulties and will, I hope, be accepted in lieu of Prehistoric. I may add that in the Introduction to this work the position of Prof. Petrie's "New Race" between the VIIth and the Xth Dynasties is formally abandoned, and the relics that were assigned to that race are recognised as pre-Dynastic.

Another publication of the Fund, which will now shortly appear, is "The Temple of Deir El Bahari, No. IV," which will comprise Plates LXXXVII. to CXVI. relating principally to the Temple of Hathor and the Southern Hall of Offerings.

The wall-paintings are of great interest, and the long religious texts subsequently incorporated into the Book of the Dead are worthy of notice, especially as M. Naville has offered a translation of one of them which somewhat differs from that of other authorities.

M. Naville is about to return to Deir El Bahari, in order to finish the collation of the drawings that have been made for the Fund with the originals, and also to complete the exploration of a well within the precincts of the temple. Prof. Petrie, accompanied by Mr. Weigall, will return to Abydos, but will probably change the scene of their operations to new ground. Unfortunately, he will no longer be accompanied by Mr. Mace, whose services have been transferred elsewhere.

The Archaeological Survey has during the past year produced two volumes, one of which, however, is only on the point of being issued. The first of these, "Ptah-hetep, Part II.," was presented to subscribers to that branch in June last. It contains thirty-five plates of wall-scenes and inscriptions.

The second is a detailed account of the Rock Tombs of Sheikh Saïd, prepared by Mr. N. de Garis Davies, though the spot had already been visited by Prof. Petrie, Mr. Griffith, Messrs. P. and J. Newberry, and Mr. Carter, whose works are mentioned and some of them utilised. The tombs, according to the list, are 102 in number and belong in the main to the Ancient Kingdom. The memoir is illustrated by thirty-four plates, and will be found full of archaeological information.

There was no expedition on the part of the Survey in 1900—1901; but in the coming season one under Mr. de G. Davies will be undertaken, though its exact destination is not yet absolutely settled.

In connection with the Archaeological Survey, I should mention that an anonymous donor, through Mr. Griffith, has established a Student's Fund of £100 a year, which is not of necessity to be continuous. During the present year this sum of £100 will be added to the salary of Mr. Davies, in order that he may extend his researches in Egyptology and so increase his efficiency for the work of the Survey.

With regard to the Graeco-Roman Branch the report that I have to make is less satisfactory, though the volume of "Fayûm Papyri," about which I gave some particulars last year, has for some time been in the hands of subscribers. The study of papyri requires both time and daylight, and I fear that Messrs. Grenfell and Hunt have during the past year undertaken tasks for which the two necessities that I have mentioned hardly sufficed. The examination and publication of Lord Amherst of Hackney's fine collection was a grave undertaking, and the editors are to be congratulated on the completion of their work. When, however, they undertook for Mrs. Hearst, of California, the editing of the Tebtunis Ptolemaic papyri, the time left at Messrs. Grenfell and Hunt's disposal for the work of the Graeco-Roman Branch was fearfully curtailed and but little could be done.

It is hoped that an arrangement can be made by which a copy of this Tebtunis volume will be sent to each subscriber to the Branch in lieu of the ordinary annual volume, or possibly of two; and if the papyri are of the character which I have heard assigned to them, I believe that subscribers will have reason to be satisfied with the arrangement. Mr. Grenfell informs me that the papyri come from the cases of mummies of crocodiles, and that many of them are of extremely large size and well preserved. They all belong to the period between 130 and 80 B.C., and are for the internal history of Egypt of great importance. The most remarkable, perhaps, constitute a series of forty-six decrees of Ptolemy Euergetes II. on a great variety of subjects. Official documents of all kinds are strongly represented, the source of a large proportion of the papyri having apparently been the bureau of the village scribe, who also kept the official archives of the place.

Among literary fragments there are portions of two or three anthologies, including part of a chorus of a tragedy dealing with Iphigenia. A special feature of interest is that these documents form a sort of pendant to the Petrie Papyri, and carry on the history of the military colony in the Fayûm in its later developments. *Inter alia* they go far to solve some of the most vexed questions with regard to Ptolemaic

numismatics, and have an important bearing on the interpretation of demotic, the study of which is still in a somewhat confused condition.

It is to be hoped that ere long the work on the Oxyrhynchus Papyri will be resumed. There is, I am informed, a large fragment of a lost comedy, very likely by Menander, among those that are still unpublished, which is sure to prove of the highest interest.

