

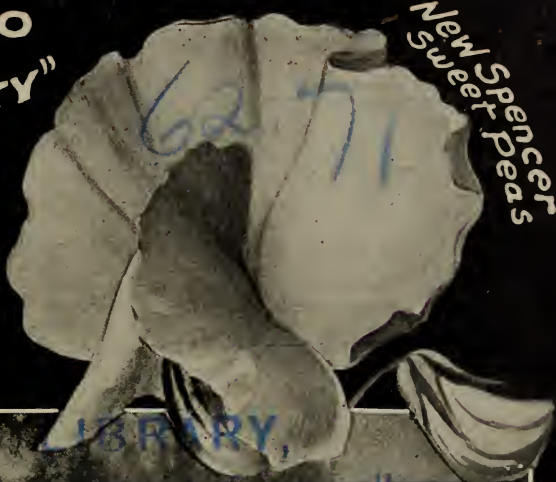

New Parcels Post Law.

THE NEW PARCEL-POST LAW WILL NOT CHANGE POSTAGE RATES ON SEEDS, ETC. Bulletin No. 336 by Postmaster General reads "That this Act shall not in any way affect the postage rate on seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions and plants, as fixed by section 432 of the Postal Laws and Regulations."

For full information as to just what this new Parcel Post Law includes, the rates and zones, see daily newspapers or ask your postmaster.

The rates, zones and general information will probably be issued in pamphlet form by the United States Government for free distribution about January 1, 1913.

25 CENTS Worth **FREE** with every \$1.00 order for Seeds in Packets and ounces. Remember, in packets and ounces only. \$1.25 for \$1.00, \$2.50 for \$2.00, and so on. This does not apply on quantities over one ounce, or where any other premium is taken.

CHINESE SACRED LILY

The fragrant flowers are of a satiny white color, with golden yellow cups. These lilies produce a profusion of bloom in an incredibly short time, usually not more than four to six weeks from the time of planting. This splendid flower increases in popularity every year.

Culture.—Chinese Lilies are usually grown in bowls or dishes of water. Put an inch or two of sand and gravel in a dish, set the bulbs on this, and put enough fancy pebbles, gravel or shells around them to keep them from falling over; fill the dish with water and set in a dark closet for a few days, until the roots start freely, then bring them to the light and keep in an ordinary living room.

Note.—Before planting these bulbs, cut all the old dry brown root off.

Araucaria Excelsia

(Norfolk Island Pine)

This beautiful plant resembles the pine somewhat in appearance, though much finer in texture; it is particularly adapted to parlor table decoration. It is most unique in appearance, the branches being arranged in neat, symmetrical whorls. They do not require much sun, and are hardy and easily cared for. (See cut No. 5.) 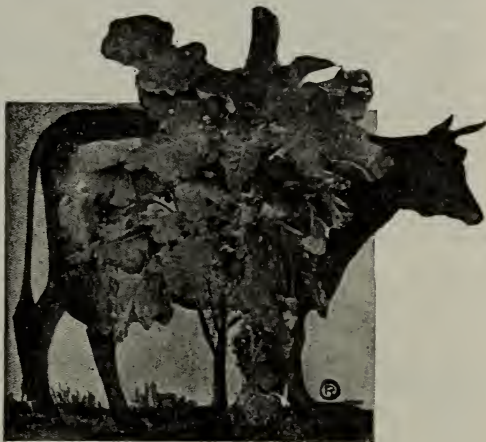

CULTURAL DIRECTIONS.

Cultural directions are printed on the back of nearly all packets.

Flowers usually succeed best in a sandy loam, made rich with well-rotted manure, which should be made fine and thoroughly mixed with the soil. A soil thus prepared will remain moist and loose, so that flower seeds, which are generally small and delicate, will germinate and grow with vigor.

Annuals grow from seed, flower, mature their seed, and die in one year, or, in other words, the same season.

Half-Hardy Annuals are those which should be started early in the house, conservatory or hotbed, and transplanted to the garden in settled warm weather.

Hardy Annuals are those which can be sown in the open ground.

