

Turning to the question of defence, Col. Allen said: "Since I have been in England the gift Dreadnought New Zealand has arrived in Dominion waters, and our people have had a chance of seeing a great warship for which they have subscribed. We expect, however, it will be attached to one of the British squadrons later."

Asked what his views were on the defence of the Pactfic, the colonel said that his opinion expressed at recent luncheons covered the whole ground. At Ottawa he said, "the problem of defence has been based upon the necessity for the protection of New Zealand's shores. Australia, more close to the menace of hostility, has undertaken the problem in a practical way, and, strange as it may seem, it is a labor government that has instituted the system of compulsory training. Imperial defence is the problem which New Zealand feels more forcibly than other Dominions, because of its lesser size. Canada, with its magnificent extent of territory and possibilities of great popudation, may feel that some day it will want to stand alone. New Zealand does not. The Pacific ocean is as important to England as is the Atlantic, but such are the demands upon the Mother Country for home defence and protection of the Atlantic trade routes that Great Britain must have a larger naval organization than she has at present if Imperial interests are to be safeguarded."





HISTORY

A letter from the French minister Cothert, to the intendant, Talon, bearing date May 15th, 1669, throws light on the immigration methods of a century and a half ago. It states in a matter-of-fact manner that "The King sends one hundred and fifty girls to be married, six companies of fifty men, thirty officers or gentlemen, two hundred other persons." These marriageable maidens were usually poor of course, and some were taken from charitable institutions. With a few exceptions, they were respectable course, and some were taken from charitable institutions. With a few exceptions, they were respectable girls, though some of them gave a good deal of trouble to the matrons who took charge of them during the voyage. From time to time young ladies of good birth were sent out to become wives of some of the officers in the colony; but peasant girls, who were "healthy, strong and accustomed to field work" were most in demand. On arrival at Quebec or Montreal, as the case might be, the girls were all lodged together in some house or hall where eligible bachelars might come to inspect them. The girls might reject any applicants of whom they did not like the appearance, but men and maldens alike were expected to choose speedily, and the marriages then took place without delay.

One of its correspondents, in explaining if not defending the actions of the militants, declares that "they have had enormous provocation." She says: "Men under like provocation would have burned half England. They did burn Nottingham Castie and a large part of Bristol in 1832, when a bill widening the franchise for men was held up for a short time in parliament. What would they have done if it had been held up for 45 years?

time in parliament. What would they have done if it had been held up for 45 years?

In considering this argument, the Outlook points out that several things should be remembered. The movement for the reform of the franchise which was successful in 1822 had been held up not for 43 years, but for over a century. Sixty-two. years before the passage of the Reform Bill, Lord Chatham said: "Before the end of this century either the parliament will reform itself from within, or be reformed with a vengeance from without." The flagrant abuses to which he referred were of long standing then. It was exactly 40 years from the introduction of William Pitt's first bill to correct the flagrant abuses of the franchise to the passage of the Reform Bill in 1822.

The burning of Nottingham Castle and a large part of Bristol was not the protest of one part of the common people of England against the action of another part. If was a protest on the part of the people of England against the aristocracy which had blocked the reform upon which the English people had set its heart. The House of Com-

We shall destroy your let-ters, smash your windows, deface your solf courses, burn down your buildings, unless you give us the vote. And we shall do this not in the sudden heat of anger, but in the cold deliberation of premeditation."

To compare this spirit with that of the patriots who spilled British tea into Boston harbor, as one correspondent has done, is weefully to confuse distinctions.

The acts of the men of Boston and of the men of Bristol may well be compared to manslaughter. The acts of the militant suffragettes have the distinctive quality of murder, malice aforethought.