I need say nothing with regard to the progress of Egyptology during the last twelve months, as the subject is fully dealt with in the Archaeological Report, of which copies will in a very short time be in the hands of all subscribers to the Fund. I may however incidentally mention the remarkable discoveries of new forms of extinct mammalia that have been made in the Lower Tertiary deposits of Egypt, some details of which have been given by Dr. C. W. Andrews in the *Geological Magazine*. These forms were extinct long ages before the days of Mena, and it would be vain to search for them in Egyptian wall-paintings. It is otherwise with Sir Harry Johnston's Okapi. Though new to us, it may have been seen by some Egyptian traveller or even have been brought into Egypt. Although in a high degree improbable, it is still within the bounds of possibility that a representation of it may exist in the pictures or sculpture of Egyptian tombs.

I will not detain you longer, but must mention one subject which I think you will agree with me is a matter for congratulation. It is that Messrs. Thomas Cook & Son have most kindly and liberally agreed to insert a prospectus of the Fund in every ticket that they issue to travellers in Egypt. The Society of Biblical Archaeology have also issued our prospectus to all their members. Apart from America, our subscribers last year were 700 in number; this year they were 721. May they still increase, and even in larger proportions!

THE HON. SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR 1900—1901.

Ladies and Gentlemen,—After the satisfactory balance-sheet that has been unfolded to you by the Hon. Treasurer, and the interesting statement by the President about the work of the Fund, not much remains for me to say, especially as you are waiting to hear an address from Professor Petrie.

From an administrative point of view, the chief feature of the past year has been the strengthening of our connection with the United States. The two old affiliated branches at Philadelphia and Chicago are now both represented on our Committee by Americans—Major Cassatt, Military Attaché at the Embassy, and Mr. Louis Dyer, who is as well known at Oxford as at his original University of Harvard. We have already derived many direct advantages from their presence among us, and there can be no doubt that it will tend to increase the confidence of the general body of American subscribers. Last year I had to regret the disappearance of the New York State Branch, though at the same time I expressed the hope that we had not therefore lost our subscribers from New York. I am glad now to be able to say that during the last year we have received from New York City and State as much as £440, paid through our Boston Office. Large as this is, it is exceeded by the total contribution from the State of Pennsylvania, which amounts to no less than £1,065. Of this, £290 comes from our affiliated branch at Philadelphia, whose proper style is the American Exploration Society, and whose energetic secretary is Mrs. Cornelius Stevenson. The remainder was paid through our Boston Office, and therefore does not appear separately in the accounts. It includes a sum of £490 from Pittsburg, which entitles that city to recognition as an affiliated branch. As I anticipated last year, the Chicago Society of Egyptian Research has made up the subscription which was then accidentally in default; so that we have now three American branches in active order, besides the Boston Office. This does not include minor organisations, such as the Connecticut

branch, with headquarters at New Haven, the seat of Yale University, which sent last year about £60; or the Detroit branch, which is credited with £100 from the State of Michigan.

From the Boston Office we have received this year the equivalent of \$10,000, instead of \$6,000 last year. This large increase is to be attributed mainly to two causes: (1) the present of *ushabtis* to individual subscribers, which stimulated them to augment their subscriptions; and (2) the interest aroused by the distribution of Greek papyri. Special funds were started, with the object of securing more papyri for particular institutions; and £350 altogether was thus raised for the Graeco-Roman Branch. Let us trust that Messrs. Grenfell and Hunt will be able to satisfy these hopes by a successful expedition to the Fayûm during the coming winter! Finally, I may mention that during the past year there have been received in America ten additional life-memberships for the Fund proper, two for the Survey, and three for the Graeco-Roman Branch.

It must always be borne in mind that these liberal contributions from America are frankly sent in view of a return in the form of antiquities and papyri for American museums and libraries. The Greek papyri sent out last year to various universities have already produced the result of doubling the American subscriptions to the Graeco-Roman Branch. The recent distribution of antiquities from Abydos may reasonably be expected to augment the American contributions to the Fund proper. At that distribution we had the advantage not only of the presence on the Committee of our two American representatives, but also of the advice of Prof. Breasted, of Chicago, who is well acquainted with the varying wants of American museums. In accordance with our rule of following strictly the proportion of local contributions, the American share has been divided between five great museums—at New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Pittsburg, and Chicago. In this country we have made awards to the British Museum, the Ashmolean and Pitt-Rivers Museums at Oxford, the Fitzwilliam Museum at Cambridge, Owens College at Manchester,

the Science and Art Museum at Edinburgh, and local museums at Bolton, Bristol, Dewsbury, Dublin, Dundee, Glasgow, Greenock, and Liverpool. We have also taken into consideration a subscription of £50 received from Berlin and a smaller amount from Brussels.

