.. Foreword ..

Again we come to the writing of the Foreword, and on this April morning there is a soft earthy fragrance in the air which portends the coming of warm spring days, assuring the glad certainty that soon there will be another season of beauty in the garden, and after all what is there to compare with the glory of a fresh green world.

During the last few years it has been impressed upon me that the gardens of most lasting beauty are those in which hardy perennials are used extensively, for it is on them the permanence of bloom in a garden depends. In every planting from the most elaborate to the simplest it is well to have a definite plan, for the individuality of a garden is always a source of inspiration to the owner, as well as the personal satisfaction achieved in the display of beautiful specimens, so combined that they give splendid color combinations and continuous bloom from early spring until late fall. Great care is needful however, to secure both a pleasing arrangement of plants and a tasteful harmony of colors, for without these two fundamentals the best cultivated border cannot be a success.

This year, we find a slightly different classification of the Bearded irises. The Directors of the American Iris Society have decided that all Bearded irises shall be classified according to the height of the bloom stalk rather than by season of bloom, therefore the Dwarf section includes all varieties up to 15 in. in height, the Intermediate those from 16 in. up to and including 28 in. and the Tall Bearded all over 30 in. In the past the name Intermediate when applied to irises, conveyed the meaning that they were intermediate in their time of bloom, in other words, between the Dwarfs and Tall Bearded. The Directors feel that the old classification caused many of the fine lower blooming irises to be overlooked, when really they are very essential, not only to plant in front of the taller varieties, but for color effect and finish to the iris border.

It is to be deplored that we do not find better varieties of perennials, especially irises, on most estates; usually it is in the smaller garden that we see the better irises. I think the chief reason is that Landscape Architects who create these large plantings like sweeps of color, and many of them have not taken the time to become familiar with the newer and better varieties which will give greater masses of superior color, and at the same time show individual beauty in size, form, and finish of the flower, while the person closely associated with the planning of their own garden generally make their own selections from the garden of an iris specialist where they can choose the blooms best suited to their color schemes.

Within recent years, the most important addition to the floral world has been the modern race of *hemerocallis* or daylilies. Incomplete indeed is a planting without a generous number of these lovely flowers for they will add charm and vitality to any garden, so plant them extensively and the result will be most gratifying. *Hemerocallis* are among the garden indispensables, and always command the admiration of those looking for improvement in their gardens for they are so vigorous and dependable, requiring little care and with proper selection will give continuous bloom from May to October.

In the *hemerocallis* list there are several new ones of my own, as well as those from other breeders, and they show plainly what great advancement has been made in the creation of new and outstanding varieties. Dr. A. B. Stout of the New York Botanical Garden is the foremost hybridizer for he has produced more distinct breaks in color than any other person working along this line. Aside from those listed in the catalogue, I have nearly all of his named varieties growing in my garden, but as I take great pride in sending out only strong well developed stock, I think it advisable not to offer these for sale until they have increased in size.

Another flower which is not well known to many gardeners is the Oriental poppy. More and more important are the newer hybrids which have come through careful selective breeding. They are remarkable for their perfect color and form, giving delightful accents to the garden.

There have been so many creations in the floral world that it has been necessary for me to use great care in selecting the newer ones which I have added to my catalogue, for it is my intention not to recommend any but those that I think most worthy of your consideration.

This season, I am introducing several irises, hemerocallis and Oriental poppies for other breeders, and I have used even greater discrimination in selecting these than I have in choosing new varieties which have been introduced through other gardens, for I feel that it is my responsibility to sponsor only those with splendid qualities and great distinction of color. In the selection of my own seedlings for introduction this year, I have used great care, and only at the insistence of competent judges have I added them to this list of introductions. It is with a sense of pleasure and satisfaction that I submit these lists of outstanding varieties.

Miss Grace Sturtevant, the dean of iris hybridizers, has discontinued her catalogue and commercial garden, and has entrusted to me the introduction of her new irises for 1937. She will continue to have her exhibition garden, but the above change will give her more time to devote to hybridizing, and this gives promise of some new and beautiful irises.

As in previous years, I have the exclusive introduction of the irises bred by Mr. T. A. Washington, and the new varieties are a great testimony to the skill of this hybridizer, who has always insisted that an iris must be tested thoroughly as to color, substance, and form before being introduced. It is his famous iris, Mary Geddes that won the Dykes Medal for 1936, the highest award that can be given an iris. Mary Geddes has had more honors showered upon it than any other iris, for it was given Honorable Mention by the American Iris Society in 1930, Award of Merit by the American Iris Society in 1933, Award of Merit by the Royal Horticultural Society of England in 1933 and the Dykes Medal in 1936.

