Omaha, Neb., Jan. 3.—The American people will save about \$1,000,000 a day on freight and passenger rates during 1922, according to estimates made public at headquarters of the Union Pacific Railroad herê. Railroad officials estimate that the saving during 1922 will amount to \$350,000,000, due to the reduction in rates and the removal of the war tax on freight bills and passenger tickets. F. W. Toronto, Jan. 3.—In the election for the Board of Control in this city yesterday, the chief feature was the battle between ex-Controller A. Russell Nesbitt and ex-Controller W. D. Robbins, and the result of the struggle was not definitely known until early this morning. The final figures showed that Mr. Nesbitt nosed Mr. Robbins out by a majority of 131.

The new Board of Control is comprised of the following: Thomas Foster, ex-M. P. for East York and a former Controller of Toronto; Controller W. W. Hiltz, Controller Joseph Gibbons and Former Controller Russell Nesbitt. Mr. Foster headed the poll by a vote of 23,376.

A feature of the vote on the hydroradial railway by-laws and to questions as to increasing aldermen's salaries from \$390 to \$1,200 a year and paying \$800 a year to the members of the Board of Education, who had not been in receipt of salaries, was that the salary question drew much larger votes than the more important question of the railways. Quadruple Agreement Guarantee of Peace

Peace Desired by Australasian Peoples

London. Jan. 3.—Premier Massey of New Zealand, in his New Year's message, in emphasizing the importance of peace for assisting the process of reconstruction, declares that results of the greatest importance from the Washington Conference are probable and that if an amicable quadruple agreement can be maintained, it will be the best guarantee of the peace of the world ever known, says a dispatch to The London Times from Wellington.

"No nations have more to gain by peace than the young British Empire nations of the Pacific," the Premier's message continues, "but whatever agreement is reached between the present great powers, none of their representatives think the world has seen the last war."

He warns against the Empire lapsing into absolute unpreparedness.

### HAS TEST FOR FOUR-POWER PACT

United States Senator Borah States Views

Washington, Jan. 3. - Senator Borah, Republican, of Idaho, speaking here, submitted what he described as a test of whether the four-power Pacific treaty "was based on justice and was therefore a peace alliance, or based upon force a was therefore a military alliance.' was therefore a military alliance."

The test which Mr. Borah offered was whether supporters of the treaty were willing to accept the reservations by which the powers would "agree to restore within one year and thereafter to respect the rights, interests, territory and sovereignty of all nations or Governments in the region of the Pacific." He added the further provision that should the agreement, to restore and respect such interests be not observed, the objections under Article 2 would be terminated automatically.

The Idaho Senator said that "the aggressions in the Far East for the last fifty years have been upon the part of nations, or rather Governments, which now signed an alliance to prevent aggression." He charged that it was the members of the alliance and not those nations outside of it who had disregarded the rights of nations and peoples in the Pacific in recent years.

"There would be no Far Eastern questions of a disturbing nature if the members of this proposed alliance had respected the rights of the weak or more peacefully disposed peoples of the East." Mr. Borah continued. "Let the alliance specifically provide that the alliance itself and each and all of its members will respect, the rights and sovereignity and interests of other peoples, and let it be provided that, if they do not, the alliance is dissolved."

Mr. Borah declared it would be a crime for the United States to join an alliance if "aggressions" are to continue in the ten years of the agreement's life as they have "taken place in the past."

The Senator discussed other provisions of the treaty concerning the homeland of Japan. These, however, he did not regard as more-simportant than other features which, he said, would lead the United States into war "just as truly if an island were attacked as though the Japanese mainland were the object of aggression. 





Thirteen fatal accidents occurred in 1921 in connection with the mining industry, ten of which happened in coal mines and three in metalliferous mining. This is considered a remarkably fine record in a comparative sense and one of which the Minister of Mines, who has been consistent in his efforts to provide adequate safeguards for the lives of those working underground, is especially proud. The ten coal mine fatalities, figuring on the basis of an employed force of 6,500 in and around coal mines, shows a ratio of 1.54 per thousand as against 2.67 per thousand. in 1920 and 2.03 in 1919. "We shall be extremely glad to have suggestions from you as to other ways of relleving the situation and assure you that it is only after very careful study of this with officials of the Department of Agriculture and those associations in a position to judge that we have gone to this step of appealing for your co-operation.

"You will note that your own District cases of distress will be promptly attended to if they are reported. It was our opinion that all the Societies should be associated together to do effective and properly balanced work as overlapping otherwise must take place.

"It is felt that the City and surrounding districts can easily take care of all'the distress provided that the different forms of subscription toward this end are distributed though properly constructed channels as referred to above.

"Hoping you will not only personally help but secure the attention of any organization in your own district to assist.