I will now conclude with a brief report on the Archaeological Survey, quoted in the words of the Superintendent, Mr. Griffith, whom we have to congratulate on his appointment as Reader in Egyptology to the University of Oxford.

“The Survey has been entirely occupied during the past twelve months with the work of publication. The memoir on Sheikh Saïd is ready. Dêr el Gebrâwi will form two volumes, of which all the plates and portions of the text have been printed. The tombs of Dêr el Gebrâwi date from the end of the Old Kingdom and are of extreme interest; but only two of them are in anything better than deplorable condition. Mr. Davies has found that some curious scenes in the tomb of Aba, one of the best preserved, correspond in a remarkable way with certain scenes that have been published from a tomb of the namesake of Aba under the XXVIth Dynasty. Evidently the latter took the former as his model, and probably claimed him as an ancestor. Mr. Davies will visit the Theban tomb this winter, before publishing the Dêr el Gebrâwi scenes, and he hopes thereby to clear up and complete several obscure patches in the latter.

“But the campaign of the season will probably be on the site of Tell el Amarna, the capital of Akhenaten, where we hope to commence the full survey of the northern group of the tombs. Further, the Survey studentship, which has been founded by an anonymous benefactor, will give Mr. Davies the opportunity of studying in Egypt and in the museums of Europe and at home, as well as of exercising his exceptional skill in the delineation of hieroglyphs and archaeological details. Mr. Davies has worked courageously for us for three years, clearing off the arrears of publication and stirring up much interest in the work by his truthful facsimiles. The Survey is now in a prosperous condition financially; and we may congratulate ourselves on the fact that his labours have met

with a more substantial reward than seemed probable when he first set to work to pay off our debt to old subscribers."

PROF. FLINDERS PETRIE'S ADDRESS.

Our work at Abydos this year was, as you know, continued on the Royal Tombs, and also on a cemetery of the prehistoric age, and on the tombs of the XVIIIth Dynasty. For the Royal Tombs Mr. Mace attended to the excavations, while I was mainly engaged on the working-up of the material of both last year and this year. Thousands of seal impressions had to be confirmed, and all the different seals restored and drawn. Cart-loads of broken stone vases had to be sorted according to material and form, until once more piece joined to piece, and we re-established each vase after the destruction of past ages: most of this sorting and joining was done by Miss Umlin and Miss Orme. The drawing of the restored forms of all the stone vases also filled a large part of my time, as you will see from the five hundred forms in the volume. Photographing was a serious task; but I have to thank Miss Orme for the weary work of developing some four hundred plates for me, as well as for the inking in of more than fifty plates of my drawings. And my wife did all the plan drawings, beside other plates. But for such incessant work of all this voluntary help, which has been entirely free of cost to the Fund, you would not have had that volume of Royal Tombs, and much would have been left quite undone.

Mr. McIver's work on the prehistoric age, and Mr. Mace's work on the later tombs, will shortly appear as a separate publication.

As Mr. Mace is now going to work for California in Egypt, after giving us his services for four years, Mr. Arthur Weigall is going out to help in my excavations. Mr. Christy will also be with us to help in such artistic work as may prove needful. Mr. Sewell, the Indian archaeologist, will join us for

a time, with a view to undertaking some excavation. Mr. Caulfield is also expecting to be in our camp, and to gain the experience of excavating, which may bear fruit in future. Miss Griffith may join us later, and will be a gain to our working staff.

We should, I feel, render our best thanks to Mr. McIver, especially for his work in the interests of the Fund for four years past, entirely as a volunteer at his own charges. He will be otherwise occupied during this next winter.

But although our previous party has now all passed on to various other works, we have the prospect of even a larger working camp next year than in the past. Nothing is more encouraging than to see the flow of interest which is maintained in this subject.