I wonder how many readers of this Foreword realize the value of these awards in selecting irises for their gardens. In most catalogues you will find the initials following the description of the irises which have been given any of these awards, and it insures that such irises are very worthy of a place in any garden. I do not intend to infer that irises not having such commendation are not good irises, simply if you are not familiar with them, such a recommendation should give you confidence in making your selections.

The Washington Hybrids of the Southern States Irises have attracted so much attention that again we are prompted to tell you of their great beauty and charm. Not only are they highly successful in America, but from England come reports of the great enthusiasm with which they have been received. In our northern gardens and in England the Louisiana and Florida species do not grow and bloom well, but the Washington hybrids of these species increase rapidly and flower so profusely that all seeing them in bloom, recognize their great garden value as well as their charming loveliness for flower arrangement. They adapt themselves to almost any place in the garden, but are especially effective planted near pools and in half shady places. The most beautiful and rare in the whole iris family.

Others for whom I am introducing new seedlings this year are, Mrs. Edward C. Stahlman, Mrs. Marjorie S. Jennings, Mrs. Arthur Scott, and Mr. Paul H. Cook.

All garden minded men and women look upon their gardens as a quiet haven, and find a continuous source of inspiration and pleasure as they realize that within their garden may be found real adventure, more exhilarating than any modern romance.

Introductions for 1937

BEARDED IRISES

- ARTISTRY** (Washington 1937) A huge flower in ashes of roses coloring. S. well domed and large; F. semi-flaring, with faint buff venations at the haft. The gorgeous yellow beard and yellow styles give an inner glow to this lovely and unusual iris, which has firm substance, a cool smooth finish and great lasting qualities. Well branched. 38 in. **\$10.00**
- CASTILIAN** (Washington 1937) An extremely large deep wine-red bi-color, almost a self, with standards just a shade lighter than the falls. The falls are semi-flaring of velvety Bordeaux-red with some veining at the haft. The heavy yellow beard and yellow center of the flower seem to give this dark red iris a glowing heart. Tall and well branched, with strong heavy substance, this iris attracted a great deal of attention last season. 43 in. **\$12.50**
- CHENOA** (Nesmith 1937) Deep purple self with blackish overcast. The standards are well domed and highly arched. The falls deep purple overlaid with faint black purple lines, such as we find in uncut velvet. Orange beard and styles of purple and yellow. A late blooming variety. Fragrant. 39 in. **\$10.00**
- CHOICE** (Sturtevant 1937) A light yellow bi-color with erect arched standards and semi-flaring falls of slightly darker yellow; orange yellow beard. A delightful May blooming dwarf that well merits the name. 9 in. **\$5.00**
- DIMPLES** (Washington 1937) A dainty pink and yellow blend of peach-pink coloring. S. are maize-yellow flushed with delicate pink, well domed and slightly fluted; F. are semi-flaring of the same maize-yellow overlaid with pink, with a deeper pink spot on each side of the fall, hence the name. Fragrant. 38 in. **\$8.00**
- DIXIE MOONLIGHT** (Washington 1937) A beautiful very late blooming ivory-white, with such perfect texture and finish that it seems almost velvety in substance. S. are warm ivory-white, very domed and stiff; F. are warm white, flushed with antique ivory on upper part of the fall and in the throat. Styles are ivory and yellow; Rich yellow beard. 39 in. **\$25.00**
- GOLDEN AMBER** (Sturtevant 1937) The name gives a perfect picture of this matchless glowing iris. The standards are arched and the color, like Chinese amber beads in sunlight. The falls are semi-flaring with undertone of deeper amber overcast with burnished orange. A reddish orange zone just below the beard adds life and vividness to the flower. The styles are lighter and more yellow, glowing orange beard. A liquid golden brown iris that received great acclaim last season. Plant near a clear yellow for brilliant garden effect. 3 ft. **\$20.00**
- GYPSY GOLD** (Washington 1937) A huge pale yellow self of firm texture and heavy substance which has a shimmering translucent appearance that is most attractive. S. cool canary yellow and domed; F. well flaring and of slightly deeper shade. Deep yellow beard and throat illumine the center of the flower. Well branched sturdy flowering stalks; late blooming. 39 in. **\$20.00**
- HAVANA** (Washington 1937) A golden tobacco-brown and velvety red iris that is most brilliant in the garden. S. glowing red, heavily overlaid with Indian-yellow. F. Spanish-red flushed golden tobacco-brown at haft and in center of the flower. Styles gold, and rich orange beard. 38 in. **\$10.00**