Biennials grow from seed, sown from June to August, flower, ripen their seed and die the next year, though some varieties bloom the same season if sown early in gentle heat.

Hardy Biennials will winter in the open ground without protection.

Perennials grow from seed, and continue flowering annually for many years after the first season. Some varieties flower the first season if planted early in gentle heat.

Half-Hardy Biennials require the protection of a cold-frame or coolhouse during winter.

Hardy Perennials can remain in the open ground during winter without protection.

Half-Hardy Perennials require the protection of a coldframe or coolhouse during winter.

Tender or Greenhouse Perennials require window or greenhouse culture, free from frost during winter, and thrive in the garden during the warm months.

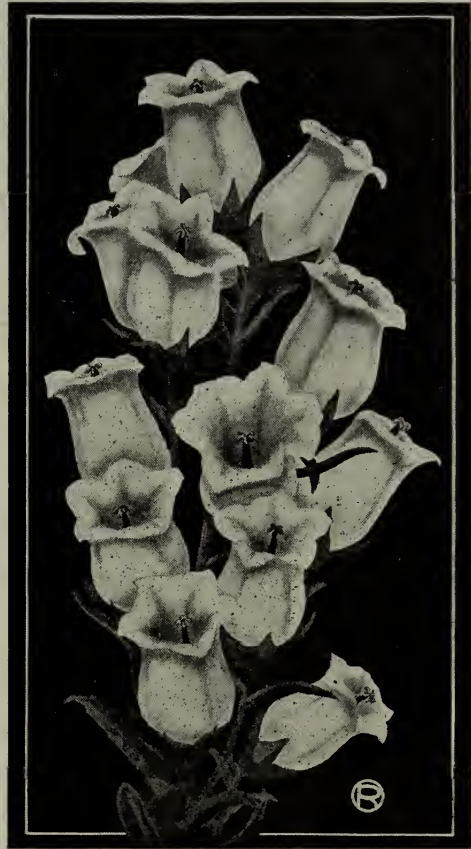

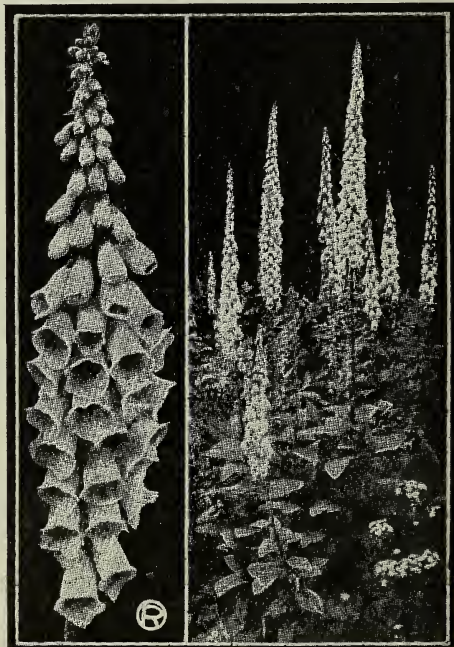

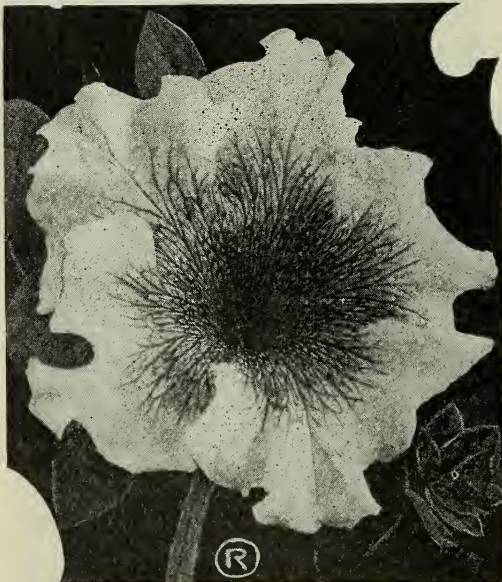

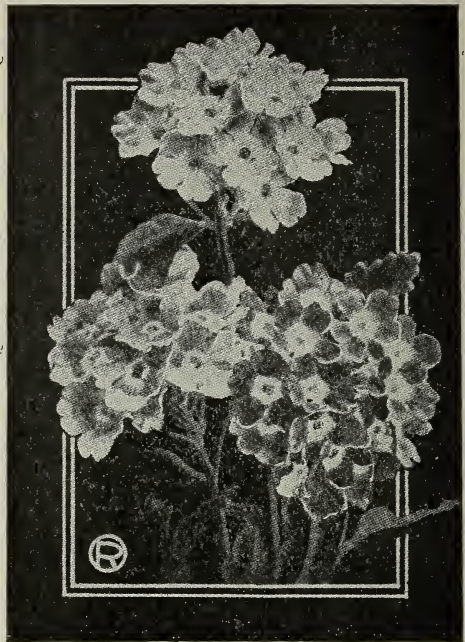

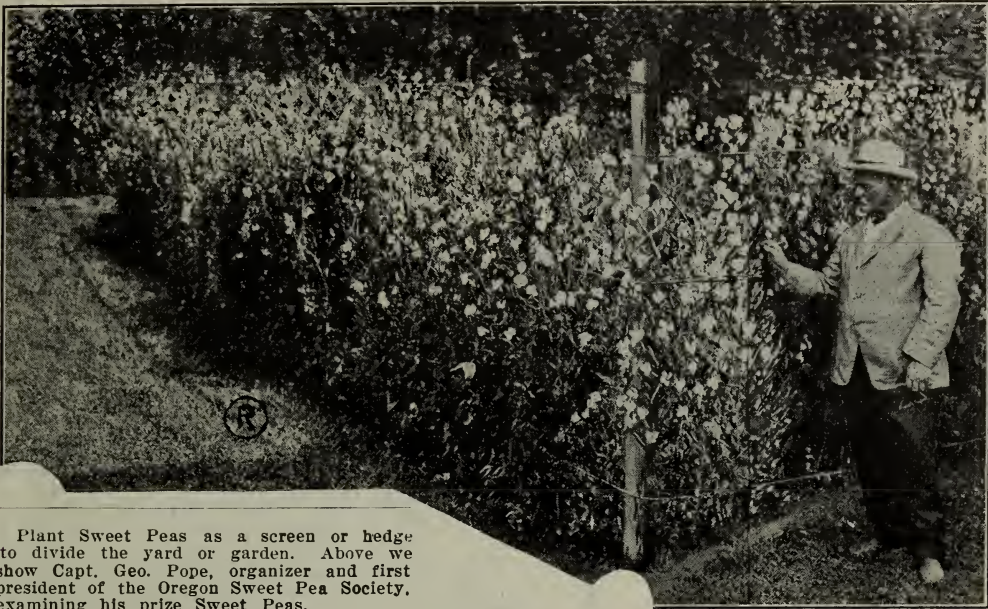

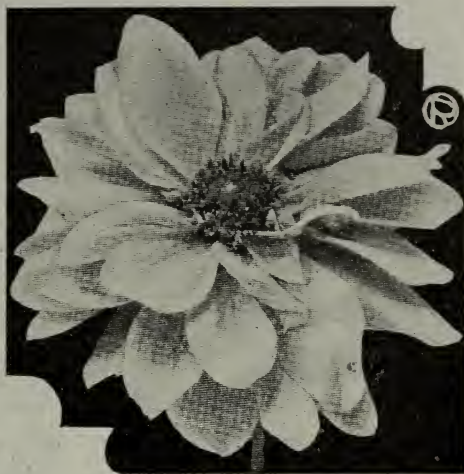

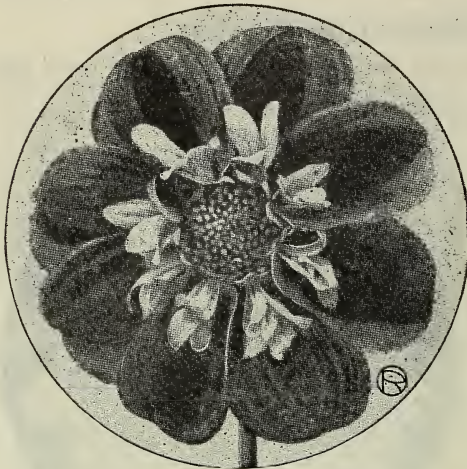

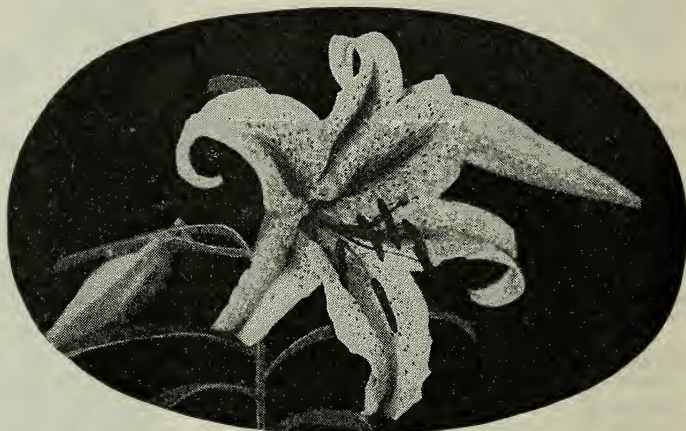

H. T.—HYBRID TEA.

These, as a rule, are as free-flowering and as constant bloomers as the tea sorts. They are harder than the Teas, but, as a rule, not so hardy as the H. P.'s. Many of this class, however, are practically hardy, and a few are very hardy.