This year we have had the satisfaction of completing the most important historical work that has yet come into our hands. The continuous order of seventeen kings has been established; and the very foundations of Egyptian history have been settled in a manner which hitherto seemed entirely beyond hope. The royal cemetery of the Tombs of the Kings of Thebes, belonging to the XVIIIth—XIXth Dynasties, and that of the Pyramid-builders at Memphis of the IVth—VIth Dynasties, were the only series of royal tombs yet known; and neither of those had added anything to the history, which was already fixed by other monuments. But the recovery of the royal tombs of the earliest dynasties has given us not only another royal cemetery, but has provided the only contemporary history of their time, and completely vindicated the historical character of the lists which had been preserved by later ages.

The criticism of myths had told us that Mena, the founder of the Egyptian monarchy, was but a form of Manu, the law-giver of India, and of Minos, the hero of Crete; and to hope for tangible monuments of his time was but seeing castles in cloudland. Now the long line of a dozen kings back to Mena is clear before us: we have seen and handled the gold, the crystal, the ivory, with his name and engravings; and even the kings which went before him are better known to us by actual objects than are half the Saxon Kings of England. No

such complete materialization of history has been obtained at one stroke from any other country or age.

And such a result was least to be expected from ground which had been pronounced exhausted, the last clearance of which unhappily had just been made before our work there. That previous clearance had not restored a single detail of the succession of the names, nor identified the historical position of a single king. It had only swept away the greater part of the material and left a chaos of destruction behind it. The whole of what we have recovered by our work was from the overlooked residue, which had escaped all the plunderers: that invisible margin was the total of what we had to use, and that hundredth of all that had existed there has sufficed to reconstruct the historic fabric. So difficult is it really to destroy history, that we may now say that our methods, which will doubtless be improved, can resuscitate knowledge of a period of which the remains have been destroyed time after time by zeal and greed.

By the use of a trained body of workmen, who had been taught in past years to notice and preserve the objects in their work, we recovered a far larger amount of material than we had hoped for. The splendid bracelets of gold and jewels, the gold bar of Mena, the sard and gold sceptre, the gold-capped vases, were beyond all expectation: and the more instructive remains include about twenty engraved tablets and dozens of fragments, five royal tombstones and 150 private tombstones, over 200 different sealings, nearly 100 inscriptions on stone vases, 800 stone vases restored, and many hundreds of small objects of the greatest interest as illustrating the civilisation. Altogether, in the two volumes issued to you, there are over 500 photographs, over 2,000 drawings, and nearly 2,000 marks, beside the full and detailed plans and sections of the whole of the tombs.

None of this mass of material, which alone has enabled us to restore the earliest dynasties, would ever have been known had we been content to leave the subject where the common routine of excavation had already abandoned it. You see before you on the largest scale an object-lesson on the futility

and destructiveness of a mode of work which was no worse than the greater part of what has been perpetrated in Egypt in the name of excavation during the last hundred years.

Now there awaits us the great temple site of Abydos, the ground of the earliest temple, that of Osiris. It has been largely dug over for earth, and some monuments have been removed, but the lower levels of it are yet untouched. It seems that this was probably the burial-place of the head of Osiris, the great relic which drew around it the burials of the historic times, and probably also was surrounded by those of the earliest dynasties, as one such grave has been found there by accident. The site is a very large one, about 500 by 1000 feet, or three times the size of the whole of Trafalgar Square and its roads, and it will have to be turned over, twelve feet deep. If we get a third of that, or as much as Trafalgar Square, turned over in the course of a season, that will be as much as one can expect, so that some three years will be occupied in undertaking this great site. It is in that ground that we may hope to find tombs of the earliest historic time, and carvings in stone and ivory of the primitive kings, like those from Hierakonpolis. Our treasurer must appeal to you to insure that this most promising site of all Egypt is thoroughly and finally explored.

It is now twenty-one years since I first began work in Egypt. Mariette then ruled, and this Fund was yet unborn. In those days the Pyramid of Khufu was our boundary of history, nothing whatever was known of the archaeology of Egypt as a comparative science, and no trace of Europe in Egypt was thought of, earlier than the Ptolemies. The situation now is completely different. The monumental history has been carried back to the very beginning of the written record, which has been entirely confirmed; and beyond all that, the whole course of the prehistoric civilisation has been mapped out for perhaps two thousand years more completely than has been done for such ages in any other land. The archaeology is better known than that of the most familiar countries; not a vase or a bead, not an ornament or a carving, but what falls into place with known examples, and can be closely dated.