- JORAM** (Nesmith 1937) A red and buff variegata that was greatly admired in the garden last season. S. buff-yellow, lightly touched with red. F. Persian-red with margins of brownish buff. Styles buff, yellow beard. 38 in. \$5.00
- JOYOUS** (Sturtevant 1937) An enchanting iris of blended pink and yellow that makes a lovely cut flower or glowing mass of color in the garden. Similar in color to Her Majesty and Queen of May, but taller and much better branched, with an undertone of yellow which gives life and glow to this crisp satiny flower of extreme fragrance. 29 in. \$10.00
- MANCHU PRINCE** (Washington 1937) A strong and sturdy iris with Oriental splendor of coloring. The standards are golden tobacco brown, ruffled and beautifully domed. The falls are very flaring, of deep Persian-red with velvety black overtone. The styles are tobacco-brown and yellow, set off by rich orange beard. 39 in. \$10.00
- NEOS** (Sturtevant 1937) An exquisite pink and yellow blend. The shimmering butterfly-like flowers are poised on slender graceful stems, and are ideal for flower arrangements or as a border iris. The standards and falls have a clear yellow background flushed with pink deepening at the tip of the blade to Rosaline-purple. The apricot and yellow heart of the flower is glorified by the intense orange beard. 2½ ft. \$10.00
- PIED PIPER** (Stahlman 1937) A large buff plicata with tall four branched stalks. The graceful well domed standards have a cream background washed and powdered cinnamon-buff. The semi-flaring falls are creamy white, lightly bordered with cinnamon-buff. Styles yellow and buff, rich yellow beard. An extremely attractive and valuable addition to the plicata group. 40 in. \$10.00
- ROSY FLUSH** (Tobie 1936) Described by the originator as "The pinkest iris in my garden". A tall graceful pink self with golden beard and yellow glow throughout the center of the flower. Late and long blooming season. 40 in. \$10.00
- SEA FOAM** (Sturtevant 1937) An airy and dainty Intermediate with pearl white standards and pale yellow falls giving the effect of a creamy white. The white styles and almost white beard add to the charm of this very fragrant iris. 24 in. \$6.50
- SELERNO** (Washington 1937) A brilliant late Intermediate which attracted great attention in the garden last June. The well domed standards are a blending of buff and red, the falls are Spanish-red with lighter tracery around the edge, and are very flaring. The styles are buff, intense yellow beard. One of the best late blooming Intermediates 28 in. \$7.00
- SNOW GOOSE** (Washington 1937) The most distinctive silvery white iris that I have seen. When the flower first unfolds it has a distinct blue cast, rapidly changing to an opaque cool white. The standards are very broad and form a perfect dome, the falls are very flaring with faint buff markings in the throat, the styles are white, and pale cream beard. It resembles Santa Barbara in form, but the flowers are larger, more perfect in shape, finish, and texture. This iris has a dignity and beauty that is most impressive. 40 in. \$25.00
- SNOW PLUME** (Nesmith 1937) An immaculate white iris of large size, fine form, and smooth finish. The standards are very broad, slightly ruffled at the edge, and closely arched, the semi-flaring falls are very large and broad. Styles pure white and light gold beard. A profusely flowering iris with well and lowly branched stalks. This with White Goddess and Cathedral Dome completes my trio of white irises, each imposing and entirely different. 36 in. \$20.00

SOUTHERN BELLE (Washington 1937) An attractive rose-pink blend with tall graceful stalks and great garden value, giving a note of pink which we find very needful in color planting. The rosy pink standards are arched and well held together, the velvety rose-pink falls are semi-flaring with slight veining at the haft. The center of the flower is buff, and the beard rich yellow. 40 in. **\$7.50**

SUB-DEB (Washington 1937) A perfectly formed flower of clear light blue with extremely firm substance and smooth satiny finish, standards are clear pale blue, very arched and domed, the falls are semi-flaring and of slightly deeper tone. The styles are pure blue and white, yellow beard. An iris of great charm and refinement. 39 in **\$10.00**

