



WHITE-RAIL JUMP



There is a growing interest in horses for field events—in the show ring and for hunting. Many farmers are finding the production and training of horses a profitable sideline.

For cross-country hunting, the horse should be trained as a jumper so as to clear the many obstacles it will encounter in the hunt. The same training can be used to great advantage for show horses.

The obstacles illustrated here will be found most useful in training horses for show and the hunt.

For longer life, wood in contact with the ground or exposed to the weather should be treated with preservative. Use a nonstaining preservative so that the equipment may be painted. Rustproof fastenings are also recommended.

Complete working drawings may be obtained from your Extension agricultural engineer at your State university. There may be a small charge to cover cost of printing.