The connection with Europe has been led back to the beginning of Greek records, then to the Mykenaeen times, next to the XIIth Dynasty, and now even to the Ist Dynasty, and Egypt is the sounding line for the unmeasured abyss of European history. No such opening of new fields to the mind has come to pass since the days when the Renaissance scholars burst into the world of lost classical authors; even the surprising unfolding of Assyria and Babylonia lacks the historic completeness of the Egyptian record, and is still almost untouched in its archaeology and development. We cannot expect the next twenty-one years to be as potent as that which we have seen, for the great outlines are now laid down; but many a dim passage in the long course of the history yet awaits the light, and it will be the duty of the new century to fill in, as far as possible, the details of the picture which has been sketched in the last few years.

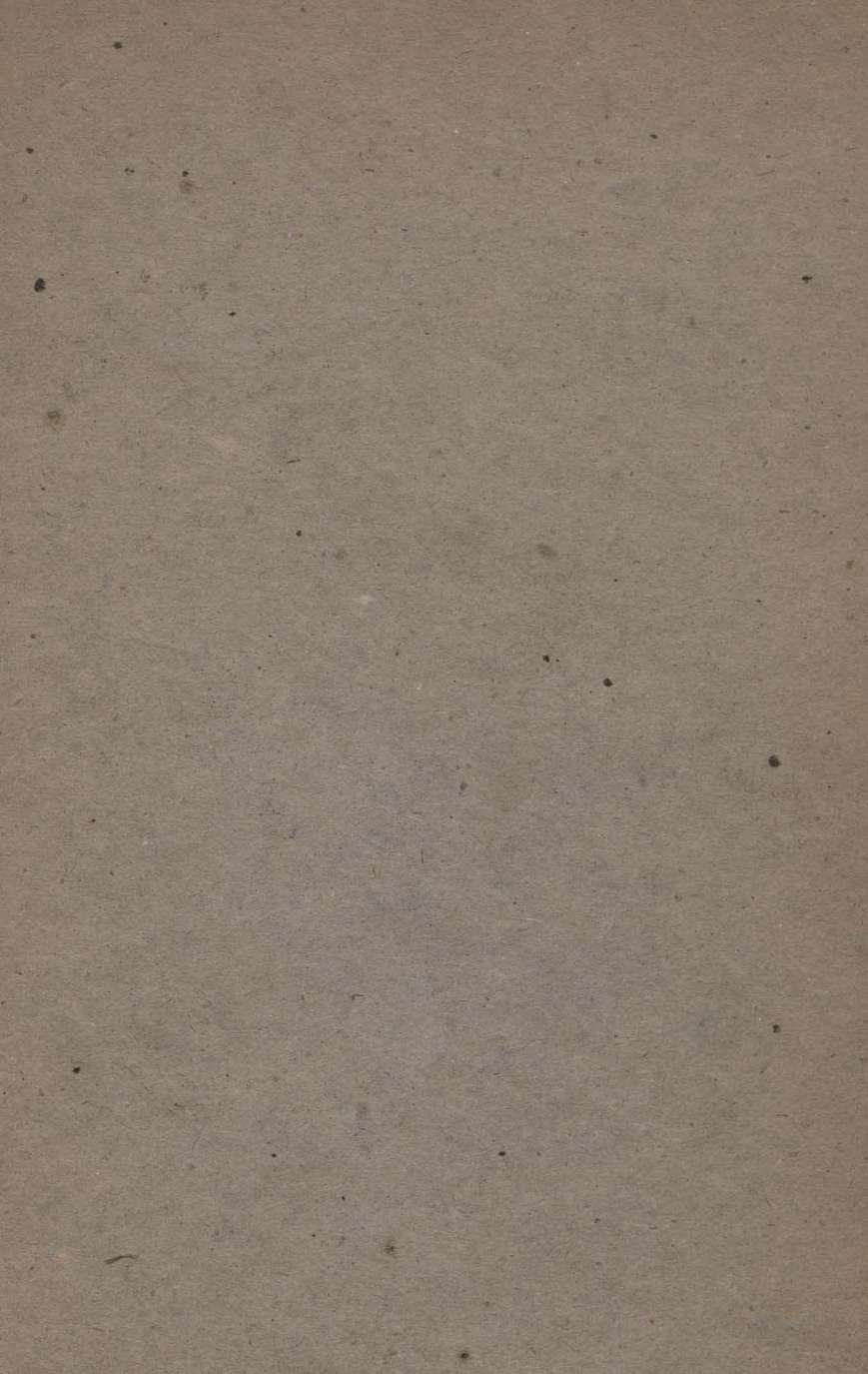