TEKOA (Nesmith 1937) A rich blue-purple self with strong heavy substance and excellent branching. The standards are very deep blue-purple, well arched and domed, the flaring falls are of the same shade, but appear darker on account of their rich velvety substance, slight bronzy reticulations in the throat. Styles blue, and deep yellow beard tipped with blue. A fragrant very late variety that gives great extension of the bearded iris season and has splendid garden value. 38 in. **\$8.00**

THE BISHOP (Washington 1937) One of the largest and most decorative dark irises that I have ever seen. A smoothly finished long flower of intense Bishop's purple. The standards are large and well domed, the large long falls are slightly flaring, but of very firm substance and texture, the styles are purple, and the deep yellow beard gives an added brilliance. Regal in color and well branched, this fragrant iris gives a note of splendor that is outstanding. 38 in. **\$10.00**

VALIANT (Sturtevant-Mitchell 1937) A very richly colored flower of peacock iridescence. The domed standards are a blending of blue and old gold with mid-rib of blue. The slightly drooping falls are brilliant wistaria-violet with faint old gold edge and a touch of bronze just below the rich orange beard. The crisp firm flowers are borne on tall well branched stalks. This iris is a seedling from a cross made by Miss Sturtevant in the garden of Professor Mitchell and is one that I am most pleased to help introduce. 38 in. **\$10.00**

WHITE PRINCESS (Washington 1937) The finest pure white, late Intermediate that I have ever seen. The standards are pure white, closely domed and beautiful in form, the falls are semi-flaring, of the same pure white. Styles white, and full medium yellow beard. The perfectly formed flowers of very firm substance, borne on lowly and well branched stalks give the effect of Carrara marble, an enchanting iris. 25 in. **\$20.00**

SIBERIAN IRISES

BABET (Nesmith 1937) A most unusual and lovely Siberian of pale lavender, flushed mauve-pink, with yellow markings at the throat. A smoothly finished flower, and a new break in color. Mr. Salbach of California was greatly impressed by the beauty of this iris, and pronounced it "One of the discoveries of our trip". Stock limited. Net. **\$5.00**

MOONSPRITE (Jennings 1937) An ethreal blossom of silvery mauve overcast with lilac-pink. The tall graceful flowering stalks often carry ten blooms to a stalk, thus giving it a long flowering season. A dainty and lovely Siberian. **\$3.00**

JAPANESE IRISES

FROSTY MORNING (Nesmith 1937) Sgl. A glistening flower of pale lavender with deeper lavender halo surrounding a canary yellow signal. The whole flower has a sheen that reminds one of the white crystals on a frosty morning. **\$4.00**

WOODROSE (Nesmith 1937) Sgl. Large falls of pinkish mauve frosted with iridescent blue. Purple lines radiating from blue halo which surrounds a large yellow signal. Standards are pink, and the styles deep rose-purple. A beautiful new iris. **\$4.00**

APPLE BLOSSOM (Nesmith 1937) An exquisite flower of delicate shell pink, with petals slightly ruffled at the edge, a pure self with no dark markings. Tall Bearded Irises

Newer and Rarer Varieties

Excellent older irises especially priced will be found on pages 20-21.

The bearded irises may be planted from July 1st to Sept. 15th. In making a new bed, take out the soil for about 12 in. If the drainage is poor, 2 in. of cinders or small stones should be placed in the bottom, over this 3 in. of sods or fair garden loam, then 4 in. of well rotted cow manure. Fill the rest of the bed with rich garden loam, with this mix a little bone meal. When finished the bed should be about 4 in. above surrounding ground. Spread out roots and plant 1 in. deep, water in when planting.

American Species and Hybrids

This group includes new and rare Louisiana and Florida irises, and especial attention is called to the named hybrids produced by Mr. T. A. Washington of Nashville, Tennessee. These bloom after the bearded irises and before the Japanese irises, and are a great addition to any garden. They are especially recommended for pool edge and half shady places in the garden.

CULTURE. In preparing ground for planting, leaf-mold or compost mixed with well decayed cow manure in the bottom, the remainder of the excavated place to be filled with leaf-mold or compost mixed with good rich garden loam. Plant rhizomes at least one inch deep, water in well and do not allow them to dry out. Late summer planting is best for it enables them to start growth soon after their dormant season. They require plenty of moisture during their growing season, but no standing water during winter. In fall give a six inch covering of leaves or marsh hay, and do not remove too early in the spring. These irises are perfectly hardy in my New England garden.

After first real freeze give green leaves a light mulch of excelsior or marsh hay.
