ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS. Here is an interesting extract from a letter from a New Zealand correspondent of the New York Medical Record, which will be read with no little amusement by the numerous fraternalists in this province who have had practical experience of the very fact which he mentions: "I came by chance on a medical directory of the United States, and was astonished to find that in the great majority of States, if not in all, unqualified men are not allowed to practise, and even a man qualified in another State has to get registered in the State in which he wishes to practise. It seems extraordinary that in a democratic country like yours such an arrangement on liberty should be allowed. Our people would not bear of such a law. It would never reach a second reading. And I speak not only of the 'bleached old country,' as your writers call it, but of all the self-governing colonies. It would be impossible to pass such a law in the Australasian colonies. Whether anything of the kind exists in Canada I do not know, but if it does we can only suppose that close proximity to the despotic democracies of the United States has enervated the love of freedom which reigns supreme in every Briton's heart."

Before his departure for Europe Sir Charles Tupper has been "setting things straight." Among other prophetic utterances he assured the people of Canada that Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper would not again be a candidate for Pictou. Knowing something of the sentiment in Pictou we can very readily believe Tupper's statement. Sir Hibbert couldn't be elected in any constituency in Nova Scotia and it was the knowledge of that fact that sent him to British Columbia. Possibly Sir Hibbert may be a candidate in Vancouver and very probably he will be defeated. Tupperism is at a discount everywhere from Pictou to Vancouver.

Death trap for Dreyfus

How the Coolness of the Martyr of France Saved Him at Devil's Island.

A Diabolical Plot - Prisoner Came Within an Ace of Being Murdered.

The Paris correspondent of the London Daily Mail, under date of July 21st, says: "Having heard a sensational story of an alleged attempt to murder Captain Dreyfus at Devil's Island, I called on M. Mathieu Dreyfus, the prisoner's brother, this afternoon, and at first found him unwilling to speak on the matter. "But it is true that your brother was within an ace of losing his life," I asked. "There, I see you know all, or nearly all," replied M. Dreyfus. "I should have preferred the story to remain unknown for the present, but as that is now impossible, I will conceal nothing from you. "The story is true - absolutely diabolical - true. In the dead of night a boat belonging to the government made a pretended attempt to land on Devil's Island. A sentry immediately discharged a cannon, the report of which awoke my brother, who, springing to a sitting posture on his pallet-bed, cried: 'Great God! what is that?' The gater who was in the room made no reply, but clapped the muzzle of his revolver to my brother's forehead. The latter, looking at the muzzle of the revolver, and the hand of the soldier on his forehead, and remained perfectly still. Had he not done so that moment would have been his last. "The government has never denied, for nobody can deny these facts. Their excuse at the time was that they wished to see what would be the attitude of my brother and those guarding him if a real attempt to poison him were made. "That whatever may be said to the contrary, there can be no doubt that a diabolical attempt was made to murder him in cold blood. His own calmness alone saved his life. "They feared what he might say if ever he were able to return to France, and hoped that things would quiet down once he was safely out of the way. "Excuse the question," I said, "was the ferozoid told you practically in these words by your brother himself?" "Don't ask me," replied M. Dreyfus; "I will not answer you now. I refuse to be interviewed by anybody. I have told you the facts as a friend, and I assure you on my honor that the whole story I have just related is an absolute and unvarnished truth to the minutest particular, and if my brother had, as was quite likely to happen, believed in the sudden madness of his gater and endeavored to strike up his weapon, the man would have fired and killed him. Dead men can give no evidence. "It is impossible to convey any notion of the intense agitation under which M. Dreyfus labored as he strove up and down the room uttering the above disjointed sentences. "The man was ashy pale as he recalled the incidents of this horrible affair, which, I am convinced, he told me as nearly as possible in the same words as it was recounted to him in the prison by the victim himself. "M. Mathieu Dreyfus confirmed the story that a despatch was given to his brother stating that his wife had been delivered of a child. The prisoner had not seen her for years, and the story nearly killed him. He realized, however, eventually, that it must be a lie intended to cause him to cease corresponding with his family.

Beware of the Bicycle Foot.

A Danger to Women Riders Who Wear Thin Soled, High-Heeled Boots. The bicycle foot is a new disease that has been developed by women riders this summer. Its surgical name is traumatic flatfoot, and it is caused by wearing the thin-soled, French-heeled boots which are fashionable for wheeling this season, and also from careless or incorrect dismounting. As a rule, women do not know how to jump. They have not learned, and seem to be without the instinct which men possess to land on their feet with a spring, bending the knees and escaping the jolt which follows if the knees are kept rigid. As a consequence, most women get a headache from jumping, and the bicycling women who give slight attention to the way they get off their wheels, get the bicycle foot. They alight on the hard pavement with unaccustomed energy. The force of the blow strains the tendons to such a degree that the proper arch of the foot is lost. It is not done at once, but the foot is sometimes months in getting out of shape. The ligaments are gradually stretched until they cease to hold up the arch. Thin-soled boots increase the trouble. They afford too little support for the curved instep and do not protect the ball from the concussion when the rider jumps to the ground. Physicians recommend only soft-soled boots with low heels and heavy soles for wheeling. The high heels irritate the nerves of the feet and cause an additional shock, as the heel reaches the ground at the same moment as the ball, which is not the case when the foot is in normal position.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY.

Can Messages Be Intercepted - Some Interesting Experiments by Marconi. As much discussion has been provoked by the possibility of wireless telegraphic messages being intercepted during their flight through the air by persons other than for which they were intended, the article in the Windsor upon Signer Marconi and Wireless Telegraphy will be read with interest. Regarding this point, Mr. Cleveland Moffet, the writer of the article says: "In the first place it is evident that generals and admirals, as well as private individuals, could always protect themselves by sending their despatches in cipher. Then, during active military operations, despatches could be kept within a friendly radius by lowering the wires on the past until the transmitting power came within that radius. Marconi realizes, of course, the desirability of being able in certain cases to transmit messages in one and only one direction. To this end he has conducted a special series of experiments with different sending apparatus from that already described. He used, for instance, but a right oscillator placed at the focus of a parabolic copper reflector two or three feet in diameter. The waves sent out by this oscillator are quite different from the others, being only two feet long instead of three or four hundred feet, and the results, up to the present, are less important than those obtained with the penton wire. "Still, in trials on the Salisbury Plain, Marconi and his assistants sent messages perfectly in this way over a distance of a mile and three-quarters, and were able to direct these messages at will by aiming the reflector in one direction or another. It appears that these Herford waves, though invisible, may be concentrated by parabolic reflectors into parallel beams and projected in narrow lines just as a bull's-eye lantern projects beams of light. And it was found that a very slight shifting of the reflector would stop the messages at the receiving end. In other words, unless the beams fell directly on the receiver there was an end of all communication. "Besides the possibility of directing the waves with reflectors, Marconi is now engaged in most promising experiments in systems, which I may describe as the electrical tuning of a particular transmitter to a particular receiver, so that the latter will respond to the former, and no other. That, of course, is a possibility in the future, but it is far from being realized. There are even some who maintain that there may be produced as many separate sets of transmitters and receivers only capable of working together as there are separate sets of Yale locks and keys. In that event, the private individuals might communicate freely without fear of being understood by others."