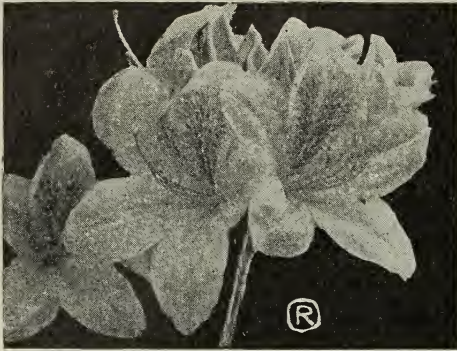

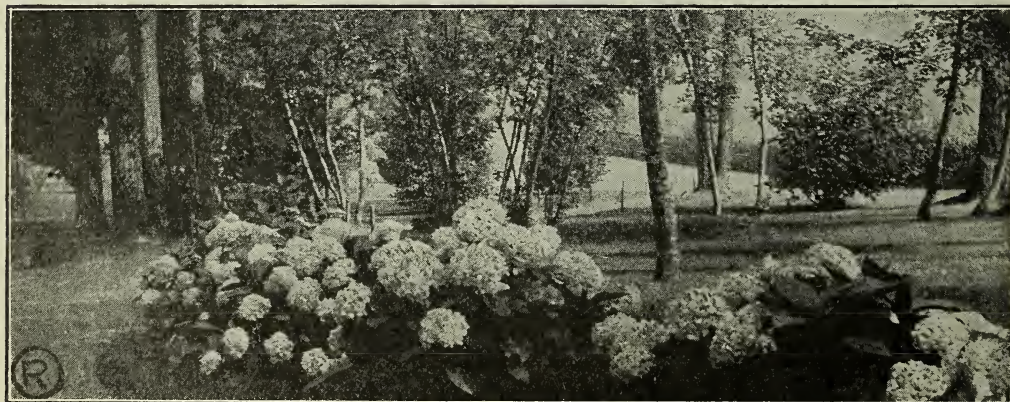

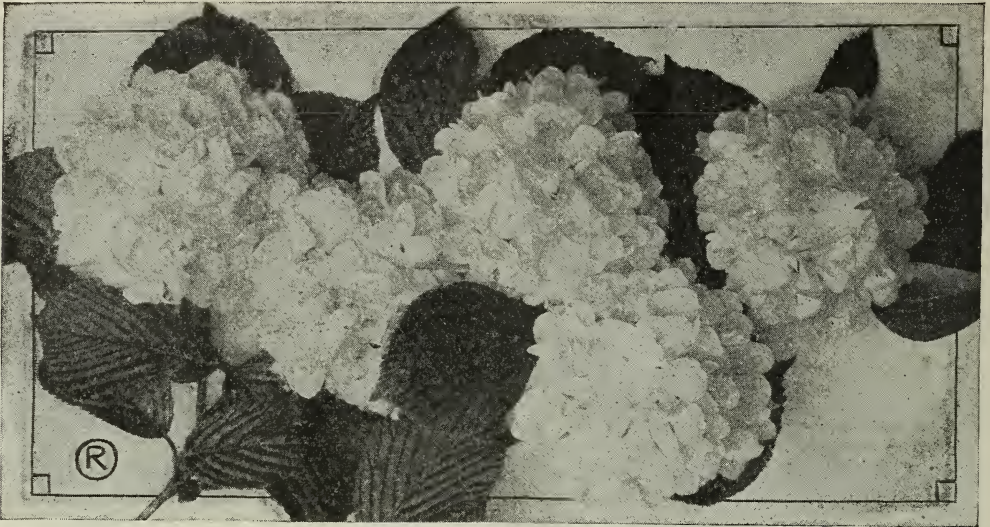

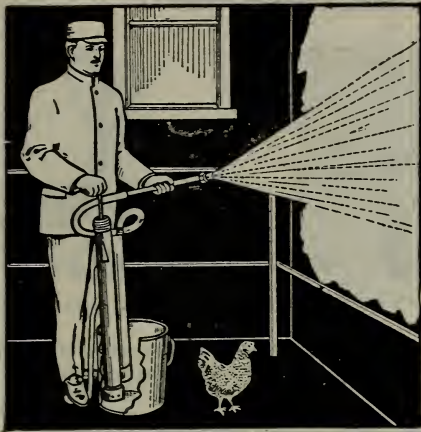

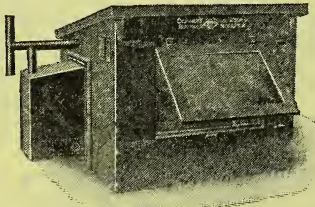

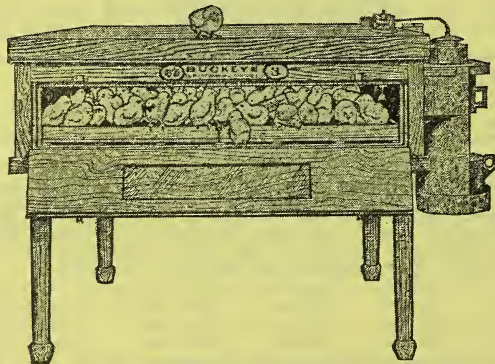

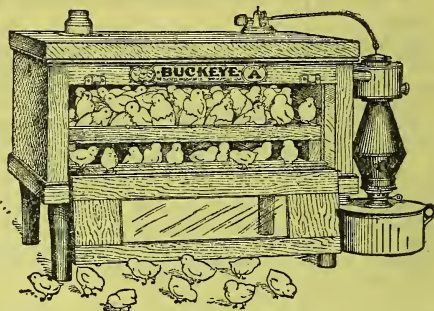

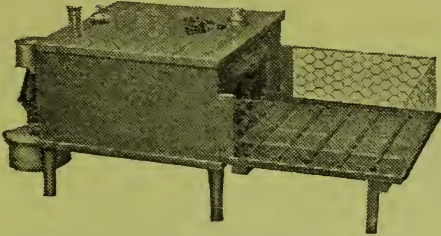

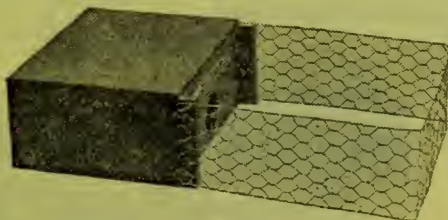

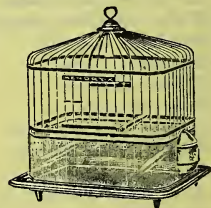

Rule.—Multiply the distance in feet between the rows by the distance the plants are apart in the rows, and the product will be the number of square feet, for each plant or hill, which, divided into the number of square feet in an acre (43,560), will give the number of plants or trees to the acre.

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
